MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference, consisting of Mesers. Nothan, Clegg, E. A. Tamm, Culm Tamm, and Clavin, considered the following suggestions submitted by SAC Coulters

1. He suggests that the Bureau consider the advisability of purchasing telephone directories of the various cities in lieu of the present practice of having Agents contact the telephone companies for them.

The Conference unanimously recommends against the adoption of this suggestion, pointing out that where it is not possible to seours telephone directories without charge, such directories need not be secured.

2. He recommends that a statement be included in Section 93 of the Manual of Rules and Regulations clarifying the rule concerning. the submission of daily reports. He points out that it is the impression of many Agents, when temporarily absent from their division on subpoens or on temporary assignments, and under the jurisdiction of other Special Agents in Charge in other districts, that it is required that they submit daily reports to the Special Agent in Chargo in their headquarters division. Ir. Coulter believes that a statement to the effect that daily reports under/circumstances are unnecessary should be included in the section of the Menual treating daily reportu-

The Conference unanimously recommends against any change in the rule covering the submission of daily reports, believing that even though such daily reports are submitted by Agents on court attendance or temporary assignments in other districts they serve a definite purpose. inasmich as the Special Agent in Charge of the office to which they are assigned has definite information as to the duties being performed by : them during their absence from their field office district.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs, Nathan, Clegg, E. A. Tana, Quinn Tana, and Glavin, considered the following suggestions submitted by former SAC Reinecke:

1. He suggests that in view of the tremendous emount of investigative work being referred to the field service and the tremendous delinquency at the present time, the Bureau do everything possible to fully man its field offices. He points out that regular violations, such as NAVTA, USTA, Impersonation, and others are being overlooked and major cases are being given prompt and expeditious attention. He further points out that the U. S. Attorneys usually desire the investigation to be completed prior to the next grand jury or court session and it has not always been possible to do this, resulting in delayed prosecution and a lessening of appreciation for our work on the part of those who have a prosecutive interest in the case.

The Conference points out that the Bureau is doing everything humanly possible at the present time to increase its field investigative staff.

2. He suggests that due to the increased administrative functions in the field division headquarter office the quality of investigative work would be enhanced if more administrative details and responsibility in business not having to do directly with investigations could be placed on some sort of an office manager in field offices of any substantial size. He points out that the following could be assigned to such a field office manager:

(1) Periodic check of automobiles and other field office equipment.

(2) Physical office inspections.

(3) Care of field office equipment and supplies including requisitions therefor.

(A) Assignment of stenographers.

(5) Handling of repairs to equipment and vouchers in connection therewith and similar non-investigative functions.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Conference consisting of Messrs. Nathen, E. A. Tamm, Clege, Q. Tamm and Glavin considered the communication dated June 19, 1939, received from Special Agent Eli J. Rose, wherein he suggests that before an Agent be considered as having attained a status of a full fledged, all-ground employee, he should have served at least six months on general assignment in the New York City Office, regardless of whether he has resided previously in a big eastern city or in one of the provincial areas. He points out that during such a period of assignment, an Agent can so broaden his investigative education and so attain pelf confidence and experience that he will be a much more valuable employee of the Eureau in other field offices.

The Conference pointed out that it is the policy of the Bureau at the present time to assign its Agents so that they receive a well-rounded experience in all sections of the country.

Agent Rose further points out that he does not believe that the Bureau should assign to the New York City Office an Agent direct from the training school because in an office of such magnitude, where special squads and special assignments are generally going on at all times, a new man gets lost in the hubbub of big matters.

The Conference is of the opinion that with proper supervision to E A 1.01 new Agents there should not be any donsiderable difficulties of any the color new Agents being lost in the sphere of the many special assignments Mr. color in New York City Office. The Conference consisting of Messrs. Nathan, E. A. Tamm. Clegg, Q. Tamm and Glavin considered the suggestion contained in a memorandum to the Director dated June 20, 1939, submitted by Glan P. Gannon in which he states that he has noticed that people entering the Bureau at the 9th and Pennsylvania Avenue entrance to the building for the purpose of taking a tour encounter difficulty in finding room 5636. Invariably they have to wait at the 5th floor elevator bank and ask for directions to the tour room. He points out that upon being directed, they forget the number before they reach room 5636 and either enter the Director's Reception Room or have to ask for additional information. He points out that the wording on the door of room 5635 is "Exhibit Room, Federal Bureau of Investigation," He recommend that this Legend be changed to "Tours, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Intrance."

The Conference unanimously recommends against the adoption of this suggestion, it being believed that the legend presently appearing on the door of room 5636 more accurately describes the content thereof then would the legend suggested by Mr. Gennon.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. E. A. Temm, Nathan, Clegg Quinn Temm, and Glavin, considered a suggestion submitted by Special Agent Fallaw that in the event of a running gun fight involving automobiles, Special Agents of the Bureau would possess a distinct advantage if their cars were equipped with movable windshields and movable glass in the rear window of the car.

The Conference recommends against the adoption of this suggestion, believing that moveble windshields and moveble rear windows would not afford a greater advantage in the case of a running gun fight than Agents of the Bureau have at the present time. The Conference further points out that on the original automobiles purchased by the Bureau such windshields were secured, although the rear windows were not moveble, and from experimentation it was found that it would be difficult to properly handle firearms through the opening made by these windshields.

HEMORAUDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference considered the suggestion of SAC-Manni that that part of Section 42 of the Manual of Rules and Regulations which contains information as to reports on fugitives be taken from that section and made a separate section or be set out in paragraph form in Section 53.

The Conference points out that Section 42 pertains to the manner of preparing investigative reports. The subheading "Title" therefore sets forth the Bureau's regulations with reference to the setting forth of a title of a report including the titles of reports in those cases in which a subject is a fugitive. The Conference believes that logically a person seeking to determine how a title would be set forth in investigative reports in those cases in which the subject is a fugitive would examine the Hanual under that section which deals with report writing and the titles of cases.

SAC Hanni also suggested that Section 7 of the Manual of Rules and Regulations be amended to provide that the report recording final disposition of a case should indicate that the ariginal enforcement officer who furnished the Bureau information of the violation has been informed of the disposition of the case.

The Conference points out that the present Mandal requirement is that the original enforcement officer who informed of the violation be notified of the disposition of the case. The Conference does not feel it is necessary to require the inclusion of an affirmative statement in an investigative report indicating that this has been done feeling that the Special Agent in Charge should in approving reports indicating the final disposition of a case satisfy himself that this action has been taken.

1. She suggests that the Bureau file numbers when availables be used on the third page of the monthly administrative report as an sid to identification of the cases when the report is received at the Bureau.

The Conference recommends against the adoption of this suggestion and that the present procedure of listing cases on page three of the administrative report by title instead of by identifying number be continued, it being pointed out that through the use of file numbers there is a great possibility of transposition occurring.

2. She suggests that when preparing additional assignment cards, the printing be begun lower on assignment cards, because it is more difficult to get carbon all the way to the top and if a duclicate assignment card is made up there is not room to type the word, "duplicate."

The Conference recommends that this be done. There is stracked horeto a memorandum to the Chief Clerk concerning this matter.

3. She recommends that the index cords on automobiles be filed first according to the name of the car, secondly as to the first three numbers of the motor number, and then according to the 4th number of the motor number.

The Conference recommends against the adoption of this suggestion, it being pointed out that index cards at the present time covering automobiles are filed primarily by make, and not numerically. It is not believed that there should be any change in this method of filing at the present time.

The Executive Conference considered the suggestion of Agent Vinstead that a plan be worked out whereby the Special Agent in Charge may pass upon preliminary reports and complaints in Thite Slave Traffic Not cases and determine whether investigation phould be continued or discontinued without referring the case to the United States Attorney, particularly in those cases in which a particular United States Attorney has indicated a disinclination to prosecute coses of a similar nature.

The Conference is of the opinion that the Bureau should not take the responsibility for deciding whether Thite Slave Traffic Act cases, regardless of the technical nature of the violation, should be prosecuted, but feels this is solely a function of the United States Attorney. The Conference is unantmously opposed to any action being taken which would authorize the Special Agents in Charge to evaluate the facts from a legal viewpoint and determine whether prosecution might be instituted and the investigation continued or discontinued.

LIFLORANDUL FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference, consisting of Mosors. Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Clegg, Quinn Temm, and Clavin, considered the following suggestions submitted by the above Agent:

I. He suggests that the use of file folders in which Bureau Field Office Files are maintained be discontinued. This suggestion is based on the fact that at the Seat of Government in the Administrative Files Section these folders are not used, since apparently they serve no useful purpose and it is believed that the discontinuance of the use of these folders in the field divisions will result in a considerable monetary savings, a saving of file cabinet space, and a saving in time and labor in making up and labeling these folders, in addition to the files themselves.

The Conference is unnimously opposed to the adoption of this suggestion, it being pointed out that through inquiry at the New York and Washington Field Offices it was accertained that the field personnel are of the opinion that such file folders are essential to the proper maintenance of field office files. It was pointed out to the Conference that the tlarical personnel of both the New York and the Washington Field Offices are of the opinion that retention of the folders is necessary for the proper filing of charge out slips and for the purpose of filing serials which have not yet been included in the file. It is further pointed out that if file folders were not used it would be necessary to have some kind of a division marker in the files so that the files themselves could be easily segregated and identified.

2. He suggests that when new Agents are first assigned to the field they be required to spend at least the first week of their initial assignment in the field office, thoroughly learning and becoming acquainted with the administrative set—up and office routing.

The Conference points out that under present regulations the SAC of the field office, upon the arrival of a new Special Agent in his district, should take it upon himself to thoroughly acquaint this Agent with the functioning of the office in question. The Conference recommends that this matter again be included in the general letter which is being prepared for dissemination to the field service.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. Clegg, Nothan, E. A. Temm, Quinn Tamm, and Glavin, considered a suggestion submitted by Mr. Hince that with respect to the handling of nemorands and other communications at the Seat of Government an arrangement be worked out whereby any supervisor on official preparing memorands requiring action have placed at the end of the body portion of the abstract slip a notation such as the following, "ACTION RECURED," " FOR RECORD PURPOSES ONLY," OR "FOR REVIEW." He believes that this would bend to expedite the handling of matters which require action, although they would not necessarily be of the minute-to-minute urgent action type, such specially urgent matters being handled with special tags.

He points out that his experience in observing large quantities of written matter coming to the desks of Durenu officials and supervisors is that the urgent and action-requiring communications are often delayed because of the large quantity of pemoranda submitted for record purposes only, for general zeview, and for interest only and believes that this suggestion will afford a method thoreby clarical employees, supervisors, and officials will be able quickly, without reading the contents of a large group of papers, to select those requiring action.

The Conference is opposed to the adoption of this suggestion, pointing out that it is believed that those supervisors and officials of the Bureau receiving correspondence would, for their benefit, wish to personally review the correspondence being referred to them for the purpose of definitely determining whether any action is to be taken or whether the content thereof is of an emergency or special nature. It is not believed that this action should be left to the discretion of the originator of the correspondence in question. A letter to Mr. Hince in this regard is attached.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Hessra, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Clogg, Quinn Tanm, and Glavin, considered a suggestion submitted by Agent Molls that all automobiles being used by Eureau Agents, especially in those districts covering west territories, be so equipped that when Agents in the field are called upon to proceed to the scene of a crime they will have readily available the proper equipment to make the needed initial investigation without first having to request that supplies be sent to them in the field from the various field offices. He points out that he has particular reference to bank robbery, bank burglary, klanaping, and other major investigations which require impediate and comprehensive action, and that in rost instances the service kits should contain such acticles and tools as are usually necessary to properly conduct the necded preliminary exemination and investigation. It is his opinion that such kits should contain the following equipments. Cemera, films and flashlight bulbs, fingerprint powders, brushes and lifting tape, plaster of paris and other raterial for the taking of casts, brench, hammer, saw, screwdriver, and other equipment of a like nature.

The Conference is opposed to the edoption of this suggestion, pointing out that kits, powders and Tingerprint cameras are available in the various field offices for assignment to Agents when necessary. It is not believed that such equipment should be carried regularly in Bureau automobiles, first, because there would be no justification for completely equipping some 400 to 500 automobiles in this manner, and second because theft of small auticles from Bureau automobiles has not been completely eliminated and there is no reason. to subject to theft fingerprint cameras and like equipment. It is believed that the SACs of the various field offices can, in their assignments, properly equip the various Special Agents in their territories.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. Nathan. Clegg, E. A. Tama, Quinn Tama, and Glavin, considered the following suggestions submitted by the above Agents.

L. He suggests that the telephone number and the address. of the office of Resident Agents be listed under the heading, "Department of Justice, " in the United States Government section of the talephone directories.

The Conference unanimously opposed the adoption of this suggestion, pointing out that a Resident Agent, in properly performing his duties, will not be available in the Resident Agency office, and a telephone for that reason would not be of any particular benefit. The Conference further points out that there are numerous Resident Agencies where no specific office space has been allocated and that by reason of the changing of Resident Agents in the various cities if their residence telephones were to be used in listings in the telephone directories they would for the most part be out of date and nacless.

2. He suggests that the Bureau consider purchasing larger red lights to be used either with a "disappearing" assembly on top of the car, or in some manner who reby the larger light can owing out to the left and be concealed when not in use. He pointed out that the present small red lights are not particularly noticeable or effective.

The Conference points out that this natter has been given study not only by a committee at the Seat of Government, but by a Committee of field experts, and the recommendation has been made that dual lights be installed in such a manner that they will be visible both from the sides and the front of the car. These lights were ordered and at the present time are being delivered to the field service with appropriate instructions for their installation.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messre, Mathen, Clegg, E. A. Tamp, Quinn Tamp, and Clayin, considered a suggestion submitted by Special Agent (A) Faulton that the purchase of dictating machines be confined to such machines as are considered immediately necessary and that an inquiry be made to ascertain when the companies monufacturing these machines expect to put on the market technically up-to-date machines with electrical recording and transcription. He points out that now rachines are being manufactured at the present time and that there appears to be an understanding between the manufacturers of such equipment to put the new machines out at identical periods.

The Conference points out that the Bureau has followed the policy in the past of purchasing dictating rechines only at the specific request of the various field offices and upon specific need at the Sett of Government. The Bureau also endeavors to keep up-to-date on new: machines being canufactured by dictating machine companies and has at all times secured up-to-date equipment.

Faulson also suggests that it would be an easy matter to have an attachment for the recording of telephone conversations. The Conference is not of the opinion that telephone recording units which cost approximately \$800 each at the present time should be considered as regular equipment in the various field offices.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Mesers, Nathan, E. A. Tamin, Quinn Tennis Clegg, and Clevin, considered the following suggestions submitted by Special Agent Frank 7. Blaket

1. That the rule of the Bureau be smended whereby some latitude may be given and come exception made to the rule prohibiting the taking of local officers outside their respective jurisdictions for essipting in an investigation being conducted by Special Agents of the Bureau. Blake points out that, it would appear in some instances that it would not only be proper to permit the local officer the furnished the information to accompany the Agents upon the investigation outside his jurisdiction, but in many instances it would be a valuable addition to the resources of the Bureut.

The Conference recommends that the Bureau's present rule in this regard be continued, that local law enforcement officers be not taken with Special Agents outside of their respective jurisdictions to assist in investigations unless prior Bureau approval is received.

2. Agent Blake suggests that the Hureau insist that Agents procure automobile driver's licenses for any state in which he is or right be expected to operate a Bureau-rimed or personally offied automobile.

It is pointed out by the Conference that the Bureauts present regulation covering this matter appears to be sufficient, the regulation being that Agents operating cars in any jurisdiction must have local operators permits. HEHORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Conference considered the suggestion made by Ur. Nest that the purpose of the bank robbery albums be so defined as to make their chief use the identification of subjects involved in future bank robberies, eliminating in particular the photographs of deceased individuals.

The Conference feels the selection of photographs of individuals for inclusion in the bank robbery albums is g problem that must be met primarily by the Special Agent in Charge who must exercise both discretion and judgment in determining what photographs should be included. The conference does not sympathize with incorporating in bank: robbery albums a large number of the photographs of persons who could not possibly have committed current bank robberies but points out it is desirable in order to check the reliability of a witness to include some photography of persons who could not possibly have been connected with current robberies. 

The Executive Conference, Messrs. Tolson, Clavin, Nathan, E. A. Tarm, Quinn Temm, and Clegg being present, considered the suggestions of Mr. Gurnea for additional equipment for the barracks building at Quantico. The Conference approved the list of equipment with the following exceptions:

1. It was believed that although .22 calibre rifles might serve some purpose in training new recruits that after all it was unnecessary and since the Agents were adults they should be able to learn to shoot by using the .351, machine gun and 30106 calibre rifle. The use of .22 callure rifles was considered by the Conference as something in the nature of a luxury the value of which after all would be too limited to justify the expense.

2. It was believed that no effort should be made to get television sets et the present time due to the fact that this type of receiving equipment is not satisfactory at great distances from the broadcasting stations.

All the other items listed by Mr. Gurnea were approved and, if approved by the Director, will be referred to the Chief Clerk's Office.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

On invitation of the authorities at Quantico, Mr. Clegg was authorized to observe the use of balloons in firearms training at Quantico. Mr. Clegg had to be absent from the city on the day the demonstration was given and Mr. Gurnes was requested to make these observations.

Balloons which were specially made, and which cost one and six-tenths cents each, had been purchased from the Toycraft Rubber Company of Achland, Ohio, by the Marine Corps. When fully inflated the balloon has the appearance of a human body, without arms or legs. Properly inflated the head is 7 x 9 inches in size and the body approximately il x 13 inches. This represents approximately the vital parts of the human body which would have to be struck by a builet in order for a shot to be fatal.

Mr. Gurnes reported that the Marines, in boats on the Potomac River, rowed to the shore and landed. They had balloons placed about on the firegins range to represent the enemy. Some of the balloons were anchored securely to the ground and some of them were attached to strings and the wind would blow them about as if they were moving targets. It would be possible for the ballooms to be attached to a rope and pulled across the range, in this manner forming moving targets. Mr. Gurnes reported that the Marines were enthusiastic and the use of these balloons stimulated their interest and at the same time served as a Heryt practical firearms problem.

Since these balloons cost but \$16.00 per thousand, the Conference Nath Cless, recommended that 5,000 of the balloons be purchased for experimental purposes in order to determine if they may be utilized in making a more practical Ladd firearms course for the Bureau. Some sample balloons were furnished and are in coney the attached envelope.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. E.A. Tamm, Glavin, Nathan, Q. Tamm, Rosen, Nichols, Ladd, and Clegg, considered suggested rules presented to the conference by Mr. Clegg in connection with the operation of the EBI training center at Quantico.

For the period following dinner, which will be completed by 7:30 P.M. and until 7:00 A.M. the following morning it was recommended by Mr. Rosen that there be no restriction on the students of the FBI NPA or others as to their activities as long as they were not intoxicated. and their conduct was gentlemanly. This would mean that they would be permitted to visit the village at Quantico, attend moving picture shows, others are to rand even proceed to Washington provided they could return by 7:00 A.M. remain on res- when the routine began the following morning. All other members of the conference recommended that as for the NPA students they be permitted to cept for week be at freedom with the usual arestrictions relative to intoxication and gentlemanly conduct imposed from the completion of the dinner period until midnight but that they must be in the building by midnight. Of course, their notebooks will be inspected and they will be required individually, to keep up with their classes and studies, and they are to be warned that in the event they fail to do so they will be dropped from the school. As for the Agents, new Agents classes will last until 7:30 or 8:00 P.M. and in-service classes will usually last until 9:00 P.M. It was recommended at the conference that the same privileges be extended to the Agents as recommended for the police Academy students from the time their classes are completed until midnight. Mr. Rosen recommended that they be given their freedom until the daily class routine began at 7:00 A.M. the following morning.

5. In case of illness, it is recommended that retrainees, new Agents and NP A members be provided medical attention and hospital facilities when needed at Quantico and that the Bureau do all it can to see that

such facilities are provided without cost; also that any illness attributive to active duty status would be paid for if possible by the Bureau. or through the regular compensation channels, and that the policemen be considered as a reserve corps of the Bureau and similar treatment be provided them. Of course, any hospitalization, operations, or medical attention in no way connected with their service as sutdents would have to be paid for by the individuals themselves. Mr. Glavin is making arrangements for Navy Department officials for the use of their hospital and medical facilities at Quantico.

4. Registration Book - It is recommended that all those assigned tố Quantico as students be requested as they depart from the reservation to sign a register showing their names, the time of departure, the time of return, and where they expect to be, and that this registration book be kept in the administrative office and that there also be listed a general statement as to the reason for their departures. If this is approved. there is attached a suggested form for this purpose.

Floors must be mopped. daily.

It is recommended that NPA members and Bureau employees be required to clean up their own rooms, make their own beds, and sweep the floors of their sleeping quarters, that there be appointed in each room of six a leader to serve for one, month to supervise the cleaning and who will be held responsible for it with authority to hold each occupant of the room responsible for assigned duties; that the sweepings from the bedrooms be swept into the hallway and the caretaker will sweep and clean tip the hallways; that there be daily inspections by the caretaker and Special Agent in Charge of the quarters, and that the floors be morped by the caretaker at least once each week and inindividual instances where it may be necessary and where the SAC instructs.

6. Pressing, cleaning, and laundry service - No laundry service man should can be rendered to individual employees or policemen by the Quantico handle incoming laundry on the reservation. This would mean that a Bureau employee, the caretaker, would handle this material when it goes out but would have nothing to do with it upon its return or for the collection. It is not desired that the laundrymen or tailors call at irregular intervals or go into the individual bedrooms. For this reason these recommendations are made.

No man is to leava reservation.

7. In order to limit the necessity or desire to go to the village as much as possible, it is recommended that cigarette, chewing gum, candy bar and soft drinks dispensing machines be permitted to be placed in the building by the representatives of the hostess house who will be supplying meals, these machines of course to be placed in an inconspicuous place to be selected after the building is opened.

8. It is recommended that for the first sixty days SAC Kenneth Logan and Special Agent A.M. Thurston be on joint duty continuously at Quantico with Mr. Logan permitted to visit him home at intervals with permission of the Training Division. Then, at the end of sixty days if Mr. Thurston has been satisfactory he would continue as Special Agent in Charge of the Quantico Training center. One man must be there all the time. Insp. Gurnea is to initiate it.

9. It was recommended at the conference that a male stenographer be employed so that he could render daily work at quantico. If any of the should live at present made stenographers in the Bureau desire such an assignment and want to commute at their own expense to Quantico this was considered agreeable. It is believed that Mr. Glavin who agreed to do so should make appropriate inquiries for this purpose and if no one presently employed by the Bureau desires such an assignment an effort should be made to locate through appropriate agencie s or schools a qualified stenographer who resides in the vicinity of Quantico.

10. Physical training - there will be a gymnasium in the building. In addition to Mr. Goudge and Mr. Meyers, physical instructors, there are emphoyed in the Bureau two clerks, Mr. David Tobin and Mr. Robert Faris physical instruction both qualified in physical education. It is recommended that these two tor must be on clerical employees be permitted for two hours per week to attend sessions duty at Quanticoas observers and assistant instructors under the supervision of Mr. Goudge and Mr. Meyers so that they may be considered as reserve instructors in physical education in the case of fillness, prolonged absence, or being on leave of the regular instructors. Estimating that there will be a maximum of three classes at any one time at Quantico; it is recommended that an effort be made to have the physical training program at Quantico within a period of three consecutive hours so that the physical instructor can return to Washington. This will probably be arranged for in the afternoon, and the early morning callisthenics in the schedule submitted above can be given by the Special Agent in Charge. In the absence of one of the physical instructors at vuantico should an emergency arise one of the two clerical employees who would have had specialized training in this type of work could take over the work in the Department of Justice Building.

No gambling of any kind.

11. Gambling - The conference recommended that the rule be adopted that gambling of all forms is probibited. Mr. Nathan recommended that instead of this rule the ordinary inclinations of the students should be given consideration and anything that is within reason should be permitted. Of course, it is recognized that at least a Special Agent in Charge will be on duty at all times. "Mr. Hogan agrees with Mr. Nathan".

It was recommended unanimously that any type of games which the studence desired to play during their recreational and free periods be permitted including card games, bridge, and the like as well as athletic games, handball and softball under supervision at all times.

All official. sight-seeing ends from now

12. It was recommended that the Bureau continue its policy of prowiding opportunities for sight-seeing by the students in the National Police Academy. Since the Bureau will have busses available arrangements can be made on Sunday afternoons and other convenient occasions for sightseeing trips without cost to various parts of Washington as a part of their educational program in the study of their national government and civics.

13. It is recommended unanimously that all firearms whether personally owned or Bureau owned be maintained in the gun vault; that policemen and Agents who are students should upon arrival turn their firearms whether personally owned or not into the gun vault and when occasion for dry firing under supervision or actual pistol practice arises the instructor could first have the weapons brought up to the classroom or carried to the range and there they would be issued to the owners or students for practice purposes. This would mean that the entire group of students would be unarmed at all times except when actually practicing.

14. It is anticipated that there will be vigits by wives, relatives, and friends of the policemen in attendance at the Academy and the Agents. It was recommended that for the purpose and in order to avoid a series of visits at irregular hours one hour on Sunday afternoons be selected for sight-seers and tourists who desire to visit the building. Of course, if friends of the Director and the Bureau or officials from the Departments represented in the class desire to come to Quantico at any time they will be welcome, but the above hour is to avoid irregular social calls throughout the week.

O.K. unless the meals run regularly within a \$1.00 then per diem to be reduced to \$1.00.

15. Per Diem - Since room rent will be without cost and as it is anticipated that the cost of meals will be approximately \$1 per day, the following recommendations are made for per diem allowances: New Agents-None; In-service Retrainces - \$1.50 per day; Counselors, all classes- \$1.50 per day.

Lecturers who get per diem must pay for meals. All guest must pay for meals unless them wants to pay for them.

16. Payment for visitors sleeping quarters and meals - It is believed that the Bureau should pay for the meals of visiting instructors or their guests who are actively on duty at Quantico or who may have occasion to visit Quantico for brief intervals. It is believed that these meals should be paid for bather than having the instructor pay for them and later supmit a wouther, as this is a little too awkward and borders on being inhospitable. It is also believed that visiting peace officers including officers of all ranks who are guests of National Police Academy person inviting students and any guests of the Bureau visiting for brief periods should be provided quarters if available and meals at the Bureau's expense. In order to take care of these expenditures it. is believed that for the first Tew months the Special Agent in Charge should keep an account of these expenditures, that he should pay for the meals himself and submit blue slips to cover the amount. After a few months when an estimate can be tairly made as to the average amount of expenses of this sort it is be-Heved that a per diem allowance for the Special Agent in Charge should be made which would properly cover this expenditure, thus in the future about-No quarters for guests & meals must ing the necessity for blue slips. be paid for them by person inviting them.

It is believed that any members of the families of the National Police Academy classes or of Special Agents who might have occasion to be at Quantico at meal time should have their meals paid for by the students who are acting as hosts to their friends or relatives,

17. It was recommended unanimously by the conference that since the shower rooms were not immediately adjacent to the sleeping quarters the students be required to provide themselves with bathrobes and house slippers, and it si believed that letters from the Bureau to Agents instructing them to report for in-service schools should contain instructions of this type.

18. Inventory, Breakage, and Loss- It is believed that any ordinary

breakage of dishes or any reasonable shortage of towels or kinen or loss of the dining room and kitchen utensils with reason should be considered as losses of expendable property and replacement should be made by the Bureau. If a large quantity of dishes are broken through botsterousness or similar activities by students then such cases will be considered on their merits.

19. Disciplinary Measures - It is recommended that intoxication on the part of any students should result in dismissal. It is recommended that no alcoholic beverages be permitted in the barracks building at any time. It is recommended that drinking be absolutely prohibited by those In an active duty status and violation of these two rules should result in dismissal. Loss of property issued should result in a ten-day suspension for Agents, and the Police Academy students should be required to pa y for the property which they lose. For unexcused tardiness one-half hour's labor landscaping the building s yard and the range for all students. should be required. For unexcused absences one-half hour's labor on landscaping projects should be the minimum penalty required, and all unexcused absences in excess of one-half hour should result in the equivalent amount of labor on landscaping projects. For wilful disobedience dismissal is recommended for all students. For violation of safety rules it is recommended for all students that the first violation after the explanations and instruction have been given should result in two hours. labor on landscaping projects. For the second violation within the same week, three. hours' labor on landscapingprojects should be required.

It was further recommended that the rules contained in the attached mimeographed form which is issued to students upon arrival be included in printed form with the rules above mentioned which would regulate the activities and conduct of the students and that such printed forms be distributed on the opening day of each school.

GENERAL RULES APPLICABLE AT QUANTICO BARRACKS

- I. All room assignments will be made alphabetically.
- 2. One man in the room will be designated in each instance to see that the room is maintained in good order.
- 3. Each man will make up his own bed, and said bed shall be made in a manner conforming with other beds in the barracks.
- 4. Fresh linen will be furnished twice a week usually on Mondays and Fridays also on the last day at Quantico so that the bed may be made up and ready for the next Agent.
- 5. No digarates, digars, and pipes are to be placed anywhere except in an ash tray, smokadore, or urn, and are not to be thrown on any of the floors, including the basement.

6. Shower room:

Place all dirty hand towels in the small baskets under the wash bowls. Place all used towels in the large basket under the paper towel dispenser. Place all used bath bowels in the large basket near the shower door. An adequate supply of towels will be found in the cabinet behind the shower room door. Do not throw used razor biades in any of the waste-baskets or cuspidors, but leave then on the shelves above the wash bowls. Then through washing, do not leave the bowl dirty but clean it out. Someone else will want to use it immediately thereafter.

- 7. All Agents shelf take at least one bath each day.
- 8. It will be necessary for all Agents to wear chothing or a bathrobe when coming or going between their rooms and any other rooms
 in the building including the shower.

The Conference recommends that the policy concerning the icchance of complies be liberalized and that the Surean expect only a 50% return on emplice leaved. This will enable the local less enforcement agencies to retain one copy in its finjerprint files and transmit one copy to the Bureau.

There are attached hereto for your information several typical letters received from fingerprint contributors objecting to the Burgan's rolley. It is noted that this policy, of course, was a complete revisal of the provious policy and of the information furnished to finserprint contributors in the field by Burgan Acents.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrc, E. A. Tamu, Nathan, Ladd, Nichols, Glavin, Hince and Quint Tamu, considered a request submitted by the Police Department Crand Ravids, Michigan, in which the Police Department advised that they are making a change in the method of filing fingerprint cards and that the survey being made goes back to 1897.

