- COO/MDC Webpage Post-Conference Summary The 2009 Worldwide Mission Directors Conference was a tremendous success! Held from November 30 thru December 4 at the Lansdowne Resort in Lansdowne, VA, over 120 Mission Directors and other Agency senior managers participated in an intense week-long examination of the Administration's top development priorities and the Agency's role in foreign policy. Topics discussed ranged from the QDDR and PSD processes to the USAID mission of the future to the people, skills, and systems we will need to be effective in an era of country-led development. Notable speakers included New York Times journalist Thomas Friedman, presidential advisor Gayle Smith, former USAID Administrator J. Brian Atwood, and CENTCOM Commander General David Petraeus. For information about the Mission Directors Conference, including conference agenda, session notes, videos of keynote speeches, and photos, please visit the conference website. A collaboration space for continued exploration of topics and themes that emerged from the conference is also available via the website, and Mission Directors and senior managers are encouraged to utilize this space to continue dialogue on these issues.

- The Administrator's Survey 2008: We Are Listening to You

Listening to customers is one of the basic rules of a successful business. After a hiatus of three years, USAID's Administrator launched the customer service survey last fall. The Survey is an important management tool and is intended to provide direct feedback to AID/Washington on the quality of the support it provides the Agency. Of civil service employees, thirty percent (356 responses) responded; of Foreign Service, thirty one percent (431 responses) responded; and, unfortunately, only eight percent (315) response among Foreign Service Nationals. An additional 220 responses came from USPSCs and institutional contractors

Highlights:

- Senior management dedicated considerable time in reviewing survey results and identifying actions that would address some of the key issues raised in comments and ratings. The top ranked units were particularly noted for their attention to the survey-a good indication, maybe, of why they get such high ratings.
- Not unexpectedly, more negative comments were received by far than positive, even for the top ranked units
- What USAID/Washington needs to:
 - Communicate better, within bureaus, across bureaus, with the field
 - Improve responsiveness, become more timely and reliable
 - Staff its AID/W functions with adequate levels

Structure of results: Comments and ratings were

sought on each bureau and office in USAID/Washington under different service quality criteria. Because of its recent establishment, the COO was not included but will be in future surveys. Office of Security chose to conduct its own survey, posted on its website.

The COO provided support to most of the Washington bureaus and offices in summarizing comments and describing proposed actions. In the interest of identifying and sharing good practice, we also identified systems and actions being used by individual units that might be useful for other units of the agency as a whole. For each bureau and independent office, we have posted both the ratings and summary of comments, and the proposed actions and best practices. Office of Human Resources, the Management Bureau, and the Executive Secretariat requested to review and summarize comments on their own; their summaries are therefore in different format but do include ratings and reference to comments and actions to be taken. Highlights of issues that were shared agency wide were presented to the Senior Staff, and are summarized in a power point. Results are posted on this website by bureau/office.

- For FY 2011, policy groups, composed of regional and pillar bureau representation, prepared ten policy papers with resource recommendations for the agency's highest priority issues. The COO provided these papers to State/F last week, they can be found here.
- The second meeting of the White House Council on Women and Girls was held on Thursday, May 21, Representatives from approximately 30 departments/agencies participated in this meeting. The Council's Chair, Ms. Valerie Jarrett, emphasized President Obama's commitment to policies and programs that provide greater opportunity and equity for women and girls, both domestically and internationally. The Council's first major milestone is to present an action plan to the President by August 17. Individual departments and agencies will prepare plans which will be compiled or summarized in the overall plan. EGAT's Office of Women in Development, the Office of Human Resources, the Front Office, and the COO collaborated in preparing an initial assessment of our programs and policies relating to women and girls, available here, and we will be starting on our agency action plan shortly.
- M/MPBP recently gave a Presentation to Senior Staff on <u>Strengthening Evaluation at USAID</u> that we think many would find very helpful.

ABOUT THE CFBCI

Uzbek boy gets fresh water from a well in Kyrgyztan. USAID's Peaceful Communities initiative has rebuilt water and gas distribution systems, as well as improving schools and creating multi-ethnic sports teams and children's festivals.

The Center for Faith-Based and Community Initiatives (CFBCI) at USAID was established in 2002 to create a level playing field for faith and community-based organizations when competing for USAID funding.

The CFBCI works

- 1. Serve as a bridge between faith and community-based nongovernment organizations and government.
- 2. Increase the capacity of faith & community based non-governmental organizations or NGOs to better compete for funding opportunities.
- 3. Eliminate barriers to faith and community-based organizations.
- Increase collaboration among the people and organizations addressing some of the greatest social service needs in our world today.
- The CFBCI works to ensure that faith and community-based organizations are properly informed about the guidelines that they will need to follow to apply and successfully administer federal funding. The Center also works to address legal and policy issues and educate USAID staff about the initiative. Additionally, it links faith and community-based organizations with capacity building resources that can be helpful to them.
- The Center supplies information and training, but it does not make the decisions about which groups will be funded. Those decisions are made through procedures established by each grant program, generally involving a competitive process. No grant funding is set aside for faith-based organizations. Instead, the Faith-Based and Community inhitative creates a "Bevel-playing field" for faith-based as well as other community organizations to compete so that they can work with the government to meet the needs of communities throughout the developing world.
- The role faith-based and community organizations can play in meeting development objectives is critical, and providing technical assistance for new and potential partners is important for a level playing field. Communicating regularly with faith-based and community groups about conferences, funding opportunities, and regulations regarding provision of U.S. Government assistance is essential.
- The Center encourages collaboration between groups with similar objectives and goals and regularly highlights conferences and funding opportunities that may be beneficial to FBCOs through our CFBCI Newsletter. ABOUT THE GDA:

The Private Sector Alliances' Global Development Alliance (GDA) methodology is USAID's commitment to change the way we implement our assistance mandate. GDA mobilizes the ideas, efforts and resources of governments, businesses and civil society by forging public-private alliances to stimulate economic growth, develop businesses and workforces, address health and environmental issues, and expand access to education and technology

In the 1970s, 70 percent of resource flows from the United States to the developing world were from official development assistance and 30 percent were private. Today, 85 percent of resource flows from the United States to the developing world are private and 15 percent are public. These changes in flows reflect the emergence of the private for-profit sector and the non-governmental sector as significant participants in the development process. The Global Development Alliance approach responds to this changed environment, and it extends USAID's reach and effectiveness in meeting development objectives by combining its strengths with the resources and capabilities of other prominent actors

Alliances incorporate the breadth of USAID and partner resources to arrive at solutions only available through pooled efforts. The resources united are as diverse as the alliances themselves, including technology and intellectual property rights, market creation, best practices, policy influence, in-country networks, and expertise in development programs ranging from international trade to biodiversity protection. Together, the combination of complementary assets has encouraged innovative approaches, more effective problem solving and deeper impact. 

Users needing guidance on logging in, navigating the menu, and using the system to initiate their registration for training should refer to the LMS Reference Guide. Supervisors needing assistance with how to approve training should refer to the Supervisor Reference Card.

First time users of the USAID University Registration system or existing users who forgot their password must use the "I forgot my password / I am a new user" link on the login page to receive a temporary password. Your username is always the first part of your USAID email address. For example, if your name is "John Doesitchimosimpo" (email address: jdoesitchimosimpo@usaid.gov) your username would be "jdoesitchimosimpo". Common access issues are addressed in Account Access Problems.

Online Training (OLT) Registration Process

Online Training (OLT) courses do not require supervisor approval and users can register for online courses in the *Course Catalog* at their convenience by clicking the "Register" button for the course in the *Course Catalog*. Users can then launch the online course from "My Courses" > "Online Courses" in the <u>Learning Management System (LMS)</u> menu.

Instructor-Led Training (ILT) Registration Process

Instructor-Led Training (ILT), also available via the *Course Catalog*, requires supervisor approval and approval from the sponsoring organization through the <u>Learning Management System (LMS</u>) before registration is confirmed. Users must *Request Authorization* from their supervisor in the *Course Catalog* and the their supervisor must also login and *Approve* training before the registration process continues. For ILT courses, all participants go to the "Waitlist" immediately upon supervisor approval to allow for the sponsoring office/mission to monitor eligible participants for a training event. When eligible employees are identified and space is available, users are then "Enrolled" from "Waitlist" status. Automated email notification from the LMS follows all steps throughout the registration process so the user knows the status of their registration.

Note: Registrations for overseas courses must be completed (including supervisor approval) no less than 45 days prior to the course start date. Courses with low enrollment after that time may be cancelled. Refer to your <u>Training Coordinator</u> for registration procedures, scheduling of classes or status of your registration.

Senior Executive Service Candidate Development Program (SES CDP)

The SES CDP is a training program designed to develop the executive qualifications of employees with strong executive potential. Competitively selected GS-15 candidates will complete a rigorous 12-18 month development program that includes rotational assignments, formal training, mentoring and more. What's New in Office Management Training

Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) - provides funding for pre-approved classroom and on-line credit courses from accredited colleges and universities. There are three TAP announcements issued yearly for the Fall, Winter/Spring, and Summer school terms. Maximum financial support is \$1500 for each funding period. Applications are reviewed by a panel to determine which courses will be approved based on justifications provided and funding limitations. Tuition Assistance Program (TAP)

Student Loan Repayment Program (SLRP) - permits USAID to repay federally insured student loans as an incentive to recruit and retain highly qualified employees. After applications are reviewed and eligibility determinations made, USAID makes payments in a lump sum on behalf of the employee directly to the lending institution for currently outstanding federal loans. The amount of reimbursement is contingent upon the number of qualifying employees and budget limitations. Review the SLRP policies and guidelines at:


Training Needs Assessment Report - In an effort to be responsive to the training needs of the staff it serves, USAID contracted PerformTech Inc. to conduct a training needs assessment to identify the learning needs of USAID's staff, including Foreign Service Officers (FSOs), Foreign Service Nationals (FSNs) (both Personal Services Contractors [PSCs] and direct hires [DH]), Civil Service (GS) personnel, and Personal Services Contractors (USPSCs). The results of this assessment are intended to assist USAID in responding to those needs by identifying perceived gaps in staff and supervisor job skills and knowledge, and in identifying training delivery methods that can potentially enable training to be more accessible to the staff.

Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) are institutions of higher education in the United States that either historically or currently have ethnic minority student enrollments of more than 25 percent. Individual Executive Orders have been issued requiring Federal Agencies to increase opportunities for Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSIs) and Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs) to participate in and benefit from programs and activities in Federal Government Agencies.

The Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization (OSDBU) coordinates the MSI and Small Business Programs. OSDBU staff is the initial point of contact for MSIs. USAID established a MSI Committee to develop strategies for creating new partnerships and ensure compliance with the Executive Orders. The Committee, which consists of representatives from each bureau and independent office within USAID, is responsible for recommending policies, initiatives, and activities to increase MSI participation in USAID programs and activities.

The MSI unit in the Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization is responsible for data collection for annual reports to the White House on USAID's plans and performance in utilizing MSIs, information sharing, and providing advice and counsel to HBCUs and other MSIs. They also provide guidance to USAID Bureaus and missions in developing activities and initiatives to increase the participation of HBCUs and other MSIs in USAID programs.

