Dear Admiral Blair:

Congratulations on being nominated to serve as the Director of National Intelligence.

I'm writing to draw your attention to the valuable role of the Government Accountability Office as a tool of Congressional oversight by the intelligence committees and to ask that, if confirmed, you ensure GAO access to the information it needs to exercise that role.

Throughout the 110th Congress, the Subcommittee on Intelligence Community Management, which I chaired, monitored reforms in the security clearance process required by the *Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004* (IRTPA). Last March, Chairman Reyes and I directed GAO to conduct a detailed study of the security clearance process in the Intelligence Community.

Unfortunately, Director McConnell resisted providing GAO the access it needs to carry out the study. In a letter to the Committee, the DNI refused the GAO access to information related to SCI clearances. GAO tried unsuccessfully to negotiate with the Office of the DN1. Throughout 2008, ODN1 prevented GAO's properly cleared personnel from gaining access to the information and intelligence personnel they need in order to do the study.

An inefficient security clearance process harms our national security by unnecessarily delaying the hiring or inter-agency detailing of qualified and trustworthy people. A GAO study can identify inefficiencies in the process as well as best practices that could be adopted by other agencies.

In addition to ensuring that this valuable GAO study is completed, I am deeply concerned that executive branch resistance to a GAO study requested by the committee of jurisdiction undermines Congress' ability to carry out its Constitutional responsibility to conduct oversight.

I ask you therefore to correct the Bush Administration's course on this matter and, if confirmed, promptly give GAO access to the information it needs to conduct investigations at the request of the intelligence committees.

Dear Admiral Blair, Director Mueller, Director Panetta and Secretary Napolitano:

As we start a new Congress and I begin my role as Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, I look forward to a productive and close working relationship with the intelligence and law enforcement communities. We share a simple goal: protecting the United States from all threats to our security and particularly the threat of global terrorism.

Your agencies have done a remarkable job since the attacks of September 11, 2001. At the same time, we all recognize that keeping America safe is an ongoing challenge and that constant vigilance remains our highest national security priority. I want to assure you that the Committee and I stand ready to work with you as partners in this essential task.

With that partnership in mind, I write to ask each of you to provide to the Committee your analysis and judgments regarding our current national security status. I would like your assessments of the most urgent threats to the people of the United States and also your analysis of longer-range dangers.

As part of your response, please describe the progress that your agency has made in addressing and implementing the findings and recommendations of the series of bipartisan commissions that have examined the issues of guarding against future terrorist attacks and protecting against chemical, biological and nuclear weapons. I am referring primarily to the 9/11 Commission, the Hart-Rudman Commission on National Security, and the Commission on the Prevention of WMD Proliferation and Terrorism. However, please do not limit your responses to issues raised in those reports. I especially want to hear what weaknesses you and your agencies perceive in our defenses against a tenorist attack on American soil or on American interests outside the country. I want to hear specifics of how you are addressing those vulnerabilities today and how you plan to do so in the future, and especially how I and this Committee can help you protect the United States and its people.

In the event that your answers require sharing classified information, please do not hesitate to inform me. I will immediately schedule time for you to provide a full assessment to the Foreign Relations Committee in closed session so that we can address these issues.

I recognize that this is a time-consuming request. But I urge you to prepare your responses in a timely fashion so that the Committee and I have the necessary information to fulfill our responsibilities in ensuring that the United States and other countries are protected from terrorism.

Thank you for your attention to this important matter. I look forward to your reply.

As the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence begins its annual oversight activities, it is imperative that it understands the Intelligence Community's assessment of the national security challenges facing the nation. To this end, the Committee invites you to testify at an open hearing to review current and projected national security threats to the United States. This open hearing will be immediately followed by a closed session.

The open hearing will take place on Wednesday, February 25, 2009 at 9:00 a.m. The location is still being determined, and your office will be informed of this as soon as possible. We anticipate the open session will conclude by 11:00. The closed session will commence after a short break, in room HVC-304 of the U.S. Capitol. The closed session should conclude no later than 1:00 p.m.

We also invite the participation of agency heads (or n designee) who can significantly contribute to the discussions, including the Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, the Director of the Defense Intelligence Agency, the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Under Secretary for Intelligence and Analysis of the Department of Homeland Security, the Assistant Secretary of State for Intelligence and Research, and any others that you deem appropriate.

The Committee requests that you provide comprehensive unclassified and classified statements for the record detailing the nature and extent of the current national security threats and those projected over the next ten years. This assessment should include discussions of the threats posed by state actors such as Iran. China. Russia, and North Korea; the ongoing campaigns in Iraq and Afghanistan, including political and military progress made in each country; global terrorism and terrorist safe havens in Africa and Asia; regional conflicts that may affect the national security of our nation, such as the recent fighting in Israel: threats from political instability in partner nations; and threats challenging the global community, such as the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, cyberthreats, energy security, and narcotics trafficking. These statements are due to the Committee no less than 48 hours in advance of the hearing.

Congratulations again on your confirmation as our third Director of National Intelligence.

I am writing to request a classified report on the abilities of the Intelligence Community to monitor the rebuilding of underground tunnels between Gaza and Egypt.

Press accounts during the conflict between Israel and Hamas detailed an extensive network of hundreds of tunnels across the Egypt- Gaza border. These tunnels facilitate the smuggling of weapons to Hamas and they hinder efforts to bring peace and stability to the region.

While Israel eliminated many cross-border tunnels during the recent conflict, I remain concerned Hamas will either attempt to rebuild these tunnels or develop more sophisticated means of camouflaging their existence.

Please address the following the questions: What technical and human capabilities does the Intelligence Community have to monitor the reconstruction of tunnels between Gaza and Egypt? What type of intelligence assistance are we providing to Egypt and Israel to enhance their capabilities to monitor Hamas' smuggling efforts? To what extent have the Egyptian efforts to eliminate cross-border smuggling of weapons into Gaza been successful?

Thank you for consideration of this issue. I look forward to working with you on this and other important intelligence matters.

Section 924 required USD(AT&L) to certify to the congressional oversight committees when NSA acquisition management performance had improved sufficiently that Milestone Decision Authority (MDA) could be delegated to the Director, NSA. The Intelligence Reform & Terrorism Prevention Act and the existing Memorandum of Agreement between the Director of National Intelligence (DNI) and the Secretary of Defense (SecDef) have now changed the environment under which the DNI and the SecDef delegate MDA. The co-MDAs have concluded that as a result of these changes, and of NSA's progress toward improved acquisition management performance, we will begin to include NSA in our joint, annual acquisition-by-acquisition MDA delegation decision review process. In the transmittal letter to Congress for the April 2007 NSA Acquisition Management Capability Report, the Deputy DNI for Management and USD(AT&L) noted that "with continued improvement, NSA may be ready to assume MDA on a selected-program basis by our next annual report." An assessment is being conducted jointly by USD(AT&L) and the Deputy DNI for Acquisition, to be completed by February 1, to determine if NSA has reached that point. Prior to the first MDA delegation occurring on a major NSA acquisition, we will send to the leadership of all committees with intelligence oversight responsibilities certification that restoring MDA is warranted for that Major System Acquisition, consistent with Section 924,

We are writing with concern over the appointment of Charles "Chas" Freeman as the next Chairman of the National Intelligence Council. Given his close ties to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, we request a comprehensive review of Amb. Freeman's past and current commercial, financial and contractual ties to the Kingdom to ensure no conflict of interest exists in his new position.

As you may know, Amb. Freeman most recently served as President of the Middle East Policy Council, a think-tank funded by the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. The board of directors includes Dr. Fuad Rihani, a consultant to the Saudi Binladin Group a inuitinational construction conglomerate and holding company for the assets owned by the bin Laden family.

On September 20, 2006, in an interview with the Saudi-US Relations Information Service, Amb. Freeman said that "thanks to the generosity of King Abdullah bin Abdulaziz of Saudi Arabia we have managed to accumulate an endowment" for the Middle East Policy Council. According to filings with the Internal Revenue Service. Amb. Freeman drew an annual salary from the Middle East Policy Council. However, the foundation has never publicly released its list of contributors - Schedule B of IRS Form 990).

We ask you to fully investigate Amb. Freeman's past and current relationship with the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia - both personal financial disclosures and the list of all contributors to the Middle East Pulicy Council across all years that Amb. Freeman drew a salary from the foundation - and report back to Congress on any potential conflicts of interest.

Two bills on interrogation practices by elements of the Intelligence Committee were introduced and referred to the Select Committee on Intelligence soon after the convening of the 111th Congress. They are S. 147, the "Lawful Interrogation and Detention Act," and S. 248, the "Limitations on Interrogation Techniques Act of 2009." In addition to limiting interrogation techniques, S. 147 addresses the closing of Guantanamo, the use of contractors in CIA interrogations, and notification to the International Committee of the Red Cross of detentions by any Intelligence Community element. S. 147 was introduced by Chairman Feinstein (and co-sponsored by Senators Rockefeller, Wyden, and Whitehouse); S. 248 was introduced by Vice Chairman Bond.

We would appreciate a report that provides the Administration's views on these bills. We are sending a copy of this request to Attorney General Holder and CIA Director Panetta, and also, with respect to Guantanamo, to Secretary of Defense Gates. We ask that you coordinate the report with them as well as with others in the Executive Branch who may have an interest in the matters covered by these bills.

Last August, we wrote to then DNI McConnell to request views on identical or similar bills (except that none addressed Guantanamo) in the 110th Congress: S. 1943, S. 3386, and S. 3437. Our letter and the DNI's October 3 response are enclosed.

We expect that the views of the new Administration may differ from those of the last on these bills. We also expect that the Administration may be of the view that the reviews now under way under the President's Executive Orders on detention, interrogation, and Guantanamo, will affect the timing of its assessment The Honorable Dennis C. of legislative proposals. We look forward to hearing from you at the earliest possible opportunity about when a full response to our request for views on S. 147 and S. 248 will be forthcoming.

In 2007, I made a request to the Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) to have the CAPNet system installed in our Sensitive Compartmented Information Facility (SCIF) located in the Ford House Office Building. That request was not granted. In January 2009, we acquired additional Committee space in the newly constructed Capitol Visitor's Center (CVC). This new SCIF space will improve our ability to conduct vigorous oversight over the activities of the Intelligence Community as they relate to protecting the homeland.

However, it has come to my attention that your staff now refuses to install the CAPNet system in any of our SCIF spaces. Despite the efforts of my staff and their repeated requests for additional information or a reasonable timetable for installation, they have been unable to elicit an answer as to why CAPNet cannot be installed in either Committee SCIF space. The Director of National Intelligence, Dennis Blair, appreciates your recent letter dated February 3, 2009 concerning security threats to the United States, to include global terrorism. He shares your desire for a productive working relationship during the 111th Congress.

Consistent with your request for Intelligence Community (IC) assessments of urgent threats and analysis of longer-range dangers. I have enclosed three items for your perusal. The first item is a copy of Director Blair's unclassified Annual Threat Assessment of the Intelligence Community Statement for the Record (SFR) which was provided to the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence during an open hearing on February 12, 2009. We are separately transmitting his classified SFR directly to the Office of Senate Security, to the attention of your Committee. Our office would be pleased to arrange more detailed classified briefings for your Committee on topics discussed in these statements.

The second enclosed item speaks to longer-range challenges and opportunities for policymakers as we look across the global landscape through 2025. The document was recently prepared and released by the National Intelligence Council (NIC), representing the fourth installment in their effort to identify key drivers and developments likely to shape world events for years to come. More background on this initiative is available on the web at <u>www.dni.gov/nic</u>, and we would also be pleased to have our National Intelligence Officers meet with your Committee to discuss these issues further. As you know, the NIC routinely transmits classified products directly to your Committee through the Office of Senate Security.

With respect to the recommendations of past Commissions concerning terrorism and weapons of mass destruction, the Intelligence Community is very engaged on these matters on many levels. The third enclosed item addresses the organizational structure of the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, to include the ten functional mission support activities, in addition to profiles for the rest of the Intelligence Community.

As discussed with your Senior Professional Staff Member, Edward Levine, we are available to outline these functions and profiles in more detail, and how they address past Commission recommendations, to include the ongoing work of the National Counterterrorism Center. We defer to the other recipients of your letter (Department of Homeland Security, Central Intelligence Agency, and Federal Bureau of Investigation) regarding their activities in areas of interest to your Committee.

During your nomination process, you indicated your understanding of the importance of clear and accurate intelligence analysis. You explained your understanding of the reasons behind the Iraq WMD intelligence failure and assured Members that one of your goals was to prevent such analytic failures in the future.

You also told the Committee that if nominated your "objective will be to ensure that the analysis produced by the Intelligence Community is objective and free of any political bias, whatever the issue or political climate might be" and said that "President Obama has made it clear ... that he expects independent analysis."

In light of your comments, we were surprised by your decision to appoint Charles Freeman as the next Chairman of the National Intelligence Council (NIC).

The NIC is responsible for providing policymakers with "the best, unvarnished, and unbiased information." Its Chairman leads this effort, is the Intelligence Community's most senior analyst, and is at the forefront of reforming analysis so that mistakes like the Iraq WMD failure are not repeated. Mr. Freeman has a distinguished resume, but his intelligence experience appears to be only as a consumer of intelligence—in other words, using intelligence for policymaking. We are unaware of another instance in which someone without years of intelligence analysis experience has been appointed to this position.

Also concerning—in light of the need for any NIC Chairman to have unquestioned objectivity and an ability to convey the Intelligence Community's judgments in a measured and non-provocative manner—are Mr. Freeman's highly The Honorable Dennis C. Blair March 9, 2009 Page Two

controversial statements about China and Israel. While Mr. Freeman has since made efforts to clarify his remarks, one of the lessons of the 2007 Iran National Intelligence Estimate (NIE) is that an essential quality in leading the NIC is an ability to ensure that NIEs and other NIC products clearly and accurately convey the views of the Intelligence Community when they are published. Once a product is released it is too late to try to clarify the Intelligence Community's judgments.

At a time when the analytic community is continuing to struggle with reforming itself and when U.S. leaders, from the President to Members of Congress, have called for a depoliticization of intelligence, we believe this appointment sends the wrong message. The NIC, as the highest intelligence entity providing top level analysis, must represent the clearest level of analytic expertise, an expertise the rest of the government and the public must be assured is free from policy bias. Given our concerns about Mr. Freeman's lack of experience and uncertainty about his objectivity, we intend to devote even more oversight scrutiny to the activities of the NIC under his leadership.

Thank you for your letter of 22 January 2009. I am grateful for your support of the Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) and look forward to working with you in the future.

We have reviewed the matter raised in your letter concerning the Government Accountability Office (GAO) study of the security clearance process in the Intelligence Community (IC). As you are aware, our Community strives to be as responsive as possible to GAO requests. We have provided the GAO numerous intelligence briefings, National Intelligence Estimates, and other analytic products and frequently make our employees available for interviews and discussions, and to review draft reports. However, because of extreme sensitivities that can arise during the oversight of intelligence-related activities, there has been a longstanding arrangement between the Executive and Legislative branches that the Congressional Intelligence Committees will be the oversight mechanism for the IC.

In this matter, the GAO was given substantial access to personnel and documents based on its request. Of the two Job Codes submitted to our Office, we participated fully in the GAO's review of the personnel security clearance reform effort (Job Code 351263), and members of our staff responded fully to GAO's multiple requests in this area. As for the second GAO study (Job Code 351224), which involves, among other things, inquiries into specific clearance determinations and reviews of individual files, we participated in four of the six elements. We have re-looked the two portions of the review that we originally declined to participate in and maintain that those elements raise significant sources and methods concerns, precisely the reason that GAO's oversight jurisdiction does not extend to intelligence activities.

Based on current law, policy, and practices related to this matter, we must recognize the traditional arrangement between the Executive and Legislative branches that protects the extreme sensitivity of intelligence activities. It is most appropriate for oversight of these activities to be conducted exclusively by the Congressional Intelligence Committees. These

traditional arrangements and the DNU's statutory obligation to protect sources and methods are the basis for the IC's longstanding practice of declining to participate in GAO inquiries that evaluate intelligence activities, programs, capabilities, and operational functions.

We take very seriously our statutory responsibilities to keep Congress fully and currently informed of intelligence activities. We will be happy to provide the Committee information on the personnel security clearance process and look forward to working with you on this very important issue. 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

Dear Director Blair:

On February 5, 2009, Senator Akaka introduced S. 385, the Intelligence Community Audit Act of 2009, which was referred to the Select Committee on Intelligence. The bill is cosponsored by Senators Lautenberg, McCaskill, Sanders, Wyden, Carper, and Durbin.

The bill "reaffirms" the authority of the Comptroller General to perform audits and evaluations of financial transactions, programs, and activities of elements of the intelligence community and to obtain access to records for the purpose of those audits. It provides that those audits may be requested by any committee of jurisdiction and may include matters related to areas listed in the bill: management and administration of Intelligence Community (IC) elements in areas such as strategic planning, financial management, information technology, human capital, knowledge management, and information sharing. Audits or evaluations of intelligence sources and methods or covert actions may only be conducted upon the request of one of the intelligence committees or the Senate and House majority or minority leaders.

In the 110th Congress, Senator Akaka introduced a similar bill, S. 82, which we referred to the DNI and the Comptroller General for comment. Our letters and the responses to them are enclosed.

We would appreciate your comments on S. 385. Also, apart from whether legislation should be enacted on the authority of the Comptroller General

concerning the Intelligence Community, we would appreciate your careful review, together with the Acting Comptroller General (and the Comptroller General when the vacancy in that office is filled through nomination and confirmation), of whether there are selected oversight subjects regarding which the Government Accountability Office (GAO) has expertise and for which assistance could be provided by agreement between the IC and the GAO in a manner consistent with national security. We note, for example, that Senator Akaka's bill takes particular note of management and administration in areas such as strategic planning, financial management, information technology, human capital, knowledge management, and information sharing. As part of this review, please advise us whether utilization of the expertise of the Government Accountability Office in selected areas would result in economies of scale from a decrease in the need for consulting contracts with private management consulting firms.

Please let us know of your views on the bill and the results of these discussions.

Dear Director Blair:

The report accompanying the Intelligence Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2002 directed that auditable financial statements be accomplished for the Intelligence Community (IC) by fiscal year 2005. Yet today, the IC appears to be farther from that goal than when your predecessor took office in early 2007, pledging to achieve it for the entire IC by 2012. And last month the IC backed away from even that date -- without putting a new goal in its place.

We understand that your previous plan has been delayed by the need to create a new business systems architecture. Indeed, our Committee strongly supports this work, which we have called for repeatedly over the last three years. Section 313 of the Fiscal Year 2009 Intelligence Authorization bill, which the Committee reported in May 2008, is designed to empower your newly-formed Business Transformation Office (BTO) to produce a business systems architecture. Indeed, if the IC had taken on this task when the Committee initially called for it in 2006, your 2012 goal might still be attainable.

Nonetheless, the BTO's work must not delay sorely-needed improvements to internal controls, which are critical to preventing millions of dollars of potential fraud, waste, and abuse, as well as providing reliable business information for sound decision-making. Many of these process controls do not need to await the result of BTO's architectural deliberations. We therefore urge you to take strong and decisive action to see that appropriate reforms and oversight controls are in place as soon as possible.

In particular, we are alarmed by the breakdown in internal controls at the National Security Agency (NSA), following its attempt to implement its commercial, off-the-shelf accounting system, known as the Financial Accounting

and Corporate Tracking System (FACTS). The U.S. Army Finance Command found in July 2008 that the system could not provide accurate financial reports and that the NSA's "[financial] operation is currently in violation of public laws, treasury financial manuals and DoD regulations. Additionally, [the NSA financial] operation is not in compliance with the Federal Managers Financial Integrity Act..." An NSA Inspector General report issued five months later found gross mismanagement, contending that FACTS was placed into operation before it was adequately tested and operators were not properly trained to use it. <u>The NSA</u> <u>made \$7 million in duplicative invoice payments that it knows about and possibly</u> <u>made more</u>. At the end of fiscal year 2008, the agency could not successfully close its financial books.

As a result, NSA financial managers do not trust the system; only 17 percent of those surveyed believe it produces reliable business data. Worse still, the NSA paid its FACTS implementing contractor 44 percent of an award fee available in a period in which NSA rated the contractor's performance as "unacceptable". Thereafter, the NSA inexplicably decided to pay this contractor almost 80 percent of fee automatically – regardless of performance. This is unacceptable.

The Committee has been engaged in a continual dialog with the IC on auditable financial statements for a decade. We are frustrated that this dialog has yielded little in the way of actual results. Thus, we are forced to begin the process of enacting statutory requirements and/or serious restrictions on funding.

Simply stated, the IC cannot continue its sloppy internal accounting procedures.

In the meantime, to assist us with our oversight responsibility, we request you undertake the following actions:

• Brief the Committee on a Business Enterprise Architecture framework by July 31, 2009;

- Present an initial Business Enterprise Architecture to the Committee by December 31, 2009, to include an implementation plan with time-phased milestones, performance metrics, and a statement of resource needs;
- Keep us apprised monthly, starting in April 2009, on progress with the plan to fully staff the BTO, with special attention on the hiring of "Highly-Qualified Experts";
- Explain to the Committee no later than April 30, 2009 what specific tasks contained in your April 2007 Financial Statement Auditability Plan are: (1) unchanged; (2) modified (with new target due dates); and (3) deferred, due to BTO's Business Architecture deliberations; and
- Continue to keep the Committee apprised of your progress with this revised auditability plan no later than June 30, 2009.

The IC must be able to produce financial reports that pass independent audit if the taxpayers and Congress are to have confidence that the National Intelligence Program budget, which was \$47.5 billion for fiscal year 2008, is being spent effectively.

Initial IC Business Transformation Roadmap

Attached is an initial Business Transformation Roadmap that depicts the current Business Transformation activities and milestones underway across the Intelligence Community (IC).

The roadmap assumes FY09 as a planning year consistent with the October 2008 Executive Committee (EXCOM) guidance and highlights key decision points required by the IC leadership, specifically a major decision in March 2010 regarding core financial systems. This decision will be supported by a business case analysis and completion of four Integrated Process Teams (IPTs) resulting in common business process determinations and informed communitywide operational strategies for systems and process management.

The business process swim lanes represented on the roadmap illustrate the major areas of Business Transformation and over the coming weeks will be fully integrated into a formal Business Transformation roadmap and initial master schedule equivalent to that for the Information Integration Program (I2P). The Business Transformation Roadmap and integrated master schedule will incorporate the Business Transformation governance approach, the initial Business Enterprise Architecture Framework, business case milestones, and the results of the Congressionally directed business systems baseline study.

It is my understanding that on February 5, 2009, senior officials from the Department of Defense and the Intelligence Community met with President Obama to brief him on recommendations regarding the future acquisition of imagery satellites and as a result of the meeting, it was concluded that a Presidential determination would be required to select the path forward.

Therefore, I was surprised to learn that you attempted to submit a report to the Congress identifying the systems to be acquired prior to the Presidential determination. As I understand it, you based your report on the recommendations of your recently appointed advisory panel.

I find the evaluation and recommendations of your panel to be incomplete. The findings of your panel are also substantially contradicted by a recent joint review undertaken by the National Reconnaissance Office (NRO) and the Central Intelligence Agency Directorate of Science and Technology (CIA DS&T) at the request of Congress.

Members from your advisory panel met with staff from our committee and four other Congressional oversight committees on March 11th. Under questioning by the staffs, the panel members admitted that they had omitted critical performance parameters from one of the competing systems while at the same time charging the costs of those omitted capabilities to the system's estimated acquisition cost. The result was a substantially inflated cost estimate of that system and an underrepresentation of its potential performance.

As a result, the incumbent contractor's proposal, which is favored by your panel, appears to perform in a superior manner to that of the competing proposals and at a cost estimate comparable to the competing proposals. The panel also failed to fully model the competing systems against the governments established attributes for imagery collection architectures.

These attributes, agreed upon by the Intelligence Community and the Department of Defense, are the varied performance attributes that when taken together, meet or exceed as many of the combined imagery collection and dissemination requirements of the U.S. as possible. The system you recommend meets only one third of these attributes. The system whose performance parameters were decremented by your advisory panel meets all but one of these attributes.

Your recommendation is to select the incumbent contractor for our future systems. It is critical to note that the best estimates presented to the Committee staff indicate that the probability of the contractor delivering on the schedule claimed by the NRO approximates zero. It is my understanding that neither the Department of Defense, nor the Joint Chiefs of Staff has endorsed your proposal due to your proposal's high risk of creating a collection gap.

While your recommendation is high risk with regard to schedule, it is by far the most expensive. You are asking the taxpayers to pay more for a single article than we paid for the last Nimitz class aircraft carrier. Pursuing the highest cost and most risk-prone acquisition recommendation when lower cost and potentially better alternatives are available is in my opinion a poor choice.

The Congress and the President have to be able to trust your decision making as the Director of National Intelligence, not only in multi-billion dollar procurement contracts, but also in producing finished intelligence. As you emphasized in your confirmation testimony, you would never knowingly use incomplete intelligence analyses in producing finished intelligence. I feel very strongly that equal care should be afforded acquisition decisions. Admiral Dennis C. Blair March 16, 2009 Page Three

As you may be aware, the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence has been on record for more than two years advocating a departure from the path you wish to pursue. The path we have recommended is consistent with the acquisition policies of the Department of Defense and the Intelligence Community to acquire lower cost sensors in more numerous quantities.

While I have not had the opportunity to discuss this issue with Chairman Feinstein or the other committee members, I will have to insist that the Committee seek a more thorough examination of all performance and cost data through independent analyses of your panel's findings as well as those of the NRO and CIA (DS&T). I believe that the proper objective is to find a solution that meets as many of the architectural attributes of both the Department of Defense and the Intelligence Community as possible within the fiscal constraints we face.

Dear Secretary Gates and Director Blair:

We are writing to urge you to suspend implementation of the Defense Civilian Intelligence Personnel System (DCIPS) and include this program in the Administration's review of the National Security Personnel System (NSPS).

We have consistently expressed concerns about the implementation of pay-for-performance systems, which would impose wholesale changes to the current federal employee system. We are deeply concerned that these systems undermine collaboration, lack transparency, do not ensure fairness, and may have an adverse impact on minorities. The implementation of these systems has caused widespread distrust and anxiety across the federal government and, in particular, among Intelligence Community employees. We note with some alarm that human resources personnel and supervisors in converting units have not received adequate training for conversions planned within the next six months.

