Re: Final Response Freedom of Information Act Request No. EPA-2022-001623

This response letter concerns the above-referenced FOIA request, received by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA or Agency) on December 27, 2021, in which you requested:

A copy of each FOIA Backlog Reduction Plan, or FOIA Backlog Reduction Strategy, and each equivalent document discussing reduction of the FOIA Case Backlog. I am interested in internal documents rather than a document published online. I agree to limit this request to the results of a search of the records of the EPA Chief FOIA Officer. I limit this request to records between January 1, 2016 and present. I EXCLUDE from this request the Chief FOIA Officer reports transmitted to DOJ and published online, and the published FOIA Annual Reports transmitted to DOJ and published online.

Your request was assigned to the National FOIA Office (NFO) in the Office of General Counsel (OGC) for processing.

By email on December 29, 2021, Roberta White, OGC FOIA Coordinator, advised you that the NFO wanted to discuss your request during the week of January 10, 2022. On January 10, 2022, Patricia Weth, Assistant General Counsel in the NFO, Nicole Rementer, NFO Attorney-Adviser, and I virtually met with you to discuss the scope of your request. The NFO provided the following information relevant to your request: EPA's backlog reduction plan is built on the use of lean management techniques in conjunction with a long-term performance goal in the Agency's Strategic Plan. EPA's records at the national level include the Strategic Plan first issued in 2018 with the goal to eliminate the backlog of overdue FOIA requests, as well as documents that show office- and region-specific monthly and annual results and targets that cascade from the long-term performance goal. EPA is a decentralized FOIA processing agency, and each region and program office devise their individual plans to meet the office-level targets, which cascade from the EPA Strategic Plan.

Based on our conversation, you agreed EPA will satisfy your request by searching for and providing national FOIA program records created since 2018 that show the long-term

performance goals and cascading office-specific targets to reduce EPA's FOIA backlog, including EPA Strategic Plans, and reports on those metrics.

Search of Agency Records and Determination

The NFO concluded its search for records responsive to your request and located 54 responsive records. The following 54 records are released to you in full:

- FY 2018-22 EPA Strategic Plan, *available at* https://www.epa.gov/planandbudget/fy-2018-2022-epa-strategic-plan (last visited Feb. 1, 2022);
- Draft FY 2022-26 EPA Strategic Plan, available at https://www.epa.gov/planandbudget/strategicplan (last visited Feb. 1, 2022);
- EPA Monthly FOIA Backlog Reports (37 records);
- FOIA Quarterly Performance Review Slides (11 records);
- Annual office-specific backlog reduction plans for FY 2020-22 setting forth annual and monthly targets that cascade from the Strategic Plan goals (3 records); and
- Data Quality Record for Long-Term Performance Goal, Jan. 14, 2021.

Unfortunately, the NFO searched for, but did not locate, records for the full time frame. Specifically, the NFO did not locate: Monthly FOIA Backlog Reports for January 2018 to November 2018 and January 2019; FOIA Quarterly Performance Review slides for FY 2018 Q3, FY 2019 Q3, FY 2020 Q4, and FY 2021 Q2-3; and FY 2018-19 Monthly Backlog Reduction Goals by FOIA Program Office.

As we discussed on January 10, 2022, EPA FOIA processing is decentralized. Therefore, FOIA Program Offices in Headquarters and Regional Offices may have records reflecting their individual backlog plans, but you excluded such records from the scope of this request, EPA-2022-001623.

This letter constitutes a final response to your FOIA request. Your request has been granted in full. The billable costs to process your request amount to \$0.00.

Colleagues,

In his November 12, 2018 FOIA Memorandum, Acting Administrator Wheeler directed the National FOIA Office to circulate monthly a report of the FOIA request backlog at EPA. At the end of November 2018, EPA's total FOIA request backlog was 2,721. For this report, backlog is defined as FOIA requests pending for more than 20 days as of the end of the month and for which an extension was not documented in the FOIAonline tracking system.

Recent steps taken to improve FOIA processing within the Administrator's Office have yielded significant results. Roughly 275 requests were closed and over 500 interim responses were issued from April 30 to November 30. A "Tiger Team" of 12 staff temporarily assigned to help process FOIA requests has completed first reviews of more than 20,000 records from August 14 to November 30. Nevertheless, even with these efforts, at the end of October, the backlog in the Administrator's Office was 1,454, and at the end of November, the backlog in the Administrator's Office was 1,473.