MSIs are involved in activities with USAID around the world, including a variety of research and development projects, participant training, fellowships and internships.



To advance progress toward a vision of global food security, this roadmap outlines a framework for implementing business-led and marketbased solutions that are explicitly linked to national development priorities.

Africa's Management of its Extractive Industries



This past summer, Sen. Richard Lugar commissioned the minority staff of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to assess the impact of the so-called "resource curse" and evaluate the effectiveness of current U.S. and international efforts to remedy the problem. Staff examined more than 20 resource-rich developing countries, including five in Africa - Angola, Chad, Equatorial Guinea, Ghana, and Nigeria. The

resulting report, "The Petroleum and Poverty Paradox," concludes that U.S. programs intended to help countries manage their oil money wisely could succeed only when there is sufficient political will to fight corruption and make other difficult choices. The report also found that where national leaders are willing to face the problem, outside experts can help promote stronger anti-graft and transparency policies, which make it harder for government officials to hide corruption and easier for citizens to follow the money to make sure it isn't wasted. These issues were discussed at a recent Senate hearing featuring expert testimony by Todd Moss (U.S. State Department), Paul Collier (University of Oxford), David Goldwyn (Goldwyn International Strategies), and Simon Taylor (Global Witness).

African Development Forum VI



The African Development Forum (ADF), initiated in 1999, is a periodic multi-stakeholder platform for debating, discussing, and initiating concrete strategies for Africa's development. ADF VI, coinciding with the 50th anniversary of the UN Economic Commission for

Africa (UNECA), will occur during November 19-21, 2008 in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. The forum will review progress made to date across Africa toward gender equality and women's empowerment, and articulate concrete actions for accelerating the process. The Forum's <u>Concept Note</u> providing background and describing thematic areas and expected outcomes can be found on the UNECA web site.

FY 2008 Performance Plan and Report



F has released the new <u>guidance</u> and related <u>annexes</u> for the FY 2008 Performance Plan and Report (PPR).

The PPR is designed to capture results achieved by each Operating Unit during FY 2008 (regardless of the year of funding used) and set targets for results anticipated in FY 2009 and FY 2010. Information from the PPR helps meet statutory requirements and management needs. Supplemental Reference materials to assist in preparation of the PPR will be available on the F web site on or before October 1, 2008.

Call for a Strategic U.S. Approach to the Global Food Crisis



In May 2008, in response to the growing global food crisis, the Center for Strategic International Studies (CSIS) launched a Task Force to assess the rising humanitarian, security, developmental, and market impacts of rising food costs and shortages. The resulting report was the focus of a Capitol Hill event on July 29 that included comments by Sen. Richard Lugar (R-IN) and Sen. Robert Casey (D-PA), who served as co-chairs of the CSIS Task Force. Accra Agenda for Action



The <u>Third High Level Forum on Aid</u> <u>Effectiveness</u> occurred in Accra, Ghana on September 2-4, 2008. The Forum provided the opportunity to assess progress in implementing the Paris Declaration commitments, identify remaining bottlenecks and challenges, and determine key actions that donors and partner countries might take to accelerate progress in making aid more effective. Forum participants considered and endorsed the <u>Accra Agenda for Action</u> (AAA) to deepen implementation of the Paris Declaration and respond to emerging aid effectiveness issues.


Africa's Ties with China



A recent article by two members of the IMF's African Department explores the burgeoning ties between Africa and China. Formerly dominated in the 1990s by official development aid and government ministries, the relationship has evolved such that China is now a major market, financier, investor, contractor, and builder for Africa as well as donor. At the same time, a

report by the European Parliament on China's growing presence in Africa lays out both positive and negative impacts, often entwined with human rights considerations, that challenge relations between Africa and the European Union.

Volatility in Global Food Prices



Despite increased world cereal production in 2007, a tight global cereal supply-and-demand situation prevails in the current marketing season. Cereal supplies are low mainly because of <u>dwindling stock levels carried over from the</u> <u>previous season</u>. With world demand showing little sign of abating, international prices of most cereals continue to be high and rising, while world reserves are heading for another decline from already low levels. The <u>FAO World Food</u> Situation portal provides information about the current rise in

food prices and its consequences for global food security.

Food Prices on the Political Agenda



Soaring food prices are affecting millions of people across the world - most of all, those living on the edge of poverty and hunger. Factors contributing to global food price rises include rising oil and energy costs; growing competition between biofuels and food; growing demand from burgeoning economies in the developing world; and increased climate and weather-related events that destroy crops, reducing food supplies. Information about the crisis and its long-term consequences for development has been <u>summarized by Simon Maxwell</u> of the Overseas Development Institute (UK). Immediate

efforts to respond globally are being spearheaded by the World Food Programme, where <u>additional information</u> is available. Questions and comments can be sent to <u>Tim Lavelle</u>, the Africa Bureau's Food Security Advisor.

China in Africa: Lending, Policy Space, and Governance



A recent report by the Norwegian Council for Africa, while largely agreeing with and expanding on common criticisms about China's involvement in sub-Saharan Africa, seeks to highlight some of the regional benefits and makes recommendations for the country as a major player in the African aid environment. The report includes an extensive case

study of Zambia's aid experience with China to illustrate the impact of significant Chinese involvement in an African nation.



What is Food for Peace?

"Food is strength, and food is peace, and food is freedom, and food is a helping hand to people around the world whose good will and friendship we want." — Then-Senator John F. Kennedy in a 1960 speech in South Dakota, a few weeks before he was elected president.

For more than 50 years, the Food for Peace program has brought hope and nourishment to the hungry corners of the world. Approximately 3 billion people in 150 countries have benefited directly from our food. The secret of Food for Peace's success lies in the unique combination of American compassion together with the unmatched efficiency of our nation's farmers. It is less a triumph of government than of working Americans, for in its essence, Food for Peace is the work of farmers, businessmen, grain elevator operators, truckers, bargemen, freight forwarders, port operations, private voluntary organizations, and government officials. Together they form an unbroken chain of humanity stretching from this country's fertile fields to hungry families half a world away. In the end, hope is what America has promised, and hope is what Food for Peace delivers around the world every day.

Upon reaching its destination, the food is used in a variety of ways, and always for the people most vulnerable to the effects of hunger: children under age 5, pregnant women, the elderly, and the poorest families in a community. During an emergency in which people face threat of imminent starvation, food - wheat, sorghum, corn and other commodities are distributed to save their lives. If the symptoms of extreme malnutrition have already appeared, a nutritionally fortified ration with blended, fortified, and processed food is provided. In less dire circumstances, food can be used to compensate people for work, such as building roads or repairing water and irrigation systems. In turn, these projects help protect communities from future hunger by providing them access to local markets for their produce, keeping them healthy, and improving their harvests.



Natural Resources Management



Land, water, forest, coasts and biological resources provide the foundation for rural livelihoods in much of the developing world. The wealth and power represented by these resources make their sound management and equitable access critical for sustainable economic development and a healthy environment. Recognizing this, the Office of Natural Resources Management's (NRM) top priority is helping Missions to design and implement development strategies that reflect the intrinsic linkages connecting healthy ecosystems to sustainable economies, good governance, and equitable and just societies.

To respond to the need for improved global resources

management, the NRM Office has assembled four teams containing multi-disciplinary technical experts with field experience across all of USAID's regions. Member Teams include the Biodiversity, Forestry, Water and Land Resources Management Team.

The Teams work together in a cross-sectoral approach to maximize expertise available to Missions and field projects. Objectives include improved biodiversity conservation and management; improved management of natural forests; improved land management capacity; and improved integrated management of freshwater, coastal and aquatic resources. In addition, NRM Office provides technical assistance and leadership to address U.S. Government foreign policy initiatives. Skills and expertise found among Team members are described in the Staff Directory.

The four Teams - described below - are available to help Missions with design, implementation, and evaluation of natural resources programs and to assist with integrating natural resources management with other Agency programs such as economic growth, agriculture, democracy, conflict resolution and humanitarian assistance.

Biodiversity Team: The Biodiversity Team provides support to field missions, technical leadership, and project assistance to support the conservation and sustainable use of the world's biodiversity and forests. The Team works within the U.S. Government and with the public sector to develop innovative, crosssectoral, and cross-boundary approaches to the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity and forests. The Team manages a number of field-support mechanisms, including the USDA Forest Service Inter Agency Agreement (IAA) and the Global Conservation Program, as well as partnerships with the private sector. The Team's efforts emphasize site-based conservation and sustainable forestry, with an emphasis on sound governance, improved livelihoods, social justice, and policy reform and implementation.

Forestry Team: The Forestry Team promotes sustainable forest management through improved forestry practices; responsible trade in forest products; expanded community-based forest management; policy and regulatory reform; reduction in illegal logging; and improved knowledge of forest ecosystems and management of forest resources. Team activities support agroforestry, biodiversity conservation, carbon sequestration, and the integration of assessment and monitoring systems for improving forest health. An agreement with the U.S. Forest Service augments the Team's technical expertise in support of Mission activities in forest management, watershed management, fire management, and environmental policy.

Land Resources Management Team: Through improved policies and programs, the Land Team promotes sustainable productive use, restoration and preservation of land resources at the nexus with poverty reduction, environmental and human health, natural hazard mitigation, conflict resolution, and democratic governance. Missions can draw on the Team's multi-disciplinary expertise to help them design and evaluate programs leading to improved governance and the sustainable use of natural resources. The Team includes experts in sustainable agriculture, soil science, integrated pest management, property rights, community-based natural resources management, natural resources based enterprise development, geospatial information technology, communications and knowledge management. Agreements and mechanisms managed by the Team provide access to research programs and services in the Team's areas of expertise.

Water Team: The Water Team promotes improved policies, management and optimal use of freshwater and coastal resources at the basin, aquifer and watershed scales, including the integration of land and



water use, groundwater and surface water, and coastal and marine resources. The team includes experts from throughout the Agency, as well as USAID field units, and other federal agencies. The wealth of expertise provides a significant resource for support of field operations in all aspects of integrated water resources management, including water supply and sanitation, wastewater management and pollution control, watershed management, integrated coastal management, irrigation, fisheries and aquaculture, hydropower, and disaster preparedness activities. The Team plays a lead role in interagency dialogue and support of USG initiatives, and manages agreements providing technical, analytical, and managerial assistance to the Missions and Bureaus.

The Office of Poverty Reduction is tasked with the challenge of assuring that the Agency's programs adequately address the needs, capabilities, and vulnerabilities of the poor and contribute to the achievement of the Millennium Development Goal of reducing poverty by half by 2015. The Office assists in the development, implementation, and evaluation of Agency policies, strategies, and resource allocation priorities regarding poverty reduction and monitors and advises Agency leadership regarding technical developments that could have an impact on Agency performance in reducing the number of poor worldwide.

EGAT/PR conducts analysis and operational research that assesses the relative efficacy of approaches that reach the poor either indirectly (e.g., by developing economic growth policies and strategies in ways that are pro-poor) or directly (that is, through interventions targetted to meet the immediate needs of the poor; programs and approaches that reduce the vulnerability of the poor to external shocks and risks; and/or programs that strengthen the capacity of the poor to accumulate assets.) The Office manages specific research capacity-building activities involving networks of researchers and policy analysts in developing and transition countries with regard to poverty.