During the campaign, President Obama indicated that he would consider either a repeal or complete overhaul of pay-for-performance systems in the Department of Defense (DOD), and this week, DOD and the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) announced that it would suspend further implementation of NSPS, pending review of this system. This review may take some time, and until it is complete, the implementation of such pay-for-performance systems like DCIPS would be premature.

We hope that you would suspend implementation of DCIPS until the Administration and Congress can properly address the future of the intelligence community's personnel systems.

We request a prompt response to this letter.

Dear Attorney General Holder and Director Blair:

Three provisions of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978, as amended, are scheduled to sunset on December 31, 2009. Two of them—on roving wiretaps and business records—were enacted or significantly amended by sections 206 and 215 of the USA PATRIOT Act of 2001, and extended for four years by the USA PATRIOT Improvement and Reauthorization Act of 2005. The third—on lone wolf surveillance authority—was enacted as section 6001 of the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004, and also extended for four years by the Reauthorization Act.

We would like to begin consideration of these provisions soon so that legislation can be enacted in advance of the end of the year. We would, therefore appreciate receiving from you, by May 1, 2009, your recommendations together with a written presentation of the facts and reasons that support those recommendations. To the extent that national security permits, please do so in an unclassified manner to enhance public understanding of your recommendations. Please supplement that unclassified presentation with a classified annex as appropriate.

If there are further recommendations you would like to make jointly to our Committee for legislative consideration this year based on experience under the FISA Amendments Act of 2008 or other matters relating to national security investigations, please include them in your response to this request. In response to your March 18, 2009 letter requesting that I immediately revoke the security clearance of John Deutch, former Director of Central Intelligence, the following is provided. I am now fully aware of the circumstances that led to the formal revocation of his security clearance on February 6, 2001. Further, I have looked into Dr. Deutch's security history and want to share with you the specifies about his access to classified information since 2001 including his current status.

Since 2001, Dr. Deutch has been granted access to classified information on two occasions. In January 2007, Director, Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Michael Haydon requested and received a waiver to security standards from the Director of National Intelligence to allow Dr. Deutch to participate in a CIA event involving former Directors. In February 2009, we verified this 2007 action to grant Dr. Deutch Top Secret Sensitive Compartmented Information access. Flater exercised my authority as DNI to grant temporary access to classified information for Dr. Deutch to participate in a short-term panel in order to leverage his extensive knowledge in a specific area undergoing review.

Following discussions with Director Panetta, we have agreed to remove the previously granted exceptional access granted to Dr. Deutch. Should there be a future requirement for Dr. Deutch to participate in a classified matter, I will make any such decision in full consideration of the issues you detail in your letter, other relevant aspects of Dr. Deutch's past history, and the results of security clearance processes deemed appropriate at that time.

On April 2, 2009, the Senate Armed Services Committee reported S. 454, the "Weapons Systems Acquisition Reform Act of 2009." We ask that you provide us, in writing, your analysis of the impact this bill would have on acquisition programs funded by the National Intelligence Program (NIP), taking into account, in particular, the Director of National Intelligence's special procurement authorities contained in Title 50.

We would appreciate it if you could provide your analysis for each of the provisions of S. 454. In particular, we ask that you address two specific issues in your response: 1) the difference between the term "major defense acquisition programs" (MDAPs), as used by the Department of Defense and in S. 454, and the term "major system acquisitions," as used in your Report to Congress on Program Management Plans and in Title 50; and 2) the impact of S. 454, if enacted, on the March 2008 Memorandum of Agreement between the Director of National Intelligence and the Secretary of Defense "Concerning the Management of Acquisition Programs Executed at the Department of Defense Intelligence Community Elements."

We would also appreciate your assessment of any possible interplay between S. 454 and the acquisition reform provisions of S. 2996, the "Intelligence Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2009," as reported last year by our Committee.

Your response prior to May 8, 2009, would be greatly appreciated.

Dear Mr. Chairman and Ranking Member Hoekstra:

In November 2008, our Inspector General issued a report entitled *Critical Intelligence Community Management Challenges.* I have reviewed the report and do believe it raises some important issues regarding the Intelligence Community and my Office. I would also like to add that some of the assessments are based on anecdotal and dated information. Because of this, the report in its entirety does not accurately reflect our current state as a Community.

I believe IG's can play a helpful role in improving efficiency and organizational management and I intend to ask our new IG, Ms. Roslyn Mazer, to search for meaningful ways to address our most pressing management challenges.

In the coming weeks, I will be presenting you and my IC colleagues with my vision with regard to our mission and announcing some realignments of organizational structure and additions to our management team. Notwithstanding, I would like to take this opportunity to comment on last year's IG report, which addressed five areas: Leadership and Governance; Information Sharing; Impediments to Collaboration and Integration; Improving Financial Management and Acquisition Oversight; and Resolving Major Legal Issues.

Leadership and Governance

With regard to the IG findings on leadership and governance, I believe that the views of IC employees interviewed by the IG last year merit attention, even if the sampling survey was unscientific. Our recent IC Employee Climate Survey revealed that our employees continue to rank the IC among the very top Federal employers in overall job satisfaction, employee recognition, quality of their managers and leaders, and our ability to recruit talent.

I believe internal and external communications efforts are vital to changing organizational culture and making each IC employee a participant in our success. I have assembled a new

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Communications team to address this need. I am visiting every ODNI component and have begun communicating directly in a weekly electronic message, written by me, to all employees. I have sent four messages to date and plan to leverage this tool to reach each IC officer.

In addition, I am working with my senior staff to re-think roles and organizations within the ODNI structure—we will be rolling out these changes soon. My predecessors have tried several approaches with regard to the structure and functioning of the ODNI. There are lessons learned from these approaches and we plan to improve upon them.

I am very close to articulating a statement of my goals for our Community with concrete examples of the methods we will use to accomplish those goals. I am visiting each IC element to meet with leadership and employees and I believe our statement of goals will resonate well with them.

In this area the IG's report could have better accounted for significant strides made in implementing the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004 (IRTPA) that have already begun to touch the working lives of our employees in significant ways:

- Executive Order 12333 updated the 27-year-old EO to align it with the IRTPA, reflecting the reform underway IC-wide, and clarify the DNI's role as head of the Community;
- Information Sharing IT solutions have enabled information sharing across the IC including iVideo (for sharing imagery), Intellipedia, A-Space, and a web-based document sharing system called Inteldocs;
- Information Sharing Agreements to include completion of more than 10 new information sharing arrangements between the National Counterterrorism Center (NCTC) and other organizations;
- **Mission Management** strategies have implemented the principle of "analysis driving collection" to focus and align activities and capabilities across the Intelligence Community to achieve deep penetrations of hard targets, mobilize collection on top priority issues, and maximize return on investment;
- The National Intelligence Priorities Framework process has been substantially adjusted and strengthened to ensure the Community uses a common set of priorities to guide and inform decision-making based upon input ODNI gathers from National Security Council Principals and Combatant Commanders.
- Security Clearance Reform modernization, which the ODNI will continue to drive in this Administration; and
- Analytic Transformation, to include establishment of analytic tradecraft standards and evaluation, which enhance analytic rigor and quality by providing IC-wide standards and feedback to the IC that informs and focuses analytic training and professional development initiatives.

Looking forward, in June 2009, the ODNI will release the third major deliverable from the new IC-Strategic Enterprise Management (SEM) process: Intelligence Planning Guidance for the 2012-2017 budget build. This guidance will further solidify the budgetary role envisioned in the IRTPA for the DNI and enable me to better align intelligence resources with national priorities.

Information Sharing

With regard to information sharing, I agree we need to improve and I am using our Executive Committee (EXCOM), chaired by me and whose membership includes all the IC Agency/Component leaders, and the Deputies-level (DEXCOM) as management tools to push information to our Community through its leaders.

More must, and will, be done to improve information sharing while balancing the need to maintain the protection of sources and methods, but I believe the IG report did not capture some of the essential building blocks we have set in place. These include:

- ICD 501 on Access to and Dissemination of Intelligence has been published and we have turned to implementation of this vital Directive—this was called for in the IG report and is now complete;
- The process to identify and adjudicate information sharing disputes among IC elements has addressed 26 cases from 15 organizations since November 2007 19 of these were quickly resolved;
- A National Strategy for Information Sharing has been adopted and focuses on improving sharing of homeland security, terrorism and law enforcement information; and
- A Facilitation and Resolution team has been established for analysts as an avenue to adjudicate decisions when access to intelligence has been denied, and a Senior Review Group is now been established as a matter of policy to serve as a "court of last resort" in these matters.

In addition, significant milestones will be reached in the near future:

- By June 2009, as a result of ICD 501, we will have the process and IT mechanisms in place to ensure that every piece of intelligence we disseminate (excluding a small number of very sensitive items) is discoverable by IC analysts; and
- This year we plan to deliver the first new capability associated with our IC-wide Information Integration Program – ONEmail, which will provide the first email platform in which all IC employees can participate.

Impediments to Collaboration and Integration

With regard to removing impediments to IC-wide collaboration and integration, I am fully committed to this effort. I am working closely with the EXCOM and DEXCOM to build on the initiatives put in place by my predecessors.

When I issue my statement of goals for the IC, I will sit down with each IC leader and work with them to define their role in accomplishing these goals and determine what they need from me and my staff to succeed.

Our collaborative efforts have been exemplary as evidenced in the warning and analytic efforts surrounding North Korea's most recent Taepo Dong 2 launch, the IC's support to policymakers during the naval incident with USS IMPECCABLE, and the efforts to achieve a decision on the nation's electro-optical satellite architecture via a deliberative, careful and consultative process.

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For example, we have room to promote more integrated action with DoD in overseas operations, overcoming some barriers to cooperation that have held us back in the past. These issues alert us to the need for change and give us the opportunity to take corrective action; they are a "to-do list."

Improving Financial Management and Acquisition Oversight

We will continue to update the Congress on our progress toward IC-wide auditability, while we proceed with our business transformation efforts. We recognize that business transformation is critical to achieving auditability, and is worth devoting the time and resources needed to achieve this goal.

In addition, we are making steady progress in instituting acquisition improvements to recover from the failed acquisition efforts of the mid-1990's. The IG is following up with a more in-depth look at acquisition, which will note progress made— such as implementation of the 2008 memorandum of agreement between the DoD and the ODNI and policies to strengthen my role in Independent Cost Estimates.

I will carefully review the IG's more in-depth and up-to-date work on acquisition and share my views in the near future.

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With respect to resolving major legal issues, I believe the report does not adequately account for the modernization of FISA, issuance of Attorney General Guidelines governing the FBI's domestic operations, or the revision of Executive Order 12333.

Also, it does not take into account the significant work done by the jointly led Justice-ODNI Working Group on U.S. persons, its clarification of critical definitional matters, contribution to new FBI Attorney General approved guidelines, and its leading role in drafting and coordinating Intelligence Community Directive 102, which captures a process to issue consistent interpretations of U.S. persons principles across the IC.

Together, the measures taken over the last four years constitute the largest substantive IC legal reforms in over thirty years. These new measures go a significant way towards addressing many of the legitimate legal challenges that the Community has faced in the past, as well as, towards implementing the Intelligence Reform and Terrorist Prevention Act.

In conclusion, I believe that while this IG report may be an imperfect data point regarding our progress, it raises important issues that will affect future progress. We will not lose sight of them.

Thank you for your continued and careful oversight of the Intelligence Community.

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

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

We are writing to urge you to withdraw the appointment of Chas Freeman to serve as Chair of the National Intelligence Council (NIC). While Ambassador Freeman has had a long career of public service, his dogmatic views, rhetorical pronouncements, and possible financial conflicts of interest make him the wrong choice for this critical role as a key filter of intelligence analysis and the gatekeeper to the National Intelligence Estimate (NIE).

It is essential for the President and your office to solicit candid and diverse perspectives and input in policy analysis and decision-making. We are deeply concerned, however, that Ambassador Freeman's sustained and documented record of controversial opinions on the Middle East Peace Process, China's democracy movement, and his reported close financial ties to the Saudi Kingdom, could cloud future National Intelligence Estimates and steer the Council's analytical activities in a skewed direction.

The National Intelligence Council is an essential forum. Its principle officer should not be the source of chronic controversy that will detract from the Council's core mission and serve as a distraction to you and the President. We urge you to reconsider your decision and inspire the confidence of policymakers, members of the intelligence community, and the public who agree that Ambassador Freeman should not serve in this position.

Dear Mr. Chairman and Ranking Member Cochran:

In November 2008, our Inspector General issued a report entitled *Critical Intelligence Community Management Challenges.* I have reviewed the report and do believe it raises some important issues regarding the Intelligence Community and my Office. I would also like to add that some of the assessments are based on anecdotal and dated information. Because of this, the report in its entirety does not accurately reflect our current state as a Community.

I believe IG's can play a helpful role in improving efficiency and organizational management and I intend to ask our new IG, Ms. Roslyn Mazer, to search for meaningful ways to address our most pressing management challenges.

In the coming weeks, I will be presenting you and my IC colleagues with my vision with regard to our mission and announcing some realignments of organizational structure and additions to our management team. Notwithstanding, I would like to take this opportunity to comment on last year's IG report, which addressed five areas: Leadership and Governance; Information Sharing; Impediments to Collaboration and Integration; Improving Financial Management and Acquisition Oversight; and Resolving Major Legal Issues.

Leadership and Governance

With regard to the IG findings on leadership and governance, I believe that the views of IC employees interviewed by the IG last year merit attention, even if the sampling survey was unscientific. Our recent IC Employee Climate Survey revealed that our employees continue to rank the IC among the very top Federal employers in overall job satisfaction, employee recognition, quality of their managers and leaders, and our ability to recruit talent.

I believe internal and external communications efforts are vital to changing organizational culture and making each IC employee a participant in our success. I have assembled a new Communications team to address this need. I am visiting every ODNI component and have begun communicating directly in a weekly electronic message, written by me, to all employees. I have sent four messages to date and plan to leverage this tool to reach each IC officer.

In addition, I am working with my senior staff to re-think roles and organizations within the ODNI structure—we will be rolling out these changes soon. My predecessors have tried several approaches with regard to the structure and functioning of the ODNI. There are lessons learned from these approaches and we plan to improve upon them.

I am very close to articulating a statement of my goals for our Community with concrete examples of the methods we will use to accomplish those goals. I am visiting each IC element to meet with leadership and employees and I believe our statement of goals will resonate well with them.

In this area the IG's report could have better accounted for significant strides made in implementing the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004 (IRTPA) that have already begun to touch the working lives of our employees in significant ways:

- Executive Order 12333 updated the 27-year-old EO to align it with the IRTPA, reflecting the reform underway IC-wide, and clarify the DNI's role as head of the Community;
- Information Sharing IT solutions have enabled information sharing across the IC including iVideo (for sharing imagery), Intellipedia, A-Space, and a web-based document sharing system called Inteldocs;
- Information Sharing Agreements to include completion of more than 10 new information sharing arrangements between the National Counterterrorism Center (NCTC) and other organizations;
- Mission Management strategies have implemented the principle of "analysis driving collection" to focus and align activities and capabilities across the Intelligence Community to achieve deep penetrations of hard targets, mobilize collection on top priority issues, and maximize return on investment;
- The National Intelligence Priorities Framework process has been substantially adjusted and strengthened to ensure the Community uses a common set of priorities to guide and inform decision-making based upon input ODNI gathers from National Security Council Principals and Combatant Commanders.
- Security Clearance Reform modernization, which the ODNI will continue to drive in this Administration; and
- Analytic Transformation, to include establishment of analytic tradecraft standards and evaluation, which enhance analytic rigor and quality by providing IC-wide standards and feedback to the IC that informs and focuses analytic training and professional development initiatives.

Looking forward, in June 2009, the ODNI will release the third major deliverable from the new IC-Strategic Enterprise Management (SEM) process: Intelligence Planning Guidance for the 2012-2017 budget build. This guidance will further solidify the budgetary role envisioned in the IRTPA for the DNI and enable me to better align intelligence resources with national priorities.

Information Sharing

With regard to information sharing, I agree we need to improve and I am using our Executive Committee (EXCOM), chaired by me and whose membership includes all the IC Agency/Component leaders, and the Deputies-level (DEXCOM) as management tools to push information to our Community through its leaders.

More must, and will, be done to improve information sharing while balancing the need to maintain the protection of sources and methods, but I believe the IG report did not capture some of the essential building blocks we have set in place. These include:

- ICD 501 on Access to and Dissemination of Intelligence has been published and we have turned to implementation of this vital Directive—this was called for in the IG report and is now complete;
- The process to identify and adjudicate information sharing disputes among IC elements has addressed 26 cases from 15 organizations since November 2007 19 of these were quickly resolved;
- A National Strategy for Information Sharing has been adopted and focuses on improving sharing of homeland security, terrorism and law enforcement information; and
- A Facilitation and Resolution team has been established for analysts as an avenue to adjudicate decisions when access to intelligence has been denied, and a Senior Review Group is now been established as a matter of policy to serve as a "court of last resort" in these matters.

In addition, significant milestones will be reached in the near future:

- By June 2009, as a result of ICD 501, we will have the process and IT mechanisms in place to ensure that every piece of intelligence we disseminate (excluding a small number of very sensitive items) is discoverable by IC analysts; and

ODNI employees are required to successfully complete a counterintelligence polygraph examination as a condition of employment and Ambassador Freeman will do so.

Finally, I assure you that Ambassador Freeman will comply with all procedures and recommendations stemming from counsel's review of the required Public Financial Disclosure Form, which he is required by law to complete within 30 days of his first day of employment. Each individual hired for a senior position at the ODNI is required to file this form to determine whether any conflicts of interest arise from prior employment or financial holdings, and to take appropriate steps to resolve such conflicts.

This process holds true for our highest-level products, NIEs, as well as shorter analytic products. I am committed to ensuring that the NIC continues to be an organization representing the best talent assembled from throughout the Community.

Once work on an NIE is assembled in draft, a senior National Intelligence Board, comprised of the directors of the IC's analytic agencies, personally approves the analysis and judgments of each National Intelligence Estimate. This Board includes the Directors of the CIA, DIA, FBI or their analytic heads, and others from across the IC. These high level reviews are a critical part of the process as they test assumptions and question judgments before any product is final.

As a full participant and leader of this review process, I personally approve each National Intelligence Estimate in my capacity as the leader of the Intelligence Community and as the President's principal advisor on intelligence matters.

Ambassador Freeman has never been a Capitol Hill lobbyist nor has he ever lobbied on behalf of any government or business (domestic or foreign). Ambassador Freeman has never received any income directly from Saudi Arabia or any Saudi-controlled entity.

The Middle East Policy Council (MEPC), which he chaired for 12 of its 30 year history, is a 501(c)(3) non-profit that does not take positions on issues. All of its activities are entirely transparent and in the public domain. The MEPC has never lobbied on behalf of any cause or government. Saudi Government contributions to the MEPC account for no more than one-twelfth of the MEPC's annual operating budget of \$600,000. Thank you for your April 29, 2009 letter requesting an explanation of how procurements of information technology within the Intelligence Community are managed and approved. We appreciate the opportunity to clarify the two issues associated with your request.

The terms "acquisition" and "procurement" are often used interchangeably. However, in certain contexts, both the Department of Defense and the Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) make policy distinctions between the two terms. In those instances, "procurement" is the buying of goods and services for the government, often commercially available goods; while "acquisition" refers to activities supporting the entire life cycle of developmental and non-developmental systems, and for which procurement is a supporting function. (See Defense Acquisition University Glossary of terms.)

In an amendment to the National Security Act of 1947, Congress created, by statute, a presidentially appointed and Senate confirmed Chief Information Officer of the Intelligence Community (IC CIO) within the ODNI. The IC CIO has authorities, subject to the direction of the DNI, to direct and manage all IT related procurements for the IC and to have procurement approval authority over all IT items related to the enterprise architecture of IC components. In the ODNI, we manage and approve information technology acquisitions through a teaming of the Deputy Director of National Intelligence for Future Capabilities (DDNI/FC) and the IC CIO.

The DNI's Intelligence Community Directive (ICD) 500, Director of National Intelligence Chief Information Officer, sets forth the authorities and responsibilities of the IC CIO, as further delegated by the DNI. ICD 500 contains policy governing IT program assessment oversight. It specifies that the IC CIO is responsible for "monitoring the performance of information technology programs of the IC, evaluating the performance of those programs on the basis of the applicable performance measurements, and, in coordination with other affected CIOs within the IC, advising the DNI regarding whether to continue, modify, or terminate a program or project" within the National Intelligence Program (NIP), including Major System Acquisitions and programs of special interest.

32

ICD 801, Acquisition, states that all major systems acquisitions that include the procurement of enterprise architecture-related IT items and are wholly or partially NIP-funded shall adhere to the applicable IC CIO enterprise architecture, standards, protocols and interfaces in support of the DNI's IC data and information sharing initiatives. Thus, the IC CIO participates in all oversight activities related to IT procurement and acquisition, providing advice; assessments and determinations related to such procurements.

There are many intersections between the Milestone Decision Authority exercised by the DDNI/FC and the procurement authorities and IT enterprise architecture standards set by the IC CIO, so teaming is the normal construct, with leadership of the team alternating depending on the nature of the system and of the acquisition. The IC CIO supports the Milestone Decision Authority and executing program offices by providing, measuring and assessing a major system's compliance with the CIO's enterprise architecture, information security, information sharing and related standards, and assessing the viability of the supporting infrastructure used in the major system, as well as Clinger-Cohen compliance. The IC CIO also conducts IT project and program assessments for acquisitions regardless of their MSA status. These include enterprise and organizational infrastructures, applications customer tool acquisition and development, information integration efforts, innovation and technology insertion, complex IT integration efforts, enterprise licenses, data center strategies and other IT initiatives.

I am confident that Ms. Guthrie, if confirmed, will be an effective manager of our Intelligence Community's information technology.

I am writing to forward you the attached letter and report, which I received from Madeleine C. Albright and William S. Cohen, Co-Chairs of the Genocide Prevention Task Force.

As the letter from Co-Chairs Albright and Cohen indicates, the Intelligence Community plays a critical role in ensuring that the Government is able to effectively and timely respond to genocide. It is absolutely essential that the United States takes a leading role in international efforts to prevent these atrocities.

The Task Force has specific recommendations for preventing genocide that require your consideration as the Director of National Intelligence, including:

- The preparation of a National Intelligence Estimate (NIE) on global risks of genocide and other mass atrocities. A 2001 NIE on global humanitarian emergencies briefly addressed genocide and crimes against humanity. An updated and more focused Estimate on genocide would greatly enhance the policy debate in this area.
- Establishing genocide early warning as a formal priority for the Intelligence Community to ensure that these mass atrocities receive the President's utmost attention.
- Training on genocide early warning in the foreign service and intelligence officer and analyst programs at U.S. intelligence agencies and the Department of State. By preparing U.S. officials working abroad to identify conditions and situations related to genocide, the U.S. Government will be better equipped to effectively identify and deter these mass atrocities.

I request that you review the policy recommendations presented in their letter and in the report issued by the Genocide Prevention Task Force. I share their commitment to preventing these devastating conflicts from happening in the future and hope that you will give serious consideration to this report.

I look forward to your response and welcome the opportunity to work with you on this important issue.

On Friday, we received the attached letter from the Director of National Intelligence (DNI) admitting that Ambassador Freeman received indirect salary from the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia through his Middle East Policy Council. While the DNI continues to conceal a complete list of contributors to the Council across the years Ambassador Freeman received a salary, we maintain grave concerns that the new editor-in-chief of our nation's most important intelligence estimates has recently received indirect salary from a foreign government.

In addition, the DNI admitted in the attached letter that Ambassador Freeman received a \$10,000 annual salary directly from Chinese National Offshore Oil Company – a company owned by the People's Republic of China with significant investment in the Islamic Republic of Iran. This appears to present Ambassador Freeman with a serious conflict of interest.

Furthermore, the DNI left open the possibility that Ambassador Freeman, as Chairman of "Projects International," may have direct or indirect financial ties to foreign entities and individuals. According to its Web site, Ambassador Freeman became Chairman of "Projects International" in 1995. The firm lists operations in Saudi Arabia, the Middle East, Africa and China. Unfortunately, its Web site does not disclose a complete foreign client list. We ask you to obtain and publicity disclose all foreign entities and individuals that paid consulting fees to Projects International since 1995.

In the wake of the November 30, 2006 report by the Department of Defense Office of the Inspector General (Case Number: H06L101153224), we know the Director of National Intelligence takes the issue of "conflict of interest" seriously. That is why we were surprised to learn in his attached letter that he appointed Ambassador Freeman without first obtaining any financial disclosure information.

Thank you for your continued investigation into this matter. We remain confident in your ability to conduct an independent investigation.

Because my representation of these individuals relates to non-public matters, I believe my ethical responsibilities to preserve the "confidence[s]" and "secret[s]" of a client under D.C. Rule of Professional Conduct 1.6(a) require me to be circumspect in discussing these representations, and in particular the identity of my clients, in public. However, I believe it is important for the Committee to understand the details.

In particular, I represent two employees of the Agency who I believe are currently undercover, who had some role in the rendition, detention and interrogation of suspected terrorists. I also represent who was

By statute, under the rules of ethics and by virtue of my ethics agreement that has been provided to the Committee, I will not participate personally and substantially in any particular matter involving these clients. I have consulted with the ODNI Designated Agency Ethics Official about the scope of that bar, and while its precise contours will have to be determined on a case-bycase basis, I will not participate in any decisions relating to the possible prosecution or investigation of these individuals nor any decisions that would affect the outcome of such matters, including decisions about similarly situated individuals, nor will I offer an opinion with respect to the legal status of particular interrogation procedures that may have been employed in the past that relate to the subject of my representation.

A principal function of the Director of National Intelligence, and by extension the General Counsel of ODNI, is to set forward-looking policies and procedures to ensure compliance by the Intelligence Community with the Constitution and laws of the United States. I do not believe my prior representation will impose any limitations on my ability

to participate fully in that process as it relates to detention and interrogation going forward.