In making this t ensier they request the Bureau's cooperation in searching by name and arrest number all of the fingerprint cards on which they have not received previous arrest records.

This matter was first considered by the C nference on November 13, 1939 at which time a fetter was addressed to the Special Agent in Charge, Grand Rapids, Office, requesting that he contact the Chief of Police of Grand Rapids and ascertain the size of this project. Information has now been received from the Special Agent in Charge, Grand Rapids, that there will be approximately 2,000 of these records which will have to be searched by name. The Identification Division has already received about 400 such requests from the Police Department.

It is noted also that a similar request has been received from the Police Department at Salt Dake City, in which they transmitted a list of 200 names. They requested complete criminal records and pointed ut that they are brining their files up-to-date.

Messrs. E. A. Tenm, Glavin and Nichols believe that the Bureau should comply with these requests and search the names and who e it is possible to effect an identification transmit the information to the Police Departments.

Nother, Ladd, Hince and Quinn Tamm do not believe over a periodhet such requests, contemplating the searching of a large volume of time 1-3 of names in order to bring the files of a local deportment up-to-date. In connection with the plant protection surveys presently being made by Bureau Agents, a number of cases have come to the Bureau's attention where a survey is scheduled for a plant in which a Bureau Agent is presently employed in an undercover capacity. In order to prevent any embarrassing situations, it is desired that in the future an Agent who is designated to conduct a survey in a plant in which an undercover Agent is employed should be specifically advised as to the fact that an Agent is so employed at the plant and the identity of that Agent. Whenever it is possible to do so without disclosing the confidential nature of his assignment, the Agent who is acting in an undercover capacity at the plant should also be advised that a plant protection survey is to be made. The Agent making the survey should also be cautioned to make no statements and take no action which would reveal the identity of the Agent acting in an undercover capacity.

Any observations made by the undercover Agent which are pertinent to the protection of the plant involved should be made available to the Agent conducting the survey so that the facts may be included in the plant protection report without disclosing the source from which they were obtained.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: POLICE SCHOOL FIELD ZONES AND INSTRUCTIONS

There is attached hereto a suggested arrangement of field office divisions into zones with the names of the Agents qualified as either general instructors or firearms instructors already assigned to each zone, and in addition firearms instructors or general instructors who it is recommended should be transferred to certain zones. Agents to be transferred are identified by asterisks. In the event an Agent is recommended to be transferred from one zone to another his name is not listed in the zone to which he is now assigned.

After the names of some of the general instructors will be found the letter "I". This means that the general instructor should be used on limited types of assignments. It means further that this instructor showed a generally satisfactory status during his training in the Instructors' School, but he has not had sufficient experience to justify his handling a complete school and the easier assignments will have to be selected for them.

Resident Agents

Some of the instructors have been identified as Resident Agents. It was the unanimous recommendation of the conference that these men be relieved of their status as Resident Agents in order to make them more available for instruction purposes.

Transfers.

The following transfers were unanimously recommended by the Executive Conference in order to accomplish the assignments in accordance with the attached list.

T. D. Pope Firearms Instructor

Is now assigned to Newark; his offices of preference ere Birmingham, Atlanta and Memphis. Special Agent G. F. Fitch, firearms instructor, is in the same zone. It is believed Agent Pope could more satisfactorily serve in Zone Number 4; and it is recommended he be transferred to the Savannah Office, which is more centrally located in the zone covering Atlanta, Charlotte, Knowville, Miami and Savannah.

Based upon an inquiry received from a graduate of the FBI National Police Academy as to whether the Bureau had established any standard courses for police firearms matchshooting a survey was made of the opinions of various firearms. experts and instructors of the Bureau. RE: NATIONALISTIC TENDENCY FILE

The Executives Conference, consisting of Mr. Tolson, Mr. E.A. Tamm, Quinn Tamm, Clegg, Ladd; Rosen, Nichols, Glavin and Nathan, considered a suggestion by Mr. Laughlin, in connection with the special Card Index file on individuals having definite nationalistic tendencies, to the effect that these index cards be filed under the names of the newspapers (in those instances where the cards represent subscribers to Toreign language newspapers), and if any additional index is desired such names be placed only in the straight alphabetical file. In other words, he recommends that the cards representing nationalistic newspaper subscribers, not be placed in the alphabetical file.

A discussion arose as to the existing procedure and it was reported that field offices are submitting these cards in triplicate. One set of cards is filed in the regular card index section in alphabetical sequence. The second set of cards is subdivided as to the nationalistic tendency, i.e., Nazi, communistic, et cetera, and filed alphabetically under the subdivisions. The third set of cards is further subdivided as to geographical location, i.e., city and state, and in those instances where there are a large number of cards allocated to a given city, they are further divided as to nationalistic tendency. The cards which have been submitted representing the list of subscribers for foreign newspapers are filed as indicated above. The nationalistic tendency of the individuals listed on these cards is determined by the language of the newspaper, i.e. Russian newspapers are considered Communistic, German newspapers are considered Nazi, et cetera.

A subcommittee consisting of Messrs. E.A. Tamm, Ladd and Mathen reported that they had considered this system of filing cards and found that there was ample information contained thereon in all except a few instances, these consisting of a lack of field office file numbers. This will be corrected on those already received and on those to be received.

The suggestion of Mr. laughlin to the effect that the filing in the straight alphabetical file be eliminated in some instances was unanimously rejected, it being the opinion of the Conference that it would not be safe to eliminate the names on any of these cards from the general alphabetical index, insamuch as there would occasionally arise instances where all the inquiring official would have would be the name, and if this were not in the straight alphabetical file no trace could be found of the individual.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

On the 20th at a meeting of the Executive Conference attended by Mesers. Tolson, Nathan, Clegg, Glavin, Nichols, Q., Tamm and Ledd, the recommendation of Mr. A. T. Potter to the effect that the experts in the Single Fingerprint Section be permitted to develop the latent fingerprints submitted to them for examination rather than to have them go to the Laboratory for such work, was considered and was unanimously approved by the Conference.

It was pointed out to the Conference by Mr. Ladd that this suggestion had been approved by Mr. Coffey, who had also made the suggestion that at any time new men were appointed to the Single Fingerprint Unit, they receive a very short course of instructions from the technicians in the Laboratory with reference to the proper manner of developing latent fingerprints. The Executive Conference also approved this suggestion.

With reference to the suggestion of Mr. Potter to the effect that a small work bench be installed in Room 1420, presently occupied by the Single Fingerprint men, which would provide facilities for the Single Fingerprint men to develop latent fingerprints in their own office, the Conference unanimously opposed this suggestion, being of the opinion that it would be a needless expenditure of funds and that the Single Fingerprint men could continue to develop latent finger-prints in the Technical Laboratory.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messra. Tolson, Nathan, Clegg, Ladd, Nichols, Quinn Temm, Rosen, and Glavin, considered suggestions submitted by Buist &. Swaim, Chief Clerk of the Birmingham Office.

He points out that the charge out slips now in use do not contain sufficient space for charging out serials in a nest manner, and that in most cases, additional serials are routed to the agents subsequent to the date of the original charge out, and that the present procedure is to list these additional serials; immediately followed by the date in parenthesis, on any available space on the charge out slip. He reports that such charge out slips do not present a tidy appearance and suggests that new charge out slips of the same size be used, which contain appropriate space for the charging out of additional serials.

The Conference points out that at the present time, the charge out slips are used on the original charge outs of the files and that under existing regulations, then additional serials are charged out, additional charge out slips:should be prepared.

The Conference is opposed to the adoption of this suggestion, it being of the opinion that the present procedure is entirely natisfactory. Subject to the Director's concurrence of the Conference's opinion of this matter, there is attached hereto a communication addressed to Mr. Swain advising him in this regard.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference, Mesers. Tolson, Glavin, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Rosen, Ladd, Michole, Quinn Tamm, and Clegg being present, considered the suggestions of Inspector E. J. Connelley following his observations in the New York office, as follows:

- (1) Mr. Connelley was of the opinion that since each supervisor has approximately 25 men under his supervision he should be of the same caliber as the average Special Agent in Charge, and with this general principle the Executive Conference was in agreement.
- (2) Mr. Connelley suggested that each supervisor in the New York office should maintain some simple system of checking the activities of the Agents under his supervision. Since it is necessary that the Agents be transferred from one supervisor to enother to handle special cases he thought it would be convenient for each supervisor to have available the total number of days work performed by each agent under his supervision each month.

The Conference recommended unanimously against this There is a monthly administrative report showing the total number of days eveilable for dury during the previous month by each Agent. It is a clerical function to record these data. The necessity of an Agent in Charge using an Agent on a rescipt or emergency case will frequently grise and the keeping of statistics on such matters would add nothing of value and would require additional clerical labor or effort on the part of Supervisors, which it is believed would be undesirable and without profit.

(3) Mr. Connelley recommended that each supervisor keep a running memorandim from day to day as to the accomplishments of his particular section from the standpoint of statistics, including convictions, sentences, and the like.

Mr. Tolson agreed with Mr. Connelley and felt that this might be some incentive to the supervisors to watch the progress of their work in various classifications. He thought this might spur the supervisors to greater activity in getting statistics which would show improvement statistically over the previous month or a similar period for a previous year.

Messrs. Glavin, Nathen, E. A. Tamm, Rosen, Ladd, Quinn Tamm, Nichols, and Clegg opposed the suggestion, since it was believed that each supervisor should supervise each case thoroughly and that the keeping of the statistics by the supervisor would require additional effort on his part which could be more profitably spent otherwise. It was not believed that the practice of field offices maintaining statistics should be resimed, and this would bring about such a practice, at least in the Bureau's largest office. It was felt that if it should be desirable in any instance that a field office be informed as to its statistical accomplishments the Bureau could forward the information to that office, as statistics can and should be kept in Washington rather than by the field offices or by individual supervisors in the field.

(4) Ar. Connelley believed that there thould be some check as to the amount of overtime being performed by the different Agents. He felt that this might be entered on the cards which they use in signing in and out of the office.

The Conference unanimously opposed this, as it would constitute a resumption of the maintenance of over-time records and complaints from personnel would again arise from such a practice.

From the information furnished to the Conference, it appears that this recorder is a portable type recorder which would be used for the nurpose of recording on tape dots and dashes of the Morse or Continental codes of messages being sent in those codes that are being sent at such a rapid rate of speed that it is not possible for an operator to pick up the words by ear.

Mr. Ladd pointed out to the Conference that this machine would be used when it is necessary to make records of broadcasts from stations in which the Bureau is interested in the furtherance of its National Defence tork. The Conference feels that this is a real or to the Identification Division rules and procedure would materially repard the handring of off fingerprint records in the Identification Division because it would necessitate the reading of the complete record of each individual by the typist to ascertain whether or not the individual had been placed on parole by the Tederal Parole Board. It is felt that in handling the tramendous volume of work it is necessary to have as few exceptions to the general rules as possible.

. It is further pointed out that the Eureau of Prisons by the expenditure of a small amount of clerical time con transmit to the Identification Division "flash" notices requesting that in the case of an arrest of an individual paroles copies of the criminal record be furnished to the Board of Parole. This appears to be simply a question of whether the Bureau of Prisons should perform the clerical work necessary or whether the Eureau should do it. It is felt that this is the responsibility of the Eureau of Prisons and if you ap rove there is attached hereto: a memorandum outlining the situation to Mr. Bennett and pointing out that an exception to the general rule cannot be made.

The Executive Conference concisting of Messrs. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Hince, Nichols, Rosen, Quinn Tamm, and Glavin considered a memorandum submitted by Mr. Laughlin for Mr. Glavin concerning the issuance of credit cards by the various telephone companies, it being pointed out by Mr. Laughlin that the Bell Telephone Company system is desirous of issuing these identification cards to the field service so that all long distance call charges could be charged to the designated telephone and not necessarily paid for in cash by the calling Agent.

It was pointed out to the Conference that these credit cards are honored only by the various companies affiliated with the Bell system in the United States and that it would not be honored by independent companies. The Conference was of the opinion that it might be undesirable to inaugurate this policy on a country-wide basis, it believing that many more long distance calls would be made from the field offices by Agents if it were not necessary to pay for such calls at the time they were placed. The Conference elso believes that a more careful check of such expenditures could be made through an examination of expense accounts where receipt must be secured if at all possible covering the expenditure of such funds than there would be under the proposed system. It was pointed out to the Conference that there are several offices at the present time using these cards, and the Conference is of the opinion that these offices should be permitted to use the cards for the balance of the calendar year. It recommends against any further general use of such cards.

If the Conference's recommendation is approved, the appropriate notification will go forward to the field offices now using these credit cards to discontinue their use at the end of this calendar year.

MEHORANDIM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executives' Conference has given considerable study to the natter of preparing a directory of law enforcement officials. It was originally contemplated that such a directory would contain the names of Chiefs of Police, Sheriffs Gounty Attorneys, U. S. Attorneys, heads of State Police, Highway Patrols, the Attorney General of the U. S., and the Attorneys news General of each state together with the division heads of the more important recerci investigative agencies. Such a directory would contain the names of approximately 16,500 persons. There is attached hereto a dumit lay-out of the conferplated directory which would run 96 pages if the names were set forth in a single column or approximately 50 pages if set forth in double columns. If set forth in single columns, the cost of the directory would be approximately 124 each and it is: estinated that 25,000 would be necessary, making a total cost of \$3,000; if it is printed in double columns, it would cost a little more than one-half that amount.

The conference desires to recommend, however, that a directory not be prepared, first, in view of the cost, and secondly, in view of the fact that at the present time the Dureau is not set up to turn out a directory comparable to the Police Blue Book put out by the IACP which contains the state low enforcement officials, the officials of correction and parole agencies and penal institutions, county attorneys sheriffs, probation agents, chiefs of police, assistant chie heads of traffic divisions, identification divisions, and chiefs of detectives, together with municipal attorneys, the population of the states, the number of employees, the number of automobiles, motorcycles, and other miscellaneous equipment.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR .

The Executive Conference considered the request made by Stanhope Lineberry, NPA, Chief of the Macklenburg County, North Carolina, Police, for permission to have a member of his department attend the April session of the National Police Academy. Lineberry has, during the past two weeks, indicated he sould like to come to Washington in order to present his request. His application has just been made. On Pebruary 16 Lineberry telephoned Mr. Michols and urged that he be given special consideration. He desires to fill a captain's vacancy and sake the NPA graduate Assistant Chief. He was informed by Mr. Nichols that every possible consideration would be given to his request in the event there was a vacancy.

The Conference considered the fact that a rule has been established requiring that applications be considered in the order of their receipt and that a formal list of eligible departments has been established for the next wession of the Academy. The Conference also considered the fact that there have been numerous inquiries received from departments which have had applications on file for a considerable period of time and the emberrassment to the Boreau which would result if It became known that the Bureau was making exceptions to the rule. It. say pointed out that during the past two weeks one Congressian has taken the trouble of coming to the Eureau in person in connection with the application of a constituent and he was given to understand very clearly that the Bureau would be unable to very from its established regulations. It was pointed out by Mr. Hince that it would be very difficult to keep confidential the fact that an exception was made for Lineberry Incomuch as the law enforcement officers of North and South Carolina are very close to each other and that the news would get out. Mr. Bathan also pointed out that the Association of Law Enforcement Officers of the Carolines would provide an opportunity for the disclosure of facts concerning any exceptions made.

Accordingly, the Conference unanimously recommended that no exception be made for Lineberry but that a very cordial letter be written to him explaining the situation. Such a <u>letter</u> has been prepared for approval.

The Executive Conference considered the opinion rendered by Judge Holtzoff concerning the question of giving receipts for property obtained from prisoners incidental to a lawful errest. Judge Holtzoff has indicated that although a receipt must be given for property seized under a search marrant, such a receipt is not required by law when articles are seized incidental to a lawful arrest.

The Conference considered the question of furnishing instructions to the field concerning this patter and approved the present procedure of furnishing instruction on this satter during the Bureau's training schools rather then issuing any general instructions to the field in written form. This position was taken inspect as it was felt that if instructions were issued to the field that receipts must be given to a prisoner, such receipts might be used for undesirable purposes by the prisoners. It is believed that the present system in which the Bureau Agents have been instructed should be continued, that is, to pake a list of articles taken from the prisoner, obtain his written acknowledgment of the purrender of the articles and maintain this written acknowledgment in the field office file. This provides a written record of the articles taken. eltheshed by at least two Special Agents, and prevents defendants having in their possession official receipts from the Bureau which night he used by them for undesirable purposes.

The Conference consisting of Messrs, E. A. Tamm, Nathan, Ladd, O. Tame, Nicholy, Rosen and Glavin considered an oral suggestion made by Mr. Quinn Tamm of the Identification Division that some steps be taken by the Bureau to eliminate the tremendous congestion at the door of the building every evening when employees assigned to the night force of the Identification Division are leaving for their homes. Mr. Tame pointed out that there are only two signing in and signing out books at the middle Pennsylvania Avenue entrance door and each of the some 175 employees presently assigned to the night force in the Identification Division must gign out in those books before they can leave the building.

It was further pointed out that many of these employees who sign out from approximately 11:50 P.M. to 12:00 midnight and must make a bus or street car are forced to remain until midnight or shortly thereafter and many who are delayed in signing out at that time of the night find it makes a hardship on them inasmuch as they cannot get proper transportation to their homes.

The Conference suggests that a card be carried by each of the night force employees, appropriately identified and recorded in the Identification Division so that these cards can be turned in to the Guard at the door on leaving the building at midnight. This would attainate the necessity of signing out in the sign out register main-Mr. Tolon tained at that door. The cards then would be returned to the Identifi-Mr. Nathan cation Division each morning, would be appropriately filed in the

Duffey as to whether the Department of Came and Fish of the State of New Mexico could be considered a law enforcement organization eligible for the FBI National Police Academy. The Conference was unanimously of the opinion that the Bureau should not open up the Mational Police Academy to game wardens at this time inasmuch as to do so in one instance would require the Bureau to consider favorably game wardens in many states where they are definitely not law enforcement officers and perform no law enforcement functions.

If approved, a letter to Special Agent in Charge Duffey has been prepared.

Mr. Clegg's first choice was the flag on which appear the national colors, red, white and blue, again showing Federal significance. It has a red background. There in a blue circle, blue again indicating truthfulness, and the shield, laurel branches and Burchi cotto appear similarly in this circle. From the circle, there goes forward an evertidening ray of light which would signify that the Buresu, as a source of truth, has turned the bright white searchlight, which has investigative significance, on whatever might be investigated.

The Conference consisting of Mesers. E. A. Temm. Nathan, Ladd, Quinn Tamm. Rosen and Glavin considered a communication received from SAC Foxworth dated February 7. 1940, wherein he requests that two electric date stamps and four manually operated date stamps be secured for the New York Office.

The Conference was advised that Mr. Forworth was of the opinion that through the use of these stamps, one electric stamp for the SAC's Office for the stamping in of all mail received and the other for the file room then the mail is received there, and the four manually operated stamps for the four supervisors would enable the New York Office to definitely place the responsibility for any delays in handling and as a result will automatically increase the speed with which the incoming material is handled. Mr. Forworth reports that the eletrically operated stamp could be obtained for approximately \$67.50 each and the manually operated stamp for \$27.95 each.

The Conference is unanimously opposed to the securing of such equipment for the New York Office, it being of the opinion that it is not necessary and would not in any manner assist in speeding up the hendling of correspondence. It was pointed out to the Conference by Massra. Usthur, nuinn Tomm, and Ledd that approximately 60% of the finger-print cards are searched at the present time through the Card Index files first by reason of information appearing on these prints which definitely indicates that the Bureau has previous records on the subjects thereof. It was further pointed out that to search all prints in Card Index before the cabinet searching would cause a decided decrease in the efficiency of the Identification Division in that there sould be no means of checking any alsued identifications arising through the subsidies of a set of fingerprints of a subject under an alian not already indexed in the files, in the event the Technical searcher desires to accept the Card Index search without making a cabinet cearch.

The Conference consisting of Messre. E. A. Tamm, Clegg, Nathan, Ladd, Nichols, Rosen, and Glavin considered hospitalization arrangements at Quantico, Virginia.

The Conference was advised by Mr. Glavin that Mr. Douglas of the Bureau of Medical Surgery of the Navy Department had telephonically communicated with him to ascertain what arrangements could be made for such hospitalization. It is the understanding of the Conference that full hospitalization in care and treatment will be given to those Bureau employees who are injured in line of duty under the Employees! Compensation Commission authorisation.

The Conference was further advised that it would not be possible for the Compensation Commission to defray any expenses incident to injuries suffered by members of the National Police Academy. Further, that any hospitalization for illnesses not the result of official duty could not be defrayed by the Compensation Commission. The Conference was further advised that the Bureau's appropriation would not be available for this expenditure.

It is the recommendation of the Conference that on the first day of the National Police Academy on announcement be made to the effect that so long as members of the Academy are at Quantico and if hospitalization is necessary, such hospitalization will be possible only if those individuals defray the cost forthis care. Mr. Glavin advised that he had further discussed this matter with Mr. Douglas of the Medical Department of the Navy who stated that the hospital at Quantico is not treated as a hospital but as a sick quarters and for that reason expenditures will be very reasonable. He stated that hospitalization expenses would not cost over \$2.00 a day. There would be no

It is pointed out that "FBI" or "Federal Bureau of Investigation" is not permitted on diplomes issued by police departments, and the recommendation of the Executive Conference would seem to be consistent with this practice and procedure. In many instances it is not the FBI school but the Bureau is more or less siding in the school; however, it does not necessarily assume responsibility for the entire course of training. If the Director agrees with this conclusion, a letter is being addressed to Mr. Conrad accordingly, and a letter is being forwarded to Mr. Pieper making the suggestion that this practice not be followed by him in the future.

The Executive Conference apnoidered a suggestion submitted by Special Agent James A. Foster that in each plant survey conducted there be prepared in alphabetical list of all
employees showing their address and nationality in order that
the names of these employees sight be obecked against the Sureau
indices. Er. Poster's suggestion further proposes that if new
employees are added, their names be furnished by the plant
management to the Bureau for obeck against the Bureau records.

The Conference is unantwously opposed to the adoption of this suggestion - first, because the name check would not permit a sufficiently positive identification; second, because persons entering the employment of a plant in order to count substage or explonage would undoubtedly not use names previously autilized by them; third, because of the tremendous valume of work which would result from checking the names of all of these employees; and, fourth, because the Bureau has pending Departmental decision a program which would require the fingerprinting a solution of all employees and a check of these fingerprints against the Bureau files, thereby making possible positive isontification.

A letter is attached hereto to Un. Poster thanking him for his suggestion and advising him of the reasons thy the hureau does not consider it desirable to adopt it at the present time.

REs Clerical Pistol Classes

The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Clegg, Ladd, Rosen and Glavin considered the subject of clerical pistol classes presently being held by the Bureau from 5:00 to 6:00 P. M. and from 8:00 to 9:00 P. M. each day as well as from 6:00 to 7:00 P. M. on Tuesday and 2:00 to 3:00 P. M. on Saturday.

Mr. Clegg brought up the subject and was of the opinion that there was a possibility of injury resulting from such activities which would result in embarrassment to the Bureau as well as the possibility of some clerical employed being taken into custody by local police due to carrying firearms.

Mr. Clavin advised the Conference that insofar as obedience to safety regulations is concerned, absolutely no difficulty has been experienced with any of the clarical employees. It was further pointed out to the Conference by Mr. Clavin that the clarical employees receiving firearms instruction have not secured permits to carry such firearms, they being registered only to permit the employee to carry the weapon, properly boxed, to and from the rifle range where practice is to be held. This holds true whether practice is to be held on the Bureau Range or on any of the club or private ranges in the city.

Mr. Clegg pointed out that it would be necessary to hold training for new Agents from 7:30 to 8:30 P. M. each evening, which hours would of course conflict with the 8:00 to 9:00 P. M. hours arranged for the clerical classes. He also stated that after the Police Academy convened in January, about the second week of their attendance they would receive assignments on the Range for a period of time from 5:00 to 6:00 P. M. each day which would conflict with the 5:00 to 6:00 P. M. classes for clerical employees. Mr. Clegg recommended that further classes be discontinued.

It was pointed out by Mr. Glavin that many of the employees have purchased weapons at considerable cost, he being of the opinion that this training for those employees should be continued at this time. He recommended to the Conference that if the clerical classes conflicted with Agent and Police classes, the hours for clerical classes be changed. It was suggested that the evening classes be changed from the hour of \$:00 to 9:00 P. M. to \$:30 to 9:30 P. M. It was further suggested that when the 5:00 to 6:00 P. M. hours conflicted with the Agent or Police training that appropriate postponements or

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other more satisfactory bours be secured for the clerical staff.

The Conference recommends approval of the continuence of these classes with a change in hours where conflict is had with regularly assigned Police and Agent Trainee classes. The Conference further recommends that additional schools of clerical employees not be started and that additional firearms instructors be assigned to assist in the handling of the clarical classes, it being pointed out that a majority of the classes up to this time have been handled by two instructors, the other designated instructors not being available.

If the Director approves the Conference recommendation, appropriate steps will be taken by Mr. Glavin to rearrange these schedules.

S. Penitentiary at McNetl Island. Washington and the State Bureau of Identification at Sacramento, California, upon the completion of the fingerprint check at the Oregon State Penitentiary.

The conference was unanimously of the opinion that this check should be made by the fingerprint technicians at the institutions in the order nesed, i.e., the State Bureau of Identification at Sacramento, California, the Idaho State Penitentiary ot Boise, Ideho and the Montane State Penitentiary at Deer Lodge, Montana.

The conference was unenimously of the opinion that it would not be necessary to make such a check at the U. S. Penitentiary at McNeil Island, Weshington, by reason of the fact that fingerprints taken at the U. S. Penitentiary undoubtedly are already contained in the fingerorint files of this Bureau which have been checked against the latent fingerprints in the Watney case.

The conference was further of the opinion that when the institutions above named have been checked, no further check should be made at state bureaus or state penitentiaries in connection with the Matney case.

As an example, Mr. Laughlin points out that a request has gone forward to the field concerning license plates which request originated in the Crise Records Section. Laughlin pointed out that this is not the general type of information that one would expect the Orine Records Section would be interested in and the initial replies received were routed to the investigative Division and the United Clerk's Office, neither office having any particular interest therein.

The Conference is of the opinion that instances such as the one mentioned by Mr. Laughlin are out of the ordinary and is of the opinion that the present procedure of routing such material to those who would be interested in it generally suffices. The Conference further points out that it is incumbent upon those receiving such communications to definitely escertain the person primarily interested in receiving this information. 



Approparation for the director

A committee designated by the <u>Lieoutive Conference</u>, consisting of ir. Tauin; ir. Q. Taum and ir. L. A. Taum has made a purvey of the opace in the Department of Justice Building assigned to the Curcay for the purpose of submitting recommendations for the absorption of the newly acquired space on the first floor and the utilization of space gained thereby. Ir. D. E. Ladd, who is presently absort from the city, functioned in the place of ir. Q. Taum curing the carly surveys of this committee but has not participated in the recommendations set out hereafter.

The Countities feels that there is no space upon the seventh, sixth, fifth, fourth or second floors now occupied by the Sureau in which full advantage is not being taken of every evailable foot. As a matter of fact, several units could utilize additional space if it were available. Bealising, however, the difficulty which the Bureau encounters in obtaining additional space, no general recommendations for broad espansion of various facilities are being set forth.

The Committee recommends that the Single Fingerprint (ection of the Identification Division be transferred from the space protently occupied by it on the beventh floor to a portion of the newly acquired space on the first floor. The constitute has been advised by Ur. Q. Tann that the work of this unit of the Identification Division is of such a nature that it can beat be transferred from space immediately adjacent to the Identification. Division. It will be necessary, of course, for the Single Finger-print Section to call for jackets from the neventh floor and examiners will from time to time have to personally deliver to Identified in these procedures will be so infinitesimal that the Committee believes the transfer of this unit to the first floor practical. The space made vacant by the rawing of the Single Fingerint Lection to the first floor is inactivately adjacent to the Card Index Section and accordingly, the Card Index Section, where the greatest congestion exists at the present time, may be expanded into the Vacated space now occupied by the Single Fingerprint Lection.

The Connitted recommends, if this move is approved, that the present inside wall surrounding the Cingle Fingerprint Section be completely removed, which step will make consible the use of a greater amount of factage in connection with this move.

The Countitee further recommends that the Locument Identijisection Readion of the Rechnical Laboratory be transferred entirely to the space obtained on the first floor, together with such reference files as are pertinent to document identification works. It is believed that the opace available on the first floor is sufficient to accommodate both the Single Fingerprint Lection and the document identification section, with an appropriate partition between the opace occupied by these two sections. It is recommended that the space occupied by the document examiners be maintained as one large room and if this move is approved, it will be insumbent upon the Laboratory Chief to designate one of the document identification sen as a supervisor in order to prohibit promiseuous visiting back and forth between the various document examiners.

It is recommended jurther that in the space on the seventh floor vacated by the moving of the document examiners to the first floor, the Laboratory be allowed to utilize one room as a typing pool to house the typicte now assigned to the Laboratory. It is recommended further that the Identification Division utilize the remaining space vacated by the remains of the document examiners by expanding the Posting Section that this space. The space vacated by the remaining Section will be utilized for expansion of a section of the Typing Lection.

If there nouse are approved, the completes further recommends that the Eureen of Landards be requested to survey the newly acquired space on the first floor and make specific recommendations as to the type of lighting fistures, etc. to be installed in this space in order that the exployees of the Single Fingerorint Section and the document examiners will have proper light working conditions.

The Committee has atudied the question of espansion of personnel in the Identification Division to absorb the expected therease in the ideally receipts of the Identification Division as a result of the Eureau's plant profection program. In this regard the committee has given consideration to the fact that although the attorney central has not as yet approved the specific recommendation of the Eureau for the fingerprinting of all employees in plants nanufacturing equipment for the lar and Eapy Departments and the transmittal of these prints direct to the Eureau, the Eureau's program nevertheless will unsoubtedly result in an inortaaced receipt of applicant fingerprints through police departments. The committee desires also to point out that in accition to the potentially large receipts from the plant protection program, the enrollment figures for the Army and Navy on a perceptime baste have been augmented since the Initial submission of data to you relating to the receipt of ear and Navy prints. The Eureau has

further under concideration at the present time a proposal of the Navy Department to fingerprint all of its current enlistments on Eureou forms for permanent retention in the Eureou files of Navy applicants. Collaborally this program does not contemplate the abandonment of the Identification Division of the Navy Department but rather the taking of two sets of fingerprints of enlistments, one copy of which is to be sent to the Durcou.

