FBI FOIPA Addendum

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) 5 U.S.C. § 552(c). Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records is itself a classified fact protected by FOIA exemption (b)(1) and/or would reveal intelligence sources, methods, or activities protected by exemption (b)(3) [50 USC § 3024(i)(1)]. - (iii) Requests for Confidential Informant Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of confidential informant records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F) [5 U.S.C.§ \$ 552 (b)(7)(D), (b)(7)(E), and (b)(7)(F)] and Privacy Act exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C.§ 552a (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records would reveal confidential informant identities and information, expose law enforcement techniques, and endanger the life or physical safety of individuals. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.

Part 3: General Information:

- (i) Record Searches and Standard Search Policy. The Record/Information Dissemination Section (RIDS) searches for reasonably described records by searching systems, such as the Central Records System (CRS), or locations where responsive records would reasonably be found. The CRS is an extensive system of records consisting of applicant, investigative, intelligence, personnel, administrative, and general files compiled by the FBI per its law enforcement, intelligence, and administrative functions. The CRS spans the entire FBI organization, comprising records of FBI Headquarters, FBI Field Offices, and FBI Legal Attaché Offices (Legats) worldwide; Electronic Surveillance (ELSUR) records are included in the CRS. The standard search policy is a search for main entity records in the CRS. Unless specifically requested, a standard search does not include a search for reference entity records, administrative records of previous FOIPA requests, or civil litigation files.
 - Main Entity Records created for individuals or non-individuals who are the subjects or the focus of an investigation
 - Reference Entity Records- created for individuals or non-individuals who are associated with a case but are not known subjects or the focus of an investigation
- (ii) FBI Records. Founded in 1908, the FBI carries out a dual law enforcement and national security mission. As part of this dual mission, the FBI creates and maintains records on various subjects; however, the FBI does not maintain records on every person, subject, or entity.
- (iii) Foreseeable Harm Standard. As amended in 2016, the Freedom of Information Act provides that a federal agency may withhold responsive records only if: (1) the agency reasonably foresees that disclosure would harm an interest protected by one of the nine exemptions that FOIA enumerates, or (2) disclosure is prohibited by law (5 United States Code, Section 552(a)(8)(A)(i)). The FBI considers this foreseeable harm standard in the processing of its requests.
- (iv) Requests for Criminal History Records or Rap Sheets. The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division provides Identity History Summary Checks often referred to as a criminal history record or rap sheet. These criminal history records are not the same as material in an investigative "FBI file." An Identity History Summary Check is a listing of information taken from fingerprint cards and documents submitted to the FBI in connection with arrests, federal employment, naturalization, or military service. agents promptly swept into locality and picked up women and children of departed men, as well as others, including all local key figures in secret anti-Castro underground, thus effectively preventing possible uprising to assist invading forces.

No fighting took place which could be observed from Naval Base and saw no jet plans of Cuban Air Force, but modern Russian tanks were observed within five miles of the Base.

In spite of Castro's success in beating off invasion, it is not felt he will make any serious move to get U.S. out of Guantanamo Bay Naval Base until his government's financial condition has been improved. Castro now gets about \$150,000 weekly in badly needed U.S. dollars by taking them from Cuban workers leaving Base in exchange for Cuban pesos.

As for Cuban workers on Base, about 80 of them immediately left to serve in Castro's militia on receiving word of invasion.

ONI has identified 55 Cuban G-2 agents among workers on Base; has had seven of these removed from payroll; but presently feels it is better to allow other 48 to remain on theory it is more practical to watch them than to try to identify those it is believed would very likely succeed them.

Swan Island anti-Castro radio of Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) was not as effective among Cuban listeners as had been hoped, and in fact it became object of some ridicule among Cubans because of factual inaccuracies it broadcast. No examples were cited.

Even if Castro is overthrown by anti-Communists, his influence in Cuba and Latin America will be felt for at least ten years thereafter. In this connection Castro has an intensive program going to eradicate illiteracy in Cuba within a year. Teachers have been sent into all areas of Cuba in this effort and even old people are receiving training, being exposed to textbooks which attack "U.S. Imperialism" and describe Russia as "Our friend." Later it is anticipated these teachers will move into other areas of Latin America to continue such teaching.

