The following is a summary of our current activities:

A. Hearings at which the Department is testifying:

- 1. <u>Department of Justice Oversight</u>. The Attorney General will testify before the Senate Judiciary Committee on Wednesday, June 17 at 10:00 a.m. (226 Dirksen). OLA has compiled extensive briefing materials prepared by numerous components and is coordinating preparatory sessions for the Attorney General on Monday and Tuesday.
- 2. <u>Identity Theft.</u> Deputy Assistant Attorney General Jason Weinstein (CRM) will testify before the House Oversight Subcommittee on Information Policy, Census, and National Archives on Wednesday, June 17 at 2:00 P.M. (2154 Rayburn). The testimony, which is being prepared by CCIPS, will focus on the Department's efforts to prosecute identify theft and fraud cases under federal law. The subcommittee is also interested in hearing the Department's suggestions on how the subcommittee can help strengthen identity theft laws. The DOJ witness will join other government witnesses (FTC, OMB, GAO) on the first panel; a second panel will include witnesses from the Identity Theft Resources Center, Santa Fe Group, Electronic Privacy Information Center, and Economic Crime Institute.
- 3. <u>Shell Corporations/Money Laundering.</u> Jennifer Shasky Calvery, Senior Counsel to the Deputy Attorney General, will testify before the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Government Affairs on Thursday, June 18 at 2:30 P.M. (Dirksen 342). The hearing will focus on how to curtail the use of shell corporations by criminals in money laundering

schemes. The Committee is likely to be interested in the Department's views on S. 569, the Incorporation Transparency and Law Enforcement Assistance Act, introduced by Sen. Levin, which would amend the Homeland Security Act to establish enhanced requirements for the disclosure of beneficial owners of corporations and limited liability companies to assist law enforcement in detecting, preventing, and punishing terrorism, money laundering, and other misconduct. The Department believes that federal legislation is necessary to effectively curtail the use of shell corporations by money launderers and that the Levin legislation would accomplish this goal. Other witnesses will include North Carolina Secretary of State Elaine Marshall, Janice Ayala from ICE, someone from the private sector and a local investigator.

4. <u>Safe Drug Disposal.</u> Joseph T. Rannazzisi, Deputy Assistant Administrator, Office of Diversion Control, will testify before the House Judiciary Crime Subcommittee on Thursday, June 18 at 10:00 a.m. (2141 Rayburn). The focus of the hearing will be how to safely and legally collect and dispose of unused prescription drugs. It will include discussion of legislation introduced by Reps. Inslee and Moran (H.R. 1191) and Reps. Stupak and Smith (H.R. 1359) to address this issue. The Stupak/Smith bill creates a regulatory structure in which DEA could legally establish a nation-wide program for this purpose. The Moran/Inslee bill would set up a far more onerous regulatory scheme in which there can be different approaches in different areas of the country. For this reason, DEA/DOJ prefers the Stupak bill. Additional witnesses are expected to include the Partnership for a Drug Free America and a local law enforcement agency that runs a prescription drug "take back" program.

B. Additional hearings of interest to the Department:

- 1. Native Hawaiians. On June 11, the House Natural Resources Committee held a hearing on H.R. 2314, the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act, which would recognize the indigenous status of native Hawaiians. The Committee is expected to mark-up the legislation as early as the first full week of July. Similar legislation is pending in the Senate (S. 1011). At the hearing, the main opposition to the bill centered on the claim that it would violate the 14th Amendment's Equal Protection Clause by discriminating on the basis of race or national origin. The Administration does not yet have a cleared position on the bill, but DOJ is working with White House legislative affairs and the Department of the Interior to ensure that the Administration is in a position to engage with the Hawaii delegation on the substance of the measure by the end of June.
- 2. Discrimination in the Juvenile and Criminal Justice System. The House Judiciary Crime Subcommittee invited the Department to testify at a hearing which was to have been held on June 18, but the Department declined to appear, citing the ongoing work of the Sentencing Working Group (SWG). The impetus for the hearing was the introduction of the Justice Integrity Act (S. 495 and H.R. 1412) by Sen. Cardin and Rep. Cohen. The Department has taken the position that it is premature for Congress to consider this or other legislation in this area until the SWG has completed its work. While it is unlikely that the subcommittee will stay all proceedings on the legislation until that time, we are working with the White House to develop an approach that will make it possible to work with Congress on these issues.

- 3. <u>Uighur Nationalism.</u> The House International Organizations, Human Rights and Oversight Subcommittee will conduct a hearing on the Uighur nationalist movement on Tuesday, June 16 at 9:00 a.m. (2172 Rayburn). The Department has declined to testify at this and other hearings related to the disposition of Guantánamo detainees pending the completion of the Task Force reports.
- 4. <u>Arms Trafficking to Mexico</u>. The House Foreign Affairs Western Hemisphere Subcommittee will conduct a hearing on U.S. Efforts to Combat Arms Trafficking to Mexico on Thursday, June 18 at 11:00 a.m. (2172 Rayburn). The only witness announced thus far is Jess T. Ford, Director, International Affairs and Trade Team, United States Government Accountability Office. DOJ was not invited to testify.

C. Markups:

- 1. **State Secrets. O**n Thursday, June 18 at 10:00 a.m. (226 Dirksen), the Senate Judiciary Committee is scheduled to mark up legislation to regulate the use of the state secrets privilege (S. 417). The House Constitution Subcommittee reported out similar legislation, H.R., 984, last week. The Department has not participated in hearings or expressed views on these bills pending the conclusion of deliberations within the Administration, but we have provided classified briefings to the committees of jurisdiction on litigation in which the Department has invoked the privilege.
- 2. **Media Shield.** On Thursday, June 18 at 10:00 a.m. (226 Dirksen), the Senate Judiciary Committee is scheduled to mark up H.R. 985/S. 448, Free Flow of Information Act of 2009, which would place limitations on the ability of the federal government to compel disclosure of information by journalists. The Department and the Administration have concerns that the legislation as introduced could undermine the Department's ability to protect national security and prosecute leaks of classified information. The Department has been working with the White House, other agencies and Congress to try to address concerns with the legislation in advance of the markup. It is unclear whether the markup will proceed while negotiations continue.

D. Pending nominations:

- 1. **Judicial nominees.** Three Circuit Court nominees are awaiting votes in the full Senate: David Hamilton, Seventh Circuit; Andre Davis, Fourth Circuit; and Gerard Lynch, Second Circuit.
- 2. **AAG nominees.** Three Assistant Attorney General nominees have been approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee and are awaiting votes in the full Senate: Dawn Johnsen, OLC; Tom Perez, Civil Rights; and Mary Smith, Tax. Tom Perez has a meeting scheduled with Senators Cardin, Kyl and Coburn this week to address any remaining concerns the latter two Senators may have about the nominee's prior stance on immigration issues. We do not anticipate floor action on any of these nominees this week. The nominations of Chris

- Schroeder (AAG for OLP) and Ignacia Moreno (AAG for ENRD) have been sent to the Senate but no hearing has yet been scheduled.
- 3. U.S. Attorney nominees. Seven U.S. Attorneys have been nominated and the Committee has listed three for a vote this Thursday: Tristam Coffin, D. VT; Joyce Vance, ND AL; Preet Bharara, SD NY.

E. Floor:

- 1. **Supplemental Appropriations, 2009.** We are coordinating closely with the White House and JMD on Guantánamo-related language in the Supplemental and other Appropriations bills, including the CJS Appropriations bill and the DHS Appropriations bill. The Conference Report is expected to come to the floor as early as Tuesday.
- 2. **Hate Crimes**. Senate sponsors of the Matthew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act (S. 909) have been looking for a vehicle to which it can be attached on the floor. S. 909 would simplify the jurisdictional predicate for prosecuting bias-motivated violent acts and add gender, disability, sexual orientation and gender identity as protected categories. Similar legislation has passed the House. The Administration strongly supports the legislation but prefers the Senate bill. The Department's letter of support, which includes its views that the new criminal offenses created in S. 909 would be constitutional, is awaiting clearance from OMB.

F. Briefings and notifications:

- 1. Last week, OLA organized a classified briefing by NSD and FBI on the government's use of Patriot Act authorities.
- 2. We provided notification to congressional offices of the transfers of Guantánamo detainees for prosecution, repatriation and resettlement.
- 3. We coordinated with the White House on notification to congressional offices in connection with the Department's filing in *Smelt v. U.S.*, a challenge in the U.S. District Court for the Central District of California to the constitutionality of the Defense of Marriage Act.

The following is a summary of our current activities:

A. Hearings at which the Department is testifying:

- 1. <u>Matthew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act of 2009</u>. The Attorney General will testify before the Senate Judiciary Committee on Thursday, June 25 at 10:00 am (226 Dirksen). The testimony will offer strong support of this legislation and urge its enactment without further delay. It will also explain the constitutional underpinnings of the legislation and offer a few recommendations for improving the bill. The Department's views letter on the bill has cleared OMB, and the testimony is awaiting clearance.
- 2. Deferred and Non-Prosecution Agreements. Deputy Assistant Attorney General Gary Grindler (CRM) will testify before the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Commercial and Administrative Law on Thursday, June 25 at 11:00 a.m. (2141 Rayburn). The hearing will focus on the Department's use of deferred prosecution agreements (DPAs), non-prosecution agreements (NPAs), and corporate monitors. The Department's testimony will focus on the importance of DPAs and NPAs in combating corporate crime, and how monitors ensure that corporations comply with these agreements. Legislation seeking to regulate the use of DPAs and NPAs has been introduced. (The bill is H.R. 1947, the "Accountability in Deferred Prosecution Act of 2009.") The hearing is not focused on the legislation, although we expect that the legislation will be discussed. We do not yet have a cleared position on the bill.

Other witnesses will include a representative from GAO to discuss its preliminary report on DPAs and NPAs; Professor Vikramaditya Khanna (Professor of Law, University of Michigan Law School); Chris Christie (Former US Attorney - New Jersey); Chuck Rosenberg (Former US Attorney - EDVA); and Congressmen Pallone and Pascrell.

3. <u>Tribal Justice.</u> The Senate Indian Affairs Committee will hold a hearing on Thursday, June 25th at 2:15 P.M on the Tribal Law and Order Act, S. 797 (628 Dirksen). Associate Attorney General Thomas Perrelli and Assistant Secretary Larry EchoHawk from the Department of Interior will be on the first panel. The Department's cleared views letter on this legislation supports the aim but provides a number of suggestions to improve the bill. The discussion during the hearing is expected to revolve around declination rates (the perception that USAOs regularly decline to prosecute cases that occur on Indian country where a federal crime has occurred) and tribal jail facilities.

B. Additional hearings of interest to the Department:

1. Native Hawaiians. On June 11, the House Natural Resources Committee held a hearing on H.R. 2314, the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act, which would recognize the indigenous status of native Hawaiians. The Committee is expected to mark-up the legislation as early as the first full week of July. Similar legislation is pending in the Senate (S. 1011). At the hearing, the main opposition to the bill centered on the claim that it would violate the 14th Amendment's Equal Protection Clause by discriminating on the basis of race or national origin. The Administration does not yet have a cleared position on the bill, but DOJ is working with White House legislative affairs and the Department of the Interior to ensure that the Administration is in a position to engage with the Hawaii delegation on the substance of the measure by the end of June. The House Resources Committee is planning a mark-up of H.R. 2314 for Wednesday, July 8 and the Senate Indian Affairs Committee is planning a legislative hearing on the Senate companion, S. 1011. DOJ has been invited but other parameters for the hearing have not been finalized.

C. Markups:

1. Miranda warnings. On Wednesday, June 24 at 10:00 a.m. (2141 Rayburn), the House Judiciary Committee will mark up a privileged resolution by Rep. Rogers of Michigan, requesting the President and directing the Attorney General to transmit to the House all documents, records, and communications in their possession relating to the giving of *Miranda* warnings by the Department (and its component agencies) to terrorist suspects captured in Afghanistan. We have been working closely with the White House, the FBI and the committee to respond to this and other *Miranda*-related measures. Late last week, during its markup of the Intelligence Authorization Act, the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence adopted another Rogers amendment to prohibit the use of funds to provide *Miranda* warnings to foreign terrorist suspects altogether. A similar amendment may be offered to the Defense Authorization Act tomorrow.

- 2. State Secrets. On Wednesday, June 24, 2009 at 10:15 a.m. (2141 Rayburn), the House Judiciary Committee is scheduled to mark up legislation regulating the use of the state secrets privilege (H.R. 984). Similarly, the Senate Judiciary Committee is scheduled to mark up its legislation (S. 417) on Thursday, June 25, 2009 at noon (226 Dirksen). The Department has not participated in hearings or expressed views on these bills pending the conclusion of deliberations within the Administration, but we have provided classified briefings to our oversight committees regarding a pending case in which the privilege was invoked. It is uncertain whether the two committees will proceed with their markups or again postpone consideration of the bills until the Administration has weighed in.
- 3. Media Shield. On Thursday, June 25 at 10:00 a.m. (226 Dirksen), the Senate Judiciary Committee is scheduled to mark up H.R. 985/S. 448, Free Flow of Information Act of 2009, which would place limitations on the ability of the federal government to compel disclosure of information by journalists. The Department and the Administration have concerns that the legislation as introduced could undermine the Department's ability to protect national security and prosecute leaks of classified information. The Department has been working with the White House, other agencies and Congress to try to address concerns with the legislation in advance of the markup. The markup has twice been postponed while negotiations continue, and it is possible that it will be postponed once again until after the July 4 recess.
- 4. The Preserve Access to Affordable Generics Act. This legislation is on the agenda for a Senate Judiciary Committee markup on Thursday, June 25 at 10:00 AM (226 Dirksen). Briefly, this bill would amend the Clayton Act to prohibit brand name drug companies from compensating generic drug companies to settle litigation in order to delay the entry of a generic drug into the market. Department has not expressed its views on this legislation, S. 369, pending completion of a brief requested by the Second Circuit in a case that raises the same issues. There is a chance that the Senate Judiciary Committee's markup on this bill will be postponed until after the brief is filed. The deadline for the filing is July 6, 2009.

D. Pending nominations:

- 1. <u>Judicial nominees.</u> Three Circuit Court nominees are awaiting votes in the full Senate: David Hamilton, Seventh Circuit; Andre Davis, Fourth Circuit; and Gerard Lynch, Second Circuit.
- 2. AAG nominees. Three Assistant Attorney General nominees have been approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee and are awaiting votes in the full Senate: Dawn Johnsen, OLC; Tom Perez, Civil Rights; and Mary Smith, Tax. The nominations of Chris Schroeder (AAG for OLP) and Ignacia Moreno (AAG for ENRD) have been sent to the Senate. A hearing on the nomination of Chris Schroeder has been scheduled for Wednesday, June 24, at 10:00 a.m. in 226 Dirksen Senate Office Building
- **3.** <u>U.S. Attorney nominees</u>. Seven U.S. Attorneys have been nominated and the Senate Judiciary Committee reported three to the full Senate on Thursday, June 18: Tristam Coffin,

D. VT; Joyce Vance, ND AL; Preet Bharara, SD NY. All three are awaiting action by the full Senate.

E. Floor:

1. Appropriations Bills for FY 2010. We are continuing to coordinate closely with the White House and JMD on Guantánamo-related appropriations language. Last week the House narrowly defeated, on a vote of 213-212, an amendment to the CJS Appropriations bill offered by Rep. Lewis of California, which would have prohibited funding to implement the President's executive order on Guantánamo. However, the Homeland Security Appropriations bill, which is expected to be on the floor on Wednesday, contains a committee-passed provision which would restrict transfers to the U.S. except for purposes of prosecution. Further amendments are possible when the Senate Appropriations Committee takes up the Homeland Security and CJS Appropriations bills later this week. On a related note, the House Intelligence Committee successfully resisted an amendment which would have prohibited the use of intelligence funds to transfer detainees to the U.S., adopting a modified form of the amendment that *permits* the use intelligence funds to transfer detainees to the U.S. once the administration has submitted a plan to Congress.

The following is a summary of our current activities:

A. Hearings at which the Department is testifying:

- 1. <u>Matthew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act of 2009.</u> Following the Attorney General's testimony before the Senate Judiciary Committee on Thursday, June 25, the Department has received written questions for the record, which we are in the process of preparing responses. We anticipate that the measure will be offered as an amendment to the Defense Authorization legislation when it is on the Senate floor the week of July 13.
- 2. <u>Military Commissions.</u> On Tuesday, July 7, 2009, at 9:30 a.m., in Room 106 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, Assistant Attorney General for National Security David Kris will testify before the Senate Armed Services Committee. The hearing will focus on the Military Commissions Act of 2006 (MCA), proposed legislative fixes to the MCA, and the trial of detainees in Article III courts. Other witnesses include Jeh C. Johnson, General Counsel for the Department of Defense, and Vice Admiral Bruce E. MacDonald, USN, Judge Advocate General, United States Navy on the first panel. The second panel of witnesses are: Rear Admiral John D. Hutson, USN (Ret.), Former Judge Advocate General of the Navy; Major General John D. Altenburg, Jr., USA (Ret.), Former Appointing Authority for Military Commissions; and Daniel Marcus, Fellow in Law and Government, Washington College of Law, American University.

- **3.** <u>Military Commissions.</u> On Wednesday, July 8, 2009 at 10:00 A.M. in 2141 Rayburn House Office Building, the House Judiciary Subcommittee on the Constitution, Civil Rights, and Civil Liberties is holding a hearing entitled "Legal Issues Surrounding the Military Commissions System." We have no further information regarding the substance of this hearing and have not been invited to attend.
- 4. Southwest Border. House Government Reform Committee hearing entitled the Rise of the Mexican Drug Cartels and U.S. National Security on Thursday, July 9 at 10:00 a.m. in room 2154 Rayburn House Office Building. DOJ witnesses will be AAG Lanny Breuer, DEA Assistant Administrator for Intelligence Anthony Placido, ATF Acting Assistant Director William Hoover. DOJ and DHS have the key law enforcement roles related to combating the SW border violence. The first panel will be DHS Assistant Secretary Bersin, ONDCP Drug Czar and AAG Breuer. The second panel will be ATF, DEA, ICE, CBP and Treasury.

