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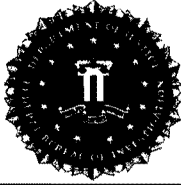

EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute(A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information (A) could be reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, (C) could be reasonably expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual;
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.

Dear Mr. Tamm:

I have hesitated about bringing up the following matter as I am sure you are acquainted with the possibility and are taking the proper steps to circumvent this danger but if true, it is too serious to pass up.

Several times recently, the well established rumor comes to me that the Party has established and placed contacts in the offices of all Intelligence Departments in Washington such as the Military and Naval Intelligence, the Treasury Department and particularly the File Room of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. And that they are particularly watching for and identifying names of informants. This, of course, would be the logical story to spread as a deterrent to this kind of work.

And the story continues that certain individuals under suspicion of doing this kind of work are being fed certain information and then a careful watch being kept to see where it shows up. Incidentally it appears sure that this procedure actually has taken place with some of Walter Winchell's sources of information.

Anyhow I am passing it on to you for whatever you think it is worth. And I have told all those whom I contact to keep this in mind in the hopes that we can pick up definite information of persons so placed, particularly in what Department and what Office.

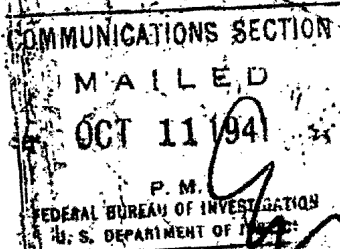
Dear Mr. Clegg:

The Bureau is repeatedly receiving information emanating from Communist sources in the New Orleans area that the Communist Party has succeeded in placing members in several of the Government Departments. Information is received from time to time specifically alleging that the Communist Party has succeeded in placing certain of its members in the file rooms of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and has also succeeded in placing such members in Military and Naval Intelligence. I wish you would, through the source available to the New Orleans Office, make a diligent effort to run down these allegations in an effort to obtain some specific data concerning any members of the Communist Party employed.

I cannot emphasize too strongly the necessity of giving this matter your most vigorous and careful attention.

RE: COMMUNIST PARTY ACTIVITIES.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your Personal and Confidential letter dated October 10, 1941, in which you advised that the Bureau is repeatedly receiving information emanating from Communist sources in the New Orleans area that the Communist Party has succeeded in placing members in several of the Government departments and that information is received from time to time specifically alleging that the Communist Party has succeeded in placing certain of its members in the file rooms of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and has also succeeded in placing such members in the Military and Naval Intelligence.

In view of the fact that Special Agent [] of the New Orleans office has been engaged in the handling of Communist Party activities at New Orleans having supervision of Confidential Informants of the New Orleans office who are members of the Communist Party and being in close touch with representatives of the Naval Intelligence assigned to investigations of Communist Party matters, I had Special Agent [] conduct discreet inquiries with respect to the matters mentioned in your letter.

The clerical personnel of the New Orleans Field Office from my observation and information furnished by Special Agent [] is without question one hundred per cent loyal to the Bureau and, of course, the Special Agents formerly and presently assigned to the New Orleans office have been one hundred per cent loyal to the Bureau. None of these employees have Communistic tendencies.

Special Agent [] informs me that [] agent, Office of the Naval Intelligence, Eighth Naval District, New Orleans, Louisiana, has been engaged, in addition to other duties, in the investigations of Communist Party of Louisiana activities for several years, and that [] has proven himself not only to be exceptionally competent in this work but loyal in every sense to his department and to the United States Government. His cooperation in matters pertaining to general subversive activities has been indeed gratifying to the Bureau. It might be mentioned that []

The loyalty to the United States Government of these two individuals
is in my mind beyond reproach.

Special Agent [redacted] informs me that he very discreetly discussed with the representatives of the Naval Intelligence the possibility of members of subversive organizations, particularly the Communist Party, U. S. A., securing appointments with the Navy Department and that information was given that applicants for any position in the Navy Department, Eighth Naval District, New Orleans, Louisiana, are thoroughly investigated, particularly as to any affiliation of such applicants with subversive organizations before they are recommended for appointment.

The personnel of the Military Intelligence at New Orleans, Louisiana, which works out of Atlanta, Georgia, consists of [redacted] and a civilian employee named [redacted]. These two men are without doubt loyal to the United States Government. The investigations of the Military Intelligence with respect to Communist Party activities are very limited. [redacted] calls at the New Orleans office at different times in connection with matters in which the Military Intelligence and this Bureau have mutual interest.

Special Agent [redacted] informs me that Confidential Informants [redacted] although members of the Communist Party of Louisiana, are loyal citizens of the United States; that these Confidential Informants advised, on being discreetly interviewed, that practically all active members of the Communist Party of Louisiana are known to them and that none of these persons are associated in any way with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Military Intelligence or Naval Intelligence.

