Washington Merry-Go-Round

BI Watches Leaders

WASHINGTON — The FBI is conducting systematic surveillance of black leaders, who are guilty of nothing more serious than excessive political rhetoric.

· Millions of dollars have been invested in the FBI's investigation of "racial matters." But our study of the secret files indicates that the investigation has been heavily one-sided. Only the most extreme white racists have come under FBI scrutiny, but almost every prominent black leader in the country has an FBI dossier in his name. Even congressmen and Nixon-Agnew supporters, if they're black, are regardedwith suspicion by the FBI.

The list of black "subversives" includes such apostles of nonviolence as the late Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., his wife, Coretta Scott King; the Rev. Ralph David Abernathy; Jesse Jackson, the handsome young "country preacher" who recently started a self-help group in Chicago; Roy Wilkins, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP); and Bayard Rustin, director of the A. Philip Randolph Institute.

· FAT FILE — The FBI has even zeroed in on President Nixon's most articulate black supporter, former CORE director Floyd McKissick Jr., whose political activities have been chronicled by the FBI in a fat file.

Now director of the new town of Soul City, NC., McKissick made headlines when he lambasted the Democratic party for failing to deliver "on its promises." The Nixon administration, he said, has offered more than "just the rhetoric."

Like many a white politician. Mc-Kissick has jumped the political fence. For two years earlier, he had called Nixon "one of the nation's leading proponents of 'Law and Order — Fascist Style.' "McKissick's words were duly deposited in his bulging FBI dossier.

SECRET - Another entry, dated Jan. 13, 1970, is stamped "Secret -No Foreign Dissemination." One of the deep, dark secrets noted by FBI agent Thomas L. Beckwith was that McKissick "has made several speeches throughout the US during 1969 wherein he advocated black capital-

But far more grievous, McKissick, "in one speech stated the Black Panther party should be supported."

FBI agents were also listening when McKissick at a black bash in Brooklyn "commented unfavorably on the fact that this affair was held in a church, since churches are among groups infiltrated by the FBI and Central Intelligence Agency which hold the blacks down."

The federal sleuths have also been poking their noses into McKissick's financial affairs. States one entry:

"Floyd McKissick, it was learned, had recently received Check Number 2666 made out in his name and drawn against the account of the Louis M. Rabinowitz Foundation, Inc. in the amount of \$2,500. This check was subsequently deposited to McKissick's ac-

Harlem, New York," A footnote warned that "the above information is not to be made public without the issuance of a subpoena duces tecum, directed to Mr. Henry P. Skelton, Vice-President, Manufacturers Hanover Trust Company, 40 East 42nd Street, New York, New York." My associate Joseph Spear attempted in vain to get a comment from bank officials.

CORETTA KING - The FBI has also been prying into Coretta Scott King's finances. When a documentary film about her late husband was appearing around the country, the top cops were busy counting receipts.

Ralph David Abernathy, successor to the martyred Dr. King, rates a file that would choke a hippopotamus.

Black artists, entertainers and sports figures, who speak up for their race, are also suspect. One of the thickest FBI files is devoted to former heavyweight boxing champion Muhammad Ali. Actor-singer Harry Belafonte and author James Baldwin are kept under surveillance, too.

The file on black comedian Dick Gregory could be measured by the. pound. Author-actor-playwright Ossie Davis and his wife have been investigated numerous times. Singer Eartha Kitt is quoted as being opposed to statehood for Puerto Rico.

Blacks don't necessarily have to be nationally known to rate FBI attention. It takes time, however, to get around to them all.

has reported in recent columns the FBI's monitoring of bank accounts of JANE FONDA (originally handled as a Racial Matter) and FLOYD MC KISSICK. Quoting FBI communications verbatim, ANDERSON set forth confidential checking account data and noted that the information was "not to be made public"... "without issuance of a subpoena duces tecum directed to", and he thereafter set forth in print the name of the bank official, the bank and its address, as mentioned in the FBI communication. The officials of two major New York banks were identified in ANDERSON's columns.

Some bank officials, including representatives of the Morgan Guaranty Bank and Manufacturers Hanover Trust, which are two banks mentioned in ANDERSON's columns, have expressed concern to the NYO over public disclosure in those columns of intelligence information obtained by the FBI from the banks of what was considered a confidential basis and the subsequent reporting of this information by the FBI by setting forth names and addresses of the bank which furnished the information together with the name of the person to be subpoenced. The bank officials feel the government did not protect them as the source of a confidential bank data furnished.

These representatives have been most emphatically assured by ADIC MALONE and SACs that information was not given to ANDERSON by the FBI.

As a result of the above mentioned articles, the NYO had very carefully analyzed the manner of reporting bank information which was obtained without a subpoena.