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

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- 2. Contrary to some reports, the Cuban anti-CASTRO troops fought valiantly and inflicted casualties on the CASTRO Cubans at the rate of six or eight to one, and this was despite the fact that they were harassed by strafing activity from the air by CASTRO fighter planes, and also despite the fact that the invading Cubans had been unable to unload the main part of their armament and ammunition.
- 3. The reaction of the CASTRO militiamen was not underestimated. The first 70 militiamen encountered in the immediate beach area immediately came over to the side of the anti-CASTRO Cubans. There were further very visible signs of panic in the CASTRO troops each time an anti-CASTRO B-26 made a bombing and strafing run over the columns of militiamen and tanks. However, the anti-CASTRO invaders were unable to mount and sustain an attack. If they had had fighter cover, the mass defections would have occurred as expected.
- 4. The anti-CASTRO airmen spotted 70 truckloads of militiamen, mobile artillery and Russian tanks when they were yet many miles from the beachhead, and with fighter coverage they would never have arrived at the battle area since instead of being shot down by CASTRO fighters, the B-26's could have bombed and strafed successfully these columns and material.
- 5. Of particular interest to the Bureau regarding any possible internal security leaks, the CIA agents advised that the beach area was deserted upon arrival, and there was no indication that CASTRO had advance notice of where the invasion was to strike.

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6. The change in plan originally made whereby the United States refused to furnish fighter cover occurred at about the level of ADLAI STEVENSON and CHESTER BOWLES. This change marked the difference in victory and defeat. To those responsible for making the President change the plan goes the responsibility for the death and capture of practically the entire pro-American, anti-CASTRO invading forces.

7. CIA agents concluded that they entertain no doubt that with proper fighter coverage the invasionary forces would now be in Havana, and the CASTRO forces would have been completely routed.

Several excellent contacts of the Bureau who were on the beachhead or on an invasive boat or in the anti-CASTRO air force have voluntarily sought contact with Special Agents of the FBI to give their firsthand appraisals of the reasons for the failure of the anti-CASTRO expedition.

There have been some minor criticisms of general planning, of failure of the frogmen to adequately mark the coral reefs at the entrance to the Bahia de los. Cochinos, and of providing equipment inferior to that provided by the Russians and Czechoslovakians to the CASTRO troops; however, there has been uniform agreement that training procedures were good and unanimous agreement among all the anti-CASTRO forces who have returned that with only brief fighter cover by six or eight United States jets, the invasion would have been totally successful. For this failure, Cubans blame CIA for making

deceitful promises, since they are not aware that the deviation from the plan to furnish fighter cover was made at top level. These Cubans state that they are more than anxious to return and fight again, but each survivor says he will only go if the invasion is planned by United States military men and United States fighter coverage previously knocks out all CASTRO Air Force planes. None of those interviewed want the United States to invade Cuba alone, and by far the most of them want to be divided into small bands and mixed with American forces to guide, interpret and fight with them as allies.

It is interesting to note that not one returned Cuban fighter has any confused opinion regarding the difference between the FBI and CIA; all are aware that the FBI did not participate in any phase of this operation. All of the returned Gubans believed the United States suffered an additional serious blow to its prestige, especially in Latin Aperica, and in the entire free world to a lesser degree.

The CIA agents expressed appreciation for all the assistance and local cooperation given them by the Miemi Office of the FBI, and expressed a desire to continue to operate on the same cooperative basis.

It was also stated that President Kennedy has ordered that only native Cubans can be used on the landing missions. This, of course, is for the purpose of being able to deny that U. S. citizens are violating Neutrality and related statutes. The ammunition, guns, fire bombs, etc. are in sealed, metal containers which are waterproof()

They are assigned to guerrilla groups on the continent not in a command capacity, but as ordinary soldiers in the presumption that their revolutionary zeal and professional competence will thrust them into positions of command . by the acclaim of their indigenous guerrilla com-Top priority countries for Cuba's program for revolution are Venezuela, Brazil and Argentina.
- d. PGI methods of operation abroad are sophisticated in form, clearly reflecting Soviet tutelage, but very often sloppy in execution and dishonest in presentation to their Headquarters in Havana. All of the elements of tradecraft are prescribed in the conduct of an operation, for example, replete with detailed checklists to be completed to ensure its security (examples are attached). In practice the Cubans individually seem indolent in measuring up to these standards and appear very often to cut corners. In reporting to their Headquarters they will report the recruitment and effective control of a person with whom in fact they are



