This is in response to your Freedom of Information Act/Privacy Act (FOIA/PA) request received in this office December 08, 2015 regarding periodic internal report, memo or email describing work and accomplishments of History office....

We have completed the review of all documents and have identified 241 pages that are responsive to your request. Enclosed are 239 pages released in their entirety and 2 pages released in part. We have reviewed and have determined to release all information except those portions that are exempt pursuant to 5 U.S.C. § 552 (b)(6) of the FOIA.

Exemption (b)(6) permits the government to withhold all information about individuals in personnel, medical and similar files where the disclosure of such information would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. The types of documents and/or information we have withheld may consist of birth certificates, naturalization certificates, drivers' licenses, social security numbers, home addresses, dates of birth, or various other documents and/or information belonging to a third party that are considered personal.

As a matter of administrative discretion, we are releasing computer codes found on system screen prints previously withheld under exemption b(2). There may be additional documents that contain discretionary releases of exempt information. We will identify discretionary releases within the record. These discretionary releases do not waive our ability to invoke applicable FOIA exemptions for similar or related information in the future.

The enclosed record consists of the best reproducible copies available. Certain pages may contain marks that appear to be blacked-out information. Such black marks would have been present prior to our receipt of the file and are not information we have withheld under the provisions of the FOIA or PA.

If you wish to appeal this determination, you may write to the USCIS FOIA/PA Appeals Office, 150 Space Center Loop, Suite 500, Lee's Summit, MO 64064-2139, within 90 days of the date of this letter. Both the letter and the envelope should be clearly marked "Freedom of Information Act Appeal."

The National Records Center does not process petitions, applications or any other type of benefit under the Immigration and Nationality Act. If you have questions or wish to submit documentation relating to a matter pending with the bureau, you must address these issues with your nearest District Office. COW2015001009 Page 2

Accomplishments:

Char Cook delivered the first webinar in Historical Records Branch's public webinar series. The webinar covered the History Library website and online catalog and introduced users to many of the full-text resources the library placed online during the past two years.

Char Cook has started loading historical images from the library's photo collection into the library's public online catalog. Users can now keyword search for photos, see a web-quality scan of the photo, and request publication quality scans if needed. Approximately 150 photos have been loaded. The History Office and Library plans to load 300 photos in the initial phase of this project.

The History Office helped her to determine possible locations for the decision, searched the library collection, and ultimately advised her to request a copy of the decision from the subject's A-file.

Genealogy Program

Accomplishments:

The Genealogy Program's Admin/Customer Service team conducted an in-house quality review for fellow program staff on Wednesday, March 26th. During the two-hour session the group identified parts of the program process that can be improved and modified to achieve efficiencies while still maintaining the quality of work products. Members of the other teams gained insight into the Admin Team process and how the flow of the work affects customer relations. A follow up meeting has been scheduled to review and implement proposed process changes. This was the first of four sessions to be conducted by each of the four Genealogy teams. Participants agreed the time spent was worthwhile and will help to improve things on both a program and personal level.

Records Awaiting Declassification –

Genealogy is still waiting for OSI to declassify and return the classified files send to them prior to June 2012. OSI recently reported approving one part of a multi-part file but has not returned any documents to Genealogy.

Regarding classified material "on hold" since June 2012, OSI did provide further HSDN training to Genealogy staff Erica Talley and Paul Jones on Tuesday March 25th. Talley and Jones are now preparing to review and flag all classified documents, scan them to HSDN, and submit them to OSI for approval via that system. Future reports will address whether this new process proves more responsive.

Records Pending Receipt of Record-

Genealogy staff earlier sent a package to NYC including instructions and all SF-135 box lists for all NYC pre-1975 accessions. Recently, it was learned that NYC never received the package.

Last week Genealogy sent a second copy of the package to NYC and is awaiting confirmation of receipt from Patricia White in NYC.

FIPS/MIDAS Problems, Outages and Updates:

March 18-20, 2014, Denise Long conducted the FIPS Release 7.1.2.0 Build 3 UAT Testing in the FIPS Case Creator, Case Processing and Case Approver roles and prepared all of the related Reports of Testing Findings.

A FIPS application outage began on Friday March 21, 2014 at 7:00 p.m. ET and ended on Friday March 21, 2014 at 11:00 p.m. ET.

History Office and Library

Accomplishments:

The History Library, with the help of EOS International, loaded a QR code on its <u>OPAC (Online</u> <u>Public Access Catalog</u>) to provide better access to the mobile version of the catalog. This will allow users to search the catalog from mobile phones and tablets.

Historian Zack Wilske delivered two lectures to the Fairfax Genealogical Society's Spring Conference in Fairfax, Virginia. The first lecture provided an overview of the historical records available through the USCIS Genealogy Program; the second lecture introduced the audience INS correspondence files, which are today stored at NARA DC but included in the Genealogy Program's index search request.

Requests of Note:

From DHS Offices:

- The DHS Library contacted the USCIS History Office and Library to co-ordinate a DHS library session for students participating in Catholic University of America's Institute on Federal Library and Resources, which is sponsored by the Library of Congress Professional Visitor Program. The preliminary plan is host the students in the History Library on June 5, 2014. DHS Librarians will provide an overview of the departmental library program and USCIS History Office and Library staff will discuss the USCIS History Library.
- Stephani Reither, Field Office Director, Norfolk Field Office, requested immigration history/agency history training for Norfolk Field Office staff. The History Office is developing an overview of agency history presentation and plans to deliver it via Vtel in early June.
- Julie Farnam, USCIS Field Operations Directorate, requested blank naturalization test forms from the 1980s-90s for use in responding to a FOIA inquiry. The History Office provided historical background information, explaining that the test was usually given orally and that the format and procedures were not standardized, meaning that there was no single INS "test blank." The History

Office did provide Ms. Farnam with information from the *Federal Textbook on Citizenship*, which INS used to develop the tests, and historical copies of the "100 questions" list from which examiners chose the specific questions given to an applicant.