The New York Office believes the standard phraseology concerning the issuance-of a subpoena duces tecum, asrequired even in intelligence-type cases by the Bureau Handbook, Part I, page 36a, and which has become traditional in Bureau reporting of bank information, is unnecessary and to some extent inaccurate from a technical legal standpoint. NY 62-14637

The required phrase, "This information is not to be made public except in a usual proceeding following issuance of a subpoena duces tecum directed to," etc., is unnecessary because government attorneys are aware of thisfact. Secondly, the phrase is unnecessary because bank records are so seldom, if ever, subpoenaed in Security-type cases. The phrase is technically inaccurate for the following reason:

Bank information in intelligence-type cases is generally confined to a review of cancelled checks showing the disbursements of funds of a subject individual or organization. Cancelled checks are thereafter mailed to the subject, usually on the same day as the FBI Agent makes his review, and the checks then become the sole property of documents upon which the information was based, ceases to have in its possession a record careful of the basic the subject. The bank, no longer in custody of the basic have in its possession a record capable of being subpoensed.

Banks do not reproduce copies of cancelled checks at the state of the sta Banks do not reproduce copies of cancelled checks of depositors, except in their individual clearing stages. Thus, since the // bank has no record to be subpoenaed it is quite meaningless to furnish the name of an individual to whom a subpoena might be issued. Practically, the only person capable of bearing testimony concerning the cancelled checks is the Special Agent who reviewed them and-contemporaneously therewith recorded his findings on an FD-302, which he at some future date, might use to refresh his recollection in court.

> It appears the requirement of the Handbook should be clarified, modified or deleted, especially as it relates to situations described above. New York recognized the rule may have been designed to apply to records permanently maintained by banks and may have been primarily directed toward cases of a criminal nature. Its application to intelligence-type investigations, however, tends to unnecessarily disclose a banks! willingness to furnish information without issuance of a subpoena or other court order.

New York recommends the Bureau no longer require, at least in intelligence-type investigations, the phraseology set forth in the Handbook, Part I, page 36a. It is further recommended that all information from bank records be set forth in Bureau reports in the same manner in which other information from sensitive sources is reported; that is, that

it be so paraphrased as to (1) not reveal the name of the individual source, and (2) not reveal that it was obtained from the confidential records of a bank. For example, a Special Agent determines from records of the Manufacturers Hanover Trust Company that on 6/1/72, JOHN DOE, who has an account at that bank, made a check payable to the Black Panther Party in the amount of \$2,500.00. The check indicates it was endorsed and deposited into the account of the Black Panther Party maintained at the Chemical Bank. This information should be reported in this manner:

"A confidential source advised that the Black Panther Party received \$2,500.00 from JOHN DOE during June, 1972."

The source would be identified on the cover-pages of the communication. The FD-302 of the Agent reviewing the bank records would be maintained in the subject's case file, which would contain all essential details of the transaction.

I believe this recommended change will add further reporting security to information obtained from banks on a confidential basis without a subpoena.

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

Washington Merry-Go-Round

FBI Stalks Rep. Reuss' Family



Washington — The FBI has sworn it doesn't investigate congressmen, but it has spent an extraordinary amount of time stalking the family of one.

An indignant Rep. Henry Reuss (D-Wis) learned last year that the FBI had been checking on his daughter, Jacqueline, 22. What he doesn't know is that the FBI is also spying on his son, Michael, 25.

Reuss is a solid sort, who devotes himself largely to banking legislation. He was once a director of a bank, but he isn't likely to rob one.

HIS WIFE, Margaret, occupies her spare time teaching economics at Washington's federal city college. The four children attended prestigious private schools. All are eminently respectable and unlikely criminals.

True, Reuss is considered a bit of a radical in panking circles because of his liberal Democratic views. A decorated infantry officer during World War II, he is also against war. His wife and children, too, are active in the peace movement.

This is what aroused the FBI's suspicions about the Reusses. The FBI, you see, has become political in recent years, and antiwar activity is against the FBI's ideology. The G-men, therefore, literally spend more time investigating peace activists than Mafia gangsters.

The darkest charge the FBI could make against Mike Reuss was that he had been "a friend of Robert Avakian." The FBI dossier on Reuss contains a confidential note that Avakian "has been publicly identified as a member of the central committee of the Bay Area RU (Revolutionary Union)."

This group is identified by an FBI "source" as a "revolutionary, Marxist-Leninist organization ideologically orienteed toward Communist China." The dossier doesn't charge that young Reuss is affiliated with the group but merely that he knows someone who is.

THE SURVEILLANCE reports on Reuss also assert ominously that, in July 1969, he lived in Lafayette, Calif., at "the residence of Mark Silverman." It turns out that Silverman is a "Stanford University student spokesman" who is opposed to the draft.

Reuss spent part of 1969 living with his brother, Christopher, in Richmond, Calif. The G-men found this out, according to the hush-hush reports, "through the use of a suitable pretext call."

Special agent Paul W. Shields also discovered "that as of March 28, 1967, Michael Reuss was Vista worker managing a quilt factory in Jackson, Ky."

Several pages in the Reuss dossier are devoted to newspaper accounts of the young man's arrest during a civil rights demonstration at West Point, Miss., on Aug. 6, 1965. Because a highway patrolman suffered a heart attack during the confrontation, some of the demonstrators, including Reuss, were charged with manslaughter. He was later cleared of any blame.

The Congressman's son and daughter are typical of the "desperados" who now seem to occupy most of the FBI's attention.