B. Additional hearings of interest to the Department:

1. Native Hawaiians. On June 11, the House Natural Resources Committee held a hearing on H.R. 2314, the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act, which would recognize the indigenous status of native Hawaiians. H.R. 2314, the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act of 2009, will be marked up by the House Natural Resources Committee on Thursday, July 9 (committee has not published a time). DOJ has worked with DOI and WH leg affairs extensively to redline changes to the bill to increase the likelihood that the bill would withstand a Constitutional challenge if enacted. DOI and DOJ met with the Natural Resources Committee staff on Thursday, July 2 laying out our concerns with the current definition section and the evidence of self-governance. As of late, July 6, OMB was working to clear a redline version of the bill to provide to the staff for a managers amendment. DOJ has constitutional concerns with the introduced version of the bill.

D. <u>Pending nominations</u>:

- 1. <u>Judicial nominees.</u> Three Circuit Court nominees are awaiting votes in the full Senate: David Hamilton, Seventh Circuit; Andre Davis, Fourth Circuit; and Gerard Lynch, Second Circuit.
- 2. AAG nominees. Three Assistant Attorney General nominees have been approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee and are awaiting votes in the full Senate: Dawn Johnsen, OLC; Tom Perez, Civil Rights; and Mary Smith, Tax. The nominations of Chris Schroeder (AAG for OLP) and Ignacia Moreno (AAG for ENRD) have been sent to the Senate. A hearing was held on the nomination of Chris Schroeder on Wednesday, June 24, and the nominee is in the process of responding to questions for the record. The following is a summary of our current activities:

A. Hearings at which the Department is testifying:

- 1. <u>Southwest Border Violence</u>. On Thursday, July 16 at 10:00 a.m. in 311 Cannon House Office Building, the House Homeland Security Subcommittee on Border, Maritime, and Global Counterterrorism will hold a hearing on Narcotics and Weapons along the border. DEA Assistant Administrator Tony Placido and ATF Deputy Assistant Director William G. McMahon will testify. The Subcommittee intends to focus on coordination issues between ATF, DEA, and ICE related to investigations of narcotics and weapons along our borders. The recent MOUs between DEA and ICE (regarding title 21) and ATF and ICE will be a topic. We expect that the only witnesses will be ICE, DEA, and ATF.
- 2. <u>Nuclear Waste Management.</u> On Thursday, July 16th at 10:00 a.m. in 210 Cannon House Office Building, Mike Hertz, Deputy Assistant Attorney General in the Civil Division, will testify before the House Budget Committee at a hearing entitled, "Nuclear Waste Management." He will be joined by two other witnesses, the acting director of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management at the Department of Energy (DOE) and the chief of the Physical Resources Cost Estimates Unit at the Congressional Budget Office. The focus of the hearing will be on the Administration's change in position with regard to the disposal of

nuclear waste in Yucca Mountain, Nevada. The Department represents DOE in litigation concerning its obligations under the Nuclear Waste Policy Act. The Budget Committee takes an interest in these cases due to the significant fiscal liabilities to the Government.

B. Additional hearings of interest to the Department:

- 1. <u>Mandatory Minimums.</u> The House Judiciary Crime Subcommittee will hold a hearing on Tuesday, July 14 at 10:30 a.m. in 2141 Rayburn House Office Building. DOJ is not providing a witness (nor were we asked to). The witness list has not been published; however, the hearing will focus on the following bills: H.R. 2934, the "Common Sense in Sentencing Act of 2009"; H.R. 834, the "Ramos and Compean Justice Act of 2009"; and H.R. 1466, the "Major Drug Trafficking Prosecution Act of 2009".
- 2. Youth Crime Reduction. The House Judiciary Committee will hold a hearing on H.R. 1064, the "Youth PROMISE Act" (Prison Reduction through Opportunities, Mentoring, Intervention, Support and Education) on Tuesday, July 14 at 3:00 p.m. in 2141 Rayburn House Office Building. DOJ is not providing a witness (we were asked and declined). The witnesses will be Marian Wright Edelman (President and Founder of the Children's Defense Fund), Tracy Velasquez (Executive Director of the Justice Policy Institute), Sheriff Lee Baca (Los Angeles County Sheriff's Dept), Dr. Deborah Prothrow-Stith (formerly dean and professor of Public Health at Harvard School of Public Health now a consultant for Spencer Stuart), Judge Ernestine Gray (past president of the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges) and two other undisclosed witness. The Youth PROMISE Act, introduced by Chairman Scott, currently has 225 bipartisan cosponsors. The Department declined to testify because it is in the midst of White House efforts to broker a compromise between that bill and S. 132, anti-gang legislation introduced by Senator Feinstein.
- 3. Military Commissions. The House Armed Services Committee will hold a hearing titled, "Prosecuting Law of War Violations: Reforming the Military Commissions Act of 2006," on Thursday, July 16 at 2:00 p.m. in 2118 Rayburn House Office Building. The witnesses will be Vice Admiral Bruce E. MacDonald, Judge Advocate General, U.S. Navy; Lieutenant General Jack L. Rives, Judge Advocate General, U.S. Air Force; Lieutenant General Scott C. Black, Judge Advocate General, U.S. Army; and Brigadier General James C. Walker, Staff Judge Advocate to the Commandant, U.S. Marine Corps. The Department and DoD have been invited to testify concerning military commission reform on Friday, July 24. The witnesses will be AAG David Kris and DoD General Counsel Jeh Johnson, both of whom testified on this subject before the Senate Armed Services Committee last week.

C. Markups:

1. <u>Intelligence.</u> The Senate Select Intelligence Committee will mark up the Intelligence Authorization Bill for FY2010 on Wednesday, July 15 at 2:30 p.m. in S-407, The Capitol. The committee is also expected to mark up S. 147, the "Lawful Interrogation and Detention Act," introduced by Senator Feinstein.

D. Pending nominations:

- 1. <u>Judicial nominees.</u> In addition to Supreme Court nominee Sonia Sotomayor, whose confirmation hearings before the Senate Judiciary Committee began on Monday, July 13, three Circuit Court nominees are awaiting votes in the full Senate: David Hamilton, 7th Cir.; Andre Davis, 4th Cir.; and Gerard Lynch, 2d Cir. There are two circuit nominees pending in the Senate Judiciary Committee: Joseph Greenaway, 3rd Cir., and Beverly Martin, 11th Cir. On July 8, Irene Berger was nominated to be a U.S. District Judge for the Southern District of West Virginia and Roberto Lange was nominated to be a U.S. District Judge for the District of South Dakota. Those two nominees join Charlene Honeywell, U.S. District Judge for the Middle District of Florida, and Jeffrey Viken, U.S. District of South Dakota, pending in the Senate Judiciary Committee.
- 2. AAG nominees. Three Assistant Attorney General nominees have been approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee and are awaiting votes in the full Senate: Dawn Johnsen, OLC; Tom Perez, Civil Rights; and Mary Smith, Tax. The nominations of Chris Schroeder (AAG for OLP) and Ignacia Moreno (AAG for ENRD) have been reported favorably by the Committee to the Senate. A hearing was held on the nomination of Chris Schroeder on Wednesday, June 24, and the nominee has responded to questions for the record. We do not anticipate that the Committee will vote on his nomination until after the hearings on the Supreme Court nominee. There are three courtesy visits scheduled for Ignacia Moreno for the week of July 20.
- 3. <u>U.S. Attorney nominees.</u> Seven U.S. Attorneys have been nominated and the Senate Judiciary Committee reported five of these to the full Senate: Tristam Coffin, D.Vt.; Joyce Vance, N.D.Ala.; Preet Bharara, S.D.N.Y.; John Kacavas, D.N.H..; and Todd Jones, D.Minn. We anticipate that Senator Leahy will offer the measure as an amendment to the Defense Authorization bill, which is on the Senate floor this week.
- 2. <u>Military Commissions Act reforms</u>. The Defense Authorization Bill also will be the vehicle for revisions to the Military Commissions Act of 2006 (MCA). Provisions authored by Senators Levin and Graham are included in the base bill. In addition, the Department is working closely with the White House and the sponsors on a manager's amendment to enhance the protection of classified information in military commission proceedings.

3. <u>Defense Authorization Amendments.</u> Other potential Senate floor amendments to the Defense Authorization bill of interest to the Department include further restrictions on the transfer of Guantanamo detainees, curtailment of the use of Miranda warnings overseas, and various efforts to weaken current gun control laws.

A. Hearings at which the Department is testifying:

- 1. <u>Military Commissions.</u> The House Armed Services Committee has invited the Department and DoD to testify concerning military commission reform and detainee policy on Friday, July 24 at 10:00 a.m. in 2118 Rayburn House Office Building. The witnesses will be AAG David Kris and DoD General Counsel Jeh Johnson, both of whom testified on military commission reform before the Senate Armed Services Committee on July 7.
- 2. <u>Bureau of Prisons.</u> The House Judiciary Committee Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security held a hearing on the Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP) Oversight on Tuesday, July 21 at 10:00 a.m. in 2237 Rayburn House Office Building and invited the Department to testify. The witness was BOP Director Harley G. Lappin. Lappin's testimony covered the federal inmate population; institution crowding; inmate health care; inmate reentry; inmate work programs; education, vocational training and occupational training; substance abuse treatment; specific pro-social values programs; life connections; inmate skills development initiative; and specific release preparation efforts.

B. Pending nominations:

C. Floor:

1. Hate Crimes Prevention. The Attorney General's letter urging support for the Matthew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act was transmitted to the Senate leadership on July 15. On July 16, the Senate adopted this legislation as an amendment to the Defense Authorization bill, after rejecting a Hatch substitute amendment by 62-29 and invoking cloture by 63-28. A Brownback amendment was adopted that provides that the law will not be applied in a manner that infringes First Amendment rights or substantially burdens any exercise of religion, along with a Leahy amendment on the First Amendment that is preferable. On July 20, the Senate adopted an amendment adding the death penalty in certain circumstances as well as an amendment requiring DOJ to include guidelines in the USA Manual establishing neutral and objective criteria for determining whether a crime was committed because of the actual or perceived status of any person, and to undertake hate crimes prosecutions pursuant to these guidelines. (A more onerous Sessions amendment was modified to address DOJ's concerns.) Another Sessions amendment was adopted that adds "U.S. Servicemen" to the protected categories.

- 2. <u>Military Commissions Act reforms</u>. The Defense Authorization Bill also will be the vehicle for revisions to the Military Commissions Act of 2006 (MCA). Provisions authored by Senators Levin and Graham are included in the base bill. In addition, the Department is working closely with the White House and the sponsors on a manager's amendment to enhance the protection of classified information in military commission proceedings.
- **3.** <u>Defense Authorization Amendments.</u> Other potential Senate floor amendments to the Defense Authorization bill of interest to the Department include further restrictions on the transfer of Guantanamo detainees and efforts to weaken current gun control laws.

D. Briefings

- 1. <u>Interrogations Task Force "listening" briefing.</u> We have invited the staff of the House leadership and the House Judiciary, Intelligence and Armed Services Committees to a listening session with the Executive Order Interrogations Task Force director and a State Department representative on Wednesday, July 22 at 12:00 p.m. in the 2148 Rayburn House Office Building. The purpose of the briefing will be to get the perspective of staff members who have studied interrogation, transfer, and rendition issues.
- 2. <u>Amerithrax briefing.</u> On Friday, July 24, and prior to notifying the media, the Department and the FBI plan to brief victims and relevant congressional committees regarding the closure of the Amerithrax investigation.
- **3.** New Black Panthers. On July 20, career attorneys from the Civil Rights Division, joined by FBI representatives, briefed Rep. Frank Wolf on the New Black Panthers case. Another briefing, for Rep. Lamar Smith and either Rep. Conyers or Rep. Nadler, is being arranged for the week of July 27.

The following is a summary of our current activities:

A. Hearings at which the Department is testifying

1. <u>Terrorist Prosecutions.</u> AAG David Kris and DoD General Counsel Jeh Johnson, who testified jointly before the Senate and House Armed Services Committees on July 7 and July 24, will testify twice more this week regarding terrorist prosecutions before military commission and Article III courts. On Tuesday, July 28, 2009, at 2:30 p.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, they will appear before the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Terrorism and Homeland Security at a hearing entitled, "Prosecuting Terrorists: Civilian and Military Trials for GTMO and Beyond." A second panel will include former prosecutor David Laufman, a partner at Kelley, Drye & Warren, LLP; Deborah Pearlstein, Associate Research Scholar, Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs; and former NSC counsel Michael Edney, now of Gibson, Dun & Crutcher, LLP.

On Thursday, July 30, 2009, at 1:00 p.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, Messrs. Kris and Johnson will testify before the House Judiciary Subcommittee on the Constitution, Civil Rights, and Civil Liberties at a hearing entitled "Proposals to Reform the Military Commissions System."

B. Additional hearings of interest to the Department

- 1. Peer-to-peer file sharing. On Wednesday, July 29th at 10:00 a.m. in Room 2154 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee will hold a hearing on the risks of peer-to-peer file sharing. Listed witnesses are Mark Gorton, chairman of the Lime Group; Robert Boback, CEO of Tiversa, Inc.; and Thomas D. Sydnor II, senior fellow and director of the Center for the Study of Digital Property, the Progress and Freedom Foundation. While the department is not testifying at this hearing, representatives of CCIPS briefed the committee staff last week about their enforcement efforts with regard to peer-to-peer file sharing. Staffers raised the issue of Limewire's ability to breach classified documents and spread them on the internet as well as the work that Tiversa has done in this area; Tiversa is a security software company that identifies breached internet files and identity theft.
- 2. <u>Indian Affairs.</u> On Thursday, July 30 at 2:15 p.m. in Room 628 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building the Senate Indian Affairs Committee will hold a hearing examining the Department of Justice Report prepared by the Executive Office for U.S. Attorneys, "Prosecution of Serious Crimes in Indian Country," which accompanied the FY 2009 Omnibus Appropriations Act (P.L. 111-8). The Committee has invited the Department and FBI to testify concerning the increase of gang activity in Indian country; both have declined to send witnesses at this time.

C. Pending nominations

- 1. <u>Judicial nominees.</u> On Tuesday, July 28, the Senate Judiciary Committee favorably reported the nomination of Supreme Court nominee Sonia Sotomayor. The full Senate is expected to act on the nomination before the August recess. Three Circuit Court nominees have been approved by the committee and are awaiting votes in the full Senate: David Hamilton, 7th Cir.; Andre Davis, 4th Cir.; and Gerard Lynch, 2d Cir. The Senate Judiciary Committee has scheduled a hearing on the nomination of Beverly Martin, 11th Circuit, and the nomination of Jeffrey Viken, District of South Dakota, for July 29.
 - **2.** <u>AAG nominees.</u> Four Assistant Attorney General nominees have been approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee and are awaiting votes in the full Senate: Dawn Johnsen, OLC; Tom Perez, Civil Rights Division; Mary Smith, Tax Division; and, on Tuesday, July 28, Christopher Schroeder, OLP. The committee also approved the nomination of Cranston Mitchell to be a member of the U.S. Parole Commission. We do not anticipate a hearing on the nomination of Ignacia Moreno, the nominee to be the Assistant Attorney General for the Environment and Natural Resources Division, until September.
- **3.** <u>U.S. Attorney nominees.</u> Thirteen U.S. Attorneys have been nominated and the Senate Judiciary Committee reported five of these to the full Senate: Tristam Coffin, D.Vt.; Joyce

Vance, N.D.Ala.; Preet Bharara, S.D.N.Y.; John Kacavas, D.N.H..; and Todd Jones, D.Minn. All five are awaiting action by the full Senate.

D. Markups

On Wednesday, July 29, at 10:00 a.m. in room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the House Judiciary Committee will mark up a number of pending bills and resolutions, including:

- 1. H.Res. 636, a resolution of inquiry by Rep. Frank Wolf, directing the Attorney General to transmit to the House of Representatives all information in the Attorney General's possession relating to the transfer or release of detainees held at Guantanamo. We anticipate that the Committee will report the resolution adversely, effectively preventing it from going to the floor as a privileged resolution.
- 2. H.Res. ____, a resolution authorizing the House General Counsel to seek immunity for certain witnesses in connection with the Porteous impeachment inquiry.
- 3. H.R. 3245, introduced by Rep. Bobby Scott (D-VA), which would eliminate the current sentencing disparity for cocaine offenses.
- 4. H.R. 3327, introduced by Reps. Bobby Scott (D-VA) and Ted Poe (R-TX), which would authorize federal judges to impose a sentence below the mandatory minimum under certain circumstances when necessary to prevent injustice.
- 5. The markup notice also lists a number of other measures of importance to the Department, such as H.R. 984, the State Secrets Protection Act, but we do not expect the committee to take these up until after the August recess.

E. Floor

1. <u>Defense Authorization Act</u>. On July 23, the Senate passed S. 1390, the Defense Authorization Act for FY 2010, which includes two departmental priorities not included in the House version of the legislation: the Matthew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act, on which the Attorney General testified before the Judiciary Committee on June 25; and amendments to the Military Commissions Act of 2006 (MCA). The Senate and House bills must now be reconciled in conference.

F. Briefings

1. <u>Interrogations Task Force.</u> Similar to the listening briefing that was held last week for House leadership and the House Judiciary, Intelligence and Armed Services Committees, we have invited Senate leadership, as well as Senate Judiciary, Intelligence, and Armed Services Committees to a listening session with the director of the Interrogations Task Force and a State Department representative on Wednesday, July 29, at 4:00 p.m. at the Hart Senate Office Building, Room 512. The purpose of the briefing will be to hear the views of congressional staff members with regard to the issues under review by the Task Force.