Below are graphs showing the backlog of FOIA requests in headquarters programs and the regions at the end of October and November 2018. During this period, most offices saw their backlog

FOIA requests increase.

As these graphs show, we must increase our efforts to achieve our goal of timely processing all FOIA requests. The Administrator's Office continues to tackle its backlog and is committed to dramatically reduce its FOIA request backlog as quickly as possible.

The National FOIA Office will provide a report like this regarding the status of FOIA backlog across the Agency every month going forward.




In his November 12, 2018 FOIA Memorandum, Acting Administrator Wheeler directed the National FOIA Office to circulate monthly a report of the FOIA request backlog at EPA. Because of the government shutdown, this report provides data for the months of December 2018 and January 2019, as compared to the data previously reported for November 2018.

During the government shutdown from December 29, 2018 through January 25, 2019, EPA received 511 FOIA requests. Consequently, the Agency and most offices saw their backlog of FOIA requests increase in January. At the end of December 2018, EPA's total FOIA request backlog was 2664; at the end of January 2019, EPA's total FOIA request backlog was 3106.

Below are graphs showing the backlog of FOIA requests in headquarters programs and the regions at the end of November and December 2018 and January 2019. The backlog in the Administrator's Office was 1,473 at the end of November 2018, and it was 1,424 and 1,465 respectively at the end of December 2018 and January 2019.







Please continue your efforts to reduce your office's backlog. Many offices made progress in March to bring their FOIA backlog down from the high at the end of the appropriations lapse. The backlog from the end of December is included to serve as a reference point from prior to the appropriations lapse.

A few offices made notable progress to reduce their FOIA backlog. Regions 3, 5, and 9 and OECA, OGC, OLEM, OMS, and ORD all reduced their FOIA backlog by the end of March by more than 10 FOIA requests below December 2018. 








The charts below show the FOIA backlog in the headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of June, May, April, and March.



Colleagues,

The charts below show the FOIA backlog in the headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of July, June, May, and April.

The Agency's overall FOIA backlog again declined in July continuing a six month trend. At the end of July, the Agency had a FOIA backlog of 2,272, down 76 from the end of June. The Office of the Administrator again led the Agency's backlog reduction by a decline of 43 in June. Congratulations to Region 8 for an end of July backlog of 0 and to Region 3 by reducing your backlog by more than 50% in July.

The Backlog in a few offices increased in July. Overall, the Agency remains behind on its goal of reducing the FOIA backlog this fiscal year to 1,902 by the end of September. We must reduce the backlog by an additional 280 to achieve our FY 2019 goal. We need continued effort by all.

FY 2020 Office-specific Goals


The Agency has set its goal to reduce the FOIA backlog to 1,269 by the end of FY 2020. To achieve that goal, in FY 2020, all headquarters program offices and all regions must have in place and measure progress towards an office- or region-specific goal. The goal and your progress towards it will be reflected in the monthly bowling charts.

During the Month of September, I will reach out to all offices and regions to discuss with you the setting of your office- or region-specific FOIA backlog reduction goal. One approach would be for us to use an agency-wide approach that applies the same percentage reduction to all offices and regions. While that approach would be uniform and easy to apply (and we may choose to use it), it would not take into account unique circumstances or provide the opportunity for an office or region to get credit for setting a more aggressive goal. Thus, please carefully consider how your office or region can contribute to help the Agency achieve its FY 2020 goal and be prepared to discuss your plans with me in September. (For the 14 months between the end of July and the end of FY 2020, the Agency must reduce the backlog by an average of 84 each month to achieve the goal.)


July Backlog Data

The backlog in the Administrator's Office was 1,216 at the end of July, which is down from 1,259 at the end of June (and 1,304 at the end of May and 1,354 at the end of April). The Agency's backlog was 2,272 at the end of July 2019, which was the third consecutive month that the Agency's backlog was lower than it was at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Colleagues,

The charts below show the FOIA backlog in the headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of August, July, June, and May.

The Agency's overall FOIA backlog increased in August, ending a six month downward trend. At the end of August, the Agency had a FOIA backlog of 2,289, up 17 from the end of July. The backlog in the Office of the Administrator increased by 8 in August, to a total of 1,224. Congratulations to OCFO and Region 1 for an end of August backlog of 0, and congratulations to Region 2 for reducing your backlog by 15 in August.