At the precent tire the Identification liviation disposes of by classification, answer and filing, 1000 Far Lepartments prints a day. The average daily receipts of far Lepartment prints are 600 per day, which result in a net main in electifying and filing of her Lepartment prints of 400 prints per day. The Identification fiviation has an hand at the precent time 177,000 for Lepartment prints for filing and classification. The committee is further advised that there are in the Identification bivision at the precent time 300,000 Personal Identification cards not yet classified and filed. A net gain is being made upon the filing of these prints of approximately 4,000 per week over current receipts.

The average number of prints searched per day in the Identification Division per son actually upon the subjects is 20 per day, but the average number of prints searched per day per son for the entire staff of the Technical Section is 39 prints per day, the difference being due to the number of sen assigned to researches, assembly verifiers, special searchers, non-ident checkers, etc. In adding the recommendations outlined hereafter, with particular reference to per son output per day, the consisted worked upon the basis of the figures of the Identification Division for the month of October, in which ICO,000 prints (a new record for avery type of print) were searched by a staff of 290 men.

The committee estimates conservatively that during the course of the present plant protection program there will be received in the Identification livision, if the Attorney Coneral approves the singerprinting project, at least 800,000 fingerprint cards. This figure is based upon an average number of employees at each plant of 2000 men and the fact that the present list for inspection totals approximately 200 plants. This figure is a concervative one but believed to be the best possible index because of the variety of plants under inspection. It is pointed out that come of the plants, such as steel mills and ship yards, have as many as 20,000 employees in a single organization but that on the other hand some companies manufacturing meters, values, dials, stor, may employ only a few hundred men at the most. The conmittee has been advised by Ir. Q. Tarm that it will require 250 technical men and 150 elerks to properly handle these prints. The committee points out, however, that the Bureau is so cituated at the present time that we do not know whether the complete fingerprinting program

will or will not be approved by the Attorney General. be further noted that apployees in the Identification Division. particularly Technical ven, require a period of vir wonths actual training in the Identification Livision before their reliability and productivity approaches the average per man production. It follows consequently that the Eureau can ill afford to past unbil it has actually received a large volume of prints to artempt to auchent its staff to handle these prints. The committee recommends consequently the addition as rapidly as is possible to the identification Division staff of 50 technical sen and 30 elected employees. The addition of these employees at the prevent time of 11 make possible the immediate undertaining of their training in order that the force will be augmented above its present level when fingerprint receipts are augmented as a result of the plant protection program. If there to no great volume of increase in the plant protection prints, it to felt that the normal increase in current receiptes plus the augmented receipts of ar and Kapy Department prints as a result of the expansion of the lar and Javy Lepartzonto, will nine necessary the exponsion to the figure insteaded in the i-estate Julure, reservieus of the plant protection program.

The complete further recorners thus the Identification livision naintain a careful cheak upon the receipts of the plant protection fingerprints and entall a report every ten deus upon the number of these prints received in order that accitional blocks of personnel in the amount of 95 or 50 technical men and Is or 30 clerks may be added so the volume of work justifies.
It is felt that by adding the employees recomended at this time and beeping a close chook on the receipts, the Identification Division will be able to remain reasonably for ahead of the creat of the plant protection printe.

The Complete further recommends that oll increases to the various scotions of the Identification division personnel be made upon the night chifts since the Countities not only feels that this is the only practical way to add personnal to the Identification Livision but further believes that this program offeres an excellent opportunity for the Eureau to build up on adoquate atomic staff to avoid further conjection and reculting decrease in individual production in the Identification Division. It is to be understood. of course, that this recoir uncation does not ucon that new personnel should be applyined inneclinarly to the highly entry but what on appropriate transfer of experienced personnel from day to atomt posignment thould be pade at now personnel to added to the day. dustonments for training purposes. dir. Wim pointed out that just recently the Bureau has adopted the practice of destroying runch cards for fingerprints which have been returned to the contributor. Consequently, there are a few thousand punch cards in the Identification Division files which are not supported by fingerprint cards and when the machine selects one of these pards it necessitates a long search by the Technical employee before he can definitely appertain that such a fin erprint card is not contained in the files.

The remaining of all of the fingerprint cards would require approximately three hundred days or the time of three employees for four months.

The Conference feels that this is a worth-while project and that it should be done at some future time. Conference does not feel that it is necessary that this project be started immediately but rather that when the work of the Identification Division permits the process of requirebing the fincerprint cards on the machine be started.

The Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, Clegg, E. A. Tamm, Nichols, Rosen, Ladd, Quinn Tamm and Glavin considered a communication received from Special Agent in Charge Reynolds of the Louisville Office concerning the protection of Bureau files.

Mr. Reynolds points out that all filing cabinets in the various field offices are keyed identically, it being necessary to have only one key to open all locks on the cabinets of the same make. The Conference considered this comment of SAC Reynolds and is of the opinion that it would be well at this time to arrange for the cabinets housing files pertaining to matters relating to national defense to be equipped with special locks.

Louisville a large cleaning staff is maintained and at least 5 or 6 building employees are in the Louisville Office space in connection with the cleaning from approximately 12:30 A. M. to 7:00 A. M. each day during which time the building is locked and not accessible to outside individuals. Reynolds suggests that although it may not be of particular concern at the present time, he believes it would be well to effect arrangements where possible for the cleaning of Bureau offices by one or two reliable building employees. He points out that such an arrangement is not possible at Louisville due to the fact that various employees have different tasks to perform. The same is true for the maintenance force at the Seat of Government, various employees having routine duties to perform making necessary a number of employees going through the various offices.

The Conference is of the unenimous opinion that wherever possible arrangements should be made to have one, two or three, if necessary, reliable maintenance employees assigned to do cleaning duties in the various field offices. The members of the Conference are of the opinion that in private space this is probably done now and in Federal space arrangements should be made where possible.

Reynolds suggests that it might be desired insofar as the Louisville Office is concerned to have a Bureau employee on duty till 3:00 A. M. each morning due to the fact that if such an employee could be placed on duty arrangements could be made to have the entire office space of the Louisville Office cleaned by that time. The Conference points out that if an unreliable employee

The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Clegg, Rosen, Nichols, Ladd, Quinn Tamm and Glavin considered the desirability of changing the visual requirements for female Typist and Stenographer applicants.

The Conference was advised by Mr. Nathan that at the present time our visual requirements are that applicants have uncorrected vision of not less than 20/50 in one eye and 20/40 in the other, both corrected to 20/20. Mr. Nathan was of the opinion that the visual requirements could be considerably reduced inasmich as female clerical employees are not at any time going to be considered for investigative positions and their efficiency as stenographers and typists would not be reduced by their having eyesight uncorrected to a lower degree.

The Conference unanimously recommends that insofar as visual requirements pertaining to female applicants are concerned, that all female applicants have uncorrected vision of no less than 20/100 in each eye corrected to 20/20. If the Conference recommendation is approved by the Director, appropriate notification will go forward to the field and to the interested Seat of Government officials concerning this matter.

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

PENORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executives! Conference on the night of November 12th considered the matter of the continuation of general intelligence and plant protection training. It was the unanimous opinion of the Conference that it would be possible to discontinue this training after the conclusion of the class which starts on November 27th. This class will make a total of 357 agents who will have received training and 256 who have received intelligence training (252 agents have received both types of training).

It was further recommended by the Conference unanimously that an instruction be issued to the field to the effect that within thirty days following the
receipt of the instruction a conference be held of all Special Agents available in
the field office and that the SAC and either the Number One Man or some other agent
who has received intelligence and plant protection training conduct an exhaustive
forum discussion covering instruction which has been given at Washington upon these
subjects.

It was further recommended that at the New York Office arrangements be made for instruction over a peniod of four evenings of all available Special Agents at the New York City and Newark Divisions concerning these subjects, and that Mr. Gurnea lecture on two evenings, Mr. McIntire on one evening and Mr. Carson on one evening. It is believed that such training would be very helpful in these districts in view of the fact that many of the men will be assigned from time to fine to espionage and related matters.

The Conference did not feel that favorable action should be taken upon the recommendation contained in the letter addressed to the Bureau on November 7, 1939, by SAC Rutzen to the effect that all Resident Agents receive espionage and sabotage training. Rather the Conference feet that the special forum to be held by the SAC and Number One Man would suitably instruct the Resident Agents in the handling of these types of cases.

The Bureau desires that you make appropriate contacts with the recognized law and accounting schools presently falling within the territory of the following field divisions:

Either directly or through the appropriate field offices, contects should be made with the authorities at the colleges and universities in question, so that if desired you may make a personal appearance before the members of the senior classes or even larger groups of the student bodies, to discuss the nature of the position of Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. In each instance, in addition to appearing before the student groups, particularly senior classes, it is believed that a most valuable source of information and of prospective applicants, will be found by contacting the alumni offices and placement bureaus of the various law and accounting schools. Prior appointments should be made so that you may reduce necessary travel to a minimum.

It is entirely possible that a good many graduates during the past few years, who are now practicing law or accountancy, are known to the deans of law schools or to those connected with the alumni offices and placement bureaus of the schools. It will be agreeable for those who may be interested to be invited to be present when you address the other members of the student bodies and to confer with you privately on the day you appear at the schools in question.

The Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Clegg, Ladd, Nichols, Rosen, Quinn Tamm and Glavin considered an oral suggestion made by Mr. Nathan that a band be organized from the Bureau employees,

Mr. Glavin pointed out to the Conference that in connection with a proposed Bureau orchestra the response was unsatisfactory and that those who did respond to the call showed only lukewarm interest when it had been ascertained by them that it would not be possible for them to go out and free lance on orchestra jobs.

The Conference opposes the formation of such a band at the present

The Executive Conference, with Lesses. Tolson, Nathan, Clegg, Glavin, Rosen, Q. Tamin and E. A. Tamin in attendance, considered a number of suggestions, enumerated hereafter, submitted for revision in the Plant Protection Manual prepared in the Bureau.

With reference to the suggestion submitted by Ur. Clegg concerning a rewording of Page One, Ur. Clegg with-drew his recommendation because of a misapprehension as to the purpose of the Plant Protection Manual at the time that he submitted this suggestion for a revision. Ur. Clegg also withdraw his suggestion for rewording the last complete paragraph on Page One.

L'r. Clegg suggests that Page Two of the Manual be routsed to point out the accessity and desirability of extending the plant inspection program to warehouses and concentration points for distribution regardless of the location of these plants. The Executive Conference believes that this suggestion is meritorious, and accordingly suggests that a question be included at the top of Page Nine, under the caption "Physical Description of Plant," as follows:

"id. Are the finished products stored in warehouses off the plant property?

If so, where?

At what point does the Government accept delivery of the products?"

In connection with this suggestion, it is further recommended that under the caption "Recommendations" on Page Thirteen of the proposed Lanual, there be added the fallowing provision:

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"Therever a plant under survey is found to utilize warehouses or assembly depots at points away from the factory, the inspection should, of course, include a survey of the protective facilities of the warehouses or assembly points. Such inquiries should, of course, be conducted by the field office covering the point at which the warehouses are located."

Ut. Clegg withdrew his suggestion for a revision in Paragraph Two of Page Six, because this suggestion was predicated upon a misunderstanding as to the purpose of the Plant Protection Vanual.

Concerning Lr. Clegg's suggestion that Page line of the Manual be augmented to include stringent provisions for a check upon the photographic, photostatic and other types of reproduction equipment, the Conference recommends the inclusion at this page of the following provision:

"There practical and possible, plant protection officials should install and operate a careful system of checking all photographic, photostatic and other types of reproduction methods. Consideration may be given to the use of a requisition system showing the specific number of copies to be made, the distribution to be made of the copies, and a check, if possible and practical, of all spallage, improperly exposed copies and prints, and other wastage in the reproduction processes."

The Conference was unanimously of the opinion that there should be included on Page Pifteen a provision indication the desirability of placing upon "Application for Employment" forms a statement indicating that all information furnished by the applicant would be carefully checked.

Ur. Clegg suggests that the provisions of the Manual at lage 15 relative to the fingerprinting of employees be so revised as to provide that only a single set of finger-prints need be taken, this copy of the fingerprints to be sent to the FBI through the established channels outlined elsewhere in the Manual. At the present time, the Manual suggests that two sets of fingerprints of employees he taken, one set for transmittal to the FBI, the second set

to be maintained in the personnel file of the employee at the point of employment. The principal advantage of having the second set of fingerprints in the personnel file is to enable the plant personnel officer to make innediate and positive identification of a particular employee in the event any question arises as to whether a particular person is identical with the person originally employed in the plant. The objection offered to the taking of the second set of fingerprints is that the existence of this additional set of fingerprints might lead private detectives, local sleuths and police to endeavor to identify law violators by using the fingerprint files of the industrial company or group. Mr. Tolson, Mr. Glavin and Mr. E. A. Tanm were of the optition that the Manual should provide for the taking of two sets of fingerprints as is presently outlined in the Manual. Mr. Nathan, Mr. Rosen, Ur. Blegg, and Ur. Quinn Tann were of the opinion that the Nanual should be changed to provide for the taking of but a single set of fingerprints. Ur. Gurned shares the views of the majority of the Conference.

Ir. Clegg in his suggestions expresses his belief that spot checks of employees and searching of the employees' lockers will create widespread resentment, and he accordingly recommends against the Bureau's recommending these searches as a part of the plant protection procedure. With the exception of Ur. Clegg, the entire Conference was of the opinion that spot checks should be recommended and that searches should be made of the employees' lockers.

Concerning Ir. Clear's suggestion that the sentence near the top of Page Nineteen "Nothing in this Kanual shall be interpreted to apply to any bona fide labor or union organizer or representative" be placed in the preface or in an earlier and more prominent position in the Hanual, the entire Conference was of the opinion that no particular purpose would be served by shifting this sentence from that section of the Kanual to some other part, and accordingly, the Conference recommends against any change at this point.

Concerning Mr. Clegg's recommendation that the section of the Manual beginning at Page Thirty, which deals with the program of training, be so amended as to indicate those subjects which will be taught by Sureau personnel and those which the plant management should obtain outside lecturers to handle, the Conference recommends that this page of the Manual be

rewritten to indicate that the Buredu will aid in giving instruction upon the following subjects:

Duties and Lesponsibilities of Plant Protection Employees The Part the FBI Plays in Plant Protection and the Cooperative Functions of the FBI Discipline, Loyalty, Tact, Alerthess and Appearance Promptness in Reporting Irregularities Note Taking on the Part of Plant Protection Employees Searches of Person Searches of Places Fingerprinting Protection of the Scene of the Crime Developing Informants Firearms Training Patrol Vort Supervising the Visitors at the Plant Espionage and Sabotage Lethodo Personal Descriptions Bombs and Explosives Arson

The following subjects should be indicated as those in which outsiders should be expected to give instruction:

Plant Organization and Records (to be given by a Plant Superintendent)

Fire Protection (to be given by local fire chief or fire marshal)

Plant Rules (to be given by a plant official)

Physical Set-Up of the Plant (to be given by a plant official)

First Aid (a 15 hour course to be given by representatives of the American Red Cross)

Concerning the suggestion of Lr. Connelley that a revision be made in Page Seven of the Lanual to provide against an Agent during the course of the inspection bringing to the attention of the plant official the points which are weak in the plant protective system, the Conference was of the unanimous opinion that the change suggested by Ur. Connelley should not be made. The Conference is of the

opinion that it is highly desirable for agents during the survey to discuss with the plant protection officials the apparent pealmeages of the propent plant protection setup. This procedure affords the agent on apportunity of accertaining what otens have been taken in the past to attempt to improve the protection organization and the regulto of these attempte. This procedure affords the Agent an expertunity of receiving suggestions from the plant protection efficials. The Sanual specifically propides that the Agent should not rake any recoverdations orolly, but that the Dureou's recommendations will be nade in priting after approval of the recomendations by the Dureau. The Conference facts that this restriction upon the nexting of recommendations will prevent only Agent from naking attements which might be enterrossing to the Aureau, but the Lanual provisions as presently worded vill not precipie the Agent from freely and frankly discussing with the plant protection official the subject nattor of the inepeation of it progresses.

The Executive Conference, of course, concurs in In. Connalley's recommendation that the word "memorandum" on Page Four be changed to "Lanual."

Concerning Mr. Connelley's suggestion that the substance of Page Thirteen be revised so us to provide that the recommendations of the Agent for improvement in the protective facilities of a portioular plant be submitted in a reparate document opert from the inspection report, it is pointed out that a copy of the inspection report will not be submitted to the plant consgenent. The complete inspection report, including the Agent's recommendations, to forwarded only to the Dureau, where after review the recommendations which are approved by the Nurcou are forwarded to the plant management in a letter over the Director's atgusture. is jett consequently that a provision requiring the subassisting of a deparate document apart from the investigative report containing the recommendations for changes in the plant protective system would not serve any practical purpose. but would rake sions difficult the checking and reviewing of the complete inspection report in the Dureou and the preparation of the letter of transmittel of approved recommendations. The Conference was of the unantrious opinion that the Lanual's present provisions upon this subject not be changed or revised. Fourteen of the Lanual, which refers to a recommendation that application forms for employees include an agreement that the employee would submit to being fingerprinted, be eliminated. Ur. Connelley takes the position that the inclusion of such a provision in an application form establishes a controversial issue between the employer and employee. It is the unanimous opinion of the Executive Conference that this method of handling this situation is not only practical but desirable, since the employer unquestionably has the right to establish at all times the conditions under which he will accept applications for employment.

If a Connelley next suggests that the Manual be revised to provide that the Bureau will obtain the dispositions of all arrests indicated upon criminal records forwarded by the Bureau to plant officials. The recommended procedure in the Manual calls for the Bureau's forwarding to the plant management the ariminal record as it is recorded in the Identification Division and leaving it to the plant management to determine any dispositions of arrests not recorded in the Bureau's Identification Division records. Hr. Connelley feels that the Bureau, through the field offices, should obtain all of these dispositions. The Conference is of the unanimous opinion that in view of the potential receipt of millions of fingerprints in this plant protection program, it is highly undestrable for the Bureau to take on the additional correspondence burden of soliciting hundreds of thousands of dispositions, and the Conference feels consequently that the procedure presently outlined in the Lanual should be retained and Ur. Connelley's suggestion not adopted.

Manual which indicates that Bureau employees should be available and willing to discuss with the plant protection officers and plant personnel officers problems growing out of the employment of personnel should be stricken from the Manual. Mr. Connelley feels that the Bureau might be placed in a position where it would be criticized for participating in employer-employee disputes if the Bureau acts as counselor in employment problems. It is pointed out that this section of the Manual does not deal with situations involving disputes or potential disputes between employers and employees. The Manual repeatedly sets forth that the Bureau will not participate in or be a party to any labor disputes. The program contemplated by the provisisment of discussion is the frank discussion of personnel problems by

plant protection officials and plant personnel officials, with particular reference to employment problems, particularly the taking on of new employees, which pertain to the problem of plant protection. The Conference believes that the present provision of the Banual will establish and encourage a close relationship between Bureau field offices and plant officials.

Mr. Connelley next suggests that the provisions of the Lanual which suggest that when plant officials or employees investigate new or potential employees they ascertain particularly whether the applicant has been engaged in subversive activities or has displayed tendencies which would arouse suspicion concerning his sympathy with subversive movements, be so amended as to sprike out this specific provision. Ur. Connelley feels that if we recommend investigation of applicants with particular reference to their subversive attitude, the plant management will initiate investigation of union activities and Lay the responsibility to us. The Conference points out again that the Bureou Manual repeatedly cautions Agents against interfering in any employer-employee relationship or participat-ing in any manner in bona fide labor controversies. It is felt, however, by the Conference that the Dureau cannot consistently recommend and outline investigation of employee applicants bithout emphasizing the necessity for determining whether the applicants have in the past manifest any subversive sympathies. The Conference consequently does not recommend any affirmative action on this suggestion of Mr. Connelley.

Lir. Connelley recommends that the provision of the Lanual which provides that cameras found in the possession of unauthorized persons should be confiscated and retained in the possession of the plant protection officials for delivery to an Agent of the Bureau, be stricken from the Lanual, in order to avaid any criticism of the Bureau. The Conference is of the unanimous opinion that the recommendation presently included in the Lanual should be continued, pointing out that as a matter of precaution, any camera utilized by a person in photographing the manufacturing processes of other facilities of a plant producing material for the Var and Navy Departments is subject to suspicion, and consequently the Conference feels this provision of the Lanual is essential to a proper program of plant protection.

In. Nother has suggested that there he included in the Lanual a statement pointing out the possibility that nondescript stores and dwellings situated immediately contiguous to an important plant may be utilized for espionage and sabotage

purposes, particularly as a basts for tunneling into the plant. The Conference feels that this recommendation of Ur. Nathan possesses merit, and accordingly recommends that there be added to the top of Page Nine of the Lanual, under the heading "Physical Description of Plant", the following statement:

"12. Are there buildings of questionable character innediately adjoining the plant property which could be used as a headquarters for sabotage or espionage activities?"

Consideration should be given to the possibility of such previous being used as a base from which entrance to the plant hight be effected by tunneling, or as a point from which explosives or combustibles hight be impelled into the plant.

If such buildings are adjacent, asscribe

Ir. Nother further suggests that Page Twenty-Seven of the Lanual, which provides that all aliens should be eliminated from the plant police force, may cause some dissension in the event the United States altimately enters the war if at that time aliens of nations allied with the United States are discharged because they are aliens. No. Nother points out that his objection to this phraseology is not applicable if the program outlined in the Lanual is intended for immediate application to the entire program. The Lanual contemplates the immediate elimination from the police departments of all aliens, effective upon the undertaking of the plant protection pragram, and, accordingly, Ur. Nathan concurs in the maintenance of this provision in the Lanual in its present form.

ir. Pathan raises the question of whether the Ranual should contain some specific provision concerning disciplinary necesures to be taken against members of the plant police force reporting for duty drunk or with some manifestation of having been drinking. The Conference suggests that there be included in the Manual in that section dealing with the administration of a plant police department a specific clause or sentence stating that any member of a plant police force who reports for duty under the influence of liquor or with obvious manifestation of having

been drinking should be subject to stringent disciplinary action.

If. Nathan sees not believe that the Lanual statement relating to the performance of duty by members of the
plant police force for "8 or 12 hours" is desirable. Ur.
Nothan believes that this provision of the Lanual should be
so worded as to provide that hours of employment for the
plant police force should be 8 hours "or some other appropriate number of hours." Hr. Nathan feels that the Dureau, by
suggestion at least, establishes a standard of working hours
which is either "8 or 12 hours" and that the real recommendation should be for 8 or gone other number of hours. The
Conference recommends, in view of Ir. Nathan's views, that
there be incorporated on fage Thirty-three, under the caption "Shifts" a revised sentence which will provide that:

The shifts or tours of duty costgact to the officers of the force should be of 8 hours duration or of some other appropriate period of hours. The 8 hour shift is generally preferred over longer shifts, because an officer working an 8 hour shift will necessarily be more physically fit to operate alertly and at a peak of efficiency than will an officer employed on a shift of a much longer duration.

Ir. Lack has suggested that Page Fifteen of the Lanual, which deals with the fingerprinting of employees, should be so revised as to indicate that it is not the desire of the Dureau that any concerted effort be made to secure the fingerprints of the various plant employees, but that if the managers or appropriate afficials of these plants indicate any interest or desire of their own to fingerprint the employees, they may do so by using applicant fingerprint cards and forwarding them to the Bureau. The Conference believes that the Dureau should defer any action upon this matter until the Attorney General has specifically indicated the policy which he desires to be followed in connection with the handling of fingerprints.

Kr. Hanni has submitted a suggestion that there be incorporated in the recommended application form aning-iry to be answered by the employee as to whether he has a previous criminal record. The Conference recommends that there be added to the lanual as an additional question on Page Fourteen, the following provision:

"16. Have you ever been arrested?

If so, when, where and for what offense?"

The following suggestions pertoin to the probletons of the Manual relating to the steps to be taken in the event a bomb is reported in a plant which is the subject of the Dureau's plant protection. No controversy arises over situations in which a north or alleged bomb is discovered in the plant of the time that the Bureou Agent is actually conducting his inspection. Under such circumstances, it is of course considered escential that the Dureau Agent take command of the situation and take the parious protective stops which are outlined in the Hanual. Considerable discussion has accurred concerning those situations in which a bond or alleged bond is discovered in a plant at a time when an Agent is not in the plant, and it is the consevers of opinion that the logical suggestions, aside from elementary precautions such as removing all personnel from the vicinity in which the bomb is located, notifying the .. police and fire departments, etc., would be to furnish the plent with the names and addresses of the most readily available recognized bomb authority, preferably one with the Army or Vavy, if available. The suggestions outlined hereafter all pertain to vituations involving the location of bombs in plante.

In. Coffey recommends that the section of Page Twenty-five which deals with steps to be taken in the event of the location of a bowh, be amended to include the following provision:

"Notify the minicipal fire department and the minicipal rescue squad."

The Executive Concerence unanthously recommends that this suggestion be adopted.

Ur. Coffey's next suggestion is that the present wording of Suggestion .10 on Page Twenty-six be changed to provide:

"Furnish the names of nearby explosive experts from the Army, Kavy or other available sources, as listed in the field office index."

This suggestion should be considered in conjunction with a further suggestion of Ur. Coffey that the Dureau conduct is

o survey through the field offices to determine, through the Army and Navyand panufacturers of powder and explosives, reliable to both experts, and that upon the obtaining of this information, each field office be furnished with the appropriate data to enable them to maintain an index of available authorities upon bambs. The Conference is of the opinion that this suggestion should be adopted as a precautionary measure, and likewise approves a further recommendation of Ir. Doffey, rade by Ir. Laughman, that this survey include the location of portable I-ray equipment for use in studying bombs. Concurrence in these recommendations automatically approves Ir. Coffey's recommendation for Suggestion 10 on Page Twenty-Six.

Ir. Coffey further suggests that the entire paragraph on Page Twenty-Six, beginning "The Sureau cannot enter into any suggestions for the removal of bombs that will endanger human life." be removed. The Conference is of the opinion that this is a precoutionary provision which would appear to be destrable as a matter of record in the lanual.

The Conference unanisously reconsends adoption of Lr. Coffey's suggestion that the third paragraph on logs Iwasby-aid be re-written to read as follows:

"Each field office should ascertain the quallability and identity of individuals in its
district, especially experts of the Army or
Navy who are considered explactnes and band
experts and who would undertake to be of service
to a plant in such an energency. For your
information, allitary experts are usually
connected with the Ordnance Department. The
names of these experts should be indexed as
such in each field office, and a list of the
experts provided to the Sureau for central
indexing in Eachington."

The Conference agrees with Ur. Coffey's recommendation that the following paragraph be added to lage Twenty-six of the Lanual:

Threau Agents are not book experts and chould not attempt to handle books. If an Agent is

at the scene when a suspected bomb is discovered, he should assist in the exergency to the extent of safeguarding life until properly qualified authorities, such as the local nunicipal fire department or qualified bomb experts arrive at the scene and take charge of the removal and destruction of the bomb."

In connection with the handling of bombs, Ur. Connelley suggests that when a bomb is reported to have been located in a plant on Apent should proceed at once to the plant, in order to initiate an investigation to determine who is responsible for the placing of the bomb, and to conduct appropriate investigation of this act of attempted sabotage. The Conference realizes, of course, that the Bureau is charged with the investigative responsibility of ascertaining the identity of the person preparing the bomb and placing it in the plant, but points out that an orderly investigation can hardly be initiated while the bomb is "ticking" in the plant. The Conference feels that the program outlined, calling for the proper removal of the bomb and its appropriate disposition by a bomb expert, is a necessary prerequisite to the initiation of a complete investigation of the circumstances surrounding the placing of the bomb in the plant. The Conference believes, consequently, that the provision of the lanual as heretofore written, subject to the changes outlined, should be continued.

Concerning Ir. Connolley's comment upon the possible danger in the Bureau's recommending an expert in the removal of the bomb and being held responsible for that individual's action because we had recommended him, the Conference points out that this is a potential danger which cannot be avoided, since the Bureau can only recommend those people who are recommended to it as bomb experts.

The Conference feels that the provisions outlined hereinabove make unnecessary the preparation of any circular to be distributed to plant officials concerning action to be taken in the event a bonb is discovered. The Conference points out that bonbs present such a tremendous field of such varied circumstances that it is not destrable to attempt to prepare any set of rules or standards which might subject the Dureau to criticism should they be found inapplicable to a particular situation.

During the course of the discussion of these various suggestions, the question was raised spontaneously as to whether the Bureau should accept the fingerprints, if and when the Attorney General approves the fingerprinting partion of this program, of plant employees from the plant officials by relay through the field office, or whether it would be more desirable to establish a program whereby the plant would send its fingerprints direct to the Dureau and not through the proper field office. From the viewpoint of the Identification Division, the amount of work involved is utrivilly identical, whether the prints are received direct from the plant or sent through the field office, since the program as outlined in the Lanual contemplates the transnittal of a copy of each employee's original record to the proper field office for the information of that office. Von-idents will not be answered under the present program. Ur. Clegg was of the opinion that a considerable amount of clerical work bould be imposed upon each field office in the handling of prints received from plants: the letter re-mailing these prints to the Bureau, the separation of the records when received back from the Bureau, and the recalling to the proper plant officials. The Conference points out its belief that the Special Agent in Charge and the Special Agents engaged upon the plant protection work will be interested in reviewing the criminal records of the employees as received, and that undoubtedly in cases of aggravated records, a Apreau representative will desire to call upon the proper officials of the plant and discuss the various records with the plant officials. For this reason, it is the opinion of a najority of the Conference that the singerprints and records should clear through the appropriate field offices. Ur. Nothin and Mr. Cleng voted in favor of a policy of direct dealing between the plants and Bureau headquarters in Washington. Mesors. Tolvon, Glavin, Rosen, C. Tann and D. A. Tonn are in favor of carrying an this program through the field offices. Kr. Kurnea, who has reviewed all of the various penoranda in this situation, concurs in the najority view.