I appreciate the Committee's consideration of my situation. I am, of course, prepared to answer questions about this matter at the confirmation hearing. However, as noted above, my understanding of the applicable Rules of Professional Conduct is that I am not permitted to disclose the identity of my clients in non-public matters of this nature. Although I have obtained permission from or disclose this identity on a confidential basis to the Committee for this limited purpose, I also respectfully request that the Committee treat identity as confidential consistent with his request.

Thank you for your May 1, 2009 letter to Director Blair requesting additional information on the capabilities of the work done by the National Drug Intelligence Center (NDIC) and recommendations on whether the Intelligence Community should continue to provide funds to it. The information that follows supplements our March 31, 2009 submission to the Congress in response to H.R. 2638, P.L. 110-329 enacted 30 September 2008, on the National Drug Intelligence Center (NDIC), an element of the Department of Justice.

Tradecraft

NDIC's analytic capacity includes an in-house training program to maintain and propagate NDIC methods. NDIC leadership plans to incorporate the IC's analytic tradecraft into this training. At NDIC's invitation, the DNI's Office of Analytic Integrity and Standards (AIS) recently agreed to provide NDIC analysts and managers training similar to that AIS has provided to numerous IC analytic elements on how analysts can use IC Analytic tradecraft to enhance analytic rigor and effective communication in analytic products.

The training session took place on May 20-21, 2009 in Johnstown, PA. AIS trained senior level analysts and managers in Johnstown on the proper application of the Analytic Tradecraft Standards found in Intelligence Community Directive 203 and provided attendees training materials that they can share with others in NDIC and incorporate into NDIC's in-house training program.

The ODNI also encourages NDIC to make its specialized counterdrug training, already widely offered in the law enforcement community, more readily accessible to IC analysts.

His questions asked about Intelligence Community assessments about the suitability of detainees for release and about the Yemeni Government's ability to successfully rehabilitate or constrain any Yemeni detainees who are transferred from Guantanamo Bay (GTMO).

I associate myself with the concerns raised by Senator Coburn and join him in looking forward to the response to his questions.

Senator Coburn's letter to you takes note of information recently provided to our Committee by the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) and quotes part of a sentence in DIA's transmittal. In the hope it might be helpful for you to have the complete sentence, it is:

"DIA has consistently objected to the movement of the detainees DIA assesses to be the most dangerous, however, *during the past several years* has not objected to the movement of many rank and file members of terrorist organizations due to the explicit understanding that many detainees were destined to be transferred out of GTMO regardless of intelligence-based objections." (emphasis added). So to be clear, the DIA was, in fact, referring to "the past several years." I write solely to make the record clear.


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

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On February 25, 2009, my Committee received a briefing from the Director of the National Center for Medical Intelligence and I am concerned about the revelation that, "coordination of medical intelligence and domestic health information is not the sole responsibility of one agency or individual, but the collaborative effort of partners at federal, state, and local levels." Without a single individual who can be held accountable for overseeing the coordination of domestic and international medical intelligence, the United States increases its risk of having valuable information not shared because of the current bureaucratic structural flaws in our national security system. Certain classified medical intelligence information could be invaluable to Americans if a natural pandemic begins spreading across the globe or if a foreign country is preparing a biological attack on the United States.

After reflecting further on the briefing, it even appears that we do not have a contingency plan to implement in the event the Intelligence Community does acquire valuable, timely medical information. Please examine the intersection between domestic and international intelligence which exists across many national security sectors, giving special consideration to the question, "does the United States need a single individual who is responsible for ensuring proper coordination is taking place between all of our different medical collection elements?" I believe a single coordinator who is knowledgeable about all civil liberty concerns, intelligence information sharing challenges, and medical processes makes sense as the United States prepares itself for new and evolved 21st century threats.

Thank you for your letter of March 20, 2009 regarding the conversion of certain Department of Defense civilians to the Defense Civilian Intelligence Personnel System (DCIPS).

Deputy Secretary Lynn is responding separately to your letter with an updated DCIPS implementation schedule. However, I wanted to acknowledge your continuing concerns and personally assure you of my commitment to do everything we can to address them. DCIPS is an integral part of a broader effort to introduce performance-based pay throughout the entire Intelligence Community (IC), and I believe that effort has the potential to be a real "game changer" in the IC's ongoing transformation. That said, I also know that we both want pay-for-performance to be credible, transparent, merit-based, and above all, free from any unlawful discrimination, implicit bias, or adverse impact on minorities, women, persons with disabilities, or employees with heritage backgrounds.

We have made a substantial investment in "up front" and ongoing training for our employees, supervisors, human resources professionals, and especially those management officials who will make performance pay decisions. Per your guidance, that training places a particular emphasis on avoiding unlawful discrimination, implicit bias, and adverse impact. We have also provided procedural protections that are intended to directly respond to other concerns voiced by our employees, and by your Committee. For example, we prohibit performance rating "quotas" and also forbid those management officials who will make pay decisions from changing or manipulating individual performance ratings in any way.

Further, we have tried to take some of the uncertainty out of the performance pay process itself. Thus, every employee who receives a performance rating of "Successful" or higher will receive the equivalent of the annual government-wide and locality pay increase. In addition, employees at the "Successful" level or higher will also be eligible for additional performancebased salary increases (largely driven by a mathematical formula). Finally, we have established four separate layers of oversight, with performance rating and pay results reviewed by agencylevel Performance Review Authorities; the IC Chief Human Capital Officers Council; my Office of IC Equal Employment Opportunity and Diversity, which will conduct its own independent annual assessment; and the IC Deputies Executive Committee.

As you know, our National Intelligence Civilian Compensation Program (NICCP, of which DCIPS is part) has drawn heavily from the National Geospatial Intelligence Agency's more than ten years of pay-for-performance experience, and the features I have described clearly differentiate it from other such Federal efforts. You also deserve considerable credit in this regard; your legitimate concerns, as well as your thoughtful and continuing oversight, have had a strong, positive influence on the design of the NICCP. I believe that the result offers unprecedented safeguards against unlawful discrimination, implicit bias, and adverse impact; in the end, that is what will ensure that pay-for-performance in the IC is credible, transparent, and merit-based.

Mr. Chairman, we both want an IC workforce that is second to none – highly motivated, focused on results, technically unrivaled, and as diverse as the peoples and cultures that we must understand. I believe that the NICCP is one of the keys to achieving that goal, and I look forward to working with you and your Committee to make it a reality. We will also continue to keep your Committee, and its Senate counterpart, fully informed on the results of our reviews as well as any changes we decide to make as a result of those reviews.

(U) The Director of National Intelligence, Dennis C. Blair, appreciated the opportunity to testify before the Committee on Armed Services on March 10 on the worldwide threat assessment. He asked me to convey his continued appreciation to you and the Committee for your support of the Intelligence Community and our Armed Forces.

(U) During the hearing, you asked Director Blair about the Visa Waiver Program (VWP) as it relates to disaffected Pakistanis and their ability to travel to the United States. We have checked with our colleagues at the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and have received an updated overview of the VWP dated March 16, 2009 (copy attached). There are currently 34 countries which have been deemed eligible for this program and the list does not include Pakistan.

(U) The Secure Travel and Counterterrorism Partnership Act of 2007 expresses the Sense of Congress that visa-free travel privileges to the United States should be extended "to nationals of foreign countries that are partners in the war on terrorism." This Act also amended the Immigration and Nationality Act to provide discretionary VWP expansion authorities to the Secretary of Homeland Security, in addition to providing responsibility to the Director of National Intelligence to provide notification to the Secretary of threats from countries participating in the VWP. Upon receiving such notification, the Secretary, in consultation with the Secretary of State, may suspend a country's participation in the VWP.

(U) We are advised by DHS that the visa refusal rate for Pakistan for Fiscal Year 2008 was 46.3%, which is 15 times the maximum rate allowed for VWP participation. As such, DHS expects that Pakistani citizens will continue to require visas in order to travel to the United States for the foreseeable future.

Congressional Notification: 2008 Intelligence Community Employee Climate Survey

<u>Summary</u>: The Director of National Intelligence (DNI) has released the results of the fourth annual Intelligence Community (IC) Employee Climate Survey. The 2008 results indicate that our employees continue to rank the IC among the very top Federal employers on four key workplace metrics: their overall job satisfaction; how they are recognized and rewarded (that is, our performance "culture"); the overall quality of their managers and leaders; and the IC's ability to recruit talent. In addition, the survey indicates that the vast majority of IC employees continue to like the work they do and realize how important it is to our Nation's security. We also saw marked increase in the value that our employees place on collaboration, but they still report impediments to doing so.

Background: While our 2008 results once again compare very favorably to the rest of the Federal government, our employees continue to want more effective leaders, as well as a stronger linkage between their performance and their pay and promotion prospects. The IC Climate Survey is based on the Federal Human Capital Survey, conducted biennially by the Office of Personnel Management; for the third year, we also included our own battery of seven items dealing with the state of collaboration and information sharing across the IC. The 58-question (plus demographic items) instrument was administered to IC personnel between 1 October 2008 and 30 November 2008, with the number of respondents about the same as in 2007. All 17 IC agencies and elements participated.

According to our 2008 results, the IC remains an "employer of choice" amongst its employees, especially when compared to other Federal agencies; in this regard, average IC results exceed the Federal average on 37 of 46 common measures. However, as noted, a strong majority of employees still remain concerned about performance management; in our view, not enough of them believe their pay checks and promotions are based on their performance, nor do they believe that we are doing enough to hold poor performers accountable. Further, while our employees rate their immediate managers highly (for example, a very high percentage of them say that their supervisors support their efforts to balance the demands of work and family), they also clearly expect more from their senior leaders. So do we.

The IC has a number of long-term human capital initiatives designed to sustain the high morale of our workforce, as well as to address the improvement areas revealed by the survey. For example, in order to strengthen our performance management systems, the DNI established a rigorous new performance appraisal policy which took effect on October 1, 2008; that policy requires every IC civilian to be evaluated on what they accomplish, as well as on six "core" IC performance elements – including such mission-critical behaviors as collaboration and critical thinking. We implemented a similar policy covering senior IC civilian employees, including a . process for them to receive 360° developmental feedback this past year. We also issued a series

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of IC directives that, taken together, establish the National Intelligence Civilian Compensation Program (NICCP); the NICCP will strengthen the linkage between individual performance and pay. And to ensure that our future leaders are prepared to sustain a new IC "culture of collaboration," we continue to forge ahead with the groundbreaking civilian joint duty program, with thousands of employees currently on joint duty rotational assignments to other IC agencies and elements, combatant commands, etc.

<u>Next Steps</u>: Although individual agency results are classified, the DNI has instructed agency heads to publicize their individual survey results internally to their employees, and to develop and execute action plans to address deficiencies. Aggregate IC results are attached and will be released to the public and posted on the DNI's unclassified Web site. We are available to brief the Committees on the survey. Last week I read with great interest the press coverage of President Obama's new strategy on Afghanistan and Pakistan in the Washington Post and Economist. Especially interesting were the articles that cited you as having opined that twothirds to three-fourths of insurgents have local grievances and can be mollified by the government, while the other one-fourth to one-third are followers of Mullah Omar.

While I agree that there may be some combatants who are likely to be "dayfighters," this is the first time that I have heard that we have such fidelity on the numbers and motivation of anti-coalition militants in Afghanistan. I am very interested to hear how much we know about the militants in different parts of the country, what motivates them, and what would turn them away from the insurgency. Could you please provide the Committee a copy of the analysis or analyses from which you gleaned this information?

I would also like to know what the Intelligence Community is doing specifically to support the President's plan. Now that we have such specific information, I assume we will deploy collection platforms and missions that will specifically target information to aid in the reconciliation process. I would appreciate your written response not later than 30 April, 2009.

I appreciate the great leadership you provide as the Director of National Intelligence including your collaboration and coordination with the intelligence agencies. I have had the pleasure of observing first hand the innovative applied research being done at the Cyber Security Research Institute (CSRI) at Armstrong Atlantic State University (AASU) in Savannah, Georgia.


CSRI has developed customized training programs on steganographic tools and the other covert channel communications for Special Operations Command (SOCOM) and the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center. Through their partner Factor² Tech, LLC, CSRI is conducting research and development on a process known as Tersus that effectively eliminates an adversary's ability to transmit or receive steganographically hidden digital payloads. This work is currently focused on adapting and integrating Tersus to meet a number of critical needs:

- For information assurance (IA) Tersus is being modified to assure secure communications within an existing network and to securely store data.
- For covert operations Tersus Is being adapted to "normalize" steganographic carrier files to bypass counterdetection using advanced statistical analysis.
- For offensive capabilities this approach is being used to develop a stealth delivery system for weaponized digital payloads to bypass an adversary's network defenses before executing.

SOCOM and CSRI are currently collaborating to develop devices for military applications for future information operations exercises.

Shoring up our nation's information infrastructure and staying ahead of those who are developing malicious capabilities, demands that we fully employ institutions like CSRI to continuously develop solutions with systems like Tersus. I am confident that a partnership with CSRI at Armstrong Atlantic State University will yield great returns for nation's cybersecurity.

Thank you for your letter of March 9, 2009 and forwarding the Genocide Prevention Task Force Report and letter from Co-Chairs Albright and Cohen. The Intelligence Community shares your commitment to genocide prevention and we appreciate your offer to work with us on this critical issue. Since the Task Force Report did not fully capture all we are doing with regard to genocide early warning, analysis, and reporting, we wanted to highlight the most important activities for you.

- The National Intelligence Officer for Warning (NIO/W) has overall responsibility for genocide warning and publishes the *Atrocities Watchlist* highlighting countries at risk of widespread or systematic atrocities. NIO/W also produces the *Instability Watchlist* of countries at risk of serious political instability (which is always a precondition for genocide).
- The Central Intelligence Agency's (CIA) Crime and Narcotics Center (CNC) produces the monthly *War Crimes, Atrocities, and Human Rights Monitor*, which reports on human rights abuses and war crimes worldwide. CNC is also the principal drafter for the *Atrocities Watchlist*.
- CIA's Office of Transnational Issues (OTI) maintains and produces analysis based on two early warning models that cover genocide and mass killings. These models—as well as a monthly data collection effort on low-level atrocities committed worldwide—support CIA and other community analysis and research on genocide-related topics. OTI's Political Instability Task Force (PITF) project systematically engages outside scholars and experts to advance community research, analysis, and modeling capacity on these issues.
- The War Crimes, Atrocities, and Democracy Division in the State Department's Bureau of Intelligence and Research (INR) produces all-source intelligence on genocide-related topics. INR also cosponsors (with CIA) an annual Genocide Prevention Forum that brings together U.S. and foreign government intelligence and policy officials, expert scholars, and several Non-Governmental Organizations (NGO) to discuss genocide-related legal, warning, and responsibility-to-protect issues.

• The Special Assistant to the Director of the CIA for War Crimes and Related Issues chairs the Human Rights and War Crimes Topic under the National Intelligence Priorities Framework (NIPF). The goal of that effort is to focus Intelligence Community resources on "at risk" countries to ensure we provide indications and warning of preparations to commit atrocities.

The Task Force report you forwarded includes an excellent chapter on Early Warning that outlines the critical role played by intelligence in genocide prevention, highlights key challenges with respect to collecting and reporting on genocide risks, and makes a number of important recommendations for improving our intelligence capacity. We take those recommendations very seriously and are planning a number of related initiatives.

- The National Intelligence Council (NIC) will prepare, this year, a coordinated national intelligence product addressing countries at risk of genocide in the next three-to-five years. This product will comprise key findings and warnings and a series of country-focused items (to include key indicators).
- NIO/W will work with training and education officials throughout the national Intelligence Community to develop genocide-related training modules for inclusion in warning and other basic analytic courses.
- The NIC will collaborate with the Global Futures Forum (at INR) to organize a major international conference of government, academic, think tank, NGO, and other experts to explore the development of an early warning network focused on identifying and reporting on emerging risks of instability, humanitarian crises, and atrocities.
- My annual threat testimony to Congress will, in the future, highlight countries at risk of genocide and mass atrocities.

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We look forward to working with the Committee on all of these issues and offer to have members of our staff brief you, other members, or Committee staff on our efforts. When I wrote to you on 1 May 2009 regarding medical intelligence collection and analysis, I indicated our strong agreement with you that global health was an issue requiring greater attention from the Intelligence Community (IC). I would like to take this opportunity to update you on steps the IC has taken on this issue.

The Long-Range Analysis Unit at the National Intelligence Council (NIC) has hired a full-time Director for Global Health Issues. The Director for Global Health Issues will lead the preparation and coordination of strategic trend assessments focused on global health issues and factors that affect stability and U.S. security interests.

The NIC is very close to selecting a highly-qualified Senior Officer to serve as Chief Medical Intelligence Officer. Thank you for your March 12, 2009 letter seeking comment on S. 385, the *Intelligence* Community Audit Act of 2009.

We recognize that this bill seeks to strengthen congressional oversight of the Intelligence Community. In first introducing S.385 in the 109th Congress, Senator Akaka noted that this bill is in keeping with legislation "to ensure more effective oversight of the [Intelligence Community]," 2006 *Cong. Rec.* at \$10463 (Sept. 28, 2006). This is a goal that we share.

As we have discussed, I believe that oversight of the Intelligence Community by the intelligence committees plays a critical role in making sure we are fulfilling our responsibilities with regard to keeping our Nation safe while ensuring privacy and civil liberties protections. This oversight, precisely because it is conducted by the committees through a cadre of knowledgeable and experienced staff, is a valuable contribution to improving the quality of intelligence and the effective, efficient operation of the Intelligence Community. This close and full communication is necessary and beneficial, and I am fully committee to responding to intelligence committees in a timely manner to ensure that the intelligence committees have the information necessary to perform their vital oversight function.

I would note that the Intelligence Community has worked together with GAO on hundreds of their reviews ranging from personnel security clearance reform, to U.S.-Saudi Counter Terrorism and Terrorism Financing, to an examination of the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States. We will continue working cooperatively with GAO on such reviews to improve federal government performance. However, the question presented by S. 385 is whether GAO should conduct intelligence oversight. In your letter, you ask me to look at areas where "there are selected oversight subjects regarding which the [GAO] has expertise and for which assistance could be provided by agreement between the IC and GAO in a manner consistent with national security." With respect to the Intelligence Community, that oversight responsibility lies with the intelligence oversight committees. This leads me to the conclusion that there is no clear necessity or benefit from expanding GAO's scope of authority to the Intelligence Community.

We want to ensure that the underlying goal of S. 385, effective Intelligence Community oversight, is met, but I do not believe that this bill is necessary or appropriate to meet that goal. I find the oversight by the intelligence committees indispensable when it is conducted by the intelligence committees' skilled, professional staffs who have detailed knowledge of intelligence programs, experience with highly sensitive, classified information, and an understanding of intelligence operational concerns. Because highly sensitive, classified information and sources and methods are frequently and indistinguishably intertwined with issues such as knowledge management, information sharing, and strategic planning. I believe the intelligence committees are best able to review such activities within the Intelligence Community. Moreover, I an concerned S. 385 could diminish the ability of the intelligence committees to provide effective oversight. For example, S. 385 would authorize the Comptroller General to carry on selfinitiated work and other work beyond that directed by intelligence committees. Accordingly, I am also concerned that by creating another source of tasking, S. 385 would negatively impact the ability of the Intelligence Community to respond to requests from the intelligence committees in a timely manner, within available resources.

I believe the fundamental question that should be addressed is how the Intelligence Community can better help the intelligence committees strengthen their oversight activities. To that end, any discussion must include both the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence and the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence. As we continue this discussion, it is important to make clear that you have my assurance that the Intelligence Community is fully committed to providing the intelligence oversight committees the information they need to enhance their oversight activities. I welcome the opportunity to discuss with you other ways to enhance such oversight activities. If you ever feel that information you need is not being provided to you, I encourage you to reach out to me directly.

Thank you again for your letter and the opportunity to share my views on S. 385. The Office of Management and Budget has advised us that, from the perspective of the Administration's program, there is no objection to submission of this letter. I look forward to our continued discussion of this very important topic. Thank you for your August 24, 2009 letter expressing your increasing concern with the growing number of anonymous leaks of classified information. I share your concern. Disclosure of classified information, including "teaks" to the media, can compromise sensitive sources and methods; allow our adversaries to learn about, deny, counteract, and deceive our intelligence collection methods; and lead to the loss of critical capabilities, resources, and even lives. Senior intelligence leaders recently received a disturbing briefing on the impact that specific leaks of classified information have had on sources and methods, that I will share at my next meeting with the committee.

As partners in this effort, I will work with you to address this urgent concern. Trecognize that the solution to this problem must be found in the Executive Branch. In addition to the pursuit of a criminal investigation and possible prosecution, all agencies and elements in the Intelligence Community have administrative triols available to deal with employees responsible for unauthorized disclustures, ranging from denial of future access to classified information, to dismissal. Criminal investigation will remain an available option both to deal with egregious cases and because most agency disciplinary actions cannot reach former employees.

Lagree with you that it is imperative that the Intelligence Community and the Department of Justice have the tools to address this problem. Fappreciate your invitation to discuss whether legislation is necessary to ensure that all of those tools are in place. It is important to recognize, too, that legislation can be both part of the solution and part of the problem. We must be careful that legislation not be enacted that could protect individuals who illegally disclose classified information or prevent the Executive Branch from using all appropriate tools at its disposal.

Thank you again for causing this very important issue. I look forward to working jointly with the commuted to address this serious problem.



Dear Adm. Blair:

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Last week, the Obama Administration revealed the existence of a secret underground uranium enrichment facility located near Qom, Iran. According to official press guidance, "The U.S. has been carefully observing and analyzing this facility for several years...We and several other countries have been watching this site very carefully for some time, in particular given Iran's past track record of building clandestine nuclear facilities."

But earlier this year, you wrote in testimony to Congress, INR "[State Department Bureau of Intelligence and Research] shares the Intelligence Community's (IC's) assessment that Iran probably would use military-run covert facilities, rather than declared nuclear sites, to produce HEU [Highly-Enriched Uranium]. Outfitting a covert enrichment infrastructure could take years. The IC has no evidence that Iran has yet made the decision to produce highly-enriched uranium." In addition, a 2007 National Intelligence Estimate (NIE) judged "with high confidence that in fall 2003, Tehran halted its nuclear weapons program" including ending its "uranium enrichment-related work."

We are concerned by the apparent contradiction between the Administration's recent comments, your testimony and the 2007 NIE. Your suggestion that "outfitting a covert enrichment facility could take years" appears to contradict the Administration's assertion that "the U.S. has been carefully observing and analyzing" Iran's secret underground uranium enrichment facility "for several years."

We are left to question whether your testimony's omission of information was intentional or a result of poor coordination with the wider Intelligence Community. Therefore, we request a written explanation of your testimony to Congress and its contradictions regarding Iran's nuclear program.

Lappreciate the opportunity to respond to your concern that the recently-disclosed efforts by Iran to build a uranium enrichment facility near Qom leads you to question my unclassified testimony to Congress earlier this year, and the declassified judgments of the 2007 National Intelligence Estimate entitled "Iran: Nuclear Intentions and Capabilities."

Thank you for your thoughtful responses to our letter of October 29, 2008 requesting consideration of a regular process for reviewing, redacting and publishing key opinions of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court and the Court of Review that rule on important matters of law. We are pleased to find agreement that such a process would benefit public confidence in both the Intelligence Community's use of Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) authorities and the independent judicial review and oversight provided by the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Courts.

We believe that the process that you have proposed will meet the aims of our request regarding future opinions, but we would like to note that our request also envisioned a publication process that would include "both future opinions and those from the past several years." With this in mind, we are interested in how you intend to apply this new review process to decisions of the last several years that contain important rulings of law. We recognize that publishing redacted versions of individual past opinions is only one possibility among many, and that a public report of key interpretations of FISA over a span of years could be an appropriate option as well. In any case, we believe that it is of vital importance to both the present and future discourse and the historical understanding of these issues that the publication process include future opinions and those from recent years as well.

Dear Director Blair:

Following up on my letter of April 20, 2009, I am writing to reiterate my request for a full, complete, and correct list of the dates, locations, and names of all members of Congress who attended briefings with respect to the use of enhanced interrogation techniques by the Central Intelligence Agamoy, which I have not yet received. In addition, I am formally requesting copies of all Memoranda for the Record prepared memorializing the substance and attendees at any and all such briefings.

With respect to the list of Members briefed on Enhanced Interrogation Techniques, while I appreciate the interim response on April 22 I am concerned that the list provided is incomplete and inaccurate. It is less comprehensive and complete than other briefing lists that the CIA has previously provided to the Committee, and it also appears to contain errors. Moreover, since the documents already in the possession of the Committee clearly indicate that careful records were kept with respect to these briefings by the CIA, it is difficult to understand the delay in receiving a full and complete accounting. This information should be disclosed fully, accurately, and immediately, because the public record on this issue cannot be a selective one.

With respect to briefing memoranda, review of such documents already in the possession of the Committee clearly indicates that they provide a record of the attendees at each such briefing, as well as a very precise accounting of the substance of each briefing. I believe that these records will clear up any questions that may exist about precisely what information was provided to Members of Congress on these matters, as well as the degree of bipartisan consensus that existed with respect to the programs in question.

These documents should be provided immediately, and Congress is clearly entitled to records of its own briefings. In any event, however, it is imperative that you immediately gather any such materials in the possession of the Executive Branch and ensure that they are preserved. Serious questions would arise if any such briefing records were destroyed or unavailable for review by the Committee.

Dear Chairman Leahy:

This letter presents the views of the Administration on the Specter-Schumer substitute amendment (HEN09B24) to S. 448, the "Free Flow of Information Act of 2009." This legislation is the result of a series of productive and cooperative discussions with the sponsors and supporters of the legislation. The Administration supports this substitute amendment and urges that no further amendments be adopted to this carefully crafted compromise.

We appreciate the critical role that the media plays in a free and democratic society. This legislation provides robust judicial protection for journalists' confidential sources, while also enabling the Government to take measures necessary to protect national security and enforce our criminal laws.

There are a number of changes from previous versions of this legislation that address concerns that the Administration has expressed.