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Special Agent [redacted] advised me that under the pretext of securing general information on Communist Party activities in New Orleans, Louisiana, and elsewhere, he called on [redacted] of the Railway Audit and Inspection Company, 1700 Masonic Temple Building, New Orleans, Louisiana. As is known to the Bureau the Railway Audit and Inspection Company, which is engaged in private investigative work, has been very cooperative with the Bureau in the past in connection with

Communist Party activities. Special Agent [] informs me that during the interview or discussion [] remarked that he had an informant in the Communist Party at New Orleans who made reports to him and that although he did not think it advisable to furnish the Federal Bureau of Investigation at New Orleans with information as to routine activities of the party he would furnish information on matters of importance to the New Orleans Field Office. Agent [] states further that during the general discussion, much to his surprise, [] remarked that he, [] was a loyal American citizen and felt it his duty to cooperate with the Government, but that he had to be very careful about any information which he gave to the Government on account of it getting into the hands of the Communists as the Communist Party had plants in the Federal Bureau of Investigation and in other departments of the Government. Further, [] remarked that the Communists had their men in the file rooms of the Government. Special Agent [] informs me that [] was asked whether he had any information as to Communist Party members being associated with the clerical or file room personnel of the New Orleans Field Office of this Bureau and in response [] stated, "Why, probably not at New Orleans but probably at Washington, D. C., and probably in any office of the FBI in the country". Special Agent [] informs me that he asked [] for the names and locations of such Communist Party members and in response [] stated that he did not possess the names of any persons so employed nor could he tell at just what places such persons were employed. Further Special Agent [] tells me that [] from his remarks, seemed to believe or be under the impression that the plant or plants of the Communist Party were within the Bureau office at Washington, D. C.; also that [] remarked that we should be careful about the kind of information we turned over to the Naval Intelligence. Special Agent [] informs me that [] was specifically asked if he had any direct or specific information as to whether Communist Party members were planted in the Naval Intelligence at any place and that in response [] went on to say that he did not know of the names of such persons and then he talked at length about a person with Communistic tendencies who was being investigated by the Naval Intelligence for a position with the Navy Department. [] indicated during the discussion that he had no additional information to offer as to that person who was being investigated.

Special Agent [] advises me that he asked [] if the information about members of the Communist Party having been planted with various Government departments had come to him from informants and in response [] stated that his informant had given him the information.

Special Agent [] informs me that [] indicated that he would not disclose the identity of his informant and again remarked that should his informant furnish information which he believed to be of importance to the Bureau he would submit such information to the New Orleans Field Office in person. b7C

It is thought appropriate in this connection to again advise the Bureau that Confidential Informant [] of the New Orleans Field Office is a member of the [] Communist Party of Louisiana []

[] the Communist Party of Louisiana [] at the office of the Communist Party of Louisiana, Room 417 Godchaux Building, New Orleans, Louisiana. Also this Confidential Informant []

The information as to these informants is given to show or to properly apprise the Bureau of the position these informants are in to ascertain and report the activities of the party in Louisiana. Special Agent [] informs me that the [] informants mentioned advised him that the Communist Party of Louisiana through its secretary or other members has not planted any members in any governmental agency. Confidential Informant [] particularly has furnished information from time to time on certain employees of various branches of the Government receiving literature of the Communist Party and contributing to certain funds of the party. These informants have from time to time furnished information relative to members of the Communist Party being in the employ of the Works Progress Administration and information as to members of the party who were drafted into the Army and information as to the employment of Communist Party members by firms having Government contracts. Confidential Informant [] states that there is a possibility that members of the Communist Party in other sections of the United States or sympathizers of the party have secured positions with governmental agencies but that to his knowledge such matters have not been discussed by the secretary or other members of the Communist Party of Louisiana. b2 b7C b7D


Of course, the Bureau is advised that the entire matter was very discreetly handled with the Confidential Informants of the New Orleans office and no indication was given to them that information had been received that reports had been received by the Bureau of Communist Party plants in governmental agencies.

It is my intention to keep in touch with [redacted] of the Railway Audit and Inspection Company, New Orleans, from time to time for information in connection with Communist Party activities and for any information he might have to offer in connection with the matters which are the basis of this investigation.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your personal and confidential letter dated October 10, 1941, and a reply from this office dated November 13, 1941, regarding information received by the Bureau from Communist sources in the New Orleans area that the Communist Party has succeeded in placing members in several of the Government Departments.

For the further information of the Bureau, I am quoting below a memorandum submitted by Special Agent [redacted] on November 18, 1941:

"Reference is made to letter dated November 13, 1941, written to the Director in the above-entitled matter, which is in connection with letter received from the Bureau regarding reports emanating from Communist sources at New Orleans to the effect that the Communist Party has members planted in the FBI and Military and Naval Intelligence.