EGAT/PR coordinates its research and implementation agendas and other activities with other donors, international organizations, and other agencies of the U.S. Government.

The Office manages contract/grant mechanisms that enable Missions and regional Bureaus to access a wide range of technical expertise capable of implementing both short- and long-term programs and activities that they initiate. The Office develops tracking systems and impact indicators that permit analysis of the results of the activities using the mechanisms and contribute to decisions to maintain, redesign, or terminate the mechanisms. The Office uses these mechanisms to carry out its own worldwide projects and activities as well.

The Office works closely with the Office of Economic Growth to assure that there is coordination between the two programs, especially regarding questions on the structure of growth processes, issues of equity, and the joint responsibility for monitoring Agency contributions to the Millennium Development Goals of reducing poverty and hunger. In addition, the Office of Poverty Reduction collaborates with the Office of Economic Growth in assuring that appropriate information on poverty-related issues is incorporated into Agency and Bureau training programs.

The Director of the Office of Poverty Reduction reports to the Deputy Assistant Administrator for Economic Growth, Poverty Reduction, and Education. He/she directly supervises two Supervisory Team Leaders, each responsible for oversight and management of a permanent core team:

The Microenterprise Development Team (EGAT/PR/MD) is responsible for leadership and field support regarding the Agency's implementation of the Microenterprise Initiative. The Team manages programs designed to: foster innovation in the microenterprise and microfinance fields; encourage the growth of a technically-competent practitioner community; supply short-term technical assistance to missions on the development of microfinance and microenterprise programs; and assess and monitor experiences to determine best practices in microfinance, business development services for microentrepreneurs, and meeting poor clients' needs.

The Poverty Analysis and Social Safety Net Team (EGAT/PR/PASS) provides analytical and technical leadership as well as program assistance for regional and country-based efforts aimed at reducing the risks and vulnerabilities of poor populations and other disadvantaged groups to income shortfalls, short-term food deficits, and/or the loss of personal or collective assets. Special efforts will be directed to enabling informal sector

participants to compete successfully in the formal economy through, inter alia, the development and implementation of specific legal and regulatory reforms. The Team is responsible for coordinating closely with the Bureau for Democracy, Conflict, and Humanitarian Assistance (DCHA) on Agency approaches and activities that respond to emergencies in which poor people are especially affected.

The Urban Programs Team (EGAT/PR/UP) provides technical, analytical, and project assistance support for programs that promote improvements in the way that cities foster economic growth, provide safe and adequate housing and other infrastructure for their citizens, and assure sound governance. The team manages contracts and grants that enable the team to implement its research agenda as well as provide regional bureaus and missions access to a range of partners with relevant expertise in the areas of: shelter; urban and municipal financial management; urban pollution prevention; and urban infrastructure and services. The team formulates the Agency's urban development research agenda and provides updated content for training courses.

The team provides leadership on emerging issues of urbanization and advises Agency leadership on the importance of these issues for the success of the Agency's programs.

EGAT/PR/UP has responsibility for technical coordination with bilateral and multilateral donor and lending agencies on urban development matters. The team is responsible for engaging in partnerships and alliances that further USAID's urban development agenda.

The Urban Programs Team maintains the <u>Making Cities Work</u> website which contains reports, best practices as well as access to services and partners.







Located in Budapest, Hungary, USAID/RSC is a regional service provider, responsible for procurement, legal, financial, administrative and training support for its client missions and offices in the region. In 2002 the RSC also assumed responsibility for regional program coordination and management and it currently manages four active regional programs. In February 2009, the Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance established a regional office within the RSC.

The annual budget for programs in Central and Eastern Europe managed by USAID Missions and offices in the region is \$250 million, counting SEED and ESF resources, but excluding disaster assistance. The RSC serves six active medium to large-sized programs in Southeastern Europe (Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Kosovo, Macedonia, Montenegro and Serbia), USAID's program in Cyprus, and a new Development Counselor position in Bulgaria. RSC also supports USAID's Office of Development Partnerships' overseas offices in the US Mission to the European Union (Brussels) and in the US Mission in Geneva, and the closing/closed Missions in Croatia and Romania. The RSC also provides financial services for USAID officers posted to the European and Africa Command (EUCOM and AFRICOM) located in Stuttgart, Germany.

The Office of the Regional Director has overall responsibility for planning, direction, and management of all offices within the RSC. The Regional Director maintains regular contact with USAID Mission Directors managing bilateral programs to ensure the delivery of timely and effective services, and to organize appraisal committees for employee performance reports from smaller Missions. The office is also a training hub for the region, managing a variety of training and continuing education courses throughout the year.

The Office of the Regional Director has overall responsibility for planning, direction, and management of all offices within the RSC. The Regional Director maintains regular contact with USAID Mission Directors managing bilateral programs to ensure the delivery of timely and effective services, and to organize appraisal committees for employee performance reports from smaller Missions. The office is also a training hub for the region, managing a variety of training and continuing education courses throughout the year.

The Regional Legal Advisor and a USPSC lawyer provide a wide range of legal services and advice to the six SEE Missions/offices, Cyprus, Bulgaria, the RSC, USAID offices in Belgium and Switzerland, and transition and disaster assistance organizations. Guidance is provided on U.S. foreign assistance legislation, USAID program operations, anti-terrorism financing, USAID policies and regulations, and ethics and standards of conduct issues. **The Regional Contracting Office (RCO)** provides acquisition and assistance (A&A) services for program activities and personnel in six SEE Missions/offices, Cyprus, Bulgaria, Belgium, Switzerland, Germany, the RSC Regional Program Office, and the closing/closed Missions in Croatia and Romania. With 15 staff members, the RCO manages an award portfolio of approximately 400 awards with a combined value of \$2.3 billion, providing the full range of A&A support to client Missions and is responsible for each phase of the A&A cycle, including pre-award, award, administration and close-out.

The Regional Financial Management Center (RFMC) is the official accounting station, which includes accounting, budgeting, payroll, payment, financial analysis and financial management services, for USAID activities of the E&E & ODP Bureaus in six SEE Missions/offices, Cyprus, Bulgaria (plus the closed Missions in Croatia and Romania), Germany, Belgium, and Switzerland. Twenty-one staff members maintain the accounting and financial reporting systems for the region, ensuring that financial activities are conducted in accordance with US Government laws and regulations and providing USAID programs with timely and accurate financial information vital to effective program management. The office provides advice and assistance to USAID programs with respect to audit matters emanating from USAID's Office of Inspector General, the General Accounting Office, and other groups auditing or inspecting USAID financed activities in the region.

The Executive Office (EXO) is responsible for administrative management activities for RSC. Ten EXO staff provide administrative services and logistic support for program operations through direct staff services, indirect commercial and Embassy ICASS services. The Executive Officer also supervises Regional Management Support Office (RMSO, see below).

The Regional Management Support Office (RMSO) provides management assistance to 17 Missions in the region and offices in Brussels and Geneva. Technical assistance, training, consulting, and EXO operations backup are provided through this office. Upon request from client Missions, RMSO also conducts management assessments of Executive Office operations and recommends courses of action to correct deficiencies identified.

The Regional Program Office (RPO) has two staff members responsible for regional projects. Currently, RSC manages three activities supporting civil society strengthening and higher education. The RPO also manages an emerging donors initiative for the region, working alongside new and aspiring EU member states as they establish their official development assistance (ODA) programs, helping them to build their capacity to deliver ODA while also building partnerships in the region between USAID missions and the new donor countries. Additionally, the RPO represents USAID at various fora with a regional perspective. A brief description of the activities follows.

The **Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA)** opened a regional office in the RSC in early 2009 covering Europe, Eurasia and the Middle East. OFDA is responsible for facilitating and coordinating U.S. Government emergency assistance overseas. OFDA provides humanitarian assistance to save lives, alleviate human suffering, and reduce the social and economic impact of humanitarian emergencies worldwide, responding to natural disasters or in situations when lives or livelihoods are threatened by civil conflict, acts of terrorism, or industrial accidents. In addition to emergency assistance, OFDA funds mitigation activities to reduce the impact of recurrent natural hazards and provides training

to build local capacity for disaster management and response.

The <u>China-Africa Trade and Economic Relationship Annual Report 2010</u> was released October 14, 2010, by a research institute under the Chinese Ministry of Commerce. Chinese investment in Africa reached \$1.44 billion in 2009, compared with \$220 million in 2000, the report says.

Africa's Management of its Extractive Industries



This past summer, Sen. Richard Lugar commissioned the minority staff of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to assess the impact of the so-called "resource curse" and evaluate the effectiveness of current U.S. and international efforts to remedy the problem. Staff examined more than 20 resource-rich developing countries, including five in Africa - Angola,

Chad, Equatorial Guinea, Ghana, and Nigeria. The resulting report, "The Petroleum and Poverty Paradox," concludes that U.S. programs intended to help countries manage their oil money wisely could succeed only when there is sufficient political will to fight corruption and make other difficult choices. The report also found that where national leaders are willing to face the problem, outside experts can help promote stronger anti-graft and transparency policies, which make it harder for government officials to hide corruption and easier for citizens to follow the money to make sure it isn't wasted. These issues were discussed at a recent Senate hearing featuring expert testimony by Todd Moss (U.S. State Department), Paul Collier (University of Oxford), David Goldwyn (Goldwyn International Strategies), and Simon Taylor (Global Witness).

African Development Forum VI



The African Development Forum (ADF), initiated in 1999, is a periodic multi-stakeholder platform for debating, discussing, and initiating concrete strategies for Africa's development. ADF VI, coinciding with the 50th anniversary of the UN Economic Commission for

Africa (UNECA), will occur during November 19-21, 2008 in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. The forum will review progress made to date across Africa toward gender equality and women's empowerment, and articulate concrete actions for accelerating the process. The Forum's <u>Concept Note</u> providing background and describing thematic areas and expected outcomes can be found on the UNECA web site.

FY 2008 Performance Plan and Report



F has released the new <u>guidance</u> and related <u>annexes</u> for the FY 2008 Performance Plan and Report (PPR).

The PPR is designed to capture results achieved by each Operating Unit during FY 2008 (regardless of the year of funding used) and set targets for results anticipated in FY 2009 and FY 2010. Information from the PPR helps meet statutory requirements and management needs. Supplemental Reference materials to assist in preparation of the PPR will be available on the F web site on or before October 1, 2008.

Call for a Strategic U.S. Approach to the Global Food Crisis



In May 2008, in response to the growing global food crisis, the Center for Strategic International Studies (CSIS) launched a Task Force to assess the rising humanitarian, security, developmental, and market



impacts of rising food costs and shortages. The resulting report was the focus of a Capitol Hill event on July 29 that included comments by Sen. Richard Lugar (R-IN) and Sen. Robert Casey (D-PA), who served as co-chairs of the CSIS Task Force. The <u>report and</u> <u>speakers' comments</u> can be found on the CSIS web site.