Academic Researchers:

• Patrisia Macias, Professor Sarah Lawrence College and Visiting Scholar at the American Bar Foundation, visited the library to research deportation, voluntary departure, and "deferred action" policy changes in the 1960s-70s. She used the library's collection of OIs, INS periodicals, vertical files, and annual INS budget requests.

Public Researchers:

• Sandra Murphy, public historian, requested information about a historical photograph of the Portal, North Dakota Chinese Examination Station for use in an exhibit on that town's immigration history. The History Office located the photo and citation and also provided Ms. Murphy with links to other historical information about Portal, ND in the library's online collection.

- Char Cook collaborated with DHS Librarian Lea Wade to repair a broken link on the DHS Library page. She also alerted OCOMM to a broken link in USCIS Today.

Accomplishments:

In celebration of Sunshine Week, Denise M. Long attended a ASAP Member's Only Lunch & Learn training session on April 10, 2014 sponsored by the CFPB Culture Team and ASAP which was titled "The Impact of Government Disclosures". Participants heard from members of the FOIA requester community on the impact of public disclosures and highlighted the best practices in transparency in the federal Government.

Record Request Turnaround and Percentages

Of the 123 Record Requests pending more than 90 days, 55 of them are awaiting a requested A-file and 18 await declassification by OSI. Thus more than half of those cases are beyond Genealogy's control.


Cases Pending 90+ Days

In past years, cases awaiting file receipt and/or declassification were placed in "suspense" by temporarily closing the case, then re-opening it again later when the file arrived or became releasable. Because they appeared closed, those cases did not appear in the biweekly/monthly reports on Genealogy record requests pending more than 90 days. At the same time, the closing and re-opening of cases distorted program statistics to the point of concern for the Office of Performance and Quality's (OPQ) National Production Report.

In October 2013 Genealogy was told that the "no more than 10% of Record Cases pending more than 90 days" measure was no longer required. In response, the program prepared to take all Record cases out of suspense and worked with OPQ to adjust and correct their reporting. In December 2013 Genealogy accomplished the change and saw the predictable jump in numbers as a result.

Only after the cases were removed from suspense was Genealogy informed the "90+ day" reporting would continue. As it stands, the numbers in red in the chart above accurately reflect the percentage of cases beyond Genealogy's control to complete in a timely manner.

History Office and Library

Accomplishments:

Librarian Char Cook loaded 280 digitized photographs into the Library's online **ca**talog. The catalog now includes a separate collection of historical images that can be searched and accessed online.

Zack Wilske participated in two panel discussions at the 2014 Annual Meeting of the Society for History in Federal Government (SHFG). The first panel provided an overview of federal history programs for graduate students and others interested in public history; the second panel considered how federal

historians deal with controversial topics and issues. The panels included historians from the Department of State, Navy, National Archives, House of Representatives, and National Museum of Health and Medicine.

Requests of Note:

From DHS Offices:

- Michael Defensor (RAIO) and Sheila Macgruder (Human Resources) requested a list of every USCIS Director's Award winner. Crystal Williams organized and Char Cook and Ijah Wilson located information about the Director's Awards 2004-2013 from a variety of sources (Leadership Alerts, USCIS Today, Google, USCIS Connect, Vertical files). The library provided the list to the requesters and created a Director's Award vertical file for the library collection.
- The History Office and Library is coordinating with the USCIS New York District Office to provide historical photos, statistics, and other information for the Office's public open house on April 29, 2014. The NYC Office will also provide USCIS History and Genealogy Program brochures to open house attendees.
- The History Office and Library is provided scanned historical images to the Baltimore Office for use in a naturalization exhibit in their new office space.

Academic Researchers:

 The History Office provided Rachel E. Rosenbloom, Associate Professor, Northeastern University School of Law with advice on requesting INS Central Office (CO) policy files from USCIS FOIA.

Public Researchers:

- The History Office provided research advice to author Julia Flynn Siler who is doing archival research to support a book about early 20th century San Francisco immigration activist Donaldina Cameron.
- The History Office provided eight scans of historical INS photos to the New York Historical Society for use in their upcoming exhibit on Chinese Exclusion policies.

"Records Found" Case Studies

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Items Requiring Action or Attention:

- The Library catalog URL will be changed again because the vendor (EOS) is moving its data centers from California to Georgia. In two weeks EOS will inform the library of the transition's exact date. After the transition the library will have approximately two weeks to update all of the catalog links on uscis.gov.
- Due to the mandatory upgrade to Windows 7 the public terminals in the Library no longer have local access logins. As a result, the Library cannot provide onsite catalog access to public researchers. Agency personnel will have access only by logging in to the library's terminals under their own usernames. The Library is public facing entity and the lack of an accessible onsite catalog makes it impossible to provide quality customer service to our users. A Help ticket was opened April 15th INC2356723, which was replaced by INC 2377153. The three public terminals are identified as CIS 121599, DHS 296820 and DHS 302243. To date the USCIS IT Help Desk has been unable to resolve the issue.

Accomplishments:

Record Request Turnaround and Percentages

During the ESD Biweekly meeting of 4/23, Lynda Spencer discussed the difficulties associated with the "10%/90 day" metric reported by the Genealogy Program. As a result of that discussion

with ESD leadership, the Historical Research Branch is assessing the current single metric for "genealogy records requests pending 90+ days," and preparing to make recommendations to the Records Division. The options under consideration are:

1. Two metrics: one addressing files within Genealogy Program control, and another one addressing files outside that program's control, and whether or not those two metrics should roll-up to an aggregate 90-day metric.

At present the Genealogy Program prefers two separate metrics, reported separately. Rolling the numbers into one aggregate would continue to conceal the issues troubling the program.