McGOVERN vs. O'Brien - If Sen. George McGovern wins the Democratic presidential nom ination, Democratic National Chairman Larry O'Brien will be fired. This is the word from the McGovern camp. McGovern will also divorce his campaign organization from the old guard Democratic National Committee. He has already incorporated his McGovern for President organization as a separate entity. His plan is not only to r move it from the regular party machinery by also to avoid the kind of law suits that were findividually against Eugene McCarthy and late Robert Kennedy's estate to collect/1968 paign debts. By forming a corporation, McG can avoid personal responsibility. He inter work with the party regulars, however, presidential campaign.

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The Reign of the Late
J. Edgar Hoover

J. Edgar Hoover, a trusted father figure to most Americans for his long FBI career, had become a controversial figure who was accused of arbitrary and despotic rule.

WASHINGTON, D.C.

For nearly five decades, the late J.

Edgar Hoover cast a giant shadow over Washington. Few dared stand up to him in life. Fewer dissented from the public praise at his funeral. Yet in the backrooms of Washington, there was almost an audible sigh of relief at

One Senator, after issuing a stirring tribute to the memory of the great man, expressed the prevailing silent mood. "There must never," he whispered urgently to me, "become another J. Edgar Hoover."

his passing.

As a critic of Hoover, I sometimes felt like a David hurling pebbles at America's most enduring symbol of strength and integrity. Americans put their trust in him as children might a father. I agree that his virtues overshadowed his failings. But othere are some cautions to be learned from his remarkable reign over the FBI:

Dazzling image

Hoover projected a public image that dazzled Americans for half a century. First, there was the indefatigable bureaucrat who, at the age of 29, single-handedly transformed what was known in Washington as the Department of Easy Virtue into an elite corps of professional lawmen.

Then came the legendary crimebuster of the 1930's whose agents solved kidnappings, chased hoodlums and gunned down mobsters. And finally there arose the supersleuth who broke up Nazi spy rings during World War II and rooted out Communist sympathizers after the war ended.

He was America's No. 1 lawman—a tough, incorruptible cop who made all of America his beat. But behind the image, there was the man: the old bulldog, the irascible and durable despot who wielded bureaucratic power throughout Washington and stubbornly refused to let go after he had passed the retirement age.

Suggested reforms

When he died, he left a gaping hole in the FBI fabric that perhaps never will be sewn back together. But ithere are thoughtful men inside the FBI who agree that the old Hoover pattern shouldn't be restored. They would like to see a new, reformed, more effective FBI rise from Hoover's bier.

Here are several modest reforms that I would recommend:

(1) When Hoover took over the old Bureau of Investigation in 1924, he demanded a free hand to hire and fire. He set his own rigid standards for his agents. Hacks, misfits, drunks and court hangers-on were quickly replaced by men with law and accounting degrees.

Result: the FBI achieved a distinguished record free of scandal.

But Hoover maintained discipline with petty rules, arbitrary punishments, meaningless chores and constant harassment. He became obsessed with appearances. Agents were reprimanded for long sideburns, dirty fingernails, even sallow complexions.

One prospective agent, a war hero who had been wounded in action and had yellowed slightly from intensive

medication, told me bitterly he had been dismissed because Hoover didn't like his looks. Another was banned to an unpleasant post after Hoover saw a newspaper photograph of him hustling a hijacker off an airline. The agent's sideburns, unhappily, were a fraction of an inch longer than Hoover approved.

Recommendation: The time has come to put the FBI under Civil Service. At least, FBI employees should be given job rights.

(2) To Hoover's credit, he never stepped into the dangerous arena of megalomania where sick men duel to rule the world. Several times in the 1940's, he was offered even more powerful positions in government. At one point, he was asked to coordinate Army and Navy espionage as well as the FBI's counter-spying. Hoover wisely turned down the job. "This country," he said, doesn't need a Himmler."

Yet Hoover became entrenched as

lord of his own fieldom, too powerful to remove and too jealous of his power to step down. If his stewardship taught us anything, it is that we can no longer afford a father protector.

Recommendation: No future FBI chief should be allowed to serve longer than two seven-year terms. Whatever the term, it should be fixed; retirement should be mandatory.

(3) Hoover was a public relations genius. He made himself a living legend by projecting the image of the fearless crusader against evildoers. It was an image built largely on press notices, movie scripts, a bulldog profile and public hokum. The watchword at the FBI was: "Do nothing to embarrass the director."

~Big on statistics · · ·

He embellished the FBI's reputation for solving crimes by directing his agents to amass statistics. Instead of the long hours it takes to nail a Mafia leader, most agents spent their time chasing the easier-to-catch auto thieves, bank robbers and petty criminals.

FBI publicists furnished newsmen with favorable facts that made the FBI look good. As long as I was willing to praise Hoover, I could obtain sensitive information from FBI files. This would usually be slipped to me by one of Hoover's trusted aides, neatly typed, on plain white paper. For authors who would write heroic books about the FBI, Hoover's men would supply the re-

FBI writers also ground out articles and books under Hoover's byline. Although these were written at government expense, he distributed the proceeds. He pocketed one-fifth of the book royalties for himself and bequested the rest upon others.

Picked TV star

Hoover personally approved TV-and radio scripts. He had such control of the media that he even handpicked Efrem Zimbalist Jr. to star in the FBI TV series.