For the time being, at least, those pages of the Lanual which pertain to the fingerprinting part of this program will be deleted in order that the Lanual may be forwarded to the field offices as soon as those changes which are approved by you have been made.

The Executive Conference, Mesors. E. A. Tamm, wilnn Temm, Clavin, Cless. Nathan and Ladd being present, considered the recommendations of Mr. Cless as to soning up the field offices of the country and endeavoring to assign qualified instructors for general training subjects and for fireness training subjects in order to miniming the amount of travel necessary to handle rolice training schools in the respective divisions. There follows a suscented list of zones with the present field offices in each sone areas, together with the name of the general instructor and firearns instructor now qualified who are assigned to that zone and the names of those who it is believed should be brought to Washington for training on order to qualify them, if possible, as general instructors or as firearns instructors.

It was the further recommendation of the Conference that the school of instruction for the Agente to be given instruction in general law enforcement subjects be held at the conclusion of the In-Service School which begins on November 27, which course will be completed on Tuesday evening, December 5. The general instructors' school, therefore, would last from December 6 to December 13 for a total period of meneweels. It was believed that the firearms! Lustructors school should last for a period of two weeks and this school can begin at the completion of the new Agents' Eirearms training course at Quantico, or more particularly, December 6th, such firearms training course to lest for a period of two weeks from December 6 to 20, inclusive.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Hessrs. E. A. Tamm, Quinn Tamm, Nichols, and Glavin, considered a suggestion submitted by Mr. John D. Doerr of the Files Section to the effect that a public address system be installed on the Sixth Floor. He pointed out that such a system would be especially beneficial since at the present time it is necessary to go from section to section in locating some wented piece of mail.

Inquiries were made concerning the cost of such an emplifying system, it being determined that such a system having a sufficient number of stations distributed throughout the Files Section could be secured for an approximate cost of \$1,000. This sytem would consist of five duo-speakers and six single speakers; the inquiry could be made and the reply immediately given without loss of time.

The Conference recommends the approval of the installation of the system. If the conference recommendation is approved by the Director, appropriate instructions will be issued for the ordering of necessary equipment.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs, Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Clegg, D. M. Ladd, A. Rosen, Quinn Tamm, L. B. Hichols and Clavin, considered the desirability of opening an office at Mobile, Alabama for the purpose of having jurisdiction over the southern district of Alabama and the northern district of Florida. There are attached hereto maps, (1) reflecting the different judicial districts in the state of Alabama, and (2) the judicial districts for the state of Florida. Pensacolo, Florida, at the present time houses considerable government activity. There are both Naval Air and Army Air training stations, and both military services have made extensive studies in that section of the country for the purpose of having emergency landing fields and fences available. Fensacola is approximately 900 miles distant from Miami and takes the better part of two days to proceed from Miami to Pensacola, it being necessary to go by rail or automobile highway, there being no air service of a commercial pature from Miami to Pensacola. Mobile, Alabama is located in close proxinity to Pensadola, Florida,

Population

Under the proposed field division consisting of the southern.

district of Alabama and the northern district of Florida, the following
large cities would be included:

Pensacola, Florida - 31,000 Tallahasses, Florida - 12,000 Gainesville, Florida - 12,000 Mobile, Alabama - 68,000 Selma, Alabama - 18,000

Transportation Pacifities

Transportation facilities are entirely satisfactory from Mobile to the southern district of Alabama as well as to the northern district of Florida. The greatest distance which would necessarily have to be travelled from Mobile to any point in the proposed territory would be 350 miles in the state of Alabama.

Resident Agents

At the present time resident agencies are maintained at Mobile, Alabama, Pensacola, Florida and Tallahassee, Florida.

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Pending Cases

At this time there are 74 cases pending in the southern district of Alabama requiring 62 days work to complete. There are 69 cases pending in the northern district of Florida requiring 995 days work to complete, or a total of 143 pending cases requiring 1615 days investigative work to complete in the proposed Mobile Division. Should a field division be established at Mobile the Birmingham Division would then cover the northern and middle districts of Alabama and would have 292 pending cases necessiating 221 days investigative work. The Mismi Division would have 276 pending cases in the southern judicial district of Florida requiring 345 days work to complete.

Recommendation

The Conference imanimously recommends the establishment of a field division at Mobile, Alabama to have jurisdiction over all investigative work in the southern district of Alabama and the northern district of Florida. It is believed that with a field office in close proximity to the various government activities in and about Pensacola and Mobile there will be a donsiderable increase in investigative work in a very short period of time.

Temm, Clegg, Ladd, Rosen, Quinn Tamm, Nichols, and Glavin, considered the possibility of opening an office at Jackson, Mississippl, to cover the entire State of Mississippl, taking the southern district of Mississippl from the jurisdiction of the New Orleans Office and the northern district from the jurisdiction of the Memphis Office.

Population

From available records it has been determined that the approximate area of the State of Mississippi is £6,865 square miles. It has a population of approximately 2,036,000 persons. The principal cities in Mississippi are:

Population

Resident Agents

At the present time the Washington Field Office, which office has jurisdiction over the State of Maryland, meintains three Resident Agents at Baltimore and one at Comberland. The SAC of the Washington Field Office has advised that he is of the opinion that it is expential to assign an additional Resident Agent to Baltimore at the earliest possible date. It will therefore be seen that there will be at least 4 Agents working in Baltimore proper and one in Cumberland, or 5 Resident Agents in the State of Maryland within the very hear future, there being 4 such Resident Agents at the present time.

Pending Work

At the present time there are 772 cases pending in the Washington Field Office, requiring 2,470 days! investigative work to complete. Of the total number of pending cases, 170 cases requiring 312 days! work to complete are pending in the State of Maryland, 602 ouch cases requiring 2,158 days! work to complete pending in the District of Columbia.

Recommendation

The Conference unanimously recommends the establishment of a

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October 3, 1939 Memorandum for the Director field office at Baltimore, Maryland, to handle all investigative tork within the State of Maryland. The Conference points out that under present conditions the work, especially along the unterfront of Baltimore and the various Covernment proving grounds, such as the Aberdeen proving grounds, Haryland, will undoubtedly cause a great number of additional cases to be referred to the Bureau for proper investigative consideration. It is the belief of the Conference that with an office at Bultimore the work in the State of Maryland would increase tremendously within a very short poriod of time. The Executive Conference consisting of Messra. Tolson, Clegg, E. A. Town, Ladd, Rosen, Quinn Town, Richols, and Glavin, considered the desirability of locating an office at Norfolk, Virginia. The state of Virginia is divided into two judicial districts; the eastern district covers cities such as Richmond, Alexandria, Northern Rows, and Norfolk, where court is held, and the vestorn district, where court is held, and the vestorn district, wherein court is held at Abington, Big Stone Gap, Churlottesville, Denville, Harrischburg, bynchburg, and Rosnoke.

Resident Agents

At the present time the Richmond Orlice maintains two Restant Agents at Norroll, one at Roskoke, bud one at Alexandria, Virginia.

Pending Cases

The rejority of the pending work in the State of Virginia in at the present time compentrated in the centern judicial district. Of 176 cases pending in the entire State of Virginia, requiring 6.002 days investigative work to complete, 329 are pending in the eastern judicial district requiring 6.342 days work to complete, while only 147 are pending in the nestern judicial district, requiring only 206 days to complete.

With reference to the possible establishment of a field office of Norfolk, Virginia, it is noted that in the territory surrounding Newport News and Norfolk there are 157 cases pending at the present time requiring 214 days investigative work to complete. The Conference is of the opinion that although the establishment of an office of Norgania, rolk would split the eastern judicial district of the State of Virginia, and that the entire division would be relatively small, it is believed that with the concentration of shipping enterprises and military establishments in and about the vicinity of Norfolk and Newport News it would be to the great adventage of the Bureau at the present time to establish a field office in that territory. The attached map reflects the size of the proposed territory, it being blocked off in the yellow portion there by a heavy black line.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Conference, consisting of Messrs, Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamin, Clegg, Q. Tamm and Glavin, considered the desirability of furnishing a uniform range uniform for representatives of this Bureau while at Quantico. Mesars. Tolson, E. A. Tamm and Glavin recommended the adoption of a khaki uniform, (shirt and trousers), tie, black or ten shoes, for regular summer uniform at Quantico. Messre. Tolson and Glavin opposed the adoption of a uniform hat. Mr. E. A. Tamm recommended an inexpensive type helmet to complete this uniform. Mesers. Nathen, Clegg and Cuinn Term recommended favorably as to any equipment not costing more than \$10.

Messrs, Tolson, E. A. Tanm and Glavin recommended that the uniform adopted be adopted for classroom and reservation wear as well as sotual range duty wear. Messra, Wathan, Clegg and Quinn Tamm recommended uniform for the range only. Mr. Clegg stated that by uniforming men in classrooms and on the reservation it would be difficult to eliminate the so-called college spirit. Further, he is of the opinion that they should not look like the Marine personnel.

There is attached to this memorandum a sample of the khaki uniform which it is suggested be secured for Bureau personnel while assigned to Quantico. This uniform will cost approximately \$4.70. It is the opinion of the Conference that two or three uniforms of this type could be purchased by agents attending training schools without financial difficulty. The Conference was of the unanimous opinion that such uniforms be not compulsory to those agents the attend Quantico for a period of only one week. It was also of the opinion that this uniform be not made compulsory for members of the National Police Academy.

The Conference was advised by Mr. Clegg that insofar as winter uniforms are concerned such uniform made of satisfactory material as it is tailored for Quantico officers would cost approximately \$50. The Conference is opposed to the adoption of my winter uniform for the Bureau men at Quantico. The members of the Conference pointed out that it would be perficularly difficult to adopt a uniform range uniform during the winter period due to the varied weather conditions. Should the Director approve the adoption of the summer range uniform, appropriate instructions will be issued to Mr. Clegg concerning them.

The Executive Conference, those present being Mesers, Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Nichols, Quinn Tamm, Ladd, Glavin, and Hinco, considered a proposed bulletin to the field bringing up to date Bureau Bulletin No. 12, First Series 1939, dated April 1, 1939. This bulletin and the revision were for the purpose of informing the field of the names of the Special Agents who are qualified as firearms instructors.

The Conference considered the fact that existing instructions to the field permit the SAO to designate one of the Bureau's approved firearms instructors to handle one day of the firearms training when two days! training are given to two different groups in a field division, the existing instructions requiring the SAC to be personally present on one day.

Mr. Tolson and all of the members of the Conference with the exception of Mr. Hince were of the opinion that the Bureau should change its existing rule and that the Bureau should now require the SAC personally to be present at every firearms training period, and that the services of the Bureau's approved firearis instructors should be limited to assisting the SAC in his presence. This recommendation is based on the fact that the official in charge of firearms training is responsible not only for the technical supervision of firing the guns but also is responsible for the conduct of a large group of Bureau agents during the entire period of training and en route to and from the training.

Mr. Hince is of the opinion that the Special Agents qualified and approved as firearms instructors should be permitted to handle one day of firearms training where two days' training are given. He believes that any of the Bureau's agents who successfully obtain the approval of the Bureau's firearms experts at Washington are very well qualified to handle firearms training and that they should be permitted to take complete charge at the range.

The SAC is now responsible for seeing that the agents of a particular office properly assemble for travel to a range. He is also Mr. Solin Topus, responsible now for seeing that they depart in good order and that proper precaution is given to the loading of weapons and the arrangements for the proper convoy of the weapons to the range. Mr. Hince believes that this arrangement should continue and that the Bureau's firearms

instructor should be permitted on one day of the training to supervise the group en route to the range after leaving the field office, during the actual practice at the range, and up to the arrival of the agents back at the field office headquarters where the SAC again is responsible for the conduct of the men.

The majority of the conference favored giving the New York Division special consideration by having one of the better qualified firearms instructors from the Seat of Government or the Washington Field Office supervise the training at New York.

The Executive Conference conclating of Mesers.

E. A. Temm, Nathan, Quinn Temm, Rosen, Mince, and Glavin considered a memorandum submitted by Mr. Loughlin for the attention of Mr. Tolson concerning night garage passes.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference considered the question of furnishing fireers training to local police training schools by Bureau Instructors. It was pointed out that there is conelderable denger involved in furnishing actual firearms instruction on the range to local police officers, in view of the fact that in many departments the men are completely untrained before the arrival of the Bureau's fireerms instructor. In most instances, they have had no previous training in safety precautions. Many of the firearms instructors have commented on the hazard. involved

The Conforence wise considered the fact that it is not possible for the Eureau's instructors to stay at any police school long enough to furnish the extended training in the use of firearms which is necessary in order to qualify a police officer. For example, in the prepent police training progress in the Philadelphia Police Department, it would be impractical for the Bureau to have firegras instructors present to handle the eighty two groups of fifty officers each, which make up the total of four thousand, one hundred officers, which are to be given firearms instruction. The way it is being handled in Philadelphia, the Bureau's firearms instructor gave come demonstrations, furnished a course of in-struction in safety precentions and the principles of pictol shooting and left the actual training on the range to be bendled by the local police instructors.

The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Hince, Nichols, Rosen, Quinn Tamm, and Glavin considered a suggestion made by William H. Gardner, Employee of the Technical Section of the Identification Division, wherein he suggests an improvement for the handling of leave throughout the Bureau.

He submits a suggested form of leave slip which is attached hereto which is to be identical with our present leave slip, with the exception that it has a detachable stub which would be furnished an employee as a record of leave taken by him. Gardner, under his suggestion, stated that an employee would retain the stub as a record of leave taken and would be entitled to make no complaint unless he submitted a written memorandum attaching the same thereto. The plan advanced by Gardner presupposes that each employee is furnished with a record of his leave at the beginning of each year. However, this is only true with respect to the Identification Davision since no other employees of the Bureau are advised concerning the leave due them at the end of each year.

The Conference is opposed to the adoption of this suggestion; first, due to the fact that the leave slip presently used by the Bureau is the approved Department of Justice Leave slip; and, second, that furnishing the stub to the interested employee would not result in any benefit either to the employee or to the Bureau. The Bureau has no objection to advising the employee the amount of Leave due him if such a request is made, and it should not be necessary for an employee to have to submit stubs of leave taken by him to secure such information.

It was brought to the attention of the Executive Conference consisting of Messis. Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Quinn Tamm, Hince, Nichols, and Glavin, that on November 2, 1939, the New York Office had requested. the permanent installation of additional recording equipment, due to the many telephone taps and microphone. installations; and in some instances foreign language conversations which have been encountered making it. necessary to utilize recording equipment until such time as the recordings can be translated. The Special Agent in Charge of the New York Office stated that in order to accomplish this, several attempts had been made to utilize the Type D Presto Recorders which were recently forwarded to the New York Office. It was found that the speed with which this recorder operates resulted in a situation wherein the consumption of records is believed to be excessive on this type of recorder and renders it. impractical for continued conversations. He pointed out, however, that the type D recorder will be utilized when possible in recording telephone conversations of an intermittent nature. He further stated that in order to record continued conversation on the various plents, it has been necessary for the New York Office to use the Larger Presto with assigned there; and, accordingly, there is no recording equipment available for recording in the New York Office at the present time. He points out that the present setup in the conference and detention rooms in the New York Office makes it necessary to maintain a recording unit in the Technical Room at all times to record any conversations taking place in the office on detention mooms and that the occasion has recently lars sen whereby interviews in the detention rooms had to the recorded, and as a result thereof, the Bureau forwarded to the New York Office for temporary use the recording unit, manufactured by the Radio Tone Products Corporation.

The Special Agent in Charge at New York stated that the Radio Pone unit is more adaptable as a fixed installation, whereas the Presto unit is so constructed

that it lends itself to portability from one point to another. He further believes that the Radio Rone Unit has other additional advantages which it is believed will make it a valuable addition to the equipment of the New York Office. He requests that the Bureau give consideration to allowing this unit to be retained by the New York Office as a stationary unit to record the interviews in the conference and detention rooms which would make the Presto unit available for any such telephone taps or microphone installations as might arise.

Mr. Ladd, in a memorandum submitted on this matter under date of November 10, states that the New York Office at the present time has in its possession two of the large Presto recorders, that the Radio Tone recorder was forwarded temporarily to the New York Office, that the equipment cost approximately \$1,500 and that insofar as can be ascertained, it is the intention of the New York Office to request the assignment of this recorder so that it may be permanently setup to record interviews and conversations in the conference and detention rooms.

Mr. Ladd is of the opinion that a permanent setup in the New York Office is not justified, that the New York Office is not justified, that the New York Office can use the Presto recorders presently assigned there in connection with microphone hookups, and if necessary, can make use of such recorders on the outside in connection with investigative work. He points out that the Presto recorder could very easily be disconnected from the conference and detention rooms and used outside on any investigation.

This matter was referred to Mr. Connelley. who was then in New York, to secure his opinion concerning the necessity for such equipment. Under date of December 14, 1939, a communication was received from Mr. Connelley wherein he states that in connection with various surveillances and telephone taps which have been necessary from time to time in the New York Office, it has required the use of the presently available Presto set and when this set is established on a plant outside the office, it is. mot possible to make available a recording of conversations which might be taking place or interviews being had with subjects when they are available in the various conference gooms or detention cells of the New York Office. Mr. Connelley also pointed out that there is a small Presto recording set available in the New York Office which would take a twelve-inch record. Mr. Connelley believes that due to the volume of work handled in the New York

Office, together with the use which is made from day to day, the additional expense would be warranted in supplying them with an additional Preso set of equipment, because such equipment would be more portable than the Radio Tone equipment recommended by Special Agent in Charge Forwarth. He pointed out that it is expected that there will be an increasing use made of these recordings, both in the office and on the outside, due to the additional work necessary

in connection with the espionage cases. He further pointed out that the Bureau might went to give due consideration to the recent ruling of the U.S. Supreme Court concerning

wire tapping before furnishing this additional set!

The Conference was advised by Mr. Quinn Tamm that it would be very unlikely that Radio Tone sets would be secured as a result of the bids requested by the Bureau, inasmuch as Radio Tone Corporation suffered financial difficulties as a result of our last bids, since the bids submitted by that company were so low that they could not carry the financial burden. The Conference is of the opinion that the only reason this additional set is wanted by the New York Office is for a permanent installation to be used when necessary in recording interviews or conversations had in the detention rooms or conference rooms of that office.

The Conference is of the opinion that the two sets presently on hand at the New York Office is sufficient and that the heed is not such as to warrant an additional expenditure of approximately \$1,500 for a new set for that office. If the Director approves the Conference's recommendation in this matter, an appropriate communication will go forward to the New York Office.

Taum, Quinn Tamm, Clavin, Nathan, Nichols, Ladd and Clegg being present, considered the possibility of holding a reunion of the FBI National Police Academy during this celender year. It was believed that such a reunion should be held and that it should coincide with the final week of the final session of the Academy this year, the date of which it is believed should be moved up so that instead of running from August 12, 1940 to November 2, 1940, it will run from July 15, 1940 to October 5, 1940. - PROPERTY -

All property for which you have signed a receipt is property of the FBI and is merely issued to you for temporary use during the period of training.

No one may leave the reservation without the permission of the Special Agent in Charge.

A registration book is maintained in the administrative office and all students on entering and leaving the reservation must sign the register and include the required information.

- ROOM ASSIGNMENTS -

Assignments of rooms will be made to each class arriving at the FBI Training Center according to the alphabetical order of the names on the roll. The Special agent in Charge of the FBI Training Center will designate one traines in each room for a specific period of time to take charge of the room end maintain it in good order. Each traines will be responsible for maintaining his eleeping quarters and for maintaining his space in accordance with the uniform method prescribed.

Fresh lipen will be furnished twice a week and each trainee will be responsible for handling his changes of linen. At the conclusion of the class period at the FBI Training Center each traines will prepare his sleeping quarters for the next class.

Digarettes, cigars and other smoking materials must be placed in ash trays or other smoking utensils specifically provided for this purpose and in no other place.

- SHOWER ROOMS -

Appropriate receptacles have been provided for the holding of soiled towels, and these should be used. An adequate supply of towels will be found in the cabinets behind shower room doors. Used razor blades must be disposed of in a safe manner and must not be placed in the towel receptacles. Locker room shoes are required in the shower rooms to prevent contamination with Athletes Foot.

- RANGE CLOTHING -

Wet overshoes, raincoats and other wet footgear must be placed in the overshoe-rack in the basement corridor. Prior to entering the basement and after leaving the range it will be necessary for all trainees to enter the building through the basement door, removing muddy footgear prior to entering the building.

- DINING ROOM -

The dining room will be used only at the appropriate hours when it is open for service. Trainees will not appear in the dining room for meals unless wearing appropriately cleaned apparel. When necessary to have meals while wearing range clothing, trainees will make certain that this clothing has been sufficiently cleaned so that it will be presentable and will not soil the dining room equipment.

- Notices -

Schedules and special announcements will appear on the bulletin heard located in the class rooms. Everyone will be held responsible for such information as appears on these bulletin boards.

- CONDUCT AND ORDERLINESS -

Each student must make up his own bed daily and keep his bed and locker in a neat, orderly arrangement at all times, subject to most minute and strict inspection. A monitor will be designated for each room and it will be his duty to see that the floors of each room are swept by assigning such duties to various students assigned to the dormitory space. It will be the duty of such monitors to inspect the neatness of the making of the beds, the cleanliness of the floors, the lockers and all equipment in each dormitory area daily, and there will be an official administrative inspection of each of the quarters daily.

No gambling of any kind is permitted on the Reservation.

No intoxicating beverage may be brought anto the Reservation at any time and no intoxicating beverage, beer or wine may be brought into the FBI Building at any time.

There is to be no bolsterousness. Any breakage of furniture or fixtures will have to be paid for by those responsible.

- Firearus -

Firedras, whether belonging to the FBI or whether privately owned, must be maintained at all times in the gun vault except when actual practice is scheduled to be engaged in under supervision. No atudent, therefore, is permitted to have in any of his luggage or on his person or in his private quarters any firearms of any type, and special receptacles for storing personally owned firearms are available in the gun vault and they will be issued as needed.

All tables used for gun cleaning must be covered with tarpaulin during the gun cleaning process. All soiled materials should be placed immediately in the waste cans, and any oil which is unavoidably spilled on the floor or other equipment must be immediately removed. All gun cleaning rods must be placed in the gun cleaning rod-rack following use.

- LOCKER ROOM SHOES -

All students are required to provide themselves with locker room shoes, and this equipment should be appropriately used.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference on May 16, 1940, considered the status of document identification work. This matter was brought up by Mr. Ledd in view of two recent erroneous identifications in handwriting which have come to the attention of the Technical Laboratory.

It was pointed out by Mr. Ladd that in the first case the examination of handwriting appearing on a check had been made in February, 1940, by examiners C. A. Appel and S. T. Holland, and that they had identified the handwriting of one John Paradiso as being the hendwriting on the check; that subsequently, the Chief of Police at Provo, Utah, the contributor in this case, informed the Laboratory that a roomste of Paradiso, one Lloyd V. Rollins, had confessed to this forgery. No prosecution was instituted against either of these individuals and none is contemplated in view of the fact that appearently restitution has been made.

The second erroneous identification occurred upon the exemination of handwriting submitted in November, 1939, by the Bureau of . Criminal Investigation at Des Moines, Iowa, in connection with a check forgery case. The handwriting of Mrs. Buth Gibson, who had a criminal record as a forger dating back to 1923, was identified by four examiners, Mesers. L. D. Casteiger. W. N. Armstrong. S. T. Holland and C. A. Appel. Subsequently, Mr. Gasteiger testified at the trial of Mrs. Gibson to the effect that it was his opinion theichecks were in the handwriting of Mrs. Gibson. There were also five eye-withesses who identified Wrs. Gibson as the passer of the two checks involved. Mrs. Gibson was convicted and sentenced to serve ten years in the Komen'n Reformatory of the State of Iows on December 23, 1939. Subsequently, another female check forger, Mrs. Harriot Lokue, was arrested in nearby Minnesote in connection with some forgories, and she has now confessed that she forged and passed the checks upon which Mrs. Gibson was convicted. An investigation of this case has been instituted in order that handwriting specimens of Brs. LaRue, as well as additional handwriting specimens of Mrs. Gibson, may be obtained and studied. In the meantime, the State's Attorney at Ceder Rapids, Iowa, has turned over to krs. Gibson's attorney copy of the confession secured from Mrs. Lakue for his use in having the case remended to the lower court and dismissed. RECORDE

In discussing this matter with the Conference, it was pointed out that the Bureau has committed itself too atrongly and sweepingly in connection with document work to endeavor to retire from the outside field of document examinations at the present time; that to withdraw would injure the Laboratory in that those document cases which the Bureau did not accept and handle would be sent elsewhere, resulting in local agencies building up their own laboratories for document work, following which they would enlarge their activities to cover all laboratory examinations, and that one or the other Federal agencies, such as the Secret Service or the Post Office Inspectors, would immediately set up a laboratory for the purpose of handling these cases for local as well as Federal agencies.

It was pointed out that during the fiscal year of 1939, the PMI Technical Laboratory made a total of 3,511 document examinations, divided as follows:

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Third - It was suggested that the FBI discontinue all document work for State, local and all other Federal agencies, continuing exeminations in document work only in FBI cases.

Fourth - It was suggested that the Bureau continue making document exeminations for all contributors, but that the Bureau furnish experts to testify only in Bureau cases. In local and other Federal cases, the results of the examinations should be furnished for investigative purposes only and Bureau experts should not appear in court.

Fifth - It was recommended that the FBI continue all examinations and furnish testimony for the FBI, other Federal agencies and for State contributors, as at the present time; however, requiring stricter supervision of this work in that the first recommendation that three senior document examiners, plus the document Supervisor, must make the identification.

The Executive Conference, composed of Messrs, Tolson, Nathan, Michols, Clavin, Rosen, Quinn Term, Hince and Ladd, on May 25, 1940, considered the attached Bureau Bulletin to the field advising them of the discontinuance of all handwriting examinations for State and local contributors. Tolson and Nathan that considerable pressure had been brought to bear through the Department on the various United States Attorneys insisting that all handwriting examinations be referred to the Bureau's Laboratory and refusing to pay for any private handwriting examinations in Federal cases, and in view thereof, it would be most embarrassing to discontinue that work at the present time and the Bureau would also lose all the ground it had gained through having forced this position on the Department. It was also believed that other types of document exeminations might be made for all contributors, that is typewriting, exeminations of paper and exeminations for the purpose of restoring erased or eradicated writing, insamuch as these phases of document work were believed to be nore exact and less subject to opinion testinon

All of the members of the Conference were in accord with these views with the exception of Mr. Glavin, who stated that he believed that examinations should be conducted for all contributors and that if any bear were to be placed on handwriting work, it should apply to all contributors, including the Bureau, his views being that we should do this work for everybody or nobody.

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The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Quinn Tamm, Hince, Nicholm, Rosen, and Glavin considered the suggestion submitted by Special Agent D. K. Rankin of the San Francisco Office, concerning the notarization of vouchers of field employees in the Bureau. This Agent points out that in Section Three of the Government Travel Regulations, chief clerks of the various executive departments and bureaus, or clerks designated by them for the purpose, are required, empowered, and authorized, when requested, to administer oaths, required by law or otherwise, to account for travel or other expenses against the United States.

This agent points out that it has occurred to him that it might be proper for the Chief Clerk of the Bureau to designate the chief clerks of the various field divisions to administer the oaths required above, that this would speed up the submission of vouchers to the Bureau, there would be a saving in Agents! time, it would eliminate the amount of expense vouchers being common gossip shong non-employees, and finally, it would be a saving of twenty-five cents in notary fees each month for many of the field employees.

The Conference was advised that the Appointment Clerk in the Department has stated that each of the chief clerks of the various field divisions could be authorized to notarize expense accounts. The Appointment Clerk pointed out to Mr. Glavin that this has been done in all penal institutions in the United States. In order that such authorization may be granted, it would be necessary for the Bureau to appropriately advise the Department as to those who would be authorized to notarize such expense accounts, at which time the appropriate letters of authorization

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It is pointed out to the Director that in several states it is not possible for the Government employees to hold notary commissions and in those states, particularly Pennsylvania and California, it is necessary that outsiders properly notarize expense accounts of Special Agents of this service. It is believed that in giving this authorization to the chief clerks in the various field divisions that less difficulty would be experienced by Special Agents in having expense accounts properly notarized and further, in the future it would not be necessary to have the Special Agent personnel in the various field offices defrey notary expense when a notary commission is secured for a clerk in the field division.

If the Director approves, the appropriate communication will be forwarded to the Bepartment concerning this matter. There is attached hereto a suggested communication to Mr. Rankin, subject to the Director's approval.

The Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Q. Tamm, Nichols and Glavin considered a memorandum submitted by Mr. Belmont of the Chief Clerk's Office under date of March 21, 1940, concerning Section 64 of the Manual of Rules and Regulations pertaining to applicants.

Mr. Belmont pointed out that in this section under the heading of LABORATORY TECHNICIAN, the statement is made that applicants for appointment to the position of Laboratory Technician are required to have a Master's Degree in the sciences. Hr. Belmont pointed out that it is his understanding that a Master's Degree is not a requirements for appointment to the position as Laboratory Technician with the exception of the position of Junior Physicist, it being understood that those applicants having a Master's Degree the are applying for the other positions are given preference. The statements concerning these positions which are sent out to applicants applying, with the exception of the Junior Physicist position, do not make mandatory that the applicant must have attained a Master's Degree in the sciences. He recommends that Section 64 of the Manual of Rules and Regulations pertaining to Laboratory Technicians be appropriately changed. The Conference was advised that the qualifications for applicants for appointment to the position of Laboratory Technician are that they must have a Bachelor's Degree in the sciences, with preference being given to those having a Kaster's Degree, with the exception of the applicants for appointment to the position of Malunior Physicist, who must have a Master's degree to be considered. The Executive Conference, including Messrs. Quinn Tamm, E. A. Tamm, D. M. Ladd, W. R. Glavin and L. A. Hince, considered the suggestion made by Mr. Logen that the present regulation against "dry firing" without supervision be rescinded.

The present regulation requires that Special Agents and others obtaining training from the Bureau will not be permitted to engage in "dry firing" except under supervision of a designated firearms instructor. This ruling was established following the death of Officer John Miller while attending the National Police Academy and who was killed with a supposedly unloaded gun. There have been in the past also numerous instances of accidental discharges of supposedly unloaded guns.