2. What a reasonable goal metric should be if we cannot fairly succeed at the current one.

FIPS/MIDAS Problems, Outages and Updates:

History Office and Library

Accomplishments:

Zack Wilske completed the first I&N Historical Research Webinar, which covered INS's most important historical records now at the National Archives. The 35 participants included National Archives and Border Patrol Museum employees, as well as scholars from Yale and the City University of New York.

Char Cook attended a tour of the Department of Justice Main Library on April 17th. She learned more about the library's holdings, including those from the years when INS was under DoJ, and saw a demonstration of how DoJ library staff track reference requests using a SharePoint-based utility.

Requests of Note:

From DHS Offices:

- The History Office provided Christopher Pleasant, USCIS Records, with a historical copy of Form I-172 for use in preparing a retention schedule for INS legacy forms.
- Sheldon Lerner, Customer Service, is viewing videos and photographs from the library collection for use in a history of INS/USCIS Customer Service operations.
- The History Office provided historical background information and photographs to the New York Field Office for use in their April 29 public open house. We received the following email on April 30:
 - We'll have some photos and press clips to share with you but I wanted to send a quick THANK YOU to you and your team for assisting with our Open House! It was a big hit and we can't thank you enough for your role in that success. It was very well attended and there was plenty of attention on our genealogy table with all your brochures,

FIPS/MIDAS Problems, Outages and Updates:

SODA Captiva Issue

Since the later part of 2013, the Genealogy Program experienced major hiccups with regard to the FIPS scanner misreading the FIPS Separator Sheets (Request Letter, Supporting Documents and Responsive Records). This issue is most noticeably recognized by two or more sequential documents appearing as one

large document with no page breaks in between. As a workaround, the Records Team have been manually inserting document page breaks and inputting document index data. As a high-production environment, having to employ these workarounds for **EVERY** batch scanned into FIPS is most taxing on our productivity.

To bring a speedy resolution to this matter, the Records Team have, on multiple occasions, solicited the assistance of the FIPS Helpdesk Team (INC2343729), but outside of a visit from a member of the CSC Team, Mr. Taylor Hope, little has been done to resolve this matter. It may be there are no provisions to support our level of FIPS production *outside the NRC*.

History Office and Library

Ongoing Concerns:

USCIS IT has yet to find a way to provide public access to the library catalog at the library's public workstations.

Accomplishments:

Historian Zack Wilske delivered the presentation "Beyond the Basics: INS Citizenship Records for Genealogists" to the Jewish Genealogy Society of New York at the Center for Jewish History in New York City. The presentation featured citizenship records available through the USCIS Genealogy Program.

Zack also gave a public program at the National Archives in New York City which provided researchers with an overview of the USCIS Genealogy Program. USCIS Public Affairs covered the event on social media and the *New York Daily News* is planning an article on the Genealogy Program. While at the Archives Zack met with Archives staff to discuss the Genealogy program and other shared concerns, such as document requests from applicants for dual citizenship.

Requests of Note:

- The History Office provided USCIS Office of the Chief Counsel with information from the historical *Interpretations*, for use in determining U.S. nationals' ability to apply for derivative citizenship.
- The History Office is providing historical photos to Refugees Affairs Division for use in promoting World Refugee Day (June 20) during the month of June.
- Leanne Leigh, Chief of Staff, USCIS Seattle, contacted the History Office for advice on allowing the Wing Luke Museum of the Asian Pacific American Experience to scan pages from historical documents currently on display in the USCIS Seattle office lobby, as well as about concerns that the Wing Luke Museum may have INS documents on display. The History Office provided general information about USCIS privacy restrictions (though all the documents in question are 100+ years old) and suggested that Seattle contact USCIS FOIA with additional privacy concerns. The History Office also contacted the National Archives at Seattle to discuss the possibility that the Wing Luke Museum had original documents on display. It was determined the documents are likely facsimiles, but USCIS Seattle will get more information when they meet with the Wing Luke Museum.

From other Federal Agencies:

- Zack Wilske met with Rangers from the National Park Service's Ellis Island interpretive and education programs to discuss possible partnerships with the USCIS History and Genealogy Programs.
- Bonnie Sauer, National Archives at NYC, requested information about a set of Naturalization Petitions from 1984 now stored at the Archives in NYC that all begin with the prefix "V" rather than the standard "P." The History Office is researching the question.

From the Public:

- Megan Vogel, from law firm Davis Wright Tremaine LLP, requested historical I-9 forms and information on expiration dates for each edition. The library sent scans of the forms and directed her to current online guidance.

Our office (GEN) continues to experience delays with cases dropping down for case creation a/f they have been scanned into FIPS. On Wednesday November 23, 2011, cases were scarining into FIPS for case creation. However, this morning the cases still had not dropped for case creation. Previously, we experienced this problem where the cases were scanned into FIPS on or about November 9, 2011 but did not drop for case creation until November 22, 2011. Please see the email communications below beginning November 10, 2011 describing our issues. Do you know if a determination has been made as to what causes this delay?

• There is a LONG record on this problem, but it has become worse since the FIPS contractor changed. As can be seen, if cases take nearly 2 weeks to "drop" in the FIPS system, that adds 2 weeks to the Genealogy processing time of those cases.

- Natasha Adigwe of the Genealogy Search team identified a 6-digit A-number in Flex in response to a Search Request. These rare numbers are all of the 900,000 series of A-numbers issued to foreign diplomats resident in the US in 1940. Rather than the AR-2 form, this series of numbers was issued on DOS form PR-1. The situation posed a problem for Genealogy: The record is found in the alien registration microfilm (AR-2's, \$20), but because they do not use form AR-2 we cannot cite them as AR-2's. The records are under an A-number below 8 million and so could qualify as A-files under the Genealogy rule. But the A-file fee is \$35 because A-files are on paper. The record in question is on microfilm. Natasha developed a solution by drafting an explanatory letter identifying the records as an "alien registration document" and providing instructions on how to correctly request it online or via mail for only a \$20 charge.

