You stated that you would like to limit your request to a copy of a list of the CMEPs or a title page of the CMEPs. I have enclosed the list of CMEPs for your convenience.


If you would like a copy of one of the CMEPs individually, please let us know in which CMEP you have an interest. Each of the CMEPs would be redacted to protect any proprietary information.

In order to facilitate processing of the appeal, please include your mailing address and daytime telephone number as well as a copy of the initial request and a copy of this letter. The envelope and letter of the appeal should be clearly marked "Freedom of Information Act Appeal." Any amendment to the appeal must be made in writing and received prior to a decision.

The appeal should be addressed to the Solicitor of Labor, Division Management Administrative Legal Services U.S. Department of Labor, 200 Constitution Avenue, Room N2420, Washington D.C., 20210. Appeals may also be submitted by email to foiaappeal@dol.gov. Appeals submitted to any other email address will not be accepted.