Mr. Logan's suggestion indicates that "dry firing" is a recognized method of instruction which should be participated in more frequently than is possible under supervision. Er. Logan observes that since the inception of the Bureau's rule prohibiting "dry firing" many new Agents as well as older Agents have been very clumey in the handling of their sidearms which these men have attributed to lack of familiarity caused by the restriction on "dry firing". Mr. Logan says that this clumsiness can be overcome by considerable "dry firing".

The Conference was unanimously of the opinion that the Bureau's present ruling should be continued. It was pointed out that fireeras training has been extended from three to five days for In-Service Agents. E A land further pointed out that it would be more desirable to use the class additional time in training under supervision than to risk the calamity land of a fatal accident during Edry firing" without supervision. MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

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The Executive Conference, Messrs. Tolson, Q. Tanis, Rosen, Clavin and Hince being present, considered the practice followed by the Bureau at present in forwarding reports of the physical examinations of the members of the National Police Academy to their superiors.

The letter which is presently addressed to the member of the Academy and a copy of which is furnished to his superior contains a report of physical condition as found and recommendations for improvement. There was no objection to this, nor to the first pertion of the following paragraph. Mr. Hince and all of the members of the Conference except Mr. Clavin were in agreement that the last two sentences of the paragraph following should be eliminated. The last two sentences are underlined.

> "It is the opinion of the Bureau that you will be desirous of taking the necessary action to increase your physical fitness so that you could be recommended for strenuous physical exertion. For your information, under the standards of fitness for Special Azents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, it is necessary that they be able to perform stremuous physical exertion and have no defects which would interfere with participation in raids or other work in connection with the detention and apprehension of originals. In instances where the Examining Physicians! Board recommends less than strenuous physical exertion, representatives of the Bureau are afforded a period of one year in which to remedy any physical defects reported as mitigating against their participation in strenuous physical endegvor."

The reasons for objection to the underlined portion were: (1) The phraseology infers that the standards of fitness for Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation should be followed by the local agencies. (2) The phraseology infers that the local department should consider affording its representative in the FBI

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National Police Academy the same period of one year to remedy physical defects which is allowed Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. (3) It was believed by the majority that the Bureau has nothing to gain by indicating any desirability for a following of the Eureau's physical standards by local agencies and that we may antagonize the member of the National Police Academy and possibly his Chief through such a suggestion. It was also felt that some Chief of Police back home may use these statements against the member of the Academy and justify his action by stating that the Eureau itself had recommended requiring the man to remedy physical defects within a period of one year.

Mr. Glevin was of the opinion that the sentences underlined should be left in the form of the present letter; that Chiefs of Police should be specifically informed what the standards of fitness are for Special Agents of the FBI and that the Bureau requires that physical defects be remedied within a period of one year. Mr. Clavin believed that this should emphatically be brought to the attention of the local officers.

Tamm, Forworth, Nichols, Rosen, Tracy and Ladd, considered the proposal submitted by the Dictograph Sales Corporation to modify and add extensions to the inter-office communication system at a cost of \$1,987.00.

The greater portion of the difficulty arising from short circuits and failure of the inter-office communicating system to operate has occurred in the cables on the Seventh Floor by reason of the fact that there are presently three large conductor cables running through the conduits which are no longer being used and replacement with a single cable would eliminate the trouble in the operation of the dictograph. It is estimated that if this service is performed, the inter-office communicating system will operate much more efficiently and the present maintenance cost will be reduced by about 50%.

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The Executive Conference consisting of Mesers. E. A. Tamm, Nathan, Clegg, Ladd, Nichols, Quinn Tamm, and Clavin, considered a request submitted by Special Agent in Charge Civly, of the San Diego Office, that a special radio be furnished to San Diego so that it could be utilized if necessary in intercepting meseages broadcast on either local or short wave radios and on any radio band.

SAC Wyly points out that the San Diego Field Division would be intamposition to tune in on messages broadcase White alleged espionage agents no matter whether the transmission came from ships at sea or from concealed radio stations in Mexico.

The Conference is of the unenisous opinion that such special radio equipment is not needed or necessary in the San Diego Office. It is pointed out that the Naval Intelligence Service at San Diego undoubtedly has the necessary receivers to intercept such messages if necessary. Mr. Ladd pointed out that if such a piece of equipment were to be secured for the San Diego Office, it would have to be the so-called Hammerlund radio which costs approximately \$1,000.

The Conference is opposed to furnishing any such equipment to the San Diego Division at this time.) There is attached hereto, for the Director's approval, a communication addressed to the San Diego Office concerning this matter.

Mr. Glavin advised the Conference that he had been informed by the local representative of the Wayne Body Company, which company manufactures bus bodies exclusively, that the most common color used on busses is a dark blue, generally known asa marine blue or navy blue. Also, quite a number of busses are a maroon color. The Conference was further advised that the representative of the Wayne Body Company pointed out that the roofs of the busses should be in aluminum paint since such paint would make the busses cooler inasmuch as the sun's rays are reflected rather than absorbed.

A photograph of a bus was exhibited to the Conference, such photograph being attached hereto. This bus has an aluminum paint job on top and trim and a dark blue body.

The Conference is of the unanimous opinion that the busses being prepared for the Bureau should be of dark navy blue color with aluminum-painted top and trim, comparable to the color scheme on the attached photograph.

The Executive Conference with Mesers. Nathan, Ladd, Q. Tamm, Rosen, Glavin, Michols and E. A. Tame in attendance, considered the suggestion submitted by Joseph D. Allen, a clerical employee, that supervisors prior to checking Sureau files when following up menoranda to the Department upon ticklers, first call the Department file and review it. Ar. Allen makes the observation that often the Department has taken some action upon a Sureau memorandum, such as referring the natter to the United States Attorney for observation or comment, and that if the Bureau supervisor reviews the Department file prior to following up the Department, he can ascertain that the matter is pending action within the Department.

The Executive Conference is of the opinion that the Department should, both as a natter of good administration and as a matter of courtesy, advise the Bureau of action taken by the Department upon Bureau memoranda. It is further observed that under the eyetem followed in the Department in handling filing operations, a considerable period of time clapses before material finds its way into the files and that consequently an examination of the Departmental file is not conclusive as to the status of a partioular case. The Conference feels consequently that as a matter of efficient operation within the Bureau the Bureau Supervisor should continue to follow up the Department in matters brought to the Department's attention by Eureau memoranda upon the status of the case as indicated by the Bureau files rather than first reviewing the Departmental files.

The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. E. A. Tamm, Nathan, Ladd, Quinn Taum, Nichols, and Glavin further considered the securing of a plaque for the barracks building at Quantico, Virginia. The Conference was advised by Mr. Glavin that he had been in touch with Mr. Underwood, one of the supervisor architects of the Public Buildings Agency, concerning the type of plaque which would be most desirable. The Conference was further advised by Mr. Clavin that Mr. Underwood has an excellent reputation as an architect and that he has had and continues to have an extensive private practice.

Mr. Glavin stated that Mr. Underwood had advised him that an aluminum plaque with a sand blasted or deplated background and polished face letters. would show up very distinctly against the red brick of the barracks. He stated that the sand blasted or deplated background would give the plaque a soft end non-shining background and the polished face letters would stand out very oldetinctly. He stated also that a bronze plaque with a pebbled background and polished face letters would tone in very well with the red brick background of the barracks. Mr. Glavin also stated that he had inquired of Mr. Underwood as to which would be the more decireble, end he stated that the aluminum plaque would be rather loud and that he personally would recommend a bronze plaque which would add dignity to the building and would be easily discernable from the highway.

The Conference unanimously recommends that steps be taken to secure the hecessary bronze plaque with a pebbled background and the polished face Tetters for the barracks at Quantico.

MENORABUM TOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference consisting of Messre. Tolson, Nathan Clege, E. A. Tass. Ladd, Nichola and Glavin considered the suggestion made by Glavin on April 10, 1940, concerning the Bureau's clerical employees being considered for Special Agent (Accountant) positions.

(1) The Conference was advised by Glavin that he mag of the opinion that in the event the Bureau is not going to consider favorably any applicant for a Special Agent (Accountant) position from its clerical employees without having the adoessary three years of accounting and auditing experience. Bureau employees both at the seat of government and in the field who at the present time are studying accountancy be notified to this effect so that they will not be laboring under the delusion that when they complete their accounting courses, they will be considered for Special Agent (Accountant) positions without the necessity of three years of accounting and auditing experience. Up to this ting, the Bureau has not required its clerical applicante for Special Agent (Accountant) positions to have the three years of accounting and auditing experience, although this requirement is necessary for those applying for accomment positions from the outside.

The Conference unanimously agreed that clerical employees of the Bureau studying for Special Agent (Accountant) positions should have the necessary three years of accounting experience and that in the absence of such experience, their applications be not favorably considered. The Conference recommends that Bureau clerical employees presently studying accountancy be so advised.

2) Er. Clegg pointed out that during a number of recent interviews conducted by him with clerical employees of the Bureau, he has found that certain of the clerical employees either studying accountancy or law, in his opinion, do not possess the necessary personality requisites to be considered feverably for Special Agent positions. Er. Clegg recommends that a committee be appointed at this time to interview present clerical employees who are studying either law or accountancy with the goal in mind of becoming

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Special Agents to definitely ascertain whether these employees possess the necessary personality requisites to be further considered for Special Agent positions. Mr. Clegg believes that if such employees cannot measure up to the accepted standards for Special Agents, these employees be advised at this time that it does not appear that they will be favorably considered for Special Agent positions due to their personality and personal shortcomings. Mr. Tolson was of the opinion that such a committee would not be able to function satisfactorily. He recommended that the various division heads handle this setter in so far as clerical employees assigned to those divisions are concerned and after having the opportunity of observing such employees, appropriate memoranda be directed to the Director setting forth their views concerning the clerical employeest possibilities for advancement to the Special Agent position. Mr. Tolson is of the further opinion that in appointing clerical eaployees that such employees be appointed with the thought in mind of their future development to a Special Agent position. He recommended that if a clerical or messenger employee entered on duty and did not appear to measure up to the standards required, that the Bureau official who had initially recommended the employee be immediately communicated with and advised in detail concerning the employee in question. Mesers, Tolson, E. A. Tamm and Glavin are of the opinion that the setting up of a committee to pass on the personality qualifications of the employees now in the service would be undesirable. The Conference was of the unanimous opinion that in the event a clerical employee is appointed who cannot meet the required personality qualifications that the person originally recommending him be immediately advised thereof.

(3) Mr. Nathan observed that there should be no preference shown to a clerical employee who possesses the basic qualifications for appointment to the position of Special Agent over the applicant who is not now employed in the Bureau. Mr. Nathan is of the opinion that all applicants, whether in or out of the service, should be treated and considered in a like manner and no preference given to any class of applicant.

Messra. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Nichols and Glavin are of the opinion that a clerical employee who possesses all of the basic qualifications for the position of Special Agent should be given preference over a person applying from the outside

The Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, E. A. Tann, Ladd, Hince, Quinn Tamm, Michols, Rosen, and Glavin considered a suggestion submitted by Special Agent Werren J. Taylor concerning the installation of sirens in Bureauowned automobiles.

Special Agent Taylor suggested that in the later model automobiles the siren be mounted / between the radiator and the grill; that when . mounted under the hood as in the older models, the air blasts from the fan tends to greatly neutralize the effect of the siren and prevent its being heard by the traffic ahead; and that . when mounted immediately behind the grill, the siren cannot be seen and there is no resistence. and thus the siren's blast can be heard a much greater distance ahead of the Bureau automobile.

The Conference was advised that the construction of the radiator shell of the new Ford automobiles which have recently been purchased is such that the siren mounted between the grill and radiator could be easily detected by a service station attendant upon raising the hood of the car for servicing purposes.

The Conference was also advised by Mr. Glavin that in mounting the siren between the grill and the radiator, we would undoubtedly have considerable repair bills for sirens inesmuch as in most of our automobile accidents the radiator grill is demaged which in turn, of course, would damage the siren.

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The Executive Conference, Mesers. Tolson, Glavin, Nathan, Nichols, Ladd, Quinn Tamm and Clegg being present, considered the suggestions set forth in the report of the clerical conference of the St. Louis Office.

The following suggestions were made by Stenographer A. J. Miceki

(1) That in connection with unsolved bank burglary cases in the St. Louis Division when an acetylene torch is used, it was suggested that arrangements be made with the Missouri State Penitentiary whereby that institution would advise the St. Louis Office of the former immates who engaged in work requiring the use of an acetylene torch while in the Missouri State Penitentiary.

The Conference felt that this was an investigative lead which could be followed as circumstances warranted and to require it as a routine procedure would not be desirable in many instances.

(2) It was recommended that the Bureau fix a definite time of departure for Special Agents under transfer, that is, the amount of time which an Agent could remain in a district after he had been ordered a transfer. Those who were complying promptly were losing the services of personnel and those who were more dilatory were taking advantage of the Bureau in this connection.

The Conference felt that the present instructions that the transfer be undertaken with due consideration given to the pending public business in the office, was the best that could be done and that no arbitrary rule could be adopted as subpoenas, pending cases and other exigencies would likely prevent compliance with any arbitrary rule.

(3) It was suggested that the rule requiring the restatement of undeveloped leads be abolished. Many offices, it was pointed out, receive the leads and use the asterisk on repeated leads even though they are not thirty days old.

Adm 5862 Mr. Nathan and Mr. Olavin concurred with this recommendation.

Pero Field the other members of the Conference recommended that the repetition

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of leads be continued as at present which merely requires that they be restated in any report written thirty days after the leads are previously set forth when the leads are still pending. Mr. Nathan and Mr. Glavin are still opposed to the restatement of undeveloped leads of this type.

In the event the above recommendations are approved, the St. Louis Office is being advised accordingly.

He pointed out that under our present filing system, suggestions are filed by subject matter; that is, each separate suggestion is placed in a file according to the subject matter of that particular suggestion. The letter which is sent to each employee in June of every years requests that employees submit each suggestion on a separate sheet of paper accompanied by a cover letter. Mr. Carr suggests that in order to place each suggestion in the appropriate file, it is suggested that the next letter which is sent to employees concerning this matter that the interested employees should forward one copy of the cover letter for each suggestion accompanying it. He points out that this would eliminate considerable copy work in the Files Section, especially during the month of June when these suggestions are submitted.

Mr. Patterson states that this would essist the Files Section quite a bit.

The Conference is opposed to the adoption of this me. Tolson suggestion, it being believed that further clerical work of the Nation this type should not be placed on the field at this time.

Term, Nichols and Glavin was advised by Mr. Clavin that it has been found necessary to request that a ventilating unit be installed in the film woult in the attic of this building. He pointed out that Mr. Renneberger stated that this unit was needed to improve conditions in the yault as it had been necessary in the past to destroy film on account of the heat. The Conference was advised that Mr. Remeberger is of the opinion that approximately \$1,000 worth of photographic paper and film (unused) has been rendered unusable due to the faulty conditions of the vault. It is not pos-sible to place a force fan in the vault due to the fact that sufficient air is not available in the vault itself.

This matter was discussed with Mr. Van Lear, the building superintendent, who advised that the installation of the dir conditioning unit in the vault topped on to the air conditioning unit in the building would cost approximately \$250 to \$300.

The Conference is of the unanimous opinion that this air conditioning unit should be installed in the vault in view of the fact that there is a considerable wastage of film at the present time and since all of the film in the wault is not safety film, the possibility of damage through spontaneous combustion or explosion would be entirely obviated.

Mr. Lester stated that during his recent appearances before law and accounting schools in the East, while interviewing potential applicants at these schools, it developed that many of the law and accounting school seniors claimed to be proficient in reading and speaking various foreign languages. He suggests that these schools and possibly other achools in the East would be a fertile source for interpreters needed by the Bureau. Mr. Lester points out that he does not mean that these potential applicants claimed to know foreign languages "from the book," but they were of particular foreign extractions and had talked and read their parents, native language all of their lives.

Mr. Lester was of the opinion that if such employees could be secured, they would be much better qualified than the old-time interpreter sometimes found hanging around courthques and immigration bureous looking for this type of work.

The Conference does not see the necessity of securing such eligibles at the present time. A sufficient number of interpreters are available at this time as needed by the Bureau, and no purpose would be served in gathering a group of eligibles for future consideration.

Should the Director approve the recommendation of the Conference in this matter, Mr. Lester will be appropriately advised.

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The Conference, consisting of Mesers. Tolson, Mathem, E. A. Temm, Ladd, Rosen, G. Temm, Nichols and Clavin considered a suggestion made by Mr. R. A. Harrison, clerk, Chief Clerk's Office contained in a memorandum to Mr. Glavin dated March 7, 1940, wherein he suggests that the Bureau consider combining two or more apprehension orders on one card instead of having individual cards for each order.

Mr. Herrison stated that he is comizent of the fact that the distribution of such orders is to be as speedily performed as pou sible and that the above auggestion would not be applicable in instances where such procedure rould delay the spreading of information of an apprehension for any material time. He states, however, that due to his experience in the field, on numerous occasions he has received two or more such apprehension orders malled to the field divisions at the same time, both of which are naturally mailed to the same individuals and inaspuch as each order in on an individual card, it takes trice the necessary amount of time to put out lottly of these orders. He points out that the distribution of an arpreliention order in the average office necessitates at least one hour or one and a half hours of one employed a time to complete the addressing and packing of these orders and in view of the fact that there are a considerable number of these orders buing distributed at all times, the combining of two or more apprehension orders would be miquestionely a time savor.

In addition,, he points out that it would, also, save materially supplies, such as cartons, paper, ink and the time of the LAT employees in the Mechanical Section of the Bureau.

Ne suggests that a time Limit be set by the fugitive superth Core visor relative to the iscuance of such orders and careful supervision
as Governof the iscuance thereof be maintained.

The Conference is opposed to the adoption of this suggesting, it pointing out that these orders as presently prepared are filled in the regular identification order files not only by Bureau field offices, but, also, by police departments and that the inclusion of more than one apprehension order on one card would result in contact, confusion in the proper filing of such apprehension orders.

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The Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, D. A. Tamm, Ledd, Rosen, Q. Tamm, Nichola and Cinvin considered two memorands addressed to Mr. Clevin, Chief Clerk, by Special Agent Francis X. Jahn and Special Agent P. G. Vinley. These Agents had requested information as to whether they could secure per diem charges of \$5.00 a day for their stay in Machington covering the retraining period, both of these Agents staying with relatives during the bime they were in Washington.

In the case of Special Agent Jahn, in which he states in his memorandum to the Chief Clerk that it was his understanding on coming to Washington on January 31, 1940, that he could either register at a local hotel and claim per diem, or stay with his folks and claim per diem, provided that in the latter instance he paid for his room. Agent Jahn stayed at his home, paying his mother \$1,00 a day for the room. He states that it costs approximately \$1.00 a day for transportation to and from the Bureau and that it was necessary that he had the same daily expense for meals downtown that all retainess had with the exception that he usually had a light breakfast at home and had no other meals in Washington for which he did not pay for the same at a restaurant.

He points out that he has been under heavy expense in the recent past and would appreciate information as to whether it would be possible for him to claim per diem while in Washington.

Special Agent Finley states that his legal residence is Wachington, D. C. and in the past when in Washington on official business, he has stayed with his parents and has not attempted to obtain any nor diem; however, during his recent retraining at Washington, he was unable to reside with his parents and he, therefore, rented a room with his nother-in-law and has been staying there.

We do noted that his expenses have continued in Philadelphia, his official headquarters, and he would appreciate receiving information as we obtained by him in this matter.

The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, E.A. Tamm, Nathan, Nichols, Rosen, Quinn Tamm, and Glavin considered a suggestion made by Mr. Robert F. Cartwright, of the Personnel Files Section, to Mr. O. H. Patterson under date of February 27, 1940.

Mr. Cartwright states that it has been suggested to him by Mr. Joseph Allen, of the Personnel Files Section, that the personal status sheets and avocation sheets of Bureau employees which are filed in front of the in-service Tiles beneath the cover sheets, be destroyed when replaced with up-to-date personal status and avocation sheets. Samples of these sheets are attached hereto! Mr. Patterson comments that it it is possible to destroy the obsolete sheets, it will save a tremendous amount of work, providing it is consistent with Bureau policy...

Under present regulations, these reports are not recorded, and it has been the practice to file them in approximate date order when new forms are received from employees at the Seet of Government on January 1 and from field. employees on September 1.

Messrs. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Nichols, Rosen, and Quinn Tamm are oppos to the destruction of these records due to the fact that it is possible that they might be advantageously utilized at some future date, even though a more up-to-date record is maintained in the file. Mr. Tolson pointed out that it is cossible that the Bureau might wish to check back on avocations listed by Agents for a period of time and that the avocations would be listed only on obsolete avocation forms. Mr. Nathan recommends that the avocation records be destroyed and that the personal status records be maintained. Mr. Glavin is of the opinion that no real purpose would be served by retaining these obsolete forms in the personnel files. He pointed out that when the new forms are secured, it is necessary to break a file so that the old form can be filed in chronological order and that if this step could be eliminated, considerable time would be saved in the personnel Tiles section, he pointing out that in stripping some 2,500 personnel files, the personnel of the Bureau at the present time, considerable men power is used.

Should the Director approve the majority recommendation in this matter, the Files Section will be appropriately notified.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Conference consisting of Messrs. E. A. Tamm, Nathan, Ladd, Q. Tamm, Nichols, Rosen, Hince and Glavin considered a memorandum submitted for the attention of Mr. Tolson by Mr. Laughlin dated Februery 20, 1940, concerning a light survey whichwas made on the seventh floor and first floor space occupied by the Bureau. The report as submitted is attached hereto.

Briefly, it has been found that on the Ninth Street side of the Technical Section there was a reading of twenty foot candles; on the Constitution Avenue side of the Technical Section readings varied from eight foot candles to twelve foot candles. In the student alcove on the seventh floor readings were varied from seven to ten foot candles. In the fingerprint training school readings varied from six to eleven foot candles. In the older section of the Assembly Files readings were ten foot candles. In the newer part of the Assembly Files readings. averaged eight foot candles. In the Assembly Checkers' room six to eleven foot candles; in the Mail Room five foot candles. However, it is noted in this room the work is done largely on tables and desk lamps have been installed for the use of the employees. In the Typing Section five to ten foot candles. It is not possible to use indirect lighting fixtures in the Typing Section due to the coiling being acoustically treated and the obsorption from an indirect fixture would be so great. that its efficienty would be tremendously cut down.

The space on the first floor occupied by Document Examiners and the Single Fingerprint Unit was checked and found to vary from seven to thirteen foot candles. Indirect lighting has been installed in this room with the exception of six fixtures and these six fixtures will be replaced by indirect fixtures in the very near future. All of these readings were taken at hight by a representative of the Chief Clerk's Office, the Identification Division, the building superintendent and the chief electrician.

The building superintendent and chief electrician agreed that about once every two weeks two employees of the Department would be assigned to night duty and would spend their entire time going through the various sections on the seventh floor and spotting those lights which were not functioning efficiently and replace the bulbs.

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COPY: JA Memorandum for the Director March 1, 1940 that it may be entirely possible that florescent lights would be the Answer to our problem. It was pointed out that the Public Buildings Administration had requested \$120,000 from the Bureau of the Budget in connection with the installing of indirect fixtures throughtout the Department of Justice Building and the estimate had been turned down in toto By the Budget Bureau and no specific appropriation was made to remedy the lighting conditions here. Additional loads cannot be placed on the present electrical equipment. They, therefore, recommend that a sample installation of florescent lights be installed to ascertain whether this type of light would be satisfactory. It is understood that by florescent lighting thirty foot candles of light could be secured in the Technical Section without difficulty. The Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, C. Tamm, Nichols and Glavin considered a memorandum submitted to Mr. Ladd by Mr. Coffey on March 14, 1940, wherein Mr. Coffey recommends that 644 visible index cabinets be secured for the proper filing of the Laboratory's anonymous letters. Teh Conference was advised that six cabinets of the 6x4 size costing a total of \$795.50 and a table costing \$40.00 would be necessary. Mr. Coffey pointed out that if the above mentioned cabinets are approved, they will give a total capacity of 8,844 cards which will be sufficient for including all of the present anonymous letter file, the espionage file, and will allow a sufficient amount for future expansion for some time.

The Executives Conference, on March 7th, consisting of Messrs. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Quinn Tamm, Ladd, Nichols, Rosen, Glavin and Nathan, considered the question as to whether any theoretical instruction in wire tap ing should be given to National Police Academy students, et cetera.

The Conference was informed of a memorandum received from Mr. Coffey to the effect that at the present time, in connection with the NPA; about thirty minutes of a general sound equipment schedule is devoted to a theoretical discussion of wire tapping, which includes, when time permits, a demonstration of a terminal board, and the students are shown the lineman's instructions which are usually used in wire tapping. They, of course; cannot in this time learn how to tap wires themselves, the real value of the instruction being an appreciation of the fact that wires can be tapped by criminals, as for instance in race horse swindles, and a demonstration of how the tap is effected:

The Conference unanimously decided to eliminate this instruction to NPA students and also to eliminate this instruction to new Agents and re-trainees. If and when it becomes necessary to afford this theoretical instruction, it will be given to the members of specially selected groups of Agents brought in for general sound equipment instruction.

The Conference considered two communications received from Charles G. Carr, Files Section, concerning the preparation of collect telegrams on yellow Department of Justice telegram forms. Mr. Carr pointed out that through the use of both the yellow and green forms, there is a possibility of the yellow forms at times becoming attached to the yellow of the outgoing correspondence and being overlooked by the mail clerks and not being sent. This has happened in the past. He suggests that all telegrams whether they be collect or hald be prepared on the regulation green telegram form which also includes a place thereon for a notation as to how the telegram was sent and at what time and by whom. Samples of both forms are abtached hereto.

The Conference consisting of Messrs. E. A. Tamm, Nathan, Ladd, C. Tamm, Nichols, Rosen, Hince and Glavin is of the opinion that the suggestion is a desirable one and recommends that in the future all telegrams sent by the Bursau at the seat of government be prepared on the regulation green telegram form and that the yellow blank be not used in the future.

Subject to the Director's approval, there is attached hereto a suggested memorandum to all supervisory officials at the seat of government instructing that this procedure be followed in the future, and a communication to Mr. Carr thanking him for his suggestion.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Hince, Nichols, Rosen, Quinn Tamm, and Glavin, considered a suggestion submitted by Special Agent J. F. Buckley, Supervisor in the Identification Division, concerning a change in the method of rating the reading room employees of the Typing Section.

Mr. Buckley suggests that, in addition to besing a relative rating and record upon the number of criminal records proofread by the readers, the readers also be given credit for the number of errors which they detect in the criminal records.

The Conference was advised that this would tend to make the work of the readers more accurate and would tend to assure the Bureau that all copies of criminal records emanating from the Identification Division are correct at the time that are placed in the mail and do not have typographical errors.

The Conference, with the exception of Mr. Glavin. recommends the adoption of the suggestion and recommends that the Identification Division be instructed to institute a scoring system for readers whereby they would be given credit for the number of errors detected. Mr. Glavin does not feel that such a reading system would be justified for the reason that he is of the opinion that a good reader does not necessarily have to be one who will detect the most errors in the mail read by him. He believes that if such a system were instituted wherein errors detected would be included in the rating system, the Bureau would be treading on dangerous ground inasmuch as at times certain of the readers would not handle mail reflecting errors and their production would be just as good as those detecting errors in the mail; yet, the one who detected the most errors, who may not be any better than the one whose mail did not contain errors, would be rated above the other.

At greeting of the Executive Conference on May 27, 1940, attended by Messre. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tama, Nichole, Glavin, Quinn Tamm and Lade, the question of filing the alien registration fingerprint cards was brought up by Mr. Ladd.

It was pointed out to the Conference that the first group of these registration cards had been received from the State of Georgia, where the Governory had recently ordered all aliens fingerprinted, and it was suggested that a uniform policy should be established with reference to the filling of these prints at this time in order that the alien prints would not be lost through being mixed in the general files.

The Conference was of the unanimous opinion that the alien fingerprint cards to be of any value should be filed in the criminal files in order that any subsequent arrest of that alien would be called to the Bureau a attention. In connection therewith, it was pointed out that the legislation fending before Congress requiring the registration and fingerprinting of all aliens carries a provision to the effect that the fingerprintiperds/sogenhaitted shall be maintained in a separate alien file. In confection therewith, it was the unanimous opinion of the Conference that a memorandum should be directed to the Attorney General pointing out to him that in the event the Department approved the pending legislation with reference to the fingerprinting of aliens, that the Department should suggest the elimination of the phrase from the bill which would require the maintenance of these cards in a separate file, inasmuch as to so maintain them would defeat their purpose in that future arrests would not be caught. In the event you approve of this recommendation, there is attached hereto a memorandum to the Attorney General.

In order that the allen cards will not be lost when placed in the criminal files, it is the recommendation of Wessrs. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tanm and Ledd that the regular index card be prepared and placed in the Original Files in alphabetical order and that a second index card marked as an alien card and maintained in an Alien Card Index Section in alphabetical order be prepared, said card to contain among other things the mationality of the individual represented thereby, this recommendation being mede in order that it would be possible, should the occasion erise. to have impediately available a list of all alien registrations.

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Inasmuch as a handmade flag costs \$287.50, an appliqued flag costs from \$24 to \$44, and a machine embroidered flag costs approximately \$100, contact was made with Mr. A. E. DuBois of the Quartermaster-General's Office of the War Department, he being in charge of the heraldry section which draws flags for the various military sections. DuBois was the contact man through whom the Attorney General's flag was drawn up and purchased some years past. The Conference was advised that DuBois stated that our original sketch with the bar going from the lower left to the top right ran in the wrong direction and designated, instead of loyalty, disloyalty. He also suggested that the letters "FBI" be not included. He advised, however, that the general scheme of the flag and the meanings contained in the coat of arms were very well made up for this organization. He recommended two alternate flags, both of which are attached hereto, labeled 2 and 3. Our original sketch is attached hereto labeled 1.

DuBois further stated that a handmade flag should be purchased if any flag is to be purchased at all. He stated that an appliqued flag, which is one on which they sew the designs and do not embroider them in, would be a very cheap appearing flag and if shown in connection with an American flag would present a very poor appearance. DuBois pointed out that a good handmade flag would cost approximately \$300. This is borne out by the bids received, indicating that such flags would cost \$287.50 each.