On November 14, 1941, I had occasion to meet [redacted] of the Railway Audit and Inspection Company, referred to in letter of November 13, 1941, and during the course of my discussion with him he stated that it took his Confidential Informant eight or nine years to build himself up in the Communist Party and that he could not possibly afford to disclose the identity of that informant. [redacted] indicated that his informant was well up in the Communist Party and was, by Communist Party members, looked upon as a radical and that his informant did as a matter of fact, take active participation in the Communist Party movement. During the interview [redacted] remarked or indicated that he has talked to his informant since he was previously interviewed by the writer and that from information received the Communist Party has not any members planted in any departments at New Orleans but a strong suspicion is that members of the party are planted probably in departments at Washington, D. C., and in offices of the government at various industrial points. [redacted] again remarked that should his informant furnish him with such information which he, [redacted] believed to be of importance to the FBI, he would promptly call at the office in person to submit the same. Otherwise, he did not feel it necessary to report information on general activities of the Communist Party to this office.

I mentioned to [redacted] that in the next few days I would call on him for any developments in connection with the subject matter and for general information as to Communist Party activities which might be of interest to the Bureau and in response [redacted] very nicely stated that that was not necessary

as we could feel assured that should any information of importance and of high interest to the Bureau come to his attention he would personally report same to the New Orleans office. I might mention for record that [redacted] impressed me as wanting to definitely conceal the identity of his informant and, in addition from his talk he impressed me as having a fear of his informant being disclosed in the event he gave to this office general information furnished to him by the informant.

No mention, however, was made by the writer to [redacted] about reports having been received by the Bureau which emanated from New Orleans about Communist Party members having been planted in the FBI and other departments of the government. It would not be surprising, however, to learn or receive information at some later date that the information which the Bureau has reference to emanated from [redacted] or persons associated with him. "

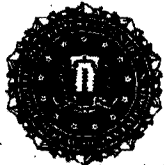

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: EFFORTS OF COMMUNIST PARTY
TO PLACE MEMBERS IN THE
EMPLOY OF THE BUREAU

The following material is being submitted for your information to corroborate information previously received relative to Communist Party members attempting to obtain employment in the Bureau.

Information has been received from the Houston office to the effect that at a meeting of the White Collar Branch of the Communist Party on the night of January 16, 1942, in Houston [redacted] discussed the qualifications of FBI stenographers, saying that the Houston office often contacted the Southwestern Business University in an effort to obtain the same.

The Houston office has advised that [redacted] was employed as a teacher of shorthand by the Southwestern Business University in August, 1941. It is further reported that [redacted] at the above meeting also stated she had been wondering how much information a stenographer in the Federal Bureau of Investigation could obtain and that she was grooming a girl at the above school to obtain a position as a stenographer in the FBI office at Houston.

A check of the present employees of the Houston office has reflected only one as having had any connection with the Southwestern Business University, this one being a male typist. However, he has been eliminated as a suspect because, among other things, he terminated his connections with the above University prior to the time [redacted] entered the employ of that school as a teacher.

The Houston office has advised that [redacted] and her husband are two of the most active Communists in Houston, Texas, and that they have contributed substantial sums to the support of the Party there as members of the White Collar Branch.

ACTION: The Houston office has advised that this matter is being watched very closely and that extreme care is being exercised to prevent any member of the Communist Party in that district from gaining employment with the Bureau.

You will recall my memorandum concerning information received by the New York Field Division from confidential informant [redacted] to the effect that a Communist Party member, New York City, had said, "I would like to get into the FBI and start a Party Unit." You will remember that the Communist Party member making the remark was identified as one [redacted] New York City.

In the report of Special Agent [redacted] dated February 4, 1942, New York City, entitled [redacted] Internal Security (C)", information concerning subject has been furnished to the effect that [redacted] [redacted] Communist Party, [redacted] Assembly District, New York City. He is stated to have received this appointment after attending the Training School conducted by the Communist Party, [redacted] Assembly District, New York City.

Investigation has revealed that the subject was employed as a buckle maker in the manufacturing concern of Levin and Rosenberg, New York City, until August, 1941, when he was discharged because of troublemaking amidst fellow workers. At the present time he is stated to be directing strike activities against the above-mentioned manufacturing concern.

Reference report reflects further information received from confidential informant [redacted] concerning the subject and his statement that he would like to start a unit with the FBI. In her report of January 18, 1941, confidential informant [redacted] states that, "I am certain he meant this as a joke."

Reference report further reflects that upon recent contact, confidential informant [] had stated that she had received no further information that would lead her to believe that a movement would be instituted by the Communist Party of New York to establish a Party Unit in the FBI.

