This is the first interim response to your November 2, 2010, Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) for a copy of each submission by DHS components to the Privacy Office of significant FOIA activities, to include records that were created/dated between July 2009 and the present. This office received your request on November 9, 2010.

To date, we have completed our review of 82 pages for documents responsive to your request. I have determined that 68 pages of the records are releasable in their entirety and 14 pages are partially releasable pursuant to Title 5 U.S.C. § 552 (b)(6), FOIA Exemption 6.

FOIA Exemption 6 exempts from disclosure personnel or medical files and similar files the release of which would cause a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. This requires a balancing of the public's right to disclosure against the individual's right privacy. The privacy interests of the individuals in the records you have requested outweigh any minimal public interest in disclosure of the information. Any private interest you may have in that information does not factor into the aforementioned balancing test.

You have a right to appeal the above withholding determination; however, we do request that you hold any appeals in abeyance pending the issuance of our final response. Your agreement to do so will have no affect on the adjudication of your appeal. Should you wish to do so, you must send your appeal and a copy of this letter, within 60 days of the date of this letter, to: Associate General Counsel (General Law), U.S. Department of Homeland Security, Washington, D.C. 20528, following the procedures outlined in the DHS regulations at 6 C.F.R. § 5.9. Your envelope and letter should be marked "FOIA Appeal." Copies of the FOIA and DHS regulations are available at www.dhs.gov/foia.

This is the final response to your November 2, 2010, Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) for a copy of each submission by DHS components to the Privacy Office of significant FOIA activities, to include records that were created/dated between July 2009 and the present. This office received your request on November 9, 2010.

My previous partial release addressed the first 82 pages reviewed in response to your request. To date, we have completed our review of an additional 301 pages. Of those pages, I have determined that 256 are releasable in their entirety, and 45 pages are partially releasable pursuant to Title 5 U.S.C. § 552 (b)(3), (b)(6), and (b)(7)(C) FOIA Exemptions 3, 6, and 7C.

FOIA Exemption 3 protects information specifically exempted from disclosure by another statute, if the statute (A)(i) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on the issue; or (ii) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld; and (B) if enacted after the date of enactment of the OPEN FOIA Act of 2009, specifically cites to this paragraph. Section 114(r) of title 49, United States Code, exempts from disclosure SSI that "would be detrimental to the security of transportation" if disclosed. The TSA regulations implementing Section 114(r) are found in 49 CFR Part 1520.

FOIA Exemption 6 exempts from disclosure personnel or medical files and similar files the release of which would cause a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. This requires a balancing of the public's right to disclosure against the individual's right privacy. The privacy interests of the individuals in the records you have requested outweigh any minimal public interest in disclosure of the information. Any private interest you may have in that information does not factor into the aforementioned balancing test.

Exemption 7(C) protects records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes that could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. This exemption takes particular note of the strong interests of individuals, whether they are suspects, witnesses, or investigators, in not being unwarrantably associated with alleged criminal activity.

That interest extends to persons who are not only the subjects of the investigation, but those who may have their privacy invaded by having their identities and information about them revealed in connection with an investigation. Based upon the traditional recognition of strong privacy interest in law enforcement records, categorical withholding of information that identifies third parties in law enforcement records is ordinarily appropriate. As such, I have determined that the privacy interest in the identities of individuals in the records you have requested clearly outweigh any minimal public interest in disclosure of the information. Please note that any private interest you may have in that information does not factor into this determination.

You have a right to appeal the above withholding determination. Should you wish to do so, you must send your appeal and a copy of this letter, within 60 days of the date of this letter, to: Associate General Counsel (General Law), U.S. Department of Homeland Security, Washington, D.C. 20528, following the procedures outlined in the DHS regulations at 6 C.F.R. § 5.9. - I. Efficiency and Transparency Steps taken to increase transparency and make forms and processes used by the general public more user-friendly, particularly web-based and FOIA related items:
 - Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) recently made significant enhancements to its FOIA Reading Room. New information is posted to the reading room on a weekly basis. During the week of July 13, 2009, ICE posted four government contracts, five 287(g) audits, and 11 detention facility audits.
 - U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) is furthering its backlog reduction effort by revisiting procedures for handling requests where the associated files cannot be located ("lost files"). In the past, lost files were carried in the USCIS FOIA tracking system for a period of 12 months, with the FOIA request remaining open. USCIS is considering reducing this time period to 9 months, at which time the FOIA request will be closed with a notation that USCIS is unable to locate the file associated with the request.
 - U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) is currently reviewing a draft call center guide which, when put into use, will help assure consistency of response as well as act as a reference guide for the most frequently asked questions.