- 2. NSA surveillance authority compliance. The Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence has invited the Director of the National Security Agency, the NSA General Counsel, and the Department to brief Members of the Subcommittee regarding the results of the NSA's operational review of all of its programs. The Department is expected to explain the position of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court regarding this review and other NSA issues before the Court. DAAG Todd Hinnen and NSD attorney Robert Boyer will represent the Department. The briefing is scheduled for Thursday, July 30, at 3:00 p.m. in Room 304 of the House Visitor's Center.
- 3. New Black Panthers. Career attorneys in the Civil Rights Division are scheduled to provide a briefing on this case to members of the Judiciary Committee on Thursday, July 30 at 4:30 p.m. in Room 2237 of the Rayburn House Office Building.

On Thursday, September 10 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 342 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Department's Antitrust Division will provide a statement for the record at a hearing entitled "Follow the Money: An Update on Stimulus Spending, Transparency, and Fraud Prevention," before the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs. The witnesses will be Robert L. Nabors, II, Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget; Jon D. Leibowitz, Chairman of the Federal Trade Commission; Earl E. Devaney, Chairman of the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board; and J. Christopher Mihm, Managing Director for Strategic Issues at the U.S. Government Accountability Office.

B. Additional hearings of interest to the Department

The following is a summary of our current activities:

A. Hearings at which the Department is testifying

- 1. Steroids and Steroid-like Substances. On Tuesday, September 29 at 2:30 p.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, DEA Deputy Administrator for Diversion Control Joseph Rannazzisi will testify before the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime and Drugs at a hearing on Steroids and Steroid-like substances entitled, "Body Building Products and Hidden Steroids: Enforcement Barriers." The purpose of this hearing is to examine the issues surrounding the problem of more and more dietary supplements containing controlled substances. The Subcommittee is interested in background on the wide-ranging problem of steroid use and abuse, and in hearing about the Department's efforts to meet the challenges involved, especially that manufacturers seem to be "one step ahead" of law enforcement.
- 2. Crime Victims Rights Act. On Tuesday, September 29 at 4:00 p.m. Deputy Assistant Attorney General for OLP Laurence Rothenberg and Acting Assistant Attorney General for OJP Mary Lou Leary will testify before the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security on the Crime Victims Rights Act. The purpose of this hearing is to provide a forum for the Department to outline the actions it has taken to implement the provisions of the Crime Victims Rights Act of 2004, particularly with

reference to the recent GAO Report on the subject. In order to provide as complete a response to the Committee's questions as possible, the Department is providing two witnesses for this hearing. DAAG Rothenberg will address implementation issues, while Acting AAG Leary will discuss the grant funding provided for in the CVRA.

- 3. <u>Terrorism.</u> On Wednesday, September 30 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 342 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, FBI Director Robert Mueller will testify before the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Government Affairs regarding the current terrorist threats and the nation's effort to address those threats at a hearing entitled "Eight Years After 9/11: Confronting the Terrorist Threat to the Homeland." Additional Witnesses include U.S. Department of Homeland Security Secretary Janet A. Napolitano and Office of the Director of National Intelligence's Director of the National Counterterrorism Center Michael E. Leiter.
- 4. <u>FOIA.</u> On Wednesday, September 30 at 10:00 a.m. in room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, Associate Attorney General Thomas Perrelli will testify before the Senate Judiciary Committee at a hearing entitled "Advancing Freedom of Information in the New Era of Responsibility." Miriam Nisbet of the Office of Government Information Services of the National Archives and Records Administration will also testify. The hearing will focus on implementation of the Attorney General's FOIA guidelines and other FOIA reforms under the OPEN Government Act.
- 5. Controlled Substance Abuse in Medicaid. On Wednesday, September 30 at 3:00 p.m. in Room 342 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, DEA Deputy Administrator for Diversion Control Joseph Rannazzisi will testify before the Senate Homeland Security Subcommittee on Federal Financial management, Government Information, Federal Services and International Security at a hearing entitled "A Prescription for Waste: Controlled Substance Abuse in Medicaid." We expect that the Committee's questions will focus on two areas: (1) the problem of doctors who are not legally permitted to prescribe certain schedules prescribing them anyhow, and getting them paid for, and how doctors get certified to prescribe certain schedules of drugs; and (2) the "take-back" issue involving wholesale pharmacies who ship prescription drugs to nursing homes. Our witness may be queried extensively about the take-back issue, since the staff thinks that it is very interesting, and that it was not covered sufficiently in the recent GAO report on DEA scheduling, banned providers, and doctor-shopping.

B. Additional hearings of interest to the Department

1. <u>Federal Judgeships.</u> On Wednesday, September 30 at 2:30 p.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Senate Judiciary Committee's Subcommittee on Administrative Oversight and the Courts will hold a hearing entitled "Responding to the Growing Need for Federal Judgeships: The Federal Judgeship Act of 2009." Testifying will be Judges George Z. Singal, District of Maine; Lawrence J. O'Neill, EDCA; and Gerald B. Tjoflat, Eleventh Circuit Court of Appeals.

C. Pending nominations

- 1. <u>AAG Nominees.</u> On Thursday, September 24 the nomination of Ignacia Moreno, AAG for the Environment and Natural Resources Division, was approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee. Her nomination is now pending on the Senate Executive Calendar, along with the nominations of the following AAGs: Dawn Johnsen (OLC), Thomas Perez (CRT), Mary Smith (TAX), and Christopher Schroeder (OLP). We anticipate the filing of a cloture petition on the Perez nomination as soon as the Senate completes action on the DoD appropriations bill, probably at the end of this week, which would mean a cloture vote early next week. A hearing on the nomination of Laurie Robinson, to be the AAG for the Office of Justice Programs, will be held on October 7.
- **2.** <u>Judicial Nominees.</u> The nomination of Jeffrey Viken, to be a U.S. District Judge for the District of South Dakota, was confirmed by a vote of 99-0 on September 28.

The following judicial nominations are on the Senate Judiciary Committee's agenda for consideration on October 1: Joseph A. Greenaway, Third Circuit; Charlene Honeywell, Middle District of Florida; Irene Cornelia Berger, Southern District of West Virginia; and Roberto A. Lange, District of South Dakota. These nominees were held over at the Committee's business meeting last week.

3. <u>U.S. Attorney Nominees.</u> The following U.S. Attorney nominees were approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee on September 24 and are awaiting action by the full Senate: Paul Fishman, District of New Jersey; Jenny Durkan, Western District of Washington; Florence T. Nakakuni, District of Hawaii; and Deborah K. Gilg, District of Nebraska. The Committee has on its agenda for markup on October 1 the nominations of Timothy Heapy, to be U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Virginia, and David L. Cargill, to be U.S. Marshal for the District of New Hampshire.

D. Markups

- 1. <u>Heath Care Fraud.</u> On Tuesday, September 29 at 9:30 a.m. in Room 216 of the Hart Senate Office Building, the Senate Finance Committee will reconvene and continue the markup of the "America's Healthy Future Act of 2009." This will begin the second week of markup and many amendments are still pending. The Department continues to monitor actions taken at the markup, and it is anticipated that amendments related to the fraud, waste and abuse section of the bill could come up this week.
- **2.** <u>USA Patriot Act.</u> On Thursday, October 1, at 9:30 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirsken Senate Office Building, the Senate Judiciary Committee is scheduled to take up S. 1693, the USA PATRIOT Act Sunset Extension Act of 2009.

E. Briefings

- 1. Cybercrime training for foreign law enforcement. On Tuesday, September 29 at 2:00 p.m. in Room 478 of the Russell Senate Office Building CCIPS will brief Senator Gillibrand's staff on DOJ's efforts to train foreign law enforcement on matters relating to cyber crime. Senator Gillibrand has introduced a bill, S. 1438, the "Fostering a Global Response to Cyber Attacks Act," which requires require the Secretary of State to submit a report to Congress on improving cybersecurity.
- 2. <u>USA PATRIOT Act.</u> On Tuesday, September 29, representatives from DOJ (including the FBI) and the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, are meeting with staff of the Senate Judiciary Committee and the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence to discuss reauthorization of the PATRIOT Act. Senator Leahy has introduced a bill (S. 1692) that reauthorizes the three expiring provisions of the Act while adding a number of oversight measures. While the Administration has not finalized formal views on these additional provisions, we are conveying informal thoughts and concerns to the staffers in advance of the mark-up on Thursday.
- **3.** <u>Financial Fraud.</u> On Wednesday, September 30 at 6:30 p.m., AAG/CRM Lanny Breuer will meet with Senator Kaufman regarding how DOJ has approached investigations and prosecutions related to the financial crisis, from mortgage fraud through securities fraud.

F. Floor Action

1. Foreign Evidence. On Wednesday, September 30, 2009, the House will consider for a vote the Foreign Evidence Request Efficiency Act (S. 1289) (H.R. 3133) on its suspension calendar. This bill amends the federal criminal code to allow any court of competent jurisdiction, as defined by the Act, to require the disclosure of stored wire or electronic communications for criminal investigations, including a request from a foreign authority for evidence (currently, only a court with jurisdiction over the offense under investigation may issue an order for disclosure). The proposed bill also authorizes a federal judge to issue orders to execute requests from foreign judicial or law enforcement authorities for assistance in the investigation or prosecution of criminal offenses. This bill also address in which district courts a request for foreign assistance may be filed. On July 10, 2009, the Senate passed the bill by unanimous consent. The administration supports the bill and the Department has engaged in extended negotiations over the bill.

G. Other Developments.

1. <u>National Defense Authorization Act.</u> Pre-conferencing (staff level) work is continuing to reconcile differences between the Senate- and House-passed versions of this bill, including the Matthew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act, which was adopted as an amendment to the Defense bill in the Senate, as well as reforms to the military commissions process.

1. <u>Human Rights.</u> On Tuesday, October 6 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, Assistant Attorney General for the Criminal Division Lanny Breuer and FBI National Security Branch Executive Assistant Director Art Cummings II will testify before the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Human Rights and the Law at a hearing entitled "No Safe Haven: Accountability for Human Rights Violations, Part II." AAG Breuer will address the enforcement work of the Criminal Division and potential Criminal Division restructuring to better address human rights violations. EAD Cummings will discuss the FBI's efforts as they relate to human rights enforcement. Other witnesses at the hearing will be DHS Assistant Director John Morton and Deputy Assistant Secretary of State David T. Donahue.

The hearing will focus on *Circuit City v. Adams*, which extended the scope of the Federal Arbitration Act to employment contracts, and *Gross v. FBL Financial Services, Inc.*, which changed the standard for proving age discrimination in the workplace. No Administration witness is scheduled to appear.
- **3.** <u>Health Insurance Antitrust.</u> On Thursday, October 8 at 11:30 a.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the House Judiciary Committee's Subcommittee on the Courts and Competition will hold a hearing titled "The Health Insurance Industry Antitrust Enforcement Act of 2009."

D. Markups

1. <u>USA PATRIOT Act Reauthorization</u>. On Thursday, October 8, at 9:30 a.m., in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Senate Judiciary Committee will resume its markup of S. 1692, the USA PATRIOT Act Sunset Extension Act. The Department has played a leading role in White House-led interagency negotiations with the Committee to address administration priorities and concerns. There is a high likelihood that the Committee will report out the bill once the markup is concluded. Other scheduled business includes further work on S. 448, the Free Flow of Information act, popularly known as the "media shield" bill, but the committee is not expected to resume consideration of the bill at this markup.

- 1. <u>USA PATRIOT Act Business Records Authority</u>. On Wednesday, October 7, at 12:00 noon, in [LOCATION TBA], Assistant Attorney General David Kris will participate in an interagency briefing for Members of the Senate Judiciary Committee on classified uses of Section 215 of the USA PATRIOT Act.

Other witnesses will include Michael Leiter, Director of the National Counterterrorism Center, and Rob Joyce of the National Security Agency.

D. Markups

- 1. <u>Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization</u>. The Senate Indian Affairs Committee is expected to mark up S.1011, the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act of 2009, as early as October 22. The purpose of the bill is to provide federal recognition for the Native Hawaiians. Sam Hirsch, Deputy Associate Attorney General, testified before the Committee on August 6, 2009.
- 2. <u>Health Insurance Antitrust.</u> On Wednesday, October 21, at 10:15 a.m., in Room 2138 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the House Judiciary Committee will mark up H.R. 3596, the Health Insurance Antitrust Act of 2009, which would repeal the McCarran-Ferguson antitrust exemption for certain conduct in connection with health insurance or medical malpractice insurance coverage. This legislation is identical to S. 1681, which was the subject of a hearing on October 14 in the Senate Judiciary Committee at which AAG for Antitrust Christine Varney testified.

E. Briefings

1. <u>State Secrets.</u> On Friday, October 23, 2009, the Department will meet with House and Senate Judiciary Committee staff to discuss the Department's newly-released policy concerning the assertion of the state secrets privilege and pending legislation. The Department also will provide a briefing on the new policy for the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence on Monday, October 26, 2009 at 2:00 P.M. The principal briefer will be Associate Deputy Attorney General Donald Verrilli.

F. Floor Action

- 1. <u>National Defense Authorization Act.</u> The House has approved the conference report on the Defense authorization bill, which includes the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd, Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act as well as reforms to the Military Commissions Act. The Senate is expected to take up the conference report soon, possibly tomorrow.
- 2. <u>Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act.</u> The Senate approved the conference report on the DHS Appropriations bill today by a vote of 79 19. The bill prohibits the use of all appropriated funds to transfer detainees into the United States for detention *except* for purposes of prosecution or detention during legal proceedings. By a vote of 193-224, the House rejected a motion to recommit with instructions which would have barred transfers *even for purposes of prosecution*.
- 3. Commerce, Justice, Science Appropriations Act. The Senate may take up the CJS Appropriations bill, which funds DOJ programs and operations. Among the many provisions we are monitoring is a possible amendment by Sen. Lindsey Graham which would prohibit the use of funds for the prosecution in federal court of individuals suspected of planning, authorizing, organizing, committing, or aiding the attacks on the United States on September 11, 2001.

AAG West will describe our HEAT efforts with the Department of Health and Human Services and the work we are doing with the Strike Forces. HHS Deputy Secretary Bill Corr will also be testifying.
- 2. <u>USA PATRIOT Act.</u> On Thursday, October 29 at 2:30 p.m. in Room 301 of the House Visitor's Center, the House Judiciary Committee will hold a closed classified hearing on the USA PATRIOT Act and related matters. Witnesses will be Assistant Attorney General for National Security David Kris and Michael Leiter, Director of the National Counterterrorism Center (NCTC).

- 1. <u>Congressional Notifications.</u> On Tuesday, October 27 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 304 of the House Visitor's Center ODNI General Counsel Robert Litt will testify before the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations about congressional notifications of intelligence activities.
- 2. <u>Ashcroft v. Iqbal.</u> On Tuesday, September 27 at 2:30 p.m. in Room 2237 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the House Judiciary Committee Subcommittee on the Constitution, Civil Rights and Civil Liberties will hold a hearing entitled, "Access to Justice Denied: Ashcroft v. Iqbal." This recent Supreme Court decision raised the pleading standard for plaintiffs filing civil lawsuits. Legislation to reverse the decision has been introduced by Senator Specter.
- 3. Racial Disparities and Criminal Justice. On Thursday, October 29 at 9:30 am in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building the Crime, Terrorism and Homeland Security Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee will hold a hearing entitled "Racial Disparities in the Criminal Justice System." The hearing will focus on legislation introduced by Congressman Steve Cohen, H.R. 1412, the Justice Integrity Act of 2009. This is the legislation that the ABA helped Senator Biden draft while he was still in the Senate. (Sen. Cardin has introduced the Senate companion bill, S. 495.) Representative Cohen will testify, and the Department has been invited. However, the Department declined to testify as it does not yet have cleared views on the legislation.
- 4. Federal Cyber Defense. On Thursday, October 29 at 2:30 p.m. in Room 342 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Subcommittee on Federal Financial Management, Government Information, Federal Services, and International Security will hold a hearing titled "More Security, Less Waste: What Makes Sense for our Federal Cyber Defense." Witnesses will include Former Representative Tom Davis of Virginia; Vivek Kundra, Chief Information Officer and Administrator, Electronic Government and Information Technology at OMB; Gregory Wilshusen, Director of Information Technology Security Issues at GAO; and John Steufert, Chief Information Security Officer, Bureau of Information Resource Management at the State Department.

- 3. <u>U.S. Attorney Nominees.</u> Last week the Senate Judiciary Committee approved the nomination of Ben Wagner, ED CA. The nominations of Carmen M. Ortiz (MA) and Edward Tarver (SD GA) are on the Senate Judiciary Committee business meeting agenda for October 29. Both Iowa U.S. Attorney nominees, Nicholas Klinefeldt and Stephanie Rose, have courtesy visits with Senator Grassley this week.
- **4.** Other Nominees. The Senate confirmed the nomination of William Sessions to be Chair of the U.S. Sentencing Commission on October 21. The nomination of Ketanji Jackson, to be a Member of the U.S. Sentencing Commission, is on the Senate Judiciary Committee business meeting agenda for October 29.

D. Markups

An amendment in the nature of a substitute was adopted as the base text by voice vote. The substitute will be taken up on Thursday, October 29 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building.
- **2.** <u>Webb Commission.</u> The Committee also may mark up S. 714, the National Criminal Justice Commission Act, introduced by Sen. Webb, which would mandate a comprehensive, independent review of federal criminal justice policies. While the Department does not have cleared views on the bill, it has been working with the White House to help shape the legislation as it moves through the legislative process.