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ofttimes only in casual contact. They seem prone to the selection and recruitment of female agents. From the security side they are heavily indoctrinated in the fear of audio and visual surveillance. Among their primary targets in France, for example, beyond the needs of the support structure, are reporting sources in Latin American embassies. We would imagine that this preoccupation with Latin American diplomatic installations would extend to their activities in, say, New York.

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most clandestine manner, from behind a fenced enclosure, and under the guise of a radio electronics experiment operation for the U. S. Army. Access to their buildings and space is normally not permitted as such is not needed. Approximately a year ago the SAC and Supervisor paid a courtesy call on the new Chief of Station, THEODORE SHACKLEY, in view of the fact he had not called at the FBI office as had his predecessors. During the visit the number of persons with whom the SAC and the supervisor were in contact appeared to be held to a minimum. Their covert officials are not even acquainted with all the overt officials on a personal basis.

The reason this is brought out is to show that a cover operation such as this - the only one of its kind in the United States of this magnitude - does not lend itself to a close association with the various officials or even to a knowledge of their identity. The normal procedure for contacting and transmitting business with covert CIA is for either that agency or this Bureau to telephone the liaison man and set forth what the question or problem is, and then for CIA to come either to the FBI office or to meet at a previously agreed upon spot, such as a parking lot, etc., and the business is transacted in the car or in a temporarily rented apartment, etc., being utilized by CIA for individual interviews.

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

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

On 3-12-68, WGBS, Miami, Florida, telephonically advised that he and a companion had taken a partially submerged suitcase from the water from the foot of Pier 4, Dinner Key Marina, Coconut Grove, Miami. He advised further that the suitcase contained numerous charts of Florida and Cuban coastal waters, a notebook in Spanish listing U. S. weapons, a coded page and code breakdown, etc.

on 3-12-68, were interviewed aboard the "Satori", Slip 42, Pier 4, Dinner Key Marina. They advised that a short time previously they had extracted an overnight brown suitcase, about two-thirds submerged, from the foot of Pier 4. Neither had any information concerning the owner of the suitcase or how it came to be in the water at Pier 4.

The suitcese, a leather overnight bag of good quality, though battered, was taken with its contents to the Miami Office. Its noteworthy contents included an HRT-2A Beacon Transmitter; Field Instruction Manual; 3" x 6" memo pad listing equipment (ammunition; food, explosives, radio, paddles, etc.) evidently for a raiding party; various charts of offshore Florida and Cuban waters; instruction sheet for letter code (3 letter combinations); sheets of radio transmission signals and meanings; 3-ring notebook with instruction sheets and numerous U. S. small arms and mortars, instructions re explosives, incendiarism, sabotage, guerrilla warfare, invasion and escape, etc. (this notebook in Spanish language); loose pages detailing preparation for reconnaissance operations (Spanish language); two-page Spanish language booklet on raid planning; address book

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On 3-15-68, the suitcase and its contents were turned over to CIA, Covert, Miami.

It is noted that who originally turned the material over to the Miami Office, has since been in daily telephonic contact in an effort to obtain information regarding this matter. He also has indicated that he claims a "salvage right" to the suitcase and its contents, as it appears to him that they have been abandoned in the water. He asked that the suitcase and its contents, therefore, be returned to him following Miami Office examination of the material.

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An inventory of the suitcase contents and a list of the names, addresses and telephone numbers appearing in the address book mentioned above, are being placed in the Sub 1-A section of this file.