The Conference does not believe, inasmuch as these flags would cost approximately \$300 each at this time, there being four flags ordered, that any such flags should be purchased now and the order should be held in abeyence until a more propitious time.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Mr. Tolson, Mr. Nathan, Mr. E. A. Tann, Mr. Clegg, Mr. Ladd, Mr. Foxworth, Mr. Michols, Mr. Rosen, Mr. Quinn Tamm, Mr. Tracy and Mr. Ulavin, considered the suggestion made by Mr. Mossburg that a minimum of six days be set for the arranging of interviews for clerical applicants. He points out that it would be bene-Ticial to both the Applicant Office and Personnel Files Section inasmuch as the file then sould be in an up to date condition in the Personnel Files Section and no loss of time would be experienced in securing the file up to date for the Interviewing Official who wishes to dictate the results of an interview.

The Conference has carefully considered this matter and is opposed to the adoption of such at this time. It was pointed out to the Conference that at the present time the Chief Clerk's Office is endeavoring to the best of its ability to have all applications numbered at the earliest date so that appropriate tests and interviews can be given and qualified individuals can be secured for appointment at an early date. With a further period of time between interview dates, with the number of applications presently coming into the Bureau, it is believed that there will be considerable loss of time in securing qualified applicants. 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The Executive Conference, Messrs Tolson, Glavin, E. A. Tamm, Q. Tamm, Nichols, Ladd and Hince being present, considered the attached work sheet for a training course for newly appointed Special Agents to cover a period of six weeks. This work sheet is a day by day work sheet which shows the subjects which will be handled on each day, the time period for each subject and the grouping of the subject matter.

The grouping of the subject matter is shown inasmuch as this was arranged so that a minimum number of instructors would be at Quantico on each date. On most of the days only one instructor need go to Quantico inasmuch as subject matter has been arranged so that when an instructor goes to Quantico he may complete his subjects before returning to Washington. On many of the days it will be necessary to have two instructors, one for the morning sessions and another for the afternoon or evening sessions. The Conference approved the general principle of limiting insofar as possible the appearance of an instructor so that an instructor would not appear for less than one-helf day of instruction.

It will be observed that the attached work sheet provides for eight days' continuous firearms training. The Conference realized that better training could be afforded at Quantico if firearms training could be given a few hours each day rather than full time for eight consecutive days. However, for the present, in view of the limited Tange facilities and the fact that spreading out the firearms training would require the continuous presence of the firearms instructors, it would be better to concentrate the firearms training until such time as additional classes are at Quantico and range facilities available continuously. The Conference recommended that in the appointment letter sent to those to whom an appointment as Special Agent is extended, there should be a clear statement that the training will in all probability be held at the FBI training center, Quantico, Virginia. It was recommended that this statement be included so that men coming to Washington might be apprised of the fact that they may be required to live out of the city of Washington and will, therefore, not make arrangements for monthly rental, etc., on their arrival in Washington. 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At a meeting of the Executive Conference on June 5, 1940, Messro. E. A. Tama, Ladd, Glavin, Nichole, Rosen, Rince, and Quinn Temm being present, consideration was given to a suggestion submitted in a letter from the Special agent in Charge of the Pittsburgh Field Division dated May 31, 1940. Reference letter advised that an undertaker in the city of Pittsburgh, who was also on the faculty of the School of Anatomy of the University of Pittsburgh, suggested that the Bureau might desire to recalive the fingerprints of approximately 1,500 deceased persons who die in hospitals and whose bodies are unclaimed either because relatives are not known or because they live too far distant or because the relatives do not have the means of burying the deceased.

It was suggested that the fingerprinting and searching of the fingerprints would be a means of definitely identifying such deceased individuals and that the possibility exists that fugitives might be located through this means. It is further noted the undertaker is interested from the standpoint of having a search made of all Government files on the possibility that the deceased might be war veterane and, as such, entitled to proper burial.

The Conference, with the exception of Messrs. Ledd and Glavin, was opposed to the adoption of the suggestion. It was pointed out that a great number of the deceased individuals are not unknown; that the searching of these decoased prints would necessitate a great deal of work not only in the Bureau, inasmich as the proper handling of the prints would entail searches in the Army, Mavy, and Marine Corps files. The Conference does not feel that the work necessary would be justified. 

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

At a meeting of the Executive Conference on June 8, 1940, which was attended by Messrs, Tolson, Nathan, Clegg, E. A. Tann, Clavin, Michole, Rosen, Quinn Tann and Ladd, the request of the Identification Division for the attached supplies and equipment was considered and unanimously approved, these supplies and equipment being ordered in anticipation of the receipt of between three and one-half and four million alien fingerprint cards.

With reference to the purchase of the four drawer fingerprint cabinets, this was approved after a sub-committee, composed of Mesers. Tolson, Clegg and Rosen, viewed both the three and four drawer finger wint cabinets in the Identification Division, and on their recommendation four drawer cabinets are being ordered primarily in order to save space, and these cabinets will be used on the Government file and other files where searches are not necessary, insunch as they are rather high for the men to use the top for classifying and searching. With the 175 four drawer fingerprint cabinets, which it is suggested be ordered, at this time for use in the Government File, together with the 157 three drawer cabinets which are already on order, it is believed there will be sufficient cabinet space in the Identification Division to handle the estimated three and one-half to four million alien fingerprints and about two years normal expansion.

The Conference also considered various colors of index cards to be used in maintaining the meparate alien index and it was decided to make use of a canary yellow card for the alien index card.

Reference is made to the memorandum of Mr. Gurnea dated June 5, 1940, advising that the blds were open on that date for the construction of the range at Quantico.

Nr. Garnes advised that there will be an inspection fee of approximately \$1,500 which added to the bid totals \$97,800. As the bidder, W. C. Spratt, will allow \$14,000 for the deduction of item \$2 (the grading at the end of the range for future expansion). Mr. Gurnes suggested that Commander Needham be instructed to delete this item from the specifications. This would bring the total cost down to \$83,800 leaving a balance of \$4,200 as an emergency fund during construction and still provide all the facilities for present uses. Commander Needham can apply the excess funds as on a continuing project and protect it for us to be spent as we may direct at any time during the construction.

It was therefore suggested that Commander Needham be instructed to award the contract in this manner and that Mr. Glavin be instructed to transfer the \$5,000 being held by this Bureau to the Navy Department.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. LADD

Ret Searching and Filing of Ammunition Specimens from all Guns.

The attached letter from the Miami Division indicates that the City of Fort Lauderdale by ordinance is requiring the registration of all firearms and is taking a test bullet from each gun so registered. The Identification Officer of the Police Department offers to send such test bullets to the Bureau's Laboratory for inclusion in its file.

This presents an interesting question of policy.
For a number of years various citizens have made suggestions that test bullets from all firearms be so registered. The Bureau has consistently replied to such suggestions that a large registration system of this kind is impractical for two reasons; first, the gum barrel changes from time to time due to wear, and second, it is not possible to classify the markings of such a huge collection of bullets. Perhaps the City Ordinance in Fort Lauderdale is the beginning of official recognition of this movement which in my opinion is a fallery.

I suggest that the Bureau at this time again consider its policy and stand in respect to this movement. My recommendation is that the Bureau take no part in any attempt to register the microscopic markings of test bullets fired from all guns for registration purposes.

Mr. Q. Tamm further advised he had been informed that the War Department has approximately 5,000 fingerprint cards of German alien enemies who were interned during the last war, that he believed this might be of interest to Division V and that some steps might be taken to obtain these 5,000 fingerprint cards, or copies of them, for the Bureau's records.

The Executives Conference, consisting of Messrs. Forwarth, Ladd, Clegg, Rosen, Michols, E. A. Taum, Tracy and Nathan, considered the present progress of firearss training for special agents and spervisors. Under the present system each agent is required to qualify at least twice each year with each weapon except the pistol, and is. required to qualify four times with the pistol. During the course of the year each agent is given an opportunity, according to the pre-arranged program, to fire each gun a minimum of three times, and an opportunity to fire the pistol a minimum of five times.

At present the training division is under instructions to follow up regularly any failure on the part of any agent to take the regular, scheduled firearms training. This is being done by notifying the field office that the agent is reported as having failed to take the training for a particular south and further advising that he should take occasion to make up this training.

As it was originally planned, it was recognized that agents would miss certain sessions of firearms training because of subpoenss. illness, vacation, or other emergencies. Therefore, the requirement that each agent qualify twice with each weapon except the pistol and four times with the pistol was placed in effect as the minimum requiredment.

It is the recommendation of the conference that the minimum requirements still be maintained, but that the training division berelieved of the present instruction to insist that any period missed 35 10 1131 by an agent be made up, the Bureau being content with the minimum, qualification of each agent without requiring that make up periods be engaged in. If any agent fails to qualify the required number of times during the course of the year, then administrative action will be taken consistent with each particular case.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Clegg, Ladd, Quinn Tamm, Nichols, Rosen, and Glavin considered the desirability of opening an office at Houston, Texas, to include the Galveston and Houston divisions of the southern judicial district of Texas presently assigned to the San Antonio Office and the Beaumont division of the eastern district of Texas presently assigned to the Dallas Office.

There is attached hereto for the Director's information a map of the State of Texas showing the divisions of the present offices; blue for Dallas, red for San Antonio, yellow for El Paso, with the proposed Houston district superimposed thereon. A survey was made of the condition of work in the Texas territories at this time. It was found that:

There are pending in the San Antonio Field Division 724 cases, necessitating 1,087 days' work to complete.

There are pending in the Dallas Field Division 493 cases, necessitating 866 days' work to complete.

CASES WHICH WOULD BE ASSIGNED TO THE PROPOSED HOUSTON OFFICE

The Galveston and Houston divisions of the southern judicial district of Texas have pending at the present time 285 cases, necessitating 428 days' work to complete. The Beaumont division of the eastern judicial district of Texas has pending 58 cases, requiring 95 days' work to complete. The Houston office, therefore, would have 343 pending cases, requiring 533 days' work to complete.

The Conference further considered the possibility of including in the proposed Houston division the western judicial district of Louisiana which at the present time has 163 cases pending, requiring

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200 days' work to complete. The Conference is of the opinion that it would be undesirable to include the western district of Louisiana in the proposed Houston division in view of the fact that work in the State of Louisiana as well as commercial transportation and all other activities center towards New Orleans.

The Conference is of the opinion that there is a sufficient amount of work in the proposed Houston territory to justify the opening of an additional office there. It is pointed out that in opening such an office the judicial district would be split and during attendance at court there is a possibility of more Agents of the San Antonio Office as well as of the Houston Office being present in the southern judicial district, and Agents of the Dallas office and the Houston office being present in the eastern judicial district.

The Conference believes that the need for an office at Houston at this time, due to the amount of work pending there and the growth of the city of Houston from the point of importance more than justifies this division of judicial districts and recommends to the Director that the Houston division be approved and that space be secured in that city at the earliest possible date for the opening of the office.

Transportation facilities through the proposed territory are as atisfactory from Houston as from San Antonio or Dallas, and in both instances Houston will be more centrally located than are the present field offices to the large cities of Galveston, Houston, Beaumont, and Port Arthur.

The Executives Conference, consisting of Mesers. Tolson, Rosen, Ledd, Clegg, Nichols, Foxworth, E. A. Tamm, Glavin and Mathan, considered the suggestion of SAG Andersen of the Oklahoma City Field Office contained in his letter of June 18th. SAG Andersen advised, in view of the fact that the Oklahoma City Office holds its firearms training at Fort Sills, Oklahoma (over 100 miles from headquarters) and it is necessary to transport ammunition and equipment in regular automobiles, that a station wagon would be desirable for use by the Oklahoma City Office. SAG Andersen also indicated that he believed an automobile of that type could be used to advantage in the oil fields on extortion cases.

The Executives Conference was unanimously of the opinion that it would be a needless expendature of money to buy a station wagon for the purposes in question. It was pointed out that the purchase of such an automobile for Oklahoma City would probably mean the purpose of similar station wagons for other offices, and it was not felt an automobile of this kind would fill any definite need.

The Executive Conference, Mesers. Tolson, Glavin, E. A. Tarm, Nathan, Forworth, Quinn Tarm, Nichole, Ladd, and Clegg being present, considered suggestions of Special Agent J. P. MacFarland with reference to the Bureau's national defense program.

- I. We MacParland suggested that logislation barring allers from holding office in political organizations having their roots in foreign countries might be an effective way to deal with Fifth Column activities. The Conference agreed that this was a matter of legislation which might be communicated to the Department.
- 2. Mr. MacParlant suggested that major telegraph and radio agonales make available to the Bureau sessages transmitted through them during the present emergency. The Conference did not believe that any action along this line should be taken because, when any particular message is desired, an effort should be made to obtain the particular message involved.
- 3. It was recommended that an effort be made to determine the identity of all parsons who, during the past five years, have purchased powerful radio transmitting and receiving equipment. The Conference doubted the advisability of this because there are more than 55,000 licensed whort-wave radio operators in the United States, most of whom have their own stations, and by short wave, regardless of the power involved, it is possible, in most instances, to communicate with foreign countries. This suggestion does not seem to establish a workable policy, and it was recommended unfavorably.
- A. It was suggested that an effort be made to determine the identity and location of purchasers of medium-sized printing presses which might be used for propagands purposes. The Conference likewise believed that there were thousands of printing presses of various sizes throughout the United States, and that the best direction of sativities would be to investigate each propagands agoncy when it appears to be serving as an agent for a foreign principal, in the event the Registration Act is violated.
- 5. Inquiry was made as to whother the Army and Navy would permit the Sureau to establish informants within the ranks of the Army and Navy to determine whether radical groups were infiltrating

these services. In view of the division of work between ONI, G-2, and the FBI, this type of activity, except on specific requests, is within the jurisdiction of the Intelligence Services of the Military branches.

If this is approved, Wr. MacFarland is being advised to this effect, and a memorandum is being addressed to the Department with reference to legislation barring aliens from holding office in political organizations.

Mr. McMillian states that it has been the experience of the Agents of the Dallas Office that the Bell System Toll Credit Cards have been very helpful.

For the information of the Director, certain of the field offices have secured the Bell System Toll Credit Cards during this calendar year and previous calendar years. The purpose of the Credit Cards is so that Agents making long distance telephone calls from the field will not have to pay the charges in cash but will, upon identification and presentation of their Toll Credit Cards, be permitted to have the call charged to the field office telephone. The Executive Conference some time ago considered this matter and reported that inasmuch as some difficulty had been experienced in having the Toll Credit Cards honored on certain occasions that no consideration be given to the continuance of these cards after the present calendar year.

The Conference, however, in view of the fact that these cards have been of particular benefit to the field service, has no objection to their continued use in the future subject to the Director's approval.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Quinn Tamm, Nichols, Rosen, Clegg and Glavin, considered the suggestion of Stenographer Marjorie Saunders that the Bureau devise some means whereby electrically operated typerwriters could be secured for field offices; that they would increase the output of the field office materially with considerably less effort than is now expended.

Tamm, Ladd, Quinn Tamm, Nichols, Rosen, Clegg and Glavin, considered the suggestion of Stenographer Mattye Havens that when photographs of suspects, subjects, etc. are received at field offices they need not be indicated on index cards by the stamped word "photograph". This employee points out that when the photographs of subjects, suspects, victims, etc. are received in field offices at present the word "photograph" must be stamped on the index cards. She points out the unusual amount of time consumed in this duty, particularly when it is necessary to withdraw index cards on the names and aliases of individuals. She points out that she does not know of a single instance where this procedure has assisted in the administration of the Dallas Office in any manner whatever.

The Conference is in agreement with Miss Havens and recommends that the present Bureau regulations concerning the stamping of the word "photograph" on index cards be eliminated.

For the information of the Director, this procedure was established several years ago so that it could be definitely determined from a review of the index card whether a photograph had been received on a certain subject. "Section 79 of the Manual of Rules and Regulations is being changed to read as follows:

(79) CONFIDENTIAL COMMUNICATIONS.— Confidential communications to the Director shall be so marked, both on the communication and the envelope. The Bureau desires to receive from its individual employees constructive criticisms and suggestions concerning its work and policies. Such letters also may be forwarded under confidential cover.

Letters addressed to the Special Agent in Charge by name and jmarked "Confidential" should be opened only by the Special Agent in Charge. Letters addressed to a field office or Special Agents in Charge mariked "Personal Attention" may be opened by the Acting Special Agent in Charge but may not be placed in a file until after they have been initialed by the Special Agent in Charge.

In Section 50 of the Manual of Rules and Regulations where it is indicated that the names and addresses of confidential informants referred to in investigative reports shall be transmitted to the Bureau by letter under "Personal and Confidential" cover, it is desired that this Section be amended to show that such communications shall be sent under "Confidential" cover.

Any other references to personal and confidential communications in the Bureau's Manuals or Bulletins are hereby changed in order to indicate such communications, relating to official matters shall be marked "Confidential".

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, E.A. Tamm, Ladd, QuinnTamm, Nichols, Rosen, and Glavin, considered the desirability of opening an office at either a Connecticut or a Rhode Island city.

At the present time there are 207 cases pending in the State of Connecticut, necessitating 675 days work to complete. If these cases are removed from the number of cases pending in the New York Office, the New York Office will then have 1,329 cases pending necessitating 4,742 days to complete. The State of Rhode Island, under the jurisdiction of the Boston Office, has 95 cases pending, necessitating 149 days to complete. Should these cases be taken from the Boston Office, that office would then have remaining 749 wases totaling 1,505 days ato complete.

The proposed additional New England Office would then have 302 pendings cases for the State of Connecticut and Rhode Idland, necessitating 824 days work to complete.

The Conference is of the opinion that an effort should be made to establish an office at New Haven, Connecticut. From the attached mapait will be seen that New Haven is on the southern coast of Connecticut on Long. Island Sound. The Conference points out that it is on the direct rail route from New York City to Boston, going through Providence, and the Conference is of the opinion that New Heven is the best losted city for an office in the States of Connecticut and Rhode Island. It recommends that in the event office of space cannot be secured at New Haven, the city of Hartford be considered. It will be noted that Hartford is very centrally located grographically in this proposed territory.

In the event it is not possible to locate in either New Haven or Hartford, it is suggested that the City of Providence be considered.

At the present time, the U.S. Attorney and two assistants are located at Harfford, Connecticut, one assistant to the U.S. Attorney at New Haven, Connecticut, and the U.S. Mershal maintains his office at New Haven for the State of Connecticut. Providence is the headquarters for court officials in the STate of Rhode Island, that being the only city in Rhode Island in which Federal Court is, held.

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The Conference also, points out that condiderable difficulty was experienced last year when the Bureau was desirous of opening an office at one of the aforementioned New England cities. It was pointed out to the Conference that real estate men in those cities were hesitant. about executing a lease with the Government containing 30-day clauses and necessitating eleporate detention facilities. The Conference is of the opinion that we should not be too technical on our detention facilities at this time in the securing of space in the New England territory. Wenig states the Bureau has outlined a program of physical exercise to be taken by Agents of the Bureau three days each week in gymnasiums; that the same set of exercises has been set forth for newly appointed Agents 23 years of age and for Agents about to retire, at 61 years of age, and that this is inconsistent with the exercises needed for the physical requirements of various individuals.

The Conference was of the opinion that there was merit in this observation, and there is attached, for your approval, a letter to the field in this connection.

Agent Wenig also states that the heat in closed gymnasiums in the summer is oppressive, and he believes it would be more appropriate for these exercises to be taken in the open. He also believes it would be more beneficial to allow the agents to select the type of exercise they prefer—swimming, golf, tennis, et cetera.

The Conference was of the opinion that these suggestions would not be desirable. It is not believed that well equipped gyanasiums would constitute an undue herdship upon the igents, and the Conference is opposed to optional recreation exercise, feeling that these exercises should be of a definitely regular type in order to be of any value.

The Conference, consisting of Messrs. Q. Term, Ladd, Michols, Rosen, E. A. Taun, Clegg, Glavin, and Mathan, considered the suggestion of Virginia Cerrigin, a stenegrapher at Richmond, that the manual of rules and regulations furnished to clerks be revised to include only that infermation helpful to them and by which they are governed.

The Conference was of the opinion that this manual should be continued as at present and that it should continue to be a manual in which all the daties pertuining to, and all the duties of interest to, clerical employees should be specifically included. The Conference reclises that there are some elements in this manual which do not directly pertain to the work of all employees, but feels that the information in this manual is sufficiently inclusive as to be either of use or interest to these employees.

This employee further suggested the awarding of seme type of pin the recognition of service, probably to start at I years.

The Conference was of the opinion that although this suggestion had merit, it would not be practical. First, it would be necessary for the employees to buy their pins; second, it would be necessary to consider the investigative staff, in connection with which it is extremely doubtful whether any labeling, such as pins, would be desirable-manifestly at times it would be definitely undesirable; third, it would areate a distinction between never and elder employees that might be to the detriment of the interests of the never exployees. The mejerity of the Bureau's employees at the present time would come under the never category. The Conference felt that any procedure which would seem to render them in any manner inferior would be detrimental to the interests of the Bureau.

The Executives Conference, consisting of Messrs. Folson, Q. Tamm, Ladd, Rosen, Richols, Glavinand Nathan, considered the attached communication from S. P. Smith, Lieutenant in the Oklahoma Highway Patrol, in which he expresses a desire to become a Special Agent of the Bureau. Mr. Smith is a graduate of the Sth Session of the NPA. The communication was considered only in connection with the question of policy as to whether NPA graduates should be considered eligible for appointment as Special Agents.

Messrs, Tolson, Ladd, Q. Tamm, Nichols, Glavin, were of the opinion that NPA graudates should, in themselves, not be considered eligible. The primary reason for this viewpoint was that if one or a few were selected this action would create dissension, jealousy and resentment among other NPA graduates not so selected and would tend to mitigate and possibly break up the splendid feeling now existing among NPA graduates, particularly with regard to the Bureau.

Mr. Nathan was of the opinion that NPA graduates should not be appointed unless they are qualified attorneys or accountants and otherwise suitable material. He was very positively of the opinion, however, that NPA graduates should not be discriminated against, b.e., that if exceptions are made now or later to the ruling requiring law or accounting degrees, NPA graduates should be considered individually in the same manner as we would consider any other law enforcement officer.

Mr. Rosen was of the opinion that an NFA graduate who had the necessary qualifications and who had severed his connection with any law enforcement agency and was engaged in private practice, or otherwise, should be eligible for consideration.

Ret Talks before officials of plants on subject of plant protection

The Executive Conference, with Messra. Nathan, Tolson, Clegg, E. A. Tamm, Lada, Clavin, Nichols Q. Tamm and Rosen in attendance, recommended that such a conference plan be prepared with the following policies governing:

- (1) That the Bureau accept invitations from plant offictals or their representatives to address groups of plant executives in a general namer and necessarily in the abstract because
 the plants have not been surveyed, giving them advice as to how
 to focus their attention in the plants on problems which would
 reduce the likelihood of espionage or sabotage.
- (2) It is recommended that some degree of stimulation of these invitations should be undertaken. It should be done slowly, however, and the first two approved suggestions were that an oral contact be made with the secretary of the Manufacturers! Association and, second, that Mr. Tamm orally contact Major Sadler, liaison officer for the War and Many Joint Industrial Board, so that these two individuals through their contacts can let it be known that such services are available.
- (3) It was believed to be advisable that such meetings be held at the field offices headquarters cities, if possible, however, individual consideration should be given to each invitation as to the place it is to be held.
- (4) It was recommended that after a talk had been given on this subject that the meeting be held open for forum discussions and answers to questions which Bureau policy would permit answering. Un. Tamm and Mr. Clegg were instructed by the conference to prepare a suggested program, which is attached hereto for your approval.

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(5) The following employees of the Bureau were recommended favorably to handle this type of work, each individual invitation to be considered before making specific assignments. It is further understood that the supervisory staff in Vashington Itsted would only handle those assignments near Vashington which could be handled in the evening or with the minimum of perhaps one-half day's absence from their offices. The Executive Conference consisting of Mesers. Tolson, Nathan, Clegg, Ladd, Quinn Taum, Rosen, Nichols, and Glavin considered a suggestion made by Special Agent A. H. Belmont of the Chief Clerk's Office concerning volumes of the U. S. Postal Decisions.

It was pointed out to the Conference that at the present time volumes 1, 2, and 3 of the U. S. Postal Decisions are issued to Special Agent Accountants. It was further pointed out that volume 4 of these Decisions has recently been released, and due to the fact that it is not possible to secure the volume for each of the Special Agent Accountants that one volume be secured for each field office for reference purposes. Mr. Belmont is of the opinion that the same procedure could be followed with volumes 1, 2, and 3 in view of the fact that the Accountants having these volumes do not find them necessary for reference purposes unless mail fraud cases are being investigated. Mr. Belmont is of the opinion that a set of these volumes in each of the field offices would be sufficient and would cut down on the equipment not absolutely necessary assigned to the investigative personnel.

The Conference unanimously recommends that Mr. Belmont's suggestion be adopted and that a set of these volumes be included in each of the field offices and in the larger field offices where more mail fraud work is handled that several sets be available for reference purposes by Accountants. If the Director approves the recommendation of the Conference, appropriate instructions will be issued concerning this matter.

For the Director's information, the General Accounting Office has approved arrangements for Bureau Agents to be reimbursed at the rate of 5d a mile for personally-owned cars when used and it has been predetermined that their use is more economical or advantageous to the Government.

Mr. Glavin pointed out to the Conference that on numerous occasions expense accounts are being received at the Bureau from the field wherein reimburgement at the rate of 5% a mile is being claimed for the use of personally-owned automobiles. On a number of occasions the travel performed is of such limited duration and between such cities that it is not readily ascertainable without appropriate explanatory data as to why the rate of 5% a mile is being charged.

The Executive Conference constating of Mesars. Tolson, Nathan, Glavin, Rosen, Clegg, Forworth, Ladd and Michola considered the suggestion of Inspector Egan to the effect that an Agent be assigned in all Field Offices from 12 Midnight until 8 or 9 A. M.

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With reference to your recent memorandum concerning clerical employees now in the Bureau who possess accounting degrees and the matter of their qualification for appointment as Special Agents (A), please be advised that this matter has been discussed with Mr. Forworth and Mr. Pennington, and has been considered at the Executives Conference.

Two alternative suggestions were made as follows:

- 1 That elerical employees with these qualifications might be appointed as Special Employees Juntor Accountants at a salary lower than the Cof. 9 \$3200 per annum regular entrance for Special Agents.
- 2 That we revert to the rule which was established in June, 1938; namely, that clerical employees who began accountancy studies on or before March 1, 1939 will not be required to possess the three years of practical commercial accounting and auditing experience in order to be considered for appointment as Special Agent (A).

Mr. Tolson and Mr. Nichols recommend that we revert to the June, 1939, rule and permit clerical employees in the category indicated to make application for appointment as Special Agent. We feel that there is a certain moral obligation to consider these employees for the Special Agent (A) designation incomuch as they entered accounting school with the understanding at the time that an accounting degree would qualify them for consideration.

Mesers. E. A. Tamm, Rosen, Ladd, Quinn Tamm and Tracy recommend that employees in this category be appointed as Special Employees - Juntor Accountants in Caf 8 \$2900 per annum; that after appointment and training they be utilized only upon accounting work and that they be promoted to Caf 9 Special Agent positions only when they have qualified to perform strictly accounting assignments.

Usears, Tolson and Nichols feel that this would be undestrable inasmuch as it would be very difficult to differentiate between designations of employees in the field service, particularly when the services of employees are needed on Agents' work in raids, surveillances, special assignments, etc.

Ur. Glavin recommends the Juntor Accountant designation but suggests the entrance on duty grade be Caf ? \$2600 per annum.

Ura Nathan is opposed to the foregoing suggestions and feels that we should continue the requirement of three years' practical accounting or auditing experience. He feels that we are not securing Accountants under the system which has been in effect.

In this connection, Mr. Formorth has stated in the attached memorandum dated July 7 that for the most part where clenical accounting graduates have been kept on accounting work under experienced Special Agent Accountants they have developed.

SA Thitten further points out that he realizes that compliance with his suggestion would probably necessitate a change in the existing regulations and lawn relative to such matters but that the suggestion is being subattied for consideration in the event it is desired to make any suggestions to the proper authority or legislative body in the luture.

The Conference is of the uneninous opinion that no legislation concerning leave can be secured st this time which would affect Bureau employees and that on a full Government scale, such legislation would not be favorably acted upon at this time. The Conference points out that under existing regulations, an employee cannot have accrued to his benefit more than staty days of annual leave at the end of any calendar year or more than ninety days of sick leave and that all leave in excess of these smounts which has been secreed is automatically cancelled at the end of each calendar year. The Conference further points out that if an employee is sick or has been injured, the Bureau has not under any circumstance in the past falled to carry an employee on a leave-withoutpay status, and if the illness arises out of official duty; every effort has been made to secure the necessary compensative payments for that employee.

It would be desirable to have an Agent make suitable contacts in order to determine just what the nature of this mailing address is. I talked today with Captain Nixon and Captain Phillips, who, it is understood, will later succeed Captain Nixon when he goes to sea, both of ONI. We discussed the handling of Japanese espionage matters and the counterespionage work which should be undertaken. Both Nixon and Phillips indicated they had for years been focusing their attention on the Japanese problem, since Japan for a number of years appeared the most likely enemy. A war with Japan would be quite largely a Naval problem. Naturally, they were concerned.

They have developed a number of informants. They have quite a large volume of information. It appears that Anderson has recently told Nixon to send their information to the FBI. At least, he asked if this had been done. Nixon has informed him that it had not. They pointed out the problems involved and the contacts that had already been established. This at least has delayed the information already in the Navy Department's files being sent to the Bureau. Nixon pointed out the difficulties in getting Japanese translators; he pointed out the handicaps under which the Bureau will be working without the vast amount of background knowledge, a great deal of which has not been placed in writing, and the difficulties involved in assimilating the store of information which is a matter of record in the Navy Department. He pointed also to the large increase in work of the Bureau in proportion to the increase in Special Agents.

I pointed out the difficulties involved, since we were contacting transportation companies, including railroads and airplane travel companies, and finding that they had similar contacts which they had not canceled, and that it would obviously be irritating to various contacts to have to report to two or several governmental agencies; that I felt definitely there should be an understanding in the fixing of responsibility instead of leaving it in a nebulous state as at present. Nixon stated that at present, under the agreement, the work belonged to the FBI except where the Naval establishments were directly affected, but it could be told that Nixon personally and, I believe, Phillips, were desirous of retaining a large share of jurisdiction over Japanese espionage.