In criminal investigations and prosecutions where the Government seeks to compel disclosure. Section 2 of S. 448 as introduced provided that a court would engage in an openended analysis weighing the interest in disclosure against the free flow of information. The Specter-Schumer substitute eliminates this open-ended analysis, and replaces it with a more balanced and appropriate process. First, it requires the Attorney General to certify that the request for compelled disclosure was made in a manner consistent with the guidelines in the U.S. Attorney's Manual (USAM). Second, reflecting the fact that the USAM already provides significant protections for the news media from subpoenas that might impair the newsgathering function, the Specter-Schumer substitute provides that when the court balances the interest in compelling disclosure against the interest in the free flow of information, the journalist bears the burden to establish by clear and convincing evidence that disclosure would be contrary to the public interest. (In addition to these two requirements, the substitute amendment retains a number of other elements of Section 2 of S. 448, including the requirements that the Government exhaust all reasonable alternative sources of the protected information, show there are reasonable grounds to believe a crime has occurred, and demonstrate reasonable grounds for believing that the information is essential to the investigation or prosecution.)

Moreover, the Specter-Schumer amendment provides appropriate protection for national security. If disclosure of the information in question would materially assist the Government in preventing, mitigating, or identifying the perpetrator of an act of terrorism or other significant and articulable harm to national security, the Specter-Schumer amendment provides that the balancing test contained in Section 2 of the legislation would not apply and the court would be expected to compel production of the information. The Administration supports the provision in the substitute amendment giving courts the power to determine whether the harm at issue rises to the level of an act of terrorism or other significant and articulable harm to national security, and whether the information sought by the Government would in fact materially assist in preventing, mitigating, or identifying those responsible for such harm, while giving appropriate deference to specific factual submissions by the Government.

This same basic approach would apply in criminal investigations and prosecutions of allegedly unlawful disclosure of properly classified information, where the Government is seeking information to prevent or mitigate an act of terrorism or other significant and articulable harm to national security. If the Government establishes that the information it seeks would materially assist in preventing or mitigating such harm, under the substitute amendment it will face the same conditions and court review as in other national security cases. In other leak cases, the court would have an additional role, employing the balancing test described above for criminal investigations and prosecutions generally.

We also appreciate that the substitute addresses a number of other Administration concerns, including:

- permitting the Government to make its submissions in camera and ex parte where necessary;
- excluding from the bill's coverage authorities granted under the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act;
- eliminating a provision that contemplates judicial review of individual classification decisions; and
- not requiring the Government to establish that the allegedly unlawful disclosure in question was made by someone who had "authorized access to such information."

Finally, the definition of a "covered person" protected by this legislation has been much improved. First, the intent and actions necessary for a person to meet this definition are now clearly specified. Second, the definition now includes several important exclusions so that, for example, someone who is or is reasonably believed to be committing or attempting to commit the crime of terrorism or providing material support to a terrorist organization is not a "covered person." At the same time, this definition does not require a covered person to be a salaried employee of, or independent contractor to, a media organization. Over time, we expect that the courts will be able to distinguish persons entitled to the protections afforded by this statute from those who are not. In conclusion, this legislation is a significant step forward from previous versions. The Administration supports this legislation, and the Office of Management and Budget has advised us that there is no objection to this letter from the perspective of the Administration's program.

Thank you for your October 7, 2009 inquiry about the release of unclassified key judgments from National Intelligence Estimates (NIEs) on Afghanistan and Pakistan. As we discussed in our phone conversation on October 28th, I share your concern for ensuring that the American people have a clear and accurate understanding of our national security challenges around the world, particularly in areas where American lives are on the line. To help keep the American public informed about global issues, I deliver to Congress each year an unclassified version of the Worldwide Threat Assessment, and the National Intelligence Council (NIC) produces unclassified assessments, such as the Global Trends 2025, which are available on the DNI website. However, the public release of NIE key judgments on critical issues presents several serious concerns for our intelligence process, broader national security interests, and U.S. policymaking.

- To foster an atmosphere of open, comprehensive analytic collaboration in the production of NIEs, there should not be any presumption that key judgments will be declassified. There is both a real and perceived danger that analysts will adopt less bold approaches, or otherwise modify the way they characterize developments, and the integrity of the NIE could be harmed.
- The declassification of NIE key judgments runs the risk of compromising sensitive intelligence sources and methods, weakening our ability to answer critical questions in the future. The 2007 fran nuclear NIE stimulated a public debate which resulted in sensitive information leaking into the press.
- Declassification poses problems for maintaining consistent analytic judgments between unclassified and classified versions, potentially creating the appearance that the NIC presents different versions for different audiences.
- Public release of NIE judgments can complicate U.S. diplomacy and damage U.S. interests. The release of the 2007 NIE on Iran made diplomatic efforts at the U.N. more difficult and strained relations with key U.S. allies who questioned the wisdom of sharing information with us.

I have identified tasks from the April 2007 Intelligence Community (IC) Financial Statement Auditability Plan that are unchanged or deferred based on the Business Transformation Office (BTO) business architecture efforts. We did not use the modified category since alternative dates cannot be projected until BTO planning efforts are completed. In addition, I have provided a crosswalk to the milestones previously identified in the quarterly CDA report.

Auditability is a key thread with extensive interdependencies in the business transformation process. The CFO is a partner and contributor to business transformation and the enterprise process management approach, providing the BTO with process documentation, financial management standards, and functional requirements for the business enterprise. The IC will continue to improve financial management and internal controls, to the extent possible, as the BTO implements business transformation. The Office of the Director of National Intelligence, with the IC, will reassess auditability timelines and produce a revised auditability plan no later than four months after the BTO completes its evaluation and develops a roadmap later this year.

We are writing to follow up on letters from Ranking Member Hoekstra on April 20, 2009, and April 24, 2009, a letter from Subcommittee Chairman Thompson on April 29, 2009, and a meeting that your staff held with Committee staff on April 15, 2009 requesting that the Administration provide lists of Members of Congress who were briefed and records of briefings with respect to enhanced interrogation techniques used by the Central Intelligence Agency, as well as information with respect to several substantive oversight questions relating to the release of related memoranda by the Office of Legal Counsel.

We are extremely concerned that the Administration appears unwilling or unable to provide complete and accurate information with respect to the briefings, particularly when detailed but partial records of such briefings have been made available on several occasions in past years, nor has it provided a reasonable explanation for this extended delay in providing basic information. We are also concerned that the Administration appears unwilling or unable to answer even basic oversight questions on the diverse implications that the decision to release the memoranda has had on intelligence community personnel and operations.

As you know, the President is required by law to keep the congressional intelligence committees "fully and currently informed", and to "furnish the congressional intelligence committees any information or material concerning intelligence activities ... which is within their custody or control, and which is requested by either of the congressional intelligence committees in order to carry out its authorized responsibilities," with respect to both general intelligence activities and covert actions (50 U.S.C. §413a(a)(2), 50 U.S.C. §413b(b)(2)). The failure to provide the requested information is in violation of this statutory requirement.

If the Administration intends to fulfill its own rhetoric with respect to the "Rule of Law", we expect the requested information to be provided immediately.

However, my personal review of the Memoranda for the Record has only reinforced my view that those documents provide the best record of briefings that were memorialized with such records.

Given that the underlying programs have now been publicly disclosed by the President and that a general description of each briefing has been declassified, I am requesting that the MFRs be reviewed for declassification and publicly released as soon as possible. While I understand that some information relating to sources and methods or the ongoing Committee and criminal investigations of the destruction of interrogation videotapes may need to be withheld or redacted, my own review suggests that much of this material should be able to be made publicly available quickly.

Once again, thank you for your assistance in this matter.

Thank you for you letter of April 27, 2009 regarding the Senate Armed Services Committee bill, S.454 and for the efforts of your staff to clarify its impact on National Intelligence Program (NIP) majority-funded acquisitions during the floor debate of this legislation.

As we conveyed to your staff, our assessment of the impact this bill is that S.454 does not impact the acquisition programs funded by the NIP.

The details on the two specific issues you asked us to address on terminology and the Memorandum of Agreement are contained below.

- a. With respect to the difference between "major defense acquisition program" in Title 10 and "major system acquisition" in Title 50:
 - As specified in Title 10 U.S.C. 2430 (a) (1) (2), a major defense acquisition program (MDAP) is a program either designated as such by the Secretary of Defense, or that is estimated to require an eventual total expenditure for research, development, test, and evaluation (RDT&E) of more than \$300M (based on fiscal year 1990 constant dollars) or an eventual expenditure for procurement of more than \$1.8 B (based on fiscal year 1990 constant dollars).
 - The 2004 Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act (IRTPA) defines a NIP major system acquisition (MSA) in accordance with Title 41 U.S.C. 403 (9). Specifically, the 403 (9) dollar threshold for major systems executed by DoD elements is \$75M in total RDT&E expenditures (base

75

year 1980 constant dollars) and \$300M in total procurement expenditures (base year 1980 constant dollars).

b. On the impact of S.454 on the March 2008 DNI-SecDef MOA:

• The IRTPA directed joint management by DoD and ODNI of wholly NIP funded acquisition programs executed by DoD IC elements. However, there are a number of jointly-funded acquisitions for which IRTPA was silent. A Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) was signed between the SecDeF and DNI agreeing that programs wholly or majority funded by the NIP executed in defense agencies would be jointly managed.

 The contents of S.454 are specifically applicable to a "major defense acquisition program" (MDAP) within the meaning of Title 10 U.S.C. 2430. Section 2430 (a) defines a MDAP to exclude a Department of Defense (DoD) acquisition program that is a "highly sensitive classified program" as determined by the SecDef.

On March 25, 2008, the Secretary of Defense (SecDef) and DNI entered into a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) entitled "Management of Acquisition Programs Executed at the Department of Defense Intelligence Community Elements." In that MOA, the SECDEF agreed that majority NIP-funded acquisition programs executed by DoD IC elements would be executed according to IC acquisition policy. In operation, fully and majority NIP-funded major system acquisitions (MSAs) executed in accordance with IC acquisitions policies, are treated as "highly sensitive classified programs" and do not follow MDAP requirements.

We have also completed an assessment of any possible interplay between S.454 and the acquisition reform provisions of S.2996 and have found none.

We have reviewed your letter to the Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence in response to the November 2008 report of the Inspector General for the Office of the Director of National Intelligence entitled *Critical Intelligence Community Management Challenges*, and appreciate the actions that you have taken since becoming the Director of National Intelligence to address these issues.

We note that you describe the report as "based on anecdotal and dated information." We hope that this is not an attempt to dismiss the seriousness of the issues raised by the report. The concerns raised about the past DNI's leadership, the challenges addressed in information sharing, and the lack of financial controls in the IC were all based on previous reports from IGs, and echo concerns raised by the Committee itself.

As for the concern on timeliness, we want to assure you that the committee appreciates that the information contained in the November 2008 report does not reflect changes implemented since that time. Then-Inspector General Edward Maguire acknowledged the dated nature of the information in his testimony before our subcommittee, and, where appropriate, provided updated information on the progress of the organization in addressing the issues in the report. Yet many of the concerns raised in the report go to deeper, systemic issues and as such, we believe that they are still relevant challenges for you as the Director.

Thank you for your Dccember 21, 2009 letter concerning the Intelligence Oversight Board (IOB) documents recently released pursuant to a Freedom of Information Act request. Secretary Napolitano will be responding to your four specific questions. I write separately to reaffirm to you my continuing commitment to timely and accurate Congressional notifications.

As I have often repeated. Congressional oversight of the Intelligence Community is eritical and the Intelligence Community takes seriously its statutory obligation to keep the intelligence committees fully and currently informed of intelligence activities. Your letter raises the concern that the documents released pursuant to the FOIA request were the first time you learned of some of the incidents and asked how the Intelligence Community decides whether to notify Congress of intelligence activities that have been reported to the IOB.

The Intelligence Community follows the standard set forth in Title V of the National Security Act when assessing whether to notify Congress of intelligence activities that have been reported to the IOB. Under the Title V standard, the Intelligence Community must keep Congress fully and currently informed of, among other things, any illegal intelligence activity (as well as any corrective action that is or will be taken), significant anticipated intelligence activities, and significant intelligence failures. I have provided guidance to the Intelligence Community on notifying Congress of such activities through Intelligence Community Policy Memorandum 2005-100-3 and other memoranda to the heads of the Intelligence Community elements. In contrast, intelligence activities are reported to the IOB if the activity may be unlawful, contrary to Executive Order, or Presidential Directive. While there is certainly substantial overlap between the two reporting standards, the standard for reporting to the IOB under Executive Order is different than that required for reporting to Congress. Consequently, not everything reported to the IOB is reported to Congress under Title V of the National Security Act. This different IOB standard is designed to encourage early identification of any potential intelligence oversight issues that may exist in a department. Moreover, IOB reports may be made on the basis of incomplete or inaccurate information and do not require substantiation before the matter is reported to the IOB.

Although there are different standards, many activities reported to the IOB are reported to Congress. I want to assure you that reporting matters to the IOB in no way alleviates the Intelligence Community's obligation and commitment to keep Congress fully and currently informed or to forward to the Attorney General information concerning intelligence activities that involve possible violations of Federal criminal laws. Going forward, my office's review of

(U) Congressional Notification: Progress Made in Strengthening Intelligence Community Efforts Against Weapons of Mass Destruction 2006-2008

(U) The National Counterproliferation Center (NCPC) – Office of the DNI's mission manager for countering the spread of weapons of mass destruction – is pleased to transmit the attached booklet highlighting key accomplishments since its founding.

(U) NCPC was founded in late 2005 and chartered by the ODNI to serve as the primary organization within the Intelligence Community for managing, coordinating, and integrating planning, collection, exploitation, analysis, interdiction and other activities relating to weapons of mass destruction, related delivery systems, and related materials and technologies, and intelligence support to United States Government efforts and policies to impede such proliferation.

(U) Since its founding, and through 2008, NCPC's work has been focused in eight areas, as spelled out in the booklet:

- Helping to prevent WMD terrorism;
- Ensuring action and results across the intelligence and counterproliferation communities;
- Looking "over-the-horizon" for WMD threats;
- Working to close gaps in WMD intelligence;
- Implementing counterproliferation strategies;
- Enabling real information sharing;
- · Developing our nation's newest counterproliferation tools; and
- Bringing our best minds together.

(U) In an effort to provide continued visibility into the work of NCPC, starting in June, the Center will transmit a semiannual update to highlight significant actions it has undertaken in that six-month period.

The attached Fiscal Year 2009 Annual Report on Intelligence Community (IC) Pay Modernization is being provided in response to ongoing congressional interest in the National Intelligence Civilian Compensation Program. While the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2010 suspended the Defense Civilian Intelligence Personnel System (DCIPS), and by extension the IC's pay-for-performance initiative, pending an independent review of the DCIPS, much work was accomplished in 2009 on IC pay modernization and the accompanying report highlights those accomplishments.

Congressional Notification: The National Intelligence Plan for Countering Proliferation 2009-2011

(U) We are pleased to provide you with this copy of *The National Intelligence Plan for Countering Proliferation 2009 – 2011*. Since its founding in 2005, the National Counterproliferation Center (NCPC) has worked to integrate, strengthen, and focus the Intelligence Community's efforts to counter the spread of weapons of mass destruction. This Plan – the second such guiding document NCPC has prepared – is the next step in laying out Community-wide counterproliferation goals and priorities.

(U) This Plan was a product of a Community-driven process – we depended on input from across the intelligence and counterproliferation communities to identify issues that required action. This is a blueprint to counter proliferation and not just describe it. For too long, we have done the later at the expense of the former, viewing counterproliferation solely as a technical issue that should remain cloistered within the walls of the science and technology establishment. To move beyond simply describing, we must expand the number of people who view WMD counterproliferation as part of their responsibilities, including offices focused on political, military, and economic issues.

(U) As we move into the implementation phase, we are pleased with the way that the Intelligence Community is responding to the range of challenges we face in countering the proliferation of WMD. From innovative approaches to working on (and succeeding at) WMD interdiction issues, to going after the most important intelligence gaps related to WMD terrorism, and our ongoing collaboration to look "over the horizon" for WMD threats, our Community has advanced all the priorities in NCPC's first Strategic Plan for Countering WMD Proliferation. We are confident that we will make similar progress under the direction of the new Plan.

As you are aware, questions about how the U.S. government should resolve the issue of Guantanamo Bay (GTMO) detainees have been the subject of intense debate in the months since the President announced his intent to close the detention camp in January 2009. This issue will continue to be the subject of debate as Congress considers the Administration's proposals for ultimate disposition of the detainees currently being held there.

To help inform this debate, on March 3, 2009, I submitted questions for the record (attached) following your February 12, 2009 appearance at the annual hearing on national security threats. While most of the Committee's questions from that hearing were answered on April 24, 2009, your office informed the Committee that my questions regarding the GTMO detainees and the Yemeni rehabilitation program would be answered separately by the Office of General Counsel. Yet, more than three months after these questions were originally submitted, I have not received a response.

Recently the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) informed the Committee that it advised against release of 25 of the 60 detainees the Administration has determined are eligible for release.

DIA's admission that it is not objecting to the release of some members of terrorist organizations due to a belief that policy considerations will outweigh intelligence concerns, is highly troubling and highlights the need for the Committee to hear from your office about the judgments of all agencies on this matter. I hope you ensure that my threat hearing questions are answered expeditiously and that those responses will include the analysts' best judgments about the threat posed by GTMO detainees and not judgments tailored to meet perceived political needs. It is critical that Congress have an understanding of the Intelligence Community's unbiased judgment of the potential threat posed by GTMO detainees prior to considering proposals for moving detainees and closing GTMO. Thank you for your urgent attention to this matter.

Thank you for participating in our December 3, 2009, hearing on unauthorized disclosures of classified information. We appreciate your testimony and action plan to better address leaks of classified information through the use of administrative actions.

In furtherance of our oversight efforts, we respectfully request that the following information be provided to the Committee:

- A written notification to the Committee (either from the filing agency, or the Office of the Director of National Intelligence) each time that an Intelligence Community (IC) agency submits a crimes report to the Department of Justice (DOJ) for an unauthorized disclosure of classified information. We expect the written notification to include the date and title of the specific article where classified information was disclosed, as well as the specific information in the article that is classified. Please supplement these notifications with the information provided to the DNI under the reporting guidelines of Intelligence Community Directive (ICD) 701 (f).
- 2) A separate written notification should be sent to the Committee noting the precise reasons that DOJ has declined to initiate an investigation.
- 3) A written notification should also be submitted to the Committee when a leak investigation is closed. The notification should specify why a prosecution is not being sought.

I received the after-the-fact notification from your office this morning regarding the transfer of four Uighur detainees to Bermuda, and have also followed with interest media reports this week that the Administration intends to transfer additional Uighur detainces to Palau, as well as reportedly to make a payment to the Government of Palau of \$200 million, an amount which significantly exceeds the estimated 2008 Gross Domestic Product of that nation.

I am writing to ask for further information and clarification of several matters relating to such resettlements, as well as to again express my concern that these steps are being taken without any consultation with Congress. In fact, the relevant Administration Task Forces have cancelled scheduled briefings with the Committee and refused to brief the Committee.

My questions are as follows:

- 1. Are the reports accurate with respect to the potential transfer of detainees to Palau, and the payment of \$200 million?
- 2. Was any payment made to the Government of Bermuda with respect to the transfer of detainces announced today? If so, what was the amount of the payment?
- 3. For any payment that has been made or is contemplated in connection with the relocation of Uighur or other detainees, please identify the budget account and specific appropriation from which the funds will be drawn. If any National Intelligence Program or Military Intelligence Program funds have been or are contemplated to be used for this purpose, please identify the specific authorization for the funds to be expended for this purpose.
- 4. Will the former detainees receive any direct financial assistance or other resettlement assistance?
- 5. What steps have been taken to ensure that the transferred detainces and any detainces to be transferred in the future will not leave the countries to which they have been transferred?

Will the relevant task forces commit to brief the Committee on their work both now and in advance of any final determinations of these critical national security matters, which in the past were briefed on a consultative and bipartisan basis?

- 4) A written notification should be provided to the Committee each time that administrative sanctions are imposed by the IC against an employee for the unauthorized disclosure of classified information. We expect the notification to detail the information the employee disclosed as well as the sanction that was imposed.
- 5) Further, we request that you provide the Committee with any guidance sent to IC agencies subsequent to ICD 701, including guidance on the obligation of IC agencies to continue administrative investigations following a crimes report to DOJ until such time as DOJ asks the agencies not to continue them.

A copy of this letter will be sent to the Attorney General, as the Department of Justice's full cooperation in our oversight efforts of leaks is expected.

Dear Majority Leader Reid and Speaker Pelosi:

Over the past several months, Congress has been considering the reauthorization of three important provisions of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA), which are scheduled to expire on February 28, 2010: section 206 of the USA PATRIOT Act, which provides authority for roving surveillance of targets who take steps to thwart FISA surveillance; section 215 of the USA PATRIOT Act, which provides authority to compel production of business records and other tangible things with the approval of the FISA court; and section 6001 of the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act, which provides authority to target with FISA surveillance non-United States persons who engage in international terrorist activities but are not necessarily associated with an identified terrorist group. National security requires that these provisions be reauthorized before they expire.

As discussed in the Attorney General's November 9, 2009 letter, we believe that S. 1692, the USA PATRIOT Act Sunset Extension Act, as reported by the Senate Judiciary Committee, strikes the right balance by both reauthorizing these essential national security tools and enhancing statutory protections for civil liberties and privacy in the exercise of these and related authorities. We were very pleased that the bill received bipartisan support in the Committee.

Since the bill was reported, we have negotiated a number of specific changes with the sponsors of the bill which we support including in the final version of this legislation. Among these are several provisions derived from the bills reported by the House Judiciary Committee and introduced by House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence Chairman Silvestre Reyes in November.

We strongly support the prompt consideration of USA PATRIOT Act reauthorization legislation based on S. 1692, together with the changes to which our staffs have informally agreed. However, if Congress is unable to complete work on this measure before these authorities expire, it is imperative that Congress pass a temporary extension of sufficient length to ensure that there is no disruption to the availability of these vital tools in the fight against terrorists. As was previously noted in a September 14 letter from the Department of Justice to Senator Patrick Leahy, the business records authority has been used to support important and highly sensitive intelligence collection operations, of which both Senate and House leadership, as well as Members of the Intelligence and Judiciary Committees and their staffs are aware. We can provide additional information to Members concerning these and related operations in a classified setting.

Finally, we remain committed to working with Congress to examine additional ways to enhance protection for civil liberties and privacy consistent with effective use of these important authorities.

The Office of Management and Budget has advised us that there is no objection to this letter from the perspective of the Administration's program.

Thank you for your 10 June letter and your longstanding support and commitment to increasing diversity in the Intelligence Community (IC). IC senior leaders believe strongly that diversity is a mission-critical imperative, essential to ensuring our Nation's security. We welcome input, ideas, and assistance as we work collaboratively as a community to achieve our shared goal of building and retaining an IC workforce that reflects diversity in its broadest context—cultural backgrounds, ethnicity and ancestry, race, gender, ability, language, generations, and perspective.

Pursuant to P.L. 107-306, Section 324, the Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) provides to Congress an Annual Report on Hiring and Retention of Minority Employees in the IC. Currently we report on the "Big Six" IC components: the Central Intelligence Agency, the Defense Intelligence Agency, the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Security Branch, the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency, the National Security Agency, and the National Reconnaissance Office.

The Office of IC Equal Employment Opportunity and Diversity (IC EEOD), with assistance from the IC EEOD Council (which consists of the Directors of EEOD across the community) will be requesting diversity data and information from all 16 components to include in the annual report that we will provide to the Congress in 2010. In addition, IC EEOD will be requesting similar diversity data and information on the ODNI workforce to include in the report as well. This will be an incremental process for some IC elements that do not currently maintain comprehensive workforce diversity data.

Dear Director Blair,

I write to request that ODNI conduct a review of the national security and intelligence implications of the increased presence of Chinese-manufactured telecommunications equipment in U.S. telecommunications systems. This equipment includes switches and routers that are embedded in all networks, and could potentially be accessed and controlled from China. The existence of such products seems to create the possibility of espionage, allowing China to monitor and interfere with U.S. communications.

Among the largest global telecommunications suppliers today are two Chinese companies - Huawei Technologies Co., Ltd. and ZTE Corporation. Huawei is alleged to have significant ties to the Chinese military and has received billions of dollars in export financing from the Chinese government.

Huawei's operations have raised national security concerns in several contexts. The Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States ("CFIUS") prevented an acquisition by Huawei of U.S. network and software company 3Com. Huawei and private equity company Bain Capital withdrew their offer for 3Com in 2008 after they were unable to reach a mitigation agreement with CFIUS, which planned to oppose the transaction. Governments around the world have also raised security concerns about Huawei's potential for espionage, including in the United Kingdom.

In addition, changes in the telecommunications market are encouraging domestic carriers to outsource their network operations to telecommunications equipment suppliers. So it is possible that U.S. telecommunications will be managed in whole or in part from China if the market is unconstrained.

While Huawei has historically had a low market share in the United States, it has recently taken steps to increase its penetration in the U.S. telecommunications market. The company has made several bids to supply telecommunications equipment at low prices with attractive financing, and it has been making more sales of late. When telecommunications carriers purchase equipment from Huawei, the result is that U.S. communications will travel over switches, routers, and other equipment that was

manufactured and designed in China and may be remotely accessed and programmed from that country.

In light of this situation, I request that ODNI conduct both a classified and an unclassified or Secret assessment and provide a brief on the following issues:

- How does the use of Chinese-origin telecommunication equipment in the United States affect the conduct of U.S. law enforcement and intelligence activities, as well as the use of intelligence against the United States?
- What risks does the use of Chinese-origin telecommunication equipment in the United States pose to the switched telecommunications infrastructure?
- How does the possible outsourcing or offshoring of telecommunications services to Chinese companies affect national security and intelligence activities, and what risks and vulnerabilities does our country face?
- What tools do the intelligence and national security agencies have to address any national security risks arising from the use of Chinese-origin telecommunications equipment or services?
- How have the agencies used those tools to date?

I know you share my concern for our nation's security and hope you will conduct this review with great thoroughness and dispatch. I look forward to the results of your review, and thank you in advance for your cooperation.

(U) Over the past several weeks, we have been providing Congressional Notifications on individual staff and element changes in the Office of the DNI. On May 28, 2009 we notified the Congress of the appointment of Dr. L. Roger Mason as the Associate Director of National Intelligence for Systems and Resource Analyses (ADNI/SRA). The ADNI/SRA will serve as the principal staff assistant and advisor to the DNI for matters pertaining to program analysis, evaluation, and resource allocation. The SRA office is composed of elements and personnel from the Office of the Deputy Director of National Intelligence for Future Capabilities (the Architecture, Engineering and Integration component) and the Program Analysis and Evaluation Office and the Cost Analysis Improvement Group components of the office of the Associate Director of National Intelligence/Chief Financial Officer. David Svetz, formerly of the office of the Deputy Director of National Intelligence for Collection, is Dr. Mason's deputy.