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
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

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

THE CUBAN SITUATION

SYNOPSIS:

We have been endeavoring to obtain from Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) the nature and extent of its relationship with Cuban exilés in the United States since the ill-fated Cuban invasion. Prior contacts disclosed CIA was waiting for policy decisions. On June 21, 1961, Liaison Agent received briefing from CIA which indicates there is almost total lack of any fixed program or direction on the part of the Administration. According to CIA, State has been given the responsibility of dealing with exile organizations in the United States. CIA is permitted to run operations inside Cuba. There allegedly is considerable confusion within State because responsibilities have not been fixed and no firm program established. Briefing disclosed CIA trained many Cuban exiles to assume internal security duties if the invasion had succeeded. Such exiles still in the United States could be potential sources for Bureau but we need additional information before we take further action.

ACTION:

1. Liaison will continue to follow developments through contacts in other agencies.

2. The Liaison Agent will obtain from CIA additional particulars concerning the Cuban exiles who were trained by the Agency to handle internal security functions within Cuba.

DETAILS:

Since the ill-fated Cuban invasion of April, 1961, the Bureau has been endeavoring to obtain from CIA an accurate description of that Agency's interest in and relationship with Cuban exiles (including organizations in the United States). Up to date, information received from CIA has disclosed that the Agency has been unable to describe its objectives and interests because it was waiting for policy decisions at White Money and State Department level. On June 21, 1961, furnished the following information to the maison agent in answer to several questions introduced by the Bureau Agent.

rankly admitted that at the present time CIA's responsibilities and interests as they relate to Cuban exiles in the United States are nonexistent. CIA has been specifically informed, through the White House, that for the present all dealings with Cuban exile organizations are to be handled through the office of Arturo Morales-Carrion, Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Latin American Affairs. This new instruction has been interpreted by CIA as applying to any programs or projects involving exiles in activities of a political action nature. Furthermore, CIA assumes that any guidance or assistance to be given to exile groups should come from State. As far as CIA is concerned the new policy, although outlined in rather vague terms, has practically barred the Agency from any involvement with exile organizations in the United States. In addition, CIA feels that it is not to get involved with any exile leaders.

CIA is permitted by State to have dealings with organizations who can furnish evidence that they actually are operating within Cuba. In such situations CIA is to limit its activity to running operations within Cuba with the assistance of the particular exile group. Actually, little of this has been taking place.

commented that the above-described policy is
not working from a practical standpoint and United States intelligence operations as directed or planned against the Castro Government are either nonexistent or in a chaotic state. He stated that Horales-Carrien has done nothing constructive, primarily because no firm line or objectives have been established at the Secretary of State level or higher. CIA in turn has not been engaged in any significant intelligence operations because of the existing confusion, misunder-standing, and absence of a clear-cut United States Government program.

CIA officials regularly have been conferring with State Department regarding various situations which have arisen. For example, CIA assumed that State wanted to handle all propaganda programs directed against Castro; this would include the operation of radio Swan in the Caribbean (Radio station established by CIA several months ago to beam anti-Castro breadcasts to Cuba.) State suggested that the United States Information Agency (USIA) could take over this responsibility. USIA allegedly has refused to take

the job. CIA has asked State what should be done with equipment collected for the invasion. No firm decision has been made. Exile leaders such as Jose Mire Cardona have been asking for funds. CIA has referred him to State. The State Department has no appropriations for the exiles. Consequently Cardona deals with State but is being paid by CIA. The Agency is maintaining contact with certain exiles who are in a position to furnish information which might assist CIA in handling intelligence operations inside Cuba. For example, the identities of friends and relatives who might be cooperative can be useful to CIA.

With regard to paramilitary operations stated the Agency is not to become involved in any "invasion-type" activity. CIA is free to promote landings in Cuba for the purpose of sabetage, intelligence collection, or effecting the escape of defectors. Some of these operations will require a limited amount of training in the use of firearms, explosives, etc. Although lid not elaborate, CIA apparently does maintain a roster of Cuban exiles who potentially could be used for such operations in Cuba.

With regard to the White House position, the individual who has been "calling the shots" appears to be He has not come up with anything constructive. In addition, Adolph Berle periodically gets involved in the Cuban situation. Quite often his ideas conflict with those of State officials. quoted an unidentified State Department official as saying: "You tell us what is going on."

There was one phase of CIA's program against Castro which will require some Bureau attention. The Agency groomed many Cuban exiles in the Mami area (estimated 75 - 100) to handle internal security investigative-type of duties in Cuba if the invasion had succeeded. Our Mami Office very likely has been in contact with several of these individuals. However, a more complete appraisal of this group might suggest potential sources of information for the Bureau. We do need more information before becoming involved with such persons.