Reference is made to your letter of December 15, 1941 to all Special Agents in Charge in the above entitled matter in which you advised that the Communist Party is reported to be endeavoring to place its members in Bureau positions as Special Agents, etc., and that the Party contemplates conducting surveillances of Bureau Agents.

No reports have been received by me, from available sources and informants, which indicate that the local Party has definitely designated any particular individual to attempt to secure a position in this Bureau or to attempt the surveillance of any Special Agent of this office.

Checks of our files against the names of all applicants in this office, occasionally reveal a prior record to the effect that the applicant is known as "radical" or extremely "liberal". In all such instances, it has been found that the original complaint was either unfounded or non-specific.

~~DEFERRED RECORD~~

On January 22, 1942, [redacted] was given the examination for Special Agents, and during the interview, stated that he had no connection whatsoever with any anti-American organization. Our files showed, however, that this individual had signed a nominating petition circulated by the Communist Party; that the Philadelphia County Detectives' Office had forwarded a questionnaire to all signers of the petition, and that [redacted] returned his questionnaire with a statement that he had signed the petition knowingly and willingly, with full knowledge of its Communist nature.

SAC Thornton from Pittsburgh called and in my absence talked with Special Agent [redacted] Mr. Thornton stated that [redacted] Central Industrial Service Company, has made available to him a written report from one of [redacted] confidential informants. Mr. Thornton stated that the Central Industrial Service Company investigates industrial plants; that [redacted] has previously furnished information to the Bureau; and is known to Mr. E. A. Tamm. This report is dated February 19, 1942, and reads as follows:

"We have a report which we cannot verify and under the circumstances can hardly take the chance of verifying things because of our limited resources which has to do with the New York Office of the FBI. The statement was made that the Jewish office workers in the FBI office have on certain occasions tipped off the highest ranking Jewish Communist leaders to certain facts and they have also tipped off leaders of the international Jewish organization known as Kahall or Cahall."

"The Report has it that [redacted] is one of the [redacted] Cahall and she has been in contact with [redacted] who, according to some reports, is the individual who runs the destinies of Winston Churchill."

SAC Thornton stated that he and Inspector [redacted] who is at the present time in the Pittsburgh Office, talked with [redacted] but he would not name his informant. However, SAC Thornton has made arrangements with [redacted] to have the informant in Pittsburgh about Tuesday, February 24, at which time SAC Thornton and Inspector [redacted] will talk with him. SAC Thornton stated he did not anticipate that [redacted] would have any difficulty in getting the informant into the proposed conference [redacted]

SAC Thornton called attention to his "Personal and Confidential" letter to the Director dated February 16, 1942, which contained information along the same lines concerning the [redacted]

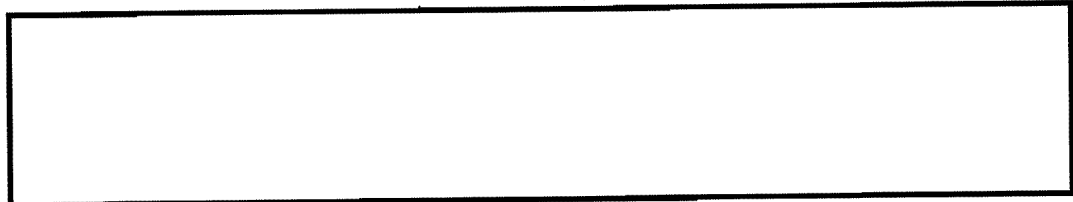

The following observations, suggestions and instructions are submitted:

(A) MOVEMENT TO PLACE COMMUNIST PARTY MEMBERS IN THE BUREAU. -- This is to advise that information has been recently received from a confidential source to the effect that a well organized movement is under way by the Communist Party to place members in this Bureau. It is reported that the Party is urging those members who have the required qualifications to apply for the various positions.

It is alleged that the Party is aware of the strict investigation that their members will have to undergo to qualify for a position with the Bureau but they are attempting to succeed in placing as many members as possible in the employ of the Bureau.

In view of the above and previous information concerning this subject recently furnished the field, it is the Bureau's desire that all Agents be continuously on the alert for information concerning the same and that meticulous care be taken in the investigation and supervision of applicant cases.

Probers Told Friends Of Progress Hinted At Assassinations

Mock Trial 'Convicted'
Roosevelt of Treason,
Leader Testifies

By the Associated Press.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 24.—A State Assembly committee investigating un-American activities was told yesterday that bulletins of the Friends of Progress organization contained propaganda hinting at possible assassinations in the United States.

Evidence had been submitted earlier to show that Robert Noble, director of the organization, said: "I am for Germany and for Hitler. I read this book, 'Mein Kampf,' and was absolutely thrilled."