(U) With the realignment of the Architecture, Engineering and Integration function and to provide clarity of responsibilities, the position of the Deputy Director of National Intelligence for Future Capabilities is renamed the Deputy Director of National Intelligence for Acquisition & Technology (DDNI/A&T). The DDNI/A&T will oversee the discovery, development, and application of advanced technologies while ensuring the IC's major acquisitions are effectively accomplished. These staff realignments are resource neutral.

(U) Alden Munson, who has served as the Deputy Director for National Intelligence for Future Capabilities since May 2007, will leave that position on July 10, 2009. Mr. Munson has led the Intelligence Community to a return to acquisition excellence. Among his many accomplishments, he achieved a Memorandum of Agreement with the Secretary of Defense on Milestone Decision Authority and the application of IC acquisition policy for National Intelligence Program acquisitions and, he stood up the Intelligence Advanced Research Projects Activity. Mel Heritage will assume the role of Acting DDNI/A&T.

We are writing to reiterate our request for the installation of two Capital Network (CAPNET) terminals in the House Committee on Foreign Affairs' (HCFA's) recently renovated Secure Compartmented Information Facility (SCIF), and to express concern over the apparent confusion in your office regarding the completion of this installation.

The original site survey of our facility was conducted during a March 6, 2008, meeting with the House Security Office, represented by Mr. William McFarland, representatives from the Office of the Architect of the Capital (AOC) responsible for construction, and the DNI's CAPNET office, represented by Mr. Brian Woolfolk. Construction proceeded with the installation of the proper cables, T-1 lines, and computer outlets installed for two CAPNET terminals. The facility is now awaiting final accreditation which will occur in the next several weeks.

At approximately the same time as our initial 2008 meeting, similar requests were made by the Homeland Security Committee and the Armed Services Committee for CAPNET installations in their SCIFs. Terminals were provided to the Homeland Security Committee last month, and we understand from an email sent by your agency that terminals will be installed soon inside the Armed Services Committee SCIF.

As you know, CAPNET was established to allow appropriately cleared staff in Congress access to information from the intelligence community's classified intranët (Intelink). It also includes a secure email system to assist in communication between the Congress and the intelligence community. Much of the information contained on the system is already received by this Committee on a daily basis in hard copy.

We are deeply disturbed by the explanations your agency has provided to justify its reluctance to proceed with the CAPNET installation. The first is that it is "against the law" for this Committee to have access to CAPNET; and the second, that ODNI "never had the plans" to provide this Committee with access despite conducting a site survey in 2008 and monitoring the project periodically during the construction phase. If ODNI believes there is no legal basis for this Committee to have access to CAPNET, we request a meeting immediately with appropriate counsels from your agency and the White House to explain this position, as we are not aware of any legal prohibition on any congressional committee – especially HCFA – from accessing the information provided by CAPNET. If ODNI never had the plans to provide us this service, we expect ODNI to remedy this situation as quickly as possible to ensure that HFAC has access to CAPNET.

The House Committee on Foreign Affairs is responsible for a wide range of issues relating to U.S. foreign policy and national security, including matters pertaining to the State Department, global political affairs, international terrorism, and export controls on sensitive technologies. In order for the Committee to fulfill its constitutional responsibilities and provide effective oversight, it is imperative that we have appropriate access to relevant information from the intelligence community, including through CAPNET.

We would appreciate your immediate assistance in resolving this serious matter, and look forward to working with you.

Once again, congratulations on your nomination to be the Director of National Intelligence. I read with great interest your response to Senator Feingold's question on the value of GAO to the intelligence community. In particular, you cited GAO's critiques of the Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance road map, as well as their work on Security Clearance reform as two areas where GAO has been useful to you.

I obviously agree with you about the benefit of GAO's work on security clearances. It was that very work that lead me to include language in the Intelligence Authorization Bill to guarantee GAO's access to the intelligence community. Unfortunately, some in the Administration have objected to using GAO to audit intelligence community functions.

As the recent Washington Post series of articles makes clear, the intelligence community is having difficulty evaluating and getting an understanding of the intelligence enterprise, and in particular the number of contractors it has. This is exactly the kind of work in which GAO excels.

I believe that GAO is an important legislative branch oversight tool which provides tremendous benefit and expertise in areas such as human capital management, financial management, and review of strategic plans. Furthermore, I do not believe it is appropriate or Constitutional for the Executive Branch to deny Congress the use of such tool.

I would urge you to voice your support for GAO to the President directly. I hope I can count on you to continue to be an advocate for GAO during your continued government service.

Dear Mr. Clapper:

We are writing to request that your office prepare a report on the risk and vulnerabilities to our defense and intelligence interests and critical infrastructure from the increasing globalization of supply chains and provision of services. This is a matter that was supported by the House of Representatives in its consideration of the Intelligence Authorization earlier this year. However, since action on the Authorization has not yet been completed, we believe that work on this study must begin immediately to ensure that our nation's critical interests are protected.

Attempts – and successful efforts – to infiltrate critical communications infrastructure are increasing on a daily basis. These actions target a wide variety of assets not only to identify and exfiltrate valuable information, but to develop strategies to deter and deny our nation's ability to defend itself and its interests. The actions in question involve not only the Internet but also other informationalized assets. Electronic incursions may be facilitated by the variety of equipment, components, and, indeed, services that we rely on in an increasingly globalized world.

More and more, equipment and component parts manufactured abroad are being integrated into the computer networks, telecommunications, electric grid, financial systems and other critical infrastructure of our nation. The risks posed by our globalized supply chains and services are mounting. It is vital that we assess these risks and evaluate what mitigation steps may be appropriate to ensure that our systems are secure, and our national interests are appropriately protected.

We believe that your office should prepare a National Intelligence Estimate or National Intelligence Assessment on the global supply chain and global provision of services to determine whether such supply chains and such services pose a risk to defense and intelligence systems and critical infrastructure due to components that may be counterfeit, defective or deliberately manipulated by a foreign government or a criminal organization, or services that may be managed, controlled, or manipulated by a foreign government or criminal organization.

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In addition, we believe that your office should conduct a review of the adequacy of the mechanisms to identify and mitigate vulnerabilities in the global supply chain and provision of services that jeopardize our nation's interests. We believe that particular attention should be paid to the threat posed by State-controlled and State-invested enterprises and the extent to which the actions and activities of such enterprises may be controlled, coerced, or influenced by a foreign government.

We look forward to working with you on this matter.

We write to you regarding press reports that the Chinese firm Huawei Technologies (Huawei) is bidding to supply equipment to Sprint Nextel, and that lawyers retained by the company are currently working with the Treasury Department to allow it to operate in the United States. Sprint Nextel supplies important equipment to the U.S. military and law enforcement agencies, and it offers a broad array of devices, systems, software and services to the private sector. We are concerned that Huawei's position as a supplier of Sprint Nextel could create substantial risk for U.S. companies and possibly undermine U.S. national security.

Huawei has a concerning history. The Iraq Survey Group reported that Huawei sold communications technology to Saddam Hussein's regime in possible violation of U.N. sanctions, and it also supplied the Taliban before its fall. Some reports indicate that this communications technology included fiber optic equipment used in Saddam Hussein's air defense network, which routinely fired on U.S. military aircraft.¹

And, according to press releases issued by the Embassy of the People's Republic of China in Iran, "Huawei has gained the trust and alliance of major [Iranian] governmental and private entities within a short period...[M]ilitary industries...are among other clients of this telecom giant."² That Huawei is such a leading presence in Iran, especially with military industries, suggests that under U.S. sanctions on Iran, Huawei should be prohibited from doing business with the U.S. government. Equally troubling is Huawei's reported "takeover of Iran's Telecom Market," and the close relationship this must therefore create with the Islamic

Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC), which, reportedly, owns a controlling stake in the Telecommunications Company of Iran.³ As you know, the IRGC has been sanctioned by the United States government for its role in weapons of mass destruction proliferation. A Chinese company with such a leading role in Iran's economy, and close relationship with the IRGC, should not be able to do business in the U.S.

Huawei has also been accused of several violations of intellectual property rights, most notably in 2003 when Cisco sued the company in a U.S. court for copying its computer codes. In fact, these serial violations appear to have led Motorola to refuse to enter into a deeper business relationship with Huawei.

Most troubling, however, is the firm's reported relationship with China's People's Liberation Army (PLA). The firm's founder and current CEO, Ren Zhengfei, was a member of the PLA. The 2009 Department of Defense Report on the Military Power of the People's Republic of China states that "information technology companies, including Huawei...maintain close ties to the PLA and collaborate on R[esearch] & D[evelopment]." We have been informed that Huawei is the preferred provider of telecommunications products and services to the PLA and Chinese embassies. In addition to the close relationship between Huawei senior leadership and the PLA, press reports also suggest that a number of Huawei employees have direct ties to the PLA.

Given China's well documented focus on developing cyber warfare capabilities, Huawei's ties to the PLA have aroused concern in a number of other nations in which it does business. According to reports, British, French, Australian, and Indian intelligence agencies have either investigated Huawei or expressed concern that its products could facilitate remote hacking and thereby compromise the integrity of the telecommunications networks in their countries.⁴⁵⁶⁷

Huawei also has reportedly received substantial financial assistance from the Chinese government.⁸⁹ In the past, this government assistance has helped it undercut its competitors and could provide the basis for its bid to supply Sprint Nextel. At worst, Huawei's becoming a major supplier of Sprint Nextel could present a case of a company, acting at the direction of and funded by the Chinese military, taking a critical place in the supply chain of the U.S. military, law enforcement, and private sector.

In view of these and other concerns about Huawei's activities and relationship with the Chinese military, we ask for your answers to the following questions:

- What contracts with the Department of Defense (DOD) and the IC does Sprint Nextel have?
- Does Huawei currently supply companies with U.S. government contracts? If so, what are they?
- Have any goods provided to a U.S. government supplier by Huawei ever been found to contain suspect technology, such as intentional defects or "back doors" allowing remote entry?
- Please describe what, if any, a priori security review the General Services Administration conducts on technology (software or hardware) that the United States government purchases from overseas suppliers.
- Have U.S.-based employees of Huawei been granted security clearances by the U.S. government for access to classified information?
- Please describe in detail any export licenses currently in review, or approved in the past five years, between any U.S. firm and Huawei.

In view of the President's pledge this spring to seek ratification of the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT) by the Senate, we request that the Intelligence Community (IC) update its previous National Intelligence Estimate (NIE) on the capability of the United States to monitor this treaty.

We believe this NIE should, at a minimum, include a review of the Intelligence Community's current and future capabilities to monitor compliance by signatory nations with the requirements of the CTBT; an assessment of whether treaty states can evade the CTBT and the ability of the IC to detect such evasions; and an appraisal of what treaty states could achieve when conducting tests designed to evade detection. While the previous analyses may have been comprehensive at the time they were conducted, additional subjects not included in those estimates may require analysis now to ensure a thorough product. To accomplish this, please consider for inclusion in the final estimate all requests for additional analysis made by Members of the Congress.

We ask that this NIE be completed within a year and be shared with the congressional intelligence, armed services, and foreign relations committees. If you or your staff have any questions concerning this request, please have them contact Dafna Hochman, of the Committee staff, at

Dear Director Clapper:

Equal access to information and personnel in the Executive Branch by both the majority and minority parties in Congress is a bedrock principle in our government. Whenever information is restricted to a limited number of members and/or staff due to classification, Committee jurisdiction, or other imperatives, such restrictions are (and should always be) imposed on a bipartisan basis. To favor one political party over another in the provision of information to the Congress is inimical to our national values and threatens the very nature of the collaborative relationship necessary between the Legislative and Executive Branches.

Accordingly, we are most disturbed by the report that the Director of the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), citing your direction to him based on the objections of the Chair of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence (SSCI), cancelled a previously scheduled appointment between one of his employees and the Vice Chairman of the SSCI and prohibited any contact with this employee until approval was granted, or conditions for contact with him were set, by the SSCI Chair. We are further alarmed by the response from DIA that, as a matter of routine, all minority member requests for information from the agency are conveyed to the majority for review.

We do not recognize any authority by majority members of the Congress to control or restrict access to Executive Branch employees or information to minority members of the Congress, particularly in the case of the SSCI where it is stipulated that the Chair and Vice Chair are to have equal access to information. We are unaware of any precedent or justification for such an action, one that we believe strikes at the heart of fair play with the Congress. Accordingly, we request that you immediately rescind your previous direction to the Director of the DIA in this matter and make available his employee to meet with the Vice Chairman,

without restriction. We also ask that you commit to refraining from any action that favors one party of the Congress over another on any matter in the future.

This is an essential matter of principle that strikes at the heart of minority members' relationship with you and the entire Intelligence Community. We request your immediate action.

Thank you for your July 29 letter requesting my professional opinion of the potential impact of the proposed reductions to the Fiscal Year (FY) 2010 budget request for the Cyber Security Data Center.

As background, the Cyber Security Data Center will provide space and power to satisfy near-term requirements that will exceed currently available capacity at the end of FY 2010. Unlike a traditional data center that provides large-scale storage capacity, the Camp Williams facility will host unique National Security Agency (NSA) computing systems. The data center will be constructed in two useful segments, with common infrastructure underlying both segments. The first \$969.5 million (\$169.5 million appropriated in FY 2009 and the \$800 million FY 2010 request) provides:

- Availability of 65 megawatts of in-coming power capacity;
- Common site infrastructure (e.g., facilities for generators, uninterrupted power supplies, and chilling) for both segments; and
- The first segment's data halls that will host equipment using up to 30 megawatts of power.

Acquiring up-front, sufficient site infrastructure capabilities to support both data center segments was determined to be the most cost-effective and lowest risk approach to meet the center's total requirements. It also avoids any potential disruption of mission operations during construction of the second segment. Funding to complete the second useful segment, which will host equipment using up to 35 megawatts of power, is being requested in FY 2011.

The House and Senate Military Construction Subcommittees have proposed a \$300 million and \$100 million reduction, respectively, to the FY 2010 data center request. Due to operational requirements, the data center must be available for occupancy in FY 2011. Under the House's funding level, NSA will not have sufficient funding to complete the data halls and procure sufficient site infrastructure to support both segments. Since schedule is paramount, NSA would have to re-direct infrastructure funds to the data hall. Therefore, the Houseproposed \$300 million reduction precludes procuring both segments' site infrastructure simultaneously and would force the Administration to redesign and acquire the site infrastructure for each segment separately. This redesign would result in a projected \$130 million increase to the overall cost of the data center. While the Senate's funding level will require timing and scheduling adjustments, the original approach can remain intact. If any cut is sustained in 1

conference, the Intelligence Community (IC) would be forced to restore the funds in the FY 2011 budget at the expense of other IC missions at a time when the IC is operating at a very high operational tempo to support military operations, sustain worldwide counterterrorism activities, and defend against increasing cyber attacks.

In the mark-up, the Committees stated their view that only \$500 million is necessary for FY 2010 based on projected FY 2010 expenditures. However, funding for the full contract value needs to be available for obligation before contracts for goods and services are initiated. We acknowledge that this acquisition has goods and services for which we will not receive involces for completed efforts until FY 2011.

As Congress completes deliberations on the FY 2010 military construction budget request, we look forward to your support and engagement with your colleagues to avoid impaired mission and to mitigate cost growth. During my confirmation hearing. Chairman Feinstein asked for my observations and recommendations to improve understanding of foreign cultures in the Intelligence. Community (IC). I understand your concerns and fully agree that the IC needs to make additional progress.

I would like to inform you of soveral specific initiatives that will assist in improving the IC's capability to foster a better understanding of foreign cultures:

• To improve cultural understanding, we will leverage the education and training programs already developed by the Department of Defense and the Military Services, such as the Human Terrain System effort. We have already made contact with the Afghanistan Studies Program at the University of Nebraska (Omaha) to begin sending IC personnel to their orientation course.

• The IC Equal Employment Opportunity and Diversity (EEOD) Office has established an IC Affinity Network Organization that consists of nine IC-wide employee groups, including a group for Middle Eastern and North African-employees. Best-inclass organizations use these groups in a number of productive ways to assist with recruiting, hiring, mentoring, career development and advancement, particular for diverse employees. The Office has sponsored a number of Colloquia to provide these groups with training in leadership, strategic planning, and communications.

• The Chief Human Capital Office (CHCO) and EEOD have developed a joint IC Heritage Strategy to recruit, hire, and retain first- and second-generation Americans. They have also designed a tool that will allow us to capture additional employee data on heritage, cultural background, and language across the IC.

 The CHCO has established an IC Heritage Community Liaison Council to provide input on outreach and recruitment efforts with key heritage communities and address areas of concern. The Council meets twice a year, with the most recent meeting.

in September 2009. Representatives from key organizations within the Arabic, Afghani, Pakistani, Chinese and other communities participated.

• The IC will work to expand attendance at courses such as the Cross-Cultural Communications courses under development at the National Security Agency. Personnelfrom the National Intelligence University Foreign Language Program Office assisted in the development of the pilot course.

As you are aware, learning and understanding a foreign language also greatly assists with understanding a culture. In light of this:

• We are doubling the English Heritage Language Speakers scholarships from 30 scholars a year to 60 by 2011. The EHLS program selects native and heritage speakers who study critical analytical thinking and English language proficiency at Georgetown University. The additional scholars will primarily support analysis of Afghanistan and Pakistan. These graduates are an important source of cultural understanding, diversity and talent for the IC, especially for the Open Source community.

• The Congressionally-supported STARTALK program to provide summer language and cultural training programs for elementary and secondary education students and teachers is very popular. We taught over 5000 students and 1400 teachers last summer. We are working hard to expand this program from the 34 current states to all 50. I expect demand will for these programs will increase.

• We now have nearly three dozen universities as part of our Centers for Academic Excellence program to facilitate national security and language studies. 170 students received scholarships last year. Over 350 have studied abroad since the program started and have brought back with them a much better understanding of the cultures they were exposed to.

• We support the Defense Intelligence Enterprise Civilian Foreign Area Specialist (CIVFAS) effort, which seeks to develop a cadre of intelligence personnel with a deep understanding of the languages and cultures on a variety of countries and areas.

Finally, we will keep the issue you raised, along with the related issue of language capabilities, under regular review by the IC Deputies Executive Committee, which I chair. We greatly appreciate your continuing support for the IC foreign programs, and I look forward to working with you to improve our cultural understanding capability across the IC.

In response to questions raised at an interagency briefing of the Senate Armed Services Committee on March 3, 2010, Chairman Levin asked agency representatives to provide a letter to the Armed Services Committee and the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence describing the role of the Intelligence Community in the review of Guantanamo detainees pursuant to Executive Order 13492. Specifically, the Chairman asked whether the Intelligence Community, including the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), concurred in the decisions to approve the transfer of certain detainees to countries outside the United States.

Executive Order 13492 placed responsibility for the review of Guantanamo detainees with six agencies—the Department of Justice, Department of Defense, Department of State, Department of Homeland Security, Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI), and Joint Chiefs of Staff. The interagency nature of the review was designed to ensure that all relevant viewpoints—including military, intelligence, homeland security, diplomatic, and law enforcement—were fully considered and that information informing the decisions was consolidated from across the government. After carefully considering each case, the six agencies reached unanimous agreement on disposition determinations for all 240 detainees subject to the review.

Consistent with the framework set forth in the Executive Order, the Attorney General, as the coordinator of the review, established the Guantanamo Review Task Force in February 2009.

The Task Force was staffed with career professionals, including intelligence analysts and officers from the CIA, the National Counterterrorism Center (NCTC), DIA, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), DHS, and the Department of Defense's Criminal Investigation Task Force (CITF); federal prosecutors; FBI agents; State Department representatives; senior military officers, military prosecutors; and national security lawyers. Over 100 staff members served on the Task Force over the course of the review, with a maximum of approximately 65 serving at any one time.

Task Force members reviewed relevant information and formulated recommendations for each detainee's disposition based on evaluations of the threat posed by the detainee, the ability of potential receiving countries to mitigate such a threat, the feasibility of prosecuting the detainee, and the legal basis for any continued detention under authority granted by Congress in 2001. Task Force members considered the totality of available information and gave careful consideration to the credibility and reliability of the information. The guiding principle from the Executive Order was to ensure that the disposition of each detainee was consistent with the national security and foreign policy interests of the United States and the interests of justice.

Members of the Task Force representing each of the six agencies drafted, reviewed, and discussed recommendations for transfer or continued detention, while prosecution recommendations were drafted primarily by prosecutors and investigative agents from the Departments of Justice and Defense. Threat assessments of each detainee were developed independent of legal or prosecutorial considerations and were based on all available information. Full and candid discussions were strongly encouraged; indeed, they were the model for the Task Force's deliberations. Task Force recommendations, which contained detailed classified assessments of each detainee, were submitted on a rolling basis to senior-level decision-makers.

Beginning in March 2009, an interagency Review Panel met on a weekly basis to consider the recommendations of the Task Force. The Review Panel was composed of seniorlevel officials from each of the six agencies identified in the Executive Order. Review Panel members were delegated authority from their respective agency heads ("Principals"). Senior officials from the CIA and FBI regularly attended the Review Panel meetings to further inform the decision-making process.

The Review Panel made disposition determinations only by unanimous agreement. Each agency identified in the Executive Order had an equal voice, and no determinations were made over the objection of any of the six agencies. The Review Panel's discussions over the course of more than 40 weekly meetings were highly deliberative. Questions were raised, and concerns were discussed in detail. At times, Panel members requested additional information before further considering the disposition of certain detainees, and these responses were factored into discussions as determinations were reached. The Review Panel achieved consensus and reached unanimous determinations for the large majority of detainees. When Review Panel members did not reach consensus, cases were referred to the Principals. All cases referred to the Principals also ultimately garnered unanimous agreement.

The Intelligence Community was fully represented at all stages of the detainee review process. Approximately 15 career intelligence analysts from the CIA, NCTC, and DIA served

on the Task Force over the course of the review (in addition to intelligence analysts and officers representing DHS, FBI, and CITF). These analysts played a critical role in representing the Intelligence Community and bringing to bear their analytic expertise and judgment. Their assessments of a detainee's threat level were a critical element of the Task Force's evaluations. To the extent an Intelligence Community representative on the Task Force disagreed with a recommendation on a particular detainee, the dissenting view was made known to the Review Panel or the Principals, as appropriate.

At the Review Panel, the Intelligence Community was represented by a senior official from ODNI whose views were informed by the intelligence analysts' work at the Task Force and by senior CIA and FBI officials who participated independently in Review Panel meetings. In all cases, if the Intelligence Community objected to a particular decision, ODNI had the ability to dissent from a Review Panel vote and elevate the decision to Principals.

The DNI, as one of the six officials named in the Executive Order, was responsible for representing the Intelligence Community in this process. (As a component of the Department of Defense as well as the Intelligence Community, DIA also was represented at the Review panel and the Principal level by the Department of Defense and the Joint Chiefs of Staff.) After all of the deliberations described above, the DNI—either personally for cases considered by Principals or by delegation to the ODNI official on the Review Panel—agreed with the other five agencies on disposition determinations for all 240 detainees subject to the review. We attribute the ability to reach unanimous agreement in all 240 cases to the full and candid exchange of information and views at all levels throughout the review process.

Thank you for your letter of 18 March 2010, inquiring about the Intelligence Community's use of text extraction tools provided by the Utah-based company Attensity.

The Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) started investing in Attensity in 2002, but stopped using their products due to labor intensive training requirements. Since CIA's initial investment, Attensity revised their software and developed a more complete and less labor intensive mode of extraction. CIA components thoroughly reviewed the revised technology and determined it had not matured to the point that it could be effectively utilized within existing resource restraints. In fact, the CIA piloted the software in 2008, but identified continued difficulties with Attensity's customer service that could not be resolved. Attensity was recently purchased by another company, and the CIA is evaluating whether their new products will meet their needs.

Thank you for your February 9, 2010 letter soliciting Executive Branch comment on S.2834, the Security Clearance Modernization and Reporting Act of 2009 ("the Act"). Much has changed since Congress passed the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004 (IRTPA), which provided the initial statutory basis to drive timeliness and consistency improvements in the security clearance process across Government. The Office of the DNI (ODNI) appreciates the Committee's continued support of the security clearance reform efforts, including potential use of legislation to support our goals.

The ODNI appreciates the Act's intent, its recognition of the importance of the Performance Accountability Council (PAC); its emphasis on the Information Technology Strategy as a critical component of reform efforts; and the provision of Congressionally-desired metrics comprising broader measures and increased fidelity to collect and report a more accurate overview of reform progress. We are concerned, however, that the Act does not recognize and build on the significant progress made to date, may limit the flexibility and development of the PAC, and requires duplicative reporting.

We note that the significant improvements in timeliness and streamlined policy and process successes gained to date are likely attributable to IRTPA's legislative foundation flexibly executed through a series of Executive Orders that updated, clarified and improved the reform effort over time. We agree that the reporting measures contained in the Act increase insight into performance in particular cases and sectors of the Government, and that these insights would be valuable for all reform stakeholders. The reform effort has been working on additional and expanded performance measures in partnership with the Government Accountability Office (GAO). We provided these measures to the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee in June 2010.

Putting the PAC into statute, however, presents challenges. We recognize that the PAC has an important role and function as a strong, enduring body serving to align the security clearance and suitability functions across the Government. The PAC was established in Executive Order and has, to date, provided an excellent forum for reform effort coordination, security and suitability alignment, and implementation planning and tracking. The PAC's role and activities have evolved as the reform effort has switched from a focus on planning to an emphasis on implementation, and we are concerned that a statutory requirement directing the PAC would constrict its future flexibility and evolution.

The Act calls for a *Strategic Framework for Reform* and we believe the reform effort met this requirement in its February 2010 *Security and Suitability Process Reform Strategic Framework* document (attached). This document presents the reform effort's mission, strategic goals, approach, key deliverables, performance measures, external factors, roles and responsibilities, and long term funding requirements.