Captioned matter dealt with Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) operation directed against Castro regime. 7/18/61 issue of "Look" magazine contains article entitled anatomy of a Failure" which deals with this operation. The article was written by Tan Szulc, a diplomatic correspondent for Latin-American affairs for the "New York Times." Article does not contain any pertinent factual data on the operation not already known to us. Following is summary of data appearing in article:

Anti-Castro invasion was doomed from the beginning by misleading intelligence reports, faulty planning, disregard for political realities and astonishing ignorance of subversion procedures. CIA field agents who planned the invasion kept their superiors in the dark about many aspects of the planning. CIA eliminated anti-Castro organizations inside Cuba from the operational picture and thus destroyed the very machinery that might have brought about Castro's downfall. ignored President Kennedy's directives excluding followers of former Cuban Dictator Batista from the Cuban Liberation Army. CIA backed right-wing groups in connection with its operation without consulting President Kennedy or State Department. Plans of the anti-Castro underground in Cuba were not coordinated with the planned invasion of Cuba. In the last week of March, 1961, it was an open secret in Miami that invasion of Cuba was approaching and somebody had decided on a single-landing attack. When the invasion did take place, not a bridge or railroad line was destroyed to prevent Castro from bringing his forces to the invasion point.

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Castro's tiny air force was not destroyed and quickly gained control of the air. Castro's aircraft sunk the Liberty Ship carrying all the communications equipment, the entire fifth battalion of the invasion force and stores of weapons. The Cuban invaders expected sea and air support by United States forces. The orginal invasion plans called for participation in the invasion by United States aircraft and ships, but two weeks before the attack President Kennedy decided to let the Cubans go it alone.

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

You should, therefore, when appropriate refer a requesting agency to CIA when information appears in our files indicating and interest by CIA in such an individual in connection with either of the above programs. This should be the usual referral and no mention should be made in the referral in either the program.

As a result of the ensuing discussion CIA officials advised that the following instructions would be issued to the Miami Office of CIA: "As usen as CIA receives word or evidence of the presence of a Cuban agent in the United States, CIA will notify the ABI representative in Miami immediately (immediately is understood to mean within not more than 24 hours) unless special circumstances (lack of communication) prevail making such notification within 24 hours impossible. Upon notification to the IBI, the case as then known will be discussed and a mutual agreement will be reached as to how to pursue the case there after. Each Miami office will immediately notify its own headquarters as soon as possible in order that there can be, if necessary, wegotiations at the headquarters level."

In explanation of the above, CIA officials noted that undoubtedly notification to your office would be within a matter of minutes but felt that instructions for same day notification would ouffice in order to cover communications problems. These same officials noted that discussions called for in the instructions may be required in cases where the following may arises

(a) A Cuban agent arrives in V. S. for short period and

(b) A Guban agent errives in U.S. and his instructions proceed to another country.

The Eureau feels that your present arrangements with Till at Hami are adequate to fulfill Eureau's responsibilities and comply with its investigative jurisdiction. Ills at High should be requested to simultaneously furnish CIA information supplied your office by INS relative to identity of Cuban intelligence agents among the arriving Cuban refugees.

For your information, INS has advised the Bureau that every effort will be taken to insure that Eureau is promptly furnished information which may come to the attention of that Service relative to the presence in this country of Cuban intelligence agents. INS has stated it regrets any delays which may have occurred in Bureau notification in the past and has taken corrective steps to insure against any recurrence.

If any particular difficulties are encountered in carrying out the above instructions, sutel details for Bureau consideration as to need for additional contacts with CIA or IIIS at headquarters level.

This long-established policy and understanding between the FBI and CIA was most recently enunciated, so far as the Miami CIA office is concerned, when the matter was discussed with CIA in Washington by liaison on November 8. 1962, as set forth in detail in Bureau airtel to Miami dated November 14, 1963, under the above caption. On April 29, 1963, the SS "American Surveyor" arrived at Port Everglades, Florida, from Havana, Cuba, with 668 Cuban refugees aboard. To date it has been determined that four of these refugees were recruited by Cuban G-2 prior to their departure from Cuba to perform intelli-Mence Twissions in the United States. He said she was thereafter turned over to the CIA Covert office for detailed debriefing. He said he understood a copy of the report which would be prepared by the CIA Covert office would be furnished to the Miami Office of the FBI.