Accra Agenda for Action



The <u>Third High Level Forum on Aid</u> <u>Effectiveness</u> occurred in Accra, Ghana on September 2-4, 2008. The Forum provided the opportunity to assess progress in implementing

the Paris Declaration commitments, identify remaining bottlenecks and challenges, and determine key actions that donors and partner countries might take to accelerate progress in making aid more effective. Forum participants considered and endorsed the <u>Accra Agenda for Action</u> (AAA) to deepen implementation of the Paris Declaration and respond to emerging aid effectiveness issues.


Africa's Ties with China



A <u>recent article</u> by two members of the IMF's African Department explores the burgeoning ties between Africa and China. Formerly dominated in the 1990s by official development aid and government ministries, the relationship has evolved such that China is now a major market, financier, investor, contractor, and builder for Africa as well as donor. At the same time, a

report by the European Parliament on China's growing presence in Africa lays out both positive and negative impacts, often entwined with human rights considerations, that challenge relations between Africa and the European Union.


Volatility in Global Food Prices



Despite increased world cereal production in 2007, a tight global cereal supply-and-demand situation prevails in the current marketing season. Cereal supplies are low mainly because of <u>dwindling stock levels carried over from the</u> <u>previous season</u>. With world demand showing little sign of abating, international prices of most cereals continue to be high and rising, while world reserves are heading for another decline from already low levels. The FAO World Food

Food Prices on the Political Agenda



Soaring food prices are affecting millions of people across the world - most of all, those living on the edge of poverty and hunger. Factors contributing to global food price rises include rising oil and energy costs; growing competition between biofuels and food; growing demand from burgeoning economies in the developing world; and increased climate and weather-related events that destroy crops, reducing food supplies. Information about the crisis and its long-term consequences for development has been summarized by Simon Maxwell of the Overseas

Development Institute (UK). Immediate efforts to respond globally are being

ABOUT THE GDA:

The Private Sector Alliances' Global Development Alliance (GDA) methodology is USAID's commitment to change the way we implement our assistance mandate. GDA mobilizes the ideas, efforts and resources of governments, businesses and civil society by forging public-private alliances to stimulate economic growth, develop businesses and workforces, address health and environmental issues, and expand access to education and technology.

In the 1970s, 70 percent of resource flows from the United States to the developing world were from official development assistance and 30 percent were private. Today, 85 percent of resource flows from the United States to the developing world are private and 15 percent are public. These changes in flows reflect the emergence of the private for-profit sector and the non-governmental sector as significant participants in the development process. The Global Development Alliance approach responds to this changed environment, and it extends USAID's reach and effectiveness in meeting development objectives by combining its strengths with the resources and capabilities of other prominent actors.


Alliances incorporate the breadth of USAID and partner resources to arrive at solutions only available through pooled efforts. The resources united are as diverse as the alliances themselves, including technology and intellectual property rights, market creation, best practices, policy influence, in-country networks, and expertise in development programs ranging from international trade to biodiversity protection. Together, the combination of complementary assets has encouraged innovative approaches, more effective problem solving and deeper impact. Importantly, public-private sector conversations almost always lead to a better understanding of the challenge.

Overview

Agricultural development is a proven <u>engine of growth</u> that reduces global hunger and poverty. Historical evidence from 18th century England, 19th century Japan, and modern China shows that agricultural growth was a key factor in industrial growth and economic development.





USAID supported greenhouses allow farmers in Afghanistan like Mola Shah Goel to grow fruits and vegetables for sale year round.

The recent global recession and food price crisis

added to the suffering of people living in poverty and with chronic hunger. Around 75% of people in developing countries live in rural areas, with the vast majority dependent on agriculture for their livelihoods. In many famine prevalent countries, farming is done mostly by women. However, women only own 2% of land worldwide and often have limited access to agriculture inputs, loans, and opportunities to learn about improved techniques.

The <u>United Nations Millennium Development Goals</u> brought global attention to the problem of food insecurity and the important role of agriculture innovation and investment in developing countries. The first goal calls for the eradication of extreme poverty and hunger and requires significant investment in agriculture by donors, developing countries, and the private sector. USAID assists developing countries harness agriculture for economic growth to increase the supply and lower the cost of food by making agriculture more efficient, productive, and sustainable.

At the April 2009 G20 Summit, President Obama called upon Congress to <u>double U.S. support for agricultural</u> <u>development</u> in developing countries to more than \$1 billion. Recognizing that solving food insecurity requires engaging the world's poorest populations toward rapid, sustained economic growth, the President tasked USAID to take a leading role in the endeavor.

USAID's approach

USAID has a long history of technical leadership in international agricultural development by drawing upon the expertise of U.S. universities, industry, non-governmental and private voluntary organizations, multilateral development partners, and its own technical staff. USAID supports country-driven strategies and invests in strengthening both public and private institutions that underpin growth of the agricultural sector. The Agency works throughout the sector, from developing improved seeds and management practices to strengthening the industries along the agricultural value chain. USAID is scaling-up a comprehensive approach to agriculture by:

- Developing agricultural markets, trade, and finance
- Promoting food and nutritional security
- Funding collaborative science and technology research efforts
- Organizing volunteer technical assistance and extension services
- Fostering support for biotechnology-related decisions and access
- Developing and supporting sound programs for livestock and sustainable agriculture







MSI ORGANIZATIONS AND OTHER RELATED WEBSITES Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) are institutions of higher education in the United States that either historically or currently have ethnic minority student enrollments of more than 25 percent. Individual Executive Orders have been issued requiring Federal Agencies to increase opportunities for Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSIs) and Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs) to participate in and benefit from programs and activities in Federal Government Agencies.

The Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization (OSDBU) coordinates the MSI and Small Business Programs. OSDBU staff is the initial point of contact for MSIs. USAID established a MSI Committee to develop strategies for creating new partnerships and ensure compliance with the Executive Orders. The Committee, which consists of representatives from each bureau and independent office within USAID, is responsible for recommending policies, initiatives, and activities to increase MSI participation in USAID programs and activities.

The MSI unit in the Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization is responsible for data collection for annual reports to the White House on USAID's plans and performance in utilizing MSIs, information sharing, and providing advice and counsel to HBCUs and other MSIs. They also provide guidance to USAID Bureaus and missions in developing activities and initiatives to increase the participation of HBCUs and other MSIs in USAID programs.

MSIs are involved in activities with USAID around the world, including a variety of research and development projects, participant training, fellowships and internships.

Located in Budapest, Hungary, USAID/RSC is a regional service provider, responsible for procurement, legal, financial, administrative and training support for its client missions and offices in the region. In 2002 the RSC also assumed responsibility for regional program coordination and management and it currently manages four active regional programs. In February 2009, the Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance established a regional office within the RSC.

The annual budget for programs in Central and Eastern Europe managed by USAID Missions and offices in the region is \$250 million, counting SEED and ESF resources, but excluding disaster assistance. The RSC serves six active medium to large-sized programs in Southeastern Europe (Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Kosovo, Macedonia, Montenegro and Serbia), USAID's program in Cyprus, and a new Development Counselor position in Bulgaria. RSC also supports USAID's Office of Development Partnerships' overseas offices in the US Mission to the European Union (Brussels) and in the US Mission in Geneva, and the closing/closed Missions in Croatia and Romania. The RSC also provides financial services for USAID officers posted to the European and Africa Command (EUCOM and AFRICOM) located in Stuttgart, Germany.

The Office of the Regional Director has overall responsibility for planning, direction, and management of all offices within the RSC. The Regional Director maintains regular contact with USAID Mission Directors managing bilateral programs to ensure the delivery of timely and effective services, and to organize appraisal committees for employee performance reports from smaller Missions. The office is also a training hub for the region, managing a variety of training and continuing education courses throughout the year.

The Office of the Regional Director has overall responsibility for planning, direction, and management of all offices within the RSC. The Regional Director maintains regular contact with USAID Mission Directors managing bilateral programs to ensure the delivery of timely and effective services, and to organize appraisal committees for employee performance reports from smaller Missions. The office is also a training hub for the region, managing a variety of training and continuing education courses throughout the year.

The Regional Legal Advisor and a USPSC lawyer provide a wide range of legal services and advice to the six SEE Missions/offices, Cyprus, Bulgaria, the RSC, USAID offices in Belgium and Switzerland, and transition and disaster assistance organizations. Guidance is provided on U.S. foreign assistance legislation, USAID program operations, anti-terrorism financing, USAID policies and regulations, and ethics and standards of conduct issues. **The Regional Contracting Office (RCO)** provides acquisition and assistance (A&A) services for program activities and personnel in six SEE Missions/offices, Cyprus, Bulgaria, Belgium, Switzerland, Germany, the RSC Regional Program Office, and the closing/closed Missions in Croatia and Romania. With 15 staff members, the RCO manages an award portfolio of approximately 400 awards with a combined value of \$2.3 billion, providing the full range of A&A support to client Missions and is responsible for each phase of the A&A cycle, including pre-award, award, administration and close-out.

The Regional Financial Management Center (RFMC) is the official accounting station, which includes accounting, budgeting, payroll, payment, financial analysis and financial management services, for USAID activities of the E&E & ODP Bureaus in six SEE Missions/offices, Cyprus, Bulgaria (plus the closed Missions in Croatia and Romania), Germany, Belgium, and Switzerland. Twenty-one staff members maintain the accounting and financial reporting systems for the region, ensuring that financial activities are conducted in accordance with US Government laws and regulations and providing USAID programs with timely and accurate financial information vital to effective program management. The office provides advice and assistance to USAID programs with respect to audit matters emanating from USAID's Office of Inspector General, the General Accounting Office, and other groups auditing or inspecting USAID financed activities in the region.

The Executive Office (EXO) is responsible for administrative management activities for RSC. Ten EXO staff provide administrative services and logistic support for program operations through direct staff services, indirect commercial and Embassy ICASS services. The Executive Officer also supervises Regional Management Support Office (RMSO, see below).

The Regional Management Support Office (RMSO) provides management assistance to 17 Missions in the region and offices in Brussels and Geneva. Technical assistance, training, consulting, and EXO operations backup are provided through this office. Upon request from client Missions, RMSO also conducts management assessments of Executive Office operations and recommends courses of action to correct deficiencies identified.

The Regional Program Office (RPO) has two staff members responsible for regional projects. Currently, RSC manages three activities supporting civil society strengthening and higher education. The RPO also manages an emerging donors initiative for the region, working alongside new and aspiring EU member states as they establish their official development assistance (ODA) programs, helping them to build their capacity to deliver ODA while also building partnerships in the region between USAID missions and the new donor countries. Additionally, the RPO represents USAID at various fora with a regional perspective. A brief description of the activities follows.

The **Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA)** opened a regional office in the RSC in early 2009 covering Europe, Eurasia and the Middle East. OFDA is responsible for facilitating and coordinating U.S. Government emergency assistance overseas. OFDA provides humanitarian assistance to save lives, alleviate human suffering, and reduce the social and economic impact of humanitarian emergencies worldwide, responding to natural disasters or in situations when lives or livelihoods are threatened by civil conflict, acts of terrorism, or industrial accidents. In addition to emergency assistance, OFDA funds mitigation activities to reduce the impact of recurrent natural hazards and provides training







ABOUT THE GDA:

The Private Sector Alliances' Global Development Alliance (GDA) methodology is USAID's commitment to change the way we implement our assistance mandate. GDA mobilizes the ideas, efforts and resources of governments, businesses and civil society by forging public-private alliances to stimulate economic growth, develop businesses and workforces, address health and environmental issues, and expand access to education and technology.