They stated they would join in a recommendation as follows:

e point where they believed prosecution was desirable, they would subsit all facts and information to the FBI with the request that the information be examined and such investigations as were necessary from a standpoint of getting legal evidence be conducted by the FBI with a view to presenting the facts to the U.S. Attorney for prosecution; that such investigations conducted by the FBI would be made only in cases wherein prosecution was desired and upon the specific request of GMI.

In any information in passession of the FBI or which the FBI receives in the future concerning Japanese or intelligence work relating to Japan or Japanese would be transmitted to ONI; all information presently in the passession of ONI, with the exception of the names of certain confidential information of the names of certain confidential information in these categories as it is received will be furnished to the FBI; and in the future, information in these categories as it is received will be furnished by OHI to the FBI. The purpose of the FBI receiving any of this information would be, not for investigative purposes, but so that the Bureau's files may be completed and the information essimilated so that if, in the future, a time sense when the FBI is to assume jurisdiction over such matters, the proper background and available records would be on hand.

The above enumerates the glat of the attitude of Captain Nixon and Captain Phillips. They were personally entirely agreeable to it. It was obvious that they could not apeak for Admirel Anderson and had no authority to commit ONI to this program. If the Bureau was desirous of having such a program effected, including not only the United States, but also Hawaii, I have no doubt but that Captain Nixon and Captain Phillips would support such an Idea.

United States and Hawail. In Puerto Rico, Alaska and the Virgin Islands, the Navy will not function in this field, and information will be furnished by FBI to ONI, as they plan no establishments there. In Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, particularly, the Japanese work is negligible.

2. That whenever a case is to be presented for prosecution, at the request of ONI the FBI will complete any investigative work as yet unfinished when it is presented to the FBI for prosecution purposes, and the FBI will present the case to the U.S. Attorney for decision

That a representative of the Bureau confer with selected officers of Naval Intelligence so as to select the information already in the records of Naval Intelligence for ONI to send to the PBI concerning Japanese matters, and that there be a free and full exchange of all information concerning Japanese intelligence matters between the FBI and ONI.

It is recommended that this matter be discussed at the Intelligence Conference next week.

Mr. Tracy advised the Executive Conference that the San Francisco, Los Angeles, Seattle and Honolulu offices have been sending in on Bureau request, passenger lists of all arriving and departing steamships from and to the Orient. As a result, the Bureau is receiving thousands of names of men, women and children and under the present rules of indexing, all such names must be indexed in the Bureau's Administrative Files Division. On most of the lists, just the name of the traveller is given. On some lists there is complete identifying information such as age, nationality, sex, citizenship, ports of embarking and destination.

Passenger lists submitted by the Konolulu Office are duplications of the passenger lists submitted by the West Coast offices in most instances with the exception of those few passengers travelling to and from the Orient, from Honolulu.

Complete indexing of such names has been done in accordance with the request of the National Defense officials, however, there is a difference of opinion; Supervisors Kimball and Flinn have stated that there is no need for this indexing while Messrs. E. A. Tamm, P. E. Foxworth and R. P. Kramer are of the contrary view. Mr. Tamm advised that if the information is worth getting, it is worth indexing.

Mr. Tracy pointed out to the Conference the volume of work involved as compared with the clerical personnel involved; that with unlimited personnel facilities, it would be desirable to index everything submitted to the Bureau, however, the Dureau does not have unlimited facilities and therefore some limitation must be considered.

 M_T . Tracy suggested the field could submit passenger lists as enclosures to reports, the field being instructed to place in reports the names of those persons who, in the opinion of the field, should be indexed.

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has requested copies of complete passenger lists of all arriving and departing Japanese steamships. His request could be handled separately without the Bureau indexing each and every name.

The Conference, consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Toxworth, Clegg, Rosen, Ladd, Glavin, Nichols, Gurnea, Drayton, Q. Tamm, and Tracy, unanimously voted to instruct the Field:

- 1. To discontinue sending passenger lists to the Bureau.
- 2. Lists should be secured as is now the practice, however, they should be filed for reference purposes in the respective field divisions.
- 3. A report should be prepared containing the names of travellers whose record of travel should be indexed in the Pureau or where the travel is pertinent to a pending investigation.

The attached bulletin to all field offices has been prepared in the event the Conference action is approved.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Nichols, Quinn Tamm, Tracy, Rosen, and Glavin, considered the possibility and desirability of opening an office at Norfolk, Virginia, to cover a portion of the Eastern Judicial District of the Virginia territory. The Conference was advised as follows:

That there are 615 cases pending in the Richmond Division at the present time, necessitating 946 days of work to complete. Of this number, 140 cases are pending in the Norfolk and Newport News Divisions of the State of Virginia, necessitating 222 days of work to complete. In the event steps were taken to open an office at Norfolk, this would leave 475 cases pending in the Michmond Division necessitating 724 days of work to complete.

For the Director's information, when the initial survey was made in November, 1939, concerning the possibility of establishing an office at Norfolk to cover the Norfolk and Newport News divisions, there were 207 cases pending in that area. There has therefore been a degreese in the number of cases pending from November of last year until the present date. It is believed that this is primarily due to the fact that at the present time there are four Resident Agents assigned to Norfolk and with the assignment of these Agents there that there has been a material decrease in the amount of pending work in and about that city.

The Conference further points out that at the time the last survey was made it was impossible to secure any space in Norfolk, Newport News, or Portsmouth, Virginia.

The Conference recommends that no further consideration be given at the present time to the opening of an additional office at Norfolk; that if there is a material increase in the work there appropriate arrangements be made to have a space survey conducted to ascertain whether space would be available for the establishment of an office there.

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The Amequatives' Conference has considered the contents of year recent memorandum growing out of your discussion with Special Agent (A) Clyde W. Smith with respect to the policy which has been followed in the field on the part of SACs in preparing efficiency ratings upon Special Agents (A) with particular reference to their accounting qualifications and ability. Mr. Smith has talked this matter over with Mr. Pennington and also with Mr. Tolson.

It does appear that there is a certain unfairness in the rating of Special Agents (A) in view of the fact that they are given ninety days of Special Agent's work immediately after they enter upon duty in the field. Further, as in the case of Special Agent (A) Smith, there are instances when Special Agents (A) are used upon Special Agent's work in emergencies and, as in the case of Ur. Smith, a number of Special Agents (A) have been assigned to New York City, Newark, and Philadelphia for the purpose of working upon a congested amount of bankruptcy and similar work which contains very little actual accounting; consequently, it is difficult for employees in this category to indicate their accounting knowledge and ability.

The conference desires to make two recommendations:

The Executive Conference consisting of Messers. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Ladd. 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MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Nichols, Quinn Tamm, Tracy, Rosen, and Glavin, considered a memorandum for Mr. Tolson regarding copies of legislation.

Mr. Glavin pointed out to the Conference that a great many sequests are being received in the Chief Clerk's Office for copies of current and past legislation to be transmitted to persons outside the Bureau who have requested them from the Bureau or its field divisions. It was further pointed out to the Conference that considerable difficulty is experienced from time to time in securing copies of such legislation and the suggestion is made by the Chief Clerk's Office that the Bureau might wish to establish the policy of declining, except in very special cases, to furnish copies of legislation, both past and present, to persons outside of the Bureau. It was suggested that those requesting past legislation should be referred to the statutes at large or to the United States Code Annytated, and those requesting present legislation should be advised that such legislation can be secured only from their representative Congressmen.

The Conference was of the unanimous opinion that the Bureau should continue its present policy of securing legislation for persons desiring copies of it.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference on August 24, 1940, considered the suggestion of Special Agent Patrick A. Munley of the Grand Rapids Office to the effect that the field divisions gather information concerning individuals who are known in the past to have engaged in preparing, making, manufacturing, or placing of bombs in public places, and that the names, photographs and fingerprints of such individuals known to the police departments be obtained and placed in the Bureau's single finger-print file.

Mr. Foxworth favored this suggestion, however, suggesting that the information be gathered from all police departments on the Bureau's mailing list by means of a circular letter. Messrs. Clegg and Glavin were in favor of having agents in the field contact police departments in all towns of 100,000 population or more and through oral interviews obtain the desired information for submission to the Bureau. Mr. Tracy was in favor of the suggestion of Agent Munley in the event it was clearly understeed by the police departments contacted that the Bureau would offer no advice or assistance in connection with the handling of the bombs, but that the information was merely wanted for the Bureau's single fingerprint file.

Messrs. Rosen, Mathan, Nichols and Ladd were opposed to gathering this information, it being pointed out that such a list would contain primarily labor racketeers, who were known to have placed bombs, etc., and would be of little value in connection with the national emergency; that the maintenance of a general appearance file for the photographs and descriptions of known bombers would be of little or no value inasmuch as witnesses are seldom located who have seen any persons placing bombs. Further, it was pointed out that to obtain such information would entail a great deal of investigative work on the part of the field which would not be justified from the results obtained, it being particularly pointed out that after a bomb has exploded, the possibilities of any latent finger-prints being left thereon are very remote.

The Executive Conference consisting of Mesers. Clegg, Mathan, Ladd, Forwarth, Tracy, Glavin, Rosen and Michaels considered the matter of distributing the booklet "Suggestions For Protection of Industrial Facilities." The Conference was of the opinion that first of all the booklet should not be distributed widely but is something that we have to give and should be requested. While the booklet has not been widely distributed to date, nevertheless it is felt that following the publication of the September issue of the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin, there will be numerous requests for it.

For the time being the Conference recommended

In That copies of the booklet be furnished to each plant which has been surveyed by the SAC. This would give him the basis for continuing his contact with the plant. The Conference felt that copies should not be furnished to the plants which have not been surveyed as yet but which are on the priority list inasmuch as the suggestions set forth therein would undoubtedly be covered in the survey while on the other hand if these booklets are given out in advance the plants might take it upon themselves to put into effect certain suggestions which an Agent would be in a better position to make to more effectively protect the plant's facilities. If this is approved a letter will go forward to each SAC issuing the proper instructions.

It was the consensus of the Conference that copies of the booklet should not be sent to graduates of the National Police Academy at the present time but should be handed to those who attend the Annual Reunton and Retraining and then copies sent to those who do not attend. It was pointed out that this is something additional that we can give the graduates and it would give them something to take home and talk about.

The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Glavin, Nathan, Foxworth, Tracy, Ladd, Rosen and Nichols considered the suggestion of Mr. Patterson designed to make more file space available by the destruction of the following summary reports:

- id. MONTHLY OVERTIME REPORTS These reports record the overtime of individuals and have been maintained since 1934. They occupy two file drawers. The present report is different than the form kept at that time and it is the unanimous recommendation of the Conference that the records not be kept in the Files Section but that the material be furnished to the Chief Clerk's Office informally and after it has been summarized, it then be destroyed. The summaries will, of course, be made a matter of permanent record.
- 2. MONTHLY MAILING LISTS IDENTIFICATION DIVISION Inasmuch as some question might arise, it was the unanimous opinion that these lists be kept indefinitely.
- 3. MONTHLY REPORT OF AGENTS! WORK PERFORMED IN FIELD OFFICES
 This is a summary of the monthly administrative reports and have been maintained since 1927. It was the opinion of the Conference that only the original be kept with all copies being destroyed.
- 4. RECORDING CARDS IDENTIFICATION DIVISION These particular cards reflect the daily number of fingerprints feceived from various contributors to the Uniform Crime Reports. They occupy 48 file drawers and have been kept since 1934, however Mr. Schilder authorized the destruction of the reports for 1935. It was the unanimous opinion of the Conference, with the exception of Mr. Glavin that these cards should be kept for three years and then destroyed, it being believed by Mr. Glavin, however, that these cards be destroyed after the expiration of one year.
- 5. DAILY REPORTS OF INQUIRIES ANSWERED BY THE IDENTIFICATION DIVISION This, in effect, is a summary of the work done in the Identification Division and it was the unanimous opinion of the Conference that they be kept for only a period of one month. These reports occupy two file drawers and have been maintained since 1926.
- 6. DAILY REPORT OF THE MOVEMENT OF AGENTS These reports have been kept since 1926 and occupy two file drawers. It was the unanimous opinion of the Conference that these reports should only be kept for thirty days as they are a duplication of the information kept in the files of the Agents and the various offices.
- 7. MONTHLY FIELD ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS These reports which are submitted each month occupy 21 file drawers and have been maintained since 1931. It was the

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unanimous opinion of the Conference that these reports should be destroyed after one year inasmuch as complete copies are available in all Field Offices.

It was the consensus of the Conference that there was no need to refer to the administrative reports for a period beyond one year and furthermore the summaries would be available in the monthly reports of the work performed by the Agents in the various Field Offices.

8. Mr. Petterson recommended the destruction of ten file drawers of newspaper clippings and articles on the Lindbergh kidnaping case. It was the opinion of the Conference that these clippings be retained.

In the event that the foregoing recommendations of the Onference are approved, the appropriate instructions will be issued to the Files Section.

The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Nathan, Clegg, Forworth, Ladd, Rosen, Glavin, Tracy and Nichols considered Mr. Nichols' memorandum of August 22, 1940 summarizing the Field's observation with reference to physical training. The Conference also considered Mr. Nichols' suggestion on the continuance of physical training.

The donference generally was of the opinion that physical training of some kind was beneficial, although the observation was made that routing types of physical training might not have the advantages of certain other types.

Messrs. Nathan, Clegg, Foxworth, Eadd and Rosen were in favor of discontinuing compulsory physical training until the present emergency is over for the following reasons:

I. It is felt that the great pressure of work at the present time, the time of the agents could be spent to greater value to the Bureau on actual investigative work.

2. The time required for physical training upon the part of the individual Agent would exceed the one hour designated for such training for the reason that if an Agent is on the outskirts of town on a routine investigation as most of them should be doing, it is necessary that he leave his investigative work, return to the office some time before the designated hour for training. After spending an hour in training, it is not felt likely that he would return to his investigative work.

3. Some of the Agents have pointed out that in certain localities they are able to find persons between five and seven of clock more readily than at other times of the day, particularly in residential districts.

A. It was felt that to regularly give physical training during the present emergency might give a basis for criticism to persons antagenistic toward the Bureau. It was pointed out that with the large volume of work now before the Bureau and the publicity which has been given to it, someone might make It a point of criticism that the time of Agents was being spent in being given physical training.

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Messrs. Glavin, Tracy and Nichols were in favor of continuting the present program of physical training because it was believed that the advantages exceeded the disadvantages. It was pointed out that a common-sense interpretation should, of course, be given this Bureau requirement which would necessarily excuse an agent from taking compulsory physical training in the event he was engaged in in investigation of utmost urgency and importance and in the event he was a long distance from his field office or the place where he took gymnasium.

It was also pointed out that the physicians at the Naval Hospital found the Bureau agents who took supervised physical training in better physical shape than those who did not take physical training. It was also observed that for a period three times a week physical training would take agents away from their work and provide a period of relaxation and possibly recreation, thus bringing the men of an office together.

In the event the majority opinion is approved, a letter is attached ordering the discontinuance of supervised physical training. In the event the minority opinion is approved, a letter is attached pointing out that supervised physical training should be continued.

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Nichols, Quinn Tamm, Tracy, Rosen and Glavin, considered a suggestion received from the Special Agent in Charge of the Washington Field ffice concerning applicant investigations.

SAC Hottel suggested that the Bureau be designated as the office of origin in all applicant investigations, in view of the fact that telegrams are sent out by the Bureau to all divisions, setting forth information about the applicant and requesting that the investigation be completed and that a telegraphic summary or report be sent to the Bureau by a certain date. It was also pointed out to the Conference that these investigations are without exception followed by the Chief Clerk's Office.

The Agent in Charge of the Washington Field Office further points out that there are a great many reports received in the Washington Field Office covering applicant investigations which are entirely unnecessary and which would not be received if the Washington Field ffice were not to be considered as the office of origin.

Mr. Glavin advised the Conference that the Chief Clerk's Office has always followed applicant investigations and all inquiries to the field concerning applicant investigations are initiated by the Bureau. He is of the opinion that by making the Bureau the office of origin on all applicant investigations considerable unnecessary work would be saved the field offices without any additional work whatsoever in the Chief Clerk's Office.

The Conference is of the unanimous opinion that it would be well to establish the procedure of having the Bureau the office of origin on all Bureau applicant investigations and recommends that this policy be followed in the future. Subject to the Director's approval, there is attached hereto a form letter to the field covering this matter, as well as a communication to the Special Agent in Charge of the Washington Field Office.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

On August 8th the Executives Conference, consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Foxworth, E. A. Tamm, Ladd, Glavin, and Nathan, considered a communication of August 2nd from SAC Guinane at Birmingham to the effect that Chief of Police Dickerson of Selma, Alabama had stated he did not like the idea of sending officers to the FBI NPA and then having to lose them to another department. He was referring to the case of Werdner W. Moseley, who was recommended by the Bureau for appointment as Chief of Police at Lake Wales, Florida and received the appointment. Guinane stated Chief Dickerson also criticized Moseley for not letting him know about the negotiations for his appointment in any manner whatsoever. Guinane recommended that no graduate of the NPA be recommended for any position without receiving a letter from the head of his department giving his consent (with the exception of instances where graduates may have paid their own way to the Academy).

Messrs. Tolson, Foxworth and Nathan were of the opinion that the policy of the Bureau should be to recommend no graduate of the NPA unless said graduate had returned to his department and continued to function there for one year after graduation. It was stated that no previous graduate had been recommended to another department within a year of his graduation. They felt it would be undesirable to communicate with and receive the approval of the Chief of Police, pointing out that the Bureau sometimes recommends four or five graduates for one vacancy, and the fact that this is done might jeopardize a member's standing with his police organization. The Burean, of course, has the right to recommend such NPA graduates as it thinks are capable of positions of greater responsibility.

Mr. Glavin was of the opinion that the Bureau should take the matter up with the Chief of Police in all instances prior to suggesting the name of a police officer under his jurisdiction.

Messrs. E. A. Tamm and Ladd felt the Bureau should recommend the best NPA graduate available at all times, without regard to whether he had served a year in his own organization subsequent to graduation.

The Conference was umanisously of the opinion that the Eureau should consider the Williamsburg Restoration, with its buildings and streets and complete community, as a municipality and that the Department of Public Safety of the organization should be considered of a type which would give Captain Nuffmen an opportunity to retain his status as a National Police Academy Associate.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

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The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Ladd, Nichols, Quinn, Tamm, Hince and Clegg, considered the request of Special Agent in Charge Sackett for approval of a circular letter to be sent to police departments whose representatives attended the conference of law enforcement officers in the New York Office on August 9, 1940. The enclosure sets forth substantially the information included in the Bureau's letter of instructions to Special Agents in Charge with reference to holding such conferences.

The Executive Conference was unanimously of the opinion that such a circular letter should not be issued as the oral instructions given as to the matters discussed should obviously have been made clear by the Special Agent in Charge and because of the possibility that some policies might be changed and it would then become necessary to re-circularize the police departments, thus involving throughout the country, if such examples were followed, a heavy clerical and administrative burden which should not be undertaken.

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MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference, consisting of Messra. E. A. Tamm, Nathan, Ladd, Nichols, Rosen, Clegg, Foxworth, and Glavin, considered the desirability of installing an announcing system at the Quantico Barracks. It was pointed out to the Conference that an announcing system costing approximately \$371 could be installed which would embrace the following equipment:

The office would have a microphone with a deak stand and standard 15 watt amplifier, which could be mounted under the existing telephone stand and plugged into the nearby power outlet. A small control panel in the office would permit selection of speakers individually or in groups not to exceed eleven; this control panel having a switch which connects all speakers simultaneously for general announcement purposes. The office would have a wall speaker to not as a monitor for the announcer.

Wall speakers would be placed in the caretaker's room in the basement, in the armory in the basement, in the recreation room on the first floor, and one two-way speaker would be mounted at the middle point of each doraitory floor hallway, i. e., on the second and third floors. Mr. Engel stated, however, that in his opinion, it would be difficult for persons in the individual rooms to hear these speakers, especially if the doors were closed. The estimated cost for such a system was \$371.

The Conference is of the opinion that such a system is needed at the present time and recommends that the installation be made. Should the Director approve the installation of this system, appropriate steps will be taken by the Chief Clerk's Office to have the necessary contracts for installation executed.

A Conference, consisting of Mesers. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Lawler and Clegg, considered the request of Colonel O'Kellerher that the Bureau conduct investigations as requested of members of the approximately 6500 draft boards in the United States. It was not expected that every board member would be investigated but certain selected groups and individuals as well as members in certain suspected localities would probably have to be investigated. There are three members of each board, so there arises a possibility of 19,500 individuals maximum being investigated. Colonel O'Kellerher indicated that written in the draft law was a provision that the President was empowered to call upon any governmental agency to assist and he expressed the hope that the Bureau would offer its services voluntarily. Other than this statement, his attitude seemingly was very friendly.

The Conference felt that any investigations of this type should be conducted by the police departments. It is recommended, therefore, that Colonel O'Kellerher be informed that the Bureau will be glad to have inquiries made concerning those whose names were referred to the Bureau and that the Bureau refer these matters to field offices with instructions that the police be requested to conduct the investigations.

It is noted that this recommendation exteris the assignment of non-ident checkers to particular cabinets in the Technical Section where they stand at the cabinet and work with the fingerprint searchers. This is in contrast to the present system in the Identification Diviaion of lating the non-ident circulars scated at a table in one corner of the Technical Section.

The Conference was advised that this system had been tried for 60 days in the Technical Section and was found to work satisfactorily, of course with the exception that it was necessary to use at least a additional non-ident chapters on the day force under the new system. However, the Conference fools that this system is giving a nove thorough check to the fingerprints and recommends that it be adopted personally, providing that the Identification Division has sufficient Grade 5 or old fingerpriot non to place this system conpletely in effect on both the day and might force.

The non-licent checker is the highest grade fingerprint can in the Technical Section. He should have at least 5 years experience. At the present time the Identification Division does not have sufficight fingerorist men with this experience as non-ident checkers to place the system in effect completely on the day force and night force.

It was suggested that the Bureau procure a Graflew Photorecord machine for each field office and three additional machines for the Seat of Government, one of which is to be used by the Training Division.

The photorecord machine is a portable photographic unit, illustrations of which are on the attached anclosures.

With this machine it will be possible for field offices to reproduce on film resembling motions picture film, up to 2000 copies of small documents, such as index cards, for 800 copies of documents of newspaper size. The camera uses motion picture film and the film can be developed in any locality where motion picture film can be developed. It does not take a photographer to operate the machine as it is relatively stuple, as it has its own lighting system, has a foolproof focusing arrangement and is operated by either a fact peddle or hand bulb. It is much faster than the portable photostat units now in field offices. It can be set up in a very few minutes any place desired. The lighting system uses regular 110 volt ourrent.

The Conference consisting of Mr. Tolson, Mr. Tamm, Mr. Clegg, Mr. Ladd, Mr. Clavin, Mr. Rosen, and Mr. Tracy unanimously recommends the purchase of one machine for each field office and three for the Seat of Sovernment. At a meeting of the Executive Conference on October 15. 1940, attended by Mesers. Tolson, E. A. Temm, Clogg, Tracy, Glavin, Hince and Ladd, the question of the necessity of monitoring various radio stations in connection with the Mational Defense work was brought up by Mr. Ledd, at which time it was pointed out that the only all-wave receiving sempresently in possession of the Bureau had been on that date sent out to the New York and Hewark Offices.

The National Defense Division advised that they anticipated further work of this nature and in view thereof, it was recomended that ten Hammerland Professional All-Wave radio receivers be purchased in connection with this work. These receivers sell for approximately \$250 each and are capable of receiving all phort-wave es well as commercial broadcasts and would be necessary in any monitoring work.

The Conference was upenimously in favor of the purchase of ten of these receivers and suggested that they be stationed in the following offices:

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

Re: Requirementa Pertaining to Accounting Course.

The Executives' denference yesterday considered the possible relaxation of the rules pertaining to the completion of the Eureau's accounting course as follows:

- (1) The requirement that each accountant complete this course within a period of one year from November 1, 1940, and that all newly appointed accountants complete the course within one year after their appointment.
- (2) The requirement that all SACs, Number One Men, and Supervisors must complete this course not later than November 1, 1941.
- (3) The requirement that no one in the service shall be considered for assignment to an executive position until and unless he has completed the accounting course.

Messrs. Glavin, E. A. Tamm, Ladd and Tolson recommend approval of the foregoing policy.

Mr. Clegg states that he thinks this course is too advanced and that he feels it would be sufficient for employees in the category of Special Agents to complete only the first 12 of the 36 lessons which they are now required to do.

The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs.

Foxworth, Ladd, Nichols, Hince, and E. A. Tamm considered the attached letter addressed to the Bureau, in which Mr. Jones protests against the assigning of the border towns of Brownsville and Laredo to the Houston Office.

At the time consideration was given to the opening of the Houston Office, the desirability of assigning the Brownsville and Laredo territories to that office was considered. It was pointed out that railroad transportation would be better from San Antonio, Texas, than it would from Houston. However, it was pointed out that a great deal of travel would be by automobile and that the roads from Houston to Brownsville and Earedo would be just as good as from San Antonio. It was further considered that if the work in the Brownsville and Laredo territories remained under the jurisdiction of the San Antonio Office, the Southern Judicial District of Tesax would be split up so that it would be necessary for Agents of the San Antonio Office to consult with the U. S. Attorney located under the jurisdiction of the Houston Office regarding investigative matters in the Laredo and Brownsville territories. This fact was considered when the Executive Conference recommended that the entire Southern Judicial District be assigned to the Houston Office.

Mr. Glavin has had opportunity of discussing transportation problems in the Houston Office with SAC. K. Fierstone, Number One Man of that office. SA Fierstone states that they have excellent air transportation between Houston, Laredo, and Brownsville and that it takes about three and one-half hours to Brownsville from Houston. He also stated that they have good highway transportation and that the only time railroad transportation is used is when an Agent is coming in for firearms training or some matter of that kind when he is proceeding directly to the Houston Office and makes the journey over night

from Brownsville or Laredo to San Antonio and then by rail to

For the Director's information there is attached hereto a map reflecting the Southern and Western Divisions of Texas, the Southern Division being under the jurisdiction of the Houston Office and the Western Division being under the jurisdiction of the San Antonio Office.

The Conference is of the opinion that the allocation of the territory in Texas should be maintained in its present form for a period of at least six months unless something happens in the meantime to indicate that these two towns should be assigned to the San Antonio Office. At the end of a six-months' period, an appropriate check can be made of travel vouchers, investigative operations, et cetera, to determine whether the interests of the Bureau would be best served by having the towns of Brownsville and Taredo covered by San Antonio.

Tamm, Clegg, Tracy, Glavin, Mince and Ladd, considered the request of the Technical Laboratory for the purchase of a Densitometer for use in comparing and analyzing the spectrographic film for the purpose of determining the quantity of any particular element which might be reflected through the line in the spectrum in the film.

It was pointed out to the Conference by Mr. Ladd that for eccurate check of the work of the spectrograph such equipment was necessary, it being further noted that at the time the Laboratory spectrographer visited the Laboratory at Loyola University and New York University, these universities indicated that they felt this equipment necessary in connection with spectrographic work.

The Conference was unanimously in favor of the purchase of this equipment, which it is estimated will cost approximately \$1,300.

The Executive Conference, Messrs. Tolson, Glavin, E. A. Tame, Nichols, Rosen, Ladd, Hinco, Tracy, Lawler, C. Term-and Clegg being present, considered the recommendations of the committee composed of Messrs. Ladd, Michols, Lawler and Clegg, that there be no consolidation of the fingerprints of the Government and the regular criminal files for the following reasons:

- There are now more than four and one-half million mester prints in the criminal files, two million Government prints in file and one-quarter million unfiled. This would make a total in excess of six and one-half million master cards in the general files. Such a total volume to be handled in the Technical Section would be undesirable. Such a situation would lengthen the time of all searches and slow down production and slow down replies to police agencies.
- 2. Such a situation would require more reference searches on Government prints and thus there would be more individual searches required then is indicated merely by the memerical increase in the files.
- 3. The increased number of references to be searched would lead to possibilities of greater inaccuracy and misses in the searches.
- It would slow down production by a figure estimated 4. as approximately 50 per cent.
- It would crowd cabinets with personnel and also 5. crowd the cabinets with cards.
- 6. Statistics showing the number of identifications in the general criminal files, which would contain also the Covernment cards, would make a decided drop because not only criminal fingerprints but also Covernment fingerprints would be searched against these records and would enter into the determination as to the percentage of idents made.

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The Executive Conference agreed with this conclusion.

There was next considered the recommendation of the subcommittee that there be no consolidation of the index cards on the names of individuals whose fingerprints are in the Government files and in the criminal files for the following reasons:

- 1. It would require 16 employees one year to file the Government index cards with the general cards.
- 2. It would require 24 additional employees, if the two files were consolidated, to handle the additional and more lengthy searches because of the consolidation.
- 3. It would increase the amount of time for searching in the Card Index Section by approximately 20%.
- 4. Of all the Civil Service and Government prints received there are many who are merely applicants,
 and the FBI is not aware of the fact that they
 have gotten a position or in what Department, nor
 is there information available on the card as to
 when they left the Government service or transfer
 from one department to another.

The Executive Conference agreed with this conclusion.

The Conference next considered the recommendation of the sub-committee that there be no regular routine searches through the Government index cards of the names appearing on fingerprint cards received in the criminal category for the following reasons:

- 1. If only the non-idents were searched against the file it would require an additional 28 clerical employees based on present receipts.
- 2. Because of the fact that several of the Government prints were received several years ago, it would be just as logical to search the idents as the non-idents against such cards, and in this exent there would be a requirement for 60 additional employees based on present receipts.
- 3. Such a procedure would slow down the production and the responses to the police agencies by approximately one full day. This is most undesirable from the standpoint of service to police and the handling of criminals.

In connection with this recommendation and the above recommendations, the Conference desires to point out the prospective heavy increase in receipts for the Government files due to increases of personnel in all Government Departments, large increases in the enlisted and officer personnel of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard, and in each instance the present objections to making these searches in the index and fingerprint card files will be rapidly increasing in the immediate future. It might be sited that it is expected that 400,000 draftees will be inducted into the military service at a comparatively early date.

