Alexandria, by referenced airtel, furnished an LHM which reported on information appearing in a Jack Anderson article printed in the "Huntsville, Alabama, Times," 10/8/76, entitled "Army Missiles Fail to Meet Required Performance Marks." This matter had been called to Alexandria's attention by Major Directorate of Intelligence Operations, Security Division, Department of the Army, Pentagon, Arlington, Virginia.

Major advised that Anderson's article contains classified information regarding the army's Chapteral Missile, which Anderson claims to have taken from a copy he obtained of the General Accounting Office's classified study of the short-range air defense system.

Major in addition to reporting this matter to the FBI, requested that we attempt to recover this classified report from Anderson.

As indicated above, we do not institute investigations into these type matters unless so instructed by the Department, who, in the past, has always requested answers to the 11 questions shown on previous pages, before making any determination as to the course of action to be taken.

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



Dear Mr. Kelley:

With respect to your memorandum dated April 20, 1937, concerning the unauthorized release of classified information to Jack Anderson, October 1976, Espionage - X, the following information is being provided.

The report in question was a staff study, conducted annually, by our Procurement and Systems Acquisition Division (PSAD).

The report "Roland and Chapperal Missile and Anti-aircraft Gun Programs" (PSAD-76-116), dated March 17, 1976, and classified CONTINENTIAL, was received in our printing facility located at the GAO Building on March 10, 1976. One hundred and forty two (142) copies of this study were printed.

On March 17, 1976, our Distribution Section began delivering these reports in accordance with the distribution list provided by PSAD. We were unable to locate the original list used for the distribution. However, a duplicate copy of that listing is enclosed. A dual receipting system was used with an external receipt used to certify receipt of a package, and an internal receipt was completed by the personnel in the Congressman's office and in turn was to be returned to GAO. The external receipt did not identify the GAO control number assigned to the internal receipt. Therefore, it was impossible for our staff to relate the two kinds of receipts to identify who delivered the material, or to be certain and certify that those offices who failed to return the internal receipt actually received the classified reports. The result is that we have been able to certify recipients of 96 of these reports (87 to Congressmen; 9 reports held by PSAD).

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Enclosed for your review are copies of all of the receipts that could be located, a copy of the distribution list used at the time, and a copy of the report in question (copy 9). Given this wide distribution and the likelihood that a copy was made to give to Jack Anderson--rather than giving him a controlled, prenumbered report -- it seems highly unlikely to us that the source of the information can be located. It should be noted that since the publication of this report, two supervisors in our Distribution Section have been removed from their positions and substantive changes have been instituted to tighten controls on classified materials. Your letter mentioned that we may be contacted by the Army regarding this matter; to date we have not been contacted. In connection with this request, Mr. Frederick D. Baron. Special Assistant to the AG, telephonically requested from Special Agent Supervisor Federa Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Headquarters, that the FBI Tederal furnish his effice with four or five summaries, approximate 270 one-two pages in length, relating to FBI investigations of unauthorized disclosures of classified information. Mr. Baron suggested five categories which reflected the type of cases he wanted summaries written for. Mr. Baron also requested a copy of a letter from the FBI to various intelligence agencies, written in 1969, Which alerted them to the eleven questions used to obtain information in leak cases for the Justice Department in order for the Justice Department to make a determination Associas to Whether any investigation should be initiated. Three of these letterhead memoranda are classified "Confidential," Also enclosed is one copy of the 1969 letter requested by Mr. Baron, as mentioned above, which is dated November 5, 1969, and directed to the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense. Enclosures (9) NOTE: Matter relates to a request from the Department that the Bureau furnish material to enable them to respond to a letter from Senator Incuye to the AG dated 5/23/77. b6 SA Legal Counsel Division, originally b7C received the request from the Department for our assistance in preparing a response to Senator Inouye's letter and he has been coordinating this letter with Mr. Frederick Baron, Special Assistant to the AG. The 5 categories suggested by Mr. Baron, which reflected the type of cases he wanted summaries for were: 1. A case involving a high-ranking military or civilian Government official, who, to gain support for proposed policies, leaked classified information concerning them to the media or other unauthorized persons. A case involving a low-level Government official accused of leaking classified information.

- 3. A case where investigation and/or prosecution was initiated and subsequently stopped for one reason or another, such as the complainant agency did not desire to continue pursuing the matter, etc.

- 5. A case where the investigation involved a member of Congress or his staff which resulted in our investigation being hampered because of the status of the individuals involved.