In the 1970s, 70 percent of resource flows from the United States to the developing world were from official development assistance and 30 percent were private. Today, 85 percent of resource flows from the United States to the developing world are private and 15 percent are public. These changes in flows reflect the emergence of the private for-profit sector and the non-governmental sector as significant participants in the development process. The Global Development Alliance approach responds to this changed environment, and it extends USAID's reach and effectiveness in meeting development objectives by combining its strengths with the resources and capabilities of other prominent actors.

Alliances incorporate the breadth of USAID and partner resources to arrive at solutions only available through pooled efforts. The resources united are as diverse as the alliances themselves, including technology and intellectual property rights, market creation, best practices, policy influence, in-country networks, and expertise in development programs ranging from international trade to biodiversity protection. Together, the combination of complementary assets has encouraged innovative approaches, more effective problem solving and deeper impact. Importantly, public-private sector conversations almost always lead to a better understanding of the challenge.





The Center for Faith-Based and Community Initiatives (CFBCI) at USAID was established in 2002 to create a level playing field for faith and community-based organizations when competing for USAID funding.

The CFBCI works

- 1. Serve as a bridge between faith and community-based nongovernment organizations and government.
- 2. Increase the capacity of faith & community based non-governmental organizations or NGOs to better compete for funding opportunities.
- 3. Eliminate barriers to faith and community-based organizations.
- Increase collaboration among the people and organizations addressing some of the greatest social service needs in our world today.

The CFBCI works to ensure that faith and community-based organizations are properly informed about the guidelines that they will need to follow to apply and successfully administer federal funding. The Center also works to address legal and policy issues and educate USAID staff about the initiative. Additionally, it links faith and community-based organizations with capacity building resources that can be helpful to them.

The Center supplies information and training, but it does not make the decisions about which groups will be funded. Those decisions are made through procedures established by each grant program, generally involving a competitive process. No grant funding is set aside for faith-based organizations. Instead, the Faith-Based and Community initiative creates a "level-playing field" for faith-based as well as other community organizations to compete so that they can work with the government to meet the needs of communities throughout the developing world.

- The role faith-based and community organizations can play in meeting development objectives is critical, and providing technical assistance for new and potential partners is important for a level playing field. Communicating regularly with faith-based and community groups about conferences, funding opportunities, and regulations regarding provision of U.S. Government assistance is essential.
- The Center encourages collaboration between groups with similar objectives and goals and regularly highlights conferences and funding opportunities that may be beneficial to FBCOs through our CFBCI Newsletter. Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) are institutions of higher education in the United States that either historically or currently have ethnic minority student enrollments of more than 25 percent. Individual Executive Orders have been issued requiring Federal Agencies to increase opportunities for Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSIs) and Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs) to participate in and benefit from programs and activities in Federal Government Agencies.

The Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization (OSDBU) coordinates the MSI and Small Business Programs. OSDBU staff is the initial point of contact for MSIs. USAID established a MSI Committee to develop strategies for creating new partnerships and ensure compliance with the Executive Orders. The Committee, which consists of representatives from each bureau and independent office within USAID, is responsible for recommending policies, initiatives, and activities to increase MSI participation in USAID programs and activities.

The MSI unit in the Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization is responsible for data collection for annual reports to the White House on USAID's plans and performance in utilizing MSIs, information sharing, and providing advice and counsel to HBCUs and other MSIs. They also provide guidance to USAID Bureaus and missions in developing activities and initiatives to increase the participation of HBCUs and other MSIs in USAID programs.

MSIs are involved in activities with USAID around the world, including a variety of research and development projects, participant training, fellowships and internships.







What is Food for Peace?


"Food is strength, and food is peace, and food is freedom, and food is a helping hand to people around the world whose good will and friendship we want." — Then-Senator John F. Kennedy in a 1960 speech in South Dakota, a few weeks before he was elected president.

For more than 50 years, the Food for Peace program has brought hope and nourishment to the hungry corners of the world. Approximately 3 billion people in 150 countries have benefited directly from our food. The secret of Food for Peace's success lies in the unique combination of American compassion together with the unmatched efficiency of our nation's farmers. It is less a triumph of government than of working Americans, for in its essence, Food for Peace is the work of farmers, businessmen, grain elevator operators, truckers, bargemen, freight forwarders, port operations, private voluntary organizations, and government officials. Together they form an unbroken chain of humanity stretching from this country's fertile fields to hungry families half a world away. In the end, hope is what America has promised, and hope is what Food for Peace delivers around the world every day.

Upon reaching its destination, the food is used in a variety of ways, and always for the people most vulnerable to the effects of hunger: children under age 5, pregnant women, the elderly, and the poorest families in a community. During an emergency in which people face threat of imminent starvation, food - wheat, sorghum, corn and other commodities are distributed to save their lives. If the symptoms of extreme malnutrition have already appeared, a nutritionally fortified ration with blended, fortified, and processed food is provided. In less dire circumstances, food can be used to compensate people for work, such as building roads or repairing water and irrigation systems. In turn, these projects help protect communities from future hunger by providing them access to local markets for their produce, keeping them healthy, and improving their harvests.







Natural Resources Management



Land, water, forest, coasts and biological resources provide the foundation for rural livelihoods in much of the developing world. The wealth and power represented by these resources make their sound management and equitable access critical for sustainable economic development and a healthy environment. Recognizing this, the Office of Natural Resources Management's (NRM) top priority is helping Missions to design and implement development strategies that reflect the intrinsic linkages connecting healthy ecosystems to sustainable economies, good governance, and equitable and just societies.

To respond to the need for improved global resources

management, the NRM Office has assembled four teams containing multi-disciplinary technical experts with field experience across all of USAID's regions. Member Teams include the Biodiversity, Forestry, Water and Land Resources Management Team.

The Teams work together in a cross-sectoral approach to maximize expertise available to Missions and field projects. Objectives include improved biodiversity conservation and management; improved management of natural forests; improved land management capacity; and improved integrated management of freshwater, coastal and aquatic resources. In addition, NRM Office provides technical assistance and leadership to address U.S. Government foreign policy initiatives. Skills and expertise found among Team members are described in the <u>Staff Directory</u>.

The four Teams – described below – are available to help Missions with design, implementation, and evaluation of natural resources programs and to assist with integrating natural resources management with other Agency programs such as economic growth, agriculture, democracy, conflict resolution and humanitarian assistance.

Biodiversity Team: The Biodiversity Team provides support to field missions, technical leadership, and project assistance to support the conservation and sustainable use of the world's biodiversity and forests. The Team works within the U.S. Government and with the public sector to develop innovative, cross-sectoral, and cross-boundary approaches to the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity and forests. The Team manages a number of field-support mechanisms, including the USDA Forest Service Inter Agency Agreement (IAA) and the Global Conservation Program, as well as partnerships with the private sector. The Team's efforts emphasize site-based conservation and sustainable forestry, with an emphasis on sound governance, improved livelihoods, social justice, and policy reform and implementation.

<u>Forestry Team</u>: The Forestry Team promotes sustainable forest management through improved forestry practices; responsible trade in forest products; expanded community-based forest management; policy and regulatory reform; reduction in illegal logging; and improved knowledge of forest ecosystems and management of forest resources. Team activities support agroforestry, biodiversity conservation, carbon sequestration, and the integration of assessment and monitoring systems for improving forest health. An agreement with the U.S. Forest Service augments the Team's technical expertise in support of Mission activities in forest management, and environmental policy.

Land Resources Management Team: Through improved policies and programs, the Land Team promotes sustainable productive use, restoration and preservation of land resources at the nexus with poverty reduction, environmental and human health, natural hazard mitigation, conflict resolution, and democratic governance. Missions can draw on the Team's multi-disciplinary expertise to help them design and evaluate programs leading to improved governance and the sustainable use of natural resources. The Team includes experts in sustainable agriculture, soil science, integrated pest management, property rights, community-based natural resources management, natural resources based enterprise development, geospatial information technology, communications and knowledge management. Agreements and mechanisms managed by the Team provide access to research programs and services in the Team's areas of expertise.

Water Team: The Water Team promotes improved policies, management and optimal use of freshwater and coastal resources at the basin, aquifer and watershed scales, including the integration of land and







Bureau for Management

The Management Bureau is responsible for USAID's human and information resources management, acquisition and assistance, financial management and administrative services functions. It is composed of nine offices that collectively perform these functions.

The Office of the Assistant Administrator for Management serves as the Agency's principal advisor on matters relating to management and administration. It is headed by an Assistant Administrator and two Deputy Assistant Administrators who oversee and provide policy direction to Management Bureau Offices. The Assistant Administrator is also the Agency's designated Chief Information Officer (CIO), and oversees the Chief Financial Officer (CFO), the Procurement Executive, and the Chief Human Capital Officer (CHCO).

The Office administers a program of centralized administrative support for Agency operations worldwide. These support services include: personnel management, accounting and finance, management policy, control and audit coordination, administrative services, procurement policy and operations, information resources management, and overseas management support. The Office also ensures the integrity of administrative, financial, and information resources management Bureau leads the Agency's business systems modernization.



Website Design, Development, & Support

As a global organization, it is important that USAID share information throughout the Agency, with its partners, and with the general public. Web sites are a fantastic way to do so.

Web Services' experienced and customer service-oriented team provides website design, development, maintenance, hosting, and support to USAID's internal intranet and public internet websites.

Most Web Services' sites use either a SharePoint or Drupal content management system, which lets the organization maintain its own content in a familiar and easy-to-use interface without prior knowledge of HTML. A web-based content management system also frees USAID missions and offices to post content in a timely manner, without having to wait for Washington, D.C. to make content updates or alterations.

USAID Network and Mission Websites

Web Services offers secure and reliable hosting on USAID's network in Washington, D.C., and it works with missions to customize web sites to meet the needs they've identified. It builds most sites using the online content management system known as Drupal. Because it is an open-source product, it keeps costs down.






2009 Diversity and Inclusiveness Survey

Please find attached the <u>final version of the 2009 Diversity Survey Report</u>. This was an independent survey administered by the USAID Executive Diversity Council.

- With the Administrator's leadership, USAID has made great strides in promoting diversity in its workforce. Over the past 18 months, the percentage of minorities represented in our Senior Executive Service (SES) increased from 28.6 percent to 39.1 percent. USAID has a 23.2 percent higher representation of minorities in the SES than the government at-large and also is 12.1 percent higher than the government-wide representation of minorities in the SES development pool at the GS-14 and GS-15 levels.
- Among all of our new hires throughout the Agency in the past 18 months, USAID exceeds the average representation of minorities in the National Civilian Labor Force by 25.4 percent.
- This year, USAID added a new criterion for advancement to Senior Foreign Service and Senior Executive positions candidates must have demonstrated a commitment to promoting diversity. This will help ensure that respect for diversity is promoted throughout the workplace, both in Washington and in overseas missions.
- This improvement in USAID's diversity is due in part to significant advances in recruitment. Applications from minority-serving colleges and associations rose from approximately 50 to more than 1,100. Among Foreign Service Office (FSO) new hires, minority representation increased by 12.3 percent by 2007 and 2008. A new program providing internships also has improved diversity in the Agency. Program participants include five Hispanic/Latinos interns through the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU), two Native American interns through the Washington Internship for Native Students (WINS), two African Americans from Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), two other African Americans and one person with a disability.
- USAID worked with State to extend access to emergency visitation travel, security training, FAST language courses, distance learning training, and a course for Iraq-bound employees to Members of Household (MOHs) this year.