Genealogy

Stuart created a document containing form letter language for GEN Search Request Response Letters and posted it on the GEN Projects ECN page. 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NRC Trip Notes

Marian Smith and Vanessa Thornton traveled to the NRC March 20-22. On March 21 Marian Smith delivered training to NRC staff and Vanessa Thornton received training in NRC FOIA. Ms. Thornton also gathered details regarding opportunities and limitations for HQ staff to participate in FOIA overtime.

The most important findings of the trip were revealed when Ms. Smith worked with the NRC's Case Resolution Branch (CRB) staff regarding their work with non-A-files. Such files are irregular in a facility devoted to A-file processing and require a Headquarters manual search of the Master Index, or MiDAS. Unfortunately, lack of clear communication between the NRC's CRB and HQ's Records Services Branch (RSB) results in confusion and a lack of appropriate action. Two examples will illustrate the problem:

 Lack of instruction regarding consolidation of C-Files. The CRB frequently encounters Old DO Series and other odd series files containing paperwork relating to nationality status. This paperwork contains no A-number and generally no C-number. To resolve the case CRB submits a manual search request to HQRSB. In reply, RSB sends back a letter identifying a C-file for the subject of the paperwork and usually includes a print of the MiDAS index card for the C-file. But the response does not include any guidance or instruction for CRB telling them what to do with this information.

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- The appropriate guidance to be included in such a letter is as follows: "A C-File closed prior to April 1, 1956, has been identified for the subject of this request. All files and documents related to this subject should be consolidated in their C-File. Please forward your file to HQ RSB for consolidation with the Headquarters C-File."
- A cursory review of the ROH found no instructions regarding the requirement to consolidate C-Files. On the contrary, the A-file-focused ROH's discussion of A-file consolidation could confuse field staff and cause them to create an A-file and consolidate C-file material therein, which would be a violation of policy and the C-File retention schedule.
- 2. Lack of information needed to locate responsive A-File. The CRB routinely encounters "low A" A-files not recorded in CIS. To resolve the case CRB submits a manual search request to HQRSB. In reply (when found), RSB responds with a letter identifying the same A-number and file. RSB also "creates" a record in CIS using information found on the MiDAS index card. Presumably because the information from the card has been entered into CIS, the card image print is not included with RSB's letter to CRB. It would be helpful to CRB to receive the MiDAS card image for the A-File.
 - In the case of COW accessions, the MiDAS index card for the A-file contains box and accession information. For any other FCO the card indicates the FCO and the last date the file was inventoried at that location. In either case, if the card were in the hands of CRB staff, they could confirm the file indexed by MiDAS and the file in their hand are one and the same file. They could then proceed to update CIS with any missing information found in the file.
 - If the MiDAS card appeared to relate to an additional A-file jacket bearing the same number as the file in hand, but at/from a different FCO, CRB staff would be alerted to the possibility of multiple jackets and/or subject for the same A-number. This information would be of great value to a program devoted to case resolution.

The two examples above are only the two most common cases where inadequate communication between NRC and HQ cause inefficiencies and delay, and may cause deviation from policy.

Recommendations:

- Provide MiDAS access and training to NRC's Case Resolution Branch so they may employ MiDAS in their day to day operations. CRB's function is the most directly related to the purpose of MiDAS (location and tracking of files) and extension of MiDAS to CRB makes logical sense.
- Prepare and publish clear guidance on the consolidation of C-files closed prior to April 1, 1956.

Items Requiring Action or Attention:

OSI and Declassification of records requested from USCIS Genealogy: There are currently 3 files/cases pending with OSI for declassification. Those three have been with OSI since June 14, 2012. OSI has not been and is not currently accepting any additional declassification work.

OSI has communicated they review the documents for all of USCIS' as a collateral duty and do not have a dedicated staff to carry out this function. They did mention they are looking to hire dedicated staff to perform this duty in the near future. In the interim, thay are not accepting anymore documents until they complete the backlog of cases they currently have in their possession.

The Genealogy Program has approximately 14 more sets of documents that require action on the part of OSI. Per Genealogy procedure those cases are placed in "suspense" until the documents have been reviewed by OSI, deemed unclassified, and returned to Genealogy for processing and closure.

On as related matter, suspending cases means they are closed, then re-opened when the documents return from OSI, only to closed again when completed by Genealogy. This is the practice not accounted for by the MiDAS CMT system thus deflating the number of cases pending in Genealogy reports. It has been the subject of recent email discussions on the FY13 National Production Report template.

DHS Museum Task Force – Crystal Williams participated in the DHS Museum Task Force conference call on October 23.

After much persistence, the Genealogy Records Team received requested requested from the Suitland FRC regarding results of the C-File audit conducted by ROB in 2011. As expected, that data

confirmed 1) procedures developed in that project created new boxes of C-files but no new box list was ever provided to HQ Records, and 2) not all accessions of C-Files were included in the audit. Confirming these results is helpful in documenting the difficulties associated with locating, retrieving, and delivering needed case files.

January 7, 2013, MiDAS CMT was down for both Genealogy and Records Operations from early morning until late afternoon. The CMT came back after 3:00. The outage was reportedly due to a DNS problem but otherwise not explained.

The Genealogy Records Team has begun looking into the A-Files retired under accession 085-53A545 and later compacted at NRC to determine what percentage, if any, contain any documents beyond a simple AR-2 form. 'All A-files in this accession relate to subjects naturalized prior to 1953 ("A-files closed by reason of naturalization, 1940-1953) and were unfortunately recorded by NRC in CIS without status.

Though better than on Jan 22, the BSC number above is still in the yellow. The Genealogy Record Team reviewed the overdue cases and determined the main explanation rests with files that a) took 2 or more requests to retrieve, some taking up to a year to be received, and b) upon receipt the files were very large and so take more time to process by the Record Team and the FOIA Team. For example, one request just closed involved a file of more than 800 pages.