- I. Efficiency and Transparency Steps taken to increase transparency and make forms and processes used by the general public more user-friendly, particularly web-based and FOIA related items:
 - The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced plans to prepare FAQ's for FOIA requesters, which will be posted on the FEMA website.
 - Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) instituted an agreement to facilitate the electronic referral of records, significantly reducing agency costs. USCIS refers 1,500 pages of records to ICE approximately three times per month. In the past, these records were transmitted in hard-copy via the U.S. Postal Service. Through the new agreement, these records are now transmitted electronically via e-mail, which is expected to save approximately \$39,826.00 annually. The savings include \$520.00 in paper costs, \$900.00 in postage, and \$600.00 in printer toner annually. In addition, previously one GS-9 Employee was assigned to receive, electronically scan, and log-in all referrals received from USCIS on a full-time basis. Because all referrals are now electronic, the GS-9 Employee now spends only 25% of his/her time receiving and logging-in referrals from USCIS for an estimated savings of \$37,806.

The response included an Excel spreadsheet listing the total annual costs since 2001 and the bed-day rates associated with each detention facility.

- On December 21, 2010, Kevin Wisniewski, a reporter with News
 Channel 5 in Nashville, Tennessee, requested from U.S. Immigration and
 Customs Enforcement (ICE) records regarding Barrett Enterprises, LP,
 Barrett Ammo, LLC, Barrett Firearms Manufacturing, Barrett Firearms
 USA and the weapons made by these companies. (Case Number
 2011FOIA4210).
- On December 22, 2010, Ginger McCall, Assistant Director with EPIC
 Open Government Project in Washington, D.C., requested from U.S.
 Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) copies of all communication or agreements between the U.S. Government and corporations regarding the personal information of donors to WikiLeaks, and all communications between the U.S. Government and corporations regarding the personal information of individuals who accessed or attempted to access the WikiLeaks website or the November release. (Case Number 2011FOIA4276).
- On December 22, 2010, Andrew Medici, a reporter with Federal Times
 in Springfield, Virginia, requested from the National Protection and
 Programs Directorate (NPPD) copies of the aggregate numbers of incident
 reports filed by members of the Federal Protective Service while
 responding to incidents, making arrests, assisting local law enforcement
 and issuing citations at federal facilities, by building, state, and region.
 (Case Number NPPD11F060).

III. FOIA Appeals

On December 29, 2010, Paul Gottlieb, a reporter with the *Peninsula Daily News* in Port Angeles, Washington, appealed the response from U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) to his request for the number of arrests made by Port Angeles Station, Blaine Sector, for Fiscal Year 2009 and Fiscal Year 2010. (Case Number 2010F16670).

IV. FOIA Releases

- On December 13, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Jim Polson, a reporter with Bloomberg News in New York, New York, 165 pages pertaining to his request for records concerning and oil spill involving the vessel EAGLE TOME on January 13, 2010 in Port Arthur, Texas. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(5), (b)(6) and (b)(7). (Case Number 2010FOIA2244).
- On December 13, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Claudette Juska, a representative of Greenpeace in Washington, D.C., 87 pages pertaining to her request for records concerning communications