The Act's prescriptive requirements for an Information Technology Strategy would, in effect, dictate what that strategy is, and would limit the Administration's ability to alter the strategy response to evolving Administration priorities, organizational structure and technology advancement. Legislating in this area may limit continued quality and technology improvement going forward. We believe that further dialogue is needed to ensure we share a common understanding of congressional intent and a clear articulation of reform activity in this area.

While we support the goals of the Act, we believe that legislation in this area is not necessary. The reform effort is working well and is producing results. We and our reform effort partners in the Office of Personnel Management (OPM), Department of Defense (DoD) and Office of Management and Budget (OMB), welcome the opportunity to meet with your staff to ensure we provide the Committee with the information it needs to appropriately execute its oversight responsibilities and to move reform efforts forward in a direction consistent with Congressional intent.

Thank you for the opportunity to present our views. The Office of Management and Budget has advised us that from the perspective of the Administration's program, there is no objection to the submission of this letter.

As you know, on August 6th Senators Feinstein and Bond urged you to instruct the Intelligence Community to update its previous National Intelligence Estimate on the capability of the United States to monitor the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT). In their letter, our colleagues wrote:

While the previous analyses may have been comprehensive at the time they were conducted, additional subjects not included in those estimates may require analysis now to ensure a thorough product. To accomplish this, please consider for inclusion in the final estimate all requests for additional analysis made by Members of Congress.

We request that the following specific assessments be included in the new NIE to be submitted to Congress by August 2010:

- 1. An assessment of the nature and extent of the nuclear weapons maintenance and modernization activities since 1991 of all foreign countries known to possess such weapons, including assessments of—
 - any nuclear testing activities that may have produced nuclear yield used to maintain or modernize such weapons, or develop new nuclear weapons capabilities; and
 - 2. the challenges associated with monitoring such activities.
- 2. An assessment of the Russian and Chinese interpretations of their obligations with regard to nuclear testing under the CTBT, based on agreements and understandings reached at the time of the treaty negotiations and intelligence gathered concerning nuclear weapons related activities by these two nations since the treaty was opened for signature on September 24, 1996.
- 3. An assessment of the ability of the International Monitoring System (IMS) of the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty Organization (CTBTO) to detect <u>any</u> activity by a signatory to the treaty that is potentially militarily significant (in that such activity could assist a foreign country in maintaining the reliability of its nuclear weapons, modernizing its nuclear weapons, or developing nuclear weapons with new or different military capabilities) and involves the release of any nuclear yield.
- 4. An assessment of the maximum nuclear yields that could be concealed (including through use of known evasive techniques like decoupling and containerization) at the known or suspected test site(s) of Russia, China, India, Pakistan, France, and North Korea, and the likely test site(s) that would be used by Iran.

- 5. An assessment of the level and sufficiency of the cooperation of China and Russia in conducting seismic monitoring near the respective known nuclear test sites of each of those countries.
- 6. An assessment of the types of information a suspected violator of the treaty could conceal by exercising the right to create privileged zones, if an on-site inspection were ordered.
- 7. An assessment of the extent to which China, India, Iran, North Korea, Pakistan, Russia, and Syria utilize techniques similar in concept to the stockpile stewardship tools utilized by the United States, including computer simulation, and of the possibility that such countries will benefit from information derived from the declassification of United States nuclear information during the period from 1989 to 2009.
- 8. A comparison between the capabilities of the IMS and the United States' national technical means to collect and analyze information related to nuclear weapons programs in China, Iran, North Korea, and Russia and compliance with the treaty.
- 9. An assessment of the aging of the IMS and United States' national technical means used to monitor compliance with the Treaty and the impact on collection of necessary information if they are not modernized or replaced.
- 10. An assessment of the number of foreign countries that have developed or sought a nuclear weapons capability since 1991 and an analysis of the reasons that those countries did so.

This letter is in response to your September 16, 2010 letter to me regarding the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) employee, detailed to the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence (SSCI) for a one year assignment supporting an SSCI study.

I agree wholeheartedly that the Intelligence Community must always operate on a bipartisan basis and never favor one political party over another in the provision of information to the Congress. That is the ethos of the Intelligence Community.

The DIA employee was detailed to the SSCI, at SSCI request, to support SSCI work and as such, the individual was working and operating as an SSCI staffer for the one-year assignment, not as an Intelligence Community officer. Any discussion SSCI Members would like to have with him about his committee work is a committee issue, not an Intelligence Community issue. If Vice Chairman Bond or any other SSCI member would like to talk with the DIA analyst about things other than his committee work, then we will certainly consider that request as we would all such requests. However, we understand that Vice Chairman Bond wants to talk with him in his role as a committee staffer, and as such, that is a matter for the committee to address.

If Intelligence Community officers, detailed to support Congressional requirements, are put in the middle of committee disagreements, we may not be able to support such requests in the future. I respect and require Congressional oversight of intelligence and I assure you that the Intelligence Community will always operate on a bipartisan basis.

Thank you for your letter of July 30, 2010 to Acting Director Gompert requesting unredacted Guantanamo Review Task Force Recommendation Worksheets on Mohammed Mustafa Sohail Bahazada (ISN 1008), Mohammed Hasan al-Odaini (ISN 681) and on other detainees currently held at Guantanamo. You have also requested any documents evidencing dissent or disagreement with the decision to release or transfer any detainee who has been released or transferred since the formation of the Guantanamo Review Task Force.

We are providing to the Committee the interagency Guantanamo Review Task Force threat analyses consistent with Section 3011(a) of PL 111-212, the Supplemental Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2010. We also are including additional information on the detainees such as biographical assessments and potential destination country evaluations. The material redacted from the Worksheets consists of deliberative process materials relating to the possible prosecution of the detainees and their *habeas* proceedings, sensitive sources, diplomatic exchanges, interagency Task Force recommendations as well as names of federal government employees. Redactions of the material were made to protect the confidentiality of deliberations and to ensure that decision makers, including Executive Branch Principals, have the unvarnished recommendations of those who participate in the detainee review process.

I appreciate your interest in the disposition of detainees at Guantanamo Bay and look forward to working with you over the coming months.

I am writing to express my concern about the military and political power of the Lebanese terrorist group Hezbollah.

As you know, Hezbollah receives substantial funding from the Government of Iran. After its July 2006 confrontation with Israel, Hezbollah has by some accounts been rapidly rearming, possibly to its pre-2006 level. The July explosion of an alleged arms dump in south Lebanon is a further indication arms may be flowing into the area.

This has occurred despite the presence in southern Lebanon of an enhanced force of UN peacekeepers. On August 27th, 2009, the United Nations Security Council extended the mandate of the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL), despite serious concerns – from both Israel and NATO members – that its presence has not prevented such rearmament. This should be cause for grave concern to the United States, and also cause for action.

Certain financial restrictions on Hezbollah are already in place. Hezbollah is listed as a Foreign Terrorist Organization by the State Department and designated under E.O. 13224, among other sanctions. However, Hezbollah is not recognized as a terrorist organization by the European Union, many individual European countries, and most of the rest of the world. And though it receives substantial funding from Iran, Hezbollah also raises money openly in those countries where it is legal. If the US is to reduce the military capacity of Hezbollah, it must start with the group's economic base.

I thus request that you provide me with your assessment of:

- A breakdown, country-by-country (excluding Iran), from which Hezbollah draws the majority of its financial support, and (if necessary to indicate a trend) data from the past five years.
- The 10 non-Iranian entities which enter into the estimated highest-value financial or business relationships with Hezbollah, in those countries where the group is legal.

(U) On September 17, 2009 we notified you of the selection of Mr. Robert Bryant as the new National Counterintelligence Director. As a core intelligence mission, the DNI has also designated Mr. Bryant as the Director of National Counterintelligence (DNCI), thus integrating the DNCI more fully into the intelligence process. He will oversee and integrate a consistent, comprehensive, and collaborative effort across the federal government, employing both offensive and defensive CI measures to protect U.S. interests against foreign entities, violent extremists, cyber intruders, and criminal organizations. The DNCI will lead the CI community, serving both the policymaker and the operator, detecting insider threats, penetrating foreign services, integrating CI with cyber, and assuring the national security community's supply chain from foreign exploitation.

(U) One of the most significant counterintelligence challenges is cybersecurity. As such, the DNI has created the position of Associate Deputy Director of National Counterintelligence for Cyber. The ODNI will notify the Committees promptly once this position is filled.

There are two significant changes from S. 3611 passed by the Senate on August 5, 2010 relating to the Government Accountability Office (GAO) and congressional notification. Earlier provisions on these issues were subject to a veto threat. However, based on our interpretation of the changes, which I have outlined below, the President's senior advisors would recommend that he sign this bill if it is presented for his signature.

The proposed Senate amendment includes a new provision that would require the Director of National Intelligence to issue a directive, in consultation with the Comptroller General, governing access of the Comptroller General to information in the possession of an Intelligence Community element. Nothing in this provision changes the underlying law with respect to GAO access to intelligence information. We interpret this provision to provide the DNI with wide latitude when developing the directive to ensure that it conforms with (1) the statutory provisions governing GAO's jurisdiction and access to information; (2) the intelligence oversight structure embodied in the National Security Act; and (3) relevant opinions of the Office of Legal Counsel of the Department of Justice.

The second significant change relates to the provision that alters the current congressional notification framework. It is important to note at the outset that the Administration has already indicated that, with respect to the requirement to provide "the legal authority under which [an] intelligence activity is being or was conducted," we construe that requirement only to require that the Executive Branch provide the committee with an explanation of the legal basis for the activity; it would not require disclosure of any privileged information or disclosure of information in any particular form.

Over the past 24 hours, I have been made aware of information from the intelligence community that suggests the possibility that serious issues exist with respect to the performance of U.S. intelligence agencies in connection with what appears to have been a terrorism-related attack at Fort Hood, Texas by Nidal Malik Hasan. I am disappointed that the Administration has not been more transparent with the American people.

Given the potential seriousness of these issues, I am troubled that the intelligence community has not been more immediately forthcoming with the congressional oversight committees and has refused to provide specific information I have requested to review in connection with the matter. It is imperative that all documents and materials connected with this matter be preserved in order to ensure a full and complete review and accounting of issues relating to the performance of the intelligence community in connection with this matter.

Accordingly, I am requesting that you immediately issue a preservation order to all personnel in your agencies with respect to all documents and materials related to the Fort Hood incident and any related investigations or intelligence collection activities, including other potentially related threats. The record must be clear and complete with respect to these matters, which I am beginning to fear will require significant and serious oversight activity by the Committee.

Thank you for your September 4, 2009 letter regarding the Intelligence Community (IC) update to the National Intelligence Estimate on the capability of the IC to monitor the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT). As we noted in our September 3 response to Chairman Feinstein and Vice Chairman Bond's initial letter requesting the NIE update, we are moving ahead on updating the NIE, with the intention of completing this effort within a year.

The NIE will address such topics as: the IC's current and future capabilities to monitor compliance by signatory nations with the requirements of the CTBT; an assessment of whether treaty states can evade the CTBT and the ability of the IC to detect such evasions; and an appraisal of what treaty states could achieve when conducting tests designed to evade detection. In addition, my staff has engaged with Mr. Morrison of Senator Kyl's staff to identify those topical areas in your request that we have the ability to address in the NIE.

Pursuant to its authority under Rule XXV(k)(1) of the Standing Rules of the Senate, Section 101 of S. Res 445 (108th Congress), and Section 12 of S. Res. 73 (111th Congress), the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs has initiated an investigation into the events surrounding the November 5, 2009 shootings at Fort Hood, Texas.

The Committee is concerned that there appear to have been significant warnings of Major Nidal Malik Hasan's growing extremist views and suitability for military service that may have been missed, including because they were not adequately shared across agency lines. As you know, this Committee has long been concerned about the information stovepipes within the United States Government that were revealed by the attacks of September 11, 2001, and has worked since then to break them down. The reports now surfacing in the media suggest that many of these stovepipes remain, and in fact may have prevented some officials from learning about Major Hasan's contacts with known terrorists. We are aware that there is an ongoing criminal investigation and want to assure you that we do not intend to interfere with or replicate that investigation. However, we intend to investigate, and to provide answers to, the many questions the American people are currently asking about how the U.S. government may have once again failed to "connect the dots."

We intend to investigate, among other issues, Major Hasan's espousal of extremist ideology, the Army's awareness of and handling of his situation, what information the Intelligence Community gathered about his contacts with known terrorists and other extremists. and whether and how this information was shared across the federal government. We will be requesting documents addressing all these issues, and intend to interview officials including Major Hasan's commanding officers, individuals with whom he served, and others who may have investigated or considered his contacts with extremists or his fitness for duty.

Please have your staff contact our staff as soon as possible to discuss our requests in more detail and to develop a production schedule. Committee staff will be available at the Committee Offices, 340 Dirksen Senate Office Building, on Monday, November 16th and Tuesday. November 17th at the time of your choosing. Please have your staff give us a specific time on one of those days, and in order to facilitate our discussions, please ensure there are officials at this meeting who can discuss generally the status and parameters of ongoing investigations. If you or your staff has any questions concerning this request, please contact us, or have your staff

The Senate Select Committee on Intelligence will conduct a closed hearing on unauthorized disclosures of classified information on Thursday, December 3, 2009, at 2:30 p.m. in room S-407, in the Capitol.

We request that you appear as a witness at the hearing and provide testimony on the following issues and areas, where appropriate: the reasons behind the limited number of administrative actions taken against Intelligence Community (IC) employees who have leaked classified information in the past five years; the specific problems preventing the Department of Justice (DOJ) from successfully prosecuting current and former IC employees, contractors, or other government officials who leak classified information; and the effects of DOJ's inability to share its findings from criminal investigations with the affected IC agency.

Your testimony should also focus on the future, including: how the IC will implement and pursue administrative actions in a more timely fashion; how DOJ can share its investigative efforts from criminal investigations with the IC agency affected by the leak; and, how the IC can augment the use of preventative measures to halt the increasing number of leaks of classified information.

The Committee is also interested in your assessment of the effectiveness, or lack of effectiveness, of current criminal, administrative, and civil remedies which are applicable to instances of unauthorized disclosure of classified information. We also request that you address the damage to national security caused by leaks.

We request that you present an opening statement on these matters in no more than 10 minutes at the hearing. Finally, we request that you submit a copy of your written testimony no later than Tuesday, December 1, 2009, at 2:30pm.

Dear Director Blair and Secretary Clapper:

As a follow-up to my letter of a few days ago to Undersecretary Clapper, I remain extremely disappointed that I have been unable to receive an updated briefing on the tragic attack which occurred at Fort Hood, Texas on November 5, 2009. During the initial briefing given to this Committee on November 19, 2009, witnesses repeatedly stated that they were unable to address some Member questions because they were still collecting all available information in an effort to provide a comprehensive report on the attack to the President. That report has since been given to the President, but Members of this Committee continue to wait indefinitely for answers from this Administration on certain national security aspects of the attack.

I realize that both of you take direction from the National Security Council as to when and what you should brief to me, but the information I have requested is well within the jurisdiction and responsibility of this Committee. I remind you that in the House of Representatives this Committee has exclusive jurisdiction for the oversight of intelligence sources and methods.

This Administration seems to have forgotten that it is a requirement, not an option, to keep Congress fully and currently informed. Given what we already know about the attack, we need to prevent its reoccurrence. We cannot waste more time. We must immediately begin a healthy dialogue between the Executive and Legislative Branches in order to investigate the intelligence-related matters surrounding the attack.

As you know, pursuant to its authority under Rule XXV(k)(1) of the Standing Rules of the Senate, Section 101 of S. Res. 445 (108^{th} Congress), and Section 12 of S. Res. 73 (111^{th} Congress), the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs has initiated an investigation into the events surrounding the November 5, 2009, shootings at Fort Hood, TX. To aid this investigation, we request that the Intelligence Community (IC) provide the Committee with the following documents and witnesses.

I. Documents

Please provide copies of all documents listed below held by any entity of the IC, whether or not they were produced by such entity of the IC. The terms "documents" and "communications" below include all forms of documentation including but not limited to files, reports, analyses, memoranda, notes, and presentations and cover all media, including e-mails. If a document is held by multiple IC entities, please provide a copy from each entity that held the document. Discrete marking on a document shall render that version a different document subject to production. Please organize documents to identify clearly from which entity a document was produced.

- 1. All reports, communications, or other materials pertaining to or referencing Major Nidal Malik Hasan created by, received by, or in the possession of the National Counterterrorism Center (NCTC), the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), or other IC elements prior to November 5, 2009, and any records related to further analysis or dissemination of such information.
- 2. All intelligence reports and assessments pertaining to or referencing Anwar al-Aulaqi (or al-Aulaqy, al-Awlaki, al-Alwaky, hereinafter "al-Aulaqi") created by, received by, or in the possession of NCTC, CIA, or other IC elements prior to November 5, 2009.
- 3. All intelligence reports and assessments created by, received by, or in the possession of any IC element pertaining to any person who has a record or is

otherwise identified in the Terrorist Identities Datamart Environment (TIDE) database (or any other IC database of known or suspected terrorists) with whom the U.S. Government now knows Major Hasan communicated prior to November 5, 2009.

- 4. All IC policies and operational procedures pertaining to intelligence and information-sharing with respect to (a) sharing of information derived from collection pursuant to the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act, (b) use of originator control (ORCON) markings, (c) restrictions or limitations on information-sharing with respect to U.S. persons, and (d) information-sharing policies and procedures with respect to counterintelligence risks pertaining to U.S. military and civilian government employees. Please also provide all policies and procedures in effect since January 1, 2007.
- 5. All current IC policies, directives and operational procedures with respect to counterintelligence risks pertaining to U.S. military and civilian government employees. Please also provide all policies and procedures in effect since January 1, 2007.
- 6. All counterintelligence reports or assessments created by, received by, or in the possession of any IC element since January 1, 1990, that address threats and risks related to U.S. military personnel becoming radicalized to espouse Islamist extremism or affiliating or communicating with known or suspected foreign extremists or known or suspected terrorists, including the desire of Islamist extremists to target U.S. military personnel for radicalization.
- 7. To the extent not covered above, all material provided to the Director of the NCTC pursuant to your order on November 13, 2009, to the heads of all IC elements, ordering them to preserve and maintain any information related to Major Hasan in their possession and to provide this information to the Director of the NCTC (including providing information on how such information was held, handled, disseminated, accessed, and shared).

II. Witnesses

- 1. Please provide immediate access to all IC personnel who:
 - a. Read or accessed information prior to November 5, 2009, indicating that Major Hasan had communicated with al-Aulaqi or any individual with known or suspected connections to terrorist organizations or who has espoused extremist ideology, or
 - b. Had knowledge of Major Hasan prior to November 5, 2009

We ask that you produce such documents and witnesses on a rolling basis beginning immediately and concluding by December 23, 2009. Please provide the documents in electronic format. We look forward to discussing this request with your Office of General Counsel and other relevant IC entities in order to determine appropriate

procedures for production of witnesses and documents, including to ensure that such production does not interfere with the ongoing criminal prosecution of Major Hasan. Earlier this year, we exchanged correspondence about the Genocide Prevention Task Force Report and Intelligence Community work on genocide early warning, analysis, and reporting. Due to your keen interest in this important issue, I invite you to address a conference on this topic scheduled to take place 17-19 March 2010. Your specific speaking time slot can be adjusted to accommodate your schedule.

The conference is one of the initiatives of the Genocide Prevention Task Force and is hosted by the Vanderbilt University Law School in Nashville, Tennessee. The National Intelligence Council; CIA, Directorate of Intelligence; and State Department, Bureau of Intelligence and Research are co-sponsoring the conference. We expect experts from government, academia, and private industry to attend in order to explore the development of an early warning network that will identify and report on emerging risks of instability, humanitarian crises, and atrocities.

Thank you for your November 12, 2009 letter regarding your concerns with the transfer of some Guantanamo Bay detainees to Yemen. The decision to transfer or release an individual detainee is a complex process in which numerous factors are considered, including appropriate security assurances and whether the detainee's release has been ordered by the court.

Pursuant to Executive Order 13492, the interagency Guantanamo Review Task Force is reviewing the status of each individual currently detained at Guantanamo in order to determine, on a case-by-case basis, whether it is possible to transfer or release the individuals consistent with the national security and foreign policy interests of the United States. The work of this task force, directed by the President and led by the Attorney General, is ongoing.

Shortly after this determination, your agencies briefed members of my staff as to the reasons for the cancellation and potential next steps. Generally, your staff indicated the cancellation was not a result of lack of funds, but rather a change in mission requirements at Keystone.

Due to the importance of the Keystone Project to our national security, if this project/concept is revived in some form in the future, I strongly urge the location of the Keystone facility be in my congressional district in north Aurora. Many organizations and businesses in the area already commenced plans to assist Keystone in its operations. For the resources and efforts undertaken by these groups, the proximity of the Keystone project to the Aurora area is of the utmost importance.

Lastly, the company contracted to design and build the former endeavor of Keystone. The Peterson Companies, were in the process of developing the plans for Keystone when the contract was terminated. Turge you to ensure this company is compensated for any services rendered to date on the Keystone Project.

Thank you for your response to our letter of September 23rd asking that you review the results of the 1999-2000 Hazard Support System pilot and evaluate current options for restoring that capability to warn of forest fires.

I'm pleased that the review so far shows a potential to leverage current technical collection capabilities to provide warning to the firefighting community. I've asked our staff to review the information you provided, and to follow up as needed with your staff to understand the plan you lay out.

We regret that it's taken so long to get this far, and that you do not expect to have the information needed for budget and operation decisions until April 1, 2010. We urge you to press ahond expeditiously with the process of developing options. The hazard of forest fires more than warrants sustained attention to ensuring effective warning, and we have to ensure that IC capacities to collect against foreign targets are protected.

Thank you for your October 28, 2009 letter regarding Mercyhurst College's Intelligence Studies Program and that institution's interest in the Intelligence Community's Centers of Academic Excellence (CAE) Program.

The CAE Program is intended to provide "seed" funding, in the form of grants, to those academic institutions that demonstrate an interest in and have the potential for developing courses of study that will produce a diverse pool of graduates with the skills to meet projected Intelligence Community (IC) hiring needs in core mission areas. These grants may be from one to five years in duration, after which grantees are expected to sustain intelligence related courses and curricula. The selection as an Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) IC CAE academic institution is not intended to be an honorary designation.

CAE institutions are selected through an open competitive process, generally on an annual basis, and all accredited colleges and universities are eligible to apply. Proposals are assessed by technical evaluation teams comprised of senior IC managers. The assessments are then sent to an IC selection panel for final deliberations and selection.

Mcreyhurst College was one of 41 academic institutions that submitted proposals to the ODNI in FY 2009; seven of those institutions were selected to be part of the CAE Program for the 2009/2010 academic year. As a matter of standard practice, the selection panel provided specific, confidential feedback to all applicant institutions, including Mcreyhurst College and that information may assist Mcreyhurst in any future grant competitions.

Dear Director Blair and Secretary Napolitano:

Documents recently released pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act underscore the need to better define the mission and authorities of the Department of Homeland Security's Office of Intelligence & Analysis (I&A). According to those documents, the following incidents occurred:

- An I&A representative prepared a threat assessment on local demonstrations by Wisconsin pro-choice and anti-abortion groups who posed no threat to homeland security, and sent it to the local police department.
- An I&A representative produced and disseminated a report about a conference at a mosque in Georgia even though there was no evidence that the conference or its speakers promoted radical extremism or terrorist activity, and the activities were protected by the First Amendment.
- An I&A representative produced, and sent to hundreds of federal officials, a report about the Nation of Islam. The report later was ordered to be destroyed because assessment of the group continued for more than 180 days without evidence that the information was necessary to I&A's responsibilities.
- I&A produced and widely disseminated to local, state and federal authorities a report "focused on the role of a known U.S. Muslim leader in countering violent Islamic extremism" without minimization of U.S. person information.

There is no question that DHS has an important homeland security mission and that our nation faces ongoing threats from terrorist groups. But that is exactly why it is inappropriate to focus time and energy reporting on lawful, First Amendment-protected activities; indeed, such abuses serve only as a distraction from the real threats we face. I appreciate that in each of these examples discussed in the FOIA-released documents, the problem was identified and remedied. But these instances suggest that there is nonetheless a pattern of problems that needs to be addressed in a more comprehensive way. Indeed, the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence said the following earlier this year in the committee report on the FY2010 intelligence authorization bill: "The committee has raised a number of concerns with reports issued by the Department of Homeland Security OIA [Office of Intelligence and Analysis] that inappropriately analyzed the legitimate activities of U.S. persons. These reports raised fundamental questions about the mission of the OIA, and often used certain questionable open source information as a basis of their conclusions."

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As I indicated during the confirmation hearing on the nomination of Caryn Wagner to be the Under Secretary of Homeland Security for Intelligence and Analysis, I am concerned that the authorities of I&A with regard to collecting and disseminating information about U.S. persons, and in particular the use of "open source" information and the obligation to coordinate with the FBI, are not adequately defined.

Please respond to the following questions:

- Why is I&A still operating under "Interim Intelligence Oversight Procedures" that were issued in April 2008 by the former head of I&A? Executive Order 12333 requires each element of the Intelligence Community, in consultation with the Director of National Intelligence, to establish procedures concerning the collection, retention and dissemination of U.S. person information that are approved by the Attorney General. What is the status of those procedures for I&A?
- What is DHS doing to address the pattern of inappropriate analysis and dissemination of information on U.S. persons engaging in First Amendment protected activities?
- How do the responsibilities of I&A with regard to domestic threats overlap with those of the FBI, and how does I&A coordinate with the FBI?
- These FOIA-released documents are the first that I have learned of some of these incidents, despite my role as a member of the Senate Intelligence and Judiciary Committees. How do you decide whether to notify Congress of violations that have been reported to the Intelligence Oversight Board?

The Committee is in receipt of your January 12, 2010, letter regarding your recent action returning the Community's Business Transformation Office (BTO) to a position subordinate to the DNI Chief Information-Technology Officer (CIO), and returning all financial management efforts to the Financial Management Office under the Chief Financial Officer (CFO), a structure that was originally requested with the fiscal year 2010 budget submission. The Committee considered this requested construct, yet determined that the BTO's authority, functions, and funding must be elevated above the CIO for the strength and benefit of an effective Intelligence Community-wide business transformation effort. The funds for the BTO were appropriated under the DNI project account to ensure this critical four-year effort received either your personal attention, or the attention of the Principal Deputy Director or the Director of the Intelligence Staff. This step follows best organizational management practices seen throughout both the government and the private sector and mirrors past successful financial improvement efforts. It also ensures objective decision making when the director of the BTO is faced with a disagreement between stakeholders like the CIO, the CFO, the Chief Human Capital Officer and other deputy directors.