MIDAS Problem/Outages:

On February 1, 2013, Lynda K. Spencer, Chief, Genealogy Program noticed that cases closed on 1/31/13 were still active in the MIDAS CMT. She immediately reached out to the MIDAS Team to make them aware of this issue. As a result, INC000001772905 was created. After consulting with the Database Team, it was reported that an error occurred in the database which prevented the cases from processing (i.e., the database background job was not running). Consequently, the DBA manually processed and closed 25 additional Record Requests, and 23 additional Index Searches. Due to this error, the Genealogy Programs Monthly Statistics were impacted and instead of reporting a total of 199 Record Requests and 287 Index Searches closed in January 2013, 174 and 264 were reported. The unreported January work will appear in the February report.

New Genealogy Program Website

Since the launch of the new Genealogy website on 1/14/13, and the support of NGS posting a blog about the site (on 1/25 and1/28), the program received an influx of Search requests in the last days of January 2013. Specifically, from 1/14/13-1/31/13, the Program received 190 Index Search Requests, and 122 Records requests, totally 322 Search requests for the month, and 172 Record Requests. This is an upsurge of the average volume of Index Search receipts by approximately 70+ cases, and although the Records influx is inconclusive, the number of Records Requests volume increased by approximately 20 additional cases.

• History Library:

We Worked" feature. The feature highlights photographs of historical federal workers and asks readers (more than 275,000 subscribers) to submit information about their related experiences. MIDAS Problem/Outages: On February 27, 2013, the MIDAS Team made the Program aware that 29 Record cases that did not close the prior night, February 26, 2013 as scheduled. The MIDAS Team advised the Section Chief that a database error occurred which caused this issue. Furthermore, they didn't know why the error occurred and would continue to monitor the issue.

On February 28, 2013, Lynda K. Spencer, Chief, Genealogy Program noticed **that** only 17 of the 33 Search cases closed on 2/26/13 were closed in MIDAS CMT. However, the remaining 16 cases were still active. She immediately reached out to the MIDAS Team to make them aware of this issue. After consulting with the Database Team, it was reported that an error occurred in the database which prevented the cases from processing (i.e., the database background job was not running).

After further investigation, the MIDAS Team reported that a case (CMT-1124824788) caused the failure on 02/26 for the Records and Search cases due to multiple recordings of the Final Review activity.

Accomplishments:

After much research the Records Team was able to confirm that the "A-Files retired by reason of Naturalization":

- a) Have been erroneously entered into CIS due to the date in which the immigrant naturalized.
- b) Is not the file in its entirety since, from the sample taken, none of these records contain documents certifying the immigrant's naturalization.
- c) Contain much more than just an Alien Registration Form as previously speculated
- d) May be on the track to being permanently transferred to NARA (due to the immigrant's DOB)
- e) Correspond with C-Files that were captured in the last audit performed by ROB

History Office and Library:

The History Office and Library has received several requests related to the USCIS's 10th anniversary. To address these requests the History Office is drafting a review of USCIS's accomplishments during the past decade and we have partnered with the Office of Communications to develop a photo series pairing historical INS photos with analogous photos of current operations. The photos are scheduled to appear in USCIS Today and may be used in the Director's 10th anniversary event.

Due to the possibility of new immigration reforms the History Office and Library is anticipating an increase in requests related to IRCA, the last major immigration reform involving legalization. (See

In late February (2/27/2013) ESD and Records discussed Genealogy's efforts to improve their monthly production report where the numbers did not always "add up" over time. Since, Genealogy staff gathered data from GEN CMT and from the contractor CSC for analysis. That analysis identified the source of traditional problems and helped develop solutions for future reporting. The solutions demanded and allowed for changes to the content/format of Genealogy's monthly report. The two slides attached use the April 2013 report in both old and new format to identify and explain the changes. The May 2013 Genealogy report will be submitted in the new format.

FIPS Scanning Issue

On May 10, 2013 Erica Talley, Genealogy Records Team reported that "there seems to be an issue with cases scanned into FIPS that will not drop into the case create queue. The cases were scanned several times between the dates of 4/26/2013 and 5/8/2013. Lynda Spencer checked the scan reports and it showed nothing was scanned on those dates. We also checked both the "Re-Scan" application and the barcode sheets to ensure they were not duplicated.

On May 10, 2013 Karla S. Einspahr created ticket INC-1899315 for this FIPS issue. The ticket was assigned to the FIPS Support queue in Remedy.

On May 22, 2013 Craig Blackstone reported the "Root cause, "sendToFips script pointing Genealogy at 64bit FIPS environment" didn't get executed properly. As a consequence, Genealogy cases from May 6-8 were pushed to 32bit FIPS. Resolution -moved missing cases from 32bit FIPS to 64bit FIPS for ingestion".

MiDAS MSE Slow Down since 2.4.0 Revision Deployment on May 5, 2013

Paperless Initiative

On June 3, 2013 the Genealogy Program began their effort to test the feasibility of "going paperless" in processing forms G-1041, Genealogy Index Search Request, submitted over the internet.

- G-1041's submitted online represent 75% of all G-1041's
- G-1041's submitted online represent 46% of all Genealogy Requests (G-1041 and G1041A, submitted online and via lockbox)

Traditionally, the Genealogy Admin Team printed 2 or more pages of paper, prepared labels, and created manila folder request case files for each request. In the paperless test environment, the Admin Team prints only one sheet of paper, the "case worksheet" implemented with the most recent MiDAS CMT release (requested since 2008). The Genealogy Search Team then processes the entire case electronically with minimal annotations on the case worksheet.

So far, this initiative is saving time for the Admin Team as well as paper (at least 50% for those cases) and supplies (folders, labels, etc.). Later in the summer the Genealogy Program will review all aspects of the paperless initiative, report findings, and make recommendations.