Recommendation: Future FBI directors should be prohibited from using FBI material for commercial ventures, such as books and films, both during and after their term of office.

(4) Originally, Hoover sought to make the FBI free of political abuse. But as he became more ideological, he imposed his ideology upon the FBI. His passion against Communism led him, in the end, to view liberals, too, with increasing suspicion.

Attitudes toward political dissidence have changed considerably in the last 50 years. Most Americans, I think, are more tolerant today. But under Hoover, the FBI viewed black leaders as "rabblerousers" and anti-war agitators as





pared to make his trip to Peking, Hoover wrote in an article entitled "Mao's Red Shadow":

"The shadow of Mao Tse-tung can be seen and felt in the United States today. We can expect the subversive danger to grow as time passes. The only way to meet it is to be prepared."

Avoid politics

Recommendation: The FBI must purge itself of Hoover's political ideology and practice what Hoover originally preached-political neutrality. It should be an agency respected as much by liberals as by conservatives, a community of impartial investigators whose own politics are left outside the agency.

(5) FBI files are stuffed with trivial, useless, irrelevant and often unverified material. Hoover also kept dossiers on people who had not and were unlikely to commit crimes-political figures, movie stars, football players, newspapermen, and other prominent Americans, personalities such as Rock Hudson, Joe Namath, Harry Belafonte, Coretta King, James Baldwin, Paul Newman, Marlon Brando, Jane Fonda, and Lance Rentzel.

FBI agents snooped into their sex lives, business dealings, and personal affairs. Hoover, the bachelor, demonstrated an inordinate interest, for example, in who was sleeping with whom in Washington and elsewhere.

Countless agents were used to gather the information at considerable cost to the taxpayers while at the same time Hoover fiercely resisted a White House suggestion that he spare a few hundred agents to crack down on drug abuses.

Affairs recorded

File after file at the FBI begins with the notation: "This individual is not the subject of an FBI investigation." The taxpayers might justifiably inquire: "Why is a file kept on these individuals?" Certainly, the FBI has no business poking into the bedrooms and private affairs of prominent Americans.

Recommendation: Controls must be established for the use of FBI files and dossiers. Firm limits should be set on where individual privacy rights begin and the government's right of inquiry

There can be no denying the giant accomplishments of J. Edgar Hoover. He was one of the greatest public servants in American history. Probably no one ever served his country longer and with a more fierce dedication. But the Senator, whose public mourning was tempered by quiet relief, was also right. The fabulous FBI that J. Edgar Hoover left this country should become more an agency which serves the people who pay for it than a forum for the man who runs it!

Five Years After the Six Day War

IERUSALEM

or the proud and confident lady pictured on this page, and for the 3 million people she now leads, tomorrow marks an important anniversary. On this day five years ago (June 5, 1967), the first salvos of the Six Day War were fired, and Israelis began the ferocious defense of their country which was to surprise their enemies, their friends, and even themselves. In six lightning-fast days Israeli troops stormed through the Suez Canal (75 miles from Egypt's capital, Cairo), the Jordan River (30 miles from Jordan's capital, Amman), and up the Golan Heights (30 miles from Syria's capital, Damascus). "And then we rested on the seventh day," recalled one Israeli officer. "We were sure that in a short time the Arabs would make peace with us at last."

Now, five summers later, there is no peace, and Israeli troops are still sitting exactly where they were when the war ended. From their bunkers, their frontier outposts, and in mobile patrols, they continue to watch over their 1030-mile-long borders, and they continue to wait for peace.

A confident people

Yet, as unchanging and gloomy as such a situation first appears, most Israelis are nonetheless confident, and even satisfied, with what has happened here in the past five years. They point, for example, to the fact that since the fall of 1970, all their borders have been relatively quiet: the Suez Canal-the front of bitter fighting very shortly after the Six Day War until the American-initiated cease-fire in the fall of 1970-is now as peaceful as a summer day should be, and Egyptian soldiers spend their off hours fishing in it; and the Palestinian terrorists, who used to fire on Israeli frontier settlements, and sabotage theaters, stores and bus stations, have now almost completely disappeared (except for an occasional hiiacking).

Moreover, among the 1.1 million Anaboliving in the "occupied territories"—the areas conquered by Israel in the Six Day War—Israelis feel there has been a growing acceptance of their rule. Local Arab political leaders are no longer quite so hostile; in fact, recently

It is pointed out that under Civil Service Commission (CSC) there are two forms of employment: excepted and competitive service. FBI employees are under the excepted service. The nature of the work makes it necessary that employees of such investigative agencies as the FBI, the CIA, and the National Security Agency be under excepted service. In many respects Bureau employees have the same privileges, job rights requirements, and benefits as all other CSC employees.

There are two main differences between excepted and competitive service; in the hiring and firing of employees. In connection with hiring employees, the FBI is not required to take people off the CSC register; sets its own standards in regard to recruitment, trying to stay in line with CSC standards, and making appointments on the basis of work needs. In order to assure the highest caliber personnel, in view of the great need for security, it is necessary that the FBI be able to investigate and hire applicants independently from the CSC register.