In considering all of the above disadvantages and objections, the only advantage that could be seen was the possibility of a rare and occasional identification of a government employee, and the estimate was that this percentage of identification was less than one per cent of the receipts. The amount of cost, the delay in handling regular criminal fingerprints, the scarcity of personnel and the totally inadequate staff of trained personnel all would seem to outweigh tremendously the slight advantages which could be obtained.

It was recommended, however, that the memorandum to Judge Holtsoff in reply to the communication addressed to the Attorney General by the Administrative Assistant to the Secretary of Commerce should point out that in the event the Commerce Department or any other Department of Government had any facts or circumstances which it was believed would justify the making of a specific or individual search, the Bureau would be glad to make that search of the Federal employee's fingerprints and name against the criminal files and index cards. Such circumstances as requests for extended leave, requests for leave without pay, allegations made anonymously or directly concerning such employee, would logically suggest that a specific request of this type be made. It was further pointed out that for minor offenses such as traffic violations and overnight detention for drunkenness and similar situations would probably not, in most Government Departments, result in administrative action. However, in the event of a serious violation or conviction, there would be publicity or at least a request for extended leave in order to serve a sentence, and under these circumstances the administrative officers of the Departments concerned may direct their inquiry to the FBI whenever suspicious circumstances arise according to their epinion.

The Executive Conference consisting of Messra, Tolson, I. A. Mr. Couch suggests that the service revolver, with holster, be issued permanently to all, those included in the monthly fireness retraining rooter.

The Conference is opposed to the adoption of this suggestion. The Conference points out that those not having the status of Special Agent have, in fact, no authority for the carrying of freezes and although it is necessary for certain of the technical employees in the Crime Laboratory to receive firstense training during their training periods, it is not believed that this sould justify the permanent assignment of firstense to such employees.

The Conference further points out that when such suployees in the Technical Laboratory become qualified experts and receive the Special Agent rating they are issued if rearms in the same memory as such equipment is launed to regular Special Agents in the service. It is not believed that there should be may deviation from this procedure.

Rei Monthly Pirearms Retraining

As each monthly firearms retraining period arises, it is the practice to issue service revolvers to these retrainees not in permanent possession of them, and to recall these revolvers immediately upon completion of the retraining period.

Let. Couch of the Tachnical Laboratory
has suggested that in order to reach the maximum skill with
the revolver, it is desirable for the shooter to be in
constant possession of the same arm so that the "feel" of
the trigger pull, double action, grip and sights will become
"second nature". This "feel" is not possible where the revolver
is handled only for the short period of retraining, and where
a different revolver and holster are issued each time.

The Executive Conference on October 18, 1940, attended by Messrs. Tolson, E. A. Tanm, Clegg, Michols, Clavin, Mince, Lawler, Rosen, Tracy and Ladd, considered the suggestion that in view of the fact the receipts in the Identification Division are greater than it is possible to search at the present time with the present trained personnel, and in view of the fact that the number of alien prints being presently received is being increased by 1,000 prints each day, that the fingerprint cards be searched on a selective bacis, thus searching each day all of the criminal prints, current unlistment, the Army, Mary, Marine Corps, etc., the Mavel Intelligence prints, the Alien Registration prints and the National Defense prints as they are received and in addition bandling enough of the applicant and Civil Service prints, which are not special, to make a total number of prints which will be possible to search each day in the Identification Division, and to permit the non-expedite applicant and Civil Service prints to become delinquent rather than to let all of the expedite prints become delinquent.

Through this policy, it was pointed out that as the trained personnel is increased and the daily volume of searching is greater, the number of delinquent applicant prints sent through will be increased until such time as the Technical Section is again up to date.

The Conference was unanisously in favor of this suggestion.

In the event you approve of this procedure of searching fingerprints on a selective basis, care will be immediately started to coincide with the receipt of the additional 1,000 alien prints which it is believed will be received on Monday, October 21, 1940,

Tolson, Ladd, Clagg, L. J. Tamm, Hince, Clavin, Rosen, Lawler,
Fracy and Nichole, considered the suggestion which has been
made on several occasions in the past to search all incoming
fingerprints through the Card Index Section prior to checking
them through the main files of the Technical Section.

This suggestion was renewed in view of the large valume of work being received daily in the Identification Division, in an effort to assist in speeding up the production of that Section.

It was pointed out that this procedure would without a doubt increase the number of errors inasmuch as the employees would feel there was no subsequent check, knowing that the print had already been searched in Card Index and in those cases where it was not identified on the name search they would feel safe in taking short outs in searching the print knowing that no index cord under the same name was contained in the files and that there was not any possibility of checking further on their search. The Assembly Verifiers verify all identifications that are made prior to sending them out. In the case of non-idents, the non-ident checker merely vertiles that the print has been properly classified and searched through all references and the present system of searching the prints in card index after the search in Tech has acted as a restraint and check on the technical menwas further pointed out that by making the change at this time and searching all prints in Card Index first that the daily average of searches in the Identification Division would be increased by approximately 1,000 prints.

It should be pointed out that at the present time approximately 80% of all fingerprint cards being received are searched through the Card Index Section first. This 60% is composed of all "Institution prints" and all "bad prints" which are difficult of classification or which would have extremely lengthy searches. The remaining 40% have been put on the cabinets immediately and searched in the fingerprint files first.

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The Executive Conference after considering the large increase in the work in the Identification Division and after weighing all of the advantages and disadvantages of searching prints in Card Index first was unanimously of the opinion that this procedure should be adopted at least until such time as the trained personnel is sufficient to handle the daily volume of receipts. In the event the action of the Conference is approved, this program will be placed into effect and carefully scrutinised and a detailed report will be submitted to you with reference to the manner in which it is found to be working.

Mr. Renneberger recommended that at least two Speed Graphic cameras be assigned to each field office and that the Speed Graphic cameras gradually replace the Recomar cameras which have been supplied to the field prior to this time. Mr. Coffey recommends that the Speed Graphic cameras replace the Recomars when replacements are necessary.

For the information of the Director it is not possible to purchase Recommar cameras at the present time due to the war because such cameras are manufactured from parts supplied principally from Germany.

The Conference is of the unanimous opinion that the Speed Graphic cameras should replace the Recomars as additional cameras are needed in the field.

The Conference further approves the suggestion made by Mr. Renneberger that each field office be equipped with at least two Speed Graphic cameras.

Should the Director approve the recommendation of the Conference, immediate orders will be placed for the necessary camera equipment.

Tamm, Tracy, and Glavin considered the communication received from Special Agent in Charge Rutzen of the New Orleans Office, wherein Special Agent in Charge Rutzen advised that Mr. Egan had suggested during the recent inspection of the New Orleans Office that .351 rifles, a Thompson submachine gun or shotgum should be made available in resident agency cities.

The Executive Conference considered the suggestion of Special Asent F. D. Cronby that instruction be effected to Special Asenta in the use of the blackjack. The conference also concidered the information furnished by Mr. Goudge with respect to instructions which can be given on the use of the blackjack. It was noted by the Conference that there is very little instruction that can be afforded Special Agenta except such elementary training as la now given. For example, the Special Agents are given the following instructions:

The blackjack is a decemptre weapon, should not be carried on the suga side of the person as the sun, but should be always carried in the same place. The strap attached to the blackjack should not be encircled about the wrist. It is dangerous to strike a person on the head but effective blows den be utruck on the joints, kidney, coller bone, back of bond or knuckles, kneecep, and other Wilderable places.

RECORDED 66-25-34 Re Pursuit Cars

Reference is made to your memorandum of October 26, 1940, concerning bids received for the purchase of pursuit cars and with which was enclosed the report of the tests performed by the National Bureau of Standards.

It is noted from the Bureau of Standards report that the car submitted by the shudson and Terraplane Sales Corporation, Washington, D. C., passed the tests with the highest rating and the other three cars tested were rated considerably below the Hudson.

If the bid submitted by the Hudson and Terraplane Sales Corporation can legally be accepted, this Bureau has no objection to the acceptance of its bid for the purchase of Hudson automobiles under the first solicitation in the total amount of \$135,000. It is understood that this will provide approximately 189 automobiles.

With regard to the second solicitation in the total amount of \$150,000, it is desired that this solicitation be disregarded altogether. It is furthermore desired that new bids be solicited for the purchase of approximately 225 automobiles under the limitation of \$150,000. The specifications to be used for this purchase should conform with previous specifications, with the exception that the service top speed should be listed as 75 miles an hour instead of 85 miles an hour.

It will be appreciated if this matter can be given your usual prompt attention.

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The Executive Conference, consisting of Messrs. Telson, Tama, Tracy, Nichols, Rosen, Ladd, Hince, Lawler, Quinn Tamm, and Glavin, considered a memorandum addressed to the Director by Mr. Quins of the Department concerning the pursuit cars, wherein the Bureau was advised that as a result of the Bureau of Standards tests the Hudson automobile was determined to be the best automobile for this Bureau's use. For the Director's information, the tests reflect the following ratings:

Hudson 96 Ford 74.6 Buick 69.8 Chevrolet 68.8

It appears that the Ford has included a new 99 horse power motor instead of the regular 95 horse power motor which had been previously installed in the Ford special police car. Undoubtedly this new motor has not yet been properly perfected.

It was pointed out to the Conference that under bids which resulted in the tests aforementioned, the Bureau can purchase \$135,000 worth of cars which will total approximately 189 cars. It was further pointed out to the Conference that additional bids for the purchase of cars in the amount of \$150,000 were also received, the same companies bidding on the purchase of these cars, and the Bureau can, if it wishes, accept the results of the tests already made in purchasing the cars under the second bid.

For the Director's information, under the bids under consideration at this time the Hudson car will cost us \$712.59 per car. It is not the low bid, the low bid being the Ford with a net price of approximately \$609 per car. Under the second bids which might be considered at this time, the Hudson submits a bid of \$742.93 per car, while the Ford submits a net bid of \$606.38 per car. RECORDED

The Conference is of the opinion that the bid of the Hudson Motor Company should be accepted for the initial contract covering the purchase of approximately 189 cars.

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It further recommends that the bids which have been secured on the second proposed purchase be disregarded and that additional bids be submitted at this time with the possibility of reducing the top service speed from 85 miles an hour to 75 miles an hour in order that additional manufacturers may bid to give the Bureau a proper distribution of different types of cars. Mr. E. A. Tamm pointed out to the Conference that it would be very undesirable to purchase 400 to 450 cars of the same make and that if possible these cars should be distributed in types so that the Bureau's work would not be hampered. This can be accomplished by the acceptance of the bid of the Hudsen Motor Company for the first purchase of cars and requesting the resolicitation of bids on our now pending purchase with the top speed limit reduced from 85 to 75 miles per hour.

If the Director approves the appropriate acceptance of the first order will go forward to the Department and a memorandum will also be addressed to the Department requesting that the current bid be disregarded and that revised specifications be sent out on the pending purchase.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference consisting of Mesers. Tolson, E. A. Tamm, Cuinn Tamm, Nichols, Tracy, Rosen, Lawler, Hince, and Clavin considered a communication received from Special Agent in Charge Sears of the Philadelphia Office wherein he suggests that the Eureau might wish to consider purchasing some small cameras in Philadelphia which are comparable to the recommar camera, it not being possible for the Eureau to purchase additional recommar cameras due to the fact that they have been manufactured in Gersany.

It was pointed out to the Conference that according to a memorandum submitted by Mr. Coffey, the "Thegoe" camera is also a German-made camera and would mean an additional type of camera used by the Bureau.

The Conference is unanimously opposed to the purchase of any such camera and recommends that speeds stable cameras be furnished to the field offices then additional cameras are needed.

For the information of the Director, there has already been approval by the Director of a suggestion of the Conference to furnish additional speedographic cameras to the field. There is attached here a communication to the Special Agent in Charge at Philadelphia concerning this mather.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. LADD

Re! Portable Public Address System.

It is recommended that arrangements be made by the Bureau for the purchase of one portable public address system capable of 110-volt 60-cycle operation and rated at 30 to 40 watts output. Such a system will enable the Bureau to establish a microphone and loud speaker system at any point where power is available whether inside buildings or in the open. Such a system would be admirably suited for setups in the main courtyard or out of door groups at Quantico.

In addition to the amplifier and an appropriate carrying case for it the system should include two twelve-inch permanent magnet speakers also mounted in a carrying case, two high quality directional velocity microphones with a matching collapsible type floor stand for each microphone. The amplifier is to have five microphone input channels and two phonograph input channels.

The unit is to be furnished complete with tubes and a detailed wiring diagram. The entire portable public address system is to be Lafayette Radio Model 765-T or its approved equivalent, listing at \$125.35.

The following information is submitted relative to the proposed revision of the work sheet for the new agents' training course.

As a result of a discussion with the various supervisors, relative to the amount of time presently allotted to them for instruction and the types of investigations handled by them, the following information was obtained. It will be noted that the writer's inquiry was to determine whether the amount of time as presently allocated was adequate for the proper handling of their subjects, or whether on the other hand, any reduction might be made from the present allocation.

It may be seen from the above that while eight additional hours have been requested by supervisors listed above to devote to their respective subjects, only three hours of this time is available during the seven weeks' training period, unless reductions are made in some of the other subjects upon which instruction is going given at the present time. A careful review of the entire training program fails to reveal that any reduction is possible or practicable on those subjects, nor does it appear advisable to drop any of the subjects presently included on the program. It is the writer's recommendation that the three hours which may be deducted from the time allotted to the subjects listed above be divided as follows:

The increase of two hours on the subject it is believed, may be absorbed during the total time of nine days devoted to instruction on the manual of rules and Regulations so that the seven weeks period of instruction will not be effected by this change.

The Conference considered the suggestion made by Mr. Hinco that a program for the training of clerical employees in the field be adopted.

The Conference approved the holding of a school at Washington for one clerical employee from each field office except Juneau and Honolulu to begin November 12 and to conclude November 16, covering a total period of five days. The attached curriculum is suggested. The Conference recommended that each field office be instructed that the employee to be designated should be one who has not previously attended a Chief Clerks' School at Washington, but should be an employee who will be capable of transmitting the information learned at Washington to the other employees in the field office and one with qualifications to handle the work of Chief Clerk after proper training.

If approved the Chief Clerk's Office on the basis of this memorandum will prepare the appropriate communications to the field ordering in the clerical employees.

The Conference approved following up this school with a change in the clerical conference procedure in the field. In view of the increased number of new employees in the field, the Conference approved the suggestion of Mr. E. A. Tamm that clerical conferences be held monthly and that as part of each monthly program the employee who participates in the clerical school at Washington should handle a portion of the instruction. If approved, the field will be instructed by the attached bulletin. It will be noted that at the time the bulletin reaches the field the field will already be apprised of the fact that a clerical school is being held at Washington inasmuch as the field will have received the instructions ordering in the clerical employees, for the school at Washington.

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#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive Conference, with Messrs. Tolson, Ladd, Glavin, Lawler, Carson, Rosen and E. A. Tamm in attendance considered the question of the Bureau policy in the acceptance of applicant investigations from governmental agencies. The conference recommends that the Bureau decline to handle applican't investigations either prior to appointment or subsequent to appointment for any agency other than the Department of Justice with the exception of special requests made by the War and Navy Departments, the State Department and the National Defense Advisory Commission when those requests pertain particularly and poculiarly to matters affecting the national defense. In other words, the general policy of the Bureau will be not to accept cases requiring investigation of applicants for employment in other governmental agencies but will from time to time from the Departments specified accept requests for investigation when the subject matter of the inquiry relates immediately to the national defense.

The Conference further believes that requests received from organizations such as that headed by Nelson Rockefeller and similar agencies for an individual investigation of a man being considered for a special position as distinct from blanket requests for wholesale investigations should be acceded to.

If you approve this program, appropriate letters will be addressed to the Federal Communications Commission and to the National Investors Council of the Department of Commerce declining to conduct personnel investigations which they have currently requested.

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The Executive Conference on October 22, 1940, which was attended by Messra. Clogg, Nichols, Glavin, Rosen, Hince, Lawler, Tracy, Quinn Tana and Ladd, considered the suggestion of Mr. Coffey to the effect that a clerical employee be assigned to review all Eureau files on bombs and criminal explosions for the purpose of removing therefrom the names of any known makers of any explosive devices not indexed in the Single Finger-print Section, in line with Eureau letter of October 8, 1940.

Mesers. Clegg, Glavin, Rosen, Michols, Layler and Hinco were of the opinion that a clerk should spend about one day on this for the purpose of determining whether there was any worthwhile information in the Bureau files; that if any material of value was found, then the review of the files would be continued.

Messrs. Quinn Taxa, Tracy and Ledd were opposed to this in view of the fact that the field is already obtaining this information by contact with law enforcement agencies in towns of 190,000 or more population and that it was thought that spending time in reviewing old files in the Bureau would be a duplication of this work and further that there would be no way of knowing from the Bureau files whether an individual listed therein ten years ago was still alive and active, whereas more up-to-date information will be obtained from the survey presently being made in the field.

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The Executive Conference considered the proposed session of the FBI National Police Academy for representatives of Central and South American countries.

The Conference suggests that this session be held for a pariod of six weeks beginning January 27, 1941.

It is recommended that the school be held for five and one-half days each week, six hours per day. The daily schedule recommended is 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon and 2:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. from Monday through Friday and from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon on Saturday.

The Conference approved the attached curriculum. The Director will note that the curriculum represents the condensed and amended revision of the present curriculum for the FBI National Police Academy. Important phases of the program include the following:

- 1. Opening Exercises to which the Conference recommends that the Attorney General, the Secretary of State, Mr. Matthew F. McGuire, and diplomatic representatives of Central and South American countries be invited.
- 2. A full day's tour of the Bureau.
- 3. Addresses by Mr. Adolf A. Berle, Jr., Assistant Secretary of State; Dr. L. S. Rowe, Director General of the Pan American Union; Father Edmind Walsh, S. J., Vice President of Georgetown University; Henorable Harry Analinger, Commissioner, Bureau of Narcotics; Nelson Rockefeller, Coordinator of Commercial and Cultural Relations with Latin America; Mr. Burton Marsh, American Automobile Association, and Mr. Gurnea on "Traffic".

- 4. Three days of firearms training to begin with a lengthy daytime firearms demonstration and conclude with a night firearms demonstration. The Conference points out the necessity for an adequate number of firearms instructors to handle the supervision of the firing.
- 5. One day of Communications in Law Enforcement to include demonstrations of various types of radios and other communications facilities, two-way radio demonstrations in automobiles, and demonstrations of the numerous communications devices and methods.
- 6. One day of Training Methods and Operation of Police Training Schools.

The remainder of the subjects would deal with police organization and administration, law enforcement techniques, identification in scientific and technical matters, investigations, enforcement, and regulatory procedures.

Mr. Take has indicated the Director's desire to have a lecture on the subject "Penology" and steps will be taken to determine the availability of Nat Cohen.

The Director will observe that no provision is being made in the curriculum for gymnasium in view of the fact that the age, physical condition, and other factors concerning the individual representatives are not known to the Bureau.

The Conference was informed that the State Department would attempt to make arrangements to have the representatives from Central and South America of English speaking ability. If this is not possible in each instance, it was pointed out that an interpretor would be necessary.

There is also attached for approval a letter to Mr. Adolf A. Berle, Jr., Assistant Secretary of State, transmitting a copy of a proposed invitation letter to be forwarded by the Bureau to the proper officials of the Central and South American countries.

Taxm, Hince, Clavin and Nathan, considered the information submitted by Mr. Hathan concerning the possibility of housing more men in the FBI Barracks at Quantice. The Conference approved the suggestion that two additional beds be placed in each of the sixteen roces on the second and third floors, thereby making available a total additional number of thirty-two beds for Special Agent-Trainees. It was understood that an opinion would first be secured from the medical authorities at the Marine Corps Base in order that there would be no possibility of any intimation of overcrowding at a later date in the event colds or similar silments developed.

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#### MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIFFETOR

The Executive Conference, Messrs. E. A. Tame, Methan, Clegg, Ledd, Michals, Glavin, Resen, Tracy and Quinn Taxis being present, considered a suggestion which had been submitted to the effect that the Identification Division discontinue the enswering of fingerprint cards which have been searched against the files without revealing a previous record. The Conference was advised that at the present time, of course, the Identification Division enswers all fingerprint cards which are submitted to it whether or not those cards are identified with a record except in those specific cases in which the contributor has requested that answers reflecting a negative search not be submitted. For your information fingerprint cards which have not been identified are not answered to the War Department, to ONI and to some police organizations, nesely, the Berkeley, California Police Department.

It is further pointed out that the Bureau has precedent for adopting such a policy in that the California State Bureau does not answer any finger-print cards unless their search reveals a previous record.

The proposed change is simply to advise all contributors that unless they receive a reply to their fingerprint eard transmitted by them to the Identification Division it will mean that there is no record on file in the Identification Division.

The suggestion was divided into two parts. The first part had to do with the applicant fingerprint cards.

The Conference, with the exception of Mr. Clavin, was of the opinion that applicant fingerprint cards which are not identified with a previous record should not be answered. The Conference does not feel that this would reflect materially on the Bureau and it would natorially decrease the work of the Identification Division's Typing Section.

Messrs. Olegg. Nathan, E. A. Tamm, Hosen, Tracy and Quinn Tamm believe that the Bureau should adopt this policy and simply answer identifications effected on any type of fingerprint. Messrs. Nichols, Ladd and Glavin are opposed to the adoption of this suggestion. Mr. Tolson believes that all criminal prints should be answered, feeling that the Bureau will receive numerous inquiries concerning the possibility of records existing unless the police departments are advised promptly that no record was found in the files of the Bureau. He also feels that police departments may go into court and state that because a reply has not been received from the Bureau and because of the Bureau's new policy it is safe to assume that this individual does not have a criminal record, when acqually he may have a long criminal record.

It is noted that Mr. Clavin based his objections to both portions of the suggestion on the basis of the alien fingerprint cards, believing that the Bureau should answer all alien cards to the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Mr. Clavin does this with the thought in mind that no opportunity should be given these people to claim that we have not furnished a record.

It is pointed out that the Bureau will receive approximately three million five hundred thousand of these fingerprint cards and that, at the present time, there are one hundred sixty-five thousand on hand in the Identification Division. Only 2% of these cards are being identified with a previous record and the not answering of the non-idents would materially assist the Identification Division during this period of emergency.

Pending your decision concerning this matter a Bulletin has not been prepared to the contributors of the Identification Division. However, when the matter is decided a suitable Bulletin will be prepared and also a notice will be published promptly in the FBI law Enforcement Bulletin.

If you approve the majority report concerning the applicant fingerprint cards which also includes the alien fingerprint cards in which Wr. Tolson is in agreement, there is attached hereto a memorandum addressed to Mr. Matthew F. McGuire, the Assistant to the Attorney General, advising him that in the future the Alien Registration Division will only receive replies on those fingerprint and cards which are identified.

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The Executive Conference, consisting of Mesers. E. A. Tamm, Clegg, Nathan, Ladd, Quinn Tamm, Nichols, Rosen, Lawler, and Glavin, discussed the maintenance of the index cards concerning informants. The following matters were brought up for discussion:

number of letters had been turned over to him from various field offices showing informants developed in commarcial plants throughout the country, these informants in mome instances being paid informants and in others being in an unpaid status. It was further pointed out that in some instances the field divisions in reporting this information had just reported nine informants in one plant and ten in another, without giving names or any other detailed information concerning them. It was also pointed out to the Conference that in some instances the field offices were reporting general managers and other officials of the plant as informants.

The Conference was of the unanimous opinion that names should be furnished for each and every informant and that these plant informants should be included in our informant index file. The Conference instructed that the field be instructed to furnish the names of the informants so developed. The Conference also instructed that the names of officials of the plants not be included as informants and that the field should be advised that these officials are to be considered as contacts in line with previous information furnished to the field by the Bureau. The field will be notified concerning these matters if approved by the Director.

2. The question was raised as to the following of field activities in developing informants and answering inquiries from the field regarding informants and the authorization for payment thereof.

The Conference was of the unanimous opinion that this was the duty of the Investigative, National Defense, and SIS Divisions

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and that after all the arrangements have been made for the employment of an informant or the maintaining of an informant in a non-pay status this information should be furnished to the Chief Clerk's Office for inclusion in the informants index file.

For the Director's information, the index files have been set up and are maintained under lock and key at all times. An accumulation of data which has been secured from the field and which was not made up in index form at the times these records were turned over to the Chief Clerk's Office is being worked on on a full-time basis at this time.

Tamm, Trany, Nichols, Rosen, Ladd, Hince, Lawler, Quinn Tamm, and Glavin, considered a communication received from SAC Hallford of the Little Rock Office, wherein he suggests that the Bureau establish the policy of applicants submitting their applications in duplicate so that when they are referred for examination the duplicate application can be referred to the field office examining the applicant so that the information will be on hand in the event a character and fitness investigation must be made.

The Executive Conference considered the inquiry made by the Los Angeles Division concerning the availability of Eurosu instructors for an FBI Folice school at Pozona, California. RE: State Court Statistics

Reference is made to the Executive Conference memorandum dated Hovember 3, 1940, concerning the compilation of State Court statistics.

AS you know, the statistical section compiles the manual report chosing Dureau statistics concerning convictions, acquittale, fines, savings, and recoveries, in connection with Bureau cases. This information is used in the Annual Report of the Bureau and of the Automory General. In addition, this section compiles a report reflecting convictions in State Courts under certain limited conditions. Semerally, when a Bureau representative testifies in a State Court proceeding or evidence collected by this Bureau is turned over to the State procedure. Also, all State Court statistics relative to the State procedure. Also, all State Court statistics relative to the Eddarding bank robbery and theft of government directs are recorded in order that the special tabulations relative to those categories may be combineed in the same form as during the past several years. In addition, State Court statistics are recorded in unlawful flight to avoid prospection cases when the fugitive has been located by the Europe.

The State Court statistics are not employed in the Eureau report transmitted to the Department for inclusion in the report of the Attorney Ceneral, and it is not believed novisable to do so, inequals at the presentation of such figures to show achievements of the Bureau would require considerable explanation. On the other hand, it is believed highly desirable that such figures be compiled in order to properly represent the Eureau's estivities in the fields mentioned above. To illustrate, the report of Eureau statistics for the 1940 fiscal year propered for inclusions in the Attorney Guaral's Report reflected only 7 Federal Court convictions under the unlawful flight to avoid presecution statists. In addition to this there were, as reflected by the compilation of State Court

statistics, al State Court convictions in cases where the PNI located the fugitives in unlawful flight to avoid prosecution cases, there being no Federal prosecution. If such information were included in the Durenu's report as presented in the report of the Attorney General, it is probable it would lead to some criticism of the Durenu for taking credit for State Court convictions; however, the information is valuable to the Burenu insecuch as it will emable the Surenu to give a fuller accounting of work done in connection with unlawful flight to avoid prosecution cases in the event impairios are made by Congressional Countities or other participal groups.

At a meeting of the Executive Conference on November 26, 1940, attended by Messrs. Telson, Mathan, Glavin, Rosen, Tracy, Quinn Temm and Ladd, the memorandum of Special Agent B. B. Miller requesting copies of type standards for typewriters for the use of the Intelligence Unit set up within the Colombian Army was considered.

However, the Conference recommended unanimously that specimens of the German typewriters, numbering some five or mix types, together with the chart which the Laboratory has prepared as to the general characteristics of the standard machines should be furnished to the Intelligence Unit of the Colombian Army through the Special Agent stationed in that territory.

In the event you approve, this material, numbering some six or seven charts, will be forwarded to the Agent in that district.



The Executive Conference consisting of Messrs. Tolson, Tamm, Nathan, Ladd, Tracy, Rosen, Drayton, Nichols, Quinn Tamm, and Glavin considered a communication addressed to the Director by Wade H. Alley, Clerk in the Chief Clerk's Office, regarding notification by telegram to the Bureau of arrivals and departures of Special Agents and clerical employees on transfer.

It was pointed out to the Conference that at the present time the majority of this information is transmitted to the Bureau by letter; however, in many instances letters are not forwarded to the Bureau promptly, and it is believed that the transmittal of telegrams can be handled more expeditiously. Mr. Alley further points out that in view of the increasing investigative personnel of the Bureau and the greater necessity for following up transfers, it is believed that it would be most advantageous to the Bureau to have this information transmitted telegraphically. This telegraphic notification would not supersede the form communication which now is forwarded to the Bureau listing the property, address, telephone number, and relationship of the person to be notified in case of emergency. It was further pointed out to the Conference that there is sometimes delay in receiving letters pertaining to the arrivals and departures of field employees and in many instances it is necessary for the Chief Clerk's Office to telegraphically communicate with the field to ascertain whether such and such an employee has proceeded on transfer or whether he has arrived at his new office of. assignment. This, of course, necessitates a telegraphic communication from the field, responding to the Bureau's inquiry.

Messrs. Nathan, E. A. Tamm, and Tolson are op osed to issuing any instructions that the arrivals and departures of Agents be reported to the Bureau by telegram, Messrs. Nathan and E. A. Tamm being of the opinion that it is a routine administrative matter handled in the Chief Clerk's office and if such information is not received immediately there is no particular harm done. Mr. Tolson is of the opinion that the Bureau might be criticized for utilizing telegraph service in cases of this kind.

The majority of the Conference recommends that such information be reported to the Bureau by telegram.

The Executives Conference, consisting of Mesers. Tolson, Glavin, E. A. Tamm, Q. Tamm, Nichols, Tracy, Ladd, Rosen, Forworth and Nathan, considered the possibility of resuming inservice training.

After some discussion the Conference, with the exception of Mr. Tolson, was of the opinion that inservice training should not be resumed at this time.

Mr. Tolson was of the opinion that it should be resumed after the forthcoming military officers school, which begins January 13th, for a period of four weeks.

Those opposing the resumption of inservice training were of the opinion that this would be inedvisable, first, because of the emergency conditions confronting the Eureau in the field, requiring the sending to the field, at the earliest possible moment, of all possible sid; and, second, because this action would appear definitely undesirable in the face of the problem confronting the Bureau in handling Selective Service evaders, which the Bureau is unable to do at the present time because of lack of funds.

In addition, Mr. Nathan pointed out that in his opinion the training division is not equipped to handle the additional work involved in the resumption of inservice schools at the present time.