The number of Genealogy Record requests pending more than 90 days again exceeded 10% of all pending requests. Review of the pending cases reveals the situation results from a number of <u>traditional factors</u>;

- Lack of CMT transparency/tools to manage cases: Until the most recent release CMT offered no effective way to "see" cases in trouble nor were there any "alerts" built into the system. The current cases over 90 days old remain from and in that environment. CMT now has a "Case Alert" function to flag any case that is inactive for a given amount of time. This function will help to manage and reduce the number of cases over 90 days in future.
- Difficulties in locating/requesting old A-files: Low-numbered A-files retired prior to and inactive since 1975 remain difficult to locate and request or receive. Requests must first go to the last known FCO for the file to obtain accession and box information NRC needs to pull the record. Unfortunately many requests cause the FCO to immediately enter the file as "Lost" in CIS. Genealogy staff work hard to persuade Field Office staff to assist in locating files, often to no avail. Meanwhile, Genealogy maintains contact with the customer who is always advised of their option to withdraw their request and take a refund. Many prefer to wait if there is a chance the file will be found.
 - The problems associated with and time required to retrieve old A-files, combined with the time required to FOIA/PA process them, are why Genealogy is proposing the A-files be removed from the Genealogy program rule and fee schedule. If they cannot be removed from the program's responsibilities then the balanced scorecard measure should be reconsidered.
- Difficulties in locating/requesting historical files from Suitland FRC. In addition to file series for which there are no current/accurate finding aids, the C-files stored at Suitland present unique problems since NARA staff changed the location of many file without adequately updating USCIS. While some of the C-files can be tracked using NFTS, most old file series cannot be tracked in any system so Genealogy (along with Records Operations) follow time-consuming manual processes to locate and obtain files. As described above, while doing so Genealogy staff communicate with customers about the status of their case and the likelihood of eventually locating the file.
 - The lack of adequate inventory/location data for historical files continues to be a part of the MiDAS clean up project discussions.

• Items Requiring Action or Attention:

ESD Hoteling Working Group: On June 26, 2013 – Denise M. Long represented AFGE Local 1924 on behalf of Records employees at the first of a series of upcoming ESD Hoteling Working Group Sessions. The Working Group plans to meet at least once every one Month and perhaps more often. The purpose of the Working Group is to discuss examine performance measures for the Hoteling Pilot that is currently underway at VER, discuss challenges and/or issues relating to the pilot and the expansion of Telework and Hoteling Programs to other HQ/ESD Components (Records division and ESD Front Office). Hoteling Etiquette/Training is currently being developed for Managers and employees. The next ESD Hoteling Working Group Session is TBD



Genealogy Program

Paperless Initiative/MiDAS 2.4.1.0 and 2.4.1.1

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New features delivered by the recent MiDAS release prompted the "practically paperless" inititive in the Genealogy Program Search and Admin Teams. Both found the new case layout screen saves time because users "click" less and so spend less time waiting for the system to respond. The case worksheet feature also suggested savings through less printing and the use of fewer manila folders.



Genealogy Search Requests closed between ca. February and mid-June 2013, prior to launch of the "practically paperless" initiative. The manilla folders represent the proportion of cases now being processed as "paperless." The blue folders, much smaller in number, still require some paperwork but less than before (thanks to the worksheet introduced with the last MiDAS CMT release).

The Genealogy Search and Admin teams continue their experiment going "practically paperless" in processing form G-1041 Search requests. The Search Team revised their SOP's to reflect the change while the Admin Team continues to collect data to measure savings in time and/or supply costs.

FIPS/MIDAS Problems, Outages and Updates:

FIPS--Testing for the next FIPS 7.0.70 deployment began July 8, 2013. On July 2, 2013 Lynda Spencer participated in a conference call regarding the deployment of FIPS 7.0.70 scheduled for some time after July 12, 2013. The NRC provided Release Notes for the SCR's, UAT template, etc. – a copy of all of which Spencer forwarded to the FOIA Team.

There were FIPS testers for UAT July 8-10, 2013. One tester worked remotely (while teleworking) and one via their desktop beginning Monday, July 8, 2013. Denise M. Long tested from home on Monday using her laptop while teleworking and Carleita Plight tested her PC desktop onsite.

MiDAS

Genealogy requests submitted online via Pay.Gov did not appear or "drop" into the GEN CMT after 12 am July 1 2013. The contractor identified two cases that somehow clogged the system preventing all others from dropping. All cases were released and flowed into GEN CMT by COB on July 8th. CSC is still working to identify the root cause of the problem.

History Office and Library

Genealogy Program

Locating Old A-Files

In the report of July [10?], 2013, the Genealogy Program reported various reasons why Genealogy Record Requests may be pending more than 90 days, among them:

• Difficulties in locating/requesting old A-files: Low-numbered A-files retired prior to and inactive since 1975 remain difficult to locate and request or receive. Requests must first go to the last known FCO for the file to obtain accession and box information NRC needs to pull the record. Unfortunately many requests cause the FCO to immediately enter the file as "Lost" in CIS....

Declaring a file "lost" in CIS because an FCO has no finding aids adds months or years to retrieving a file. For example, on July 17, 2013, the Record Team received two NYC A-files requested 11 and 7 months prior. Each file had been located in and requested via CIS. Both then were updated in CIS to "Not Found" by the NYC Field Office. Field offices perform such updates because they have no tools or information available to help them locate an old A-file. Unlike other programs who accept the update, Genealogy's Record Team persists with requests that usually, eventually, produce the file.

