This letter is the final response to your January 12, 2009, Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request for a copy of any and all records, photos, etc. pertaining to nuclear weapon accidents/incidents covering the period of January 1, 1951 through December 31, 1995.

We contacted the Los Alamos Field Office (LAFO), which has oversight responsibility for Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL) and Los Alamos National security (LANS), about your request. LNAS searched and located two documents to your request. One document, A Compendium of U.S. Nuclear Weapons Accidents was previously provided under FOIA 09-00025-H. The second document, Department of Defense – Narrative Summaries of Accidents involving U.S. Nuclear Weapons 1950-1980, can be found online at http://www.dod.mil/pubs/foi/Reading_Room/NCB/965.pdf.

We contacted Sandia Field Office (SFO), which has oversight responsibility for Sandia National Laboratories (SNL), about your request. SFO and SNL searched and located three documents responsive to your request:

- 1. History of Accidents Involving Nuclear Materials, dated May 25, 1966
- 2. History of Accidents Involving Nuclear Materials
- 3. Letter to D.L. Foster, ALO, DOE from E. H. Plassman, LASL, DOE w/enclosure

These documents were reviewed by SFO, SNL and the Los Alamos Field Office (LAFO). Pursuant to Title 10, Code of Federal Regulations, section 1004.6 (10 CFR § 1004.6), the Office of Classification, Office of Environment, of Health, Safety and Security, in the Department of Energy (DOE) has also reviewed the documents responsive to your request. The documents are provided to you with deletions pursuant to 5 USC § 552 (b)(3) (Exemption 3 of the FOIA).

Title 5, United States Code, section 552(b)(3) (5 USC § 552(b)(3)) (Exemption 3), exempts from disclosure information specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552(b) of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on the issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld. The Atomic Energy Act (AEA) of 1954, as amended, 42 USC § 2011 et seq., is an Exemption 3 statute. Sections 141-146 of this Act (42 USC §§ 2161-2166) prohibit the disclosure of information concerning atomic energy defense programs that is classified as either RD or FRD pursuant to the AEA, as amended. The portions deleted from the subject documents pursuant to Exemption 3 contain information about weapon

design that has been classified as RD and/or stockpile quantities that has been classified as FRD. Disclosure of the exempt data could jeopardize the common defense and the security of the nation.

To the extent permitted by law, the DOE, pursuant to 10 CFR § 1004.1, will make available records it is authorized to withhold under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) whenever it determines that such disclosure is in the public interest. With respect to the information withheld from disclosure pursuant to Exemption 3, the DOE has no further discretion under the FOIA or DOE regulations to release information currently and properly classified pursuant to the AEA, as amended.

Pursuant to 10 CFR § 1004.6(d), Dr. Andrew P. Weston-Dawkes, Director, Office of Classification, Office of Environment, Health, Safety and Security, is the official responsible for the denial of the information determined by DOE to be classified under Exemption 3.

Pursuant to 10 CFR § 1004.8, you may appeal our withholding of information, in writing, within 30 calendar days after receipt of this letter, to the Director, Office of Hearings and Appeals, Department of Energy, L'Enfant Building, 1000 Independence Avenue, SW, Washington, DC 20585, or you may also submit your appeal by email to <u>OHA.filings@hq.doe.gov</u>, including the phrase "Freedom of Information Appeal" in the subject line. The written appeal, including envelope, must clearly indicate that a Freedom of Information Act appeal is being made, and the appeal must contain all other elements required by 10 CFR § 1004.8. Judicial review will thereafter be available to you in the District of Columbia or in the district where: (1) you reside, (2) you have your principal place of business, or (3) the Department's records are situated.

There are no charges to you for processing your FOIA request.

Cumberland, Maryland -DOE 1.6 DELETED b(3) Ellsworth AFB, South Dakota - On December 5, 1964, a retrorocket #11, AIPAT 30. fired in a Minuteman missile in a silo located near Ellsworth AFB, South 4/165 Dakota. The explosion dislodged the Re-entry Vehicle which contained a Mk-56 warhead. It fell approximately 75 feet to the floor of the silo. There was no fire and no HE detonation. There was no radioactivity DOE/AL detected. A response team consisting of D. P. Dickason, ALO, and Dead File R. K. Peterson, Sandia Corporation, Livermore, proceeded to the scene DELETED where they were later joined by N. D. Benedict, of LRL. The Re-Entry DOE Vehicle was successfully removed from the silo, X-rayed, packaged, and b(3) shipped to Medina for post-mortem. Bunker Hill AFB, Indiana -31.