The Backlog in a few offices increased, a few substantially. Overall, the Agency remains behind on its goal of reducing the FOIA backlog this fiscal year. Our goal is to reduce the backlog to 1,902 by the end of September. We must reduce the backlog by an additional 297 this month to achieve our FY 2019 goal. We need continued effort by all.

FY 2020 Office-specific Goals

The Agency set its goal to reduce the FOIA backlog to 1,269 by the end of FY 2020. This goal was set at a 50% reduction from the backlog that existed in April 2018 (the FY 2019 goal is to reduce by 25% backlog that existed in April 2018). While the Agency made progress towards reducing the backlog, much work remains.

To achieve the FY 2020 goal, all headquarters program offices and all regions must have in place and measure progress towards an office- or region-specific goal in FY 2020. The office- and region-specific goal and your progress towards it will be reflected in the monthly bowling charts.


This month, I will reach out to all offices and regions to discuss with you the setting of your office- or region-specific FOIA backlog reduction goal. By including September 2019 in the calculations, the Agency must reduce its FOIA backlog by 79 in each of the next 13 months and each office must reduce its backlog by 3.5% per month if a uniform goal is used by all.

A uniform percentage reduction across the whole agency would be easy to apply, although it might not take into account unique circumstances or provide the opportunity for an office or region to get credit for setting a more aggressive goal. For example, those offices with a current FOIA backlog of less than 10 could easily commit to eliminate the backlog entirely. Please carefully consider how your office or region can contribute to help the Agency achieve its FY 2020 goal and be prepared to discuss your plans with me in the next few weeks. All offices must eliminate their backlog by 2022.


July Backlog Data

The charts below show the FOIA backlog in the headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of September, August, July, and June.

The Agency's overall FOIA backlog resumed its downward trend in September after a modest increase in August. At the end of September, the Agency had a FOIA backlog of 2,153, down 136 from August (which was up 17 from the end of July). The backlog in the Office of the Administrator also declined by 31 at the end of September to a total of 1,193.

Congratulations to OCFO and Regions 1, 8 and 10 for an end of September backlog of 0. Congratulations also to OCSPP, OGC, and Regions 2 and 5 for reducing your backlog by 10 or more in September (notably, Region 5 eliminated an anomalus spike in August and also reduced by 10 from July). Nearly all offices reduced their backlog.




Data Review this Fiscal Year

The National FOIA Office plans to review and audit the data in FOIAonline during this fiscal year. Currently, our measure of the backlog takes into account the original 20 working days allowed by the statute as well as due date extensions of 10 days for unusual circumstances and due date extensions by agreement with requesters. The NFO will audit the information recorded in these fields in FOIAonline and work with program and region offices to ensure that the recorded due date extensions are supported by information in the FOIAonline record.

The NFO will also audit and work with program and region offices to ensure record support for tolling of the due date for the one-time allowed for clarification of requests and for seeking fee assurances as well as record support for communication with requesters about unusual circumstances requiring longer than 30 working days, even without the requester's agreement.

When the Agency is confident with the data and record support in FOIAonline, we intend to adjust the backlog reporting to reflect when offices have accurately used the flexibility provided in the statute for communicating with requesters about due date extensions and tolling of the response time. With full support from all offices, our goal is to complete this adjustment prior to the end of the fiscal year.


Colleagues,

The charts below show the FOIA backlog in the EPA headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of March, February, January, and December. The Agency's overall FOIA backlog decreased in March down to 2,035.

Congratulations to the offices with no backlog this month—Regions 1, 8, and 10 (and congratulations to Regions 1 and 10 for sustaining a zero backlog for seven consecutive months, and to Region 8 for six consecutive months). Also, congratulations to the Administrator's Office for reducing its backlog by 86 in March. At the end of March, the Office of the Administrator had a FOIA backlog of 1,076, which was down from 1,162 at the end of February.

While these successes and the overall Agency backlog reduction in March are great news, several offices added to their backlog in March and the Agency as a whole is behind on its targets for this fiscal year. Thus, we need continued, sustained effort over the coming months to achieve the Agency-wide and office-specific backlog reduction goals by the end of the fiscal year.





The charts below show the FOIA backlog in the EPA headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of April, March, February, and January 2020. The Agency's overall FOIA backlog decreased in March down to 1,846. This is down 13% from the beginning of the fiscal year, when the backlog stood at 2,128. Let's keep this trend going!