Meanwhile, Genealogy's Record Team has been working find a better way, and recently worked with Records Policy and Implementation to identify retirement documents for certain accessions of A-files retired by the New York District. The Genealolgy Record Team intends to obtain copies of these documents from the Federal Records Center (FRC) as no copies were maintained by the office that retired the files. The Record Team hopes to use the documents to identify the most likely location of a given file so they can submit direct FRC requests. If successful, they would request the file without contacting NYC and thereby avoiding the creation of a "Lost" A-file in CIS. This workaround solution would be used unless and until the old NYC accessions are compacted by the NRC.

Summary: In an effort to meet the "no more than 10% of Genealogy Record Requests pending more than 90 days" Balanced Scorecard measure, <u>Genealogy staff find themselves assuming more and more tasks and functions that rightfully belong to other programs</u> (i.e., OSI for declassification, Field Operations for Field FCO functions). While the Genealogy Record Team is enthusiastic and often suggests "doing it themselves" rather than waiting for others, Branch Chief Marian Smith does not like this trend and feels the cause of assuming so many duties is the Balanced Scorecard measure alone. There is no law or regulation mandating any time limit for turning around Genealogy Requests.

FIPS/MIDAS Problems, Outages and Updates:

MiDAS - Siebel Productivity Issues - On Thursday, July 11th, Demetrius Marshall, Genealogy Records Team Lead, participated in Midas testing via teleconference where again the issue involving the attachment of documents into Siebel Public Sector presented itself (taking upwards of 30 minutes to add one attachment). With both the EID network team and OneNet hoping to identify the culprit(s) responsible for these reoccurring bottlenecks, we came upon no resolution (speculation continues re firewall blockages, network restrictions, etc.)

Thursday, July 18th – Demetrius Marshall, Genealogy Records Team Lead, participated in Midas testing at 111 Mass., where again the issue involving the delayed response in attaching documents. Since this issue could be recreated by pulling the attachments from a different server, OIT was able to identify the source of the problem, namely Siebel. Initially it was thought our recent transfer/migration to DCI was the cause behind slowness issues but it turns out this was not a significant factor. [At the same time, our local server does and will play a small role because large applications (i.e. Siebel, EDMS, etc...) rely on this server and create exceedingly high traffic volume.]

FIPS - Testing for the next FIPS 7.0.70 deployment: On July 9, 2013, Vanessa Thornton began testing the FIPS UAT Case Creation performance. On July 10 and 11, 2013, Vanessa Thornton and Denise Long began testing the FIPS UAT Case Processing performance. On July 10 and 11, 2013, Denise Long continued with testing the FIPS UAT Case Processing and Case Approver performance. Follow-up stages of UAT testing continue as of July 23.

*The number of Genealogy Program Record Request cases pending more than 90 days nearly doubled in this report because such cases are no longer being placed into "suspense" and cases already in suspense have been reopened.

What cases are these?

• 24 cases previously suspended while awaiting **declassification**. OSI stopped accepting requests from Genealogy for declassification on June 14, 2012. Genealogy record requests needing declassification were then placed in suspence. Six months later Genealogy realized OSI was not going to accept any more work in the forseeable future, and so suggested some Genealogy staff be trained and authorized to do this work. This plan was approved in April 2013 and OSI began training two Genealogy staff members in July 2013. However, OSI never authorized those staffers to finalize their own declassification and OSI has been unavailable to approve anything prepared by the Genealogy staffers since. In short, OSI has not declassified any Genealogy cases for at least 18 months.

• 20 cases awaiting receipt of record(s). The majority of these are requests for A-Files retired by NYC prior 1975 that have been at the center of much discussion over recent years and months. Over the summer of 2013 Genealogy reported that requests for old A-Files retired by NYC were declared "lost" in CIS as soon as NYC received Genealogy's request for the file. In July 2013 Genealogy obtained copies of all NYC's pre-1975 A-file retirement SF-135 forms (box lists) thinking they could be used to submit requests for the A-files directly from Genealogy to the FRC in Lee's Summit. Unfortunately the FRC is unable to pull and ship an old A-file to any other office than the FCO that retired the file. In November 2013 this item appeared on the Regional Records Monthly conference call. It was then decided to provide the SF-135's previously obtained from NARA to NYC Records staff so that office can identify the location of old A-files when Genealogy (or anyone else) requests said files. The copies will be delivered to NYC shortly and all have high hopes that office will take the time needed to request the file (rather than continue to declare files "lost" as their method of delivering a "timely response").

What will Genealogy staff do?

First, Genealogy staff are contacting every requester related to these cases to confirm the customer still wants the file or wants us to continue trying to retrieve the file. Unless the customer requests their case be closed, the following will occur:

Declassification cases: Genealogy will

- 1. Identify each classified or potentially classified document in the file, remove it, and replace it temporarily with a referral sheet indicating the page/document has been referred to OSI for declassification
- 2. Process the file including referral sheets as usual, including FOIA
- 3. Close the Genealogy case
- 4. Replace the classified document(s) into the file and send the entire file to OSI for declassification whenever OSI will accept them (or until storage space becomes an issue).

File retrieval cases: Genealogy will

- 1. Deliver copies of the NYC SF-135 forms to NYC Records staff
- 2. Submit new requests for the old NYC A-files, and work with NYC staff to help them submit successful file requests to the FRC
- 3. Upon receipt of files, process and close the Genealogy cases as usual, including FOIA
- 4. If files cannot be obtained, close the Genealogy case and issue a refund

The issue was resolved by adjusting the necessary bar code fonts which allowed these users to print the bar codes necessary to scan documents into FIPS.

- i. Historical Research Branch:
 - On October 2, the HRB Chief and Historian teleconferenced with staff from the Angel Island Immigration Station Foundation. As a result of the meeting, HRB provided the USCIS History Library and Genealogy web links summaries tailored to Angel Island. Additionally, Genealogy brochures will be mailed out to park officials for placement in the museum space. - i. Historical Research Branch:

The Librarian and Historian met with Tinnina Lauver, from the Office of Intake and Document Production (OIDC), to discuss the library forms collection, OIDC's forms collection, and the possibility of combining them in the library. OIDC has two four-drawer lateral file cabinets of forms dating from 1940s to the present which they may donate to the Library. Though space may be an issue, historical forms are one of the library's most-used collections and they should be maintained and made accessible.