Safety Philosophy

The safety philosophy of USAID is the following:

- a. Any occupational injury and illness can be prevented. This goal is realistic, not theoretical. Supervisors and managers have primary responsibility for the well-being of employees.
- b. Management, which includes all levels including the first-line supervisor, is responsible and accountable for the prevention of accidents and control of resultant losses. Just as the line organization is responsible for attaining mission goals, ensuring quality of performance, maintaining good employee relations, and operating within cost and budget guidelines, supervisors and managers must likewise accept their share of responsibility for the safety and health of employees.
- c. It is possible to safeguard against all operating exposures that can result in accidents, injuries, and illnesses. It is preferable to eliminate the sources of danger. However, where this is not practical, management must use protective measures such as engineering controls, safety devices, administrative actions, and personal protective equipment.

- d. All employees must be trained in proper work procedures and must be educated to work safely and to understand that they are responsible for doing so. Management is responsible for the adequate safety training and education of employees. However, all employees are responsible for working safely, and, in doing so, they benefit not only their organization but also themselves in a very real way.
- e. It is good business in terms of efficiency and economy to prevent personal injuries on and off the job. In addition to humanitarian considerations, injuries drain resources and reduce efficiency.

Management Commitment, Involvement, and Accountability

Managers must demonstrate commitment to providing safe and healthful working conditions for all USAID employees and in all USAID owned, leased or controlled installations, become involved in day-to-day safety performance, and be held accountable for safety performance and compliance with OSHA and internal USAID standards and regulations.

Employee Rights and Responsibilities

Rights

Employees have the right to:

- a. Become actively involved in USAID's Safety and Health Program and to be provided a safe and healthful work environment.
- b. Report unsafe and unhealthful working conditions, using AID Form 529.1, Notice of Potential Hazard.
- c. Consult with management directly, if unrepresented, or through appropriate employee representatives on safety and health matters, i.e., program effectiveness, and participate in inspection activities where permissible.
- d. Participate in the safety and health program without fear of restraint, interference, coercion, discrimination, or reprisal.

Responsibilities

It is the responsibility of all employees to:

- a. Comply with all OSHA and USAID safety and health regulations, procedures, and practices, including the use of approved personal protective equipment.
- b. Keep the work area in a safe and healthful condition through good housekeeping and proper maintenance of property and equipment.
- c. Immediately report safety hazards and unsafe working conditions.
- d. Perform all duties in a safe manner.
- e. Immediately report any accident or injury in which they are involved to their supervisors, regardless of the extent of injury or amount of damages.
- f. Drive defensively and professionally; extending courtesy in all situations; and obeying all state, local, and

USAID regulations when driving a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted for by USAID.

Overview

Agricultural development is a proven <u>engine of growth</u> that reduces global hunger and poverty. Historical evidence from 18th century England, 19th century Japan, and modern China shows that agricultural growth was a key factor in industrial growth and economic development.

The recent global recession and food price crisis

added to the suffering of people living in poverty and with chronic hunger. Around 75% of people in developing countries live in rural areas, with the vast majority dependent on agriculture for their livelihoods. In many famine prevalent countries, farming is done mostly by women. However, women only own 2% of land worldwide and often have limited access to agriculture inputs, loans, and opportunities to learn about improved techniques.

The <u>United Nations Millennium Development Goals</u> brought global attention to the problem of food insecurity and the important role of agriculture innovation and investment in developing countries. The first goal calls for the eradication of extreme poverty and hunger and requires significant investment in agriculture by donors, developing countries, and the private sector. USAID assists developing countries harness agriculture for economic growth to increase the supply and lower the cost of food by making agriculture more efficient, productive, and sustainable.


At the April 2009 G20 Summit, President Obama called upon Congress to <u>double U.S. support for agricultural</u> <u>development</u> in developing countries to more than \$1 billion. Recognizing that solving food insecurity requires engaging the world's poorest populations toward rapid, sustained economic growth, the President tasked USAID to take a leading role in the endeavor.

USAID's approach

USAID has a long history of technical leadership in international agricultural development by drawing upon the expertise of U.S. universities, industry, non-governmental and private voluntary organizations, multilateral development partners, and its own technical staff. USAID supports country-driven strategies and invests in strengthening both public and private institutions that underpin growth of the agricultural sector. The Agency works throughout the sector, from developing improved seeds and management practices to strengthening the industries along the agricultural value chain. USAID is scaling-up a comprehensive approach to agriculture by:

- Developing agricultural markets, trade, and finance
- Promoting food and nutritional security
- Funding collaborative science and technology research efforts
- Organizing volunteer technical assistance and extension services
- Fostering support for <u>biotechnology</u>-related decisions and access
- Developing and supporting sound programs for <u>livestock</u> and <u>sustainable agriculture</u>







MSI ORGANIZATIONS AND OTHER RELATED WEBSITES

Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) are institutions of higher education in the United States that either historically or currently have ethnic minority student enrollments of more than 25 percent. Individual Executive Orders have been issued requiring Federal Agencies to increase opportunities for Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSIs) and Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs) to participate in and benefit from programs and activities in Federal Government Agencies.

The Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization (OSDBU) coordinates the MSI and Small Business Programs. OSDBU staff is the initial point of contact for MSIs. USAID established a MSI Committee to develop strategies for creating new partnerships and ensure compliance with the Executive Orders. The Committee, which consists of representatives from each bureau and independent office within USAID, is responsible for recommending policies, initiatives, and activities to increase MSI participation in USAID programs and activities.

The MSI unit in the Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization is responsible for data collection for annual reports to the White House on USAID's plans and performance in utilizing MSIs, information sharing, and providing advice and counsel to HBCUs and other MSIs. They also provide guidance to USAID Bureaus and missions in developing activities and initiatives to increase the participation of HBCUs and other MSIs in USAID programs.

MSIs are involved in activities with USAID around the world, including a variety of research and development projects, participant training, fellowships and internships.

U.N. Approves new "U.N. Women" The 'High-Level Segment of the Economic and Social Council's (ECOSOC) 2010 Annual Ministerial Review' ended with the adoption of a declaration re-asserting ECOSOC's commitment to achieving gender equality around the globe. The SOC is staffed 24 hours per day, seven days per week.

When calling the SOC, state the location and nature of the emergency � fire, medical, suspicious package, or telephonic threat. The SOC will make the necessary additional contacts with:

- the Federal Protective Service (FPS) to permit emergency vehicles and equipment to park on the street;
- the RRB GSA guard force to enable the response team to bypass the security screening station and get into the building; or
- · the Health Unit if it is a medical emergency.

Automated Directive System (ADS) Chapter 545 - Information Systems Security describes the basic policies for the secure operation of USAID unclassified information systems. We have revised the structure within the Chapter to make it more usable-this included elimination of conflicting statements and completion of nebulous or incomplete statements.

* ADS 545-Information Systems Security

The Chapter is organized to create a hierarchy of documents and subdocuments that follow traditional and NIST information security models. The seven document types are:

- · Policies, which are high-level statements of USAID's security objectives driven by federal regulations and industry best practices. **Standards**, which are specified sets of requirements or conditions established to maintain
- Standards, which are specified sets of requirements of conditions established to maintain performance, design or operation.
 Acceptable Usage Policies, which are lower-level policies that are specific to a technology.
 Plans, which are series of steps carried out to accomplish a goal.
 Procedures, which are methods by which policy is accomplished, or sets of actions taken to achieve a method.

- a result. **Rules of Behavior**, which are specific individual responsibilities. **Guidelines**, which are suggested (discretionary) courses of action where more than one choice is available (e.g. audit logs). **Checklists**, which are guide lists that contain objectives that relate to a specific goal. **Tools**, which have been developed to aid in the accomplishment a specific task. .

The documentation is organized by role. NIST guidance defines five role-types: user, system administrator, functional manager, information system security officer, and executive manager. Broad organizational policies apply to all five role-types. Lower-level policies and the supporting documentation may apply to one or more of the five role-types.

USAID has a longstanding history of working with contracted organizations and individuals to accomplish our goals.

Contractors are not employees of USAID or the United States Government. Rather, they work under the terms agreed to between USAID and their employer. All questions relating to benefits, time and attendance, pay, leave policy, etc, should be directed a contractor's employer.

There are several contracting agreements engaged in by the Agency. The following definitions help to understand these contracting arrangements and how they differ from one another.

Participating Agency Service Agreements (PASA)

PASAs are agreements between US government agencies in which staff are basically seconded or assigned from their agency to work on project-specific tasks. Global Health Bureau has had PASAs with Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and U.S. Census Bureau. EGAT Bureau has several PASA staff from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Read more about PASAs.

Resource Support Service Agreements (RSSA)

Resource Support Service Agreements (RSSAs) are between US government agencies in which staff are seconded or assigned from parent agencies. However, RSSAs are generally not assigned to project-specific tasks and are not posted overseas. RSSA formats are no longer used. Read more about RSSAs.

U.S. Personal Services Contractors (US-PSCs)

The US-PSC often provides specialized technical assistance in designing and managing programs, primarily in the field. They can be locally recruited (which is often more cost effective) or internationally recruited. Read more about US-PSCs.

The Privacy Office is responsible for stewarding the personally identifiable information holdings within USAID, which are protected by the Privacy Act of 1974, the E-Government Act of 2002, and other laws, Executive Orders, and OMB guidance. The Privacy Office operates under the direction of the Chief Privacy Officer. Its mission, to ensure that the confidentiality and integrity of an individual's personally identifiable information is maintained, while achieving the overall mission of USAID and the missions of its individual programs.

To achieve this mission, the Privacy Office has several functions and works with various Offices and Agencies, both inside USAID and external to it. It advises USAID Senior Management and Program Management staff on programmatic, policy, operational, administrative, and technological Issues that affect individual privacy, as well as data integrity and data interoperability, and other privacy related issues. It also has oversight for all privacy-related activities within USAID, specifically, privacy breach and incident reporting, providing training to USAID personnel on the collections, use, maintenance, dissemination, and disposal of protected information, assisting with the conduct of and reviewing privacy impact assessments (PIAs), and publishing systems of records notices (SORNs).

SECTION 508

In 1998, Congress amended the Rehabilitation Act to require Federal agencies to make their electronic and information technology accessible to people with disabilities. Section 508 was enacted to eliminate barriers in information technology for people with disabilities. The law applies to all federal agencies when they develop, procure, maintain, or use electronic and information technology. Under Section 508, agencies must give disabled employees and members of the public access to information that is comparable to the access available to others.

