## U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission Declassification Guide Under Executive Order 13526 (November 2012)

On the basis of Section 3.3(b)(8), and Section (b)(9) of Executive Order (EO) 13526, the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) proposes to exempt the following information from automatic declassification:

Under Section 3.3(b)(8): Reveal information that would seriously impair current national security emergency preparedness plans or reveal current vulnerabilities of systems, installations, or infrastructures relating to the national security:

(b)(7)(F)	

**Under Section 3.3(b)(9)**: Violate a statute, treaty, or international agreement that does not permit the automatic or unilateral declassification of information at 25 years:

П	(O)(7)(E)
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### RATIONALE

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Only 25X exemptions may be applied to records reviewed in anticipation of automatic declassification at 25 years (i.e., in reviews conducted in 2013, for records dating between 1969 and 1993). Records exempted under 25X shall be automatically declassified on December 31 of a year that is no more than 50 years from the date of origin of the record, unless an approved 50X exemption is later applied within 5 years of that automatic declassification date.

In accordance with section 3.7(c)(1) of E.O. 13526, this guide, or detailed declassification guidance, will be provided to the Director of the National Declassification Center at the National Archives and Records Administration.

This guide does not allow the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to incorporate exemptions into its classification guidance under section 2.2(e) of E.O. 13526.