Genealogy Program

Accomplishments:

On February 4, Lynda K. Spencer, Chief, Genealogy Program, held her first Monthly Genealogy Section Meeting for calendar year 2014. As part of that meeting, the Records and FOIA Teams discussed various workflow concerns. To resolve those concerns all agreed to revise their telework schedules to reduce the number of telework days performed from two to one telework day per week (from four to two days a pay period). This revised schedule will be effective Monday, February 10, 2014. Mrs. Spencer and I are optimistic the revised schedule will prove to be beneficial to accomplishing the Genealogy Section goal of timely service.

Also in response to the same workflow concerns, during the week of January 27, 2014, the Genealogy Records Team provided training on conducting Quality Assessment (QA) on G-1041A Hard Copy Requests to Denise M. Long, Genealogy FOIA Team Lead. Cross-training more individuals on both the Records and FOIA teams will ensure that all vital activities can be performed by someone in the office every day.

Update on the Re-opened record requests removed from "Suspense:"

Records Awaiting Declassification – The Genealogy Records Team contacted all involved customers to confirm a continued need for responsive record(s). For those who expressed a continued need for the record, the Records Team began reviewing and processing the files. Once complete, the classified files will be properly packaged and transferred to OSI for declassification. We do not know if OSI will accept this work, per our recitation of events in our biweekly report of December 24, 2013.

Records Pending Receipt of Record – As above, all customers were contacted and in those cases where the customer expressed a continuing need for the record the Records Team has:

- Reviewed and updated all pending A-file requests
- Established a calendar to update all waiting customers every six months

• Determined to close any case pending two years without a file and issue a refund. In cases where the customer chose not to pursue the requested file, the Records Team first searched for an alternative file that might be released instead of the file requested. Failing that, they determined if the customer qualified for a refund and, if so, submitted the refund paperwork on the customer's behalf.

- Siebel Productivity Issues: On January 22nd 23rd Demetrius Marshall, Genealogy Records Team Lead, participated in Midas testing where the issue involving the attachment of documents into Siebel Public Sector was proven to be resolved.

History Office and Library

Accomplishments:

The History Office and Library partnered with Office of Policy to develop a strategy to place historical USCIS policy memos in the library's online catalog. The memos, which will be watermarked as "historical," will be available to the public and keyword searchable through the catalog's existing search function.

Requests of Note:

Ongoing:

- The History Office and Chief of the Historical Research Branch are providing background research, editing, and historical information to support the Office of
- Communication's effort to name new USCIS offices after immigrant Medal of Honor winners. In the past two weeks the History Office has provided information used in the naming ceremonies for new offices in Puerto Rico and Baltimore.

From DHS Offices:

• Tim Futoran, ICE Policy Office, requested through DHS Libraries information on legacy INS policy. The History Library provided him with dated copies of OI 214.3 from 1985 and a scanned copy of the 2 volume set *Management Improvement of INS*, from February 1981. For a separate request by Mr. Futoran, the History Library located an unpublished report from the President's Management Improvement Council report on Foreign Students in the United States, dated July, 1981. The report, located in an old Central Office (CO) policy file, is now scanned and cataloged.

- At the request of the Training and Knowledge Management Division, Office of the Chief Counsel, the History Office reviewed, edited, and provided comments for the Immigration History for Non-Adjudicators training module that is being developed for use by the USCIS Academy.
- The History Office provided Robert Sayler, USCIS FDNS, with sample images and historical information about the OS series of overseas military naturalization certificates. Sayler forwarded the information to ICE's document lab and officials at the Department of State, who used the information to help verify a citizenship document.

Academic Researchers:

- Crystal Williams assisted researcher Shaw-Taylor gather images for a book on the last 100-years of U.S. immigration.
- The History Office provided Adam Goodman, PhD candidate University of Pennsylvania, with information about the historical definitions of the terms "deportations," "returns," and "departures" and their use in immigration statistics.
- The History Office provided Anna Pegler Gordon, Professor, Michigan State University, with immigration statistics and consulted with her on finding unpublished statistical information in INS records now at the National Archives.





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APPENDIX- FOIA EXEMPTIONS (5 U.S.C. § 552)

The Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), 5 U.S.C. § 552, gives all people, including U.S. citizens and non-U.S. citizens, as well as organizations, universities, businesses, and state and local governments, the right to access information in federal agency records. The FOIA is a disclosure statute. The President and Attorney General have issued memoranda to all agencies emphasizing that the FOIA reflects a "profound national commitment to ensuring an open Government" and directing agencies to "adopt a presumption in favor of disclosure."

While the FOIA is a disclosure statute, there are provisions that allow certain documents and information to be exempted from disclosure. While there are nine FOIA exemptions, the following are the most commonly used by the NRC:

EXEMPTION (b)(2)

Protects from disclosure any information regarding internal agency personnel rules and practices; this exemption is generally applied to human resources and employee relations records.

EXEMPTION (b)(3)

Protects any information that is prohibited from disclosure by another federal law.

EXEMPTION (b)(4)

Protects trade secrets and other confidential business or commercial information.

EXEMPTION (b)(5)

Protects inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters, which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency. The types of documents and/or information that we have withheld under this exemption may consist of documents containing pre-decisional information, documents or other memoranda prepared in contemplation of litigation, or confidential communications between attorney and clients.

EXEMPTION (b)(6)

Protects information involving matters of personal privacy; generally covers information about individuals in personnel, medical and similar files where the disclosure of such information would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.

EXEMPTION (b)(7)

Exemption (b)(7) protects from disclosure records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, to the extent that the production of those records A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of a confidential source, E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or procedures, or F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual.