- or information that mention certain endangered and threatened species and species of concern in the Gulf region following the BP Deepwater Horizon disaster. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(5) and (b)(6). (Case Number 2010FOIA3006).
- On December 13, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Claudette Juska, a representative of Greenpeace in Washington, D.C., 14 pages pertaining to her request for communications regarding turtles being killed in controlled oil burns in the Gulf of Mexico following the BP Deepwater Horizon disaster. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(5) and (b)(6). (Case Number 2010FOIA3007).
- On December 13, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Claudette Juska, a representative of Greenpeace in Washington, D.C., 4 pages pertaining to her request for records concerning communication between the USCG and ExxonMobil, Shell Oil, and/or ConocoPhillips regarding the safety of oilrigs in the Gulf of Mexico and/or blowout preventers. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(6). (Case Number 2010FOIA3005).
- On December 13, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Noah Wexler, a representative of Arnold & Itkin LLP in Houston, Texas, one page pertaining to his request for a copy of all documents regarding a Deepwater Horizon cleanup vessel incident that occurred aboard the vessel JOE G JR on June 11, 2010. These records were released in full. (Case Number 2010FOIA3080).
- On December 13, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Sharon Theimer, a reporter with The Associated Press in Washington, D.C., one page pertaining to her request for copies of any and all correspondence pertaining to a Coast Guard contractor that worked on the Gulf Oil Spill response team from April 21, 2010 to present. These records were released in full. (Case Number 2010FOIA3369).
- On December 16, 2010, United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) released to Erin Siegal, a freelance journalist in New York, New York, 11 pages responsive to her request seeking all correspondence and petitions between USCIS, the Department of State, and the United States Embassy in Guatemala pertaining to two Guatemalan sisters, who were kidnapped and the placed for adoption. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(2), (b)(6), and (b)(7)(C). (Case Number NRC2009009432).
- On December 17, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to David Kennedy, a reporter with BoatU.S. Government Affairs in Alexandria, Virginia, 234 pages pertaining to his request for a list of all waters under Federal Jurisdiction in the First Coast Guard District. These records were released in full. (Case Number 2011FOIA0873).
- On December 20, 2010, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) released to Robert O'Harrow, a reporter with *The Washington Post* in Washington, D.C., 396 pages of procurement records in response to a

- request for records relating to the Advance Spectroscopy Portals (ASP) Program to specifically include documents provided by DHS to the Government Accountability Office. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(4) and (b)(6).
- On December 21, 2010, United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) released to Michael Ravnitzky, an individual in Silver Spring, Maryland, 77 pages of records responsive to his request seeking copies of each substantial report from Department of Homeland Security to Congress or a Congressional Committee from January 1, 2008 to present. These records were released in full. (Case Number COW2010000161).
- On December 20, 2010, United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) released to E.J. Graff, a reporter with *The Schuster Institute for Investigative Journalism* in Waltham, Massachusetts, 51 pages of documents responsive to their request seeking all reports related to the August 2007 police and Guatemalan Attorney General's Office raids on the Casa Quivira children's home in Guatemala. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(6). (Case Number NRC2009025906).
- On December 21, 2010, United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) issued to E.J. Graff, a reporter with *The Schuster Institute for Investigative Journalism* in Waltham, Massachusetts, a full denial pertaining to their request seeking all records, reports, complaints, inquiries and investigations regarding a named individual. These pages were withheld in full pursuant to FOIA Exemptions (b)(5) and (b)(6). (Case Number NRC2009025923).
- On December 21, 2010, United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), released to E.J. Graff, a reporter with *The Schuster Institute for Investigative Journalism* in Waltham, Massachusetts, 13 pages responsive to their request seeking any reports, complaints, records, memos, statistical data made available to United States Citizenship and Immigration Services; from government agencies, medical facilities, NGO's or elsewhere-suggesting irregularities in the intercountry adoption process of Guatemalan children. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(6).
- On December 21, 2010, the Office of Inspector General (OIG) released to David Perera, a journalist with Fierce Government IT in Washington, D.C., the 74-page report #OIG-10-103, entitled "Special Review of the Science and Technology Directorate's Contracts with a Small Business." Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(4), (b)(6), and (b)(7)(A). (Case Number OIG FOIA #2010-166).
- On December 22, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Eileen Sullivan, a reporter with *The Associated Press* in Washington, D.C., 39 pages pertaining to her request for records regarding resource request messages for equipment and materials. Portions of this response