- 1. Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA). On Thursday, November 5 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 430 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, Assistant Attorney General for Civil Rights Tom Perez will testify before the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee at a hearing entitled, "The Employment Non-Discrimination Act: Ensuring Opportunity for All Americans." He will testify on behalf of the Administration in support of legislation to prohibit workplace discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity. Other witnesses will be Helen Norton, a law professor at the University of Colorado; Lisa Madigan, the Attorney General of Illinois; Virginia Nguyen of Nike, Inc., who will endorse ENDA legislation; Craig Parshall, an officer of the National Religious Broadcast Association; and Camille Olson, a partner with Seyfarth Shaw, LLP.
- 2. Organized Retail Crime. On Thursday, November 5 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, FBI Criminal Investigative Division Section Chief David Johnson will testify before the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security at a hearing entitled, "Combating Organized Retail Crime -- The Role of Federal Law Enforcement." The other witnesses include: John Large, Special Agent in

- Charge of the Criminal Investigations Division, Secret Service; Zane Hill, Deputy Chief Postal Inspector, USPIS; Janice Ayala, Deputy Assistant Director, ICE.
- 3. Shell Corporations. On Thursday, November 5 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 342 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, Jennifer Shasky, Senior Counsel to the Deputy Attorney General, will testify before the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs at a hearing entitled, "Business Formation and Financial Crime: Finding a Legislative Solution." The purpose of the hearing is to examine the possible impact of S. 569, the Incorporation Transparency and Law Enforcement Assistance Act, from the perspective of multiple stakeholders, including leading U.S. anti-money laundering authorities and experts, corporate formation agents, and privately held companies. Other witnesses include: David S. Cohen, Treasury Department Assistant Secretary; Jack Blum, Tax Justice Network and Global Financial Integrity; David Kellogg, President and CEO of Solers, Inc.; and Kevin Shepherd, Partner, Venable LLP, on behalf of the American Bar Association.

B. Pending nominations

- 2. <u>Judicial Nominees.</u> The Senate Judiciary Committee has scheduled a hearing on November 4 on the following judicial nominees: Thomas Vanaskie, Third Circuit; Abdul Kallon, ND AL; Louis Butler, Jr., WD WI; and Christina Reiss, D VT. The following judicial nominees have been reported by the Senate Judiciary Committee and are on the Senate's Executive Calendar awaiting action by the full Senate: David Hamilton, Seventh Circuit; Andre Davis, Fourth Circuit; Beverly Martin, Eleventh Circuit; Joseph Greenaway, Third Circuit; Barbara Keenan, Fourth Circuit; Charlene Honeywell, MD FL; Jacqueline Nguyen, CD CA; Edward Chen, ND CA; Dolly Gee, CD CA; and Richard Seeborg, ND CA. We expect the Majority Leader to file a cloture petition on the Hamilton nomination this week. The nomination of Jane Stranch, Sixth Circuit, will be on the Senate Judiciary Committee's business meeting agenda on November 5. Irene Berger, SD WV, was confirmed on October 27.
- 3. <u>U.S. Attorney Nominees.</u> The following U.S. Attorney nominees are pending on the Senate Executive Calendar: Ben Wagner, ED CA; Carmen M. Ortiz, MA; and Edward Tarver, SD GA. The following U.S. Attorney nominees are on the agenda for the Senate Judiciary Committee's business meeting on November 5: Kenyen Brown, SD AL; Stephanie Rose, ND IA; and Nicholas Klinefeldt, SD IA.
- **4.** Other Nominees. The nomination of Ketanji Jackson, to be a Member of the U.S. Sentencing Commission, is on the agenda for the Senate Judiciary Committee business meeting on November 5; her nomination was held over on October 29.

C. Markups

- 1. <u>USA PATRIOT Act.</u> On Wednesday, November 4 at 12:30 p.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the House Judiciary Committee will mark up H.R. 3845, the USA PATRIOT Amendments Act, introduced by Chairman Conyers. The bill would reauthorize for an additional four years two of the three expiring authorities of the USA PATRIOT Act and would make various changes to the standards and procedures governing their use. It also would provide a new four-year sunset for National Security Letters and make various amendments to the provisions governing their use. A competing bill has been introduced by HPSCI Chairman Reyes which closely resembles the Leahy-Feinstein bill (S. 1692) reported by the Senate Judiciary Committee and awaiting action by the full Senate. A departmental views letter on the Senate bill is awaiting OMB clearance.
- 2. State Secrets Protection Act. The House Judiciary Committee may also mark up H.R. 984, a bill introduced by Rep. Nadler to establish statutory procedures to govern assertions of the state secrets privilege. While the Department does not have a formal position on the bill, some of its provisions would codify portions of the Attorney General's September 23 memorandum on *Policies and Procedures Governing the Invocation of the State Secrets Privilege*.
- **3.** <u>Media Shield.</u> On Thursday, November 5 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Senate Judiciary Committee will likely resume consideration of S. 448, the Free Flow of Information Act, popularly known as the "media shield" bill. After extended negotiations the administration has reached agreement with the committee on language that substantially addresses the Department's concerns.
- 4. <u>Data Security.</u> The Senate Judiciary Committee also will mark up two bills relating to data privacy: S. 139, the Data Breach Notification Act, introduced by Sen. Feinstein, and S. 1490, the Personal Data Privacy and Security Act of 2009, introduced by Sens. Leahy, Specter, Feingold, Schumer, and Cardin. The purpose of both bills is to prevent identity theft, ensure privacy, and provide enhanced penalties for security breaches, fraudulent access, and misuse of personally identifiable information. The Department has concerns with the bills, and we are scheduled to meet with Sen. Leahy's staff next week once our talking points have cleared OMB.
- 5. <u>Human Rights.</u> The Senate Judiciary Committee is also likely to mark up S. 1472, the "Human Rights Enforcement Act of 2009," introduced by Senators Durbin and Coburn. The bill would establish a section within the Criminal Division of the Department of Justice to enforce human rights laws, to make technical and conforming amendments to criminal and immigration laws pertaining to human rights violations, and for other purposes. There is no House companion for S. 1472. The Department is working closely with Sen. Durbin's staff to address administration concerns with the legislation. In addition, Asst. Attorney General Lanny Breuer testified in October on accountability for human rights violations before Sen. Durbin's Judiciary Subcommittee on Human Rights and the Law.

D. Briefings

- 1. <u>Plane Shot Down in 2001.</u> On Thursday, November 5 at 10:30 a.m. in Room 304 of the House Visitors Center, a Department representative will brief Members of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence Oversight Subcommittee regarding the Department's investigation and declination decision in a particular law enforcement matter involving the death of Michigan constituents of Ranking Minority Member Hoekstra.
- **2.** <u>Amerithrax.</u> This week, the Department and the FBI plan to brief victims and notify relevant congressional committees regarding the closure of the Amerithrax investigation, a comprehensive investigation into the 2001 anthrax attacks which killed five individuals and sickened 17 others.

It is anticipated that NSA and DOJ will provide a similar briefing to Senate Intelligence and Judiciary Committee staff.
- 3. Native Hawaiians. The Department, along with representatives from the White House and Department of Interior, will meet later this week with members of the Hawaii delegation to discuss an interagency redline of H.R. 2314, Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act of 2009 (the exact date and time of the meeting is still TBD). This bill addresses the United States' relationship with Native Hawaiians and the process by which the United States would recognize the Native Hawaiian governing entity. This is the latest in a series of Administration-Hill meetings attempting to achieve consensus on the bill's language prior to

mark-up, expected to be on the December 3 business agenda of the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs.

4. <u>Guantanamo photos</u>. ODNI, CIA, DOD and FBI are scheduled to brief House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence Members on Wednesday, November 18, at 4:00 p.m. concerning the investigation surrounding photos found at the Guantanamo Bay detention facility.

1. Youth PROMISE Act. On Wednesday, December 2 at 10:15 in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the House Judiciary Committee will mark up H.R. 1064, the Youth PROMISE Act. The bill, introduced by Crime Subcommittee Chairman Bobby Scott (D-VA), seeks to promote promising, evidence-based prevention and intervention programs

aimed at juvenile delinquency and criminal gang activity. The Department has provided technical assistance to the authors of the bill, and the Judiciary Committee plans to incorporate DOJ's suggestions with respect to those portions of the bill that come within the Committee's jurisdiction. (The bill also has been referred to the Education and Labor Committee, which has not yet scheduled it for markup.)

- 2. Media Shield; Criminal Justice Legislation. On Thursday, December 3 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Senate Judiciary Committee will resume consideration of S. 448, the Free Flow of Information Act, popularly known as the "media shield" bill. After extended negotiations the administration has reached agreement with the committee on language that substantially addresses the Department's concerns. Also scheduled for markup are S. 714, to establish a National Criminal Justice Commission; S. 1765, to amend the Hate Crime Statistics Act to include crimes against the homeless; and S. 678, to reauthorize the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act.
- 3. Native Hawaiians. The Department, along with representatives from the White House and Department of Interior (DOI), met last week with Hawaii delegation staff to discuss the delegation's reaction to an interagency redline of H.R. 2314, Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act of 2009. This week, DOJ and DOI will again submit suggested revisions to the bill based on ongoing input from all parties. The Hawaii delegation is expected to seek mark-up of the bill later this week or next week by the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs.

- 2. <u>Criminal Justice Legislation.</u> Also slated for the Senate Judiciary Committee markup are a number of criminal justice bills. S. 714, the National Criminal Justice Commission Act, introduced by Senator Webb, would create a commission to study and make recommendations regarding the criminal justice system, mirroring in many respects the work of the Attorney General's Sentencing Reform Working Group. The Department is working with the White House to address various concerns with the bill. S. 678 would reauthorize the

Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974. The bill will likely be held over for one week. Meanwhile, the Department's views are awaiting clearance with OMB. S. 1789, the Fair Sentencing Act (Durbin), would eliminate sentencing disparities between powder cocaine and crack. The Department supports eliminating the disparity; recommendations on how that is best accomplished have been developed by the DOJ Sentencing Working Group and are awaiting ODAG approval.

- 1. <u>Guantanamo Detainees.</u> On Thursday, December 10 at 1:00 p.m. in Room 210 of the House Visitor's Center, Brad Wiegmann, Principal Deputy Assistant Attorney General, National Security Division, and Jeh Johnson, DOD General Counsel, will brief members of the House Armed Services Committee on the recent decision to transfer some 9/11 detainees for prosecution in federal court and to try another group of detainees before reformed military commissions.

While the Administration supports the bill (a Statement of Administration Position urging House passage of the bill is likely to be issued this week) there are several provisions that have raised significant concerns for DOJ components, including a provision that would allow a court to direct the disclosure of grand jury information to the SEC upon a finding of a "substantial need in the public interest." A leadership amendment is expected to address some of our concerns, and we will be working with the White House and the Senate to try to identify ways to provide the SEC and other agencies with investigative tools without expanding access of grand jury information.

On Wednesday, December 16, 2009 at 10:30 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, Assistant Attorney General for the Civil Rights Division Tom Perez will testify before the Senate Judiciary Committee's Subcommittee on Human Rights and the Law, at a hearing entitled "The Law of the Land: U.S. Implementation of Human Rights Treaties." This will be the first Congressional hearing on U.S. implementation of its human rights treaty obligations, including the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, the Convention on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination, the Convention Against Torture, and others. The hearing will examine what the U.S. government is doing and what more it could do to fulfill its treaty obligations and promote human rights. In addition to AAG Perez, witnesses include: Michael Posner, Assistant Secretary of State for Democracy, Human Rights and Labor; Wade Henderson, Executive Director, Leadership Conference of Civil Rights; and Elisa Massimino, CEO and Executive Director, Human Rights First. The testimony of AAG Perez will focus not only on our commitment to working with the State Department to meet our reporting obligations but also on the Administration's commitment to reinvigorating enforcement of all of the civil rights laws.

- 2. OIG Reports. E. Briefings

1. <u>Thomson Acquisition.</u> On Wednesday, December 16 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 210 of the House Visitors Center, the House Armed Services Committee will hold a Member briefing on the decision to acquire the Thomson Correctional Center to house federal maximum security inmates, including some Guantanamo detainees. Harley Lappin, Director of the Bureau of Prisons, will appear on behalf of the Department. Also participating will be Deputy Secretary of Defense William J. Lynn.

F. Floor Action

- 1. Establishment of Human Rights Section within the Criminal Division. S.1472, the Human Rights Enforcement Act, sponsored by Senator Durbin and approved by the Senate, is on the House Suspension Calendar for Tuesday December 15, 2009. This legislation authorizes the Department to merge two sections in the Department's Criminal Division the Domestic Security Section (DSS) and the Office of Special Investigations (OSI). The legislation would make the statutory changes necessary to effect the merger of the two sections into the Human Rights and Special Prosecutions Section since OSI was statutorily created.
- **2.** <u>USA PATRIOT Act Reauthorization</u>. Both the House and Senate Judiciary Committees have approved legislation to reauthorize the expiring provisions of the USA PATRIOT Act. We anticipate that Congress will include a short-term extension of the expiring provisions in the Defense Appropriations Bill this week and will resume consideration of the reauthorization bill in 2010.

G. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>USA PATRIOT Act.</u> Congress will resume consideration of reauthorization legislation when the new Session begins.
- 2. <u>Disclosure of Grand Jury Materials.</u> On Saturday, December 12, the House passed H.R. 4173, the Wall Street Reform & Consumer Protection Act. That measure combines in a single vehicle a number of financial reforms, and includes a provision that would allow a court to direct the disclosure of grand jury information to the SEC upon a motion by an attorney for the government. While the Administration supports the bill as whole (a SAP in support was issued December 8), various components have significant concerns with the provision. We will continue discussions with the SEC and will work with the White House and the Senate to ensure that grand jury secrecy is protected to the greatest extent possible.

3. <u>Cobell Settlement Implementation.</u> The Settlement Agreement in *Cobell v. Salazar* requires the enactment of implementing legislation by Congress no later than December 31, 2009. The Department is working closely with the Department of the Interior toward that end.

The other witnesses on the panel will be: Chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission Mary Schapiro and Chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation Sheila Bair. The Financial Crisis Inquiry Commission was created when the Financial Enforcement and Recovery Act of 2009 (PL 111-21) was signed into law on May 29, 2009. A question and answer session will follow his opening remarks. This event will also provide an opportunity to present information on the Ft. Hood shooting incident. This is a closed briefing. It is expected that Mr. Brennan will provide a similar briefing for Senate Members next week.

Several other briefings concerning the intelligence about Detroit Flight 253 will be held this week. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) is briefing Senate Commerce staff, and Department of State (State) is briefing staff from the House Foreign Affairs Committee on January 11, 2010. On January 12, 2010, the FBI, National Counterterrorism Center (NCTC), DHS, State, CIA and NSA will brief Senate Appropriations Committee staff in a closed meeting. On January 13, Director of National Intelligence Blair and Director of NCTC Leiter will brief House Intelligence Committee Members about the intelligence issues related to the incident. FBI, DHS, CIA, NSA, and State will be available for questions at the briefing. Also on January 13, staff from DHS, NCTC, and State will brief House Transportation and Infrastructure, Aviation staff.

E. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>USA PATRIOT Act.</u> At the close of last session, both the Senate and House Judiciary Committees had approved legislation to reauthorize expiring provisions of the USA PATRIOT Act, but neither measure had reached the floor. The Department issued a views letter expressing its support for the Senate bill, while continuing to work with the House Judiciary Committee to resolve our concerns with their version of the bill. The Senate Judiciary Committee made a last-minute push to include the reauthorization in the omnibus appropriations bill, but differences with the House could not be overcome and Congress included only a 60-day extension of the expiring authorities. We expect to resume discussions shortly with both houses in an effort to resolve remaining issues.
- 2. Flight 253. In addition to the briefings described above, various committees will hold briefings and hearings on Flight 253 during the coming weeks. On Wednesday, January 20, at 10:00 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Senate Judiciary Committee will hold a hearing entitled, "Securing America's Safety: Improving the Effectiveness of Anti-Terrorism Tools and Inter-Agency Communication." This will be an open hearing at which the Committee has invited Director Mueller to testify. A representative from the State Department also has been invited to appear. Additional hearings will take place on January 20, before the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and the Senate Commerce Committee. On January 21, the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence will hold a closed hearing with DNI Blair and NCTC Director Leiter. Finally, the House Appropriations Committee will hold a closed Member level briefing on January 19 with participation from FBI, NCTC, and State.
- **3.** <u>Heath Care Reform.</u> Negotiations between the House and Senate are ongoing, with no formal conference expected to take place. A number of provisions are of particular interest to the Department, including those relating to health care fraud enforcement and antitrust issues.

- **4.** <u>Cobell Settlement Implementation.</u> The deadline for enactment of legislation to implement the settlement agreement in *Cobell v. Salazar* has been extended to February 28, 2010, by agreement of the parties. The Department will work closely with the Department of the Interior toward enactment of the required legislation.
- 5. <u>Fugitive Apprehensions</u>: On Tuesday, January 19, 2010, at 9:30 a.m. at the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime and Drugs will hold a hearing entitled, "Exploring Federal Solutions to the State and Local Fugitive Crisis." The hearing will, among other things, focus on the Department of Justice's role in apprehending fugitives and how the Department coordinates with state and local law enforcement to do so. Chairman Specter will preside. The U.S. Marshals Service and the Federal Bureau of Investigation will send witnesses to the hearing and will submit written testimony for the record.

We have resumed discussions with House Judiciary to resolve the remaining differences.
- 2. The Detroit flight incident. In addition to the hearings and briefings described above, various committees will hold briefings and hearings on issues related to Flight 253. For example, throughout the month of February, the House and Senate Intelligence Committees will hold open and closed hearings regarding the threat assessment and analysis of terrorist threats in Yemen and Somalia.
- **3.** <u>Heath Care Reform.</u> Negotiations between the House and Senate are ongoing, with no formal conference expected to take place. A number of provisions are of particular interest to the Department, including those relating to health care fraud enforcement and antitrust issues.
- 4. <u>Cobell Settlement Implementation.</u> The deadline for enactment of legislation to implement the settlement agreement in Cobell v. Salazar has been extended to February 28, 2010, by agreement of the parties. The Department will work closely with the Department of the Interior toward enactment of the required legislation.
- **5. FY11 DOJ Budget Briefings.** The Department is finalizing details to provide overview briefings to the Commerce, Justice, Science appropriations subcommittee staff as well as the committee and personal staff on the Judiciary committees. The budget is set to be released on Monday, February 1 and the briefings are expected to begin on Wednesday, February 3.