Congratulations to the offices with no backlog this month –Regions 1, 8, and 10 (and congratulations to Regions 1 and 10 for sustaining a zero backlog for eight consecutive months, and to Region 8 for seven consecutive months). Also, congratulations to the Administrator's Office for reducing its backlog by 98 in April. At the end of April, the Office of the Administrator had a FOIA backlog of 978, which the first time below 1,000 in many years.

While these successes and the overall Agency backlog reduction in April are great news, the Agency as a whole is still behind on its targets for this fiscal year. Thus, we need continued, sustained effort over the coming months to achieve the Agency-wide and office-specific backlog reduction goals by the end of the fiscal year.

This report corrects a mistake in filters used in the data for the Regions, which caused 12 FOIA requests to be counted as backlogged when they should not have been. Although modest for the Agency's overall numbers, this is significant for a few offices that justifiably take pride in their low backlog. Thus, I am re-issuing the report to show their accomplishments.

The revised charts below show the FOIA backlog in EPA headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of May, April, March, and February 2020. The Agency's overall FOIA backlog decreased in May down to 1,767 from 1,846 at the end of April. This is down 17% from the beginning of the fiscal year, when the backlog stood at 2,128. Let's keep this trend going!





Colleagues,

Wow! You made significant progress bringing the backlog down this month. The charts below show the FOIA backlog in EPA headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of May, April, March, and February 2020. The Agency's overall FOIA backlog decreased in June down to 1,574 from 1,767 at the end of May. This is <u>down 26%</u> from the beginning of the fiscal year, when the backlog stood at 2,128. Let's keep this trend going!

The Details and successes

Congratulations to the offices with no backlog this month –Regions 1, 7, 8, 9 and 10. And, congratulations to Regions 1 and 10 for sustaining a zero backlog for ten consecutive months, and Region 8 for a zero backlog for nine consecutive months.


The two big movers were the Administrator's Office and OCSPP. The Administrator's Office led the Agency, reducing its backlog by 116 in June. This brought the AO's FOIA backlog down to 815, *down 31%* from 1,193 at the beginning of the year! OCSPP also made remarkable progress, bringing its backlog down by 59, from 461 at the end of May. That is a 13% reduction in just one month (although it is still higher than OCSPP's backlog of 368 at the beginning of the year). OCSPP has a comprehensive plan for its backlog. In June, OCSPP created a Tiger Team of 31 employees and six law clerks to review documents, and the NFO's FOIA Expert Assistance Team (FEAT) trained them and got them started tackling OCSPP's more than 100 Relativity workspaces of document collections.


The following offices started the fiscal year with a significant backlog and have substantially reduced it: OW is down 87%; ORD is down 81%; Region 4 is down 80%; OLEM is down 67%; Region 5 is down 60%; OMS is down 50%; OAR is down 46%; Region 2 is down 37%; OIG is down 28%. Regions 7 and 9 eliminated their backlog during the fiscal year.

Another 305 to go this fiscal year

The overall Agency backlog reduction is great news. Nevertheless, the Agency's Strategic Goal set an interim target for this fiscal year for the Agency to reduce the backlog to 1,269. To achieve that target, we must reduce the backlog by an additional 305 over the next three months. Thus, we need continued, sustained effort – every backlogged FOIA request that can be closed will help. We can do it – keep the effort going!

The Agency's overall FOIA backlog decreased in July down to 1,501 from 1,574 at the end of June. This is <u>down 29%</u> from the beginning of the fiscal year, when the number of overdue FOIA requests stood at 2,128.

Key Successes

Congratulations to the offices with no overdue FOIA requests this month – Regions 1, 8, 9 and 10. And, congratulations to Regions 1 and 10 for sustaining a zero backlog for eleven consecutive months, and Region 8 for a zero backlog for ten consecutive months. Congratulations also to OCSPP, AO, OAR, and Region 2 all brought their overdue FOIA requests down by more than 10 this month. The AO's backlog of overdue FOIA requests now stands at 800, down 15 in July. As part of OCSPP's effort to tackle its FOIA request backlog, OCSPP's Tiger Team of Document Reviewers, working with the NFO's FOIA Expert Assistance Team, have reviewed and redacted nearly 23,400 documents in 12 workspaces since they started work at the end of May.