It is noted on April 30,1963, CIA was notified by

INS of this case and on May 9, 1963, we learned of its existence. CIA upon its own initiative did not inform us of it.

Since they will not be able to turn her over to Miami agents until May 10 or 11, 1963, this will result in subject being turned over to us on the 11th or 12th day after discovery.

Attention is invited to the possibility that if CIA is challenged on this particular case, they may plead the "third agency rule" and attempt to disclaim any responsibility by saying that it was up to INS to notify this office.

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It is felt, however, that CTA should have turned this case over to us more promptly, based upon their knowledge from direct interviews they have had since April 30, 1963, with this woman.

On the morning of May 10, 1963, SAC GRAPP and |had a conference with| ing the fact that neither INS nor CIA had immediately disseminated to this office the facts of case number 4, referred to above, which case, as indicated, had originally been discovered by INS on April 30, 1963. and INS locally have been very cooperlative. expressed extreme regret that this office had not been immediately advised. He stated he personally first learned of this case during the week of May 5, 1963, but did not realize that no one had advised the FBI until May 9, 1963, at which time he immediately took steps to do so. He was queried as to the working relationship between originally received this information, and CIA. He stated works out of the Regional INS Office at Richmond and is assigned to the Miami INS Office for administrative purposes and that his duties consist of maintaining a very close relationship with CIA. I asked him if this was a most unusual relationship and he replied in the affirma-I reminded him of the FBI jurisdiction in the internal security field, specifically the handling of double agents

in this country. There should not be the slightest doubt in his

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mind as to the necessity of promptly advising us of any pertinent information that comes to the attention of INS.

He said he wanted to be of all possible help and he would immediately telephone his regional office. Within a half hour returned to my office and stated that upon instructions from his regional office in Richmond. Virginia, he was issuing written instructions to that in any similar cases in the future he must immediately inform the District Director of the case. The District Director, or whoever is acting for him, in most cases will immediately notify the FBI. He stated that if the FBI did not want CIA to be informed of the case he would issue such instructions to implement this procedure. him that our request at this time was to insure that in each and every case the FBI was immediately advised. I told him that if, in the future, we would like him to withhold the dissemination of such information to any other individuals or agencies, he would receive a specific request. He said that in the absence of a specific request by the FBI, effective immediately, the District Director of INS would make a decision as to whether the local CIA would or would not the advised simultaneously of the discovery of a double agent.

The Bureau is requested to advise its views on this matter, bearing in mind the excellent working relationship with and other INS officials, it again being noted that has an "unusual" working relationship between INS and CIA.

As reflected above, in all probability CIA does not know of the existence of case number 1, which is being handled by the Bureau; and the three other cases listed above with which CIA is familiar, it appears there has been a lapse of time on the part of CIA informing this office of the presence of Cuban intelligence agents in this country.

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The crux of this matter appears to lie in the meaning of the word "immediately" as used in the understanding between the FBI and CIA that the latter is obliged to immediately advise us when information is received concerning foreign agents operating in this country. If the Bureau feels there has not been "immediate notification" within the framework of existing operating policy, it is suggested consideration be given to discussing this matter with CIA in Washington.

It is to be noted that for the successful handling of a double agent by the FBI, it is far better to be the first and only agency to interview the person in detail, as distinguished from getting the agent second hand at a later date. Obviously, better guidance and development would normally follow if the FBI conducted the interview immediately after the discovery.

At this time it should also be resolved as to how and when, if at all, the FBI is to advise CIA of its discovery of a Cuban agent as set forth in case number 1. If CIA is to be advised, it should be determined what information, and how much, should be furnished to CIA and whether it should be on the local level or through Washington headquarters.

The Bureau is also requested to determine whether this office and CIA should interview such an agent alternately during the early stages, they for the purpose of developing information regarding intelligence matters inside Cuba, and the FBI for the purpose of developing a double agent.