Ben S. Beery, chairman of the American Legion's 15th District Americanism Committee, testified that the Friends of Progress bulletins hinted at possible assassinations.

Mr. Beery continued:

"It is the duty of the United States Attorney General to enforce the laws. The Sedition Act is not being enforced. Enemy propagandists pose behind freedom of speech, which does not give them the right to conduct and organize enemy propaganda campaigns."

Axis Activities Listed.

He said that Axis propagandists are thwarting Defense bond sales, provoking race hatreds, destroying public confidence in America's leaders, and "developing a spirit of discouragement."

Mr. Beery said the Ku Klux Klan has joined forces with enemy propagandists.

Ellis O. Jones, identified as a Friends of Progress leader and former head of the National Copperheads, testified that President Roosevelt had been given a mock trial at a Friends of Progress meeting and "convicted of treason by giving away the Navy of the United States."

Jones said a United States Senator had written a letter February 7 commanding him and Noble for their activities. The Assembly committee threatened to cite him for contempt when he refused to name the Senator.

Under questioning by Assemblyman Jack Tenney ofinglewood, chairman of the committee, Jones said the trial "was suggested by one of the stooges that is always hanging around our meetings—one of the F. B. I. stooges."

Investigating Board Urged.

"How do you know they were F. B. I. people?" he was asked.

"Oh, well, we knew. We have our own men around. We have our own people in the F. B. I."

A report urging President Roosevelt to appoint an investigating board which would recommend steps to forestall "a slow Pearl Harbor" in Southern California was submitted by the Americanism Committee.

High lights from the Legion's statement, which it said was compiled from evidence uncovered by its own operatives, include:

"Southern California, key war production center of the United States, is spotted with subversive organizations, aggressively spreading dissen-sion, defeatism, obstruction to our war effort, and open disloyalty to the United States of America."

"The Government is not adequately controlling enemy propaganda in spite of the efficiency of the F. B. I. in this vital field."

"High Government officials are at present in a state of non-alertness concerning enemy activity on the propaganda front that is comparable to the non-alertness that led to the Pearl Harbor debacle on our military and naval fronts."

Organizations Named.

"In this area there are many types of subversive organizations . . . devoted to spreading enemy propaganda. . . ."

"Some of these are holdovers from prewar groups—the rallying points for subversive elements from such groups as America First, National Copperheads, Christian American Guards and the Ku Klux Klan. Others are new organizations under such names as World Events Forum, Friends of Progress, United Minute Men and Women of America, the People's Church and the like."

The report declared that when Noble and his associates were arrested December 11 for violation of the sedition laws, such propaganda practically ceased in Los Angeles. He was released December 22 on orders from Attorney General Biddle.

His release, the report added, encouraged propagandists to renew their campaign.

They refer to in their leaflets and their speeches, the report said. "Remember, The United States Attorney General says we have a perfect right to talk—and we will."

The files of the Philadelphia Field Office reveal that on January 10, 1942, [REDACTED] called at this office, ostensibly for the purpose of inquiring concerning a position as translator with the Bureau, she brought to the attention of Special Agent [REDACTED] one [REDACTED] who, [REDACTED] alleged, was engaged in un-American activities. She stated [REDACTED] was very pro-German in her remarks and actions prior to 1936 and 1937.

The files of this office further reveal that an informant [REDACTED] reported to the Office of Naval Intelligence at Philadelphia that [REDACTED] is a Communist.

A further review of the files of the Philadelphia Field Division reveals the existence of a communication from [REDACTED] which letter, among other things, mentioned the fact that [REDACTED] is engaged in radical activities.

In view of the above information indicating that Applicant may possibly be a member of the Communist Party, she is not being called in for an interview and this information is being furnished to the Bureau as being a possible instance indicating that members of the Communist Party are endeavoring to infiltrate themselves into the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Re: COMMUNIST ATTEMPTS TO INFILTRATE AND
ALLEGATIONS REGARDING COMMUNIST IN-
FILTRATION INTO THE FBI

You will recall that from time to time information has been received to the effect that the Communist Party has or will attempt to place members or sympathizers in this Bureau. This type of information has on numerous occasions been called to the attention of the field with specific instructions that the Bureau be immediately advised upon the slightest indication that such is taking place. The field has also been advised that meticulous attention should be given to the investigation and supervision of all applicant matters.

In this connection an attorney from Chicago, Illinois, recently took the Special Agent's examination. Shortly thereafter this attorney, using a different name, at a party in New York City attended by known Communist Party members, told at great length about taking the examination, being interviewed and being questioned concerning his past activities, hobbies, etc. He was, of course, immediately identified and although no further consideration was given him, the applicant investigation was allowed to continue. This investigation reflects that the applicant has strong Communist sympathies and connections.