In regard to firing employees, FBI employees have an appeals system within the Bureau itself, with the FBI Director being the ultimate decision-maker. Again, the nature of the work and the essential need for security of the information handled by the FBI required this procedure. It is pointed out, that in many aspects, such as veterans rights and discrimination policies, FBI employees have exactly the same appeals and job rights as any other government employees.

2.) The second recommendation in Anderson's article is that: "No future FBI Chief should be allowed to serve longer than two seven-year terms. Whatever the term, it should be fixed; retirement should be mandatory." In this respect, he complimented the former FBI Director on his handling of the power in the office, but stated that Hoover's reign taught us that "We can no longer afford a father protector."

Again, this is an extraneous recommendation. The Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (Public Law 90-351) directs that the next Director of the FBI "...shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate..." There is no specific fixed term set for the FBI Director, but there is a built-in provision concerning the term of future FBI Directors—the will and consent of the President of the United States whose term is limited to two four—year terms. In addition, the regular

retirement age for Government employees set by the Congress of the United States is 70 years and is another factor bearing on the term of the FBI Director.

Anderson recommends that: 'Future FBI directors should be prohibited from using FBI material for commercial ventures, such as books and films, both during and after their term of office. '' He alleges that Hoover 'embellished the FBI's reputation for solving crimes by directing his agents to amass statistics, "and that 'FBI publicists furnished newsmen with favorable facts that made the FBI look good." Anderson further charges that the 'FBI writers also ground out articles and books under Hoover's byline and Hoover pocketed one-fifth of the book royalties."

There is no need for Anderson's current recommendation since the FBI fully abides by Executive Order 11222 issued under former President Lyndon B. Johnson in May, 1965. The Order provides that Government employees "shall not engage in any outside employment, including, teaching, lecturing, or writing, which might result in a conflict or an apparent conflict, between the private interests of the employee and his official government duties and responsibilities, although such teaching, lecturing, and writing by employees are generally to be encouraged as long as the laws, the provisions of this order, and Civil Service Commission and agency regulations covering conflict of interest and outside employment are observed."

The allegation that books under J. Edgar Hoover's by-line were 'ghostwritten" and that the former Director received royalties from three such books, appeared in Jack Anderson's column in the 5/11/71, issue of 'The Washington Post." In refutation, former Director Hoover sent a memorandum to the Attorney General dated 5/11/71, regarding this matter. In it he advised that all royalties from the book 'Masters of Deceit' were paid in five parts: 1/5 to the FBI Recreation Association: 1/5 to Associate Director Clyde Tolson; 1/5 to Louis B. Nichols, former Assistant to the Director; 1/5 to William I. Nichols, publisher and author; and 1/5 to Mr. Hoover. He noted in the memorandum that all these parties had participated in the preparation of the book. In regard to the other two books, "A Study of Communism," and "I Edgar Hoover on Communism," he said that no royalties were received by him but that all royalties from these two books went to the FBI Recreation Association.

Anderson's fourth recommendation stated that: "The FBI must purge itself of Hoover's political ideology and practice what Hoover originally preached -- political neutrality. It should be an agency respected as much by liberals as by conservatives, a community of impartial investigators whose own politics are left outside the agency."

He charges that Hoover's "passion against Communism led him, in the end, to view liberals, too, with increasing suspicion." Anderson alleges that "under Hoover, the FBI viewed black leaders as rabble rousers and anti-war agitators as Marxists." He further states "A secret file was kept at the FBI on every black leader of any importance. Even President Nixon's black disciple, Floyd McKissick, is the subject of a thick FBI file loaded with unfavorable references." Anderson makes a ridiculous statement that the "FBI spent more time checking into the anti-war activities of actress Jane Fonda than was devoted to any Mafia leader."

Anderson's charges that voluminous files are kept on McKissick, are untrue. Bufiles reflect that McKissick is the former head of the Congress of Racial Equality and emerged as a subject of one FBI investigation only after he had become militant in his statements and attitudes in 1967. Since McKissick was considered a possible leader in the revolutionary movement advocated by black militant groups, a complete background check was conducted. The check disclosed that he was active in anti-war and Black Power type demonstrations, but the results of this FBI check did not warrant placing him on the FBI's Security Index. Presently, McKissick is president of McKissick Enterprises, Incorporated, and is not known to be personally connected with any Militant Black Organization.

Mr. Hoover always insisted that the FBI be divorced from politics. In this respect, he stated, "The FBI does not in any way attempt to stifle groups or individuals who speak out against the Viet Nam War." The former Director has stated that "individuals have a right to oppose the war and the FBI becomes concerned only when members of these or any other groups violate laws within its investigative jurisdiction. " (Nation's Business, January 1972.)

Anderson recommends that: "controls must be established for the use of FBI files and dossiers. Firm limits should be set on where individual privacy rights begin and the Government's rights of inquiry ends." M. A. Jones to Bishop Memo

He alleges that FBI files contain trivial and often unverified material; that former Director Hoover kept dossiers on prominent personalities, and that FBI Agents "snooped into their sex lives, business dealings, and personal affairs." He claims that "countless Agents were used to gather the information at considerable cost to the taxpayer..." He asserts that many files at the FBI begin with the notation: "This individual is not the subject of an FBI investigation." He then asks the question. "Why is a file kept on these individuals?"