The law is clear. I expect the BTO's authority, functions and funding to be separated from the CIO and CFO.

As you know, the White House review of the December 25, 2009 attempted terrorist attack made several key findings to facilitate immediate corrective action. Among the findings:

Information Technology within the CT community did not sufficiently enable the correlation of data that would have enabled analysts to highlight the relevant threat information.¹

After receiving these conclusions, President Obama mandated corrective actions. A common thread among his directives was the acceleration and focus on "technology enhancements," including:

To the Department of State: ... Determine how technology enhancements can facilitate and strengthen visa-related business processes.

To the Director of National Intelligence: Accelerate information technology enhancements, to include knowledge discovery, database integration, cross-database searches, and the ability to correlate biographic information with terrorism-related intelligence.

To the National Counterterrorism Center: Establish a dedicated capability responsible for enhancing record information on possible terrorists in the Terrorist Identities Datamart Environment for watch listing purposes.²

Given these directives, I would like to bring to your attention the technology offered by a constituent company in my district, 21st Century Technologies ("21CT"). 21CT is an Austin-based software company that has been serving the DoD and intelligence community for 12 years. It develops and sells an advanced analytics platform called, "Lynxeon," which "connects the dots" in vast, complex and

disparate data stores. Lynxeon is currently in evaluation use at NCTC and JIEDDO, with successful results. Additionally, the 24th Air Force at Lackland Air Force base in San Antonio, Texas, is using Lynxeon successfully as part of its mission to prevent cyber network attacks.

Consistent with the President's guidance, the evaluation and use of tools such as Lynxeon must be accelerated in order to prevent another Christmas day attack. We know that no single tool will solve all intelligence problems, just as no single agency can. Therefore, it is our duty to ensure we are considering all available tools and moving them quickly into operational use. The right tools, combined with the right people, can prevent another attack.

I ask you to consider Lynxeon as one of the tools in your counter-terrorism arsenal and to evaluate the technology expeditiously.

I am also enclosing information that describes the product and its applications, and Lencourage you or someone from your staff to meet 21CT's CEO, Irene Williams (b)(6) pr further details.


Dear Director Blair

I wanted to share the enclosed letter that I sent to General Jones earlier today regarding the High-Value Detainee Interrogation Group (HIG).

Yesterday, I met with the top interagency leadership of the HIG. I am concerned that the administration is not moving quickly enough to establish this important group. I urge you to accelerate these efforts in order to have the HIG operational as soon as possible.

As part of this effort, I believe that the HIG should be given a permanent facility at the National Counterterrorism Center within 30 days. In a letter I received earlier today from Deputy National Security Adviser John Brennan, the administration has taken rightly great pride in its efforts to halt "stove-piping" of classified information with regard to the Guantanamo detainees. I would hope that this same effort would extend to strengthening terrorist interrogation by placing the HIG in the NCTC within the month.

you know, I have been concerned about terrorist attacks against the U.S. for many years. I authored language that created the bipartisan National Commission on Terrorism, also known as the Bremer Commission -- which released its final report in 2000, tellingly featuring the World Trade Center "Twin Towers" on its cover. The report was ignored by administration and congressional leaders -- both Republican and Democrat -- until after the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001.

On matters of national security, such as counterterrorism, I have always sought to work in a nonpolitical and bipartisan manner. The security of country is too important to be subject to partisan rancor or "point scoring." That is why I have been deeply disturbed by the lack of consultation and outreach to congressional Republicans with regard to the transfer of detainees from Guantanamo Bay over the past year. The limited congressional notification, which was only enacted after I drafted an amendment to appropriations legislation, does not adequately provide for congressional response or concerns.

As you have read in previous letters, I have been deeply concerned about the transfer of several detainees from Guantanamo Bay to Yemen, Afghanistan, and Somaliland that occurred in late December. Of particular concern is Ayman Batarfi who had a personal relationship with Osama bin Laden and trained with the head of al Qaeda's anthrax program in Afghanistan in 2001. Last month, I raised these concerns in a January 12 letter to Deputy National Security Adviser John Brennan and during a subsequent briefing on January 13. In my January 12 letter, I write that "Ayman Batarfi, one of the Yemeni detainees released by this administration on December 19, 2009, has worked closely with Osama bin Laden in Afghanistan and trained with a microbiologist who taught al Qaeda how to produce anthrax." My information was based on five unique unclassified Department of Defense (DOD) memos produced between October 2005 and December 2007. These memos represent the bulk of publicly available information about Batarfi's terrorist activities and connections to al Qaeda.

Despite these five DOD memos, Mr. Brennan challenged my concerns in a February 1 letter to Speaker Nancy Pelosi that was leaked to ABC News. Without providing additional information to counter the information contained in these five DOD documents or my letter of

January 12, Mr. Brennan asserted that "there is no basis for the assertions Representative Wolf made." I was first made aware of Mr. Brennan's response upon the release of the ABC News report the following morning -- only receiving a personal letter to the same effect from Mr. Brennan later that morning. Clearly, this letter was leaked to the press by Mr. Brennan or White House political operatives. This was an unprofessional, partisan action that is unbefitting of the president's top counterterrorism adviser.

Despite Mr. Brennan's unsubstantiated response, I maintain that based on the information that I have reviewed, Batarfi is a dangerous terrorist who may seek to re-join al Qaeda in the Arabian Peninsula (AQAP). Additional information summarizing my concerns can be found in the enclosed report by The Weekly Standard's Thomas Joscelyn. The article succinctly summarizes the troubling connection between Batarfi and al Qaeda's anthrax program.

Nonetheless, Batarfi has been transferred to Yemen. The Congress has not been informed of any specific restrictions being placed on his movements and activities, nor on the movements and activities of other former Guantanamo detainees returned to Yemen. Further, the situation within Yemen is unstable. The Government there faces multiple security challenges and separatist movements, and portions of the country are effectively beyond the control of the Government. It would not surprise me if Batarfi were to be contacted by al Qaeda in the Arabian Peninsula now that he has been released. I would appreciate if you would notify and provide me with any classified reports regarding what, if any, measures are being taken to monitor the activities of Batarfi and other transferred detainees.

I would also really appreciate it if you would encourage the president to consider and adopt my recommendations, outlined in my enclosed January 12 letter to President Obama, recommending that he bring back the chairmen of the 9/11 Commission to review progress made toward reaching the commission's recommendations and creating a "Team B" to review our strategic counterterrorism efforts. In light of the recent release of the Harvard report highlighting al Qaeda's determination to acquire and use a weapon of mass destruction, these outside reviews of federal counterterrorism programs are needed more than ever.

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



Thank you for your letter of December 18 in which you request, in an unclassified form, "the number of detainees previously held at Guantanamo Bay who, upon release or transfer to a third country, were confirmed or suspected to have returned to the fight against America and ourallies."

According to the most recent report to Congress pursuant to section 319 of the Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2009, the Intelligence Community assesses that 20 percent of detainces transferred from Guantanamo are confirmed or suspected of recidivist activity. This figure includes 9.6 percent of detainces who are confirmed recidivists and 10.4 percent of detainces who the Intelligence Community suspects, but is not certain, may have engaged in recidivist activities.

I wanted to share the enclosed letter that Rep. Myrick and I sent to President Obama today concerning the possible return of former Guantanamo Bay detainee Abdul Hafiz to terrorism in Afghanistan. According to reports in *Newsweek* and *The Long War Journal*, Hafiz has returned to the Taliban and lead kidnapping and extortion efforts against U.S. and coalition aid workers.

Despite repeated assurances from administration officials that the review process would prevent the release of dangerous detainees, it is now clear that those assurances were premature. Detainee recidivism is a serious and growing problem.

I ardently objected to the release of Hafiz and other detainees to Afghanistan, Yemen and Somaliland last December. We must not repeat past mistakes. I urge you to advise the president to follow the right policy as he has done with regard to Yemen and cease additional detainee releases to Afghanistan.

We are deeply concerned about recent reports that Abdul Hafiz, a former Guantanamo Bay detainee released by the Obama Administration to Afghanistan on December 19, 2009, has already returned to terrorist activities with the Taliban. As you may know, we ardently opposed the decision to transfer Hafiz and the other detainees to Afghanistan, Yemen, and Somalia last December.

Hafiz was held in Guantanamo for more than six years as "a suspect in the murder of an International Red Cross worker in Afghanistan," according to multiple Department of Defense (DOD) documents. He was captured and transferred to Guantanamo Bay following the 2003 kidnap and murder of Ricardo Munguia, a Salvadoran aid worker with the International Committee of the Red Cross and first aid worker murdered in Afghanistan following the arrival of coalition forces.

Last week, Newsweek reported that Taliban leader Mullah Mohammad Omar has appointed "Abdul Qayum Zakir, a former Guantanamo inmate, and Akhtar Mohammad Mansoor, a portly and personable rear-echelon leader, as his deputies... The choice of Zakir, who was released from Guantanamo in late 2007, and who returned to join the Taliban in the field about one year later after being freed by Afghan authorities, is popular with Taliban commanders."

The Newsweek article also noted that "[Omar] also appointed another former Gitmo detainee to head a committee in charge of handling the insurgents' hefty ransom demands for their kidnap victims and for dealing with nongovernment-aid organizations who are considering—or may already be running—projects in areas under Taliban influence." This information was confirmed by senior intelligence officials, who identified this former detainee as possibly Hafiz, to The Long War Journal. Disturbingly, Hafiz's new role with the Taliban may be similar to his earlier position, which resulted in the kidnapping and murder of Mr. Mungula in 2003.

Given the reported rise in detainee recidivism – from 13 percent to more than 20 percent over the last year alone – it is troubling that this administration chose to ignore these findings

and continues to suppress Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) reports on recidivism from the American people. We must learn from past mistakes and prevent additional detainees from rejoining the fight against our armed forces and aid workers in Afghanistan. As such, we urge the administration to release an unclassified version of the updated DIA recidivism report to the American people.

We strongly support your decision to cease the release of detainees to Yemen and urge you to extend this policy to Afghanistan and other unstable countries. It is wholly inappropriate to release terrorist detainees to the battlefield in Afghanistan while we have U.S. troops on the ground fighting the Taliban and al Qaeda.

- Whether there has been an increased number of suitability or security clearance denials across the federal government because of employees' financial situations, including the number of suitability or security clearance denials for financial reasons for each of the past five years;
- 2) Whether suitability and security clearance adjudication policies should be revised to include consideration of an employee's length of service and prior credit history, and if not, why not; and
- 3) Whether suitability and security clearance adjudication policies should be revised to take into account the difficult financial situation many Americans find themselves in at this time due to the poor economy, and if not, why not?

As the Ranking Members of the Senate Committee on Finance and the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs, Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, we have a duty to conduct oversight into the actions of executive branch agencies. Integral to this effort is ensuring that Inspectors General have the independence necessary to carry out audits, evaluations, and investigations within their respective agencies. During our time in Congress, we have sought to protect the independence of Inspectors General and write today in that continued effort.

Recently we learned that several agencies have sought to interfere with, limit, or outright block investigations, evaluations, or audits by, among others, Inspectors General, or otherwise impede their activities. Simply put, Inspectors General cannot get their job done without assistance and cooperation from the agencies they serve. Despite the need for cooperation, agencies are not always forthcoming with assistance required for Inspectors General to achieve their respective goals. In an effort to monitor agency cooperation, we request that your office list and describe any instances when the Department/Agency resisted and/or objected to oversight activities and/or restricted your access to information. Even temporary delays in granting access to information can be unnecessary and frustrate the mission of Inspectors General, so please include descriptions of instances where information was ultimately provided but only after a substantial delay. Where possible, please include the Department/Agency's reasoning for its actions, if any. When responding to this request, please include all applicable information from October 1, 2008 to the date of this letter. In the event a matter occurs subsequent to the date of this letter, please advise the staff members identified below immediately. We would appreciate receiving this information on June 15, 2010.

Secondly, we are requesting that you provide our staff with biannual reports on all closed investigations, evaluations, and audits conducted by your office that were not disclosed to the public. For example, this may include findings that resulted in an internal Management Implication Report. We would appreciate this non-public information for the period of January 1, 2009 through April 30, 2010 on June 15, 2010.

Thirdly, section 6(f)(3)(E) of the Inspector General Act states that an Inspector General shall have his/her comments included in the budget of the United States Government submitted to Congress if the Inspector General concludes that the budget would "substantially inhibit" the OIG from performing its respective duties. This requirement is essential if Congress is to ensure that Inspectors General are adequately funded. We were troubled to learn of an allegation that the Office of Management (OMB) and Budget told an Assistant Inspector General that OMB would "make life miserable" for the IG if they chose to communicate with Congress concerning their budget. We are also aware that a survey was done and that the Inspector General community did not identify any other situations of concern. In any event, we request that if any federal official threatens and/or otherwise attempts to impede your office's ability to communicate with Congress, whether that communication concerns the budget or any other matter, we wish to be advised immediately.

Finally, we understand that the Ranking Member of the House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform has requested that you provide information on outstanding recommendations that have not been fully implemented. Please provide a courtesy copy of your reply to us as well.

Dear Director Blair:

Media reports indicate that you are nearing the completion of an updated National Intelligence Estimate on Iran's nuclear program. Are you able to estimate when you expect that report to be completed and available for Members of Congress to review, and specifically, will the report include a detailed assessment of Iran's potential development, acquisition or use of an electromagnetic pulse (EMP) weapon?

Most open-source assessments of Iran's nuclear program indicate that Tehran may achieve a nuclear capability in one to three years. While it is difficult to template Iran's missile programs and project forward to determine with any certainty when they will develop a reliable ICBM, it seems certain that at some point over the next several years they will achieve an intercontinental reach.

It is also my understanding that the Iranian regime has, as part of its larger ballistic missile development program, detonated a test warhead at the apogee of the missile's trajectory in a training exercise. Experts say this strongly suggests that the objective of such a test is to develop the capability to execute an EMP attack rather than a direct nuclear attack. Further, it is now known that Iranian military officials have written of the devastation that the successful detonation of an EMP weapon over the United States would cause by destroying much of our electrical grid and many of the non-hardened systems and devices linked to it.

The EMP Commission, the Strategic Posture Commission of the United States and the National Academy of Sciences have all reached many of the same conclusions concerning the vulnerability of our society to EMP whether

generated naturally, by instrument, or high-altitude nuclear burst. In short, the physics underpinning this scenario are found plausible by many leading experts. This is of particular concern given that ours is now a world where fanatics increasingly possess the capabilities and determination to realize such a malevolent objective.

Indeed, it is beginning to appear that use of an electromagnetic pulse weapon may soon serve as one of the most effective and dangerous of all asymmetric threats from terrorist organizations or rogue states. Given such a potential, it is imperative that the threat be fully assessed and effectively deterred if deemed as dangerous as many of our nation's experts suggest. If careful analysis discovers the threat is not a priority, an NIE would greatly clarify the debate and assuage the concerns of many. As with all potentially significant threats, our commitment to national security demands that we err on the side of caution.

Recognizing that the ongoing NIE process is nearing completion, I ask for one of the following: Would it be possible at this point to integrate an assessment of the EMP threat into the NIE? If not, I ask the intelligence community to provide a standalone NIE assessment of Iran's intention and ability to develop or acquire an effective EMP capability as soon as possible. Either report should include the use of foreign technical or operational support surrounding such a threat.

I look forward to your response at your very earliest opportunity.

The Senate Select Committee on Intelligence will conduct a closed hearing on May 11, 2010, 2:30 p.m., in Room SH-219 in the Hart Building on how the Intelligence Community monitors arms control treaties, and its current collection and assessments on Russia's strategic nuclear forces. We ask that you provide such witnesses as you deem appropriate for the hearing.

The purpose of the hearing is to prepare the Committee for consideration of the New START Treaty that was signed by Presidents Obama and Medvedev on April 8, 2010. We understand that the National Intelligence Council is preparing a comprehensive assessment of the Treaty and that a report will be completed this summer.



A review of the High Value Detainee Interrogation Group (HIG) Charter and initial operation of the HIG leaves me gravely concerned about its radical shift in intelligence collection. It appears poorly designed in concept and execution, the results of which could significantly hamper effective intelligence collection from the most critical high value detainees.

The hasty and ill-considered decision to order the closure of Guantanamo Bay detention facility has shown the danger of setting national security policy based on political expediency. This mistake should not be repeated in detainee interrogation.

Both the initial experience with the HIG and numerous specifics in the classified Charter make it clear that the HIG is centered on fundamentally unworkable and unrealistic concepts of interrogation. There has been no demonstrated success in intelligence collection as a result of any HIG activity. At least one failure has clearly demonstrated the shortcomings of the Charter requirements.

The Charter's ill-conceived and bureaucratic concepts and restrictions make it unlikely to succeed. It detracts from ensuring effective intelligence collection from terrorists and has more to do with interagency politics and "political correctness." The many problems also include the absence of any provisions for managing interrogation of terrorists who refuse to cooperate and the restriction that interrogations will only be permitted to elicit "voluntary statements." These problems alone powerfully demonstrate the futility of the HIG concepts.

Specific elements of the Charter could jeopardize clandestine operations and sensitive cooperation overseas, as well as foreign intelligence collection within the United States.

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The current HIQ Charter seeks to impose liability on individual intelligence community personnel involved in HIG operations for potential violations of law, as well as "guidelines and objectives" for interrogation. It also fails entirely to specify how numerous critical situations should be handled. It claims to limit permissible interrogation techniques to those in the Army Field Manual, but then immediately authorizes the use of other "non-coercive" techniques that it does not specify in detail. While such vagueness and contradiction may be politically convenient, it threatens to leave line employees without clear direction. This is completely unacceptable.

Obtaining time-sensitive and actionable intelligence from high value detainces requires speed, agility, and flexibility to deal with emergent situations and circumstances. It is clear that the HIG Charter implementation has not reflected these realities. We need a different approach to ensure that intelligence professionals are fully supported and have clear direction in how to obtain intelligence to counter the terrorist threat.

I look forward to working closely with you and would like to schedule a meeting at your carliest convenience to discuss these issues.

One of the significant objectives of the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004 (IRTPA) was the improvement of information sharing both within the Intelligence Community and among U.S. Government entities in support of national security. Almost six years since passage of IRTPA, the need for better information sharing continues to be cited prominently among the lessons learned from incidents such as Fort Hood and the attempted terrorist attack on December 25, 2009. This hearing will enable us to consider progress toward the goals for information sharing and the challenges which remain to fully accomplish those goals.

The Committee intends to examine the topic as a multi-faceted endeavor for which many enablers, including statute and policy guidance, technology, and leadership, must all play a part. Recognizing the significant responsibilities to facilitate information sharing that IRTPA assigns to the Director of National Intelligence (DNI), we look forward to discussing with you or your designees the use of policy guidance, technological standards, and leadership of the Intelligence Community (IC) to enable information to be shared securely, efficiently, and with adequate protections.

We are aware that the issuance in January 2009 of Intelligence Community Directive (ICD) 501 Discovery and Retrieval or Dissemination of Information within the Intelligence Community lays the basis for information sharing across the IC. However, as your March 2009 Report to Congress Concerning Efforts to Improve Intelligence Information Sharing notes, additional policy changes were required to "remove information sharing barriers" in multiple Executive Orders. As a result, additional DNI guidelines, some which require approval by the Attorney General, are necessary to implement these changes. The Subcommittee looks forward to hearing an update on the implementation of information sharing, including the remaining challenges at the level of policy, technology, IC-wide compliance, or leadership of cultural change.

We request that you provide the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence with information regarding the need for and function of Intelligence Community (IC) buildings and facilities.

Since the attacks of September 11th, the Intelligence Community has grown significantly in both budget and personnel. This budgetary and personnel growth has also resulted in the expansion in the number of buildings and related facilities owned and leased by the Office of the Director of National Intelligence and the individual intelligence agencies, both in the Capitol region and throughout the United States. Such large growth in a relatively short period of time raises the risk of duplicative and redundant structures, and the possibility that certain facilities may be consolidated with substantial cost savings and no loss to mission performance.

We understand that your staff, through the IC Facilities Working Group, is conducting a review of the Intelligence Community's building and facilities, and that individual intelligence agencies are also internally reviewing their facility requirements. We are also interested in conducting a review of Intelligence Community buildings and facilities. We request that you provide the Committee with a list of all Intelligence Community building and facilities that includes the following information:

- Which agency or agencies utilize each building or facility;
- What offices, agencies, organizations, or mission functions are housed in each space;

- Whether the building or facility is owned or leased, and, if leased, since when, for what term and at what cost;
- Construction of any new facilities and major renovations or improvements conducted at each building or facility from fiscal year
- 2000 to the present, and their total cost;
- Any additional construction or leasing of new facilities or major renovations or improvements currently in progress or under consideration, and for those in progress or under consideration at what stage are these current projects;
- For construction, major renovations, or leasing from fiscal year 2000 to the present, please identify the principal descriptions of those activities in budget or other submissions to the Congress;
- The process used and factors considered by the ODNI and individual IC agencies for making building purchase, leasing, or renovation decisions; and
- Any other information that you believe would inform the Committee about the history and present or future challenges of IC building and facility growth.

Attached is an addendum that includes more detail on the information requested. We ask that you provide this information to Committee by August 31, 2010.

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
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
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

I have enclosed a copy of a letter from a constituent who is the mother of six children, all of whom are currently serving or have served in the U.S. military. She offers her unique perspective on an idea I first proposed to the administration on August 4—namely the creation of an Afghanistan-Pakistan Study Group. I have also enclosed a copy of my original letter for your reference.

I implore you to consider my constituent's views----the views of an "American mother with children glad to serve our country," and to move swiftly to establish an Afghanistan-Pakistan Study Group, modeled after the Iraq Study Group, to bring "fresh eyes" to the war effort in Afghanistan.


The group would be comprised of nationally known and respected individuals who love their country more than their political party and would serve to provide much-needed clarity to a policy that increasingly appears adrift. Candidly, after reading yesterday's *Washington Post* piece adapted from Bob Woodward's, "Obama's Wars," I have serious concerns that the needed clarity about our aim in Afghanistan ever existed within the administration. Woodward writes, "Even at the end of the process, the president's team wrestled with the most basic questions about the war, then entering its ninth year: What is the mission? What are we trying to do? What will work?" These are sobering questions—but they are questions that must be answered and the Afghanistan-Pakistan Study Group is just the means to arrive at these answers in a way that honors our men and women in uniform.

In the halls of Congress or the White House, at Foggy Bottom or the Pentagon, policy discussions can at times be detached from the actual lives that are most directly impacted by the decisions being made. This couldn't be further from the case for this mother. She doesn't have that luxury when it comes to the war in Afghanistan. And we mustn't either. This is not a matter of politics—or at least it ought not be— for it is always in our national interest to openly assess the challenges before us and to chart a clear course to victory. Frankly, I've been deeply troubled by Woodward's reporting which indicates that discussions of the war strategy were infused with political calculations. An Afghanistan-Pakistan Study Group could help redeem what was clearly a flawed process.

Dear Congressman Wolf:

I have read your proposal for the formation of an Afghanistan/Pakistan Study Group with deep personal interest and approbation. I applaud its respectful, well-reasoned, bipartisan approach to rethinking the war in Afghanistan. The following are my personal thoughts regarding this war. Please accept them as the insights of an average American mother.

It has been troubling to me how distant this war is for so many Americans. Many are only vaguely aware of the events taking place, other than perhaps the recent increase in the number of casualties. Even gathering information of what is daily happening in Afghanistan hasn't been easy. I comb the internet daily searching many different online news sources in an attempt to be informed. Our country is at war and yet so often the top news items contain nothing regarding it. Often it is the local papers in towns with soldiers, sailors and marines serving in Afghanistan that contain the most news. Other times it is the news stations with an embedded reporter who will have a flurry of articles while the reporter is there but then nothing once they return.

The War on Terror is not just impersonal news but it is a war that strikes very close to home. My father has a dear friend whose son-in-law died in the Twin Towers. I have a friend who lost a son in Iraq during the battle for Fallujah. A student of mine lost her fiancee in the war. My children and son-in-law have served in both Iraq and Afghanistan and have buddies injured or killed in action.

One of my daughters is currently serving in Afghanistan in a Combat Support Hospital. She arrived in time to experience first hand the peak number of casualties in June and July. In a recent news interview her Commanding Officer said they are seeing an almost constant stream of casualties; something that none of them were prepared for, but will remember the horrors of the rest of their lives.

It has sometimes appeared that the efforts in Afghanistan have trudged along, with success measured in part by the areas in which we have gained some measure of control versus the price paid in human lives both civilian and military. The casualties suffered aren't just numbers to me; each name, each face, represents a family who is paying the ultimate price, the loss of a son or daughter, brother or sister, father or mother; a family that will never be the same. Therefore, I wholeheartedly support the formation of an Afghanistan/Pakistan Study Group in the hope that it will help to turn the tide of this war and lessen the number of casualties as well.

I, too, have a deep respect and confidence in Gen. Petraus and would not want my comments to be construed as being critical of the leadership of our military. Dear Mr. President:

On September 14, 2001, following the catastrophic and deliberate terrorist attack on our country, I voted to go to war in Afghanistan. I stand by that decision and have the utmost confidence in General Petracus's proven leadership. I also remain unequivocally committed to the success of our mission there and to the more than 100,000 American troops sacrificing toward that end. In fact, it is this commitment which has led me to write to you. While I have been a consistent supporter of the war effort in both Afghanistan and Iraq, I believe that with this support comes a responsibility. This was true during a Republican administration in the midst of the wars, and it remains true today.

In 2005, I returned from my third trip to Iraq where I saw firsthand the deteriorating security situation. I was deeply concerned that Congress was failing to exercise the necessary oversight of the war effort. Against this backdrop I authored the legislation that created the Iraq Study Group (ISG). The ISG was a 10-member bipartisan group of well-respected, nationally known figures who were brought together with the help of four reputable organizations...the U.S. Institute for Peace, the Center for the Study of the Presidency, the Center for Strategic and International Studies, and the Baker Institute for Public Policy at Rice University...and charged with undertaking a comprehensive review of U.S. efforts there. This panel was intended to serve as "fresh eyes on the target"...the target being success in Iraq.