PURPOSE AND DISCLAIMER

This document assumes that you are creating files to represent standard printed publications in Microsoft Word and PowerPoint, and that you will be handing those files off to someone who knows how to create a Section 508-compliant PDF file that will be used for electronic distribution of the publication. If your original files are created using the methods described in this document, a Section 508-compliant PDF file of your entire document can be created in a matter of minutes by someone experienced in the technical implementation of Section 508, using a properly configured full-installation version of Adobe Acrobat *Professional*. If none of these methods are used, the time required to make your document Section 508-compliant will be measured in hours or even days depending upon its length.

This document is not provided as official USAID guidance, nor is it intended to be a complete guide to Section 508 compliance. If your document contains rich media, such as audio, video, animation, or interactive navigation features, additional requirements will apply that are not covered within this document. While this document will illuminate many aspects involved in the creation of a Section 508-compliant PDF file, it does not cover the technical instruction required to create the PDF file or configure Microsoft Office and Adobe Acrobat Professional software to properly pass data necessary for compliance.

This document will show you how to embed structural tags, alternative text descriptions of graphic elements, and document properties in Microsoft Word and PowerPoint.

STRUCTURAL TAGS

Structural tags are unseen labels for the type and structure of content in your document (i.e. headings, paragraph text, lists, tables, graphics, footnotes, etc, as well as their order and hierarchy). Structural tags allow people with disabilities to navigate your document through the use of assistive technologies.

ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY

People with disabilities use a variety of technologies, many of which depend upon structural tags to function property.

People with impaired vision may use assistive technology to enlarge an area of the screen, increase font size, change document colors, increase contrast, or even provide an audible or tactile Braille description of the contents and controls that would be displayed on a computer screen.

People who are mobility impaired may navigate the screen by means other than a mouse or keyboard. Some may only use a keyboard with Tab-key or arrow-key based navigation. Some may only use a mouse or joystick with a virtual software-based keyboard. Some even employ physical input methods such as eye movement tracking, or an oral sip-and-puff system controlled by breathing through a tube.

STYLES & TAGS

► If you have ever used Word's automated Table of Contents function, you have seen one use of structural tags in action – Word scans all of the tags in the document, identifies the heading hierarchy and the location of headings, and compiles the table.

► When a PDF file is made in an environment where Word and Acrobat are properly configured, the heading tags will also be used to automatically create a hierarchy of bookmarks in your PDF file – in essence, a hyperlinked table of contents.

The use of Word style elements will also allow for easy global formatting of your document to comply with USAID branding and graphics standards. Structural tags are automatically transferred into PDF files when Microsoft Office and a full installation of Adobe Acrobat Professional are properly configured to pass this data.

DOCUMENT TEXT IN MICROSOFT WORD

Using the Style elements to format your document text in Word will create the structural tags for your textual content.

Use Word's style elements to create headings:

- 1. Highlight the text you wish to format.
- 2. On the Formatting toolbar, use the drop-down menu to access the formatting style you wish to use.
- 3. Select the style. The highlighted text will change to the chosen format.

Use Heading 1 for the document's title, Heading 2 for the document's main section headings, Heading 3 for subsection headings, etc. Use Normal for regular paragraph text. Heading styles should only be used for hierarchical content headings. Use other styles to format non-heading content so that content does not become incorrectly "tagged."

LISTS IN MICROSOFT WORD

Use Word's Bullet and Numbering preformatted list styles to correctly embed structural tags for lists:

- Select the items to which you wish to add numbering or bullets. (Each item should be on its own line, i.e., in its own paragraph.)
- 2. Click the Numbering or Bullets buttons in the Formatting toolbar. The highlighted text will change to the chosen format.

TABLES & TECHNOLOGY

Screen readers and Braille displays read tables row-by-row across the columns. The TAB order also goes through the table in this way.

Consider the following simple table:

Attribute	Cat	Monkey	Snake
Fur	Yes	Yes	No
Legs	4	2	0

A screen reader will read out the information in this table as: attribute, cat, monkey, snake, fur, yes, yes, no, legs, 4, 2, 0. While this provides all of the information, it is not very helpful. Organize your table structure so that it makes sense when read from left-toright, row-by-row.

Consider the following revised table:

Animal	Fur/No Fur	Number of Legs
Cat	Fur	4 Legs
Monkey	Fur	2 Legs
Snake	No Fur	0 Legs


A screen reader will read the information in the more useful way: animal, fur/no fur, number of legs, cat, fur, 4 legs, monkey, fur, 2 legs, snake, no fur, 0 legs.

► Step 8 (right) will tag the cells in your header rows as column headings in a Microsoft Word table. Assistive technology can use that designation to bind that information to each of the cells falling below it.

A screen reader could now read our revised table (above) in this way: animal, cat, fur/no fur, fur, number of legs, 4 legs, animal, monkey, fur/no fur, fur, number of legs, 2 legs, animal, snake, fur/no fur, no fur, number of legs, 0 legs.


TABLES IN MICROSOFT WORD

Use Word's Insert Table function to embed structural tags for a simple table:

- Move your blinking text insertion cursor to the place in your document where you wish to insert your table.
- Click the Insert Table button in the Standard toolbar. A drop-down tab will appear.
- Click and drag a highlighted area in the drop-down tab to select the number of rows and columns you require. (More rows and columns can be added later, if necessary, using the Insert Row/Column functions.)
- 4. Release, and an empty table with the requested dimensions appears in your document where you placed your blinking cursor.
- 5. Populate the cells in your table.
- 6. Highlight the header rows of your table.
- Right-click the highlighted area and select Table Properties from the pop-up menu.
- 8. In the Table Properties dialog window, select the Row tab and check "Repeat as header row at the top of each page."

508 INCREASES USABILITY

Making a document Section 508 compliant doesn't just help the disabled - it adds new features we can all use:

The free Adobe Acrobat Reader can not only display PDF files - it can read 508-compliant files aloud, providing all of the information you would receive by viewing the document. You could listen to a report while eating lunch or while relaxing on the plane on your return trip from a mission!

The structural tags of a 508-compliant document can turn into a hyperlinked table of contents in a PDF file (viewable in the Bookmarks panel of Adobe Acrobat Reader), allowing you to easily skip to a particular section in a long report.

508-compliance provides ways to view and navigate documents in ways independent of the original file or intent, allowing for the creation of software that would let you access the document specially formatted for your phone or other mobile device.

There's really no limit to the ways we all may soon be interacting with 508-compliant documents!



DOCUMENT TEXT, LISTS AND TABLES IN MICROSOFT POWERPOINT

Using the placeholders in PowerPoint's Slide Layouts will create the structural tags for your text and lists.

- 1. Click the New Slide icon in the Formatting toolbar. The Slide Layout selection pane should appear on the right side of the screen.
- 2. Scroll through the pane of layout thumbnails until you find the layout containing the number and type of placeholders you need. (You can rearrange them on the slide, if necessary.)
- 3. Click the layout thumbnail to apply that layout to the current slide or, to insert a new slide using this layout:
 - a. Hover over the thumbnail until the downward arrow button appears
 - Click the button and select Insert New Slide. b.

The Outline tab will show the text and lists (and their order and hierarchy) that will automatically receive structural tags. Text on your slide that does not appear in the Outline may not receive proper tags.

Creating your tables in a PowerPoint Slide Layout placeholder should create the appropriate structure tags even though the content does not appear in the Outline view. Follow the instructions above to select an appropriate layout. For additional guidance, see the first point in the Tables & Technology sidebar in the Tables in Microsoft Word section of this document. (The second point only applies to Word).

CHARTS, DIAGRAMS, IMAGES AND OTHER GRAPHICS IN MICROSOFT WORD AND POWERPOINT

Graphic elements will not be properly tagged to the extent that the content can be conveyed by the tags alone. They will simply be identified as "shape" or "figure." This is where the next part of Section 508 compliance

508 MAKES BETTER DOCUMENTS

► Since all graphic elements must have alternative text, we may find ourselves encouraged to limit the use of graphic elements that don't meaningfully contribute to the content of our documents. Clean, uncluttered, and focused documents should always be our goal.

DON'T SKIP ALTERNATIVE TEXT

Electronic documents without alternative text for graphic elements cannot be distributed to the public, posted on the Internet or distributed to internal agency audiences.

As the author, you are best equipped to provide concise descriptions highlighting the relevant points illustrated in a graphic element.

Leaving this step to someone else risks conveying the wrong point as well as a huge increase in labor as the person tries to figure out the intended point and an appropriate description.

DON'T PRINT TO PDF!

► While the Adobe PDF printer driver is excellent for creating document proofs, IT ACTUALLY REMOVES ALL OF THE 508 FEATURES we cover in this document. Therefore, it cannot be used to create your final PDF file for distribution.

When your document is final, and you have added the Section 508 features described in this document, provide your files to someone knowledgeable in the technical requirements of Section 508 to create your final PDF file using properly configured versions of Microsoft Office and the full version of Adobe Acrobat Professional. ALTERNATIVE TEXT DESCRIPTIONS

The content and meaning of graphic elements cannot be described by structural tags alone. For these elements, we need to ensure that an alternative text description gets embedded in the element's structural tag. When assistive technologies find alternate text within a tag, that text is provided to the user. Alternative text must contain all of the relevant information a non-disabled person would get from examining the graphic element. Graphic elements that require an alternative text description include charts, photos, diagrams, clip art, icons, etc. A text equivalent must be provided for every non-text element.

The alternative text descriptions you will create in Microsoft Word and PowerPoint will be automatically transferred into PDF files when Microsoft Office and a full installation of Adobe Acrobat Professional are properly configured to pass this data.

EMBEDDING ALTERNATIVE TEXT FOR GRAPHIC ELEMENTS IN MICROSOFT WORD AND POWERPOINT

The process for embedding alternative text in Microsoft Word and PowerPoint is the same:

- Make sure all of the objects associated with the graphic (eg. multiple shapes and labels comprising a single diagram) are grouped together:
 - a. Select or highlight all of the objects.
 - b. Right-click on the selected objects. A pop-up menu appears.
 - c. Hover over the Grouping item. A sub-menu appears.
 - d. Select Group. Now you have a single graphic.
- 2. Right-click on the graphic. A pop-up menu appears.
- 3. Select Format Object/Picture/Image/(etc). A dialog window appears.
- 4. Select the Web tab. (Labeled Alt Text in newer versions.)
- 5. Type the complete description of the graphic in the area provided.

Adding document metadata doesn't just help the disabled find your document. When the document is posted on a Web site, search engines catalog the information for use in search inquiries, allowing for more focused search results. The title and subject can be displayed to the user in their search results and this logical summary information will make the user more likely to open your document. This creates a virtuous circle because your relevance ranking for the words in the user's search string increases when your document is opened as the result of a search moving you higher in the list of search results when those words are used.

DOCUMENT PROPERTIES

Document properties, also called "metadata," help people using assistive technologies to locate your documents as well as some basic information about your document. These properties will be automatically transferred into PDF files when Microsoft Office and a full installation of Adobe Acrobat Professional are properly configured to pass this data.