On December 20, 1976, Major Office of the Directorate of Intelligence Operations, Security Division, Department of the Army, Pentagon, furnished the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), information regarding a possible leak of classified information concerning the U.S. Army Chaparral Missile The classified information appeared in Jack Anderson's column in the "Huntsville Times," Huntsville, Alabama, October 6, 1976, edition.

In his column, Mr. Anderson commented on the army's short-range air defense system, claiming to possess a copy of the General Accounting Office's (GAO) classified study of this system. He particularly highlighted the weaknesses of the Chaparral Missile System, and according to Major portions of the material appearing concerning the Chaparral Missile ere classified "Contidential."

Hajor at the time of reporting this incident, stated that his office had made no efforts to determine if, in fact, Mr. Anderson did have a copy of the GAG classified report, or how he got it. However, if it were true, his office desired that the FBI attempt to recover the report from Mr. Anderson.

On January 24, 1977, Major was recontacted and requested to furnish responses to specific questions regarding the classified material which allegedly appeared in Anderson's column. These questions are normally asked by the Department of Justice (DOJ) to assist them in making a determination as to any necessary action to be taken in matters such as this.

along with Major responses to the abovementioned questions, were submitted to the DOJ, Criminal Division.

The Assistant Attorney General (AAG), Criminal Division, by letter dated March 3, 1977, instructed that the FBI obtain from CAO, a copy of the report which Mr. Anderson was alluding to, and which Major had identified as "GAO Staff Study, Roland and Chaparral Missile and Antiaircraft Gun Programs," dated March 17, 1976, classified "Contidential." In addition to the copy of this report, the AAG requested information regarding the number of copies printed and the extent of its dissemination.

The AAG also instructed that the army be requested to furnish more definitive responses regarding the classified information allegedly disclosed than that previously furnished.

On March 29, 1977, the Director of Security, GAO, was contacted by a Special Agent of the FBI, Washington Field Office, at which time a request was made for a copy of the above-mentioned GAO report. The Director of Security requested that either the DOJ or FBI Headquarters address a formal written request for this report and any other information desired. This written request was sent to GAO on April 20, 1977, by FBI Headquarters.

On April 21, 1977, Major was recontacted at which time he advised that after further consideration, the army decided that they do not desire to pursue this matter any further, and therefore, do not intend to furnish more definitive responses regarding the classified information appearing in Mr. Anderson's column.

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To date, GAO has not responded to the FBI's written formal request of April 20, 1977.




Anderson was asked if he was positive the investigating Agents were from FBI and he was positive they were.

Bureau records were checked and Anderson was advised that the Bureau was not investigating him.

Information was located in the files that advised in January, 1950, that Anderson was a draft dodger. A routine check was made at the War Department and it was ascertained that Anderson had served in the Army, the matter being checked out in this manner resulted in no investigation being opened.







Drew Pearson appeared before the Senate Subcommittee Investigating Government Ethics. He stated that twelve cases of secret data on radar disappeared from the Army Signal Corps Laboratory, Fort Monmouth, N.J. (no date given).

In discussing the relationship between the Radio Corporation of America and the Army Signal Corps. Pearson mentioned as an example Major a former RCA employee whom Pearson said was employed at the Army Signal Corps, Fort Monmouth, during the war. Immediately after the war returned to RCA but turned up at Fort Monmouth in 1946, and made a request to see files on secret radar developments. Pearson said "I do not know if he ever saw the files but incidentally twelve cases of secret radar files disappeared from Ft. Monmouth" (details set out).

SID, Fort Monmouth, conducted an investigation regarding the above and the following information was set out:

On 6/10/49 Jack Anderson telephonically inquired of Mr. Nichols whether any harm would result if Drew Pearson used the story which mentioned the name of the informant on the "Battery" who turned up the dope on Anderson was advised that since the matter was being tried there was nothing that we could say. Mr. Nichola also told him that if he were Anderson he would recheck his sources very carefully. Anderson stated that he was certain of his sources who were in a position to know unless we had some information either on or off the record which would influence them against using the name. Anderson was advised that the Bureau did not have, that he might want to take the matter up with the Department.