C. Markups

Also on the agenda is S. 1741, the Witness Security and Protection Grant Program. This bill would direct the Attorney General to make competitive grants to states, tribal, and local

governments to establish or maintain programs to protect or assist witnesses in certain court proceedings. The Department has some technical concerns with the bill.

Other bills on markup calendar include: S. 1624, the Medical Bankruptcy Fairness Act of 2009; S.1765, the Hate Crimes Against the Homeless Statistics Act of 2009; and S.1749, the Cell Phones Contraband Act.

2. <u>Missing Persons.</u> On Wednesday, January 27 at 10:15 a.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security will mark up H.R. 3695, the "Help Find the Missing Act" or "Billy's Law," concerning the sharing of data between the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs) and National Crime Information Center (NCIC). On Thursday, January 21, National Institute of Justice Acting Director Kris Rose and FBI Criminal Justice Information Services Deputy Assistant Director Stephen Morris testified in support of the legislation.

D. Briefings

- 1. <u>High Value Detainee Interrogation Group (HIG)</u>. On Tuesday, January 26 at 3:00 p.m., in Room 304 of the House Visitor's Center, HIG Director Andrew McCabe will brief House Intelligence staff regarding the HIG's mandate and provide a status update.
- **2.** <u>Intellectual Property.</u> On Wednesday, January 27, DAAG Jason Weinstein will meet with Congressman Chris Murphy regarding discuss piracy and copyright infringement issues.
- **3.** <u>Human Rights Enforcement.</u> The FBI and the Criminal Division will brief Senator Durbin's Judiciary staff this week (time to be determined) regarding the ongoing merger of DSS and OSI in the Criminal Division. Senator Durbin sponsored legislation, which was signed by the President in December 2009, approving the merger of these two Criminal Division sections.

E. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Detainee Transfers.</u> Next week, the Department will participate in interagency briefings for staff of House and Senate Leadership and various committees on the process of resettling and repatriating Guantanamo detainees. We also anticipate significant congressional activity over the next several weeks as various committees, including the Judiciary, Intelligence, and Homeland Security Committees, schedule hearings and briefings regarding the transfer of Guantanamo detainees to locations in the U.S. for purposes of prosecution and detention. We anticipate that many of the panels will include DOJ participation.
- 2. <u>USA PATRIOT Act and Use of Exigent Letters.</u> At the close of last session, both the Senate and House Judiciary Committees had approved legislation to reauthorize expiring provisions of the USA PATRIOT Act, but neither measure had reached the floor. The Department issued a views letter expressing its support for the Senate bill, while continuing

to work with the House Judiciary Committee to resolve our concerns with their version of the bill. The Senate Judiciary Committee made a last-minute push to include the reauthorization in the omnibus appropriations bill, but differences with the House could not be overcome and Congress included only a 60-day extension of the expiring authorities. We have resumed discussions with the committees to resolve remaining issues and anticipate that the White House will convene an interagency meeting next week on strategy for completing action on the bill.

We anticipate that the Department will be asked to provide briefings and testimony regarding the January 22 OIG report on the FBI's use of exigent letters. It also is possible that the Judiciary Committees will wish to consider the findings and recommendations of the OIG report in the context of the PATRIOT Act reauthorization.

- **3.** Aviation Security and the Detroit Flight Incident. Various committees will hold briefings and hearings throughout the month of February on issues related to Flight 253. These will include open and closed hearings before the House and Senate Intelligence Committees regarding assessments and analysis of terrorist threats in Yemen and Somalia.
- **4.** <u>Heath Care Reform.</u> No process for moving forward has yet been determined. A number of provisions are of particular interest to the Department, including those relating to health care fraud enforcement and antitrust issues.
- 5. <u>Cobell Settlement Implementation.</u> The deadline for enactment of legislation to implement the settlement agreement in Cobell v. Salazar has been extended to February 28, 2010, by agreement of the parties. The Department is working closely with the Department of the Interior toward enactment of the required legislation.
- **6. FY11 DOJ Budget Briefings.** The FY2011 budget will be released on Monday, February 1, and the Department is finalizing arrangements for staff briefings later that week for the Judiciary Committees and the Commerce, Justice, Science Appropriations Subcommittees.
- 7. Native Hawaiians. Representatives from DOJ, DOI and the White House continue to provide technical assistance the HI congressional delegation on legislation that would federally recognize Native Hawaiians. Representative Abercrombie, who is due to resign on February 28, 2010, is expected to bring an amended version of H.R. 2314 to the House floor in the first two weeks of February.
- **8.** <u>Tribal Law and Order.</u> In the Senate, Senator Dorgan is again attempting to "hotline" the Tribal Law and Order Act of 2009 for unanimous approval by the Senate.

Other bills on markup calendar include: S. 1624, the Medical Bankruptcy Fairness Act of 2009; S.1765, the Hate Crimes Against the Homeless Statistics Act of 2009; and S.1132, the Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act Improvements Act.

2. <u>Missing Persons.</u> On Wednesday, January 27 at 10:15 a.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security will mark up H.R. 3695, the "Help Find the Missing Act" or "Billy's Law," concerning the sharing of data between the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs) and National Crime Information Center (NCIC). On Thursday, January 21, National Institute of Justice Acting Director Kris Rose and FBI Criminal Justice

Information Services Deputy Assistant Director Stephen Morris testified in support of the legislation.

D. Briefings

- 1. <u>Human Rights.</u> On February 3 at 1:30 p.m., representatives from the Criminal Division will meet with Rep. Adam Schiff to provide an introductory briefing on Nazi prosecutions and deportations. We will also provide information on the types of cases open to the public that are currently being pursued, which foreign governments are not fulfilling their role in the problem, and any ideas on how to prompt these governments to do more.
- 2. <u>High Value Detainee Interrogation Group (HIG)</u>. On Tuesday, January 26 at 3:00 p.m., in Room 304 of the House Visitor's Center, HIG Director Andrew McCabe will brief House Intelligence staff regarding the HIG's mandate and provide a status update.
- 3. <u>Intellectual Property.</u> On Wednesday, January 27, DAAG Jason Weinstein will meet with Congressman Chris Murphy regarding discuss piracy and copyright infringement issues.
- **4.** <u>Human Rights Enforcement.</u> The FBI and the Criminal Division will brief Senator Durbin's Judiciary staff this week (time to be determined) regarding the ongoing merger of DSS and OSI in the Criminal Division. Senator Durbin sponsored legislation, which was signed by the President in December 2009, approving the merger of these two Criminal Division sections.

E. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Detainee Transfers.</u> Next week, the Department will participate in interagency briefings for staff of House and Senate Leadership and various committees on the process of resettling and repatriating Guantanamo detainees. We also anticipate significant congressional activity over the next several weeks as various committees, including the Judiciary, Intelligence, and Homeland Security Committees, schedule hearings and briefings regarding the transfer of Guantanamo detainees to locations in the U.S. for purposes of prosecution and detention. We anticipate that many of the panels will include DOJ participation.
- 2. USA PATRIOT Act and Use of Exigent Letters. At the close of last session, both the Senate and House Judiciary Committees had approved legislation to reauthorize expiring provisions of the USA PATRIOT Act, but neither measure had reached the floor. The Department issued a views letter expressing its support for the Senate bill, while continuing to work with the House Judiciary Committee to resolve our concerns with their version of the bill. The Senate Judiciary Committee made a last-minute push to include the reauthorization in the omnibus appropriations bill, but differences with the House could not be overcome and Congress included only a 60-day extension of the expiring authorities. We have resumed discussions with the committees to resolve remaining issues and anticipate that the White

House will convene an interagency meeting next week on strategy for completing action on the bill.

We anticipate that the Department will be asked to provide briefings and testimony regarding the January 22 OIG report on the FBI's use of exigent letters. It also is possible that the Judiciary Committees will wish to consider the findings and recommendations of the OIG report in the context of the PATRIOT Act reauthorization.

- **3.** Aviation Security and the Detroit Flight Incident. Various committees will hold briefings and hearings throughout the month of February on issues related to Flight 253. These will include open and closed hearings before the House and Senate Intelligence Committees regarding assessments and analysis of terrorist threats in Yemen and Somalia.
- **4.** <u>Heath Care Reform.</u> No process for moving forward has yet been determined. A number of provisions are of particular interest to the Department, including those relating to health care fraud enforcement and antitrust issues.
- **5.** <u>Cobell Settlement Implementation.</u> The deadline for enactment of legislation to implement the settlement agreement in Cobell v. Salazar has been extended to February 28, 2010, by agreement of the parties. The Department is working closely with the Department of the Interior toward enactment of the required legislation.
- 6. <u>FY11 DOJ Budget Briefings.</u> The FY2011 budget will be released on Monday, February 1, and the Department is finalizing arrangements for staff briefings later that week for the Judiciary Committees and the Commerce, Justice, Science Appropriations Subcommittees.
- 7. Native Hawaiians. Representatives from DOJ, DOI and the White House continue to provide technical assistance the HI congressional delegation on legislation that would federally recognize Native Hawaiians. Representative Abercrombie, who is due to resign on February 28, 2010, is expected to bring an amended version of H.R. 2314 to the House floor in the first two weeks of February.
- **8.** <u>Tribal Law and Order.</u> Senator Dorgan is again attempting to "hotline" the Tribal Law and Order Act of 2009 for unanimous approval by the Senate.

A. Hearings at which the Department is testifying

- 1. <u>Child Prostitution.</u> On Wednesday, February 24, at 10:30 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Missouri Beth Phillips will testify before the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Human Rights and the Law at a hearing entitled "In Our Own Backyard: Child Prostitution and Sex Trafficking in the United States." The hearing will address the work of the Criminal Division's Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section (CEOS). The Committee also would like to discuss the treaty on the Convention on the Rights of the Child. The Criminal Division will brief Senator Durbin's staff in advance of the hearing to discuss these issues.
- 2. <u>Nominations.</u> On Wednesday, February 24, at 2:00 p.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Senate Judiciary Committee will hold a hearing on nominations. On the agenda are Brian Jackson, to be United States District Judge for the Middle District of Louisiana; Elizabeth Foote, to be United States District Judge for the Western District of Louisiana; Marc Treadwell, to be United States District Judge for the Middle District of Georgia; Josephine Tucker, to be United States District Judge for the Central District of

California; and Mark Goldsmith, to be United States District Judge for the Eastern District of Michigan.

- 3. OIG Reports concerning the FBI. On Wednesday, February 24 at 3:00 p.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, Inspector General Glenn Fine, Section Chief of the FBI Language Services division Margeret Gulotta, and Jennifer Shasky Calvery of ODAG will testify before the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security at a hearing entitled, "Recent Inspector General Reports Concerning the FBI." The hearing will focus on the Department's response to findings and recommendations contained in three OIG reports, concerning: explosives investigation coordination, anti-gang intelligence coordination, and the FBI's foreign language translation program.
- 4. FY 2011 Tribal Budget. On Thursday, February 25 at 2:15 p.m. in Room 628 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, Associate Attorney General Thomas Perrelli will testify before the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs at an Oversight Hearing to Examine Tribal Programs and Initiatives Proposed in the President's Fiscal Year 2011 Budget. Other first panel witnesses are: Larry Echo Hawk, Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior; and Director Yvette Roubideaux, Indian Health Service, Department of Health and Human Services. Second panel witnesses are: National Congress of American Indians President Jefferson Keel, National Indian Education Association President Patricia Whitefoot, and National American Indian Housing Council President Marty Shuravloff.
- 5. OPR Report. On Friday, February 26 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, Acting Deputy Attorney General Gary Grindler will testify before the Senate Judiciary Committee at a hearing entitled, "The Office of Professional Responsibility Investigation into the Office of Legal Counsel Memoranda." The hearing will examine the findings of the OPR investigation of Department attorneys who provided legal advice regarding interrogation of individuals captured and detained after September 11, 2001. It is anticipated that the House Judiciary Committee also will conduct a hearing on this topic in the near future.

The hearing will explore OJP's Bureau of Justice Statistics' Report entitled "Sexual Victimization in Juvenile Facilities Reported by Youth, 2009-2009," released on January 7, 2010. While the report focuses on specific types of juvenile facilities – larger facilities that typically hold adjudicated youth for longer periods – the Department will make clear its commitment to addressing confinement issues for all youth in all facilities. Witnesses are: Brenda Smith, Professor of Law at Washington College of Law at American University; Troy Erik Isaac, victim; Bernard Warner (Tentative), Chief Deputy Secretary for Juvenile Justice, Department

- of Corrections and Rehabilitation Division of Juvenile Justice in Sacramento, CA; Gabriel Morgan, Sheriff, Newport News, VA; and Grace Bauer, Campaign for Youth Justice.
- 2. Media and Entertainment Distribution Market. On Thursday, February 25 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the House Judiciary Committee will hold a hearing on Competition in the Media and Entertainment Distribution Market. The hearing will address the Comcast/NBC merger. We anticipate that invited witnesses will include the parties to the merger, diversity witnesses, representatives of consumer groups, representatives of unions, and several professors.

D. Markups

1. Senate Judiciary Committee. The Department supports eliminating the disparity; recommendations on how that is to be accomplished are awaiting final clearance within the Department. Our latest intelligence is that the markup of this measure will be postponed due to scheduling issues.

Also on the agenda is S. 1741, the Witness Security and Protection Grant Program. This bill would direct the Attorney General to make competitive grants to states, tribal, and local governments to establish or maintain programs to protect or assist witnesses in certain court proceedings. The Department has some technical concerns with the bill.

Other bills on the markup calendar include: S. 1624, the Medical Bankruptcy Fairness Act of 2009; S.1765, the Hate Crimes Against the Homeless Statistics Act of 2009; S.1132, the Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act Improvements Act; and S. 2772, the Criminal Justice Reinvestment Act of 2009.

E. Briefings

1. <u>Detainee Transfers.</u> On Thursday, February 25, Matthew Olsen, Executive Director of the Guantanamo Detainee Review Task Force, will provide House Appropriations Subcommittee Chairman Mollohan and Ranking Member Wolf with an overview of the process used to determine whether a detainee can be transferred, released, prosecuted, or otherwise lawfully detained consistent with U.S. national security and foreign policy interests.

On Friday, February 26, Olsen will participate in House and Senate interagency briefings (times and locations to be arranged) on the process of resettling and repatriating Guantanamo detainees for staff of House Leadership, Senate Leadership and various committees. Others present include Alan Liotta of DOD and Chuck Alsup of ODNI.

F. Floor

- 1. <u>Native Hawaiians.</u> Representative Abercrombie is scheduled to bring an amended version of H.R. 2314 to the House floor this week, pending approval by the House Rules Committee (exact date/time TBD).
- 2. Civilian Trials for Guantanamo detainees. Sen. Lindsey Graham may offer an amendment to H.R. 2847, the Jobs for Main Street Act, which the Senate is expected to consider this week. Sen. Graham's amendment would bar funds from being used for the prosecution in Article III courts of individuals involved in the Septenber 11, 2001 attacks. In the House, Rep. Peter King will attempt to offer a similar amendment to H.R. 2701, the Intelligence Authorization bill, which would prohibit DOJ from prosecuting any Guantanamo detainee in any civilian criminal court. Minority members, including Rep. Lamar Smith, the Ranking Member of the House Judiciary Committee, also are expected to seek to offer a number of other amendments related to the transfer and trial of terrorism suspects. It is unclear whether any of these amendments would be made in order under the rule. It is possible that if they are not made in order, one or more of them could be offered as a (nonbinding) motion to recommit.
- **3.** <u>USA PATRIOT Act.</u> At the close of last session, both the Senate and House Judiciary Committees had approved legislation to reauthorize expiring provisions of the USA

PATRIOT Act, but neither measure had reached the floor. Congress enacted a 60-day extension of the expiring authorities which will expire on Sunday, February 28. We expect another extension to be enacted this week, most likely as part of a broader package including other expiring provisions of law. It is unknown at this time whether this will be another short-term extension or a longer extension of as much as one year. A joint letter from the AG and the DNI was transmitted on Monday, February 22 reiterating the Administration's support for the negotiated Senate package and urging Congress at a minimum to pass a temporary extension of sufficient length to ensure that there is no disruption to the availability of the expiring authorities.

4. Repeal of Antitrust Exemption for Health Insurers. The House is expected to vote this week on the Health Insurance Industry Fair Competition Act, which would repeal the McCarran-Ferguson Act's antitrust exemption insofar as it applies to the business of health insurance.

G. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Detainee Transfer and Interrogation.</u> Next week, the Department will brief Members of the Senate Armed Services Committee regarding the transfer, resettlement and repatriation of Guantanamo detainees to countries that are willing and able to accept them. We also expect various other committees including the Judiciary, Intelligence, and Homeland Security Committees to schedule hearings and briefings regarding the transfer of Guantanamo detainees to locations in the U.S. for purposes of prosecution and detention. A number of committees also have expressed interest in receiving briefings about the High Value Detainee Interrogation Group (HIG). Finally, DOD has invited House Judiciary and Armed Services Committee staff to visit the Thomson Correctional Facility in Illinois.
- **2.** Aviation Security and the Detroit Flight Incident. The Senate Homeland Security and Government Reform Committee is planning a hearing next month on issues related to Flight 253.
- **3.** <u>Heath Care Reform.</u> No process for moving forward has yet been determined. A number of provisions are of particular interest to the Department, including those relating to health care fraud enforcement and antitrust issues.
- 4. <u>Cobell Settlement Implementation.</u> The deadline for enactment of legislation to implement the settlement agreement in Cobell v. Salazar has been extended to February 28, 2010, by agreement of the parties. The Department is working closely with the Department of the Interior toward enactment of the required legislation.
- **5.** <u>Tribal Law and Order.</u> Senator Dorgan continues to await movement on his most recent "hotline" of the Tribal Law and Order Act of 2009. He is seeking unanimous approval by the Senate and attached S. 797, as amended, to H.R. 725, Indian Arts and Crafts Amendments Act of 2010, which was passed by the House in January.