This is a consistent and false charge made repeatedly by Jack Anderson. By his allegations, he would like to have the public believe that the FBI directs Agents to obtain specific personal information concerning the habits and lives of many individuals.

As an actual fact, the FBI during the course of its many investigations in connection with the 185 investigative matters in its jurisdiction, does obtain all sorts of information on all kinds of human beings for one reason or another. Accordingly, without specifically ferreting out such information, FBI files will include some personal data regarding public figures. Anderson fails to differentiate between the FBI directing investigations into matters in which it has jurisdictional responsibilities, and the FBI accepting into its files information, sometimes of an unverified or trivial nature, voluntarily furnished by individual for by other governmental agencies. Thus there is great need for the integrity and sanctity of the FBI files.

There is no need for Anderson's current recommendation. The proper dissemination of information received by the FBI is one of the Bureau's foremost responsibilities, and there are strict and specific guidelines concerning the subject matters of the dissemination and the recipients who are authorized to receive such information.

For nearly five decades, the late J.

Edgar Hoover cast a giant shadow over Washington. Few dared stand up to him in life. Fewer dissented from the public praise at his funeral. Yet in the backrooms of Washington, there was almost an audible sigh of relief at his passing.

One Senator, after issuing a stirring tribute to the memory of the great man, expressed the prevailing silent mood. "There must never," he whispered lurgently to me, "become another J. Edgar Hoover."

As a critic of Hoover, I sometimes felt like a David hurling pebbles at America's most enduring symbol of strength and integrity. Americans put their trust in him as children might a father. I agree that his virtues overshadowed his failings. But there are some cautions to be learned from his fremarkable reign over the FBI.

Dazzling image

Hoover projected a public image that dazzled Americans for half a century. First, there was the indefatigable bureaucrat who, at the age of 29, single-handedly transformed what was known in Washington as the Department of Easy Virtue into an elite corps of professional lawmen.

Then came the legendary crimebuster of the 1930's whose agents solved kidnappings, chased hoodlums and gunned down mobsters. And finally there arose the supersleuth who broke up Nazi spy rings during World War II and rooted out Communist sympathizers after the war ended.

He was America's No. 1 lawman—a tough, incorruptible cop who made all of America his beat. But behind the image, there was the man: the old bull-dog, the irascible and durable despot who wielded bureaucratic power throughout Washington and stubbornly refused to let go after he had passed the retirement age.

Suggested reforms

When he died, he left a gaping hole lin the FBI fabric that perhaps never will be sewn back together. But there are thoughtful men inside the FBI who agree that the old Hoover pattern shouldn't be restored. They would like to see a new, reformed, more effective FBI rise from Hoover's bier.

Here are several modest reforms that I would recommend:

J(1) When Hoover took over the old Bureau of Investigation in 1924, he demanded a free hand to hire and fire. He set his own rigid standards for his agents. Hacks, misfits, drunks and court hangers-on were quickly replaced by men with law and accounting degrees.

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Result: the FBI achieved a distinguished record free of scandal.

But Hoover maintained discipline with petty rules, arbitrary punishments, meaningless chores and constant harassment. He became obsessed with appearances. Agents were reprimanded for long sideburns, dirty fingernails, even sallow complexions.

One prospective agent, a war hero who had been wounded in action and had yellowed slightly from intensive

medication told mediterly he had been dismissed because Hoover didn't like his looks. Another was banned to an unpleasant post after Hoover saw a newspaper photograph of him hustling a hijacker off an airline. The agent's sideburns, unhappily, were a fraction of an linch longer than Hoover approved.

Recommendation: The time has come to put the FBI under Civil Service. At least, FBI employees should be given

job rights.

I(2) To Hoover's credit, he never stepped into the dangerous arena of megalomania where sick men duel to rule the world. Several times in the 1940's, he was offered even more powerful positions in government. At one point; he was asked to coordinate Army and Navy espionage as well as the FBI's counter-spying. Hoover wisely turned down the job. "This country," he said, doesn't need a Himmler."

Yet Hoover became entrenched as

lord of his own fiefdom, too powerful to remove and too jealous of his power to step down. If his stewardship taught us anything, it is that we can no longer afford a father protector.

Recommendation: No future FBI chief should be allowed to serve longer than two seven-year terms. Whatever the term, it should be fixed; retirement

should be mandatory.

(3) Hoover was a public relations genius. He made himself a living legend by projecting the image of the fearless crusader against evildoers. It was an image built largely on press notices, movie scripts, a bulldog profile and public hokum. The watchword at the EBL was "Do nothing to embarrass the director."



Big on statistics

He embellished the FBI's reputation for solving crimes by directing his agents to amass statistics. Instead of the long hours it takes to nail a Mafia leader, most agents spent their time chasing the easier-to-catch auto thieves, bank robbers and petty criminals.

IFBI publicists furnished newsmen with favorable facts that made the FBI look good. As long as I was willing to praise Hoover, I could obtain sensitive information from FBI files. This would usually be slipped to me by one of Hoover's trusted aides, neatly typed, on plain white paper. For authors who would write heroic books about the FBI, Hoover's men would supply the research.