On another occasion the Bureau received information that a school teacher in a secretarial school in Houston, Texas, who is a member of the Communist Party, was grooming a girl for a position in this Bureau. Shortly thereafter an application was received from a student of this secretarial school. Subsequent investigation revealed that the above-mentioned teacher had taken a personal interest in this particular student. This teacher admitted upon interview that she had spent considerable time with this student after school in an effort to help her obtain a position with this Bureau.

The Bureau has also received information that allegations have been made to the effect that the Communist Party is attempting to place members in the Bureau and that it has members in the Bureau at the present time. All of these allegations which appear to have any merit whatsoever are being completely investigated.

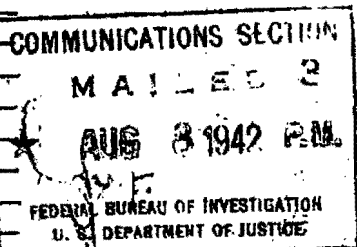

The New York office has recently advised that former confidential National Defense Informant [redacted] recently filed an application for the position of Special Agent with this Bureau. This former informant recently advised Agents of the New York office that he had been approached by one [redacted] who attempted to induce him to join the Communist Party. The informant stated that in view of the fact that [redacted] had approached him on numerous occasions concerning his joining the Party, he deemed it advisable to tell [redacted] that he did not feel it would be a good idea to join the Party at the present time since he had filed an application for the position of Special Agent with this Bureau. The informant advised that [redacted] assured him it would be perfectly all right for him to join the Party and stated in an off-hand manner that the Communist Party has members who are affiliated with the FBI. [redacted] reportedly told the informant that his Party membership could be easily covered up by the use of a fictitious name and that it would not be necessary for him to belong to a neighborhood branch where his membership would become generally known.

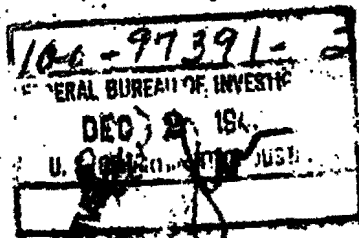

On February 17, 1946, [] paid Confidential Informant of the New York Field Office, attended a cocktail party in the residence of [] New York City, which was held for the benefit of the Committee for Democratic Far Eastern Policy. The informant attended this party [] being invited there by [] a Communist Party functionary in New York County.

During the course of the party, a group of people were standing a short distance from the bar and a young lady unknown to the informant in this group was approached by [] and asked what she was doing now. The informant was in the process of mixing a cocktail and he heard this young lady reply that she was working with -- "Bureau" -- in Washington, D. C.

Two days later the informant met [] and in discussing the success of the cocktail party held in [] home, he mentioned to her if she knew the young lady who was in her group who mentioned that she was employed in a "Bureau" in Washington, D. C. [] advised the informant that the young lady remarked to [] that she was employed "in the Federal Bureau of Investigation" in Washington, D. C. According to the informant, apparently [] did not know the young lady inasmuch as she did not furnish any additional information as to her identity.

The informant recalled that he observed the young lady to answer [] at the cocktail party with a smirk on her face and in a rather sarcastic tone, indicating that she may have been joking. The informant advised that he had a good look at this young lady and was of the opinion that he could identify her in the event he observed her in the future. He described her as follows: Age - 32 to 35; height - 5 feet 5 inches; weight - 115 pounds; hair - dark brown, combed with a bun tied up in the back; complexion - fair, not much makeup; fairly attractive looking; characteristics - well spoken, appeared to be an educated type person; drank and smoked; and was wearing a dark colored dress. She was in the company of an unknown young man and two girls. The informant further ascertained that everybody in attendance at this cocktail party was alleged to have purchased a ticket for a dinner to be given by the Committee for Democratic Far Eastern Policy on April 3, 1946, at the Hotel Roosevelt in New York City. The informant further stated that he was quite certain that this young lady was well known to []

Inasmuch as the possibility existed that this unknown young lady would attend a dinner at the Hotel Roosevelt on April 3, 1946, the New York Office made arrangements for [] the informant, to attend this dinner and to point out this individual to Agents so that she could be surveilled and identified in the event she attended.

The New York Field Office obtained and furnished a seating list of several hundred individuals who attended this dinner.

The informant, [] has been instructed by the New York Office to remain on the alert for any information concerning this individual.

ACTION:

In view of the nebulous nature of the above information, it is not deemed necessary to further go into this matter by checking the Bureau indices on all names appearing on the seating list at the above mentioned dinner held at the Hotel Roosevelt, New York City, on April 3, 1946. It will also be noted that the informant stated that the remark concerning the employment in the "Bureau" was made with a smirk on her face. It is not believed that an employee of the Bureau would have acted in the manner described by the informant. However, the New York Field Office informant, [] will remain on the alert for any additional information concerning this matter.

