Although the Library of Congress is not subject to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), it is established policy to make the fullest possible disclosure of Library records consistent with the functions and duties of the Library and its responsibilities as an agency of Congress. The enclosed copy of Library of Congress Regulation (LCR) 1917-3 governs requests for Library records as defined in Section 4.

We have reviewed your request and determined that the reports from the Dayton, Ohio facility do not meet the criteria for exemption and are, therefore, releasable. As the cost to reproduce them was minimal, we provide them at no charge to you.

The planned move of the Library's audio-visual collections, staff, and operations to the new Culpeper facility is a multi-faceted, complex transaction involving numerous organizations, committees, and contractors. This move is a huge and dynamic undertaking and there is no single "status report". We are enclosing, however, an information flyer that summarizes the major points of the move. 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

- Library collaborated with PHI to design the facility, which included digging the building out from the hill and then replacing the hill



- Construction began in August 2003 and will be completed in two phases. The complete facility consists of four building components comprising a total of 420,000 square feet of usable space
  - Phase I Collections Building
    - The existing Federal Reserve Bank facility will be converted to storage for all sound and non-nitrate moving image holdings in environmental appropriate conditions (135,000 sq. ft.)
    - Central plant (heating and air conditioning, electrical controls, etc.) for the whole facility to be built behind the existing structure with office space for maintenance workers (50,000 sq. ft.)
    - Scheduled completion date for Phase I is November 2005
    - Library will move all recorded sound, television, video and (non-nitrate) film holdings to Culpeper



Phase II – Conservation Building and Nitrate Vaults

- New three-floor main office building with administrative offices,
- preservation labs and a 200 seat theater (175,000 sq. ft.) Nitrate vaults: 124 newly constructed individual vaults within two storage pods built to meet stringent standards for storing nitrate motion picture film (55,000 sq. ft.)
- Scheduled completion for Phase II is November 2006
  Library will move staff, preservation laboratories and nitrate film holdings to Culpeper