#FBI writers also ground out articles and books under Hoover's byline. Although these were written at government expense, he distributed the proceeds. He pocketed one-fifth of the book royalties for himself and bequested the rest upon others.

Picked TV star

Hoover personally approved TV and radio scripts. He had such control of the media that he even handpicked Efrem Zimbalist Jr. to star in the FBI TV series.

Recommendation: Future FBI directors should be prohibited from using FBI material for commercial ventures, such as books and films, both during and after their term of office.

(4) Originally, Hoover sought to make the FBI free of political abuse. But as he became more ideological, he imposed his ideology upon the FBI. His passion against Communism led him, in the end, to view liberals, too, with increasing suspicion.

have changed considerably in the last 50 years. Most Americans, 1 think, are more tolerant today. But under Hoover, the FBI viewed black leaders as "rabble-rousers" and anti-war agitators as

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'Marxists.'

A secret file was kept at the FBI on every black leader of any importance. Even President Nixon's black disciple, Floyd McKissick, is the subject of a thick FBI file loaded with unfavorable references. And the FBI spent more time checking into the anti-war activities of

actress lane Fonda than was devoted to any Mafia leader. G-men faithfully attended all Miss Fonda's performances and submitted dark, critical reviews for Hoover's benefit.

To the end, Hoover never failed to warn the American public of the Red menace. Even as President Nixon pre-

pared to make his trip to Peking, Hoover wrote in an article entitled "Mao's Red Shadow":

"The shadow of Mao Tse-tung can be seen and felt in the United Statestoday. We can expect the subversive danger to grow as time passes. The only way to meet it is to be prepared."

Avoid politics

Recommendation: The .FBI must purge itself of Hoover's political idelology and practice what Hoover originally preached—political neutrality. It should be an agency respected as much by liberals as by conservatives, a community of impartial investigators whose own politics are left outside the agency.

(5) FBI files are stuffed with trivial, useless, irrelevant and often unverified material. Hoover also kept dossiers on people who had not and were unlikely to commit crimes—political figures, movie stars, football players, newspapermen, and other prominent Americans, personalities such as Rock Hudson, Joe Namath, Harry Belafonte, Coretta King, James Baldwin, Paul Newman, Marlon Brando, Jane Fonda, and Lance Rentzel.

IFBI agents snooped into their sex lives, business dealings, and personal affairs. Hoover, the bachelor, demonstrated an inordinate interest, for example, in who was sleeping with whom in Washington and elsewhere.

the information at considerable cost to the taxpayers while at the same time Hoover fiercely resisted a White House suggestion that he spare a few hundred agents to crack down on drug abuses.


File after file at the FBI begins with the notation: "This individual is not the subject of an FBI investigation." The taxpayers might justifiably inquire: "Why is a file kept on these individuals?" Certainly, the FBI has no business poking into the bedrooms and private affairs of prominent Americans.

Recommendation: Controls must be established for the use of FBI files and dossiers. Firm limits should be set on where individual privacy rights begin and the government's right of inquiry ends.

There can be no denying the giant accomplishments of J. Edgar Hoover. He was one of the greatest public servants in American history. Probably no one ever served his country longer and with a more fierce dedication. But the Senator, whose public mourning was tempered by quiet relief, was also right. The fabulous FBI that J. Edgar Hoover left this country should become more an agency which serves the people who pay for it than a forum for the man who runs it.




I. Edgar Hoover, a trusted father figure to most Americans for his long FBI career, had become a controversial figure who was accused of arbitrary and despotic rule.

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

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Anderson Offers to Educate New FBI Executive

WASHINGTON - Patrick Gray III got off to an unconvincing start as the new boss of the FBI by pleading with newsmen: "None of you guys are going to believe this - and I don't know how to make you believe it - but there are no dossiers or secret files."

We will be happy to tell poor Pat, since he's new around the FBI, where some of the secret files are stashed.

As a starter, he might ask to see the Jane Fonda file, No. 100-459279. The FBI apparently considers the tiny, if sometimes turbulent, Miss Fonda a menace to the nation.

She recently won the Academy Award as Hollywood's best actress. But her most faithful fans are Gmen, who monitor her performances around the world and submit detailed reports on her antiwar routines.

The Fonda file is stuffed with reports marked "Confidential" and "Secret." One entry, dated April 30, 1971, is stamped "Top Secret - No Foreign Dissemination - No Dissemination abroad."

This hush-hush document alleges darkly: "Between November 1970 and April 1971,

Fonda toured college campuses across the country making antiwar speeches. A source advised (the FBI) the North Vietnamese Embassy in Moscow bought a plane ticket for Fonda to travel from the United States to Moscow and Hanoi via Paris on March 17. 1971, though the trip was discontinued as all visas to North Vietnam were later cancelled."

By perusing the secret FBI files, Pat Gray can also find out who's who and what's new in the black community. There's hardly an important black leader who doesn't rate a full FBI file.

For example, Gray, can learn from reading the Coretta King file, No. 100-6351, that the martyred Martin Luther King's widow has hired the Byron Detective agency to "maintain security" at her Atlanta home. This tidbit is "Confidential," although there's a lot of equally irrelevant information labeled "Secret."