6. FBI use of "exigent letters". On Friday, February 12, FBI General Counsel Valerie Caproni briefed staff of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence regarding the recent OIG report on the FBI's former use of exigent letters to obtain telephone records. The House Judiciary Committee is planning a hearing on the topic next month and we anticipate a briefing for the Senate Judiciary Committee and the Senate Select Intelligence Committee.

1. <u>DNA Backlog.</u> On Tuesday, March 2 at 1:30 p.m. in Room 224 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, FBI Assistant Director Chris Hassel and FBI Special Counsel Alice

Isenberg will brief staff of the Senate Judiciary Committee on efforts to reduce the backlog of unanalyzed biological evidence from crime scenes, suspects and victims of crime.

- 2. <u>Detainee Transfer and Interrogation.</u> On Wednesday, March 3, Matthew Olsen, Executive Director of the Guantanamo Detainee Review Task Force, will participate in a classified interagency briefing on the process of resettling and repatriating Guantanamo detainees for Senate Armed Services Committee members. Other presenters will include Deputy Secretary of Defense William Lynn, Ambassador Daniel Fried, and Charles Alsup from ODNI.
- **3.** <u>High Value Detainee Interrogation Group (HIG).</u> On Tuesday, March 2, HIG Director Andrew McCabe of the FBI will provide an overview of HIG procedures to House Minority Leader John Boehner. On Thursday, March 4, Director McCabe, will provide a similar briefing for Senate Judiciary staff.

F. Floor

- 1. Repeal of Antitrust Exemption for Health Insurers. On February 24, the House passed the Health Insurance Industry Fair Competition Act, which would repeal the McCarran-Ferguson Act's antitrust exemption insofar as it applies to the business of health insurance, by a vote of 406-19. No action has yet been scheduled in the Senate.
- **2.** <u>USA PATRIOT Act.</u> On Saturday, February 27, the President signed a one-year extension of the three expiring provisions of the USA PATRIOT Act. The extension was passed by the Senate on Wednesday, February 24 and the House on Thursday, February 25.

G. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Detainee Transfer and Interrogation.</u> We expect various committees including the Judiciary, Intelligence, and Homeland Security Committees to schedule additional hearings and briefings regarding the transfer of Guantanamo detainees to locations in the U.S. for purposes of prosecution and detention. A number of additional committees also have expressed interest in receiving briefings about the High Value Detainee Interrogation Group (HIG). DOD has invited House Judiciary and Armed Services Committee staff to visit the Thomson Correctional Facility in Illinois (to be rescheduled for a date to be determined).
- 2. <u>Intelligence Authorization.</u> The House passed the intelligence authorization bill last week. The Congressional notification requirements that prompted a veto threat still remain. The Department has strong concerns about several amendments adopted in the House, including the Holt amendment, which are opposed by DOJ. It would require the ODNI Inspector General to revisit the results of one of the most exhaustive investigations ever undertaken by the FBI to determine whether there was any foreign connection to the 2001 anthrax attacks. DOJ will urge that this amendment not be included in the final conference report, which we expect will be voted on the week of March 22.

- **3.** Aviation Security and the Detroit Flight Incident. The Senate Homeland Security and Government Reform and House Judiciary Committees are planning hearings this month on issues related to Flight 253.
- **4.** <u>Health Care Reform.</u> No process for moving forward has yet been determined. A number of provisions are of particular interest to the Department, including those relating to health care fraud enforcement and antitrust issues.
- **5.** Cobell Settlement Implementation. The deadline for enactment of legislation to implement the settlement agreement in *Cobell v. Salazar* has been extended a second time, to April 16, 2010, by agreement of the parties. The Department is working closely with the Department of the Interior toward enactment of the required legislation.
- **6.** <u>Tribal Law and Order.</u> Senator Dorgan continues seek unanimous consent for Senate approval of the Tribal Law and Order Act.
- 7. FBI use of "exigent letters". On Friday, February 12, FBI General Counsel Valerie Caproni briefed staff of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence regarding the recent OIG report on the FBI's former use of exigent letters to obtain telephone records. The House Judiciary Committee is planning a hearing on the topic this month and we also expect to brief the Senate Judiciary and Intelligence Committees.

Other federal witnesses include: Russell Travers, Deputy Director, Information Sharing and Knowledge Development National Counterterrorism Center, Office of the Director of National Intelligence; Gale Rossides, Acting Administrator, Transportation Security Administration, U.S. Department of Homeland Security; and David Aguilar, Acting Deputy Commissioner, U.S. Customs and Border Protection, U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

Officials from the Bureau of Prisons also attended.

- 1. <u>Senate Judiciary Oversight.</u> On Tuesday, March 23 at 9:30 a.m. (location to be announced), the Attorney General will testify before the Senate Judiciary Committee at a hearing on Oversight of the Department of Justice.

Holt Amendment, which would require the ODNI Inspector General to revisit the results of one of the most exhaustive investigations ever undertaken by the FBI to determine whether there was any foreign connection to the 2001 anthrax attacks, and a provision that would bar the giving of Miranda warnings for terrorism suspects and Armed Forces detainees located abroad. The administration has urged that these and various other provisions be stripped from the conference report, which may be on the floor in each House during the week of March 22.

- 4. <u>Financial Reform.</u> The Senate Banking Committee is expected to begin markup during the week of March 22 of financial overhaul legislation introduced by Chairman Christopher J. Dodd on March 15. It is possible that amendments will be offered during markup or on the Senate floor to grant federal regulators and inspectors general various litigation authorities, including testimonial subpoena authority and access to grand jury materials. We are working with the White House to ensure that any grants of new authority in these areas do not impair civil liberties or interfere with criminal or civil proceedings.
- **5.** Aviation Security and the Detroit Flight Incident. The House Judiciary Committee is planning a hearing on March 24 regarding issues related to Flight 253.
- 6. Cobell Settlement Implementation. In December 2009, the Administration announced a settlement in the *Cobell v. Salazar* class action lawsuit. It provides \$1.412 billion to compensate class members for historical accounting claims and to resolve potential claims of trust mismanagement. In addition, it provides \$2 billion for the purchase of fractionated land interests held by individual Indians. Up to \$60 million of the \$2 billion may be contributed to a scholarship fund for the benefit of American Indians and Alaska Natives. The deadline for enactment of legislation to implement the settlement agreement in *Cobell* has been extended a second time, to April 16, 2010, by agreement of the parties. The Department is working closely with the Department of the Interior toward enactment of the required legislation.
- 7. Black Farmers (Pigford II) Settlement Implementation. On February 18, 2010, the parties signed a settlement agreement in *In re Black Farmers Discrimination Litigation* (*Pigford II*). *Pigford II* settlement is designed to resolve fully and forever all remaining claims from the original *Pigford* litigation and adjudicate thousands of late-filed claims of black farmers who allege that they were discriminated against by USDA in credit and non-credit programs. In addition to the \$100M Congress provided in the 2008 Farm Bill, the President has requested \$1.15 billion in additional FY2010 appropriations to resolve the claims. The House Appropriations Committee is drafting language to implement the settlement and we will continue to monitor this as it moves forward.
- **8.** <u>Tribal Law and Order.</u> Senator Dorgan continues seek unanimous consent for Senate approval of the Tribal Law and Order Act.

9. FBI use of "exigent letters". The House Judiciary Committee is planning a hearing on April 14 regarding the recent OIG report on the FBI's former use of exigent letters to obtain telephone records. FBI General Counsel Valerie Caproni has previously briefed staff of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence and the Senate Judiciary Committee regarding this issue.

- 1. <u>Terrorism Prevention.</u> On Wednesday, March 24, at 10:00 a.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, FBI Terrorist Screening Center Director Tim Healy will testify before the House Judiciary Committee at a hearing entitled, "Sharing and Analyzing Information to Prevent Terrorism." Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary for Policy at the Department of Homeland Security Patricia Cogswell will also testify.
- 2. <u>Drugs in Long-term Care Facilities.</u> On Wednesday, March 24, at 2:00 p.m. in Room 106 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, DEA Deputy Assistant Administrator for the Office of Diversion Control Joe Rannazzisi will testify before the Senate Special Committee on Aging at a hearing entitled, "The War on Drugs Meets the War on Pain: Nursing Home Patients Caught in the Crosffire." allow aliens who are legally present in the United States to return temporarily to the country of citizenship of the alien if that country is engaged in post-conflict or natural disaster reconstruction.

Other bills on the markup calendar include: S. 3111, the Faster FOIA Act; S. 3031, the Drug Free Communities Enhancement Act; S. 1624, the Medical Bankruptcy Fairness Act; and S. 2960, Refugee Opportunity Act, which would exempt aliens who are admitted as refugees or granted asylum and are employed overseas by the Federal Government from the 1-year physical presence requirement for adjustment of status to that of aliens lawfully admitted for permanent residence.

D. Floor

1. <u>Health Care Reform.</u> On March 23, 2010, the President signed into law health insurance reform legislation that includes provisions to strengthen the Department's health care fraud enforcement efforts. It also provides subpoena authority for investigations conducted pursuant to the Civil Rights for Institutionalized Persons Act. <u>The Senate is currently debating a reconciliation bill that will modify some provisions of the insurance reform bill.</u> <u>That legislation will provide additional funds for the Health Care Fraud and Abuse Control Program (HCFAC), a central part of the Department's efforts to combat fraud and abuse in health care.</u>

E. Briefings

- 1. <u>Guantanamo Review Task Force briefing.</u> On Monday, March 22, at 2:00 p.m. in Room 219 of the Hart Office Building, Matthew Olsen, Executive Director of the Guantanamo Review Task Force, and Charles Alsup of ODNI briefed Senate Intelligence Committee staff regarding the role of the intelligence community within the Task Force.
- **2. JJDP Reauthorization.** On Friday, March 26, representatives from the Office of Justice Programs will brief leadership staff on the Senate Judiciary Committee regarding reauthorization of the Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention Act (S. 168).

F. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Department of Justice Oversight.</u> The Senate Judiciary hearing originally scheduled for Tuesday, March 23, 2010 has been postponed. We anticipate that it will be rescheduled for April.
- **2.** <u>Detainee Transfer and Interrogation.</u> In April, the Guantanamo Review Task Force will provide an overview of the detainee review and repatriation process to House Intelligence Committee Members. We expect other committees including the Judiciary and Homeland Security Committees to schedule additional hearings and briefings regarding the transfer of

Guantanamo detainees. A number of additional committees also have expressed interest in receiving briefings about the High Value Detainee Interrogation Group (HIG).

- 3. <u>Intelligence Authorization.</u> On February 26, the House passed H.R. 2701, the Intelligence Authorization bill for FY 2010. The administration has issued a veto threat with respect to three of the provisions in the bill, including a provision that would revise Congressional notification requirements. The administration also opposes several other amendments adopted in the House that have prompted strong concern within the department, including the Holt Amendment, which would require the ODNI Inspector General to revisit the results of one of the most exhaustive investigations ever undertaken by the FBI to determine whether there was any foreign connection to the 2001 anthrax attacks, and a provision that would bar the giving of Miranda warnings for terrorism suspects and Armed Forces detainees located abroad. The administration has urged that these and various other provisions be stripped from the conference report, which we expect to come to the floor of both chambers during the coming weeks.
- 4. Cobell Settlement Implementation. In December 2009, the Administration announced a settlement in the Cobell v. Salazar class action lawsuit. It provides \$1.412 billion to compensate class members for historical accounting claims and to resolve potential claims of trust mismanagement. F. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Intelligence Authorization.</u> The House and Senate Intelligence Committees are continuing negotiations to resolve Administration concerns with the Intelligence Authorization bill for FY 2010, and a final vote on the conference report is expected soon. The administration has issued a veto threat with respect to three of the provisions in the bill, including a provision that would revise Congressional notification requirements. Although the Department's most serious concerns with the legislation have been favorably resolved, we are continuing to work with ODNI to address significant concerns regarding provisions that would require reports related to the threat posed by the transfers of Guantanamo detainees.
- 2. The HIG (High Value Detainee Interrogation Group). On a date to be determined, the HIG, headed by Director Andy McCabe of the FBI, along with HIG deputies who represent other agencies, will provide classified briefings to House and Senate leadership, Intelligence, Judiciary, Armed Services, Foreign Relations, Homeland Security, and Appropriations staff about the HIG mission and classified charter. The HIG was created pursuant to a recommendation of the Interrogation and Transfer Policy Task Force and is designed to bring together the most experienced interrogators from across the Intelligence Community, the

Department of Defense, and law enforcement, to conduct interrogations of high-value detainees.

- 3. Cobell Settlement Implementation. In December 2009, the Administration announced a settlement in the *Cobell v. Salazar* class action lawsuit. It provides \$1.412 billion to compensate class members for historical accounting claims and to resolve potential claims of trust mismanagement. In addition, it provides \$2 billion for the purchase of fractionated land interests held by individual Indians. Up to \$60 million of the \$2 billion may be contributed to a scholarship fund for the benefit of American Indians and Alaska Natives. The deadline for enactment of legislation to implement the settlement agreement has been extended a third time, to May 29, 2010, by agreement of the parties. The Department is working closely with the Department of the Interior and others within the Administration toward enactment of the required legislation.
- **4.** Black Farmers (Pigford II) Settlement Implementation. On February 18, 2010, the parties signed a settlement agreement in *In re Black Farmers Discrimination Litigation* (Pigford II). The Pigford II settlement is designed to resolve fully and forever all remaining claims from the original Pigford litigation and adjudicate thousands of late-filed claims of black farmers who allege that the USDA discriminated against them in credit and non-credit programs. In addition to the \$100 million Congress provided in the 2008 Farm Bill, the President has requested \$1.15 billion in additional FY2010 appropriations to resolve the claims. We are working within the Administration and with Congress to find the appropriate legislative vehicle for funding this settlement.

The nominations of Scott Parker, ED NC; Daryl McPherson, ND IL; and Gervin K. Miyamoto, HI, are on the Senate Judiciary Committee markup agenda for May 27.

D. Markup

1. <u>House Judiciary Subcommittee on Courts and Competition Policy.</u> It is expected that immediately following the hearing on the Removal Clarification Act before the House Judiciary Subcommittee on the Courts and Competition Policy, the Subcommittee will mark up this bill. The Department generally supports the bill, but looks forward to working with the Subcommittee as the bill moves forward to address some technical issues.

E. Floor

- 1. Tax Extender Legislation: Pigford and Cobell Settlements and other matters. The House is expected to consider H.R. 4213, a bill to revive and extend tax breaks and other programs. This legislation includes funds to cover the settlements of both *Cobell v. Salazar* and *In re Black Farmers Discrimination Litigation* (Pigford II). It also repeals language from the Health Care Reform legislation regarding exclusion of certain companies from Medicaid. In addition, the bill includes language modifying the oil spill liability trust fund. The Senate is expected to take up the measure later this week.
- 2. <u>Defense Authorization Act for FY2011.</u> The House is expected to take up the Defense Authorization Act for FY2011 this week. The House Armed Services Committee marked up its bill, H.R. 5136, on May 19, and the measure is scheduled for floor consideration on May 27. The bill as reported includes amendments related to the disposition of Guantánamo detainees and may attract additional amendments and a possible Motion to Recommit on this subject when it reaches the floor. The Senate Armed Services Committee is expected to mark up its bill this week.
- **3.** <u>Supplemental Appropriations.</u> This week, the Senate is expected to consider the supplemental appropriations bill, H.R. 4899, the "Disaster Relief and Summer Jobs Act of 2010."
- **4.** Campaign Finance. H.R. 5175, the "Democracy is Strengthened by Casting Light on Spending in Elections Act" (DISCLOSE Act), was marked up on May 20 by the Committee on House Administration and reported favorably with seven amendments. The House may take up this bill later this week. H.R. 5175 was developed in response to the Supreme Court's January 21, 2010, ruling in the *Citizens United v. FEC* case and addresses concerns related to transparency and accountability in political campaigns.
- **5.** <u>Antitrust Criminal Penalties.</u> H.R. 5330, the Antitrust Criminal Penalty Enhancement and Reform Act extension, is on the House Suspension Calendar for this week.

F. Looking Ahead

1. <u>Intelligence Authorization.</u> The House and Senate Intelligence Committees are continuing negotiations to resolve Administration concerns with the Intelligence Authorization bill for FY 2010, and a final vote on the conference report is expected soon. The administration has

issued a veto threat with respect to three of the provisions in the bill, including a provision that would revise Congressional notification requirements. Although the Department's most serious concerns with the legislation have been favorably resolved, we are continuing to work with ODNI to address significant concerns regarding provisions that would require reports related to the threat posed by the transfers of Guantanamo detainees.

2. <u>Financial Regulatory Reform.</u> Next week is Memorial Day recess, but efforts to reconcile the House and Senate versions of the financial regulatory legislation are expected to accelerate.

The Senate Armed Services Committee has reported out a Senate version of the bill (S. 3454). Each of these measures includes provisions that are of significant concern to the Department of Justice. It is unclear when the Senate will move to floor consideration of the bill.
- **3.** <u>Campaign Finance.</u> House leadership, bill sponsors and others are attempting to negotiate on a manager's amendment to H.R. 5175, the DISCLOSE Act, with the goal of bringing it before the Rules Committee as soon as this week and to the House floor immediately thereafter.
- **4.** <u>Intelligence Community Legal Issues.</u> On Tuesday, June 22, at 2:30 p.m., Assistant Attorney General for National Security David Kris and ODNI General Counsel Robert Litt will testify about intelligence community legal issues before the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence.
- **5.** <u>Guantanamo Detainees.</u> The Guantanamo Review Task Force, led by its Executive Director, Matthew Olsen, will brief staff of the House Homeland Security Committee regarding the detainee review process, and the repatriation and resettlement of detainees. The date of the briefing has not yet been determined.

United States Sentencing Commission to review and amend the Federal Sentencing Guidelines and policy statements in order to increase penalties and appropriately account for the actual harm to the public and the environment from the offenses.