Reference is made to my memorandum from Mr. Strickland, dated April 30, 1946, wherein it was stated that a Confidential Informant of the New York Office, namely, [redacted] had reported a statement made by an unidentified girl at a cocktail party held at the residence of [redacted] on February 17, 1946, wherein she stated in effect that she was employed at the "Bureau" — in Washington, D. C. The informant later ascertained from another Communist that the unidentified girl was allegedly employed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

b7C

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According to referenced memorandum, this unidentified girl would probably attend a dinner which was held at the Hotel Roosevelt on April 3, 1946. The informant was present during the course of this dinner and the unidentified girl did not attend. According to the informant, however, he was able to obtain a proposed seating list of several hundred individuals. This seating list, however, did not set forth the names of all of those in attendance and often did not list first names.

This list of names was checked by the Chief Clerk's Office against the payroll records of the entire Bureau personnel. According to this check, there were no female employees in the employ of the Bureau having the first and last names identical with any of the names appearing on this seating list. There were, however, five employees having the same last names of individuals appearing on the seating list. The personnel files of these five individuals were reviewed with negative results. Specific attention was directed to the name, age, description and background of these employees. There was no similarity to the description of the unidentified person described by the informant. Consequently, no further check of the Bureau files was made on these five names.

The foregoing is submitted pursuant to your request. The action as indicated by Mr. Tamm, namely, bring the New York informant to Washington to observe Bureau female personnel remains as a final resort. This, of course, would involve not only his being taken through the Bureau but also through the Washington Field Office. There is to be considered in this regard the fact that leave is being taken by numerous Bureau employees at this time and this will probably be the case during the next several months. This is being presented for your consideration. Meantime, the New York Office is being requested to instruct the informant, [redacted] to discreetly renew his efforts to identify the girl in question. The letter to the New York Office is attached for your approval.

On February 17, 1946, I attended a cocktail party given by the Executive Board of the Committee For A Democratic Far Eastern Policy, with headquarters at 58 Park Avenue, New York City, which was held [redacted] at [redacted] N.Y. City. Surrounding the bar was a group of guests, including [redacted] and [redacted]. A young woman approached this group during the evening and singled out [redacted] who welcomed her and inquired where she was working at the time. Her reply was not audible to me, except that I heard her mention the word "Bureau", in Washington, D. C. On hearing this, I took pains to memorize her face so that I would remember her in the future. b7C

Two days later, I contacted [redacted] (who was standing with [redacted] when the above mentioned girl was speaking to him), and engaged her in a general conversation concerning the party. I mentioned that the party had been a big success and that it appeared to me that there were many important people present, including several members from the State Department and other government agencies. I then asked her what Bureau this particular girl was employed, on the pretext that she had been outstanding because of her attractive appearance and because I had never seen her at any of their previous parties. [redacted]

[redacted] then told me that she understood the young lady worked for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, in Washington, D. C.

Dear Sir:

Please be advised that [redacted] has from time to time furnished the New York Field Division with information regarding the JEFFERSON SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE, which organization is currently the subject of an Internal Security investigation. [redacted] has been carried in reports under a temporary informant symbol. She is an English instructor at the school.

During a recent interview with [redacted] at her request, she advised Agents that she had recently become a member of the Communist Party. She volunteered the information that about one year ago in a conversation with [redacted] who is prominent in Communist activities in New York, [redacted] made the remark concerning the possibility of school faculty members being investigated by the FBI as a result of their work with Communists. [redacted] replied in effect that there was no worry about such matters as "We have a person in the FBI office here who can advise us of such things." [redacted] stated that she was quite certain that [redacted] was very sincere in her remark and that it was not made in a bragging manner. Nevertheless, she has been unable to ascertain the identity of the alleged employee of the FBI who was referred to by [redacted]

It will be noted that the statement mentioned above occurred approximately one year ago. It is also believed that [redacted] is the type of person who would make such a statement without there being any foundation thereto. In view of the circumstances as mentioned above, it is not deemed advisable to conduct further investigation relative to this matter other than to request [redacted] to attempt to ascertain the identity of this so-called employee.