While reticent at first, to their credit President Bush, State Secretary Rice and Defense Secretary Rumsfeld came to support the ISG, ably led by bipartisan co-chairs, former Secretary of State James Baker and former Congressman Lee Hamilton. Two members of your national security team, Secretary of Defense Robert Gates and CIA Director Leon Panetta, saw the merit of the ISG and, in fact, served on the panel. Vice President Biden, too, then serving in the Senate, was supportive and saw it as a means to unite the Congress at a critical time. A number of the ISG's recommendations and ideas were adopted. Retired General Jack Keane, senior military adviser to the ISG, was a lead proponent of "the surge," and the ISG referenced the possibility on page 73. Aside from the specific policy recommendations of the panel, the ISG helped force a moment of truth in our national conversation about the war effort.

I believe our nation is again facing such a moment in the Afghanistan war effort, and that a similar model is needed. In recent days I have spoken with a number of knowledgeable individuals including former senior diplomats, public policy experts and retired and active military. Many believe our Afghanistan policy is adrift, and all agreed that there is an urgent need for what I call an

Afghanistan-Pakistan Study Group (APSG). We must examine our efforts in the region holistically, given Pakistan's strategic significance to our efforts in Afghanistan and the Taliban's presence in that country as well, especially in the border areas.

This likely will not come as a surprise to you as commander in chief. You are well acquainted with the sobering statistics of the past several weeks—notably that July surpassed June as the deadliest month for U.S. troops. There is a palpable shift in the nation's mood and in the halls of Congress. A July 2010 CBS news poll found that 62 percent of Americans say the war is going badly in Afghanistan, up from 49 percent in May. Further, last week, 102 Democrats voted against the war spending bill, which is 70 more than last year, and they were joined by 12 members of my own party. Senator Lindsay Graham, speaking last Sunday on CNN's "State of the Union," candidly expressed concern about an "unholy alliance" emerging of anti-war Democrats and Republicans.

I have heard it said that Vietnam was not lost in Saigon; rather, it was lost in Washington. While the Vietnam and Afghanistan parallels are imperfect at best, the shadow of history looms large. Eroding political will has consequences—and in the case of Afghanistan, the stakes could not be higher. A year ago, speaking before the Veterans of Foreign War National Convention, you rightly said, "Those who attacked America on 9/11 are plotting to do so again. If left unchecked, the Taliban insurgency will mean an even larger safe haven from which al Qaeda would plot to kill more Americans. So this is not only a war worth fighting...this is fundamental to the defense of our people." Indeed it is fundamental. We must soberly consider the implications of failure in Afghanistan. Those that we know for certain are chilling—namely an emboldened al-Qaeda, a reconstituted Taliban with an open staging ground for future workdwide attacks, and a destabilized, nuclear-armed Pakistan.

Given these realities and wavering public and political support, I urge you to act immediately, through executive order, to convene an Afghanistan-Pakistan Study Group modeled after the Iraq Study Group. The participation of nationally known and respected individuals is of paramount importance. Among the names that surfaced in my discussions with others, all of whom more than meet the criteria described above, are ISG co-chairs Baker and Hamilton; former Senators Chuck Robb, Bob Kerrey and Sam Nunn; former Congressman Duncan Hunter; former U.S. ambassador Ryan Crocker; former Secretary of Defense James Schlesinger, and General Keane. These names are simply suggestions among a cadre of capable men and women, as evidenced by the make-up of the ISG, who would be more than up to the task.

I firmly believe that an Afghanistan-Pakistan Study Group could reinvigorate national confidence in how America can be successful and move toward a shared mission in Afghanistan. This is a crucial task. On the Sunday morning news shows this past weekend, it was unsettling to hear conflicting statements from within the leadership of the administration that revealed a lack of clarity about the end game in Afghanistan. How much more so is this true for the rest of the country? An APSG is necessary for precisely that reason. We are nine years into our nation's longest running war and the American people and their elected representatives do not have a clear sense of what we are aiming to achieve, why it is necessary and how far we are from attaining that goal. Further, an APSG could strengthen many of our NATO allies in Afghanistan who are also The Honorable Barack H. Obama August 4, 2010 Page 3

facing dwindling public support, as evidenced by the recent Dutch troop withdrawal, and would give them a tangible vision to which to commit.


Just as was true at the time of the Iraq Study Group, I believe that Americans of all political viewpoints, liberals and conservatives alike, and varied opinions on the war will embrace this "fresh eyes" approach. Like the previous administration's support of the Iraq Study Group, which involved taking the group's members to Iraq and providing high-level access to policy and decision makers, I urge you to embrace an Afghanistan-Pakistan Study Group. It is always in our national interest to openly assess the challenges before us and to chart a clear course to success.

As you know, the full Congress comes back in session in mid-September—days after Americans around the country will once again pause and remember that horrific morning nine years ago when passenger airlines became weapons, when the skyline of one of America's greatest cities was forever changed, when a symbol of America's military might was left with a gaping hole. The experts with whom I have spoken in recent days believe that time is of the essence in moving forward with a study panel, and waiting for Congress to reconvene is too long to wait. As such, I am hopeful you will use an executive order and the power of the bully pulpit to convene this group in short order, and explain to the American people why it is both necessary and timely. Should you choose not to take this path, respectfully, I intend to offer an amendment by whatever yehicle necessary to mandate the group's creation at the cartiest possible opportunity.

The ISG's report opened with a letter from the co-chairs that read, "There is no magic formula to solve the problems of Iraq. However, there are actions that can be taken to improve the situation and protect American interests." The same can be said of Afghanistan.

I understand that you are a great admirer of Abraham Lincoln. He, too, governed during a time of war, albeit a war that pitted brother against brother, and father against son. In the midst of that epic struggle, he relied on a cabinet with strong, often times opposing viewpoints. Historians assert this served to develop his thinking on complex matters. Similarly, while total agreement may not emerge from a study group for Afghanistan and Pakistan, I believe that vigorous, thoughtful and principled debate and discussion among some of our nation's greatest minds on these matters will only serve the national interest. The biblical admonition that iron sharpens iron rings true.

P.S. We as a nation must be successful in Afghanistan. We owe this to our men and women in the military serving in harm's way and to the American people.



Due to the substantial number of necessary documents that were identified, the Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) has not been able to develop a full understanding of the records and facts necessary for a comprehensive response. Accordingly, the ODNI is not yet in a position to report on many of the requested elements or to make recommendations regarding the advisability of legislative action to treat Air America employment as Federal services for the purposes of Federal retirement benefits. Because of the scope of this project, we cannot reliably predict when it will be completed. We will, however, provide Congress 90-day progress reports regarding our efforts.

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We assess the effort to review these documents will take a significant investment of time and resources. The ODNI is committed to comply with this reporting requirement relying both on CIA documents, but also other documents that may be available.

Thank you for your concern regarding the increased presence of Chinese-manufactured equipment in the United States' telecommunications infrastructure as expressed in your March 22, 2010 letter. You have raised important issues which concern me and have significant national security implications.

Per your request, I have asked my National Counterintelligence Executive (NCIX), Robert M. Bryant to conduct a classified and, where possible, unclassified review of the following by December 30, 2010:

- The use of Chinese-origin telecommunications equipment in the United States and its effect on the conduct of U.S. law enforcement and intelligence activities.
- The potential risks that the use of Chinese-origin telecommunications equipment in the United States poses to the switched telecommunications infrastructure.
- The potential effects of outsourcing or off-shoring telecommunications services to Chinese companies on U.S. national security and intelligence activities.
- The tools that U.S. intelligence and national security agencies have to address risks arising from the use of Chinese-origin telecommunications equipment or services.
- Agency use of those tools to date.

NCIX Bryant will work closely with the National Security Agency and other members of the Intelligence Community as necessary to prepare this assessment. We will provide you with a status briefing in September 2010.

During my testimony at the December 3, 2009 hearing on unauthorized disclosures, I promised to provide the Committee a 90 day status report of actions initiated by my office to invigorate and improve our abilities to detect and deter leaks. They include:

- A DNI memorandum to heads of Intelligence Community (IC) agencies directing them to pursue internal administrative actions instead of their past practice of primary reliance on the criminal process;
- Reaching agreement with the Department of Justice (DoJ) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to return actionable cases to the referring agencies for consideration of administrative action;
- Creation of two new training courses:
- Leveraging technology to deter media leaks.

Additionally, you sent me a letter on February 11, 2010 requesting crimes reporting and several other types of information concerning media leak investigations. My staff is actively working with the DoJ to reach an agreement to determine what information can be provided to the Committee concerning crimes reports without impacting ongoing criminal investigations. Once an agreement is reached, I will promptly notify the Committee of the decision and the information that can be shared.

My primary initiative since the 3 December hearing has been to emphasize IC agencies should pursue internal administrative investigations and implement administrative actions instead of relying primarily on the criminal process. I will issue shortly an IC-wide memorandum directing agency heads to more vigorously pursue administrative actions in leaks cases.

To support this initiative, I am directing IC agencies to work with the DoJ to quickly assess whether an incident should be pursued through administrative authorities rather than a criminal investigation. If an IC agency determines it wishes to pursue an administrative investigation, it will notify the DoJ of this intention as part of the Crimes Report submission. The DoJ has agreed to decide within 21 days of receipt of the Crimes Report whether they will pursue a criminal investigation of the incident. If the referring agency is not contacted by DoJ within 21 days, the agency will then proceed with its internal investigation utilizing all administrative tools within its authority.

Our experience leads us to conclude that most of the leaks currently under criminal investigation have a low probability of being prosecuted. As the result of discussions among my office, DoJ, and the FBI, actionable cases will be returned to the referring agency to either complete the investigative process or take administrative actions based on the results of the FBI investigation. The FBI has reported they have completed their initial analysis of all open investigations and will obtain final concurrence from DoJ in the near future of cases to be returned to the IC. My office will closely monitor this new initiative and provide any assistance we can to the referring agencies.

Since the 3 December hearing, my office has initiated a robust, web-based IC-wide Unauthorized Disclosure training initiative. This initiative will create two standardized training courses - one targeting the general IC employee population and the other specifically targeting the security, investigator, and executive audiences. Course outlines and content have been defined and content reviews and final course narratives will soon be completed. Communitywide dissemination of both training courses is planned for later this summer.

My office is also committed to leveraging technology where available to both deter media leaks and identify the culprit when an incident occurs. My staff continues their collaboration with security, counterintelligence, and information technology professionals throughout the IC to fully understand available and developing technology that can be implemented to assist with this effort.

All students at the NDIC must be Federal employees with a TS/SCI clearance. Charging tuition (fce-for-service) for the NDIC degree would be an exercise in moving federal funds from one appropriation to another. While tuition might provide an indication of the price agencies are willing to pay for the degree, it would incur a significant amount of administrative overhead that would erode any potential benefit.

The uniformed services incur a substantial fce-for-service through the permanent change of station (PCS) assignment system and salary costs of the full-time students attending NDIC in-residence. The services also provide a small number of faculty members for two-year rotations to the College, and a few of the Department of Defense agencies provide rotational faculty chairs. The reserve weekend executive program (reserve students and faculty) temporary duty assignment (TDY) costs are paid by their respective service.

Part-time, evening students from any organization within the Federal government who hold a TS/SCI clearance may apply and attend the evening program on their own, with no associated tuition. In essence, there are no full-time students at NDIC whose parent agency is not already paying some, if not all, direct and indirect costs for these individuals to attend NDIC programs. We do not see a need to change the current model.

Thank you for your letter of April 2, 2010, in which you asked us to review, as part of the Suitability and Security Clearance Reform effort, the policies that apply with respect how an individual's financial situation is taken into consideration, when the Federal Government is deciding whether an individual is eligible to hold a sensitive position or to have access to classified information.

We appreciate the opportunity to respond to the three questions that you have raised. In this response, we are providing answers to the second and third questions and an interim response to your first question (we will be providing you a further response on your first question). These answers are in the attachment.

We share your goal of personnel security and suitability policies that are fair, effective, and consistently applied, and that properly take into account the circumstances faced by individuals whose eligibility is being adjudicated. To that end, and in response to your letter, we have reviewed our policies in this area. Based on our review, we believe that the existing policies, as reflected in the adjudicative guidelines, adequately take into account current economic conditions and their effect on prospective Federal employees, and we do not believe that revisions to those adjudicative guidelines are necessary.

Thank you for your 8 April 2010 letter and your continued dedication to the role of independent Inspectors General. The independence of Inspectors General is critical to conducting meaningful audits, evaluations, investigations, and other management reviews. I will address the requests in your letter as they pertain to the Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) since the beginning of my tenure as the ODNI Inspector General in April 2009.

1. Cooperation from ODNI Management

During my tenure, I have not experienced an instance when the ODNI management team has resisted or objected to the OIG's activities. The ODNI leadership has been cooperative in participating in OIG audits, evaluations, investigations, and reviews and in providing input into the ODNI biannual Work Plan.

2. Biannual Report on Closed Matters not Disclosed to Public

Our reports generally are not disclosed to the public because of the classified nature of our work. We provide all final reports of audits, inspections, evaluations, and reviews to the intelligence oversight committees. Consistent with the general practice in the IG community, we do not routinely provide reports of investigations to the committees, but rather notify them of significant investigative reports and offer briefings of those matters. In addition, we summarize significant investigations, including those of senior officials, in our semiannual reports to Congress.

The OIG has produced two semiannual reports covering the period 1 January to 31 December 2009. Both reports are classified and were delivered to the intelligence oversight and appropriations committees. We are in the process of preparing the semiannual report for the period 1 Jan to 30 June 2010. Upon concurrence of the A/DNI, that report will be sent to Congress this summer.

3. Communications with Congress

Pursuant to ODNI policy, all congressional communications are transmitted through the ODNI's Office of Legislative Affairs (OLA). Therefore, the OIG coordinates all congressional interactions through OLA.

Statutory IGs have direct reporting lines to Congress under the Inspector General Act of 1978. However, the ODNI IG is appointed by the Director of National Intelligence (DNI) and reports solely to the DNI. The Fiscal Year 2010 Intelligence Authorization bill (S. 1494), pending in Congress, would create a Presidentially-appointed, Senate-confirmed Inspector General for the Intelligence Community and would establish a dual reporting requirement to Congress and the agency head, similar to that of other statutory IGs.

4. Unimplemented ODNI OIG Recommendations

Beginning in early 2009, ODNI management and the OIG instituted a review process that tracks the implementation of all outstanding OIG recommendations. This process has resulted in over 94% of OIG recommendations in reports issued since 2007 being closed or substantially closed. We plan to provide the House Committee on Government Oversight and Reform a list of pending unclassified unimplemented recommendations after we complete our semiannual report in July and will coordinate with the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence in providing you a copy of our report.

I am replying to your letter to Acting Director Gompert dated June 17, 2010 regarding a Capitol Network (CapNet) installation for your committee. We support your request for this capability. The following addresses actions completed and those remaining to be accomplished in support of this requirement.

CapNet was established in 2003 at the direction of Congress to provide the Congressional Oversight Committees (Intelligence) with Top Secret – Sensitive Compartmented Informationlevel e-mail and file transfer capability with the Intelligence Community (IC). As referenced in your letter, since that time, access to CapNet has been expanded beyond the Oversight Committees to select other congressional entities with a demonstrated requirement for access to finished Intelligence products.

On 23 June, our CapNet Program Manager Ms. Sledjeski and CapNet Engineer Mr. Woolfolk, met with Ms. Rush from your committee staff and Messrs Wilson and Bolyen from the House Office of Security. They jointly conducted a walk through of your proposed Sensitive Compartmented Information Facility (SCIF) and discovered that the area where CapNet would be installed is not yet completed and remains in various stages of construction. None of the participants were able to determine if the necessary communications infrastructures (proper cables, T-1 lines) were in place. Additionally, Mr. Woolfolk confirmed that he had not previously visited this location.

Based on the walk through, the following actions have been identified to complete a CapNet installation:

- Complete SCIF build out (committee action)
- Obtain SCIF accreditation (committee action)

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

This responds to your February 11, 2010 letter to the Director of National Intelligence (DNI) concerning unauthorized disclosures of classified information.

Unauthorized disclosures of classified information can be extremely damaging to national security. The Department of Justice, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation, takes scriously its law enforcement responsibilities relating to unauthorized disclosures that violate the law. On May 21, 2010, then DNI Blair issued the enclosed memorandum to Intelligence Community agency heads reaffirming that administrative processes should also be used to address leaks of classified information. This initiative directs Intelligence Community agencies to work with the Department of Justice to quickly assess whether an incident should be pursued through administrative authorities rather than a criminal investigation.

During the Committee's hearing on December 3, 2009, the Attorney General and the DNI were asked if the Intelligence Community would routinely provide information to the Intelligence Committees concerning the unauthorized disclosures of classified information to the media. Your February 11, 2010 letter details the specific information you would like us to provide. Oversight of the Intelligence Community by the Intelligence Committees is vital to the Intelligence Community's success. To that end, we strive, to the fullest extent possible, to provide the Intelligence Committees the information requested to fulfill their critical oversight role. This includes information on leaks of classified information. Indeed, Intelligence Community Policy Memorandum 2005-100-3 requires that Congress be notified of "the loss or compromise of classified intelligence information on such a scale or over such an extended period as to indicate the possibility of a systemic compromise, or a loss or compromise that investigation indicates poses a substantial risk to US national security activities." See Intelligence Community Policy Memorandum 2005-100-3.

As you are aware, however, the Department of Justice has a long-standing and wellfounded policy of declining to provide non-public information about ongoing criminal investigations and prosecutions. The Department also has substantial confidentiality interests in documents reflecting its internal prosecutorial decision-making process. The Department's policy helps to ensure the integrity of its law enforcement efforts by protecting information about the direction of an investigation, the evidence the government has obtained, and assessments of the strengths and weakness of the evidence. We believe that this policy also is important to ensuring public confidence in the independence of our law enforcement efforts.

The Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) and Department of Justice have worked closely with your staff to assess what information can be disclosed about leaks of classified information that both provides the Committees the information they need to fulfill their important oversight responsibilities and protects the law enforcement interests underlying the Department of Justice's policy.

The Intelligence Community will be able to provide the Intelligence Committees considerable information on leaks of classified information. First, ODNI will assure that the Intelligence Community continues to fulfill its responsibility to notify the Intelligence Committees about any significant leak of classified information to the media. We will continue to adhere to this policy, and will err on the side of providing notification of leaks of sensitive information when there is any doubt about whether this standard is met. Going forward, Intelligence Community notifications about leaks of classified information will include (1) the date and title of the specific article where classified information was disclosed; (2) the specific information in the article that was classified; and (3) confirmation that the Intelligence Community clement has reported the leak to the Attorney General pursuant to section 1.6(b) of Executive Order 12333 and the Memorandum of Understanding between the Attorney General and Intelligence Community elements.

In addition, each Intelligence Community element will notify the Intelligence Committees concerning administrative sanctions imposed by the Intelligence Community against any employee for the unauthorized disclosure of classified information. This notification will identify information disclosed by an Intelligence Community employee as well as the administrative sanction that was imposed for such disclosure.

Finally, in January of each year, the Department of Justice will provide the following information from the prior calendar year to the Intelligence Committees: the number of leak matters reported to the Attorney General by the Intelligence Community and the number of matters that were referred to the originating agencies for administrative action.

We believe that this information will provide the Intelligence Committees with the information they need to ensure that the Executive Branch is appropriately addressing leaks of classified information. We appreciate your interest in this important topic, and we will ensure you receive a copy of any additional guidance provided to Intelligence Community on the obligation to conduct administrative investigations.

During my 3 December 2009 testimony before the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, I renewed my commitment to proactively confront the issue of unauthorized disclosures in the media. In accordance with my responsibility to protect intelligence sources and methods. I have decided to refocus the Intelligence Community (IC) agencies' handling of leaks to the media and to streamline the process for the initial assessment and reporting of these disclosures.

Each IC agency will continue to follow established internal procedures to determine whether information appearing in the media constitutes an unauthorized disclosure of properly classified information. When an IC agency files a "Crimes Report" based on an unauthorized disclosure that has occurred that includes a request for an FBI investigation, the Report should include thorough answers to the Department of Justice's (DOJ) Eleven Questions. The affected agency will submit the "Crimes Report" to the DOJ and Office of the Director of National Intelligence's Special Security Center (SSC). In the cases where the agency desires to conduct an internal administrative investigation, the DOJ has agreed to inform the IC agency and SSC within 21 days of the receipt of a Crimes Report whether DOJ intends to conduct a criminal investigation. If DOJ elects to conduct a criminal investigation, the IC agency may begin an administrative investigation into the unauthorized disclosure. These new procedures will be critical to reinvigorate efforts to detect and deter unauthorized disclosures and hold accountable those individuals who betray our trust by disclosing classified information.

When an IC agency pursues an administrative investigation into an unauthorized disclosure, it will provide the SSC with status reports as necessary on the progress of the investigation in a format to be established by the SSC.

The SSC will continue to coordinate joint notifications to the DOJ if an unauthorized disclosure is determined to contain multiple IC agency equities. The SSC will also be responsible for providing investigative assistance and coordinating investigative activity between IC agencies as required. If a suspect is identified as the result of an administrative investigation, IC agencies will notify the DOJ.

Past government studies have confirmed that "leaks" by the media have significantly impaired U.S. capabilities against our hardest targets, caused grave harm to national security, and collectively cost the American people hundreds of millions of dollars. It is my intention to take the necessary actions to decrease their occurrence and reduce this harm.

This letter serves as an unclassified addendum to NCTC Director, Mike Leiter's, letter to you dated September 14, 2010, regarding the need for two critically important Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) exemptions.

The first of these provides that files forwarded to the Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) by the operational elements do not lose their Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) exemptions under Title VII of the National Security Act merely because they have been forwarded to the ODNI. This provision will facilitate information sharing by removing any real or perceived barriers to Intelligence Community elements sharing information with the National Counterterrorism Center (NCTC) and the ODNI. NCTC is the primary organization in the United States Government for integrating and analyzing intelligence pertaining to terrorism and serves as the central and shared knowledge bank on terrorism information. In order to succeed at its core mission it is vital that NCTC have access to a broad array of information held by elements of the Intelligence Community. This provision will significantly improve upon information-sharing mechanisms designed to address shortcomings identified in your Committee's report on the failed attack on Northwest Flight 253. We are very pleased that the Senate chose to include this provision in its recently-passed Intelligence Authorization bill (S. 3611).

The second proposal involves the protection of terrorist identity information. To ensure the widest possible dissemination and use of terrorist identity information by our Federal, State, Local, Tribal and Private counterterrorism partners, it is necessary to disseminate such information in an unclassified, but sensitive, format. Terrorist identify information is disseminated not just for screening purposes, but also for other counterterrorism purposes that help enhance the security of the nation. Because it is unclassified when disseminated, there is not an explicit provision in the FOIA that protects terrorist identity information that is used for screening and other counterterrorism purposes by name.

The public release of terrorist identity information can have a significant adverse impact on counterterrorism efforts. The disclosure of an individual's watchlist status may, for example, reveal that an individual, and the groups with which they are affiliated, are a subject of interest to the counterterrorism community. Additionally, individuals who learn of their status may be able to identify the means by which that information was obtained, potentially endangering classified intelligence or law enforcement sources. Furthermore, the risk remains that an individual could alter his behavior to include attempts at circumventing the screening process.

Explicit statutory protections of operational files described by Title VII of the National Security Act of 1947 provided to ODNI, and for terrorist identity information disseminated to all of our counterterrorism partners will allow a uniform response to FOIA requests across the federal government, and minimize the costly litigation and expenditure of resources by agencies responding to FOIA requests. We strongly believe that these provisions will facilitate enhanced information sharing between agencies and other US entities, and encourage agencies to provide all relevant information for counterterrorism purposes.

I am writing in response to your June 23, 2010 letter in which you asked then Acting Director of National Intelligence (DNI) Gompert to declassify all classified material under his authority pertaining to American Prisoners of War (POWs) from Southeast Asia. I am honored to assist you in this effort. I believe strongly that we have a commitment to the families and loved ones of our heroes to return or account for all who have fought bravely on behalf of our country. We are both working to the same goal.

I support the declassification of relevant information to the greatest extent possible. To accomplish this, the Intelligence Community must examine each record for intelligence sources and methods and be sensitive to privacy concerns. The majority of the documents you seek are currently in the possession of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) and are undergoing declassification review. Those records will be made available by the end of 2013 in accordance with the President's memorandum implementing Executive Order 13526.

The Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) has declassified and released thousands of pages of documents related to prisoners of war captured during the Vietnam War as directed under Executive Order 12812 (1992) and NSC-8 (1993). In addition, CIA is currently working with researchers from the Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command (JPAC) to review approximately 150 files of corporate Air America records. This effort will enable JPAC to open new cases, pinpoint crash site locations and provide their forensics department with biological profiles and precise physical characteristic information for their identification processes. CIA made their review of these documents a priority to support JPAC's mission to identify and bring home the remains of missing U.S. POW and MIA personnel.

The Defense POW/Missing Personnel Office (DPMO), as the lead agency for the Department of Defense (DoD) for declassification and release of all DoD records relating to Vietnam-era POWs, has, since the early 1990s, led a vigorous effort to review and declassify all records in accordance with Executive Order 12812, NSC-8, and 50 U.S.C. Section 435 (referred to as the McCain Bill). The McCain Bill requires public disclosure of all information contained in DoD files pertaining to unaccounted for personnel from the Korean War, the Vietnam War, and the Cold War, with the permission of the primary next of kin (PNOK). However, information exempt from release under EO 12812, i.e. military plans, foreign government information, intelligence activities and other categories of information listed in the EO is excised before the document is released. As required by that law, all Vietnam-era information that is releasable is placed in the Library of Congress (LOC). This information is indexed, key word searchable, and assessable via the LOC POW/Missing in Action (MIA) website. To date, over 1,037,000 pages of POW/MIA related documents, photos, and maps have been placed in the LOC for public access. DPMO continues to review and release material as new POW/MIA related documents are created or discovered, individuals are accounted for, or PNOK permission is granted.

Please be assured that the Intelligence Community remains committed to making these records available in the most efficient manner possible and will continue all efforts to ensure that happens.