- were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(5) and (b)(6). (Case Number 2010FOIA3204).
- On December 22, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Anna Hrybyk, with the Louisiana Bucket Brigade in New Orleans, Louisiana, 301 pages pertaining to her request for any documents containing the air monitoring results for offshore clean up vessels as well as all worker health incident reports from April 2010 to present day. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(5) and (b)(6). (Case Number 2010FOIA2760).
- On December 22, 2010, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) released to Remington Shepard, a research associate with the Service Employees International Union in Washington, D.C., a copy of the contract awarded to Paragon Systems, Inc. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(4) and (b)(6).
- On December 27, 2010, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) released to Marcas Baram, Senior Editor with the Huffington Post in New York, New York, a 6-page log of correspondence produced from the Executive Correspondence Tracking (ECT) system responsive to his request for a log of correspondence pertaining to the WikiLeaks organization. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(6).
- On December 29, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Erik Potter with The Enterprise in Brockton, Massachusetts, 24 pages of records responsive to his request seeking copies of all releasable records concerning the individuals who were with Mr. John M. Pina, Jr. when he died during a boating accident. These records were released in full
- On December 29, 2010, the United States Coast Guard (USCG) released to Anne Weismann, Chief Counsel for Citizens for Ethics and Responsibility in Washington (CREW), and Damon Moglan, Global Warming Campaign Director for Greenpeace in Washington, D.C., 569 pages of records responsive to their request seeking any and all video feeds that capture the British Petroleum (BP), Deepwater Horizon oil spill, as well as documents referring to USCG communications concerning the use of dispersants, and all USCG Gaily Operations Reports. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA Exemptions (b)(5) and (b)(6).
- On December 30, 2010, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS)
 Management Directorate (MGMT) released to Susan Carroll, a reporter
 with the Houston Chronicle, in Houston, Texas, 45 pages responsive to
 her request seeking a copy of the Balanced Workforce Strategy. These
 records were released in full.
- On December 30, 2010, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) released to Karen Kaiser, Counsel for *The Associated Press*, in Phoenix, Arizona, 41 pages of records responsive to their request and subsequent appeal seeking documents pertaining to: 1) Documents showing the

- number of recorded breaches to fences and barriers along the U.S.-Mexico border during the last three fiscal years; 2) Documents showing the number of tunnels that were discovered along the U.S.-Mexico border during the last three fiscal years; 3) Documents addressing the impact of the National Guard on border security along the U.S.-Mexico border from May 2006 through July 2008; 4) Documents showing the number of "getaways" at or near the U.S.-Mexico border during the last three fiscal years, and 5) documents considering solutions to drug smuggling along the U.S.-Mexico border. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA Exemptions (b)(2), (b)(6), (b)(7)(C), and (b)(7)(E).
- On December 30, 2010, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Office of Intelligence and Analysis (I&A) released to Jason Smathers, a blogger for Witness Unto Me in Topock, Arizona, 31 pages of records responsive to his request seeking the following records: 1) Remarks, comments, notes, explanations, etc. made by DHS personnel or contractors about the processing of these requests (and appeals, if appropriate); 2) The invocation of exemptions, or related matters; to include any analysts' notes made during the processing of the requests; 3) Any standard worksheets completed by the Analysts; 4) Any justifications for exemption invocations or other supporting documentation provided to the Appeals Authority; 5) Any correspondence referencing the requests, including tasking orders, emails, and coordination documentation; and 6) Any records previously released to the original requesters in unredacted form may be excluded from this request. Portions of this response were withheld pursuant to FOIA Exemptions (b)(2), (b)(5), and (b)(6).

V. Lawsuits

- In the matter of <u>Radeli Vishnevski</u>, <u>Maria Kirvalidze</u>, <u>Eugene Kirirkov v</u>. <u>Department of State</u>, <u>Department of Homeland Security</u>, (USDC Georgia CV-03199-WBD), Plaintiff filed a complaint on October 1, 2010, seeking declaratory injunctive, and other appropriate relief for violations of her and her son's individual, human, citizen, civil and associational rights under the Fourteenth Amendments to the United States Constitution.
- In the matter of <u>Electronic Frontier Foundation v. Department of Homeland Security</u>, (USDC ND California CV-10-5526), Plaintiff filed on December 6, 2010, claiming constructive denial pertaining to their request for records relating to the use of social-networking websites as investigative, surveillance, and data collection tools.
- In the matter of National Day Laborer Organizing Network, Center for Constitutional Rights, and Immigration Justice Clinic of the Cardozo School of Law v. ICE, et al., (SDNY. 10-3488), (Secure Communities), A hearing on the preliminary injunction was held on December 9, 2010. At that hearing, the judge ordered ICE to produce all opt-out records by January 17, 2011, and all other documents relating to the "Rapid Production List" by February 25, 2011. OPLA has set up a "war room" where staff from the ICE FOIA Office, OCR, ERO and OPLA, and FOIA

- staff from other DHS components have been processing opt-out records since December 20, 2010.
- In the matter of <u>Families for Freedom, et al. v. CBP, et al.</u>, (SDNY 10-2705), On Thursday, December 23, 2010, the Court ordered ICE to provide additional information relating to the records produced in the supplemental response and declaration. Specifically, the Court wants ICE to search for 6-month reviews of the MOU, or a declaration explaining that there were no reviews.

Exemption 7: records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, to the extent that the production of those records A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of a confidential source, E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or procedures, or F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual.

Exemption 9: geological information on wells