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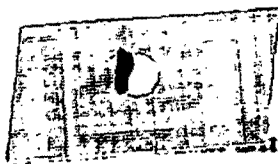

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated May 16th last, requesting that Confidential Informant [redacted] endeavor to discreetly ascertain the identity of the woman who attended a cocktail party at the home of [redacted] on February 17th, 1946, and who, during the course of a conversation, stated that she was employed by "Bureau" in Washington, D. C., later being interpreted by [redacted] as being the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

DEFERRED RECORDING

When [redacted] originally furnished this office with the above information, he was instructed at that time to endeavor to develop any leads whatever which may lead to the identity of this woman. These instructions have been regularly given to [redacted] because this office is aware of the seriousness of such a situation existing as having a Communist employed in the Bureau. The Informant has advised that he has discussed with [redacted] the successful cocktail party and dinner party held by the "Committee for Democratic Far Eastern Policy" at the Roosevelt Hotel on April 3rd last, but to date has been unable to gather any information which may lead to identifying this woman. This Informant as well as agents of this office were available at the Hotel Roosevelt on April 3rd last for the purpose of identifying this woman in the event she attended the dinner party but [redacted] was not present.

According to [redacted] it is his opinion that [redacted] does not know the identity of this woman due to the unconcerned manner in which she originally told the Informant that this woman just mentioned she worked at the Federal Bureau of Investigation and furnished no further details even though the Informant did attempt to discuss this woman's employment further, but when no information was volunteered by [redacted] he dropped the issue.

The Informant has volunteered his services to [] to help out on any committee which would run social affairs for the benefit of the "Committee for Democratic Far Eastern Policy" with the hope that if he attends the socials he may spot this woman. To date these efforts have met with negative results. Informant is of the opinion that this woman is known to [] inasmuch as he appeared to know her at his party on February 17th last. According to the Informant, [] is a shrewd and sharp person and any inquiries asked discreetly or otherwise as to the identity of this woman who allegedly worked for the FBI would immediately arouse the suspicion of [] has advised that he feels quite certain that he would be able to recognize this woman if he saw her again or would even be able to recognize a photograph of her.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated May 23, 1946, requesting this office to advise the Bureau whether or not it would be feasible to have the Informant go to Washington, D. C., and be taken on a tour of the Bureau so that he may view the female employees in an effort to identify the unknown woman if she is employed by the Bureau. The importance of removing from the Bureau employ a Communistically inclined personnel is appreciated. It is believed that [] would be in a position to identify the subject of this communication if the Bureau could make suitable arrangements for the Informant to view photographs of female employees of the Bureau. It is felt that this procedure would eliminate a possibility of the Informant's identity being disclosed and thereby destroying his effectiveness should he be recognized by the employee in question or by anyone else in the Department of Justice while on a tour of the Bureau. The procedure of viewing photographs would enable him to see pictures of all female employees, while if a tour were made, there is a great possibility that the particular employee sought might escape detection through temporary absence during a rest period, while on leave, or by being in such a position at the Bureau that her whereabouts might be overlooked.

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The Informant has expressed a willingness to cooperate in the above plan if the same meets with Bureau approval. It is requested that in the event this suggestion is approved, arrangements should be completed by the Bureau at the earliest possible date while the Informant still feels certain he can recognize a picture of this woman.

Reference is made to your letter dated June 4, 1946, wherein you advised of the steps taken by your office with regard to ascertaining the identity of an unknown woman who attended a cocktail party at the home of [redacted] on February 17, 1946, and who allegedly made the statement that she was employed by the "Bureau" in Washington, D. C., later being interpreted by Charlotte Honig as being the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The Bureau does not feel that it is practicable to forward photographs of all the female employees of the Bureau to the New York Office. Inasmuch as Confidential Informant [redacted] is of the opinion that [redacted] does not know the identity of this unidentified woman, the Bureau does not desire that any further action be taken with regard to this matter.

SUBJECT: ALLEGED COMMUNIST INFILTRATION
INTO THE FBI

DATE: June 10, 1946

At a meeting of the Executive Conference on June 10, 1946, attended by Messrs. Tolson, Tamm, Glavin, Quinn Tamm, Nichols, Hendon, Rosen and Ladd, the information furnished by the New York Office was discussed which indicated that at a cocktail party given at the home of [redacted] on February 16, 1946, a girl was observed who, when questioned by [redacted] stated she was employed by the Bureau in Washington, D. C. It was pointed out to the conference that the list of some 600 persons who had been in attendance at this party had been checked against the Bureau indices without disclosing the name of any Bureau employee. It had been suggested to the New York Office that they have their confidential informant come to the Bureau for the purpose of observing the female employees in an effort to identify the girl who was present at the party. The New York Office thought this would be inadvisable inasmuch as it would be uncovering their confidential informant and that they had encountered with a recommendation that copies of photographs of all female Bureau employees be forwarded to the New York Office to be exhibited to the informant.

The conference was advised that this person did not say that she was with the FBI but only made the statement that she was with the Bureau, which might have been any one of a number of Governmental Bureaus. In view of this, it was not deemed advisable to attempt to furnish photographs of female employees at the Seat of Government to the New York Office. The conference was unanimously of the opinion that no further action should be taken with regard to this matter.