Another 232 to reduce this fiscal year


The July backlog reduction was respectable and continued to build on the stellar reduction in the 3rd quarter of FY 2020. Nevertheless, the Agency's Strategic Goal set an interim target for this fiscal year for the Agency to reduce the backlog to 1,269, which means we must reduce the backlog by an additional 232 over the next two months (August and September). Thus, we need continued, sustained effort – every backlogged FOIA request that can be closed will help. We can do it -- keep the effort going!

Self-Audits of Due Date Extensions

Agency program and regional offices have many FOIA requests with extended due dates beyond the original 20 working days the statute initially provides. Such due date extensions may have been made by agreement with the requester or by the Agency giving the requester notice when unusual circumstances exist as authorized by the statute or because the Agency needed to seek clarification or fee assurance from the requester. Thank you to the following 18 offices that have completed their self-audit of FOIAonline data to ensure their due date extensions conform to the statutory standards: Regions 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10, and AO, OAR, OCFO, OCSPP, OGC, OIG, OMS, ORD, and OW. The NFO will begin sampling to check the self-audits and will work with the remaining offices to ensure remaining offices complete the self-audits and to ensure the accuracy of the Agency's data for reporting purposes.

Colleagues,

The Agency continued to make progress this month bringing down the backlog of overdue FOIA requests. Overall, The Agency brought down the backlog of overdue requests in August by 77, down to 1,424, from 1,501 at the end of July. This is <u>down 33%</u> from the beginning of the fiscal year, when the number of overdue FOIA requests stood at 2,128. Congratulations, and thank you!

Next Steps in the Glide Path to Eliminate the Backlog by End of FY 2022

The Agency's goal is to bring the overall backlog down to 1,269 by the end of September 2020, and then to bring the backlog down to 635 by the end of FY 2021. These are the yearly milestones along the way to EPA's Strategic Goal of eliminating the backlog of overdue FOIA requests by the end of fiscal year 2022. While the Agency has made substantial progress towards this year's milestone, we must reduce the backlog by another 155 to meet this year's goal. Several offices have told me that they are working hard to do more than usual to help achieve this goal. We need everyone's similar effort this month to do it, and we can achieve it!

Turning to next fiscal year, the NFO will send out to offices within the next week proposals for your glide path to achieve the Agency's goal of reducing the backlog of overdue FOIA requests to 635 by the end of September 2021. To achieve this goal, the agency must reduce the backlog by 61 each month from the end of August 2020 through the end of September 2021. We will propose office-and region-specific goals the same way as last year: the glide path will be monthly targets along a straight line showing what each office needs to accomplish to help the Agency achieve its monthly targets. Last year, several offices chose to nuance their own glide paths by anticipating lower backlog reduction in certain months and making up for it in other months. In addition, just as we did last year, all offices with a current backlog of 10 or less will be asked to consider setting their own goal of eliminating their backlog by September 2021.

Key Successes in August


The charts below show the number of overdue FOIA requests in EPA headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of the most recent four months: August, July, June, and May 2020. Congratulations to the Administrator's Office for achieving 44% of the agency-wide reduction this month. The AO brought its backlog down by 34 in August to 766, from 800 at the end of July.


Congratulations and thank you to Region 5 for cutting its backlog down by 12 this month.

Region 5 has been a powerhouse of success this past year. At the end of August 2019, Region 5's backlog of overdue FOIA requests stood at 101. Now, its backlog is only 12, down 88%! OCSPP also contributed significantly to the agency-wide reduction this month. OCSPP reduced its backlog by 11. These three offices – AO, R5, and OCSPP – contributed the most this month, but every reduction helps: reductions in other offices accounted for 26% of the overall reduction this month.

Also, congratulations and thank you to the offices with no overdue FOIA requests this month – Regions 1, 8, 9 and 10. Regions 1 and 10 have sustained a zero backlog for twelve consecutive months, and Region 8 has done so for eleven months! Many offices are also maintaining a low backlog of only one to three – including Regions 4 and 7, OCFO, OITA, ORD, and OW. The agency would not be as successful without these offices' continuous work at sustaining a zero or very low backlog. Everyone's effort counts and is meaningful.

Colleagues,

The Agency continued to make progress in September bringing down the backlog of overdue FOIA requests. Overall, The Agency brought down the backlog of overdue FOIA requests to 1,396 at the end of September, from 1,424 at the end of August. This is <u>down 732 or 34%</u> from the beginning of the fiscal year, when the number of overdue FOIA requests stood at 2,128. Congratulations, and thank you!