The properties you need to specify are:

- Title eg. "508: Quick Tips For Your Documents"
- Subject This should be a short sentence or phrase, eg. "Section 508 compliance tips for electronic documents."
- Author This can be a person's name (eg. Rick Thibault) or an organization (eg. USAID/EGAT/ESP/GCC). All documents to be hosted on a USAID Web site should use a USAID contact, eg. "Duane Muller (EGAT/ESP/GCC)."
- Keywords This should be a comma-separated list of relevant words someone might type into a search engine if they were looking for your document, eg. "Section 508, compliance, Microsoft Word, PowerPoint."

EMBEDDING DOCUMENT PROPERTIES IN MICROSOFT WORD AND POWERPOINT

The process for embedding document properties in Microsoft Word and PowerPoint is the same:

- In the File menu, select Properties. The Properties dialog window appears. If you don't see Properties in the File menu, click on the downward arrows at the bottom of the menu to expand all of the options.
- 2. Select the Summary tab.
- 3. Enter the relevant information for Title, Subject, Author and Keywords.



Country Development and Cooperation Strategies

The Agency has adopted a country-based strategic planning process that is evidenced based, prioritizes USAID's investments and keeps USAID accountable for results. Overseen by the new Bureau for Policy and Program Learning, these new assistance strategies are called "Country Development Cooperation Strategies (CDCS)."

Under regional bureau leadership, the CDCS process is conducted in three phases: (1) Parameter Identification (3 wks); (2) Strategy Preparation (3-4 mos); and (3) Review and Approval (6-8 wks). The entire process should take between 5-6 months.

The objective of the Parameter-Identification phase is to identify key parameters through a dialogue between a mission and Washington that will influence the preparation of a CDCS. This phase is intended to establish a common context for preparing, reviewing, and approving the strategy. The mission and regional bureau jointly will develop a Parameter Identification Paper, with input from appropriate USAID and State bureaus and offices and interagency partners in the field where appropriate.

The CDCS should focus on a limited and prioritized set of development objectives and program areas/elements, indicating where the Agency can have maximum impact and noting programmatic tradeoffs. The CDCS should demonstrate evidence-driven, analytically based and technically sound causal linkages throughout a results framework, and include results that are in USAID's manageable interest and appropriate for the level of resources proposed. The CDCS should incorporate the outcomes from the various Presidential Initiative planning processes and should propose program, Operating Expense, and staffing requirements that are aligned with priorities.

All strategies will be approved by the USAID Administrator. Pillar bureaus propose priorities at the onset of the parameter setting stage, and have the opportunity to comment on the parameter papers and draft strategies at various points along the way.

A more complete explanation of the CDCS process is provided in the Guidance below. Also, the list and schedule for the countries which will develop country strategies in FY 2011 is contained in the CDCS Workplan.

Land Resources Management Team



With a growing world population and increasing pressures on resources, sustainable land resources management is critical to meeting human needs and avoiding conflicts arising among competing groups. USAID's Land Resources Management Team helps developing countries advance land management practices that provide long-term social, economic, and environmental benefits.

The Team provides assistance in the following range of social and technical areas required for sound land resources management:

Science and Technology

The Team helps provide the knowledge base to address the complex issues that influence land management decisions. Good information on the impacts of various agricultural and natural resources management approaches permit prediction of the effects of changing practices, builds host country capacity to effectively manage resources, and helps direct future investments in the land. The Land Team has expertise in sustainable agriculture, soils management, integrated pest management, and community-based natural resources management to help Missions, Bureaus, and partners in the design and evaluation of land-use programs.

Governance, Policy, and Institutions

Social and cultural practices, governance issues, and property rights influence the ability to make and sustain a shift toward sustainable and equitable land-use practices. Because control of and access to resources is a major concern for rural populations in developing countries, strong and transparent governance and secure access to resources are critical to establishing sound and lasting land management practices that will lead to economic growth and poverty reduction. The Land Team provides expertise in the areas of property rights, land tenure, democratic governance, and institutional strengthening.

Economics and Enterprise Development

Development of activities that are economically competitive while environmentally sound is key to alleviating poverty and promoting sustainable economic growth. The Land Team has members with expertise in natural resource economics, sustainable agriculture, community-based natural resources management, and enterprise development.

Knowledge Management and Communication

Education, advocacy, and consensus building are essential to the dissemination and adoption of information and practices that support wise and sustainable land use, and they are critical to building capacity for informed decision making. The Land Team provides expertise in communications, community consensus building, knowledge management, and the application of geospatial information to land management decisions.

Contract Mechanisms

Team mechanisms supporting land management include: <u>Rural and Agricultural Incomes with a Sustainable</u> <u>Environment (RAISE) IQC, Prosperity, Livelihoods and Conserving Ecosystems (PLACE) IQC;</u> the Global Sustainable Tourism Alliance LWA, the <u>FRAME</u>, Stocktaking; <u>TransLinks</u>: Promoting Transformation by Linking NRM, EG, DG LWA, and <u>Devecol</u> programs; three Collaborative Research Support Programs -<u>Integrated Pest Management</u>, <u>Soil Management</u> and <u>Sustainable Agriculture and Natural Resources</u> <u>Management</u>; and the Land Tenure/Property Rights task order.





The Biodiversity Team (EGAT/NRM/B) provides support to field missions, technical leadership, and project assistance to support the conservation and sustainable use of the world's biodiversity and forests. The Team works within the U.S. Government and with the public sector to develop innovative, cross-sectoral, and cross-boundary approaches to the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity and forests. The Team manages a number of field-support mechanisms, including the USDA Forest Service Inter Agency Agreement (IAA) and the Global Conservation Program, as well as partnerships with the private sector. The Team's



efforts emphasize site-based conservation and sustainable forestry, with an emphasis on sound governance, improved livelihoods, social justice, and policy reform and implementation.

Biodiversity conservation is a key goal of USAID's programs to protect the environment. USAID pioneered and now supports one of the most comprehensive biodiversity conservation programs of any bilateral donor.



Forestry Team

Developing nations around the world increasingly recognize that their present and future economic well-being is severely threatened if a sustainable natural resource base is not maintained.

Forests are a particularly important resource as approximately 1.6 billion people worldwide depend on forests for their livelihoods.

The Forestry Team works closely with partners to implement a long-term strategy for strengthening the sustainable management of natural forests, agroforestry and other tree systems. The Forestry program seeks to:

- Serve as the Agency's forestry information clearinghouse, supporting applied research and providing information dissemination, communication and outreach:
- Develop cross-sectoral linkages and relationships with other Bureaus and Missions to increase support for activities in targeted thematic areas, explore opportunities to work with the State Department and improve communication with donors;
- Explore public-private partnerships with the business community to develop activities around mutual goals;
- · Provide technical leadership within the Agency through targeted assistance and training.

The program strategy includes providing information, technical assistance and other forms of support to Mission and Regional Bureau forestry and natural resources management activities; supporting and influencing the research agendas of international research institutions; and supporting demonstration, training and dissemination of sustainable forest management practices and policies to promote their adoption for the conservation of forest ecosystems, rehabilitation of degraded lands, and mitigation of forest through better forest management practices. The strategy recognizes that local rights to forest benefits and participation in forest management are essential for improving management practice. In addition to the adoption of improved practices and policies, improved and continued monitoring of forest use and health is necessary for long-term forest conservation.

Activities focus on:

- · Integrated forest monitoring
- · Reduced impact logging
- Increased community investment in natural resources management
- · Strengthened rehabilitation of degraded lands
- · Integrated watershed management
- Development and testing of field methodologies to measure carbon in forest ecosystems

Natural Resources Management



Land, water, forest, coasts and biological resources provide the foundation for rural livelihoods in much of the developing world. The wealth and power represented by these resources make their sound management and equitable access critical for sustainable economic development and a healthy environment. Recognizing this, the Office of Natural Resources Management's (NRM) top priority is helping Missions to design and implement development strategies that reflect the intrinsic linkages connecting healthy ecosystems to sustainable economies, good governance, and equitable and just societies.

To respond to the need for improved global resources teams containing multi-disciplinary technical experts

management, the NRM Office has assembled four teams containing multi-disciplinary technical experts with field experience across all of USAID's regions. Member Teams include the Biodiversity, Forestry, Water and Land Resources Management Team.

The Teams work together in a cross-sectoral approach to maximize expertise available to Missions and field projects. Objectives include improved biodiversity conservation and management; improved management of natural forests; improved land management capacity; and improved integrated management of freshwater, coastal and aquatic resources. In addition, NRM Office provides technical assistance and leadership to address U.S. Government foreign policy initiatives. Skills and expertise found among Team members are described in the <u>Staff Directory</u>.

The four Teams – described below – are available to help Missions with design, implementation, and evaluation of natural resources programs and to assist with integrating natural resources management with other Agency programs such as economic growth, agriculture, democracy, conflict resolution and humanitarian assistance.

<u>Biodiversity Team</u>: The Biodiversity Team provides support to field missions, technical leadership, and project assistance to support the conservation and sustainable use of the world's biodiversity and forests. The Team works within the U.S. Government and with the public sector to develop innovative, cross-sectoral, and cross-boundary approaches to the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity and forests. The Team manages a number of field-support mechanisms, including the USDA Forest Service Inter Agency Agreement (IAA) and the Global Conservation Program, as well as partnerships with the private sector. The Team's efforts emphasize site-based conservation and sustainable forestry, with an emphasis on sound governance, improved livelihoods, social justice, and policy reform and implementation.

<u>Forestry Team</u>: The Forestry Team promotes sustainable forest management through improved forestry practices; responsible trade in forest products; expanded community-based forest management; policy and regulatory reform; reduction in illegal logging; and improved knowledge of forest ecosystems and management of forest resources. Team activities support agroforestry, biodiversity conservation, carbon sequestration, and the integration of assessment and monitoring systems for improving forest health. An agreement with the U.S. Forest Service augments the Team's technical expertise in support of Mission activities in forest management, watershed management, fire management, and environmental policy.

Land Resources Management Team: Through improved policies and programs, the Land Team promotes sustainable productive use, restoration and preservation of land resources at the nexus with poverty reduction, environmental and human health, natural hazard mitigation, conflict resolution, and democratic governance. Missions can draw on the Team's multi-disciplinary expertise to help them design and evaluate programs leading to improved governance and the sustainable use of natural resources. The Team includes experts in sustainable agriculture, soil science, integrated pest management, property rights, community-based natural resources management, natural resources based enterprise development, geospatial information technology, communications and knowledge management. Agreements and mechanisms managed by the Team provide access to research programs and services in the Team's areas of expertise.

<u>Water Team</u>: The Water Team promotes improved policies, management and optimal use of freshwater and coastal resources at the basin, aquifer and watershed scales, including the integration of land and

EGAT's Office of Environment and Science Policy (ESP) provides technical leadership on international science and environmental policy issues, including U.S. participation in international environmental agreements (e.g., the UN Convention to Combat Desertification and the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change), multilateral agricultural research systems (e.g., the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research), and biotechnology. The Office engages in the extensive inter-agency discussions that determine the U.S. position for international events, assuring that the Agency's capacity for implementation is appropriate to the level of the U.S. commitments. The Office serves as a focal point for Agency involvement in agriculture and environment-related science and technology and, in collaboration with the Office of Agricultural policy and research activities that involve U.S.-based as well as international scientists. The Office monitors and advises Agency leadership regarding scientific and policy developments that could have an impact on Agency performance in these areas.