Or Gray may be interested to discover from a "Secret" entry in the Ralph Abernathy file, No. 100-442706, that King's successor at the Southern Christian Leadership Conference was "Considering France on July 13, 1969."

Even one of President Nixon's stalwart black supporters, Floyd McKissick, is kept under regular FBI surveillance. His file, No. 100-#46386, contains a full background report on his activities labeled "Secret -No Foreign Dissemination."

Gray can also keep up with the world travels of James Baldwin, the famous black novelist, by reading file No. 62-108763. An entry, dated Dec. 23, 1969, and marked "Secret - No Foreign Dissemination," confides:

"NY T-1, another government agency which conducts intelligence investigations, advised on July 31, 1969, that James Baldwin arrived at Istanbul, Turkey, from Athens, Greece, via Air

There followed excerpts from the Aug. 18, 1969, edition of the Turkish newspaper "Milliyet," also stamped a deep, dark "Secret."

Or Gray can read all about the personal affairs of Harry Belafonte, the talented black actor, by snooping through file No. 100-394716. A "Secret" background report starts off with the information that the "subject's true name is Harold George Belafonte."

The new FBI chief will find all sorts of titillating tidbits in the files of such movie stars as Marlon Brando, Paul Newman, Rock Hudson, Tony Randall, Zero Mostel and others. None of them are accused of any crimes or suspected subversion. But the FBİ keeps files on them anyhow.

Or, if Gray is a football fan, he can glean some fascinating facts from the FBI files on the

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likes of Joe Namath and Lance Rentzel.

For example, the FBI lists Namath under No. 505524F. His file declares: "Captioned individual, a member of the New York Jets of the American Football League, has never been the subject of an FBI investigation."

Yet the FBI has kept a faithful account of such miscellany as the report "from a reliable source that he frequents The Pussycat Bar in New York City."

Above all, newsmen should be skeptical — as Gray suggested they would be that "there are no dossiers or secret files."

One dogged investigative reporter, I.F. Stone, file No. 100-37078, is checked out regularly by the FBI. A typical entry, dated March 17, 1967, and stamped "Confidential," reports:

"During 1966, subject spoke at several anti-Vietnam affairs. In his talks he was critical of the United States handling and participation in the Vietnam War.

"In February, 1966, subject observed to meet a Second

Secretary (press) of the Embassy of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, Washington, D.C., at a Washington, D.C. restaurant."

Throughout most FBI files is scattered gossip about the sex lives of the subjects, indicating that the FBI spends considerable time snooping into the bedrooms of prominent people.

If Pat Gray still doubts that the FBI keeps secret files, we will be happy to show him some xeroxed copies.

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) -The Justice Department's No. 2 man says the nation's press is guilty of "often inaccurate, biased and grossly unfair reporting."

L. Patrick Gray III, acting deputy attorney general, told the Orange County Bar Association on Friday that "the record is replete with errors of the past."

In his remarks at a luncheon, Gray read excerpts from a 19-page text, threequarters of which he said were examples of reporting errors, omissions or slanted writing about the Justice Department.

Because of time limitations, Grav read a shortened version of the text but many members of the association were surprised at the topic.

"I didn't think he'd choose such a hot topic," said Garvin Shallenberger, the organiza-tion's president.

Gray specifically commented on what he called inaccurate stories by the New York Times, Washington Post, Newsweek magazine and the NBC and CBS television net-

works.
"I am unalterably opposed to any attempt to control the press," said Gray. "So also, I am just as opposed to the attempts of the press to control

the government."

Some of Gray's examples were not new. One cited a 1969 story quoting the attorney for the Black Panthers as saying police across, the country had murdered 28 Panthers in a national scheme by various agencies of the government to "commit genocide upon member's of the Black Panther

party.
"With no truth whatever, the charge from this biased source was soon being repeated, not as an allegation, but as an accepted fact, by many news media, including The New York Times and the Washington Post," Gray said.

Gray admitted that the Post, "to its credit ... made a full admission of error."

Newsweek also printed articles about the alleged Panther plot, and Mel Elfin, Washington bureau chief of Newsweek,

"A reading of Newsweek's article makes clear that the 'drive' we described against the Panthers was not a campaign to gun them down, but rather one involving raids, in-

creased surveillance, arrests on weapons and conspiracy charges . . ."

Seymour Topping of The New York Times commented:

"Mr. Gray. . . presents an in-complete and distorted version of the extensive coverage of the Black Panthers published by the Times over a lengthy period of time."

Gray also cited a story on NBC last December which reported that a Law Enforcement Assistance Administration grant to Miami Beach, Fla., was used to buy such things as armor, a mine detector and hidden microphones and television cameras to watch areas where demonstrators might gather during the Democratic National Convention.

"No armor and no mine detector were ever listed or intended in the grant," Gray said. He also took issue with CBS's "60 minutes" show featuring an interview with LEAA administrator Jerris Lonard on the subject of LEAA grants.

"The manner of editing these interviews is not only illuminating—it is frightening," Gray said. "Virtually every reference Mr. Leonard made to successful programs funded by LEAA was cut out."

CBS and NBC representatives said there would be no comment on Gray's remarks until the complete text of his speech was read.