Note regarding possible data adjustments because of FOIAonline problems: At the end of the fiscal year, FOIAonline was completely offline for significant blocks of time and interruptions continued into this week. Please notify the NFO if any cases were closed (or due dates properly extended) prior to the end of the fiscal year but the data was not yet entered in FOIAonline when the NFO pulled the data for this report on October 2.

Key Successes in FY 2020, including Communication with Requesters

We have celebrated many offices' success throughout the year for backlog reduction achieved in particular months. Here, we highlight the accomplishments measured for the full fiscal year from October 1, 2019 to September 30, 2020.

<u>Administrator's Office</u>. A huge congratulations and thank you to the Administrator's Office for achieving 61% of the agency-wide reduction in FY 2020. The AO brought its backlog down by 447, or 37%, at the end of September to 746, from 1,193 at the beginning of FY 2020.


Regions. Congratulations and thank you to Regions 1, 4, 8, 9 and 10 for having no backlog of overdue FOIA requests at the end of FY 2020! Regions 1 and 10 have sustained a zero backlog for 13 consecutive months, and Region 8 has done so for 12 months – the whole fiscal year! Region 9 sustained a zero backlog for the last four months of the fiscal year and Region 4 achieved a zero backlog in September. Regions 5 and 2 also significantly lowered their backlog of overdue FOIA requests within this fiscal year: Region 5 by 60% and Region 2 by 48%.


Headquarters Offices. OW, ORD, and OITA reduced their backlog of overdue FOIA requests to only 1 in each office by the end of the fiscal year. For OW, this is a 97% reduction from the beginning of the fiscal year, and it is a 91% reduction for ORD, and a 50% reduction for OITA. The following offices also significantly reduced their backlog of overdue FOIA requests by this fiscal year: OLEM by 67%; OAR by 62%; OIG by 45%; and OECA by 43%. Congratulations and thank you!

Communication with requesters is an Agency accomplishments this year. Centralizing intake enabled the NFO to establish a best practice of sending an early, substantive communication to every requester in just a few days. By year's end, requesters were receiving a letter within 5 business days and most letters were sent in two days or less. NFO also provided training to strengthen the Agency's communication with requesters regarding expected processing times, including on how to negotiate due date extensions and to narrow the scope of requested records. The NFO also provided guidance on communicating with requesters and working with them to provide electronic records during the global COVID-19 pandemic while the Agency was not able to immediately produce hard-copy records.


The Agency's backlog of overdue FOIA requests increased in February 2021. Overall, the Agency's backlog of overdue FOIA requests increased to 1,400 in February, up from 1,386 at the end of January.


Many offices are successfully maintaining a very low backlog or no backlog, and some offices have continued to bring their backlog down substantially. Congratulations to ORD and Regions 1, 4, 8, and 9, which had no backlog of overdue FOIA requests at the end of February 2021. Congratulations to Region 2, which has cut its backlog nearly in half over the last four months and to Region 5, which has joined the ranks of those with only very low backlog.

Notwithstanding these successes in many offices, the Agency has not met its monthly targets for the past five months, and the backlog reduction appears to have stalled. 





Congratulations also to OGC for achieving a 30% backlog reduction in the first quarter of FY22, and to the following additional offices for a backlog below five at the end of December: OECA, OITA, OLEM. Maintaining these low numbers is critical to the Agency's overall commitment to transparency and the specific objective to eliminate the FOIA backlog.

End of December Overdue FOIA Data

The charts below show the number of overdue FOIA requests in EPA headquarters program offices and the regions at the end of the most recent four months December November October and September 2021. The Office of the Administrators s backlog increased by 22 to 637 at the end of December.





For this report overdue FOIA request is defined as a FOIA request pending for more than 20 working days as of the end of the month or beyond an applicable due date extension that has been documented in FOIAonline (by agreement proper notice of unusual circumstances or notice of clock stoppage for clarification or fee assurances that is recorded as a due date extension). Please note that this definition of the backlog is different from the definition required for the Agency s annual report to the Department of Justice which does not take into account unusual circumstances extensions beyond 10 days or other statutorily authorized due date extensions documented in the FOIAonline tracking system.

The September data in this report was generated from FOIAonline on October 1; the October data on November 1; the November data on December 7 2021; and the December data on January 3.