The Committee is also scheduled to mark up H.R. 1933, the A Child Is Missing Alert and Recovery Act, and H.R. 908, the Missing Alzheimer's Disease Patient Alert Program Reauthorization of 2009.

On Thursday, June 17, the Committee approved the Feinstein substitute to S. 258, the Saving Kids From Dangerous Drugs Act of 2009 as well as the Sessions amendment with regard to sentencing enhancement.

2. <u>House Judiciary Committee.</u> On Wednesday, June 23, at 10:15 a.m. in Room 2141 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the House Judiciary Committee is scheduled to mark up H.R. 1455, a resolution of inquiry, directing the Attorney General to transmit to the House of Representatives copies of certain communications relating to certain recommendations regarding administration appointments. The bill would require transmission of any document or record from within the Department of Justice that relates to recommendations by the Department about discussions of any administration appointments of White House staff (or representatives thereof) with any candidate for public office in exchange for the candidates withdrawal from any election, or any investigations by the Department regarding those discussions. We anticipate that the Committee will report the resolution adversely, effectively preventing it from going to the floor as a privileged resolution.

The committee is also scheduled to mark up the following bills:

- H.R. 5503, the Securing Protections from the Injured from Limitations on Liability Act, which would revise laws regarding liability in certain civil actions arising from maritime incidents.
- H.R. 5281, the Removal Clarification Act, which would amend the federal judicial code with respect to removal to an appropriate U.S. district court from a state court of: (1) any civil action against the United States or a federal agency or officer, or specified others; or (2) a criminal prosecution commenced in a state court against any of them.
- H.R. 1020, the Arbitration Fairness Act, which declares that no pre-dispute arbitration agreement shall be valid or enforceable if it requires arbitration of: (1) an employment, consumer, or franchise dispute, or (2) a dispute arising under any statute intended to protect civil rights.
- H.R. 1237, the Fairness in Nursing Home Arbitration Act, which provides that a predispute arbitration agreement between a long-term care facility and a resident (or anyone acting on the resident's behalf) shall not be valid or specifically enforceable.
- H.R. 5092, which would amend 18 U.S.C. 48 (relating to depiction of animal cruelty) to prohibit knowingly selling 'animal crush videos' via interstate or foreign commerce and impose a fine and no more than 5 years of imprisonment.

F. Floor

- 1. Tax Extender Legislation: Pigford and Cobell Settlements and other matters. The Senate may resume consideration of a modified version of H.R. 4213, the House-passed tax extenders legislation, which includes provisions to implement the settlements of both *Cobell v. Salazar* and *In re Black Farmers Discrimination Litigation* (Pigford II), as well as language to modify a provision of the health care reform legislation regarding exclusion of certain companies from Medicaid.
- 2. Oil Spill Commission Subpoena Authority. The House may take up H.R. 5481, a bill to give subpoena power to the National Commission on the BP Deepwater Oil Spill and Offshore Drilling. The Department is working with the lead sponsor, Rep. Capps, on language to require consultation with the Department before the issuance of subpoenas by the Commission.

G. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Intelligence Authorization.</u> After intensive negotiations to resolve Administration concerns with the Intelligence Authorization bill for FY 2010, we anticipate that the Administration will support the current version of the conference report. A final vote is expected soon. Meanwhile, a provision regarding GAO audits of intelligence activities that had drawn a veto threat and was stripped from the bill has been added, in slightly modified form, to the House version of the National Defense Authorization Act.
- 2. <u>National Defense Authorization.</u> The House has approved H.R. 5136, the National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2011. The Senate Armed Services Committee has reported out a Senate version of the bill (S. 3454). Each of these measures includes provisions that are of significant concern to the Department of Justice. It is unclear when the Senate will move to floor consideration of the bill.
- 3. Campaign Finance. House Leadership, bill sponsors and others have negotiated a manager's amendment to H.R. 5175, Democracy is Strengthened by Casting Light on Spending in Elections (DISCLOSE) Act. On Monday, June 21, the White House issued a Statement of Administration Policy in strong support of its passage as "a necessary measure so that Americans will know who is trying to influence the Nation's elections." The House Rules Committee is expected to take up this version of H.R. 5175 on Wednesday, June 23 and the bill is expected to be taken up by the full House on Thursday, June 24.

The Department is working with the White House, House Leadership and Committee staff to strategize on how best to proceed on H.R. 1924.
- 4. <u>U.S. Virgin Islands Constitution.</u> The Senate unanimously approved a Joint Resolution, S.J.R. 33, providing for the reconsideration and revision of the proposed constitution to correct provisions inconsistent with the Constitution and Federal law. The House will take the measure up on suspension on Tuesday, June 29, and the Department is currently responding to OMB's request for written views and recommendations for Presidential action in anticipation of an enrolled bill.
- 5. Gun Show Loophole. The House Judiciary Committee has invited a Department of Justice representative to participate in a briefing regarding the Gun Show Loophole Act of 2009 (H.R. 2324). Other invited participants include representatives from Mayors Against Illegal Guns (MAIG) and the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP). The Committee will also invite a student who was shot during the Virginia Tech attack and the parent of a Columbine High School student who was killed in that incident. The briefing date is expected to be in the middle of July.

A request for unanimous consent to Senate passage is likely this week.

- **3.** <u>Guantánamo Detainees.</u> On a date to be determined, Brad Wiegmann, Principal Deputy Assistant Attorney General in the National Security Division, accompanied by an official from the Department of Defense, will provide an informal briefing to the majority staff on the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Terrorism and Homeland Security regarding law of war detention.
- **4.** <u>Pigford II and Cobell Settlements.</u> Legislation to implement the settlements in *In re Black Farmers Discrimination Litigation* (Pigford II) and *Cobell v. Salazar* was included in both the Supplemental Appropriations bill that that passed the House on July 1 (H.R. 4899) and the tax extender bill that previously passed the House (H.R. 4213). These provisions were deleted from the Supplemental Appropriations bill the Senate approved on July 22 and sent back to the House, and are unlikely to be included in the final measure. The fate of the tax extender bill is uncertain.

Baker will testify before the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Terrorism and Homeland Security at a hearing entitled "Government Preparedness and Response to a Terrorist Attack Using Weapons of Mass Destruction." A major focus of the hearing will be the DOJ Inspector General's *Review of the Department's Preparation to Respond to a WMD Incident* (May 2010). Inspector General Glenn A. Fine and the Director of the Department of Homeland Security's FEMA Office of National Capital Region Coordination, Steward Beckham, also will testify.

- 1. Senate Judiciary Committee. On Thursday, August 5, at 10:00 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Senate Judiciary Committee is scheduled to mark up S. 2925, the Trafficking Deterrence and Victims Support Act, a bill to implement changes to the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) to identify endangered juveniles; to authorize the Office of Justice Programs to award one-year block grants to provide shelter and services to victims of sex trafficking and for training for law enforcement and social services; to require states to report information on missing or abducted children to the NCIC database; to require the Attorney General's annual statistical summary to include the total number of missing child reports received and the total number of entries made to the NCIC database; and to require law enforcement agencies to update the record of a missing child with a photograph taken within the previous 180 days and to notify the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children of each report on a child missing from a foster care family home or childcare institution.
- **2.** <u>House Judiciary Committee.</u> The House has adjourned for the August recess and there is no scheduled mark up session this week.

E. Floor

- 1. <u>Senate Floor Consideration of Nominations.</u> The Senate is expected to begin debate on the nomination of Elena Kagan to be an Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court on Tuesday, August 3, and a vote on the nomination should come later this week. We are pressing for full Senate consideration of the nomination of James Cole to be Deputy Attorney General.
- **2.** Oil Spill. On Friday, July 30, the House passed both H.R. 5851, the Offshore Oil and Gas Worker Whistleblower Protection Act of 2010, and H.R. 3534, the Consolidated Land, Energy, and Acquatic Resources (CLEAR) Act of 2009. We anticipate that the Senate will

take up S. 3663, which would overhaul federal oversight of the outer continental shelf and boost natural-gas-powered and electric cars, and also provide monies for state and federal recreational and public lands efforts, with a midweek cloture vote that is expected later this week.

F. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Intelligence Authorization.</u> After intensive negotiations to resolve Administration concerns with the Intelligence Authorization bill for FY 2010, the Administration has indicated its support for the current version of the conference report. A final vote could come soon. Meanwhile, a provision regarding GAO audits of intelligence activities that had drawn a veto threat and was stripped from the bill has been added, in slightly modified form, to the House version of the National Defense Authorization Act.
- 2. <u>National Defense Authorization.</u> The House has approved H.R. 5136, the National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2011. The Senate Armed Services Committee has reported out a Senate version of the bill (S. 3454). Each of these measures includes provisions that are of significant concern to the Department of Justice, including provisions that would further restrict transfers from Guantánamo. It is anticipated that the Senate may begin floor consideration of the bill in September.
- **3.** Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court. A representative of the National Security Division will provide a classified briefing to House and Senate Judiciary and Intelligence Committee staff concerning a recent significant FISC order. Mr. Kris will be accompanied by representatives from the National Security Agency and the Office of the Director of National Intelligence.
- 4. <u>Pigford II and Cobell Settlements.</u> An attempt to seek cloture on a substitute amendment to the Small Business bill (HR 5297) failed, putting in jeopardy, yet again, legislation to implement the settlements in *In re Black Farmers Discrimination Litigation* (Pigford II) and *Cobell v. Salazar*. Provisions had been in various bills, including the Supplemental Appropriations bill (H.R. 4899) now awaiting the President's signature and tax extender legislation. Senator Reid is seeking consent to pass a free-standing bill funding the Pigford and Cobell settlements with unrelated offsets.
- 5. Native Hawaiians. Senators Akaka and Inouye remain keen to move ahead on H.R. 2314, a bill expressing the policy of the United States regarding the United States relationship with Native Hawaiians and providing a process for the recognition by the United States of the Native Hawaiian governing entity. It is unclear when the Senate will move to floor consideration of the bill, but both Senators continue to press Leadership for action before the August Recess.
- **6.** <u>Congressional Recess.</u> The House began its recess on July 30, and the Senate will begin its recess on August 6. Both chambers will return on September 13.

- **3.** Marijuana related crime in California. On Wednesday, September 29 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 231 of the Cannon House Office Building, representatives from the Department will brief Congressman Mike Thompson on marijuana related crime in California.

E. Markups

1. <u>Small Business Job Preservation Act.</u> S.3675, the Small Business Job Preservation Act of 2010 would amend chapter 11 of title 11, United States Code, to address reorganization of small businesses.

- 2. <u>Law Student Clinic Participation Act of 2009.</u> S.2888, the Law Student Clinic Participation Act of 2009 would amend the federal criminal code to exempt a law student or staff member participating in the legal clinic or externship of an accredited law school for a covered matter (i.e., a legal proceeding in which the United States has a direct and sustainable interest) within the scope of the clinic from the criminal conflict of interest rules applicable to federal and District of Columbia employees, unless: (1) the student or staff member has participated personally and substantially in the matter as a government employee; or (2) the matter is pending in the department or agency in which the student or staff member is serving.
- **3.** Combating Online Infringement and Counterfeits Act. S.3804, the Combating Online Infringement and Counterfeits Act, would require the Department to crack down on Web sites dedicated to online infringement.

F. Floor

1. <u>Continuing Resolution.</u> The Senate and House are expected to take up a continuing resolution this week to keep the government running until Congress returns from the election period recess.

G. Looking Ahead

a. Committee Action

1. <u>ATF Reform.</u> ATF Executive Assistant Director William J. Hoover will testify at hearings before the Senate Judiciary Committee and the House Judiciary Crime Subcommittee regarding S. 941/H.R. 2296, the "Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives Reform and Firearms Modernization Act of 2009," if and when these hearings are rescheduled.

b. Floor

- 1. <u>National Defense Authorization</u>. The House has approved H.R. 5136, the National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2011. The Senate Armed Services Committee has reported out the Senate version of the bill (S. 3454), but last week, the Senate failed to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to the bill. Each of these measures includes provisions that are of significant concern to the Department of Justice, including provisions that would further restrict transfers from Guantánamo.
- 2. <u>Pigford II and Cobell Settlements.</u> We anticipate that further attempts will be made to enact legislation to implement the settlements in *In re Black Farmers Discrimination Litigation* (Pigford II) and *Cobell v. Salazar*. Possible vehicles include tax extender legislation, appropriations bills, or freestanding legislation.
- 3. <u>Native Hawaiians.</u> Senators Akaka and Inouye remain eager to move ahead on H.R. 2314, a bill expressing the policy of the United States regarding the United States

relationship with Native Hawaiians and providing a process for the recognition by the United States of the Native Hawaiian governing entity. It appears unlikely that the Senate will move to floor consideration of the bill before the elections.

4. Oil Spill. On Friday, July 30 the House passed both H.R. 5851, the Offshore Oil and Gas Worker Whistleblower Protection Act of 2010, and H.R. 3534, the Consolidated Land, Energy, and Aquatic Resources (CLEAR) Act of 2009. Pending on the Senate Calendar is S. 3663, the Clean Energy Jobs and Oil Company Accountability Act of 2010, introduced by Majority Leader Reid. It will not be brought up for a vote before the elections.

- 3. <u>Native Hawaiians.</u> Senators Akaka and Inouye remain eager to move ahead on H.R. 2314, a bill passed by the House that expresses the policy of the United States regarding the United States relationship with Native Hawaiians and provides a process for the recognition by the United States of the Native Hawaiian governing entity. The Departments of Justice and the Interior have drafted a joint letter of Administration support, which is pending final White House approval.
- 4. <u>USA PATRIOT Act Reauthorization.</u> Earlier this year, Congress passed legislation extended the three expiring provisions of the USA PATRIOT Act until February 28, 2011. Exploratory discussions are taking place with House and Senate Leadership and the Judiciary and Intelligence Committees regarding the possibility of reaching agreement on a fresh reauthorization during the lame duck session, rather than waiting until the expiration date is imminent.

- **5.** Other nominees. The nominations of Patti Saris and Dabney Friedrich for the U.S. Sentencing Commission are on the Senate Judiciary Committee markup agenda for December 1. The Committee held a hearing on the nomination of Patti Saris on November 17, and the nominee has completed questions for the record.

D. Briefings

- 1. <u>National Security Letter Procedures.</u> On Tuesday, November 30 at 1:00 P.M. in the Senate Visitors Center, FBI General Counsel Valerie Caproni and DOJ Chief Privacy and Civil Liberties Officer Nancy Libin will brief the House and Senate Judiciary and Intelligence Committee staff regarding procedures recently approved by the Attorney General for collection, use and storage of information derived from National Security Letters (NSLs).
- 2. <u>National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS)</u>. Department representatives will brief staff for Senators Specter, Klobuchar, Cardin and Franken offices in response to a letter signed by all four Senators requesting input on recommendations presented in studies focused on NCVS reform. This briefer will include representatives of the Bureaus of Justice Statistics and is tentatively set for December 1 at 1:00 p.m. at a location to be decided.
- **3.** <u>Southwest Border Counternarcotics.</u> On Thursday, December 2 at 11:00 a.m. in Room 430 of the Cannon House Office Building, representatives of the Department will brief Representative Ted Poe on federal law enforcement efforts on the southwest border. DEA Deputy Chief of Operations, David Gaddis will also participate in the briefing.
- **4.** <u>Going Dark.</u> On Thursday, December 2 at 3:00 P.M. in Room 217 of the Senate Visitors Center, FBI and DOJ representatives will brief Senate Judiciary Committee staff on the nature and extent of the "Going Dark" problem.

E. Floor

Congress returns from recess on Monday, November 29. High priority legislation to be considered includes an omnibus appropriations bill or long-term continuing resolution. Among other measures of interest to the Department that may be on the agenda:

1. <u>National Defense Authorization.</u> The House has approved H.R. 5136, the National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2011. The Senate Armed Services Committee has reported out the Senate version of the bill (S. 3454), but the Senate failed to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to the bill. Each of these measures includes provisions that are of significant concern to the Department of Justice, including provisions that would further restrict transfers from Guantánamo.

- 2. <u>Pigford II and Cobell Settlements.</u> On Friday, November 19, the Senate passed H.R. 4783, the Claims Resolution Act of 2010. This legislation provides for the final implementation of two litigation settlements: *In re Black Farmers Discrimination Litigation*, or *Pigford* II, providing final settlement of claims of past discrimination of black farmers, and *Cobell v. Salazar*, providing final settlement of litigation arising from resolution of Indian land trust accounts. The House will take up the Senate-passed bill this week.
- 3. <u>Native Hawaiians.</u> Senators Akaka and Inouye remain eager to move ahead on H.R. 2314, a bill passed by the House that expresses the policy of the United States regarding the United States relationship with Native Hawaiians and provides a process for the recognition by the United States of the Native Hawaiian governing entity.

F. Looking Ahead

1. Briefings

a. Sex Offender Registry Notification Act (SORNA). On December 6 at 3:00 p.m. the Department will brief Senate Indian Affairs Committee staff on the status of tribal implementation of the Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act (SORNA), which is Title I of the Adam Walsh Child Protection and Safety Act of 2006 (Public Law 109-248). SORNA provides a comprehensive set of minimum standards for sex offender registration and notification programs in the United States. This briefing will include staff from DOJ's Sex Offender Sentencing, Monitoring, Apprehending, Registering, and Tracking (SMART) Office.

2. Hearings

a. Southwest Border Drug Trafficking Methods. On Thursday, December 9, the Senate Homeland Security and Government Affairs Committee is planning a hearing to examine the new methods being employed by drug trafficking organizations to penetrate the Southwest Border. Preliminary intentions are to have two panels—the first to follow up with an integrity hearing held this spring with CPB and DHA/IG, and the second to address smuggling organizations with either a focus on operations along the Southwest Border or distribution groups in the Atlanta area. DEA is being considered for the second panel, though the staff indicates the focus is undetermined. DEA representation has not been determined.