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Senator Brian MoMahon telephoned regarding the Fulton Lewis story on Major G. Racy Jordan. He was advised that Lewis had furnished the Bureau the story several weeks ago and the Bureau furnished the facts to the Attorney General who asked the Bureau to investigate. (Date not given)

Jack Anderson telephonically inquired (date not given) if the Bureau was making any statement concerning the Jordan ellegations (not further described). He was advised the Bureau had adopted a no comment position and there was nothing to be said. Anderson stated he had reason to believe the whole matter was a hoar and he wondered if he was on sound ground. He also stated a couple of Air Force people had advised that there was something fishy about Jordan. He wondered if there was any information the Bureau could give on Jordan's background.

Anderson then referred to the uranium exide incident and wondered if this was new or whether there had not been something in the papers about this. He was advised that the papers on the day before had carried stories attributing to the Un-American Activities Committee information on the uranium exide and the Bureau could make no comment.

Anderson then daked if the Bureau had told Fulton Lewis that the time had come when he could break the story. He was informed that, as he well knew, the Bureau did not tell people when to use stories or when not to use stories and again was told the Bureau's position was one of no comment from the inception.

Director's notation: "We should bring to an early conclusion our investigation. See that it is most thoroughly done."

On 1/16/50 furntahed a document dated 12/6/49 captioned "Jack Anderson, Chief Legman for Drew Pearson." and the source was described as The document. related to Army service of Anderson and an attempt to dodge the draft. On 5/21/47 Jack Anderson requested from lasistant Director Tracu. information concerning No action was taken. in regard to Anderson's request. Mr. Tracy stated that Anderson was formerly a reporter for the "Salt Lake Tribune," Salt Lake City, Utah. He was favorably impressed with Anderson. (other background information set out). It was requested that the Liaison Section request the department of the Army to furnish information concerning Jack (Northman) Anderson. **b**6 Burequ memo 1/23/50 Rez Miscellaneous-Information Concerning furnished a document dated 13/6/49, relating to Jack Anderson who was referred to as "chief leg-man" for Drew Pearson, which concerned Anderson's

Army service and his attempt to dodge the draft.

The following information from Bureau files

Anderson made a request through Assistant Director S. J. Tracy for information from Bureau files. In May, 1947, Anderson indicated to Mr. Tracy his intentions to specialize in Foreign Service at Georgetown University.

A search of the Identification Division failed to indicate a fingerprint record which reflected the Army serial number of Anderson.

The Liaison Section was requested to check with the Department of the Army for a record of Jack Northman Anderson regarding secret information passed without authority to Drew Pearson, as well as Anderson's attempt to evade the draft.

On 1/32/30 Drew Pearson stated in his broadcast that the breaking of the Brinks case in Boston might take a long time to solve because there were too few criminal informants in the Boston underworld available to the Bureau.

In connection with above Jack Anderson telephonically inquired on 1/21/50 regarding the Brinks case. He was informed the Bureau was naking no comment. Anderson stated he had heard we had good Communist undercover informants in Boston but we did not have good criminal underworld informants. He was advised no comment. Anderson then asked if the underworld was not in Revere, Mass., and again he was not given an answer.

Director's notation regarding paragraph 1:

"All too true unfortunately."

Bureau memo 1/27/50 No caption 91-5535-413 (14) Bureau memo dated 1/24/50 suggested that Liaison determine if the Army had any record which could be identified with Jack Northman Anderson which might indicate his attempt to evade the draft or to cause information to be passed without authority to Drew Pearson.

A check of the files of the Records Section, Intelligence Division of the Army, revealed no record on Jack Northman Anderson.

A check of other Department of Army files revealed that Anderson was born 10/19/22, Long Beach, California. He was inducted into the Army 10/8/45 at Headquarters, U.S. Forces, China Theater, Chunking, China, ASN 30001658. He departed from China 9/25/46 and was honorably discharged at Separation Center, Camp Beale, California, on 11/29/46. His permanent address was 2173 Fardown Ave., Murray 7, Utah. At the time of his induction he was an accredited war correspondent 11ving at the Press Hotel, Chunking, China. As of 2/14/50 there was no information which indicated that Anderson caused secret information to be passed without authority or that he attempted to evade the draft.

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A check at G-2 failed to reflect that an investigation had been or was being conducted on Jack Northman Anderson (no date).

Instructions were issued that the Bureau's indices be carefully checked (3/21/50) to determine if there was an investigation of Jack Anderson, and further if we had ever made a report on Jack Anderson to General Wedeneyer or his headquarters, or to any other branch of the Army. These instructions were given even though the indices check made in this matter did not reflect main files concerning Jack Merthman Anderson (no date).