3. Other

a. <u>USA PATRIOT Act Reauthorization.</u> Earlier this year, Congress passed legislation extended the three expiring provisions of the USA PATRIOT Act until February 28, 2011. On Monday, November 29, representatives of the Department will meet with House and Senate Leadership staff to discuss the prospects for completing an early reauthorization during the lame duck session, rather than waiting until next year.

Salazar*, brought by Native Americans regarding Indian land trust accounts held by the federal government. The President is expected to sign the bill into law.

- 3. Child Protection Improvement Act. S. 1598, Child Protection Improvement Act, would direct the Attorney General to: (1) establish policies and procedures for a program for national criminal history background checks for child-serving organizations; (2) assist such organizations in obtaining access to nationwide background checks; (3) establish procedures for insuring the accuracy of criminal history records; (4) identify individuals convicted of serious misdemeanors or felony involving children; and (5) collect demographic data relating to individuals organizations covered by this Act and make reports to Congress on such data. The bill would limit the liability of a child-serving organization for failure to conduct criminal background checks or to take adverse action against employees with a criminal history. The bill would impose limitations on the disclosure or use of criminal history records. Lastly, the bill would amend the PROTECT Act to provide for an extension of the Child Safety Pilot Program.

D. Markups

House Judiciary Committee. Later in the week the House of Representatives might consider H.R. 1249, the "America Invents Act," which would amend the federal patent law in a number of ways, including by replacing the "first-to-invent" system with "first-to-file." The Senate companion bill, S. 23, passed the Senate on March 8, 2011 by a vote of 95-5.

The bill includes a number of provisions related to terrorist detainees that are of concern to the Department, including a provision that would require military detention for the core group of al Qaeda detainees suspected of plotting or carrying out attacks against the United States. The measure includes a national security waiver that was not included in the more stringent House-passed bill (H.R. 1540). It is anticipated that the Department will participate in informal interagency briefings regarding these provisions for selected Senate staff over the next several weeks.

G. Looking Ahead

The Department and our interagency partners are continuing to work with Senate staff to resolve these issues, and the Senate Judiciary Committee will likely hold a related hearing on law of war detention in November.
- 2. <u>Testimony by the Attorney General.</u> The Attorney General is scheduled to testify in the Senate Judiciary Committee at an oversight hearing next Tuesday, November 8 and in the House Judiciary Committee at a hearing on Operation Fast & Furious on Thursday, December 8.

 - H.R. 2076, Investigative Assistance for Violent Crimes Act of 2011, which passed the House in September 2011 would authorize the Attorney General and the Director of the FBI to assist in the investigation of violent acts and shootings occurring at schools, colleges, universities, nonfederal office buildings, malls, and other public places.
 - S. 1794, Federal Restricted Buildings and Grounds Improvement Act of 2011, which would correct and simplify the drafting of section 1752 relating to restricted buildings or grounds of Title 18, US Code.
 - H.R. 347, Federal Restricted Buildings and Grounds Improvement Act of 2011, which
 would revise the prohibition against entering restricted federal buildings or grounds to
 impose criminal penalties on anyone who knowingly enters any restricted building or
 grounds without lawful authority.

- H.R. 2189, Death in Custody Reporting Act of 2011, which would encourage states to report to the Attorney General certain information regarding the deaths of individuals in the custody of law enforcement agencies.

 - H.R. 2815, which would revise the Federal charter for the Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc., to reflect a change in eligibility requirements for membership.
- 3. Senate Armed Services Committee. On Tuesday, November 15 at 2:30 p.m. in a location to be announced, the Senate Armed Services Committee is expected to mark up provisions of S. 1253, the National Defense Authorization Act for 2012, related to the disposition of terrorist detainees. The Administration has serious concerns regarding these provisions as previously reported (among them, a provision that would require military detention for the core group of al Qaeda detainees suspected of plotting or carrying out attacks against the United States), and has been working with the committee to try to resolve those concerns.

E. Briefings

- 1. Request by Rep. Rohrabacher. On Tuesday, November 15 at 2:00 p.m. in Room 2409 of the Rayburn House Office Building, AAG Weich, U.S. Attorney Preet Bharara and Andrew McCabe from the FBI will meet with Congressman Dana Rohrabacher and Chairman Lamar Smith to explain why the Department must adhere to its long-standing refusal to allow Rep. Rohrabacher to visit and interview federal prisoner Ramzi Yousef.
- **2.** <u>Going Dark.</u> On Thursday, November 17 at 1:00 p.m. in Room 302 of the House Visitors Center, representatives from the FBI and the Office of Legal Policy will participate in a staff briefing for the House Homeland Security Committee on the "Going Dark" problem.

F. Floor

The House and Senate are expected to take up the conference report on the FY 2012 appropriations "minibus" containing the Department's FY 2012 appropriations. The Senate is scheduled to vote this week on amendments to and passage of a second FY 2012 appropriations "minibus." The "minibus" also is expected to include a second continuing

resolution that will run through December 16. The current continuing resolution for FY 2012 (PL 112-36) expires on November 18. The House may take up concealed firearms legislation and a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution.

G. Looking Ahead

- 1. National Defense Authorization. The Senate Armed Services Committee has reported S. 1253, the National Defense Authorization Act for 2012, and the full Senate is expected to take up the bill during the coming weeks. As noted above, the bill includes a number of provisions related to terrorist detainees that are of concern to the Department, including a provision that would require military detention for the core group of al Qaeda detainees suspected of plotting or carrying out attacks against the United States. The measure includes a national security waiver that was not included in the still more stringent House-passed bill (H.R. 1540). The Department and our interagency partners are continuing to work with Senate staff to resolve these issues.
- **2.** <u>Testimony by the Attorney General.</u> The Attorney General is scheduled to testify before the House Judiciary Committee at a hearing on Operation Fast & Furious on Thursday, December 8.

 - H.R. 3261, the Stop Online Piracy Act.

DOJ officials are evaluating the conference report.

4. Omnibus Spending Bill. On Monday evening, House and Senate appropriators are expected to unveil an Omnibus Appropriations package comprising nine spending bills. With the current stopgap spending bill expiring on Friday, December 16, both houses will need to pass either the Omnibus or another short-term CR by the end of the week. The House could vote on the package as early as Wednesday.

- 2. <u>Cybersecurity.</u> Negotiations continued over the August recess on a compromise that could be brought to the Senate floor, but major differences remain and there is very little likelihood that an agreement will be reached prior to the elections.
- **3.** <u>National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2013 (NDAA).</u> Although sponsors had hoped to bring the bill to the floor following the August recess, it now appears that action on the bill will have to await the lame duck session.
- **4.** Nuclear Terrorism Treaties. We continue our efforts to secure Senate passage of H.R. 5889, the "Nuclear Terrorism Conventions Implementation and Safety of Maritime Navigation Act of 2012," bipartisan legislation that passed the House on voice vote on June 28. Senator Grassley has been unwilling to support efforts to bypass markup and hotline the bill. It is unlikely that a markup could occur prior to the elections, so once again, we may be looking at a lame duck strategy.
- 5. <u>Violence Against Women Act Reauthorization</u>. No progress has been made on agreeing to a House-Senate conference, so action will not occur before the elections, but Senator Leahy is committed to pressing for action during the lame duck session.

The following is a summary of our current activities:

A. Hearings at which the Department is testifying

- 1. School-to-Prison Pipeline Issues. On Wednesday, December 12 at 2:00 p.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Acting Administrator for the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, Melodee Hanes, will testify before the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on the Constitution, Civil Rights and Human Rights in a hearing titled, "Ending the School-to-Prison Pipeline." Testifying on the panel with Ms. Hanes will be Assistant Secretary for Elementary and Secondary Education at the Department of Education, Deborah Delisle; they will be followed by a second panel of witnesses.
- 1. September 11, 2012 Attacks in Benghazi, Libya. On Thursday, December 13 at 10:30 a.m. in Room HVC-304 of the Capitol Visitor Center, the Assistant Director of the Counterterrorism Division for the FBI, Andrew G. McCabe, will testify before the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence in a closed hearing on the September 11, 2012 Attacks in Benghazi, Libya. This hearing is a follow-up to the November 15, 2012, hearing on the same matter. Other witnesses will include representatives from the Department of Defense, the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, and the Central Intelligence Agency.

The House has already approved its bill (H.R. 5949), and we are hopeful that the Senate will take up the House-passed bill (H.R. 5949) or the bill reported by the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence (S. 3276), both of which are supported by the Administration, in time to avoid any lapse in these authorities. It is possible that the measure could come to the floor as early as this week.
- 2. <u>Intelligence Authorization Act for FY 2013.</u> The Senate Select Committee on Intelligence has reported S.3454, the Intelligence Authorization Act for FY 2013, which contains a number of provisions that are strongly opposed by the Administration. Among these are various provisions related to unauthorized disclosures of classified information and a provision requiring the Administration to provide the Intelligence Committees with every classified opinion issued by the Office of Legal Counsel on or after September 11, 2001.
- 3. <u>Nuclear Terrorism Treaties.</u> We continue our efforts to secure Senate passage of H.R. 5889, the "Nuclear Terrorism Conventions Implementation and Safety of Maritime Navigation Act of 2012," bipartisan legislation that passed the House on voice vote on June 28. Senator Grassley thus far has been unwilling to support efforts to bypass markup and pass the bill on unanimous consent.
- **4.** <u>Violence Against Women Act Reauthorization.</u> An effort continues to be made to resolve differences between the Senate-and House-passed versions of the VAWA reauthorization bill, in the absence of agreement to a House-Senate conference.

It is still unclear whether the House will vote in July, or wait until after the August recess, to vote on any of the recent immigration bills that have reported out of committee.

 - H.R. 1405, a bill to amend title 38, United States Code, to require the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to include an appeals form in any notice of decision issued for the denial of a benefit sought.
 - H.R. 2640, the "Central Oregon Jobs and Water Security Act," a bill to amend the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act to adjust Crooked River boundary, to provide water certainty for the City of Prineville, Oregon.
 - H.R. 623, the "Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium Land Transfer Act," a bill to provide for the conveyance of certain property located in Anchorage, Alaska, from the United States to the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium.
 - H.R. 330, the "Distinguished Flying Cross National Memorial Act," a bill to designate a Distinguished Flying Cross National Memorial at the March Field Air Museum in Riverside, California.
 - H.R. 2337, the "Lake Hill Administrative Site Affordable Housing Act," a bill to provide conveyance of the Forest Service Lake Hill Administrative Site in Summit County, Colorado.
 - H.R. 2011, the "Veterans' Advisory Committee on Education Improvement Act of 2013," a bill to amend title 38, United States Code, to provide for a two-year extension of the Veterans' Advisory Committee on Education.

The House is scheduled to take up the following legislation subject to a rule:

- H.R. 2374, the "Retail Investor Protection Act," a bill to amend the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 to provide protections for retail customers.
- H.R. 992, the "Swaps Regulatory Improvement Act," a bill to amend provisions in section 716 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act relating to Federal assistance for swap entities.
- H.J. Res. ___, Relating to the disapproval of the President's exercise of authority to suspend the debt limit, as submitted under section 1002(b) of the Continuing Appropriations Act, 2014 on October 17, 2013

G. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act.</u> In light of recent unauthorized disclosures of classified information, the Senate and House Intelligence and Judiciary Committees are considering possible changes to the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act over the coming weeks. The Department has participated in numerous hearings and briefings and is continuing to provide technical assistance in coordination with our interagency partners as those efforts move forward.
- 2. <u>Immigration Reform</u>. Last June, the Senate passed S. 744, the Border Security, Economic Opportunity, and Immigration Modernization Act, a bipartisan package of legislative proposals to provide for comprehensive immigration reform. Meanwhile, the House Judiciary and Homeland Security committees have reported out of committee five individual immigration bills dealing with border enforcement, internal enforcement provisions, E-verify, agricultural work visas, and other matters. In addition, on October 2, 2013, Democrats in the House introduced legislation that substantially mirrored the Senate-passed legislation. It is highly unlikely that this bill will ever be considered by the House. House Republican leaders have indicated that the House will not take up the Senate bill, and it remains unclear which legislation, if any, they will bring to the floor. At present, there are fewer than 20 legislative days remaining on the House's calendar this year.
- 3. Electronic Communications Privacy Act (ECPA) Reform. The Senate Judiciary Committee has reported out legislation to reform the Electronic Communications Privacy Act and is attempting to move the legislation by unanimous consent. Senator Grassley has raised concerns about the bill, and is attempting to negotiate changes prior to passage. We are continuing to provide technical assistance to the committee on various aspects of the bill (in close consultation with the White House and the Department of Commerce). We also are providing technical assistance to the House Judiciary Committee (see, e.g., the briefing listed on page 2 above), which is developing its own legislation for introduction this fall.
- **4.** <u>Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities</u>. We anticipate that the Senate Foreign Relations Committee will hold a hearing on ratification of the Convention this fall, and that the Department will provide a witness.
- **5.** National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2014. We anticipate that the full Senate will consider the 2014 NDAA in mid-November, and we are working closely with the interagency to ensure that the Guantanamo-related provisions in the bill reported by the Senate Armed Services Committee are not removed or diluted on the floor.

The Department has participated in numerous hearings and briefings and is continuing to provide technical assistance in coordination with our interagency partners as those efforts move forward.

- 2. Immigration Reform. Last June, the Senate passed S. 744, the Border Security, Economic Opportunity, and Immigration Modernization Act. Meanwhile, the House Judiciary and Homeland Security Committees have reported out of committee five individual immigration bills dealing with border enforcement, internal enforcement provisions, E-verify, agricultural work visas, and other matters. In addition, Democrats in the House have introduced legislation (H.R. 15) that substantially mirrors the Senate-passed legislation. Recently, three Republicans became cosigners to H.R. 15, and the Administration and House Democrats continue to push House Republican leadership to bring up a bill for a vote before the end of the year. However, it is highly unlikely that H.R. 15 will ever be considered by the House, given the minimal Republican support, and the fact that House Republican leadership has stated recently it will not vote on any comprehensive immigration legislation. Nor is it expected that any immigration legislation will be considered in the House before the end of this year. Fewer than 20 legislative days remain; several House Republican leaders have indicated that the House will not vote on any immigration bills in that time.
- 3. Electronic Communications Privacy Act (ECPA) Reform. The Senate Judiciary Committee has reported out legislation to reform ECPA and is attempting to move the legislation by unanimous consent. Senator Grassley has raised concerns about the bill, and is attempting to negotiate changes prior to passage. We are continuing to provide technical assistance to the committee on various aspects of the bill (in close consultation with the White House and the Department of Commerce). We also are providing technical assistance to the House Judiciary Committee, which is developing its own legislation for introduction this fall.
- **4.** Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities. We anticipate that the Senate Foreign Relations Committee will hold a hearing on ratification of the Convention this fall, and that the Department will provide a witness.

- 3. Electronic Communications Privacy Act (ECPA) Reform. The Senate Judiciary Committee has reported out legislation to reform ECPA and is attempting to move the legislation by unanimous consent. Senator Grassley has raised concerns about the bill, and is attempting to negotiate changes prior to passage. We are continuing to provide technical assistance to the committee on various aspects of the bill (in close consultation with the White House and the Department of Commerce). We also are providing technical assistance to the House Judiciary Committee, which is developing its own legislation.
- **4.** <u>Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities</u>. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee (SFRC) held a second hearing on ratification of the Convention on November

21, 2013, where Secretary Kerry testified in support of the ratification of the Convention. The Administration is continuing to work with the Committee on "reservations, understandings and declarations" to the Convention that may be offered to win additional minority support for the Convention in SFRC and the Senate.

- **1.** <u>Senate Judiciary Committee.</u> On Thursday, December, 19, 2013, at 10:00 a.m. in Room 226 of the Dirksen Senate Office Building, the Senate Judiciary Committee will mark up the following legislation:
 - S. 619, the "Justice Safety Valve Act of 2013," a bill to amend title 18, United States Code, to prevent unjust and irrational criminal punishments.
 - S. 1410, the "Smarter Sentencing Act of 2013," a bill to focus on limited Federal resources on the most serious offenders.
 - S. 1675, the "Recidivism Reduction and Public Safety Act of 2013," a bill to reduce recidivism and increase public safety.
 - S. 975, the "Court-Appointed Guardian Accountability and Senior Protection Act," a bill to provide for the inclusion of court-appointed guardianship improvement and oversight activities under the Elder Justice Act of 2009.

F. Looking Ahead

- 1. <u>Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act.</u> The Senate and House Intelligence and Judiciary Committees are continuing work on possible changes to the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act. The Department has participated in numerous hearings and briefings and is continuing to provide technical assistance in coordination with our interagency partners as those efforts move forward.
- 2. <u>National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2014.</u> Last week, the House passed a version of the 2014 NDAA that had been negotiated by the House and Senate Armed Services Committees. Although some Republican senators have threatened to block action on the bill, it is expected to pass the Senate this week. The bill includes some modifications to the current restrictions on transfers from Guantanamo.
- 3. Electronic Communications Privacy Act (ECPA) Reform. Senator Grassley and others have raised concerns about the bill, and are attempting to negotiate changes prior to passage. At this juncture, the prospects for passage by unanimous consent are unclear. We are continuing to provide technical assistance to the committee on various aspects of the bill (in close consultation with the White House and the Department of

Commerce). We also are providing technical assistance to the House Judiciary Committee, which is developing its own legislation.

- 4. Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee (SFRC) held a second hearing on ratification of the Convention on November 21, 2013, where Secretary Kerry testified in support of the ratification of the Convention. The Administration is continuing to work with the Committee on "reservations, understandings and declarations" to the Convention that may be offered to win additional minority support for the Convention in SFRC and the Senate.
- **5. Budget.** On Thursday, December 12, 2013, the House overwhelming passed a budget conference agreement (332-94), which would fund the U.S. government for two years, and reduce sequestration cuts by \$40 billon (the Department's share of resulting increased funding amounts has not yet been determined). The bill is now being considered by the Senate, and is expected to garner at least the 60 votes required to proceed to final passage of the legislation later this week.
